trol of the council from the Ciudadanos mayor, Juan Carlos Maldonado. This, he heard, would mean there would be no need to bring alleged irregularities involving his salary to the attention of the authorities. **P2**

PP councillor resigns over a job offer in return for a vote to oust the mayor of Mijas

MIJAS. A Partido Popular councillor in Mijas, Santiago Martín, resigned on Thursday after SUR revealed the content of conversations in which a Podemos councillor, Francisco Martínez Ávila, was offered a job in exchange for supporting a vote of no confidence in the current mayor of Mijas.

At a meeting on Tuesday, with Martín and the local PP president and former mayor Ángel Nozal, it was also suggested that Martínez Ávila, known as Curro, would not be reported for an alleged illegality in his salary paid by the town hall if he signed a motion that would put Nozal back in the mayor's office.

The municipality is currently ruled by the centre-right Ciudadanos (C's) party led locally by mayor Juan Carlos Maldonado. After Ángel Nozal, who was mayor between 2011 and 2015, failed to repeat his overall majority in the last elections, the PP joined forces with Ciudadanos and Maldonado became mayor.

Disagreements, however, then led to a break in the two-party pact and Ciudadanos instead went into coalition with the socialist PSOE group. They have the support of Martínez Ávila, the only CSSP (Podemos-supported) councillor, on key issues.

Car journey

Tuesday's meeting, which Martínez maintains was not the first time he has received offers from the PP, began when Santiago Martín picked up Martínez Ávila in the car park of the

Parque Acuático. The first part of the taped conversation took place between the two councillors on their way to the appointment with Nozal at the headquarters of the Mancomunidad of the Western Costa del Sol, of which the former PP mayor is vice-president.

The CSSP representative expressed his concern about a court sentence that Ángel Nozal allegedly planned to use to report Maldonado for irregularities. The sentence, according to Martín handed down by the supreme court, apparently argues that a councillor who does not belong to the local government team should not be paid a salary for working full time for the town hall, unless this is approved

at the first council meeting of a term of office.

Using this sentence as a precedent, the PP believes that a lawsuit could bring serious legal consequences for Maldonado, as well as for Martínez, who would, according to the PP, have to pay back around 20,000 euros to the town hall.

In exchange for signing the no-confidence vote, which would make Nozal mayor, the PP, according to Tuesday's conversations, would keep the alleged sentence to themselves.

"I'm telling you that if Maldonado falls, this won't come up again," said Martín.

The subject of the vote of no confidence was discussed later during

the meeting with Nozal.

"To turn the tables at the town hall, we need a motion [of no confidence]," said the former mayor.

This hypothetical no confidence vote would have taken place during the coming weeks, once the support of Martínez had been established as well as that of another councillor, Elena Abda, who is not affiliated to any party.

Job offer

Santiago Martín referred to the prospect of a job before the pair parted company again in the car park.

"Don't let me down, Curro," said the PP councillor who stood down on Thursday. "I can guarantee you the

The mayor of Mijas, Juan Carlos Maldonado, reacted to the revelations on Wednesday. "If the information is confirmed I demand the resignation of Nozal and for the PP to remove him from public and political affairs," he told the press, following the publication that the local PP had offered CSSP councillor Martínez Ávila a job in exchange for supporting a vote to oust him from power, as well as bringing a possible case of an illegal salary into the equation.

"The people of Mijas don't deserve this type of political practice," said the mayor.

next four years at Club La Costa, I can get it out of Ángel because he told me a year ago." Martín added that he could expect a salary of up to 1,500 euros and implied that it was an opportunity he couldn't afford to let pass by, as "you speak English, you're an educated person, you want to study and go abroad, you want to do things."

On Thursday the public prosecution department decided to open its own investigation into the 'Caso Mijas' to establish whether the events constitute a criminal offence.

Martínez Ávila had previously stated that he would report the PP representatives for "threats, coercion and influence peddling".

According to the Podemos councillor, this was not the first time that he had been pressured in this way. "This was the last straw," he said referring to when Santiago Martín first mentioned the possible legal case regarding his salary. "They've tried to offer me things before and this time I had to catch them out," he added. "I felt blackmailed and I couldn't let that happen."

Nozal says he didn't offer anything and sues for libel

MALAGA. The president of the PP in Mijas, Ángel Nozal, said on Wednesday that it was the CSSP councillor who had asked for the meeting, in which he was apparently offered a job in exchange for helping the PP oust the Ciudadanos mayor. The reason, said Nozal, was to discuss the "verbal violence" at recent council meetings. They spoke, he said, of the current situation at the town hall.

"I told him that he held the key and that he shouldn't vote in favour of everything," he said, admitting that they discussed the "delicate issue" of his salary, but that he didn't offer him anything.

Nozal described the situation as a "manipulation" and said he suspected that the mayor, Juan Carlos Maldonado was "behind all this". He commented on the timing of events; the Ciudadanos leader Albert Rivera, was due to visit Mijas, the biggest municipality controlled by the centre-right party, on Thursday evening.

On Thursday Nozal filed a lawsuit against the CSSP councillor Martínez Ávila for libel.

PP reaction

The provincial president of the Partido Popular, Elías Bendodo, said at a press conference on Thursday that the case, now labelled 'Caso Mijas', was a question of "individual behaviour unconnected to our party politics".

Speaking prior to the resignation of Santiago Martín, Bendodo said that the party was investigating the events and would take the necessary measures.

"I'm sure that in this situation there are more actors than those who appear in the photo," he added, referring to the images of the encounter published by SUR.

Beach recovery operation takes a hit from this week's storm

Work done last week to repair Marbella's beaches after the December and February storms has been reversed by yet more destructive weather

MARBELLA. After the sudden burst of sunshine and high temperatures of last weekend, Marbella council, with a budget of 1.3 million euros provided by the central environmental ministry, initiated a project to restore the town's storm-damaged beaches. However, the arrival of yet more bad weather on the coast earlier this week means the coastal authority, which is carrying out the

work, has gone back to square one.

The project involves the transportation and embedding of nearly 50,000 square metres of sand, and was expected to be completed by Easter.

San Pedro beach was the first to be improved, but the 14,000 square metres of fresh sand that were laid there have already been lifted and swallowed up by fierce waves caused by the most recent storm.

In addition, San Pedro's promenades and showers have been damaged along with some of the chiringuito restaurants that line the beach.

"We have suffered five storms this winter, but none as bad as this one," said a waiter from Trocadero Playa, a restaurant that saw its kitchen flooded by the torrent of waves on

Wednesday.

In spite of this setback, Marbella council is optimistic that the beach improvement project can continue and will ensure that the beaches are in perfect condition for tourists and

residents by the Easter deadline.

"There is still time for the council to work on the beach infrastructure and, fortunately, the coasts authority is prepared to redo all the work it completed before the storm so that the beaches will be in optimal condition for the first big date of the tourist season," stated Miguel Díaz, Marbella's councillor for Beaches.

After work is redone at San Pedro and La Fontanilla beaches, El Faro, La Venus and San Ramón will be improved.

Marbella's beaches were not the only ones to be dealt a blow. Five-metre-high waves had an equally damaging effect on Huelin beach in the city of Malaga on Wednesday, and the erosion of a wall caused by the waves in Guadalmar led to the deluge of sea water in the local streets.

In Torremolinos, where 30 millimetres of rainfall were registered on Tuesday, large masses of sand and sea water damaged the beach's plumbing and left the promenade flooded.

Teenagers arrested in police investigations into school bullying in Fuengirola and Estepona

National Police forces have been investigating a case in Fuengirola and two in Estepona as bullying incidents in schools continue to rise

MALAGA. The number of recent serious bullying offences in schools should be treated as “isolated cases in context”, but these are nonetheless causing a lot of concern in the regional government, according to the regional minister for education, Adelaida De la Calle.

Her statement came after six minors in total were arrested in two major incidents in Fuengirola and Estepona.

The case in Fuengirola saw four young people arrested after the victim’s father was himself witness to the bullying, having had suspicions that all was not well with his son beforehand.

Having arranged to pick his son up from the Mercedes Labrador secondary school after class, he saw one boy approach his son and pull

the hood of his sweatshirt over his head.

He then threatened to hit the victim, which forced the father to get out of his car and run towards the boys, with the aggressor fleeing upon seeing him heading towards them.

The teenager was already being insulted on a daily basis by three minors, who attended the same school as him, and also by a fourth

child at another school, before events escalated and became violent.

The three minors at Mercedes Labrador, who worryingly were also said to have threatened the boy by putting a penknife to his throat, have been suspended by the school while they are being investigated by police.

The school has also taken immediate internal action, which includes

changing classes and counselling for the boy.

National Police were also alerted to a similar situation in Estepona by the parents of a boy who confessed that he was being constantly insulted by three classmates at the Juan XXIII school and that they had threatened to beat him up.

Two minors were consequently arrested, while a third is not criminally liable at just 13 years old.

The boy has since seen a psychologist specialised in bullying, while the police are also investigating the possibility of a second victim of the same group of teenagers.

A second investigation in the same municipality is also underway after a video of a girl being assaulted on the street was circulating on WhatsApp between students at Monterroso, another local secondary school. The video also shows other young people at the school cheering while the incident was taking place.

According to the Cisneros X Report, which includes bullying statistics across Spain, 27.7 per cent of pupils suffer bullying at school in Andalucía, while other research carried out by the Centro Reina Sofia found that 75 per cent of the students surveyed have witnessed some form of bullying at their schools.

Such statistics have alarmed the regional government’s Education ministry, with De la Calle reassuring parents that these cases “will be treated with the same seriousness and rigour as any other”.

Seven arrested in Marbella for offering girl’s virginity online

:: **SUR.** National Police have disbanded a criminal organisation which advertised sexual services through various websites, one of which included offering the virginity of a minor for 5,000 euros.

Seven men were arrested in Marbella after police received anonymous tip-offs about the website, stating that the girl involved was 16 years old.

The organisation used a network of telephone operators to arrange appointments and transportation of women to hotels or even the residences of affluent clients.

British man missing in Estepona found dead

Ian Thompson, 64, was found dead at the end of last week next to his car in Calle Jerguen, in El Paraíso. Sources close to the investigation said there was no evidence of the participation of other individuals in his death, although the inquiry was ongoing.

MALAGA. The police investigation was labelled 'operación Erario' (operation treasury). A Malaga business woman had complained to police last year that a tax official was allegedly asking for money to give advice on how to avoid or evade tax.

On Wednesday this week, the undercover police operation reached its climax when plainclothes officers and the investigating judge discreetly entered Malaga's main Hacienda office, on

Seven raids were carried out in total and six people were held in

total, including at least two lawyers who belong to a 'gestoría' tax advisory that was working with the Hacienda official.

Marbella petrol stations 'illegal for 20 years'

:: **H.B.** A Malaga court has upheld earlier judgements that four well-known petrol stations in Marbella were built with illegal planning permission granted in 1995 and 1996

when Jesús Gil was mayor. The stations affected are by Marbella bus station, in Nagüeles, in Cabopino and by the Marbella arch. All were built on land designated for non-industrial use in the town plan at the time. The lawyer who first brought the case in 2000 has asked for the other legally-built petrol stations in the town to be compensated.

Residents stop council selling off La Cala land

:: **I.G.** La Cala de Mijas residents' association has succeeded in stopping Mijas council from selling off a big piece of land for private housing. The 28,180-square-metre plot, by the Los Olivos football pitch on the outskirts of the village, is due to be sold for development for around seven million euros in order to help council funds. Residents have complained that the sale deprives the area of an important piece of public land and risks causing over development in La Cala. The council still wants to sell land but has now asked for new ideas from locals.

Two bodies found in strange circumstances

:: **SUR.** Two bodies have been found in suspicious circumstances on the Costa del Sol this week. In Marbella a man was found dead in the Lomas del Río Verde area on Tuesday night. He apparently had been shot in the head while on his motorbike and was discovered by a pizza delivery boy. The dead man was carrying identification and police are investigating. In Fuengirola a man's body was found floating in the river on Wednesday morning. According to police, he was believed to have been in his 50s and a foreign national.

Luxury halal-certified hotel opens its doors in Torremolinos

The building has 36 rooms and is the first Spanish venture for Kuwaiti chain Costa del Sol Hotels

MÁLAGA. Kuwaiti chain Costa del Sol Hotels has opened a new boutique hotel in Torremolinos which caters for the Arab market. The establishment, just three hundred metres from the beach, has 36 rooms.

Named Costa del Sol Torremolinos Boutique Hotel, this is the

group's first in Spain and will be only the second in the country to carry the Halal Quality Assurance Seal created by the Muslim Council of Spain (the other is in Marbella).

This means that the hotel is able to offer services specifically catering for Muslim clientele, including strict control over the catering, strictly eliminating all traces of pork product, even in pastries and dressings.

The hotel can also provide guests with prayer mats and rooms facing Mecca if they request them.

Run by Julio García and located on the Paseo Colorado in the Playa-

mar area, the hotel is already open to the public, despite the official inauguration not being planned to take place until 11 May.

The hotel also has a heated outdoor pool open all year, a jacuzzi, free wifi throughout, a gym, a panoramic 'chillout' terrace, café, restaurant and a car park.

In its efforts to be green, the chain is working towards Breeam (Building Research Establishment Environmental Assessment Methodology) certification which will see the hotel's sustainability recognised on an international level, and it is the first in Andalucía to do so.

Costa Galera residents repeat footbridge demand

A request was made to national government eight months ago, but there is still no news on when construction might start

ESTEPONA. At the moment, residents of Costa Galera have to walk at least half a kilometre in order to be able to access the coastal part of west Estepona, unless they take the risk of crossing the A-7 coast road. Consequently, residents are demanding the construction of a footbridge to prevent unnecessarily long or dangerous journeys from north of the road to the beach.

Residents first proposed the idea to the national government's pub-

lic works ministry in June last year. They were told that it was a viable project but that it would have to be approved by the local government. Since then, however, there have been no further developments.

"Summer is getting closer, foreign residents that come for high season will soon be here and the amount of people taking the risk of crossing the A-7 will increase. It is a great danger," said Antonio Carmona, the residents' spokesman. "The council have dropped the ball on the issue," he added.

Residents are also campaigning for the seasonal bus stop to be placed this year on the side of the A-7 where most of their houses are located, which will enable them to avoid crossing the motorway each time they want to catch the bus.

Are Your Funds Suitable For You?

There are thousands of investment funds available to invest in. Besides the traditional ones that invest in equities, bonds and real assets, you may have seen funds advertised that sound more interesting and seem to offer better returns, ranging from schemes investing in foreign property to second hand life insurance policies. Unfortunately, being interesting or popular does not make them suitable, and you need to carefully evaluate the risks.

Funds which pool investors' money in non-traditional scheme assets are known as Unregulated Collective Investment Schemes (UCIS). A variety of schemes have been on offer over the past decade or so, particularly in the offshore market. Unfortunately, many of them have been suspended or liquidated, leaving investors without access to their capital or, worse still, facing heavy losses.

The UK's Financial Conduct Authority (FCA) continues to have concerns about them. After noting that "consumers have lost substantial amounts of money investing in UCIS and similar products in recent

years" it introduced rules in 2014 to prevent UCIS and close substitutes (such as Traded Life Policy Investments) being promoted to the general public.

In theory, they should now only be promoted to certified high net worth, sophisticated and existing UCIS investors.

Even if you fit these categories, caution is advised. "Sophisticated" funds tend to be complex with inherent risks. The sophisticated element is not always made clear, so investors may have little idea of the real level of risk they are taking.

It is often difficult to do due diligence on these funds due to the nature of the holdings. The risks they carry are often disproportionate to the potential returns and they are usually completely unsuitable for mainstream investors.

Despite the rules, the FCA has seen evidence that ordinary members of the public are being sold UCIS, with some customers being advised to invest their self-invested pension (SIPP) into them. And of course the

FCA is focused on the UK market; expatriates have to be extra careful.

Traded Life Policy Investments invest in life assurance policies, normally of US citizens – they are sometimes referred to as 'death bonds'. Investors hope to benefit by buying the right to the insurance payments when the original policyholder dies. Most are sold as UCIS, but some take other legal forms.

Research by the FCA found levels of unsuitable advice when selling these funds. It advises that these are high risk investments which can fail entirely. It is worried the market could grow and cause more investors to lose significant amounts of money.

Here is another example of the dangers of investing in unusual funds. We recently met a retired couple in Spain who lost around £100,000 investing in a sports betting investment scheme. They started by investing a little but when returns were good moved more capital out of traditional investments into it. The scheme has now collapsed. According to a BBC

article, it was promoted as offering huge, risk-free returns and had £27 million invested in it.

So how do you choose investments?

The key rule of investing is that your overall portfolio should be specifically designed around your personal objectives, circumstances, time horizon and risk profile – obtain an objective analysis of your risk profile. Hold a diversified mix of assets to help reduce the overall risk of your portfolio. You need to keep all this in mind when considering a new fund, and how it fits with your existing holdings.

For most investors, plain vanilla is best. It is not just a question of sticking to tried and tested investment assets, but also of investing in regulated products which do not have complex, hard-to-value structures.

Regulation is very important when considering a fund. While most financial centres have a regulatory system, the level, quality and reliability varies across territories.

Make sure your investments are supervised by a body on a par with the UK's Financial Conduct Authority, considered one of the best in the world.

It is just as important to evaluate the regulation of the adviser who is making the recommendation. Always speak to an experienced, trustworthy and regulated wealth manager, which carries out a high level of due diligence when recommending funds. They should carry the highest degree of regulation and only recommend authorised funds from highly recommended jurisdictions. Mijas launches domestic violence awareness programme aimed at foreign residents

The council, non-profit associations and emergency services take steps to reach out to women in the international community

MIJAS. The need to get vital information regarding the problem of domestic violence to the foreign community in Mijas - 40 per cent of the total population according to town hall figures - has resulted in Viogenex, a project which saw its second meeting last week.

The scheme, proposed by the foreign residents department last November, involves a partnership with the municipal social services, the Local and National Police, the Guardia Civil's domestic violence unit and the organisation Soropti-

mist International as well as Cruz Roja (Red Cross) and the Lions Club.

The councillor responsible for social services, Mari Carmen Carmona, explained that the foreign popula-

tion needed to be made aware of the importance of reporting this type of violence to the police.

"We need to show this group of women the resources that are avail-

able to them at the town hall, taking another step closer to eradicating this type of violence," said Carmona at the meeting attended by the councillor for Foreign Residents, Roy Pérez, as well as representatives of the participating forces and organisations.

Translating the information available into English, German and French, among other languages, is one of the steps being taken to ensure that women of all nationalities know where to go and what to do if they suffer violence at the hands of a current or former partner.

Luis Miguel Díaz, the local Cruz Roja president, said that his organisation would be on hand to accompany women seeking help.

Elisabeth Julia of Soroptimist International said that the women's non-profit group would help with translation and act as a link between victims and the authorities.

ALGARROBO. The avenue and roundabout leading up to the La Mayora research station in Algarrobo have been officially named after the man who founded and subsequently managed the centre and who is responsible for introducing a number of important crops to the area.

Representatives from Torrox town hall, the University of Malaga and La Mayora joined Dieter Wienberg last Thursday in a ceremony at the site.

Wienberg, who was born in Turingia in Germany on 14 July 1929, was in charge of the research station, now known as the Instituto de Hortofruticultura Subtropical y Mediterránea, in Algarrobo from 1961 to 1975.

During his time there he introduced crops such as the Californian strawberry, varieties of tomato and pepper as well as the avocado, which is now considered one of the Axar-

quía's most important products.

According to the current director of the institute, Enrique Moriones, Wienberg's vision led to an evolution for agriculture by introducing crops which have generated a large number of jobs in the area.

Wienberg studied agriculture and economy at the universities of Göttingen, Bonn and Innsbruck from 1950. He later travelled to Zaragoza thanks to a Hispano-German exchange grant from the Instituto Nacional de Colonización and in January 1955 he en-

tered the Consejo Superior de Investigaciones Científicas (CSIC). In 1961 he published, together with Joachim Berger and professor Rafael Viñarás, a paper on 'problems and possibilities of increasing the Spanish export of vegetables, fresh fruit and new potatoes,' in which the idea of opening a research station on the Costa del Sol was proposed.

In 1961 the Centro Experimental Económico-Agrario La Mayora in Algarrobo was created and financed by German development funds.

Further improvements to popular tourist areas are underway. Some 900 new plants and flowers are being planted on the Balcón de Europa. New flowers, all of which are white and purple in colour, have been chosen due to their resistance to heat and palm tree roots which town hall sources say tend to prevent other plants from absorbing nutrients.

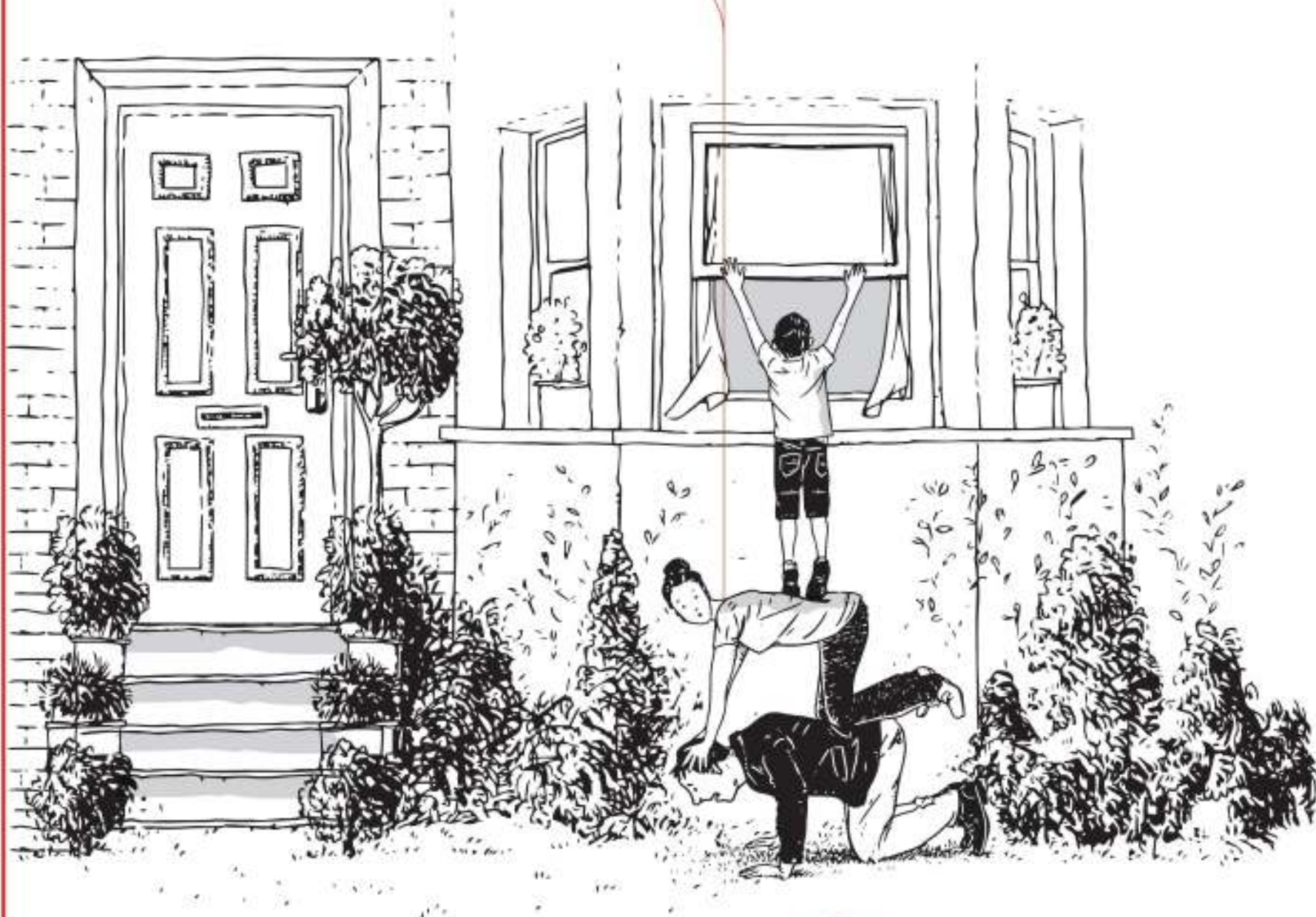

Real estate firm proposes 300-million-euro project to revamp Tivoli

The Madrid-based Tremón plans to add new attractions to the theme park as well as creating a commercial complex with a hotel, cinema and concert hall

BENALMÁDENA. The real estate group Tremón plans to modernise the Costa del Sol's iconic theme park, Tivoli World, as well as developing adjoining land to create a commercial and leisure centre.

The Madrid firm proposes to create a complex covering more than 152,000 square metres which would include two commercial ar-

reas on the east side of the park, as well as gardens and an underground car park with 2,000 spaces.

The new commercial areas would include a hypermarket, a multi-screen cinema, three office blocks, a concert hall and a hotel.

The area occupied by the theme park itself is not expected to change although Tivoli would undergo a complete renovation with the installation of 43 attractions. Among them would be an area for extreme stunts demonstrations as well as a mini Formula 1 circuit and an Everest expedition attrac-



The commercial rejuvenation of Arroyo de la Miel

The shopping and leisure centre would transform Arroyo de la Miel with two new commercial spaces, an urban park, a pedestrianised square, as well as a rejuvenated theme park.

A facelift planned more than a decade ago

Plans to modernise Tivoli have been on the drawing board for more than a decade. The real estate group Tremón has been able to make its move now, however, thanks to the recovery from the financial crisis and the unusual stability of the local town hall, which has seen five different mayors in the last ten years.

Businessman Rafael Gómez had previously announced plans to build a commercial centre on land used as a car park, with cinemas, shops and a circus, however the project was stopped in its tracks by the financial crisis. Gómez had bought Tivoli in 2004 from its previous owner, Bent Olsen, who founded the iconic park in 1972.

The project has been on the back burner since Tremón acquired the park from Gómez in 2007, although the group, with its own debts in the financial crisis, has been able to do nothing until now.

Benalmádena has no major shopping centre, despite being one of the Costa del Sol's busiest tourist resorts and residential areas.

About to reach its 45th anniversary, Tivoli has been crying out for renovation for years. The park was built at the beginning of the seventies, when Spain was starting to satisfy the need for leisure facilities in the latter years of the Franco regime.

Fireworks, a rollercoaster, the Chinese pagoda and a boating lake were highlights of the opening of a park that has been through golden eras and more depressing times, without losing its position as a benchmark attraction among several generations of residents and visitors.

In its nearly 45 years, Tivoli has seen more than 30 million visitors and even in its more neglected periods visitor numbers fell but the park was never closed.

tion. The entire complex would keep the name Tivoli.

The main obstacle in the way of the developers is the ownership of the park. Tremón bought Tivoli in 2007 from the Cordoba businessman Rafael Gómez, otherwise known as Sandokán, who owns the firm Arenal 2000. This was part of a massive real estate deal that included the sale of some 30 properties across Andalucía, amounting to a total of seven million square metres.

However Gómez alleged that the sale had not been fully completed and took the matter to court. This led to the paradoxical situation in that the park is in the name of Tremón but it is still managed by a company linked to the Cordoba businessman, who was recently sentenced to five years in prison for tax offences.

SUR has learned that Tremón is prepared to go ahead with this new project, with an investment of 300 million euros, as soon as the court dispute is over.

The project, which would trans-

form Arroyo de la Miel, has been welcomed by Benalmádena town hall. The local authority is keen to speed up the administrative process, considering the creation of employment and the economic impact of the new centre would

be a unique opportunity to revive commerce in the Arroyo area.

The town hall would also gain financially from planning permission fees and other taxes, a welcome cash injection for the local coffers.

Representatives of Tremón have met with the mayor of Benalmádena, Víctor Navas, on at least four occasions, the most recent last week. Among other conditions for a future planning agreement, the council has called for the jobs of the around a hundred staff at Tivoli to be maintained.

The project is expected to create more than 1,600 jobs during its construction, expected to take two years, and 3,300 after completion.

The new park would not require the modification of the PGOU planning regulations, although, as in the case of the complex the developer Intu is due to build in Torremolinos, the access roads could cause administrative complications.

Tremón proposes a number of works to improve road connections from the Costa and Benalmádena Pueblo. The future work to prevent holdups at the Arroyo de la Miel exit on the A-7 will also be essential for the Tivoli project, however the central government has included 17 million euros for the improvements in its budget.

Thomas Cook chooses Costa for global summer planning meeting

The British tour operator held its 'Destination Management Conference' in Torremolinos, where 250 executives discussed plans for the season

TORREMOLINOS. British travel giant Thomas Cook discussed its business strategies for summer tourist destinations at its 'Destination Management Conference' at the Palacio de Congresos conference centre in Torremolinos this week.

In a boost for the Costa del Sol's image, Torremolinos was chosen to host the annual event which was attended by more than 250 executives from 50 countries. Peter Frankhauser, company chief executive, led the two-day meeting and set out to brief staff on current social and political factors affect-

ing the tourism market and to anticipate operational issues that may occur from now until the end of the summer.

Spain is Thomas Cook's most popular destination, with the company expecting to look after a similar number this summer to the 4.5 million tourists who travelled to the country last year on its packages.

Support from the mayor

The conference was opened by the mayor of Torremolinos, José Ortiz, who was keen to highlight the strong historical links that the company, as "pioneer of tourism", has with the Costa town.

Ortiz also emphasised the importance of public and private partnerships and a strong relationship between all travel agents as key to seeing Torremolinos become "a leading tourism product".

The mayor also reminded those present of the 100 million euros in-

vested by the local hotel industry in the last two years in the town, which has been "one of the biggest renovation and modernisation programmes seen on the Costa del Sol in decades". Some 20 per cent of the 21,000 rooms in the municipality are expected to have been modernised.

Thomas Cook plans to increase flights to the Spanish mainland this summer, in addition to its increased programme to the islands. Extra flights have been scheduled to Malaga and Almeria airports among others.

Zara owner sees sales jump 12% and profits beat three billion euros

The Inditex group, owner of many well-known high street brands, sold over 23 billion euros in 2016 and created 9,596 new jobs worldwide

LA CORUÑA. Spanish retail giant, Inditex, carried on its upward march in 2016 and continued to beat its own sales records. The Galicia-based company, which owns brands such as Zara, Massimo Dutti, Pull & Bear and Stradivarius, saw sales of 23.31 billion euros worldwide in the twelve months ending 31 January, an increase of 12 per cent. Over 15 billion of these sales came from the Zara brand.

Group sales grew in each of the 93 countries where it operates. There were 279 net store openings last year and it now has 7,292 shops around the world.

Inditex profits increased ten per cent to 3.1 billion euros, helping it keep its market leadership and beating nearest rival H&M.

Reporting the annual results this week, Pablo Isla, company chairman and CEO, thanked the group's 160,000 employees globally. Staff levels increased by 9,596 on 2015.

It was also announced that Amancio Ortega, Inditex founder and one of the world's richest men, was lucky enough to walk away with a 1.3-billion-euro dividend.

In Madrid, Zara is getting ready to open its biggest store in the world on 7 April, with 6,000 square metres of retail space.

IS THE EURO REALLY THE DEUTSCHMARK?

As Europe braces itself for a year of political uncertainty, the single market currency is again coming in the spotlight. As Europeans look towards summer vacations, venturing outside the eurozone could be expensive. The market has not yet priced in a Le Pen victory or an Italian referendum on membership of the EU.

Following on the heels of the European Common market, the single currency was conceived out of a need for mortar to cement the bricks of a political institution. The construction of the EU with a central bank that has no ability to be the lender of last resort for the banks was genius of Machiavellian proportions.

The German central bank, the Bundesbank, presided over the economic miracle of a German economy that rose from the ashes of communism after reunification with the East. Etched into the Bundesbank DNA was the vow never again to return to the inflation that ravaged the 1930s when a million Marks bought 1 US Dollar. Germany today has the

largest current account surplus of any economy due in no small measure to the credit risk management of the Bundesbank. An independent treasury within the EU with the ability to print government bonds has been strongly opposed by Germany.

During the hot summer of 2010, Germany, together with the IMF and the Troika, unleashed its full fury on the Greek government, demanding severe fiscal austerity in return for a loan. Greece, already bankrupt, was forced to submit to German demands as both an example and deterrent. Deutsche Bank was near insolvency and it had a large loan position with Greece. The Greek government received little. The EU's first scalp was the resignation of Yanis Varoufakis, the Greek finance minister. He rejected the extend and pretend strategy by refusing to allow the Greek government to guarantee worthless Greek paper so that it could be held as collateral by the IMF to issue credit to pay German banks. Against the German finance minister there could only

be one victor. Varoufakis resigned, only to be replaced by someone who would continue the charade.

The German economy has benefitted the most from the single currency. With an export-led economy it makes up 27% of the eurozone and contributes the lion's share to debt relief within Europe. When Deutsche Bank lent to Greece, along with the French bank Société Générale, they knew that Greece would not be able to repay capital or service the loan. Their subsequent demands were reminiscent of the victorious allies' retribution on Germany in 1926.

President Trump, with US jobs and wages at the centre of his reform agenda, recently lashed out, disputing the strength of the euro. It is significant that he directed his remarks at Chancellor Merkel. She not only issued a strong rebuttal but added that the ECB's policy is not geared towards her country and benefits other member states. However, as the eurozone navigates the stormy waters ahead, there will only be one pair of hands at the helm. They may not be those of Frau Merkel, but they will be German.

OECD report praises Spain's recovery but warns on poverty

MADRID. The OECD has said that Spain's economic recovery is one of the strongest in the developed world thanks to structural financial reforms carried out over the last few years.

Announcing in Madrid details of the global economic watchdog's annual report on Spain, Secretary-General, José Ángel Gurría, said that the OECD was increasing its forecast for Spanish economic growth in 2017 to 2.5 per cent and

lowering its unemployment rate forecast to 17.5 per cent.

However he criticised Spain's recent record on social inequality and poverty, pointing out in front of Spain's Finance minister, Luis de Guindos, that the child poverty rate in Spain is 24 per cent, double the OECD average. He applauded labour market reforms but warned against high levels of short-term and part-time contracts and a decline in real wages.

Gibraltar to be the starting point for the Eurafrica Trail this year

Competitors will have to do a 4km vertical climb up the Rock as well as the 25 or 50km stage in Los Alcornocales and the 40kms in Chefchaouen

GIBRALTAR. The Eurafrica Trail, the first mountain race in the world to be held in two continents and three countries, will be starting from Gibraltar for the first time this year. It is due to take place over five days from Wednesday 11 October, finishing on Sunday 15 in the Moroccan town of Chefchaouen.

This year will see the third edition of the popular race, which in the past has included 1,000 competitors from nine different countries and has needed 200 volunteers. However, this year's event will be more difficult than ever because, in addition to the 25 or 50 kilometre leg in the Alcornocales Natural Park in Andalucía and the final 40 kilometre leg in Chefchaouen, participants will have to do a four kilometre vertical climb from Europa Point in Gibraltar to O'Hara's Battery via the Mediterranean Steps.

The event has grown exponentially

and has now established relationships with mainstream and specialized media partners around the world. Eurafrica Trail also has over 10,000 subscribers and its website statistics depict over 1.5 million online hits.

In addition to the competitive side of the event the Eurafrica Trail organisers are very conscious of the need to protect the natural environment within which the race is held and the communities that it involves. With this in mind, they have organised activities such as the planting of the

THE VICIOUS CIRCLE OF BREXIT

The nature of Brexit will be determined precisely by negotiations that are being soured before they've even begun

It doesn't happen often, but I recently agreed with something Mariano Rajoy said. Last Friday, the unflappable Spanish prime minister told reporters in Madrid that regarding the soon-to-commence process of the UK's withdrawal from the EU, "There is no need to dramatise things."

His characteristically placid remarks come after the leaking of a document written by the Permanent Representation of Spain to the EU (PRS). Intended for politicians' eyes only, the paper was seen by El País newspaper, who relayed its doom-laden predictions about the impact of Brexit on Spain.

According to this document, the hard Brexit being pursued by the UK government will reduce Spain's GDP growth by up to four billion euros. Spain will also lose as much as one billion euros worth of exports to the UK after the latter leaves the Single Market and will have to pay in an extra 888 million to the EU Budget. The paper goes on to express con-

cerns about the effect of Brexit on Spanish companies with big UK operations, such as Santander, Telefónica and Iberdrola.

It also warns that the lives of Spanish footballers playing in the UK might be made difficult by Brexit. That makes you suspect, if you didn't already, that the report's creators threw in any possible negative effect of Brexit on Spain (interpreting "negative" loosely where footballers are concerned), found some statistics from somewhere to back them up, and came to an often-reached conclusion: that Brexit will be a disaster for all concerned.

The report did, at least, express one unassailable opinion - namely, that Brexit would have "innumerable repercussions". But then anyone who hasn't been living in a hermitage since last June could have written that.

Attempts to be definitive about the costs of Brexit - both for the UK and for other EU member states - are premature, odd as that might sound almost nine months after the referen-

dum. We are still a long way from knowing what trading deals are likely to be struck and with which countries, what probable impact Brexit will have on sterling and the euro and what impact that, in turn, will have on the UK holidaymakers who currently favour Spain. Socratic humility is called for regarding the outcome of Brexit, because as yet all we know is that we know nothing.

El País reported that the PRS authors obviously favoured a soft Brexit. This is understandable, but it highlights what will be the fundamental problem when the exit process finally starts. The UK has stated it will leave the Single Market as well as the EU and the latter, it is now clear, wishes to punish the UK for doing so.

The undertone of reports such as the Spanish one leaked by El País is that if key EU countries are going to be hammered by Brexit, they're less likely to be amicable during the Article 50 process. While the importance of that "if" cannot be overstated, key players in the EU are already taking a combative stance towards the UK because of the perceived implications of its withdrawal from the Single Market. And so a vicious circle is created, as the nature of that exit will be determined precisely by negotiations that are being soured before they've even begun.

I'm with Rajoy, though: there's no need for drama or hysteria, especially before Article 50 has even been triggered - although "ignited" is starting to seem like a more appropriate term. Brexit is going to be complicated enough as it is.

Uncertainty for many as Brexit bill gets royal assent

Pro-remain groups are to participate in the 'Unite for Europe' march on 25 March to highlight the plight of EU citizens in UK and Britons abroad

MALAGA. Britons living in European Union countries and European Union citizens living in the UK suffered a blow on Monday when MPs voted against an amendment by the House of Lords to publish plans to guarantee citizens' rights within three months of Article 50 being triggered.

The amendment was one of two to be considered by the House of Commons before the European Union (notification of withdrawal) Bill, or 'Brexit Bill,' as it has been dubbed, was passed by MPs unamended on Monday, paving the way for Prime Minister, Theresa May, to trigger Article 50.

Following the vote, Brexit minister, David Davis promised to hold, "moral responsibility," for guaranteeing the rights of Britons abroad and EU nationals living in the UK. However, critics and pro-remain groups have accused the government of using the two groups as "bargaining chips," and continuing to leave their futures in the balance.

Spain-based 'Bremain in Spain' will be participating in the 'Unite for Europe' march planned for 25 March in London, to highlight the plight of Britons in the country and in particular pensioners, who Sue Wilson, says are, "at breaking point,"

following the vote, as they are fearful of whether they will still be eligible for free health care once the UK leaves the EU. Other concerns include paying for prescriptions and eligibility for mortgages should they have to return to the UK.

The group will be taking banners, with messages including, "If 350,000 pensioners were forced to return to the UK, could our NHS cope?" and another which features Nigel Farage presiding over a large queue of pensioners, instead of refugees, in a twist on the controversial original 'Breaking Point' poster used by pro-Brexit campaigners in the lead-up to the referendum.

The 'Brexit Bill' was given Royal assent on Thursday and Prime Minister, Theresa May, is expected to trigger the long-anticipated Article 50 during the last week of March, although formal negotiations may not start until June.

Former leader of Catalonia banned from office over illegal referendum

Artur Mas is defiant after the two-year court order, criticising Spanish democracy, but faces other pressures and accusations

BARCELONA. The former president of Catalonia, Artur Mas, has been banned from public office for two years by a Barcelona court for his part in the organisation of an independence referendum held in November 2014. Two other former regional ministers were also banned from office.

The court found that the regional government, headed by Mas at the time, had provided logistical sup-

port for the vote, despite the Constitutional Court ruling the vote illegal. Mas had claimed that the vote wasn't a referendum but a "voluntary political process". A decision is still awaited from the Supreme Court on Francesc Homs, ex-cabinet minister, on the same charge.

'Spain is a unfair democracy'

Mas hit out at the decision, saying that Spain was a "unfair democracy" and that the law wasn't the same for everyone. Mas also faces extra pressure on his political career as his name has been linked to the 'Palau' corruption case, when commission was allegedly paid to local politicians for awarding public contracts.

Another banned referendum is controversially planned for September this year by regional politicians.

The last Spanish State Visit was in 1986.

■ **J.L.A.** Richard Gere has expressed an interest in buying a group of buildings in the town of Alcorcón, in the Madrid region, to convert it into a large Buddhist meditation and cultural centre. The 67-year-old actor, known for his following of the Dalai Lama, visited a month ago and plans to take another look in May, according to the local mayor.

SUSANA DÍAZ TO UNVEIL PLAN TO BE PSOE LEADER

The President of the Junta de Andalucía, Susana Díaz, pictured in Seville this week, has said that she will announce her candidacy for the national leadership of the socialist PSOE party on 26 March. She is seen as the 'establishment candidate'. Former leader, Pedro Sánchez, and Patxi López are also to stand.

Over to Mijas

The image of Marbella often spreads beyond the municipal borders, becoming an umbrella location for a large proportion of the western Costa del Sol. There are hotels and beach clubs in Estepona that use the Marbella brand in their marketing - and nobody seems to mind, not in Marbella, nor in Estepona -, in the same way as luxury residential estates in Benahavis or property developments in Ojén also effectively use the allure of their larger, more famous neighbour. It's hard enough to position a brand in the international tourism and property markets, especially when that brand is ignored by the public institutions that should be promoting it, so there's no point clinging to it just

for the sake of boundary line.

In recent years Mijas has also made use of the Marbella umbrella but in a different way. Not to promote successful financial initiatives, but to hide its own disgraces behind scandals that are much more conspicuous, not because they are more serious, but due to the brand penetration.

However you only have to look at the planning atrocities overlooking the motorway to conclude that something has been smelling fishy in Mijas for some time. But as there haven't been great scandals to be ashamed of, it seems that the necessary moral antibodies have not been generated.

Now it transpires that the Partido Popular spokesman in Mijas,

Ángel Nozal, has offered a Podemos councillor a job for taking part in a no confidence vote to regain power over the town hall. And if he doesn't accept, he will be reported for allegedly earning a salary he's not entitled to. Nothing personal. Just business.

This offer, which is really a threat, shows yet again that, looking at it with the best will, indulgence and naivety, the Partido Popular has two souls living side by side: that of those who are ashamed of everything from the Gürtel scandal to this one, and that of those who think they can carry on regardless, simply taking the general public for as long a ride as they can.

The track record of Ángel Nozal and the ethics of his offer leave no doubt as to which soul is driving him. Neither does it seem likely that he will stand down of his own accord.

Meanwhile those who should have been showing him the door were worryingly silent after the story broke on Wednesday. Perhaps we should question the soul behind their political project.

The mysterious Apostle of Ireland

Legend says his birth name was Maewyn Succat, but he changed it to Patricius after becoming a priest



TORREMOLINOS. St Patrick's Day parties and parades will be taking place all around the world today, as Irish nationals remember the Apostle of Ireland, the most celebrated saint of them all.

Dublin's St Patrick's Day Parade and Festival is one of the largest in the world. The four-day event is attended by approximately 500,000 people, who celebrate with marching bands and folk music, Irish dancing displays, carnival-style floats and plenty of Irish humour.

However, parades in his honour first began in North America in the eighteenth century and did not spread to Ireland until the twentieth century.

The first parade was held in New York City on 17 March 1762, and today it still uses the same route as it did more than 250 years previous. However, not every city goes all-out in its celebratory efforts.

The Irish village of Dripsey once held the title of the shortest St Patrick's Day Parade in the World. The route was just 26 yards; the distance between the only two pubs in the village. The parade was abolished after one of the pubs closed down in 2007.

For most of the twentieth century, St Patrick's Day was considered a strictly religious holiday in Ireland and the nation's pubs remained closed.

The day was converted to a national holiday in 1970 and this is when the pubs were given permission to open. This must have been a great relief for the big breweries, because surveys declare that the consumption of Guinness more than doubles on 17 March.

As with most versions concerning the feats and achievements of saints and holy figures, the history of St Patrick is filled with as much myth as it is fact.

Some of what is known about St Patrick comes from the Declaration, which was allegedly written by Patrick himself. Most available details of his life are from subsequent Irish annals, but these are generally dismissed as folklore.

The dates of his life cannot be fixed with certainty, but it is generally believed that he was active as a missionary in Ireland during the second half of the fifth century.

According to Irish legend, St Pat-

rick, who was born in Britain, wasn't originally called Patrick. His birth name was Maewyn Succat, but he changed his name to Patricius after becoming a priest.

He is regarded as the founder of Christianity in Ireland and legend claims that, when teaching the Irish about the doctrine, St Patrick used a three-leafed clover as a metaphor for the Holy Trinity.

It is also claimed he drove all the snakes from Ireland with his staff, even though modern scientists suggest that Ireland has never had snakes due to its climate.

The cane with which he is said to have banished the snakes was venerated for centuries, only to be publicly burned in 1538 under the orders of the archbishop of Dublin.

Another legend claimed that his walking stick grew into a living tree.

During his journey through Ireland, he is understood to have carried an ash walking cane, which he would thrust into the ground whenever he

was preaching. Legend claims that the message of Christianity took so long to get through to the residents of a village called Aspatia; the stick had taken root by the time he was ready to move on.

Blue, not green

Even though a sea of green will engulf most towns and cities in Ireland during the saint's celebrations, several early artworks depict him wearing blue vestments. While green is now the excepted colour of Ireland, blue is still the official state colour.

King Henry VIII used the Irish harp in gold on a blue flag to represent the country. The harp has appeared on Irish gravestones since the medieval period and it is certain that it was popular in Irish legend and culture long before that period.

Holy relics

A few of the saint's relics can still be viewed in Ireland today. St Patrick's Bell, along with pieces of his jaw and tooth, are displayed in the National Museum in Dublin.

The bell, first mentioned in the 'Book of Cuanu' in the year 552, was part of a collection of relics removed from his tomb sixty years after his death.

Although most historians believe that St Patrick died in 461, the Annals of the Four Masters, chronicles of medieval Irish history, claim that he died in 493. He is said to have been 122 years old.

He is believed to have been buried at the cathedral in Downpatrick, County Down, alongside St Brigid and St Columba; although this has never been verified.

One thing that can be said with complete conviction is that St Patrick is the most venerated saint of them all.

Malaga's links with famous Irish nationals

The roots that link Malaga with Ireland are more ingrained than many people might think.

Among the Irishmen who found a prominent place in the history of the city was a leather tanner named Thomas Livermore Page.

His name is etched into Malaga's history because two of his daughters married personalities of great importance in the development and future of the city.

George Campbell was a renowned Irish painter who had a 25-year love affair with Malaga. Campbell became acquainted with numerous Spaniards who had settled in Dublin during the 1940s, and he often painted visiting Spanish dancers in their traditional costume.

Walter Starkie, the Irish scholar, Hispanist, author, musician and founder and first director of the British Institute in Madrid, was seduced by Spain.

One of his most famous works, Spanish Raggle-Taggle, is based on his travels through Spain during the 1930s.

Robert Boyd is probably one of the most popular Irish heroes connected with Spain. Boyd was one of the leaders of an ill-fated liberal uprising against Ferdinand VII that was captured and executed in 1831.

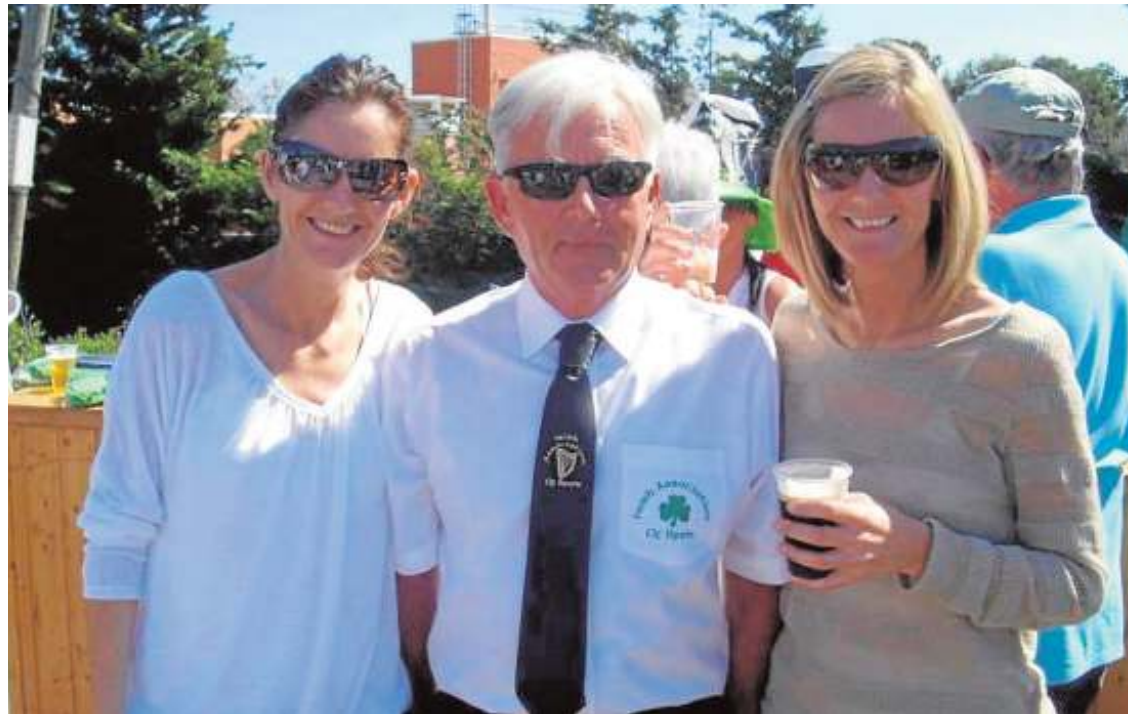
Few of the partygoers spare much thought for the coordinators of these massive all-day events and the people behind the scenes rarely receive much recognition for their efforts.

The popular celebration held in Benalmádena every year is organised by the Irish Association of Spain. Founded by Tony Bell in 1997, the association facilitates social contact between the Irish people living in Spain, and their St Patrick's Day party is one of the most attended in the area.

However, the Irish association does much more than arrange the annual shindig in memory of the Apostle of Ireland. Terry McKinley, president of the association, explained that the objective of the platform is to assist and inform Irish nationals who have chosen Spain as their adopted home. They also offer their services to the thousands of Irish tourists who visit the Costa del Sol each year.

"We are not a club or welfare; there is no membership or fee, we simply provide an informative service to the Irish community who live or visit the Costa del Sol," the president told SUR in English.

There is an estimated 4,000 Irish nationals living in the province of Malaga and the association soon

became their leading social and informative platform.

The service is not only available to the Irish community; it also offers help and information to people with a general interest in Irish history, culture and traditions.

The association has a list of teachers on their books, and so traditional Irish folk dancing lessons can be arranged for those who want to learn the Slip Jig, or other old style dances.

Working closely with many of the town halls along the coast, the Irish Association publish details of upcoming events, clubs and classes that may be of interest to the Irish community.

Their website lists preferred service providers and their products are monitored to ensure the highest quality service. Another of their priorities is to promote and encourage the use of the many Irish-owned businesses in Spain.

The association also gives assistance to Spanish nationals wishing to travel to, or live in, Ireland. They offer help with problems tourists might encounter, like lost or stolen passports.

Their committee members can liaise with the consulate and the police, and assist with complicated paperwork like insurance claims and theft reports. They recently helped with the funeral arrangements of an Irish national who had died in Torremolinos.

"We are here for the benefit of all expatriates on the coast and even though we focus on the Irish com-

munity, our services are here for whoever may need them," Terry explained.

The Irish Association of Spain has been assisting Irish residents and tourists for twenty years. They are renowned for their ongoing service and long-standing traditional St Patrick's Day celebrations, and this year they have added another party to their agenda.

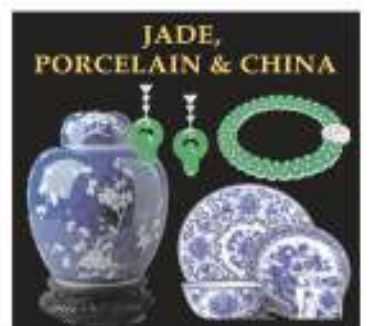
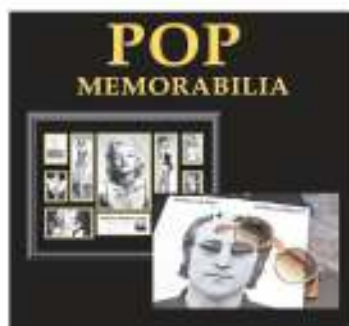

I have a physical disability that affects my legs, so I have to use a wheelchair to move around. I have a specially adapted car, but the street where I live is very narrow and I cannot park, so I usually have to leave the car in a different street quite far from my home, which causes me a lot of problems. Could I ask the Town Hall to

grant me a space to park?

In order to answer your question, it would be necessary to check the regulations of the Town Hall corresponding to your residence, as it may change from one town to another. Legislation foresees that those people with reduced mobility must be given the right to park their car without being forced to cover long distances, so Town Halls may even create a disabled parking bay for this purpose. Nevertheless, as explained above, it is the town hall who develops the specific regulations, so it is necessary to find out in the town hall corresponding to your residence.

I am the owner of a plot in which I decided to build a house. Eighteen months ago I hired a construction company to build the house, so after taking a look at the construc-

tion project and making some changes for my liking, I asked them to give me an estimate in writing, and once I verified it, we signed a contract. However, now that the works have finished, they have given me a final invoice that is far higher than the initial estimate, alleging that they had to make some changes with regard to the materials used. Obviously, I do not agree to pay this invoice. What should I do?

If there exists a detailed estimate in writing, in order to make a change to it they should have drawn up a document establishing those variations and asking for your consent, and you should have then signed that document. Therefore, if you did not allow the modifications you can refuse to pay the surplus, demanding the building company to stick to what was agreed and approved in the initial estimate signed at the time.

THE NIGHT SKY

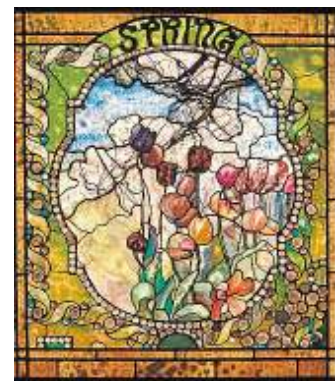
The four seasons

The Earth is not straight on its axle but tilted by about $23\frac{1}{2}^\circ$ and it is this tilt that gives the Earth its seasons. During the summer months, the Northern Hemisphere is tilted toward the Sun and we have long, hot days. But six months later the Earth has travelled half way around the Sun and now the Northern Hemisphere is pointed away from the Sun giving us short, cold days. Of course, for the Southern Hemisphere the opposite is true, winter for them is June, July and August.

The shortest day of the year - the winter solstice - usually falls on 21 December. On this date the Northern Hemisphere is pointed to its most extreme away from the Sun and so the Sun appears to stay very close to the horizon throughout the day. At any point on or above the Arctic Circle the Sun will not rise at all. The longest day, or summer solstice, usually occurs on 21 June; on this day the Sun will appear at its highest point in the sky at midday and at any point on or above the Arctic Circle, the Sun will not set. The date of the solstices can alter by a day or two depending on whether it is a leap year and also where you happen to be on Earth when the solstice occurs.

Half way between the two solstices are two dates when there is exactly twelve hours of day and twelve hours of night. These days are known as the spring and autumn equinox. Equinox is Latin for equal night.

This year's spring equinox will

occur on Monday 20 March at 11.29am. On this day the Sun will rise due east, it will be directly overhead at the equator and will set exactly due west, a perfect time to check your compass bearings.

The Sun doesn't rise at exactly 6am and set again at 6pm, this is because sunrise is when the Sun's disc first appears above the horizon and sunset is the last glimpse of the disc. But as it can take up to seven minutes for the whole of the Sun's disc to become visible the equinox day, is counted from the centre of the Sun, horizon to horizon. Also the Earth's atmosphere has a refracting effect which means the Sun is visible for several minutes before it has risen and after it has already set. But after this date, the days will gradually become longer than the nights and spring has arrived.

Malaga's Picasso museum launches a new era

The new collection is worth 500 million euros and has been loaned for three years by the artist's grandson, Bernard Ruiz-Picasso

MALAGA. Malaga's Museo Picasso entered a new phase in its history on Monday as it presented its new permanent collection, now open to the public.

The gallery, officially the most visited in Andalucía in 2016 with 558,033 visitors, was also among the worst for proportion of local visitors, with only 15 per cent of those through the door coming from the provincial capital.

For this reason the museum (MPM) has launched a two-pronged strategy to engage locals and encourage repeated visits in future. The first has seen the signing of a new deal with the Fundación Bernard y Almine Ruiz-Picasso which sees 166 works loaned to the museum for three years, after which the permanent collection will be refreshed once again. The second is to rotate the work within each three-year period every three months - a necessity in some cases, especially for works on paper, for preservation reasons.

"We wanted to reinvigorate the collection," said the museum's director José Lebrero, with constant change the key to that. The thematic approach has also disappeared, replaced by a chronological lay-out, designed to bring the visitor closer to the artist.

Split into 11 rooms, each representing a different phase of the artist's career, visitors can appreciate the artist's great versatility and diverse techniques, with several styles and motifs returning over time.

"We are relaunching the Picasso

New lighting and audioguides in ten different languages

Other significant changes include a new lighting system which aims to recreate natural light and its effect on the artworks. The LED bulbs will not only improve the visitor experience, but it will also make the gallery more green, reducing energy consumption by 97 per cent and cutting down CO2 emissions by 13 tonnes a year.

The second is to the audioguides which, according to Lebrero, are followed in their entirety 85 per cent of the time. Now they are available in 10 different languages.

museum," said the region's Culture chief Rosa Aguilar who attended the launch alongside Bernard Ruiz-Picasso, the artist's grandson, who admitted that work on this new exhibition had been ongoing for the past two years.

His wife, Almine, added that she hoped the new collection "would show a side of the genius that had never been seen before", in the process reviving local interest.

The launch, however, also piqued international interest and also saw the return of former director Carmen Giménez, who admitted she "had to see the new Picasso museum", having not been back to the museum "in thirteen years".

She was accompanied by art critic Francisco Calvo Sarraller, one of several important figures from the art world, from home and abroad, to attend the event.

ISTÁN CELEBRATES ITS FIRST WATER WEEK

March 22nd is World Water Day and the beautiful village of Istán, in the Sierra de las Nieves Natural Park and Biosphere Reserve, is one of the places which will be marking the occasion. In fact, due to its lifelong association with water, it will be holding a special programme of events from Wednesday 22 to Sunday 26 March, as part of its first-ever Water Week. The different cultures which have passed through Istán, especially the Moors, were skilled at handling this precious resource and have left a rich heritage in the form of water channels and fountains which the local council is keen to preserve for future generations. A visit to Istán is always a unique and unforgettable experience.

The slogan 'Istán, the spring of the Costa del Sol' was not chosen by accident. This village has an abundance of water, and provides it to all the municipalities along the Costa del Sol, from Manilva to Torremolinos. When La Concepción reservoir was built in 1973, water from the Río Verde began to be stored to supply the growing population of residents and visitors, thereby helping to contribute to the development of the region.

The programme for Water Week in Istán includes something to interest everybody and aims to encourage integration between local people and foreign residents and visitors. This is a perfect opportunity to discover the beauty of the village and the surrounding countryside, and its potential as a tourist destination.

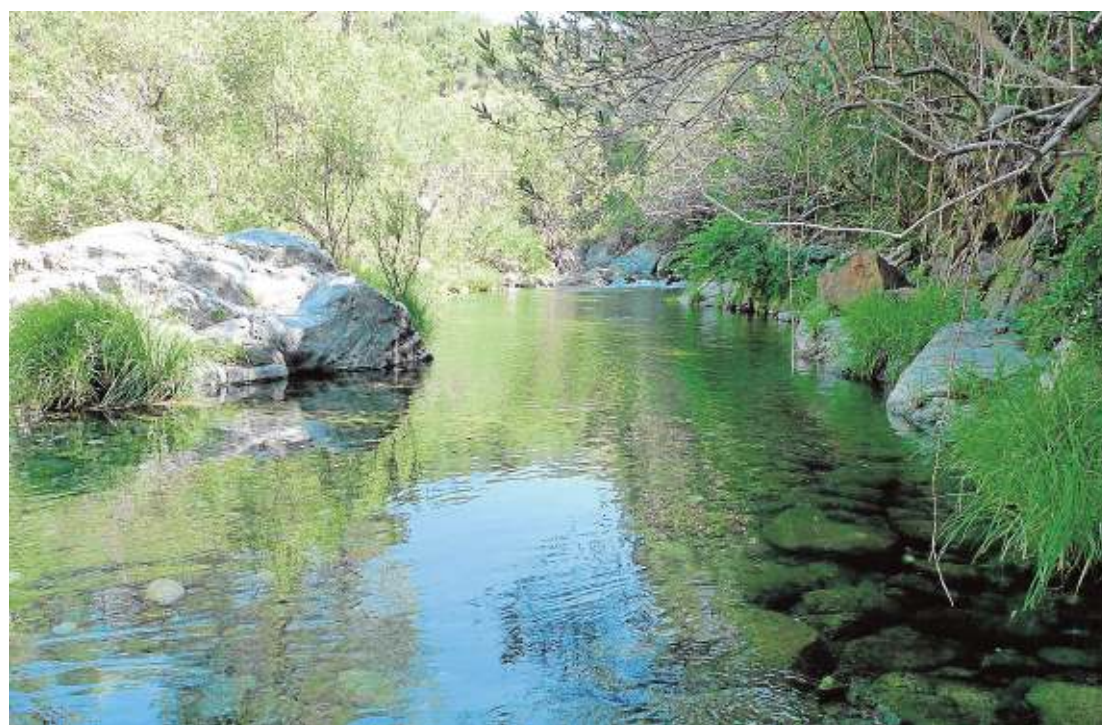
Some of the planned activities also aim to raise awareness among the new generations of 'Panochos' and 'Panochas' (as the people of Istán are known) of the importance of water and the natural wealth

of the village, because in the future they will be responsible for managing active, ecological and sustainable tourism. The expected classification of the Sierra de las Nieves as a National Park will bring new employment prospects for the young people of Istán, because the village is the natural entry to the park from the Costa del Sol.

The Natural Park and Biosphere Reserve of the Sierra de las Nieves, with its outstanding countryside, flora and fauna, is popular with many nature lovers, especially cyclists and walkers, but few of them take the opportunity to explore the hidden treasure which is the village of Istán, with its pretty streets of traditional whitewashed houses, historical buildings including the Torre de Escalante, lookout points with stunning views, more than 20 fountains and springs, and the 500-year-old Moorish water channels which still irrigate the local orchards today.

For this reason, the council decided to introduce a special Water Week every year to encourage people to come and discover Istán and its stunning countryside. Visitors will be able to follow routes around the fountains and springs, see the source of the Río Molino river, visit the Water Museum and Information Centre and enjoy spectacular views, especially those of the coast, Gibraltar and Africa from the Mirador de las Herrizas.

Everyone who takes part in the activities during Water Week will receive a rucksack to commemorate the event, and those who do the guided Ruta de las Fuentes walk will be given a small bottle known as a 'botijo' with an esparto grass cord, made by local artisans, which they can hang



around their necks and sample the water from each of the fountains along the walk, and then take home as a souvenir.

WATER WEEK PROGRAMME

The programme of activities will begin on Wednesday 22 at 10am, with the official reopening of the Water Museum. At midday there will be guided visits to La Concepción dam. The council began to organise these visits last year, and they have proven very popular.

On Thursday at 10 am there will be the 'Ruta de las Fuentes', a walk around the village to see the different fountains and streams. At 11am there will be a guided walk through the area of countryside known as 'El Coto', and at noon there will be more guided visits of La Concepción dam.

On Friday at 10am visitors can take a tour of the different viewing points in Istán, and at 11 there will be another walk around the village to see the fountains and streams. As on the previous days, there will be guided visits to La Concepción dam at midday, and at 4pm there will be workshops on making home-made soap at the fountain and laundry trough known as 'El Chorro'.

Those who visit Istán on Saturday 25th can take a guided visit to the source of the Molinos River and attend a presentation in El Coto of the 'Arbol de los Abrazos', or Tree of Embraces. As usual, there will be a guided tour of La Concepción dam at midday, and at 4pm there is a presentation on the history and use of the 'botijo' at the Water Museum.

At 5pm a competition will take place: how to drink from a 'botijo', at the beautiful Mirador de Las Herrizas viewing point. Be prepared to get wet: it will be a lot of fun and there will be plenty of prizes to be won.

Sunday 26 March is the final day of Water Week in Istán, and at 10am there will be a walk through the Moorish Water Channels in 'El Coto', followed at 12 by a guided tour of the fountains and streams in the oldest part of the village.

This is a unique way to discover a unique and remarkably beautiful village, which nestles in the heart of protected mountainous countryside, at a time of year when it is at its loveliest.

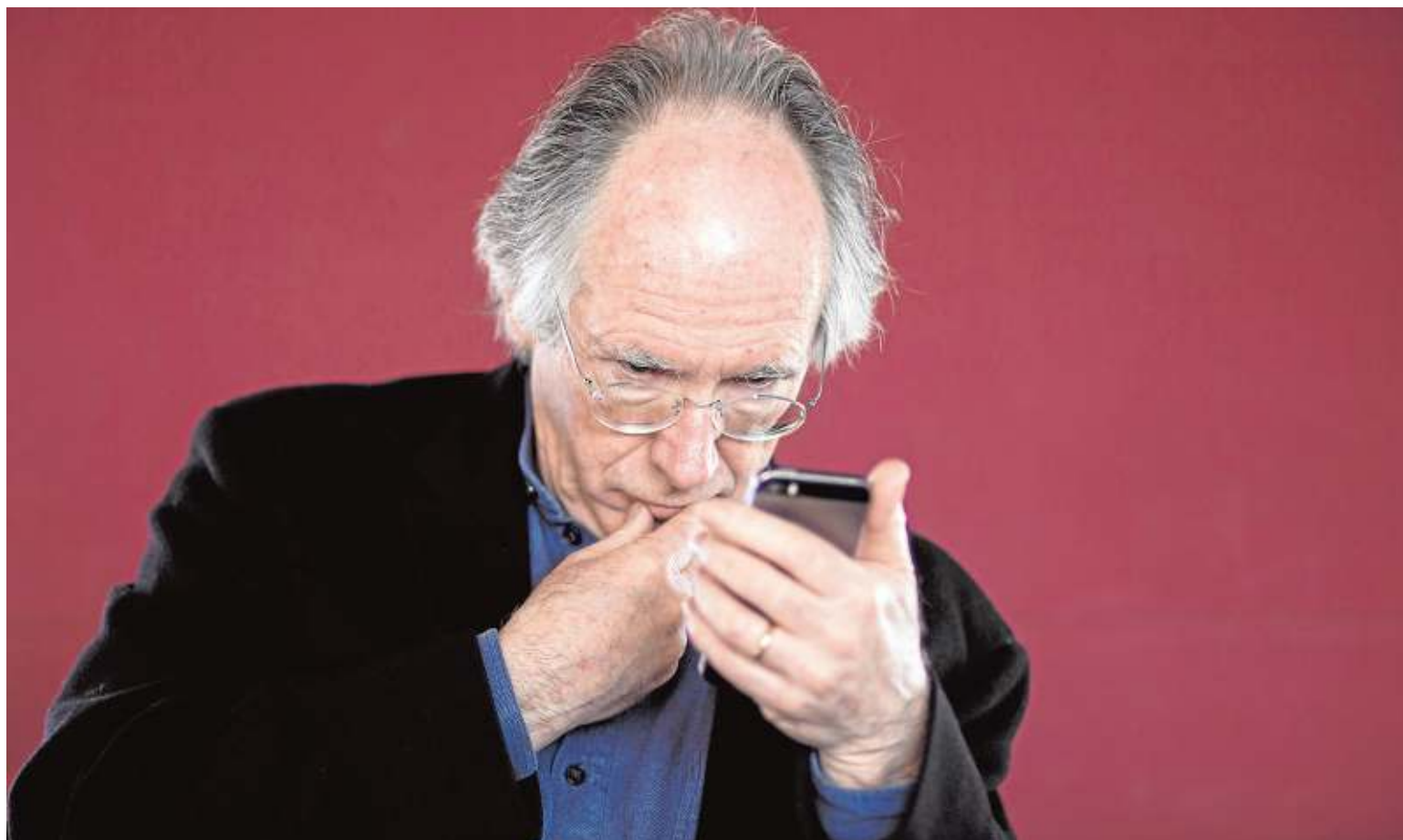

"I will really miss being an EU citizen"

Ian McEwan surprises his readers again with the acidic 'Nutshell', narrated by a foetus who emulates Hamlet

BARCELONA. The solemn spirit of Hamlet, which flows through the pages of Ian McEwan's latest novel *Nutshell*, was also very present at the press conference held by the writer in Barcelona recently

to talk about the forthcoming Kosmópolis literary festival.

The British author, who is known for his temperament and being controversial, as well as producing brilliant, complex and surprising work, was at his most acerbic when asked about the present situation in his own country, which he has compared with Nazi Germany.

He didn't hold back in his criticism of Brexit, using sharp and vehement language. "This was done by plebs, it reminds me

of the Third Reich," he said about the process, which he considers a total disaster from a social, cultural and economic point of view, especially because it is pushing Parliament in a corner "and that is where sovereignty should lie in a parliamentary democracy".

"Something smells very bad in England. The air is loaded, it's rotting," he added.

Nor did he have anything good to say about the political leaders who are handling the withdrawal from the EU, who he described as

a small group of energetic, murky and impatient politicians.

"They say they represent the people, but they are disparaging about the other half of the population. If you don't agree with what they are doing, they say you are an enemy of the people. The 16 million British people who wanted to stay in the EU feel like orphans. We have no representation," he said.

For McEwan, the European Union has been "a heroic project" which has enabled Europe to live in peace for 60 years, has brought greater wellbeing than ever before and has resulted in "extraordinary things" such as being able to travel from Slovenia to Calais without a passport. "I will really miss being part of the European Union," he said.

The author, who usually transmits his critical view of the world in his novels, often using satire and

irony, and adopting creative and original ways of developing the art of writing, has once again surprised his readers with the complexity and wonder of his most recent book. *Nutshell*, which was published last year, is totally unexpected: the focus is on an intrauterine narrator who is capable of holding all types of disquisitions upon the divine and the human, with clear parallels with Hamlet.

"How is it possible that I, who am not even young, who wasn't born yesterday, knows so much, or enough to be mistaken about so many things?" asks the aforementioned baby, who witnesses in perplexity the story of a betrayal. His mother and her lover are plotting to get rid of his father, in the way that Gertrude and Claudius plan to kill the king in Shakespeare's text. On that occasion the motive for the crime was to put Elsinor on the throne, but in this book the conspirators want to get their hands on a seven-million-pound house.

This is not the first time that McEwan has taken a classic as a reference and rewritten it in his own way. He did the same in *Saturday*, which was a reflection of Virginia Woolf's *Mrs Dalloway*, and this time he is using Hamlet to give his acidic opinion on existence, in an intelligent and daring tale about betrayal and assassination, brilliantly told in the manner of a thriller.

Why did he decide to use a foetus as the narrator? It is a symbol, he says, a way of reflecting "the impotence that I feel so often in the face of current politics". Hamlet also felt helpless, and the same applies to the intrauterine person who observes the terrible events without being able to intervene.

For Ian McKewan, this novel is a compendium of his professional career. "I have been able to portray all the violence and cruelty in it, but also the love, the hope and also my passion for poetry, for Shakespeare," he says. His literary influences include Virginia Woolf, Kafka and the Victorian author Anthony Trollope, who McKewan considers better than Dickens because of his skill in describing characters.

Villanueva de la Concepción becomes municipality 101

The province of Malaga lost its round number - exactly 100 - of municipalities on 17 March 2009. After years of campaigning, the small town of Villanueva de la Concepción finally gained its independence from Antequera, becoming municipality number 101.

The segregation was approved that morning at the Junta de Andalucía's cabinet meeting and the locals immediately took to the streets, hooting their horns and letting off fireworks.

The people of Villanueva de la Concepción, located at the foot of the famous El Torcal nature reserve, had begun their campaign for independence nearly 20 years previously, in 1980.

The next step came in 1992 when Villanueva earned itself the complicated title of Entidad de Ámbito

Territorial Inferior al Municipio (EA-TIM) which basically recognised its status as an administrative unit, but still governed by Antequera. Under this category, it had its own district mayor, 'alcalde pedáneo', and a residents council which could make decisions in areas such as construction and maintenance of country roads and fountains, among others.

In 2001 Villanueva de la Concepción was promoted to the title of Entidad Local Autónoma (ELA) which earned it a higher level of self-government.

Finally, in 2007, the segregation papers went to Malaga for approval and then on to Seville, where the final agreement was signed.

The small town fulfilled all the requirements to apply to become independent, according to Andalusian law, in terms of population, size, financial sufficiency, identity

and distance from the 'mother' town centre.

Villanueva de la Concepción had a population of 3,417 at the time of its independence (3,304 in 2016). At 5.98 kilometres from Antequera, it covers 63.2 square kilometres, and, as well as Antequera, it borders with Almogía and Casabermeja to the south.

Often referred to as the 'pueblecillo' by the people of Antequera, the Villanovenses (as the locals are known) considered Antequera as a brother municipality of which they did not feel a part.

The earliest traces of human pres-

ence in the area date back to the Middle Palaeolithic period, and Neolithic stone tools have been found. The Iberians founded the first town, Osqva, which was later referred to by Roman historians Tito Livio and Plinio. The Roman town would have had temples and a theatre, according to historians. It is thought that the town was abandoned after the fall of the Roman Empire.

In the Nasrid period the area was defended by a belt of five castles, of which one, Xébar, was in what is now the municipality of Villanueva, helping to safeguard the routes down to the coast.

Villanueva de la Concepción gained importance again in the second half of the 18th century with the construction of the Camino Real to link Malaga and Madrid.

From then on the village gradually grew up again and was named a 'población rural' in 1880.

Since 2009 two more villages have gained independence in the province, Montecorto and Serrato, both previously attached to Ronda, taking the total up to 103.

Aeonium arboreum

The tree aeonium forms a large bushy plant with erect stems and panicles of bright, yellow flowers in spring

Common names include tree houseleek, Irish rose, desert rose and tree aeonium. It is a succulent, sub-tropical plant in the Crassulaceae family. The genus Aeonium includes around 30 different species, the majority of which are native to the Canary Islands where they are called 'bejeque arboreo'.

The tree aeonium forms large, bushy plants with erect stems. The dense rosettes of fleshy, bright-green leaves can be up to 20cm across. The leaves are spatula-shaped and sometimes have a purplish mark close to where they join the stem.

The panicles of sulphur-yellow

low flowers form in the spring and are held upright, above the rosette of leaves. After flowering the plant declines and tends to get leggy (some species actually die after flowering), eventually the stems bend over and touch the ground or break off altogether. This is the aeonium's natural way of rejuvenating itself; the fallen stems will eventually root and a new, vigorous plant will be created. Aeonium can also be grown from seed but is less successful.

It is best to take cuttings in the summer when flowering is over. With a sharp, clean knife, cut a length of stem with a rosette of leaves at the top. Leave the stem to dry for a couple of weeks or until the wound has gnarled over. Then fill a pot with compost and sharp sand and push the cutting in at least 5cm. If the cutting is long you may need to give it some support to stop it toppling over.

Aeoniums are not frost tolerant but adapt well to being grown in a container which makes them easier to move to a sheltered position in cold winters. They do not like humidity and thrive in hot, dry climates although they are not completely drought tolerant either and will need occasional watering during the hottest months. Aeoniums need a free-draining, fairly rich soil and can be given a liquid cactus feed once a month during their growing season.

GARDENING HINTS FOR MARCH

Revitalising pot plants

Spring is the time to freshen up potted plants. Container-grown plants that have been in the same pot for a year or more will appreciate a little fresh compost. If the plant looks like it is thriving then it may be enough just to scrape off the top two centimetres and replace with fresh compost. If there are roots on the surface or growing out of the bottom then it probably needs repotting. Tip the pot

upside down and give the base a tap to help the plant to drop out. Very carefully loosen some of the roots from the root ball and then plant back into a bigger pot. A pot just two centimetres bigger in diameter is usually sufficient. Add new compost around the sides and gently firm in. Make sure the plant sits at the same level as it did in the old pot. Water in well to remove any air pockets.

Twenty years of liver transplant success at Carlos Haya Hospital

The Junta de Andalucía deputy minister for health spoke at an event celebrating this special milestone and highlighted the support from the local community

MÁLAGA. The Carlos Haya Hospital in Malaga held an event on Tuesday to mark twenty years since the hospital carried out its first liver transplant operation. Since 14 March 1997 surgeons and medical staff at the hospital have performed 921 other, similar operations, with 53 of those taking place last year alone.

The anniversary event was led by the deputy minister of health at the Junta de Andalucía, María Isabel Baena, and the provincial delegate for health, Ana Isabel González.

María Isabel Baena said that this was a day that all residents in Malaga could be proud of, highlighting "the solidarity shown by the families who have agreed to donate their or-

gans to a loved one who was about to die", while also praising a public health system which "responds to the needs of those who require a transplant".

The deputy minister also thanked the team of professionals in charge of carrying out the operations, highlighting the "magnificent job" they have done to restore the life and dreams of more than 900 people.

She also explained that the organ donation rate in the province currently stands at 60 people per every million residents, a figure above both the regional and national averages of 47.1 per million and 43 per million respectively.

For the deputy minister, this statistic was "the best example of solidarity" in Malaga province.

The doctor in charge of surgical services at the hospital, Julio Santoyo, commented on the development of the transplant process over this 20-year period, not just in the operating room but also in relation to the improvements made to help monitor patients' recovery after treatment.

There has also been a significant

increase in staff now taking part in the operations, with each liver transplant surgery involving between 20 and 50 professionals. Santoyo explained that such high numbers of staff are needed given the more complex nature of liver transplants in comparison to operations involving more solid organs.

Such improvements have seen a huge increase in the survival rates of patients, with seven out of ten patients still being alive five years after the operation, and six out of ten still living after ten years.

One man who is living proof of

this success is José López Rivas, who received an implant after being told it was the only way to save his life after being diagnosed with liver cancer.

Rivas was a teacher at the Campanillas secondary school and further education college near Malaga when he was diagnosed with the cancer.

Ten years on, Rivas is still reveling in the success of the operation, declaring that he now leads a normal life.

"Everyone who is operated on has their own story, but luckily for me mine was fantastic," he added.

"I can give my patients the opinion of a doctor who has experienced death"

Roberto Canessa Head of echocardiography and cardiology at the Hospital Italiano in Buenos Aires, and one of the survivors of the 1972 air crash in the Andes

He was one of the 16 survivors of one of the most tragic air accidents, immortalised in the book and subsequent film 'Viven'. Now he talks of his experiences and how they have influenced and helped him in his career

On 13 October 1972, flight 571 of the Uruguayan Air Force, which was taking some rugby players and their families to Chile, crashed in the Andes, killing several of those on board. After 72 days, long after the search had been called off, Nando Parrado and Roberto Canessa appeared, after spending ten days climbing through the mountain range. Later, they led teams of res-

cuers to 14 other survivors who were waiting amid the wreckage of the aircraft.

Roberto Canessa decided to dedicate his life to his companions on that flight who had not survived. He graduated as a cardiac paediatrician and won the National Prize for Medicine in Uruguay three times. In 2015 he was designated an Honorary Fellow of the American Society of Echocardiography. At present he is the head of Ecocardiography and Cardiology at the Italian Hospital and collaborates with a network of the most prestigious colleagues in the world to help babies and children with congenital heart disorders. "As soon as I listen to a foetus' heart I can tell whether it is complete or broken; if it only has one piece, then it has to be mended" he says.

He has been featured in the news, documentaries, films and books, mentioned by companions such as

Nando Parrado... but now he is telling his own story and how the tragedy inspired his career, in a book called 'Tenia que sobrevivir' (I had to survive).

-What lessons did you learn during those 72 days of brutal survival?

-I learned not to wait for the helicopters! I learned that you don't have to be in a plane crash to realise how lucky you are, that we always hanker for things without realising what we already have, that you shouldn't look ahead to the mountain, just focus on the next step, because anyway you don't know what you are going to need to get up the mountain when you reach it. People think of problems when there aren't any. We knew that if we walked, then at some point we would come to a path or a road. It was a finite distance. We couldn't think about the impossible, we had to just take everything in small stages. Uncertainty makes us less effective.

-As you were studying medicine, you instantly became the emergency doctor. What was that like?
-Awful. Very hard indeed. I suddenly found myself having to make bandages, clean wounds, stitch them, find out how to control infections, which were internal because the freezing cold in that place made it the most aseptic operating theatre in the world... and all with no instruments. The cologne we found in people's luggage became disinfectant, razors became scalpels, rugby shirts were used as bandages... and there wasn't a single doctor among us, only me with the soul of a doctor.

-During those months lost in the Andes, you must have found that the term 'never before' is relative.
-Definitely. That 'never before' led everyone to give us up for dead. And when they saw that we were alive, they didn't say "we were wrong." They said "they have made it after all." They called us heroes, which we never thought we were, there in the fuselage of the plane, because we were just unfortunate enough to be there, far from home... and people said things like "they survived because they ate the people

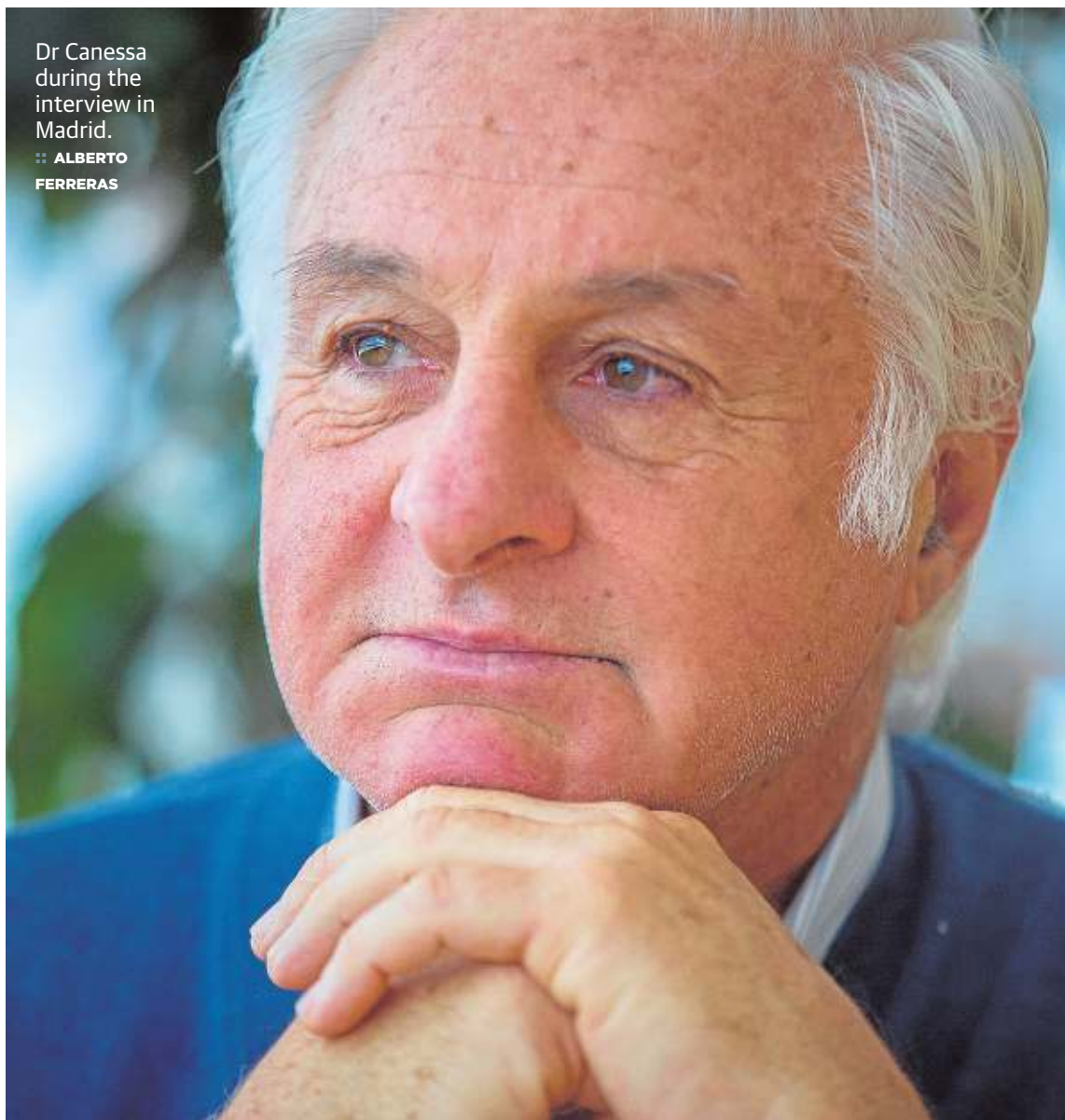

who died." No, we saved ourselves because we left the shelter of the fuselage and set off to find a way out, because we knew they must have stopped searching for us by then. It's incredible how the world sees our story and how we actually experienced it. People still tell us we were lucky - why? Our plane crashed, they didn't find us, they forgot all about us, many of our companions died...."

-It was your idea to eat the dead and as a doctor you knew there was no other option, but it must have been very hard to tell the others that and to actually do it.

-Obviously, it was the only source of calories, fats and proteins we had, but at a personal level there was a philosophical and spiritual problem, because we couldn't ask those people if they would give us permission to use their bodies in order for us to survive. I thought that if I died, I would want my muscles to be used by somebody else, so they could survive. It would be a way of giving life to others. I would want those who lived to tell my mother that I had fought to the end. Sometimes I think that some malignant spirit wanted to experiment on us and that is why it put us in that place and in that situation. We were strong young men, we were part of a rugby

team and university students, so we had knowledge to use as a tool. We were religious, so if we believed in God, he would have pity on our souls. Phrases like "where there is life there is hope," came to mind. They may not mean much in our normal lives, but for us at that time they were very valuable, they had a powerful dimension. "I am dead, but tomorrow I could be alive," things like that kept us going.

-Did you lose your fear of death?

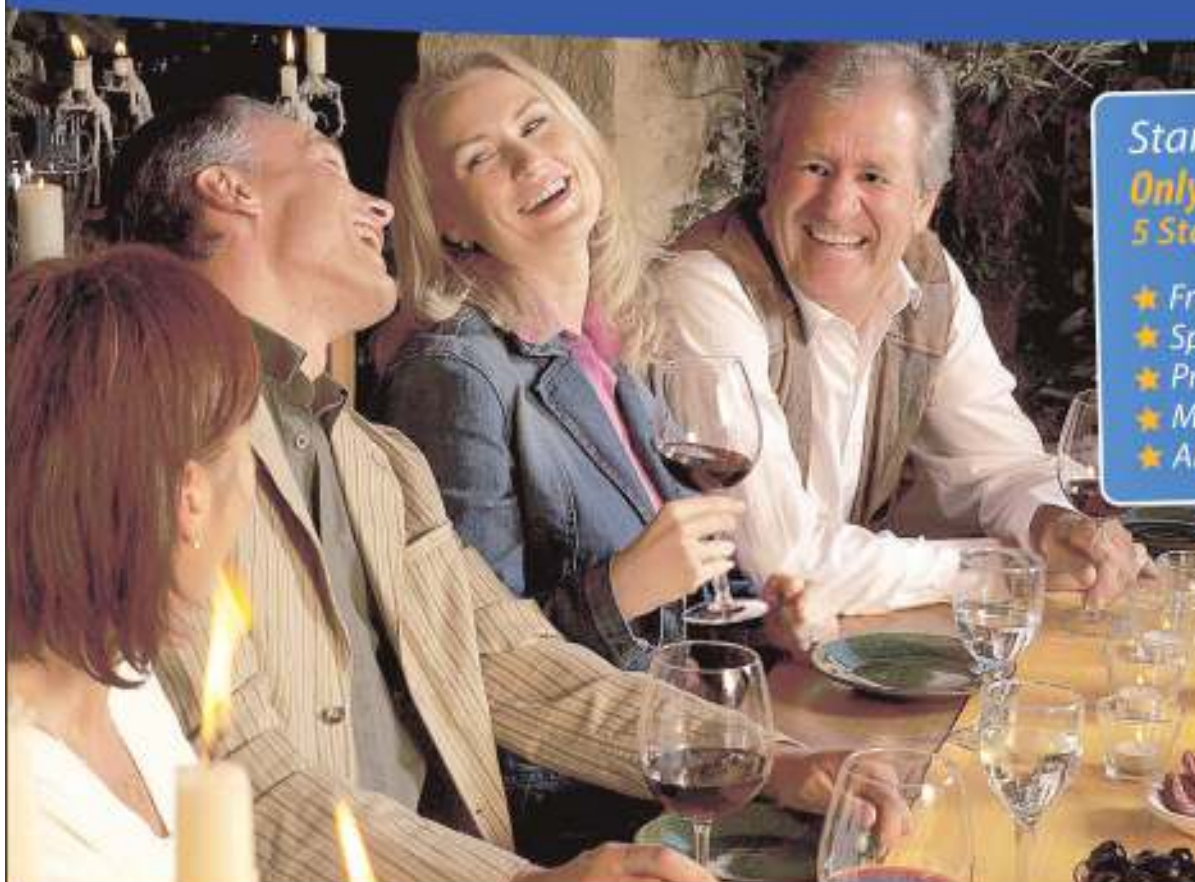
-Yes; at least, I believe so. You lose it so you don't give in to that fear in desperation. For 72 days I carried the burden of death on my shoulders. Imminent death was my greatest terror, and when we got out, when we saw a person for the first time, I felt an indescribable happiness. It was like coming back to life.

-Did your experience change the way in which you see and deal with things in medicine?

-Yes. I now know what my patients and their families are feeling. I'm in the same circle, you could say. As I say in the book, I can give them the opinion of a doctor who has also faced death. It also changed the way I see life. After all that, I thought it would be wrong to waste my life and that I should honour my companions who died, so that they would have been proud

➤ of me. I wanted to live a good life. I didn't want the parents of those who died to wonder why I had survived instead of their son. I couldn't live a relaxed life. I had a commitment to it, an opportunity which others had not had. And medicine formed part of my plan, it was a commitment to helping others. **–Going back to your patients and your commitment to them, are you in contact with the babies who were born with half a heart and who, thanks to your help, have survived and grown up?**

–Yes, of course I am, very much so. They and their mothers and fathers help me on many occasions. One of the boys, Roberto, said: "Mummy, how could I not be in this book? He saved my life." It's as if we were all one. And another of the children I talk about, the lovely Tomás, who

sadly died, used to come to see me as a friend, not as his doctor.

–Is his story one of those which has marked you most?

–You never forget the patients who die. You keep asking yourself: "What didn't I do right? What went wrong? What more could I have done for them?" There are always unanswered questions in your conscience.

–Are the children you treat braver than adults, or does everyone feel afraid in the same way?

–I believe people can be born fearful and die brave, and vice versa. There are things which change in life.

–There must be questions that so many parents of these children ask, such as "Should we carry on? If we do, what will things be like?" And the final question, "Is it worth it?" What answers do you give them?

–I can't give them any. These are questions they have to resolve themselves. I can only show them the way, without giving them any guarantees of knowing whether we will be successful or not, none of us know that. But I also show them the light at the end of the tunnel, what they can expect if everything goes well.

–In your case, it was worth carrying on....

EXTRACTS FROM 'TENÍA QUE SOBREVIVIR'

"I turn back to the pregnant woman on the bed. What is the best way of telling her that her daughter, still in the womb, is lacking the most important cavity of the heart? Until a few years ago, newborn babies with this type of complicated cardiac problem... would die soon after being born. But one day, medicine took a step forward... and for this mother there is hope. The family faces a long and uncertain journey, like the one we experienced in the mountains."

"I can't help it: I identify with people who are in situations which seem impossible to overcome. To these mothers (of children with heart problems) I want to say that they have been given diagnoses from doctors who are living, but I can give

them the opinion of a doctor who has also been dead."

"If those same researchers, with the same criteria, were to analyse the type of life which awaits the babies who are born with congenital heart problems and have to undergo open heart surgery as soon as they are born, with their tiny bodies frozen like ours were in the fuselage, and they are connected to an extra-corporal heart, and they undergo several of these operations in their first years of life, they would conclude that the lives of these children would be worse than most. But I don't think like that. Their life won't be worse or better: it will just be different."

–I believe that life is worth the effort, that there are some wonderful situations like that of my patient María Rosario, who was born with half a heart. She loves to run in races and she always come last, and her parents are afraid. They ask me, "Do you think we should let her carry on running?" And I always say, "Ask her". Because she loves it, she loves everyone clapping when she reaches the finishing line, even though she has come last. It's like having an engine with one cylinder, when everyone else has two. She knows that she is always going to come last, but that's life. I believe Rosario has twice as much soul and only half the engine. People with a disability often show others how to live.

–What happens when all the odds are against you?

–For a child who has 90 per cent, the possibilities against it are ten per cent. For many of my patients it is the opposite. But if you're lucky it can be a 100 per cent success, no matter how unlikely that may seem. We are not talking about probabilities, we're talking about people. And that's something that the parents of my patients bear in mind. Where there is an illness, there may well also be a cure.

Common problems for women's skin

Acne, rosacea, melasma and alopecia are the most frequent conditions

The Spanish Academy of Dermatology and Venereology (AEDV) has decided to pay tribute to the important role of women who specialise in these fields by looking at how the profession has evolved in recent years, and at up-to-date figures regarding the most frequent skin problems which affect women.

Society is changing and fortunately women are playing a greater role in the medical profession nowadays. As an example the AEDV has 2,478 specialist dermatologists, of whom 1,378 are women. The presence of women in this field has been progressively increasing and in the last few years more women than ever before have held top jobs, at the AEDV and at universities.

Skin problems

Some skin conditions affect women more than men, and Dr Paloma Cornejo, a member of the AEDV, says the most common ones are acne, rosacea, melasma and alopecia.

Acne

Dr Cornejo explains that acne does not only affect adolescents and

adults can suffer from it into their 40s. It is especially prevalent among women in such cases.

The clinical spectrum of acne can range from small non-inflamed comedones to pustules and papules and even deep, painful cysts which can leave scars. For this reason, Dr Cornejo says it is very important that acne is treated by a dermatologist, because it is not something

unimportant which can be easily eradicated with cream or soap. It is often associated with some hormonal problem such as a polycystic ovary syndrome which would require oral medication.

The doctor explains that diet plays a role in treatment for acne (reducing dairy products, especially skimmed ones, and foods with a high calorific-glycemic index), as

do triggering factors such as unsuitable cosmetics or a contraceptive with an androgenic effect, which will have to be changed. The treatment will depend on the severity of the case. The use of antibiotics is very limited because people can become resistant to them, but anti-androgenic contraceptives can prove effective.

Rosacea

The second most common dermatological problem is rosacea. This is an inflammatory illness of the skin which affects the central facial region in the form of reddening, papules and pustules with a burning sensation and feeling of tightness. Sufferers can often not tolerate cosmetics. Over time the redness becomes chronic and blood vessels may become visible.

Dr Cornejo says it is essential to consult a dermatologist for this condition, because it is possibly one of the most difficult of all to treat. The treatment can be topical and/or oral (generally with antibiotics) and dermo-cosmetic treatment may be a patient's best ally or worst enemy by triggering outbreaks. That is why professional

assessment is so important.

Melasma

Melasma is a symmetrical pigmentation in the facial region (forehead, cheeks, upper lip) and often affects women of fertile age. It is associated with oestrogens, although it is triggered by the sun. The ingestion of contraceptives is one classic cause, but many women who have not taken these still suffer from it.

Prevention is vital, by using continual sun protection and especially products which have well as UVB and UVA filters and even a filter against visible radiation. Physical filters such as titanium dioxide are often the most effective.

With regard to treatment, as well as topical depigmenting products, specific peeling treatments are very useful. They can clear pigmentation by more than 70 per cent "and nowadays there is a new ingredient, tranexamic acid, which is used to reduce bleeding in heavy periods and which has proven effective in reducing a tendency to pigmentation," says Dr Cornejo. It is only available by prescription.

Alopecia

Another fundamental and common problem seen by dermatologists is alopecia, when hair drops out. This is especially common after the menopause, because of the alteration between oestrogens and androgens in favour of the latter. In any case, an expert opinion should always be sought about the best pharmaceutical treatment for it.

Imagination in a weight-loss diet

Risotto made with cauliflower, tallarines which are actually courgettes and meringues made with skimmed milk are some of the dishes with which Ramón Perisé, a chef at Mugaritz, produces low-calorie haute cuisine

Mugaritz is not just the seventh best restaurant in the world; it is much more than that. Andoni Luis Aduriz leads a team of chefs for whom creativity, innovation and haute cuisine are signs of identity. That's why they are often involved in different R+D projects, such as the one run by Ramón Perisé, who is one of the chefs at Mugaritz, at Las Dunas restaurant in the Healthhouse Las Duna centre in Estepona.

"We are trying to reeducate people about food, encouraging them to adopt healthy lifestyle habits and nutrition. We have invested a great deal of time in this research project, and the results are prov-

ing satisfactory," says Ramón Perisé.

The greatest challenge is to produce haute cuisine which is low in calories, because this project is based on nutrition as part of a weight loss programme. It includes food which is high in calories but low in fats and carbohydrates, "and our imagination is our most powerful

tool," explains Ramón.

Normally, people who want to lose weight tend to eat pretty boring food. At Las Dunas restaurant, these chefs are focusing on the visual aspect before the sensory one, so the plates look appealing from the start.

"As an example of what we are doing, because the food should not contain much salt, we use a different sort of condiment to make it taste good. And because it should be low in carbohydrates, we prepare dishes which look as if they contain them but actually don't," he says.

A 'risotto a la milanese' made with cauliflower, tallarines with clam sauce made with courgettes, canneloni made with linseed, smoked tomato tartare and meringue with skimmed milk are just some of their specialties.

Dressings are another important aspect of this R+D project. In a diet, oils should be kept to a minimum, so the chefs have looked for substitutes. Once again, creativity is essential.

"We carried out a study to find delicious oil-free dressings and according to our research these should focus on three things: they need a certain acidity, umami, and a texture achieved by using tiny particles. To do that, we used three bases: tomato water or wild mushroom stock, onion paste and apple vinegar. With those, you can make a great oil-free dressing for salads and vegetables," explains Ramón. They used the same idea to replace fried items which form the basis of some dishes, such as oxtail stew.

"We use dried onion, which we caramelize without using oil, and then vacuum-pack it. We also cook

DELICIOUS, HEALTHY DISHES

► **Risotto a la milanese.** Made with cauliflower to cut down on calories and carbohydrates. The cauliflower is cooked in a reduction of chicken stock and the result is identical to risotto in appearance and texture. Psychologically, this is very useful. It is also delicious because of the stock and the use of saffron for seasoning.

► **Courgette tallarines and clams.** The courgettes are cut with a special Japanese tool, so they look exactly the same as tallarines. To give them flavour, they are served with a sauce made with clams, garlic and parsley.

► **Linseed canneloni.** The linseeds are soaked in milk, then pepper and nutmeg are added to produce a type of bechamel without fat. It looks and has the same consistency as bechamel, but is really skimmed milk with linseed fibre. The bechamel is dehydrated and cut into squares which are filled with flaked stewed oxtail. The result is a dish which is delicious, fat-free and filling.

► **Asparagus with a truffle veil.** Only fresh seasonal asparagus is used, never frozen. That is very important. The veil is made with truffle water and the curd which is obtained from cooking cheese, which is the least fatty part and has most protein.

► **Roast beef and vegetable rolls.** The beef has to be round, not loin, because it is thinner and less fatty. Clean protein. Rolls are made with the roast beef and filled with asparagus, fennel, avocado and enoki mushroom, and served with a sweet-and-sour sauce made with skimmed milk yoghurt.

► **Tartare of smoked tomato.**

Made with smoked natural tomato and chopped dried tomato, and the dressing is a reduction of tomato paste with a touch of chilli. This is a spicy dish. In the middle, a slice of crispy bread is placed, made with frozen, dehydrated and toasted bread. Chopped parsley and spring onion are used for seasoning.

► **Linseed meringue.** This is a dessert made with skimmed milk, in which linseeds and vanilla seeds are infused. It is all left to get cold before whisking. Once whisked, it produces a thick mixture with a consistent texture, but contains hardly any calories.

the vegetables in water. That way, we can control the calorie content," he says.

In fact, water is one of the main pillars of this healthy haute cuisine, and not just as a drink. "Often when we think we're hungry, we're actually thirsty, so we are making dishes which are high in hydration. They quench the thirst and stop people feeling hungry. Gelatines and stocks are the things we work with most at Las Dunas," says Ramón.

One of these is shabu-shabu, a bowl of hot stock in which they cook meat, fish and raw shellfish.

It takes time to eat, which is also an important factor.

"We have worked on a menu which makes people take longer to ingest the food. Let me explain: the feeling of being full takes about 20 minutes to reach the brain, so your stomach doesn't tell your brain to stop eating for those 20 minutes and that means you may have eaten too much. You need to eat slowly, so you feel fuller. When you eat in a hurry you never know when you are really full and you continue to eat, with all the consequent collateral damage that causes," he explains.

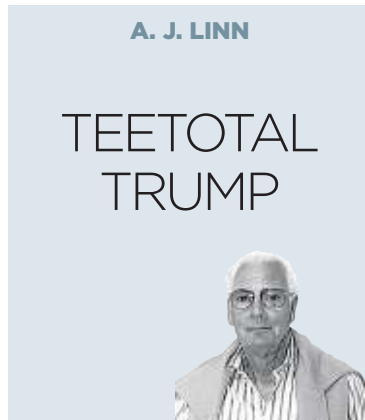

Minute grains of flavour and history

The peppercorn, is the queen of all spices and the cause of multiple international conflicts throughout history

MÁLAGA. Whether in a small condiment set or in an elegant pepper mill, pepper is found on dining tables all over the world. The ease in which it can be bought in supermarkets and grocers belies its role as a source of international conflict throughout history.

Almost 3,500 years ago, when the body of pharaoh Ramesses II was being prepared for burial, the embalmer placed a few grains of pepper in the nasal cavities to mark the greatness of the dead man. At the time the precious spice was brought from India via the first commercial routes.

Later, in the first century AD, Pliny the Elder wrote: "Some foods attract us by their sweet taste, others by their appearance whereas pepper has nothing in it that can plead as a recommendation to either fruit or berry, its only desirable quality being a certain pungency; and yet it is for this that we import it all the way from India!"

At that time, the Arabs held the monopoly on pepper and its price was so extortionate that the Roman emperor Augustus sent an expedition to Arabia to try, without success, to break it.

The Church and European nobles undertaking the Crusades also tried to break the Arab monopoly but it was the Portuguese who, during the 15th century, were able to find alternative routes, circumnavigating the African continent to reach Calcutta, Ceylon, Java, Borneo and the Maluku Islands; the latter being where pepper



originated.

Today, although pepper (*Piper nigrum*) is also grown in South America, Africa, India or Brazil, most of the supply comes from the coasts of Malaysia and Indonesia.

Pepper berries form on a climbing vine and are rich in an alkaloid called piperine, which gives it the characteristic pungent flavour. Piperin develops as the fruit matures. Thus, the green pepper, which is the berry collected before it is fully ripe, is less spicy than the black or white, and is usually sold fresh in brine or vinegar. The black pepper is the same berry collected at its optimum point of maturity, scalded and dried, and the white is the ripe berry soaked for a week to remove the skin and then dried. What we call pink pepper is actually the seed of a plant native to Brazil (*Schinus terebinthifolius*) and which the Portuguese introduced as a cheap alternative to authentic pepper.

Art and gastronomy in the Subbética

In Priego de Córdoba you will find traditional popular architecture and many splendid examples of baroque monuments

MÁLAGA. Spring is the ideal time of year to visit the Subbética region of Córdoba province. When the temperatures begin to warm up and the autumn and winter rains have had their effect on the countryside, this area in the south of the province is looking its very best.

One good example is the town of Priego de Córdoba, which is in the Sierra Subbética natural park; as you approach it, it appears to rise like an enormous iceberg from a sea of olive trees.

However, before exploring the rural paths and lanes of this region, it is worth visiting the town centre in Priego (there are also some outlying hamlets which are interesting). In particular, head for the oldest part of town, where the districts of La Villa and Balcón del Ardave are situated. It is lovely to walk through their narrow streets, where colourful pots of flowers stand out against the brilliant white of the houses.

One good way of exploring this ancient district, with its Andalusian air, is to go from the Plaza de Santa Ana to Calle Real, and then on to the charming Placita de San Antonio. There is also an open look-out point called El Ardave, with expansive views over the surrounding area. It perches on a dizzying natural gorge which for centuries was vital for the defence of the town and is one of its main attractions today.

As well as seeing its lovely architecture, it is also worth visiting some of Priego's historic buildings, as this combination has merited its classification as a Historic-Artistic Site of Andalucía.

Although Priego de Córdoba boasts different styles of art and architecture, it is most famous for its baroque. Thanks to its economic prosperity from the 17th to 19th centuries, some splendid religious buildings began to be built. Many of them contain fine examples of art of the period, such as the sanctuary in the church of La Asunción, the chapel of Jesús Nazareno in the San Francisco church and the plaster decoration

in La Aurora church.

There are also some very fine baroque features in the churches of San Juan de Dios, San Pedro, El Carmen and Las Mercedes, and some of the chapels which were built in the same period.

The castle at Priego de Córdoba also attracts the attention of visitors. Its austere construction con-

trasts with the flamboyant baroque art which can be found in other parts of the town.

Among the main features of this castle, which was restored between the 18th and 19th centuries, is the Homage Tower, which was essential during the years when the town was entrusted to the Order of Calatrava.

Priego's heritage consists of its fountains. Among them, the most important are those of La Salud, which is mannerist in style, and El Rey, which has neoclassical and baroque influences.

Part of the historical and cultural legacy of this town in the Subbética is also to be found in different cultural centres, such as the Museum-Houses of Niceto Alcalá-Zamora y Torres, who was the first prime minister of the 2nd Spanish Republic, and artist Adolfo Lozano.

There are also folk museums such as La Almendra, and the Popular Arts Museum in the hamlet of Casil de Campos).

These are mainly based on the agricultural past, and they highlight the importance of the surrounding area in the development of the town. In fact, Priego de Córdoba gave its name to what is today a famous designation of origin for olive oil.

There are some renowned mills, such as those of Vizcantar, where you can not only buy a heavenly 'liquid gold' but also enjoy an unforgettable experience thanks to olive oil tourism.

In addition to all this, Priego is also an ideal place to enjoy being close to nature in the natural park of the Sierras Subbéticas, which is one of the few geoparks in Spain. There, the rugged countryside poses a challenge to those who want to hike or climb mountains.

Among these challenges is the highest peak in Córdoba province, La Tiñosa, which stands more than 1,570 metres above sea level and is an excellent viewing point over the Subbética region.

There are many lovely places to explore on foot or bicycle in this area, including the Genilla stream and the Salado river.

Food, glorious food

Priego also boasts a sublime gastronomy, which is hardly surprising as it is famous for its extra virgin olive oil. The 'salmorejo' cold soup, the 'relleno de Carnaval', Easter meatballs and 'ajoarriero' style kid are just some of the star dishes in the typical local cuisine.

At present, the town is also hosting its 'Ruta de la Cuchara', a route you can follow to try some delicious soups and stews in local bars and restaurants.

It continues until 7 April, and in about a dozen establishments you can enjoy traditional dishes from the area for about three euros each, as well as tapas made with locally-produced extra virgin olive oil.

Its combination of popular architecture and ancient buildings made it a Historic-Artistic Site

Despite the remodelling which took place at that time, there are still some Nasrid features to be seen around the windows.

Not far from the fortress, you can walk through the San Bernardo arch which actually has no relationship with the castle precinct. Its origins date back to an old flour mill in the mid-15th century.

The Carnicerías Reales are from a later time; this is an austere building which was used in the 16th century as a slaughterhouse and market.

Nowadays it is one of Priego de Córdoba's most notable monuments. As well as its Mannerist entrance, it has a lovely stone spiral staircase down to the lower part of the building, which is where the cattle were once slaughtered before being sold.

Another important chapter in

Unicaja, with one foot in the EuroCup final

Victory in Krasnodar (57-73) means the Malaga side could confirm their spot in the final in the return game on Friday

MALAGA. Unicaja are just one game away from making history once again after recording a momentous victory against Lokomotiv Kuban on their own court (57-73) on Tuesday evening. The Malaga side can qualify for the EuroCup final should they repeat the feat at the Carpena on Friday (8.45pm).

The victory was well deserved, especially after Suárez pulled out of the squad with gastroenteritis and the loss of Musli during the game - the Serbian suffering from a twisted ankle. However, neither affected Joan Plaza's side adversely and they managed to see out the game, giving a masterclass in defensive play.

The 'cajistas' main man, Nedovic, had a night to forget but both Brooks and Fogg were able to emerge out of the shadows to finish with 18 and 15 points, respectively.

Before the game, Joan Plaza knew that Lokomotiv would look to start quickly and they didn't disappoint. Nedovic asked to come off after three minutes having been off the boil and his side struggled to adapt without their absentees (19-10, min 8). However, the introduction of Fogg and Smith stemmed the flow and the first quarter ended 19-15.

The initiative remained with

Lokomotiv, despite their play being fairly ordinary. However, with various changes to the personnel, the pace of the game suffered, playing into Unicaja's hands as a basket from Nedovic put them ahead (25-26, min 16). In truth, the margin could have been greater if it weren't for a number of missed opportunities, Omic

the main culprit.

As expected, Lokomotiv had Unicaja on the ropes as the third quarter commenced, taking the lead courtesy of several baskets by Rochestie (39-35). Things looked set to take a turn for the worse when Musli hobbled off, but the trio of Smith, Fogg and Díez steadied the ship. Despite the side's problems, three consecutive three-pointers gave Unicaja maximum advantage (42-46) and they went into the fi-

nal quarter exactly as they would have wanted - with a high defensive level and ahead on the score-

The Russian side, though, couldn't take advantage, allowing nerves to get the better of them. Unicaja managed the situation perfectly and Fogg, with five points in a row, saw off the threat.

Plaza's side came into this game on the back of their best form of the season, racking up four wins in a row. If they can make it six on Friday, they will be in the EuroCup final.

Three league wins from three as Unicaja gain momentum in the Liga Endesa

The marginal victory over Joventut signalled Unicaja's improvement in the league after an indifferent start to the calendar year

MALAGA. Unicaja continued their excellent resurgence in form with a narrow 77-74 home victory over Catalan side Divina Seguros Joventut in their league game which preceded their win in Krasnodar.

The hosts began the match with the same rhythm and intensity that was on show against Bayern Munich in their EuroCup quarter-final triumph, qualities which saw them race into an 8-0 lead. Unfortunately, they failed to maintain the levels for very long and consequently let Joventut

come back strongly into the game.

Joventut's pivot Jordan profited greatly from Unicaja's defensive lapses, as he enjoyed the freedom of the home side's half of the court. The American's tenth point forced Plaza to call a time out in the 15th minute as Unicaja's lead had been cut to just one point. Despite the changes, which included Omic being replaced by Okouo, the head coach's team talk seemed to have little effect as his side continued to give the ball away cheaply and allowed their opponents to score easy points, frailties which saw the visitors go into a surprise 36-31 half-time lead.

The break saw Plaza change tactics again as he aimed to sure up Unicaja's defence by putting Alberto Díaz in the quintet. This change in system seemed to work as Adam Waczyński led Unicaja to score nine points without reply at the start of the third quarter. The visitors refused to lie down

and three-point baskets from Bogdanović, Sàbat and Vidal saw Joventut weather the Unicaja fightback, but only for a short while.

Unicaja's defence became a lot more solid and in attack Plaza's side scored an incredible 34 points, which was more than they had managed in the first two quarters put together, to put themselves into a commanding 65-52 lead.

Plaza therefore decided to take off some of his key players such as Brooks, a move which sparked a reaction from Joventut. Plaza was forced to turn back to his stalwarts in Musli, Díaz and Smith, but even they could not prevent the Catalan side from scoring thirteen points to ensure a tight finish to the game.

With less than two minutes remaining and the score 75-72, Brooks, who was brought back on, scored a two-pointer of his own after being set up by Suárez to confirm Unicaja's fifteenth league win this season.

A deserved silver for Regino Hernández

The Mijas-based athlete suffered a setback over the weekend in the individual trial but fought back to claim only the sixth medal in snow sports for Spain at a world championship

MÁLAGA. It may seem strange to think of Malaga athletes competing in winter sports, but the Freestyle Ski and Snowboard World Championships, ongoing in the Sierra Nevada, has brought success for Mijas-based Regino Hernández who picked up silver in the team snowboard cross trial on Monday.

The 25-year-old, alongside Lucas Eguibar, tackled conditions of -5 degrees Celsius to qualify from the quarters finals in style. In the semis, they lined up against the north American duo of Hagen Kearney and Nick Baumgartner, Austrians Lukas Pachner and Julian Lueftner and the French pair Loan Bozzolo and Pierre Vaultier. Hernández came first in his run while Eguibar, from Gipuzkoa, maintained the position.

In the final, the Spaniards came up against the aforementioned Kearney and Baumgartner, Kevin Hill and Christopher Robanske (Canada), and Alessandro Hämmerle and Markus Schairer (Austria).

Hernández, in his run, came close to stealing first place but lost out marginally to Kearney. For his part, Eguibar started much slower and was initially in third place. However, on the final sprint he was able to climb a position but the veteran Baumgartner was too hard to catch.

For Hernández, silver was the perfect compensation for what happened on Sunday when a fall cost him in the individual trial after scoring the third best time in qualification. "Today we showed that what happened on Sunday was just bad luck," he said, admitting that the disappointment had left him "pissed off".

This is a career high for Hernández who insists he will continue

A journey from Ceuta to the Sierra Nevada, via Mijas

For the two-time Olympian, success at the Freestyle Ski and Snowboard World Championships was a successful return to 'home' territory. Born in Ceuta, Hernández moved to the Costa del Sol when he was just a year old. Despite being from a place with year-round sunshine, he spent a lot of time, from a young age in the Sierra Nevada.

"My parents were snowboarders and I remember them taking me up to the Sierra Nevada often, putting me on a board when I was around five or six years old. A lot of people were surprised to see someone so young on a board".

to fight for every contest "as if it were the last".

Sixth medal for Spain

With this medal, and silver for Eguibar on Sunday, it takes Spain's medal tally in snow sports world championships to six. 

Clinical Alavés get Michel off to a losing start as new Malaga boss

A 91st-minute winner for ten-man Alavés came against the run of play and sees the Blue and Whites facing a relegation battle

MALAGA. A change in manager for Malaga has not brought a change in fortune for the club after a last-minute winner for Deportivo Alavés condemned Michel's new team to a 13th defeat of the season on Saturday evening.

The first 20 minutes of the match were fairly even with both teams having equal possession and equal shots at goal. Alavés' keeper, Pacheco, was forced into action early on to deny a right-footed effort from Charles, and a header from Camacho soon after. In the latter stages of the first half, however, despite greater possession, Malaga, using the wings as their main route of attack, were in-

effective in creating many more significant chances as crosses from wingers Chory and Keko were lacking in quality.

For most of the half Alavés failed to capitalise on the home side's ineffective performance, despite winning several freekicks around Malaga's box and numerous corners. However, in the 38th minute Kameni failed to stop the visitors' first shot on target and Feddal, an unlikely scorer being a centre-half, provided Alavés with a 1-0 lead. The goal was especially hard to swallow for Malaga as the corner that fed Feddal's successful shot was provided by an unforced error from Demichelis who weighted his pass-

back to keeper Kameni so heavily that the latter was unable to keep the ball in play. The homeside pressed for the rest of the half, but their best chance, a header from Miguel Torres, was a straightforward save for Pacheco and Michel's team left the pitch 1-0

The Alavés goals came from the visitors' only shots on target, which made the final result all the more bitter

down at half time.

The second half saw a more threatening performance from Malaga, who continued to dominate possession but were now testing Pacheco much more frequently.

The first 10 minutes brought three freekicks for the homeside and the first booking of the match for the goalscorer as Malaga began to frustrate the Alavés defence. As the half progressed the chances for the hosts were coming thick and fast but did not yield any goals as a strong effort from Charles was stopped again by Pacheco and a potent shot from Sandro on the edge of the penalty area was thwarted by the inside of the post.

The last 20 minutes were the most dramatic of the fixture. An anticipated equaliser finally came in the 71st minute when left-back substitute Juankar, made a smooth finish to Charles' slick pass from outside the 18 yard box. The home fans' excitement was then compounded by the sending off of Alavés' Feddal just one minute later after he earned another yellow for a poorly-timed tackle.

The following minutes saw numerous chances for the hosts to take the lead. However more attempts from Charles' head and feet were light work for Pacheco, and a well-placed free header from substitute striker Youssef En-Nesyri was still not enough to halt the Alavés keeper's great performance. Nevertheless Malaga looked most likely to get the winner.

The winning goal finally came in the 91st minute, but disastrously for Michel and his players, it was from Alavés' central midfielder, Edgar, who easily slipped the ball past Kameni after being gifted possession by the hapless Demichelis and too much time and space by Luis Hernández in the Malaga penalty area.

The Alavés goals came from the visitors' only shots on target, which made the final result all the more bitter considering the amount of possession and the number of shots on target the home side enjoyed. A performance from Malaga, which overall looked more promising than their recent form, has once again ended in defeat, and Michel's first game is a frustrating loss.

The ultimate 'go-to' man

Pepe Mel is already working his magic at Deportivo La Coruña

On the phone of all club chairmen of top flight clubs that operate on a limited budget, there is button that says "dial in case of emergencies". In England this puts you through to the agent of Tony Pulis or Sam Allardyce, depending on who is between jobs at the time. The Spanish equivalent is Pepe Mel. He even got the call to the UK when Big Sam and Pulis couldn't be reached!

He is the football saint of almost lost causes and the 'go-to' man when all else has failed. The latest club to engage his recovery services is Deportivo La Coruña. He drove through the night from Andalucía to Galicia to answer the SOS when their position became desperate. You half expect him to arrive in a tow truck as he delves under the bonnet of the broken footballing vehicle.

In fact he's the opposite of the man in greasy overalls who has a van load of replacement parts. Mel dons an immaculate suit and starts to fix the broken parts.

This is his 12th job in football, twice he rescued Real Betis from the second division and of course West Brom dialled "M for Mel" when relegation was threatening in 2014. He doesn't tend to stay long, he does the job he was asked to do and departs for a spell penning novels (he's written three) until the next emergency calls comes in.

of desperation, they hadn't won in 2017 and suffered four successive defeats in February, with a daunting March ahead.

Mel's initiation was to be four games in eleven days, and not just any four games. It was Atlético, relegation rivals Sporting Gijón, Mel's old club Real Betis and then the free-scoring Barcelona.

He knuckled the team down for a draw with last year's Champions League finalists, inspired them to beat Sporting in the 93rd minute, found the energy for a midweek draw with Betis and then saved his best until last.

Barcelona arrived in town as global headliners after arguably the greatest comeback of all time against PSG. Messi and co had

scored seventeen goals in three games. Any opposition was just seen as stooges, like when the Harlem Globetrotters strut their stuff.

Incredibly Mel masterminded one of the biggest shocks of the season. The first goal was scored by Joselu, a striker who'd seen little playing time since signing on loan from Stoke City. The manager unleashed him and he ran around like a frenzied Spanish bull.

The masterstroke was giving local lad Álex Bergantiños his first start of the season. I say lad, he's been at the club fifteen years, like a part of the furniture but this season an unused bit of the furniture.

It was Galician Hollywood, as he emerged from the chorus line to score the winning goal to save his home-town club a relegation scrap.

The Pepe Mel influence had worked in less than two weeks. So you know the answer when your favourite La Liga team appears doomed, "Who you gonna call...?"

An assist from Kike Márquez left Zé Turbo in another one-on-one with the keeper, who was beaten this time to gift the striker with an open goal. The home fans were off their seats ready to celebrate a goal, only to watch on incredulously as the forward smashed the ball into the stands.

Marbella began the second half in a similar way to how they ended the first and both teams were now enjoying numerous goalscoring opportunities. However, after three

golden chances falling the way of Aly, Matheus and Luis Suárez, it was the latter's that broke the second half deadlock in the 75th minute.

Marbella still did not throw in the towel and persisted in seeking another goal. Añón, Goti and Okoye all had good chances to score in the last 15 minutes but an equaliser never came and Miguel Álvarez's first game in charge ended in a loss.

The final result means that Marbella move down to fourth position and will give up their place in the play-offs to Mérida AD if they lose another three points.

MALAGA. Today, Friday, sees the opening of the annual Malaga Film

Festival, a week-long celebration of the best Spanish and Latin American cinema produced in the last year. Event organisers have battled this week's wind and rain to prepare the Cervantes and Echegaray theatres and the Albéniz cinema for the bevy of famous faces that will walk the red carpet over the coming days. One of which, will be Malaga-born Antonio Banderas, who will receive a long-awaited honorary golden biznaga which recognises his lasting career and his feat in paving the way for other Spanish actors to crack Hollywood.

The festival, which celebrates its 20th anniversary this year, promises numerous film premieres, concerts, galas and

award ceremonies. Along with Antonio Banderas, throughout the week, film fans can also look forward to appearances from many other prominent Hispanic actors and filmmakers, all hoping for their work to be rewarded with the distinctive flower-shaped trophy.

Tonight's inauguration ceremony, commencing at 8pm at the Teatro Cervantes, will exhibit some of Andalucía's finest talent. The show will be co-presented by Malaga actor Fran Perea, and other artists such as choreographer Luz Arcas, dancers Alto Voltaje Crew and singer Roko, who are all from

the region, will perform in the musical segment of the show.

introduced by Jorge Drexler, which is another cause of excitement for film and music enthusiasts, as the Uruguayan is a widely acclaimed singer-songwriter who won an Oscar in 2004 for his composition of 'Al Otro Lado del Río' in The Motorcycle Diaries.

Alongside the work of internationally-successful producers and actors, Malaga filmmakers will also present their productions. On Saturday, Maniac Tales, a horror produced by Kike Mesa will be shown at Teatro Cervantes; on Wednesday, Laborable, a short by Alejandro Marín, can be viewed at the Provin-

cial Cultural Centre (CCP); and at the same venue on Thursday, Normal, a short by Chiqui Carabante will premiere.

When it comes to the prize for Best Film, an accolade that merits the golden biznaga instead of the silver one given for the majority of the awards, the panel have a difficult decision to make, as this year there are a total of 40 nominated films, 17 of which are Spanish and 23 Latin American. The closing award ceremony will take place next Sunday and will be hosted by yet another Malaga talent, singer Diana Navarro.
