# British tourist who ran over and killed three-year-old in San Pedro tests positive for cocaine

The boy, who was with his grandmother at the time, was pronounced dead at the scene in the Azalea shopping centre car park

A three-year-old French boy died on Sunday after being run over by a car in the Azalea shopping centre car park in San Pedro.

Four British holidaymakers aged between 20 and 24 were in the car as it reversed out of a parking space, colliding with the boy as he got out of another car.

The emergency services were

called and paramedics pronounced the boy dead at the scene.

The driver, 24, was breathalysed and no alcohol was detected in his system. However, drug test results showed traces of cocaine in his saliva, which could have been consumed any time between 24 and 48 hours before the test was taken.

As there is currently no evidence

that the driver was under the influence of narcotics at the time of the incident, he was released after questioning.

The results of the test will be sent to a laboratory to assess the time of consumption more accurately as part of the police's ongoing investigation into a possible case of negligent manslaughter. P4

# Cold snap covers inland areas in snow

The Serranía de Ronda and the Antequera area were worst hit as the harshest weather of the winter so far deposited up to 10cm of snow and heavy rain across Malaga province

MALAGA. The mountain areas of Malaga province were covered in white earlier this week as snow fell on higher ground, making access to remote areas difficult and causing widespread disruption, as well as amazement as families and amateur photographers came out to enjoy the unusual weather. It was the harshest spell of weather seen so far this winter.

At the weekend it snowed across the entire mountainous arc that borders the province from the Ronda mountain range and the Sierra de las Nieves in the west to the peaks of Tejeda, Alhama and Almijara in the Axarquía to the east.

The snow was also accompanied by a dramatic fall in the temperature to below zero in Ronda and other mountain towns and villages.

On Monday morning the Spanish meteorological agency Aemet raised the yellow warning to amber in the Ronda area and there were yellow alerts for snow in force in the Antequera area as more than 10 cm of snow fell, restricting road access and trapping dozens of vehicles. Drivers in the area were advised to wrap up warm, take suitable footwear and a raincoat, and a bag with water, food, and a charged mobile phone.

Access to El Torcal in Antequera was still closed to traffic until Wednesday after officials stated the heavy build-up of snow and icy patches on local roads had made the roads unsafe for vehicle access. The El Torcal visitor centre was

tonnes of salt and grit were scattered on the province's roads by the Junta's road safety department.

From Saturday through to Monday, the Junta de Andalucía sent out around 20 clearance vehicles carrying 70 road maintenance staff to clear the worst of the snow and to spread salt to prevent accidents. Their main priority was to keep the mains roads in and out of Ronda operation, especially the A-396 (to Algeciras) and the A-366 which connects Ronda to the Sierra de las Nieves via Yunquera and El Burgo.

Though access to the Sierra de la Nieves was difficult via Ronda, the natural park still attracted a number of visitors from the coast via San Pedro, including many tourists, keen to enjoy the Día de Reyes in the snow. This road too was eventually closed on Monday.

# **Highest parts of the province**

On the eastern side of the province, the highest municipalities, Alfarnate and Alfarnatejo, in the upper Axarquía, saw snow as thick as 5cm settle on the ground but the use of gritting machines meant that neither chains on tyres nor



road closures were necessary.

# Cold on the Costa too

Meanwhile, the snow didn't quite reach the Costa del Sol, but it was at least visible on the top of the mountains inland. A white layer had settled on the Montes de Málaga natural park overlooking Malaga city at the Fuente de la Reina viewpoint.

Instead, coastal areas experienced heavy rain and hail and a notable drop in temperatures. In the city of Malaga maximum temperatures ranged from 7 to 11°C, in Velez from 4 to 12° C, and in Marbella between 8 and 12° C.

Temperatures rose once more by Wednesday but meteorologists warn that cold and wet weather could return for the weekend.

During the course of the cold snap, no serious accidents nor casualties were reported.

#### **Good news for agriculture**

Despite the inconvenience for many motorists, the rain and snow came as a welcome relief for both growers and the province's reservoirs.

In the Axarquía, where drought restrictions are already in place, the heavy rain has irrigated land as well as replenishing stocks at La Viñuela reservoir, according to the association for young farmers

(Asaja). They say that the precipitation has not damaged any crops too much. The snow too, it is hoped, will have a positive effect as it melts and increases water flow in aquifers.

# **Families forced to wait** ten hours in "death trap" hold-up in Segovia

MADRID. Around 3,000 vehicles were trapped as knee-high snow fell between kilometre 60 and 95 on the AP-6 in the province of Segovia on Saturday evening. The hold-up lasted some ten hours.

There was widespread anger at apparent neglect from the authorities who were aware of the inclement weather days before.

The hold-up, which occurred as

many families returned from their Kings' Day celebrations, was described as a "death trap" by David Murciano, who was trapped with his family.

Other cases have emerged of children going without water, sick babies unable to get medical attention and a diabetic child separated from their insulin.

A joint law suit is being prepared on behalf of the victims

However, it has since been proved that this unusual image was as a result of an intense hailstorm which struck the resort. This was confirmed by Aemet, the Spanish met office, which confirmed that conditions were "all wrong" for snow to have fallen.

The beach didn't stay like this for long. Despite temperatures of just 5°C, the mercury quickly rose again and the hail melted.

# Driver who ran over and killed child in San Pedro tests positive for cocaine

The 24-year-old British man was on holiday with friends when he ran over the three-year-old in a car park in San Pedro

MALAGA. A three-year-old boy died on Sunday after being run over in the Azalea shopping centre car park in San Pedro. Four young British men aged between 20 and 24, on holiday in Marbella, were in the car that ran over the boy as it reversed out of a parking space.

The emergency services were called at 2.10pm but paramedics attending the toddler could do nothing to save his life and he was proclaimed dead at the scene.

The 24-year-old driver was breathalysed and no alcohol was detected. However, drug test results have revealed traces of cocaine in his saliva. The test used to confirm the driver's consumption of cocaine can only detect drug use 24 to 48 hours prior to the test so there is currently no evidence to suggest that the driver was under the influence of narcotics at the time of the incident. He did not show any physical signs of recent drug

use either.

The driver was therefore released after questioning but as part of ongoing investigations into a possible case of negligent manslaughter, the results of the test have been sent to a laboratory to determine the precise time of consumption to see if it could have impeded his ability to drive.

The tourists had briefly parked their rental car, a Hyundai Tucson,

in the car park in order to retrieve a cap that had blown into the street. At the same time, the young boy was going to the shopping centre with his grandmother, who had just parked. The boy, who is French, had just got out the car as the other car began leaving the space.

This accident has delivered a tough blow to the local Jewish community to which the victim's family belongs.

# Four drug traffickers arrested after a shootout

MALAGA. Four men have been remanded in custody and face a range of criminal charges from drug trafficking to attempted homicide, in connection with a shoot-out in Marbella. The events date back to last September, when two men arrived at a central Marbella hospital with gunshot wounds.

The National Police investigation revealed that the two men, of Spanish nationality and 25 and 29 years old, had been in a confrontation with two others, and had then been shot. The investigation led the police to a house on the Camino de Santiago in Marbella.


There they found two other men,

a 18-year-old Dutch man and a 43-year-old Polish man, as well as a ski mask, gloves, more than 5,000 euros in notes, and, in a blood-soaked pouch, a firearm. When they returned with a search warrant, they discovered over a tonne of hashish, the gun used in the shooting hidden in a water treatment system, as well as three other firearms.

The police concluded that the shootout occurred because the Spanish men, part of one drug ring, had attempted to steal the hashish from their rivals. The Spanish and Polish men face charges of drug trafficking, assault and possession of illegal fireams, while the Dutch man is accused of attempted homicide.

When winter arrives and the temperatures drop many residents feel uncomfortably chilly at home, especially those who live on the coast

MALAGA. No matter where you go in the world, the weather is always a popular topic of conversation: the heat, the cold, the rain, the wind.... come up in brief exchanges between neighbours.

These conversations are normally a matter of courtesy rather than based on reality, but the recent cold weather in Malaga has given residents and visitors a new slant on the subject: everyone has been complaining that their homes are cold. One question in particular always seems to be asked: how, in a place like Malaga and the Costa del Sol, which has such a lovely climate, can the houses be so cold and uncomfortable?

There are answers to this, of course, and one undeniable fact is that the weather is colder in winter and Malaga is no exception. In this province the coldest months are usually December and January, when the average temperature is about 12 or 13 degrees Celsius. It often feels colder than it actually is because of the relative humidity, which is higher on the coast than inland and gives that impression of 'bone-chilling cold' which is more acute in coastal towns.

# **Construction regulations**

The second explanation comes from the president of the College of Architects of Malaga, Francisco Sarabia, who begins by agreeing "as a user as well as a professional", that houses in a large part of the province are not sufficiently prepared to cope when the temperature drops.

"The regulations for insulating buildings in areas with a warm climate are much less strict than in places where the winters are more severe," says Sarabia. He is referring to the Technical Building Code, to explain why a house in Burgos, for example, is not built in the same way as one in Malaga.

This legislation was modified in 2006, and it means that now "the minimum requirements for insulating a building are decided by climatic areas, whereas before the regulations were changed they were generic for the whole of Spain," he explains.

In other words, it is not surprising that properties which were built over a decade ago do not comply with the Why are homes so cold on the Costa del Sol? The humidity and minimum regulations regarding insulation in residential properties are two reasons people are shivering indoors DANFOSS

conditions which are obligatory in new buildings today.

"Nowadays, we have to incorporate insulation into the outside walls of properties built in Malaga. We always have to take the local climate into account," explains Francisco

In other words, the regulations with which the professionals have to comply when designing a house have to be adjusted to maximums of consumption - in summer and winter - so households do not need to use a great deal of energy in order to obtain a comfortable temperature.

## 'Cool houses'

This also explains, for example, why on the Costa del Sol the requirements focus mainly on the heat, rather than the cold. In other words, buildings in southern Spain are obliged to bear in mind the criteria of keeping houses cool in the summer rather than warm in the winter.

Also, homes on the Costa del Sol do not use central heating to the same extent as in other areas of Spain and even Andalucía (such as Granada and Jaén) "because central heating is a complex and expensive installation and it would not be used much," says Sarabia.

On the other hand, and still following the criteria of geographical location, homes in Malaga do have to comply with other requirements, as he explains: "Here, homes are built to lose as little cold or heat energy as possible; properties tend to be designed with windows to the south so the sun comes in during the winter and also incorporate cantilevers to protect from the heat in the summer. North-facing walls tend to have few windows because a lot of energy is lost through them," he says

Most people rule out the idea of central heating because it is so expensive and is not often needed in a cli-

> mate such as that on the Costa del Sol, but many homes in this area do have air conditioning/heating units instead. These, together with other electrical appliances such as fan heaters, braziers or oil-filled radiators, are the most commonly used methods

# The gas option

For several years now, especially since the liberalisation of the market in 2008, people in Spain have had the option of incorporating gas heating into their homes. This is considered the cleanest, least polluting and most comfortable source of energy. Its installation requires a gas boiler connected to a system of pipes through which hot water circulates and then provides heat via the radiators.

This option, however, is only available if the gas distribution network reaches the area in which people live, and it is not particularly widespread.

Information from Gas Natural Andalucía, the distribution branch of Gas Natural Fenosa, in Malaga province the network only extends to 14 municipalities (and is most used in Malaga city, Marbella and Rincón de la Victoria), covers 1,270 kilometres and provides a service to more than 280,000 people.

With regard to the demand for this method of heating the home, the same sources say that requests for the installation of domestic gas heating have increased by 20 per cent compared with this time last year.

# A surprise to foreigners

It is a fact, then, that many homes in Malaga are cold and it isn't only the locals who are complaining: foreign residents, especially, say they are surprised and so do people who come

from other parts of Spain where the weather is harsher but homes are better adapted to the

One such case is Svetlana Bagdasarova, a Russian woman who moved to Estepona with her four children six years ago. She thought she was escaping from the cold in Moscow, but paradoxically found that the Costa del Sol in winter was not what she expected.

"At this time of year the house is freezing. The problem is that it is very big and it costs me more than 1,000 euros a month to try to heat it. Ít's awful!" she says.

Inés Vidal found herself in a similar situation when she moved to Malaga over 20 years ago. She comes from León - a province which is often very cold - and was accustomed to the comfort of heating in her home. She remembers as if it were only yesterday that one of the first things she noticed when she arrived here was the temperature of her home:

"It was colder inside the house than outside in the street. I bought a heater and used to huddle over it. When I walked into another room my glasses used to mist over because of the change in temperature," she says.

# The population in inland Malaga has dropped considerably in recent years

MALAGA. Large towns along the coast are gaining in terms of population and those inland are progressively losing theirs. That is a simple way of summing up the way the registered population in the 103 municipalities in Malaga province has evolved in the past decade, a period during which we moved from the boom in construction to the economic crisis and then a moderate recovery in the most recent years.

There are some exceptions, but the latest figures from the National Institute of Statistics (INE), compiled on 1 January 2017, show that since 2007 the population has only increased in 37 places in the province.

In Malaga as a whole, there has been an increase of 113,092 people on the municipal population registers during the past ten years, giving a total of 1,630,615. Most of these were in towns on the coast or in the metropolitan area of Malaga city. Benalmádena tops the list, having obtained 16,642 new inhabitants and increased from 52,217 to 68,859 in

Marbella, which has the second highest population in the province after Malaga city, with 141,172 inhabitants, has gained 14,750. Third is Mijas, where the population has increased from 64,288 to 77,151. Fourth is Vélez-Málaga, which has gained 10,274 inhabitants, reaching a total of 79,878, making it the municipality with the third highest number of inhabitants in the province. Fuengirola, after gaining 9,508, has progressed from 65,421 to 74,929 and occupies fifth place on the list. Rincón de la Victoria, with 9,424 more inhabitants, comes sixth. Its population register showed 35,714 inhabitants in 2007 and it now has 45,138.

The population has also increased in the Malaga metropolitan area, such as in Alhaurín de la Torre, which gained 7,269 inhabitants, rising from 31,884 to 39,153, and Cártama, which has gone up from 18,865 to 25,317.

Estepona's population register now shows an extra 6,535 inhabitants, bringing the total to 66,863. Among the places where the population has risen considerably is Benahavís: in ten years its population increased from 3,253 to 7,348, mainly due to an influx of foreign residents.

On the contrary, among those which have lost the most inhabitants in the past decade are the inland towns of Antequera and Ronda. Antequera has lost 3,443 inhabitants in ten years as the village of Villanueva de la Concepción split away, dropping from 44,547 to 41,104, and in Ronda the population has dropped from 36,122 to 34,268, a difference of 1,854.

The situation of Antequera is particularly surprising because it has seen improved communications and is economically stable due to its strategic location. In the case of Ronda, the figure is not as bad as it seems: its outlying districts of Montecorto and Serrato have both become independent recently and now have their own population registers. However, lack of a motorway are still hindering Ronda's growth in population.

The drop in the other inland municipalities is not as great in absolute terms, but is a matter of concern, especially in the case of small villages with fewer than 5,000 inhabitants. In fact, 29 (almost one third) have a population of less than 1,000.

The Spanish Federation of Municipalities and Provinces (FEMP) has asked the government to take urgent measures to tackle this demographic challenge, and Quique Navarro, a lecturer in geography at Malaga university, says rural depopulation has serious consequences.

"Malaga province's situation is not as bad as elsewhere but urgent plans are needed to develop tourism, farming and artisan crafts," he says.

# Marbella gains 5,000 new foreign residents in 2017

While the figures released by the National Statistics Institute (INE) last week, and reflected on this page, show a modest increase in the inhabitants of Marbella in the

year up to I January 2017 (428), more recent statistics from the town hall's 'padrón' department show that the population grew by 6,000 during 2017 to 147,248. Of those 6,000 new names, nearly 5,000 are not Spanish.

The number of foreign residents on the local census went up from 32,810 to 37,710 between 1

January 2017 and the same date in 2018, meaning that a quarter of the local registered population is now foreign. The real figure is expected to be higher however, as not all residents join the census.

Of the total registered foreigners, four nationalities make up nearly half: British, Russian, Moroccan and Ukrainian.

# Investigation continues after two die in mass brawl between rival clans in Coin

Three arrests have been made in connection with the deaths of two men in the violent fight between two rival families in the Fuensanta area on Thursday last week

**COÍN.** A mass brawl broke out on the afternoon of Thursday last week between two rival gypsy families, known as 'Los Mudos and 'Los Franceses', in the neighbourhood of Fuensanta in Coin. Two men from 'Los Mudos', aged 63 and 50, were killed, while another two, both from separate clans, remain in hospital receiving treatment for knife wounds. They are both expected to make a full recovery.

Witnesses of the "horrific" fight say it broke out when some senior members of 'Los Mudos' began reprimanding some younger 'Franceses' for making too much noise at siesta time. Despite the seemingly trivial nature of this confrontation, minutes later a mass brawl broke out which involved over 20 people.

Witnesses saw the use of knives

and bats, with some claiming to have seen guns, although these were not used. Locals say the two clans have a history of conflict with one another.

Local evangelical pastor, Bernabé Hernández, said, "The fight was meant to be trivial, one of the 'múos' [member of 'Los Mudos'] was out of line and began insulting people. He insulted one of the kids and they killed him. Things got heated, there was lots of pain and rage." The fight left four cars and one house in the area damaged. and several refuse containers were set on fire.

After numerous 112 calls from local people, some 30 Guardia Civil officers were deployed to the area to ensure no more fights broke out.

Since then, three people have been arrested in connection with the deaths; two have been remanded in custody and denied bail and the third, a minor, was referred to the juvenile prosecution service. The Guardia Civil are continuing with their investigation and have not ruled out further arrests.

On Sunday, residents of Coin gathered to say goodbye to the two men who died during the brawl. The funeral went ahead without

# **British fugitive tracked** down living in Alhaurín el Grande

:: F. TORRES. Guardia Civil officers in Alhaurín el Grande have arrested a 75-year-old British man who was wanted by the UK authorities under an international arrest warrant. The man, who was apparently living a normal life in a country house near the town, is required to serve a prison sentence of five years and nine months having been convicted of a drug trafficking offence in the UK. The arrest was made in collaboration with the UK's National Crime Agency. The fugitive was put into the custody of a Madrid court.

# Calls for 17 years jail for man 'who tried to throw officer off a bridge'

:: Á. FRÍAS. Prosecutors in Malaga have called for a man who allegedly attempted to throw a police officer from a bridge in the city to be given 17 years in prison. The events took place in July 2016. One officer was on his way home from work when the accused, who recognised him from previous incidents, hit him in the mouth with a beer bottle causing cuts to the face. A second officer, who was passing on a motorcycle, chased the assailant and attempted to detain him but suffered blows and bites, before the man dragged him to the railings and attempted to throw him off the bridge.

# Search stepped up for missing British woman

Rebecca Muldoon, 35, disappeared on 2 January in Marbella. A neighbour called the police to report that her children were at home alone

MARBELLA. National Police stepped up the search on Thursday for a British mother-of-two who went missing from her Marbella home more than a week ago.

Rebecca Muldoon, originally from Southend, Essex, vanished from her home on 2 January. The 35-year-old,

who had been living with her partner and two children on the Costa del Sol for the past year, failed to appear in court to confirm her reports of domestic abuse she had suffered at the hands of her partner. Following her allegations her partner was arrested and he was still in police custody when Rebecca went missing.

On Thursday around 50 people from the local police, fire and Protección Civil services were involved in the search, coordinated from a temporary command station in the Camino del Pilar area.

The authorities were first alerted when a neighbour contacted police claiming that Rebecca's children,

aged eight and eleven, had been left alone in the family home. Rebecca's relatives in the UK immediately flew to Malaga to take care of them.

A friend of Rebecca's has appealed for information on her whereabouts in a social media campaign, saying: "Rebecca has been missing for a week. She has no money, passport or clothes and her phone is switched off."

The woman's sister had also reported her disappearance to British police who are now collaborating with their Spanish counterparts in the investigation.

National Police have appealed for any member of the public with information to contact them on 091.

# Man sentenced for attempting to kill a woman in Fuengirola

:: I. GELIBTER. The Malaga provincial court has sentenced a man to seven years in prison for trying to kill a woman due to an "unrequited love that had become an obsession", according to prosecutors. The attack occurred in September 2015 when the man approached the victim in the street in Fuengirola with a knife and stabbed her several times. He has also been ordered to pay the woman 28,000 euros in damages.

# Last detained immigrants leave Archidona's prison building

Campaigners are relieved by the move after news that three people held there self-harmed recently in addition to the man who committed suicide

**ARCHIDONA.** The last illegal immigrants held in Archidona's unopened prison complex left on Wednesday.

The remaining 67 Algerians there were taken to the government's official immigrant centres, meaning the interior ministry fulfilled its promise to only use the Archidona building in inland Malaga province

until the start of January.

Last November over 500 illegal immigrants who had arrived in Spain from Algeria were taken to the new, unused Archidona prison building as the government's other, official detention centres were full.

The move sparked a wave of protests over the supposedly inappropriate use of the prison for migrants that came to a head recently with the suicide of one of the immigrants and increasing violence among those held inside.

Although the government has always maintained that the conditions were the same as its normal centres, news also emerged this week that three held inside had tried to self harm and sources said that the recent incidents made officials keen to speed up the plan to empty out the building.

Opposition parties and campaign groups welcomed the last departures as experts visited the building to assess the repairs necessary after its temporary use.

# Ryanair implements new baggage policy

**:: M.B.** Ryanair's new baggage policy is due to be introduced on 15 January. The changes mean that passengers will only be able to bring one handbag or laptop bag on board with them. Any bigger cases, which were previously included in the cabin bag allowance, will be taken at the gate and placed in the hold. This means that passengers may have to endure long waits at the baggage carousel at the arrival airport. If willing, passengers can pay extra for 'Priority & 2 cabin bags' to take a normal cabin bag on board.



# Road bridge over A-7 in Las Lagunas planned

:: I. G. Mijas council has carried out a feasibility study into swapping the pedestrian bridge that runs over the A-7 linking the two sides of Las Lagunas for a road bridge. It says that the increasing population in the area means driving around the Las Lagunas district of Mijas Costa, which is divided by the motorway, has become harder and this is a possible solution. If it gets permission from government it hopes to include the scheme in its 2019 budget. The pedestrian bridge is well-known to A-7 motorists for its 'You are in Las Lagunas' painted sign.

# Street lights put up on Camino de Campanales

:: IVAN GELIBTER. After years of complaints from local residents, Mijas council has announced that it has finished putting up 20 street-lighting columns along the previously unlit Camino de Campanales, between the Fuengirola-Mijas road and Avenida de Mijas in Las Lagunas.

Work has been going on for the last two months to install the new LED lighting. As well as meeting locals' demands for improvements, "we continue looking after the environment", said a spokesperson.

# Torremolinos and Benalmádena still haven't agreed on La Leala bridge link plan and financing

TORREMOLINOS. The mayors of the neighbouring municipalities of Torremolinos and Benalmádena still haven't made progress on the plans for a new bridge over the El Saltillo stream bed in the La Leala area. The bridge would link this part of the two districts and stop local traffic having to make a detour along busy main roads. Although both mayors promised the bridge in their 2015 election campaigns, Torremolinos says that it cannot pay its half as it has other investment priorities at the moment. So far not even the plan has been drawn up.

# Fuengirola to spend a million euros putting rubbish containers underground

FUENGIROLA. Over 80 rubbish containers on the streets of Fuengirola are to be put inside 23 specially built underground units. Fuengirola council says it is to spend a million euros, taken from an underspend on its 2016 budget, "with the aim of improving the look and feel" of the town's streets.

The tender document was published in December and, once a contractor is approved, the work should be finished within five months. The containers being replaced with underground depositories to collect organic waste, paper and cardboard, glass and plastic are located in different parts of the municipality.

# **Date set for illegal** houses to be torn down

**E.C. / J.R.** Vélez-Málaga town hall has confirmed that two houses built on land not intended for development in the Mano Hierro area near Los Puertas, a hamlet belonging to Vélez-Málaga, will be demolished on Monday 15 January. The decision is based on a 2012 court sentence which found the owners guilty of urban planning offences as the two houses had been built illegally and without a licence.

A final attempt was made by the owners of the houses on 29 December to stop demolition when they submitted a request for the properties be registered as Asimilado Fuera de Ordenación (AFO), which recognises illegal houses built on non-urban land as semi legal and provides them with limited rights as well as prevents them from being demol-

# Nerja is in top 10 global emerging destinations list

**E.C / J.R.** Nerja has been ranked number nine on a list of the top 10 emerging worldwide destinations by travel website, Tripadvisor. The island of Ishigaki in Japan claimed the top spot on the Travellers' Choice list. # Agreement reached over convent purchase price

The final decision now lies with the Junta de Andalucía as to whether the town hall will be able to buy the former convent. The council and local cultural society would like to see the space used as a cultural centre.

# Sewage spills blamed on heavy rain and unfinished treatment plant

A court has ordered the Guardia Civil to investigate the source of effluent leaks this week in Nerja at the mouth of the Chillar and Playa Burriana

NERJA. A court has asked the Guardia Civil's environmental unit to investigate the source of effluent leaks around Nerja town centre this week. On Tuesday sewage was spotted spilling into the mouth of the Chillar river, at El Chucho and El Playazo beaches to the west of town, and on Wednesday more effluent was reported on Burriana

According to the councillor responsible for water management and infrastructure, José María Rivas, the spillage on Tuesday was caused by an electrical fault at the Calle Mérida pump which is connected to the pipes that flow into the Chillar river and the sea.

Rivas explained that this "can happen during heavy rainfall or storms". However, he added that the problem was "resolved within 15 minutes" of the town hall being alerted to the problem. Rivas admitted that the lack of a waste water treatment plant in Nerja "complicated the situation".

On Wednesday Malaga MP for the PSOE party, Miguel Ángel Heredia, visited Nerja and joined the town's PSOE mayor, Rosa Arrabal, in calling upon national gov-

ernment to allow work to restart on the waste water treatment plant, which has been stopped for over eight months.

On the same day neighbours reported more waste water at Burriana beach, but the reason for the leak wasn't immediately clear.

Rivas said on Tuesday that "while we don't have a treatment plant this kind of situation is what we have to deal with".

Work was halted when the company responsible for carrying out the project, Isolux-Corsán-Corviam, went into receivership last July. 76 per cent of the work has been carried out, including connecting pipes to pumping stations. However, the main site as well as the pumping station near Burriana beach remain unfinished.

The tripartite leadership at Nerja town hall announced last week that if there was no news on progress by the end of January a series of protests would be organised.

# "We want to find our grandfather's remains and stop travelling to Rute"

NERJA. The grandchildren of a communist fighter who fought against Franco during Spain's civil war are hoping to bring their grandfather's remains back to Nerja.

María Luisa Sánchez and her cousin Carmen, two of José Centurión Jiménez's six living grandchildren, are part of a collective based in Rute, Cordoba, where Centurión

is buried in a common grave along with other guerilla fighters. The group has recently asked the Junta de Andalucía for permission to exhume the bodies of communist soldiers buried in the cemetery.

Every 1 November, All Saints' Day, the cousins travel to Rute to lay flowers on the grave. "For us it would be a great joy to be able to bury him with dignity alongside our grandmother and not have to travel to Rute every 1 November," explained María Luisa.

Centurión was assassinated by the Guardia Civil on 22 June 1950 after fleeing Nerja when he heard that they were looking for him. He got as far as Rute where he was eventually captured.

TORREMOLINOS. Torremolinos town hall has begun work on the pedestrianisation of the Plaza Costa del Sol and the centre of Torremolinos. The work will be carried out in two phases. The first phase - due to be finished by May - will focus on the renovation and expansion of infrastructure and utility networks. With just over a year until 'Brexit Day' there is still a lot of uncertainty over citizens' rights, especially for those of working age with UK qualifications

MALAGA. Roger Boaden is a cofounder of ECREU, a France-based citizens group which is championing the rights of British citizens abroad with regard to Brexit negotiations. ECREU belongs to British in Europe (BiE)- the umbrella group set up by Jane Golding, a British lawyer living in Germany, of which Bremain in Spain is also a member.

For 30 years Roger worked for former UK prime ministers Ted Heath and then Margaret Thatcher as their election campaigns manager and was the Conservative Party European elections officer for the first direct elections to the European Parliament in 1979.

Despite saying that he is "critical" of some aspects of the EU, Roger considers himself "European." He says he is "of the generation who helped to reconcile differences" with Germans following World War Two and spent time in Germany before the Berlin wall was built as well as while it was still standing.

He moved to France with his wife 15 years ago and is considering moving to Spain. However, with uncertainty over rights post Brexit, a move from one EU country to another looks set to be complicated by the British government's plans for EU citizens living in the UK having to apply for 'settled status.'

-We first (and last) spoke shortly after the referendum when citizens' groups were starting to mobilise. What has happened since then?

-ECREU, along with other groups like Bremain in Spain have joined forces and now belong to the umbrella group, British in Europe. I am on the BiE steering committee and we have managed to meet regularly with European politi-

Unfortunately we haven't been able to get a meeting with David Davis and have only been able to speak to junior ministers and civil servants.

-We have been told that our rights as UK citizens living in the EU will be protected post Brexit. Does this give us some sense of hope?

-There has been some progress, yes, particularly in terms of health care and pensions for those who are already retired. But figures show that over 70 per cent of UK citizens living in the EU are still working and the next round of negotiations, on trade, are going to be crucial in terms of recognition of qualifications and those who are self-employed. There is still a great deal of uncertainty.

-You mentioned that you and your wife are considering moving to Spain.

-Yes, we're 50/50 over the decision. As EU citizens we currently enjoy freedom of movement and the right to live where we want in the EU. However, with the potential for bilateral agreements between the UK and individual governments after Brexit, because of the UK's 'settled status' programme, it could well be a lot more difficult to move from one EU country to another. We could become landlocked. We'd have the right to reside in the country we're already living in, but moving to another could be very complicated. -With just over a year to go until 'Brexit Day' what are BiE's priorities?

-To keep campaigning. Now that the negotiations are moving to trade there is a danger that citizens' rights will be sidelined and we can't allow that to happen.

# HMS Sutherland will be in Gibraltar today

**GIBRALTAR.** A Royal Navy vessel is due to arrive in Gibraltar today, Friday 12 January for a short logistical stop.

HMS Sutherland , which is affectionately known as 'The Fighting Clan', is a Type 23 anti-subma-

rine warfare frigate. She left the UK earlier this week and will be away for seven months, conducting operations and exercises with a wide range of allies and partners.

The ship was the 13th of the 16 Type 23 frigates to be built, and she was launched in 1996 at the Yarrow shipyard (now BAE) on the Clyde. HMS Sutherland's home port is now Devonport, in Plymouth.

When she leaves Gibraltar, she will travel on deployment to Australia, the Far East and the Gulf region. Her captain is Commander Andrew Canale.

# Catalan separatists consider choosing a president via Skype

Carles Puigdemont, possible main candidate to be regional government leader, is in Belgium and will be arrested if he returns to Spain

BARCELONA. The pro-indepdendence political parties, who hold a majority in the soon-to-be-convened Catalan parliament, are discussing

between themselves whether to remotely invest the new president of the regional government.

The former president, Carles Puigdemont, is leader of Junts per Catalunya, the biggest separatist party after December's election, but he is still in Belgium along with five of his ex-ministers. If they return to Spain they face certain arrest over the investigation into the illegal declaration of independence last autumn.

His party and second place ERC are checking the legality of Puigde-

mont reading out an investiture speech from Belgium via a video conference link such as Skype ahead of a majority of regional MPs voting him in. It isn't clear if Puigdemont would then return to be arrested or a day-to-day stand-in would be appointed while he stayed away.

Another controversial scenario

debated is that Oriol Junqueras. leader of ERC, the second largest secessionist party, is sworn in, but he is held in jail and, if let out, would only be able to attend votes.

A further option being considered, and favoured by those against more confrontation with Madrid, is that the five MPs in Belgium, including

Puigdemont, and the three in jail in Madrid step aside from their seats and allow other candidates lower down December's electoral list to take their place as regional MPs.

Next Wednesday, 17 January the regional parliament meets for the first session in the process of deciding a new president and government.





# Man declared dead in suicide wakes up on the autopsy table in morgue

An investigation has been launched after three doctors confirmed that the 29-year-old was deceased

**OVIEDO.** An inquiry has been launched in Asturias, northern Spain, after a 29-year-old prisoner, who had been declared dead after apparently committing suicide, woke up naked on the autopsy table in a morgue.

According to the man's family, he had taken an overdose in his cell and two prison doctors had declared him dead. A third doctor confirmed that he was legally deceased.

It was several hours by the time the man started to stir when an autopsy was about to begin. "First he started to snore then he opened his eyes," reported his family. 'When he woke up the first thing he asked for was a cigarette then something to eat," they added.

The prison service has said the doctors had all acted correctly but has promised to investigate.

# **Preliminary** autopsy says **Diana Quer was** strangled

MADRID. The preliminary autopsy on the body of Diana Quer, the 18year-old woman who went missing in August 2016 in Galicia, has shown that she was strangled.

Diana's body was found on New Year's Eve in Rianxo, around fifteen kilometres from where she is believed to have been abducted.

Police were led to her body by 41year-old José Enrique Abuín Gey, who was arrested on Christmas Day and admitted her killing to police, saying it was a traffic accident.

Abuín, known as 'El Chicle', was moved to another prison this week over fears of attacks from other inmates.

# **ANYONE'S GUESS**



ust how concerned is the Spanish government about the potential cost of the Catalonia crisis to the rest of the country? One week it seems to be very worried indeed, yet the next it appears to shrug off the dangers, and nowhere is this more evident than in the statements of Spanish economy minister Luis de Guindos.

Last week saw De Guindos fretting that the ongoing prob-lems in the north-easterly region had already cost Spain one billion euros. Yet this Tuesday, the minister sent out a rather different message when he upped the government's forecast for Spain's GDP expansion in 2018.

"The scenario [for this year]," a suddenly-optimistic De Guindos said at an investors' conference earlier this week, "is a growth rate clearly above 2.5%." Previously, that estimate was at

I've written in this column time and again that, macroeconomically, Spain is indifferent to the games of its politicians: this was proved when the country went for ten months without a government in 2016 yet still posted solid GDP growth that year. What's interesting here is what De Guindos is thinking and the messages he's sending out. And the conclusion we're left with is that he thinks the Spanish economy can lose a billion euros, no problem, and still smash the government's growth targets.

When De Guindos estimated that the Catalonia farce had already cost Spain a billion euros, it seemed he was also worried about further damage to the country's GDP - and rightly: the issue is far from resolved. A week on, and this is still the case. Pro-independence parties won a parliamentary majority in the Catalan elections on December 21st last year, and this

week they have agreed to try and restore the former regional president, Carles Puigdemont, to power. There's just one problem with that plan, though: Puigdemont is in voluntary exile in Belgium and will be arrested if he sets foot in Spain.

Bizarrely and hilariously, Puigdemont is said to be proposing governing Catalonia from Brussels via video-call. Accordingly, legal experts are now pouring over the rules of the regional parliament to see if this is allowed for. Inés Arrimadas, leader of the anti-independence party Ciudadanos in Catalonia, summed up the absurdity of this proposal by saying that Puigdemont "cannot be president by hologram". Perhaps she begs the question, though, because there seem to be no limits to how surreal the Catalonia situation can become.

So there is a possibility, no matter how strange, that the Spanish government's nemesis is about to become leader of Catalonia again. And to reflect that fact, Luis de Guindos ups this year's economic forecast for Spain.

Perhaps, if a hologrammed Puigdemont is elected to lead Catalonia for a second time governing via Skype and Whatsapp - the Spanish economy minister will increase his growth estimate yet again.



# Former IMF head denies blame for the near-collapse of Bankia

The ex-president of the bank was in combative mood before a committee of MPs investigating the cause of the financial crisis

MADRID. The ex-president of Bankia, Rodrigo Rato, who was also once a government minister and head of the International Monetary Fund, appeared before a committee of MPs this week to explain his role in the crisis at the bank in 2012.

After a controversial flotation on the stock market and the pressure of the declining economy, the bank was rescued in 2012 with the help of the EU.

Making his eagerly awaited appearance on Tuesday, Rato was in combative mood, saving that it was the government that had driven Bankia to nationalisation.

Rato suggested that the regulator, the Bank of Spain, had been kept out of discussions with Bankia's competitors leading up to the bailout, saying that he believed the meetings had "been hidden".

He went on to say that the shares

of Bankia only collapsed in 2012 after finance minister, Luis de Guindos, forced him from his job as head of the bank.

Rato added that he was only accountable for the 4.6-billion-euro bailout initially requested to recapitalise and not the 19 billion euros that his successor went on to ask for.

De Guindos said on Tuesday that Bankia was now "well managed" and away from "political interference".

Rato is also waiting to hear a Supreme Court decision over his alleged involvement in fraud at Bankia.

# NH hotels rejects merger offer from Barceló for being too low

MADRID. The board of NH hotels has unanimously turned down a merger offer with the rival Barceló group.

In a statement it said that the amount Barceló proposed "in no way reflected the true value of the company".

In November Barceló made an

offer to NH to merge the two Spanish hotel giants which valued NH at 2.48 billion euros.

The NH board also said that Barceló's offer hadn't taken into account the value of its property portfolio in urban areas across Spain and the efficiency of its operation.

It went on to state its confi-

dence in its current strategic plan, solid growth and debt reduction.

Barceló replied to the rejection saying it was disappointed that NH had not agreed to create a leading European hotel chain and that it would "forget about the subject".

At the time of the offer in November analysts had said it was possibly a good strategic option for both companies, as NH is focused on urban hotels and the business market and Barceló more on the leisure market and resort

# **SOUND MONEY AND WHY IT MATTERS**



he classic definition of 'money' has three features: (1) a medium of exchange; (2) a store of value; and (3) a unit of account. 'Sound money' is simply a medium of exchange, backed by an asset with an intrinsic value and not liable to sudden appreciation or depreciation.

Money is not a risk asset. It does not, in and of itself, have a yield feature. The vield comes, from placing a EUR in a bank deposit. However, from the moment you make the bank deposit, it is no longer your money; it becomes part of the bank's unsecured liabilities.

The difference between money and bank deposits was learned painfully in Cyprus and Greece, in 2013 and 2015. In Greece, banks and ATMs were closed by the government. In Cyprus, many depositors had cash on deposit forcibly converted to bank stock.

Money has taken many different forms through history; shells, beads, feathers, gold and paper. Gold has been used as money throughout civilisation due to its unique atomic structure, and it is ideally suited to be money. Gold is physical, not digital, money and is subject to less volatility than FIAT currencies. As such, gold provides an insurance against the risks to which digital currencies are exposed. Another form of digital currency is the EUR. We may carry some paper or coins, but most of our transactions are in fact by credit card or online.


The 20 EUR note in your pocket is a FIAT currency as it derives its buying power from FIAT (Latin for 'decree'), a government mandate.

No longer backed by the tangible asset of gold, its value rests on confidence in the government bestowing buying power. Confidence is fragile, difficult to earn and easy to lose. In 1971, when President Nixon announced by decree that the US paper currency was no longer redeemable in gold, the US Dollar became FIAT for the first time in its history and the US Government could print as much as it wanted. It printed 84Bn US Dollars a month for six years, following the financial crisis of 2008. It was not necessary to collateralise it with anything, other than confidence in the US government. Historically, however, large scale money printing has led to inflation (too many dollars chasing too few goods and services).

The international monetary system collapsed three times in the 20th century: in 1914, 1939 and 1971. It came close to collapse in 1998 and 2008. Today's international monetary system is largely based on confidence in the US Dollar. The monetary system fails every 30 years or so. The next collapse will be triggered by no confidence in the US Dollar as a store of

History teaches us that it's convenient for central banks to persuade people that money is unconnected to gold, so that they can print unlimited paper and devalue their debt. However, there is something to be learned from the fact that today, major developed central banks, together with Russia and China, are net buyers of gold. Gold is still, unquestionably underpinning the international monetary system and is sound money.


for a few weeks. Not now though.

One such writer is expat novelist Joan Fallon, author of numerous books, some on a Spanish theme. Joan lives in Benajarafe with her husband, where she has become passionate about both the language and history of her adopted home. This passion is reflected in her writing. Many of her books are set in periods of recent history, such as the Spanish Civil War and they are meticulously researched.

A member of the Society of Authors and the Alliance of Independent Authors, Joan's reading taste is eclectic and ranges from Turgenev and Stendhal to William Boyd and Hilary Mantel.

A natural storyteller, Joan's novels centre on a strong female character and explore the emotions and relationships of her protagonist.

Joan was born in Dumfries, Scotland, the only child of a Scottish mother and an Irish father. A former training and development consultant for Bucks County Council, Joan was educated at Felixstowe Grammar School and

MALAGA. It was while working on an oral history on women in contemporary Spain that one of Joan's interviewees started to tell her about the massacre on the Malaga-Almeria road in February 1937, the subject of one of her books.

The woman's own father had been caught up in the events and Joan was so intrigued by what she had to say, she suspended the research on the book she was writing and devoted herself to telling this tragic story.

The historical details in Spanish Lavender were carefully researched, even down to the state of the weather that month.

"I have tried to give an accurate picture of the events of February 1937 in Malaga," Joan explains.

spent her formative years living in Marlow in Buckinghamshire.

She left school at sixteen, instantly regretted it, and spent the next fifteen years catching up on her education. She earned her teaching certificate and became a primary school teacher in Buckinghamshire, but continued with her studies at the Open University, then a fairly new institution.

Despite having a full time job, a husband and two young children she obtained an honours degree in History and Literature.

The sudden death of her son - a keen sportsman who rowed for England - when he was only seventeen, prompted Joan to make a career change and she took a postgraduate diploma in Management Studies.

"My son died of ventricular arrhythmia - sudden death syndrome. His death was a dreadful shock and it took me many years to come to terms with it," Joan explains emotionally.

For a number of years she worked at Missenden Abbey, a 17th century conference centre that was part of Brunel University. Joan became Principal Lecturer in Leadership and Behavioural Studies, before successfully launching her own management and development company.

The Scottish author began her career as a writer after moving to Spain in 1998, where she settled in Benajarafe, which, at that time, was a quiet, picturesque fishing village. She completed an Open University course in Creative Writing in 2006 and began to devote herself to fiction.

"The writing was always something I wanted to do, but I never got the opportunity to write until I came to Spain. I'm not sure what it is about Spain and Andalucía in particular that inspires me, but since a very young age I've been fascinated with Spain and I used to read old travel books

about the country. Since actually living here, I've found it even more fascinating. Everywhere you look there are reminders of the country's varied history," Joan explains passionately.

Her first book was called Daughters of Spain, a non-fictional work based on authentic interviews with a number of Spanish women from all walks of life. The research for this book in turn encouraged Joan to write Spanish Lavender, a love story set among death and carnage in Malaga in 1937. Although the characters in the novel are fictitious, the historical details are based on actual events that took place during the Spanish Civil War in February

"I knew I had to write a novel about Malaga in the Civil War. Sometimes I end up researching a period where little written accounts remain, but if I can find enough information to write the historical background accurately, I use my imagination and logic for the rest. That's the best thing about writing fiction," she declares.

Her subsequent novels have grown out of her experiences living and working in Spain.

# **Birth of 17th century** baroque artist, Jusepe de Ribera

usepe de Ribera, also known as José, was a leading 17th century Spanish painter noted for his dramatic realism and his depiction of religious and mythological subjects. He was probably the most influential painter of the Spanish baroque period, but his unconventional images categorised the artist as a painter of dark and sinister subjects. His work presented mutilated bodies, deformed children and faces contorted with

His interest in the human form greatly influenced his work; however, Ribera was more than a mere painter of oddities. His paintings include biblical scenes and a series based on mythological subjects, and portraits of real and imaginary figures.

Born in Valencia in 1591, Rib-

era's father was a shoemaker who intended his son for a literary career, but he neglected his studies, preferring to concentrate on his passion for art.

Longing to study art in Italy, he made his way to Rome in 1611. It is generally assumed that Rib-

era was the apprentice of the celebrated artist, Francisco Ribalta. Legend claims that he left Ribalta's studio and, subsequently, Spain, following an illicit affair with Ribalta's daughter. Legends abound from this period of Ribera's life: according to one source, a wealthy cardinal discovered the poor young art student drawing frescoes on a Roman palace. Ribera is said to have rejected the offer of the cardinal's support, claiming he needed the stimulus of necessity in order to produce his art.

He remained fiercely proud of

his Hispanic roots and Italian artists soon began calling him Spagnoletto, - the little Spaniard.

Despite a substantially high income, Ribera is said to have lived beyond his means and in 1616, he moved to Naples, supposedly in order to avoid his creditors. In the same year he mar-

ried Caterina Azzolino, the daughter of Giovanni Bernardino Azzolino, a Neapolitan painter whose connections in the art world helped to establish Ribera as a major figure within the Naples art sector. The Kingdom of Naples was then part of the Spanish Empire and Ribera's

Spanish nationality aligned him with the small Spanish gov-erning class, which included important

collectors and dealers of art. The artist quickly attracted the attention of the Viceroy, the Duke of Osuna, who gave him a number

of major commissions. Few paintings survive from this era, but this was the period in which most of his best work was produced. Although Ribera never returned to Spain, many of his paintings were brought back by returning members of the Spanish governing

He was said to have been in serious financial difficulties when he died in 1652.

# REF. L. O. C.

I have a bad relationship with my husband, because I want to separate and he does not. Two weeks ago, during one of our usual arguments, he shoved me and I fell to the floor. Although I wasn't injured, I reported him to the police for ill-treatment. However, now he has accepted my decision to separate and we

have agreed that if I withdraw the complaint he will go back to the UK and I could stay in Spain with our son and keep the property. What procedure do I have to follow in order to withdraw the complaint?

Theoretically, it is not possible to withdraw it. Once someone has been reported for an offence, the judge and the prosecutor are obliged to determine the veracity of the complaint, and if the facts are confirmed. to punish the aggressor. However, if the facts have not been serious, you can decide not to appear at court the day of the hearing, which can lead to the file of the case with no further action.

# REF. E. T. A.

I live in a tower block. One of the neighbours is an aggressive person, who tries to have confrontations with the rest of the owners for no reason whatsoever. This person also

breaches co-habitation rules, playing loud music even in the small hours, damaging the entrance to the building... I am trying to sell my property, and last time, when the buyers saw the behaviour of the neighbour, they lost interest. Is there anything that can be done against this neighbour who damages the image of the building and does not respect the rights of the other owners?

Yes, there is indeed. The Horizontal Property Law considers that for extreme situations, if the neighbours decide so in a meeting, they can expel these owners for a certain period of time, although a judge would have to decide the exact duration of that period. It is necessary to take legal action at court, where the conflictive owner will be entitled to allege what he considers appropriate and to defend himself. The judge will decide if it is necessary to expel him or not.



# A fragrant winter 'gardenia'

Luculia is an evergreen shrub or small tree native to the Himalayas; it has very seet smelling starry flowers and foliage that takes on a reddish tinge in the winter

#### ::DENISE BUSH

Luculia is a genus with just five species. It is an evergreen shrub or small tree native to the Himalavas in China, Nepal, India and Bhutan. It is a member of the Rubiaceae family which includes

gardenia, hamelia and coffee.

Luculia can reach six metres in height in optimum growing conditions which are: dappled shade, mildly acidic soil with lots of organic material, and a regular supply of wa-

ter. In gardens they are unlikely to reach over three metres. Like gardenias, they are tem-

peramental and hard to establish. but their perfume in midwinter and their attractive red-tinted

foliage make Luculia well worth the effort.

> The two most common species available are L. gratissima (from the Latin meaning 'very pleasing', and L. grandiflora which as its name suggests, has

bigger flowers. L. gratissima has large umbels at the ends of the branches packed with fragrant, pink, tubular flowers. L. grandiflora has umbels of large white blooms and glossy leaves 20-35cm long with red veining. The leaves of all the species tend to turn reddish during cold weather.

Although Luculia does best planted in a border, it can also be grown in a large tub.

The roots are shallow and must be kept cool in summer so a thick mulch or layer of pebbles is advisable. They do not like root disturbance and will often not survive being transplanted. Luculias are not resistant to drought or frost.

The flowers form at the ends of new wood so pruning, which is necessary to keep the shrub compact, is best carried out straight after flowering has fin-

Propagation is by seed or by hardwood cuttings.

# **GETTING AN ALOE TO FLOWER**

There are over 400 species in the Aloe family with Aloe Vera probably being the most well known. They are easy to care for and have stunning flowers. However only mature plants (at least four years old) will bloom, and although they will tolerate a degree of neglect, they must have plenty of bright sunlight, moisture and free draining soil.

# Fascinating facts about the Fabaceae family

Fabaceae is commonly called the pea / bean family. It is the third biggest plant family after Orchidaceae (orchids) and Asteraceae (daisies) with approximately 700 genera and 18,000 species. There are three sub families within Fabaceae, Papilionaceae, Casalpinaceae (the cassias) and Alimosaceae (the acacias) The flowers of the species are constructed the same, although in differing proportions. There is one large upper petal (banner) behind two smaller petals (wings) and the lower petal (keel) are fused together. The fruit is also the same across the genera, a narrow pod, opening at the sides, with the seeds in a row inside. Another characteristic that Fabaceae share is their nitrogen fixing properties. They have a fibrous tap root with nodules in which nitrogen fixing bacteria (Rhizobia) live.

An interesting fact about this family is that they are all edible or barely edible. All contain levels of a poisonous alkaloid that inhibits an enzyme necessary for mammals' metabolism. This poison is in the whole plant but especially in the seed coat. Excessive consumption of the seemingly harmless garden pea for example could cause depression and nervous dis-



# It's hard to think of anything good about January in England

ne of the best of the many surprises that awaited me many years ago when I moved, without real rhyme or reason and no plan at all, to southern Spain was January.

First of all I couldn't believe the brightness and blueness of the sky and the warmth of the days. I took endless photos of my flipflopped feet in the sand while I enjoyed a cold beer by the sea. In winter! Then I wondered what the lovely clouds of creamy white and pink petals drifting in the breeze were. I'd never seen almond blossom before. And just as the new year began so the season of saints' days started. First was San Hilario in Comares, where the patron saint is carried down some of the steepest streets in Andalucía followed by San Sebastián in Benamargosa - perhaps my favourite fiesta of all, with the heady scent of local oranges and the neighbours rushing out of their houses carrying trays laden with sweets and the alarmingly rickety Catherine wheels shooting out fiery sparks at every junction. His last appearance was last spring in the Old Time Music Hall where he was an excellent chairman. The theatre's Facebook pages have been full of affectionate tributes to a man who loved both Fuengirola and the Salon Varietés Theatre. He is going to be missed by so many people.

# GPs and hospitals are overwhelmed by patients with flu and colds at present

The regional government's health service activated a special plan on 1 December to cope with the situation

MALAGA. So many people are suffering from colds and flu viruses in Malaga at present that it is putting pressure on health centres and hospital emergency services. Doctors say they are overwhelmed by the sheer numbers of patients with respiratory problems. "I have seen more than 100 patients in one day, between normal appointments and those who need to be seen immediately," one GP told us this week.

Another GP said there is currently a full flu epidemic, and in addition many people have catarrh, pharyngitis, colds, bronchitis, pneumonia etc. As a result, there are delays in getting appointments and a considerable increase in the number of people who go to emergency departments instead

In the first week of 2018 there were 79.67 cases of flu per 100,000 inhabitants in Malaga province; this was

lower than the 102.37 in the last week of 2017. In Andalucía, 162.56 cases were registered per 100,000 inhabitants between 1 and 7 January, and 188.19 from 25 to 31 December.

"There is more flu than it would appear from the official statistics," said one GP, because the procedure to register a case of flu is complex and involves filling in a great deal of information on the computer. Instead, doctors sometimes say a patient is suffering from a viral infection instead of flu, because they don't want to lose time when so many other patients are waiting to be seen.

Another GP said that, because they are allocated so little time to attend to patients in their surgeries, and because of a lack of reliable methods, it is often not clear whether someone has flu, severe catarrh, early pneumonia or a respiratory infection. "The only thing we can say is that at this

time of year there is a considerable increase in respiratory problems," he explained.

Another factor is that the flu this season is intense and presents a variety of symptoms: high temperature, shivering, aches and pains, dry and persistent cough, headache etc.

The regional government activated a special plan on 1 December to deal with the problem, and it is supposed to mean that extra staff are taken on at hospital emergency departments and health centres, but professionals working for the Andalusian health service say that they were extremely short-staffed over Christmas. "Last Friday there were only four of us on duty instead of ten," said one GP who works in Malaga city.

The plan monitors several parameters: the increase in patients attending hospital emergency departments, health centres and observation rooms, the increase in the number of people admitted to hospital and those requesting home visits from GPs. The information is then compared on a weekly basis, and the appropriate measures are put into effect. However, the Andalusian forum for GP treatment (FoAAP) and the Basta Ya Malaga association have published a statement expressing their concern over the situation faced by doctors over Christmas and the New Year.

The patients who mostly go to emergency departments at this time of year are generally suffering from chronic health problems, especially those which are complicated by the cold weather and viruses.

# Andalucía to bring in new law aimed at reducing obesity

Restaurants will have to provide healthy options and free drinking water whie an exercise programme will be introduced in schools

**SEVILLE.** The Andalusian government has approved a bill that makes the region the first to have legal measures in place to fight obesity. The official name of this new law is the 'Ley para la Promoción de una Vida Saludable y una Alimentación Equilibrada' (The Law to Promote a Healthy Lifestyle and a Balanced Diet), and it will include plans to extend antiobesity measures to town halls and integrate them into existing meas-

Obesity affects 16.6 per cent of the adult population in Andalucía and 23 per cent of the child population, as the regional health minister, Marina Álvarez, explained on Tuesday at a press conference. This law especially targets young people, pregnant women, 15.2 per cent of whom are obese, old people and disadvantaged social groups.

When the bill becomes active, many establishments will be forced to offer drinking water free of charge. The installation of drink-

ing fountains in schools, public places and children's play centres will be a legal requirement. The new regulations require vending machine manufacturers to include free water in their products. In addition, bars and restaurants will have to provide complimentary jugs of drinking water to all customers.

Within two years, schools must establish a timetable which includes a recommended minimum of five hours of exercise per week. Additionally, a set of rules to discourage the consumption of high calorie foods and soft drinks among children under 15 will be laid out.

Under the restrictions, it will become illegal to sell food containing over 200 kilocalories and secondary schools will be required to display the calorie content of foods

in vending machines and canteens.
The new law plans to include initiatives for the distribution of fruits and vegetables and the planting of vegetable gardens in schools, starting with the areas with most social deprivation.

The bill includes clauses which require restaurants to offer multiple portion sizes and have healthy options on the menu. Nutritional values of all foods sold commercially will have to be displayed to allow for comparison of products within the same brand and between different brands.

As well as the new nutrition laws, laws to promote a healthy lifestyle will be implemented. In companies of over 50 employees, bicycle parking will have to be installed.

The government plans to create a programme to promote exercise and healthy eating in Andalucía and is considering imposing fines to encourage people to follow the

# Eating fish every week improves children's cognitive performance, according to study

The research, conducted in the United States, also revealed links between the weekly consumption of fish and better sleep

MADRID. A team from the University of Pennsylvania's School of Nursing published a study this week which has proved that the weekly consumption of fish is linked to having a higher IQ. Children who eat fish every week have an IQ that is four points higher, on average, than those who consume fish infrequently or not at all. The study revealed that eating fish improves sleep which leads to higher mental capacities.

Previous studies clarified the link between the consumption of omega-3, the fatty acid found in many types of fish, and a higher IQ. as well as links between omega-3 and better sleep. However, this is the first study that has discovered that all of these links are connected.

For the study, a group of 541 children in China, aged nine to eleven, were asked how often they

ate fish. The options ranged from "never", to "at least once a week". These children, 54 per cent of whom were boys and 46 per cent girls, were then assessed via the Chinese version of an IQ test called the Wechsler Intelligence Scale for

Children-Revised, which examines non-verbal skills such as vocabulary and coding. The parents of the assessed children answered questions about their children's sleeping habits, including how long they sleep for, and frequency of waking and daytime tiredness. The researchers took into account parents' occupation and marital status, and number of children in the home.

Analysing all of the data, the team found that the children who said that they ate fish weekly scored 4.8 points higher in the IQ test than the children who said they "seldom" or "never" ate fish. Those who "sometimes" consumed fish scored 3.3 points higher. Additionally, increased fish consumption was associated with fewer disturbances of sleep, which indicates better sleep overall.

"Lack of sleep is associated with antisocial behavior; poor cognition is associated with antisocial behavior," said Professor Adrian Raine. 'We have found that omega-3 supplements reduce antisocial behavior, so it's not too surprising that fish is behind this."

Jennifer Pinto-Martin, member of the research team, stressed the importance of children being introduced to fish as part of their regular diet from a young age, from around two years old. "Fish consumption has really positive health benefits and should be something more heavily advertised and promoted," she said. Pinto-Martin pointed out that if children are fed fish early on then they get used to the smell and taste, which children can find unpleasant if unaccustomed to it.

Further developments on this research would involve looking into the types of fish consumed, and whether this affects IQ and quality of sleep. This study would be done on an older test group as they are likely to have a greater variety of fish included in their diet. The team also want to find out what other positive effects fish may have on school performance and social abilities.

Families in Malaga, due to the province's being on the coast, tend to consume a diet that is high in fish. According to this study, eating fish once a week is considered "high consumption". For children whose diets are low in omega-3, the research team highly recommends incrementally incorporating more fish into a

"Doing that could be a lot easier than nudging children about going to bed," Raine commented. "If the fish improves sleep, great. If it also improves cognitive performance, like we've seen here, even better. It's a double hit.'



# One in six people will have a stroke, but 80% of them could be prevented

**Experts in Marbella** recommend that all highrisk patients undergo an ultrasound to avoid having a cerebrovascular accident

MADRID. One in every six people will suffer a stroke, but approximately 80 per cent of these cases can be prevented, according to the director of the Angiology and Vascular Surgery department of the Quirónsalud Marbella hospital and Quirónsalud clinic in Gibraltar, Rubén Rodríguez Carvajal.

"It is very important that the

high-risk patients (those with high blood pressure, high cholesterol or diabetes) rule out the possibility of having a cerebrovascular accident by having an ultrasound," the expert explained.

The condition, which affects 15 million people in the world every year, happens one in three times because of an obstruction in the carotid artery. There are three types of treatment for a stroke. Of these Doctor Rodríguez Carvajal singles out the Transcarotid Artery Revascularisation procedure (TCAR) due to "having more advantages than the other two. It is the safest and newest technique of treatment for this condition".

According to the specialist, the

TCAR is a clinically proven alternative to invasive open surgery, the normal treatment for a stroke, and safer than transfemoral stenting. The procedure, which can be done with a local anaesthetic, involves a small incision just above the collar bone. The surgeon inserts a tube directly into the carotid artery and connects it to a system which temporarily directs the blood flow away from the brain to protect from the dangerous deposits which can be released from the artery walls.

"This method of protecting the

Below are the most common symptoms of a stroke. If you suspect that someone is having a stroke because they are displaying one or more of these symptoms, do not hesitate in calling for an ambulance. Catching the stroke early is the best way to ensure survival and avoid serious long-term consequences.

Sudden confusion, trouble speaking or understanding speech. Speaking may become slurred or difficult to understand. Ask the person to repeat a simple sentence after you to check this.

Sudden severe and irregular headache with no known



Sudden trouble walking, falling over, dizziness, loss of balance or coordination, and confusion.

Sensation of tingling in face, arm or leg, especially down one side, which comes on

Memory loss and behav-Memory rossioural changes.

Any change in vision which 6 could be sudden loss of sight, whether partial or severe in one or both eye, and involuntary eye movements.

Sudden numbness or weakness of face, arm or leg, especially on one side of the body. This may cause face drooping. Ask the person to raise both arms and see if one drifts downwards. Ask the person to smile and see if their smile is lopsided or uneven.

Donors of bone marrow in Malaga province increased by 300 per cent more than the targets which had been set for 2017

MALAGA. Pablo Ráez's message is still having an effect and the number of new bone marrow donors who registered in Malaga province last year was 300 per cent higher than

Pablo, a young man from Marbella who died of leukaemia in February last year, inspired numerous people to join his campaign for bone marrow donors, and his story went viral on social media.

Andalucía now has more bone

marrow donors than any other region of Spain, says Isidro Prat, the director of the Regional Blood Transfusion Centre (CRTS), which registers and manages these donations in Andalucía.

By the end of November last year, 19,079 people in the region had registered as donors, and the number had risen to over 20,000 by the end of the year. In Malaga there were about 2,700 new donors (2,589 at the end of November). The original aim had been to reach 861. For Andalucía as a whole, the target was 4,463 donors.

Although these figures were lower than those of 2016, in Andalucía and in Malaga, they are still "spectacular, fabulous," and all

thanks to Pablo Ráez, says Isidro Prat. In 2016, Andalucía had 33,951 donors in total, of whom 11,201 lived in Malaga.

Anyone who is interested in becoming a bone marrow donor has to be between the ages of 18 and 55, healthy, and undergo a blood test. Experts say the ideal donor is young, between 18 and the early 30s, because at that age there is more chance of them proving compatible with a patient who needs a transplant.

# Altruism

The altruistic act of donating bone marrow offers people with leukaemia, tumours and other blood diseases the chance to have the transplant they need. The donors' details are on a register and if they are compatible with a patient they are phoned and asked to come to the hospital so that the bone marrow can be extracted. If they are happy to go ahead, they are given a blood test and asked to sign a consent form in the presence of a witness and a doctor, or two witnesses if the communication is by telephone.

The worldwide register of bone marrow donors offers a 90 per cent chance that the patients who need a transplant will be able to have one. The important factor is that the donor and recipient are compatible. The average time from the start of the process until a bone marrow implant takes place is about three months.

There are two ways of extracting the bone marrow. The first involves removing it via an injection in the hip, which is done in a sterile operating theatre. The other way is through the peripheral blood: the donor is given a treatment to stimulate the production of their bone marrow, a method known as apheresis, to obtain the cells which are produced. The extraction normally takes place the following day. The donor can go home once the apheresis is finished.

In Malaga province, the donations take place at the Carlos Haya regional hospital. The product extracted from the donor is analysed, preserved and sent to the hospital where the patient who needs the transplant is waiting. The whole process is extremely well coordinated, says Dr Prat.

# **Gastronomic trends for 2018**

# Food trends, like fashion, change regularly and the search is always on for new flavours

Innovations for 2018 include reducing waste and eating fruit and vegetable skins

MALAGA. It is sometimes difficult to keep up with the constant arrival of novelties on the gastronomic scene due to the speed at which they appear. In the last few years, the diversification in dietary styles has seen these innovations multiply and they are coming from all sides.

It is likely that 2018 will be marked by the concept of 'food on demand' that Ferrán Adriá anticipated - ingredients that seek to satisfy an informed public, eager for healthy foods and traceability, but also low in calories. And in catering, innovations are moving more and more towards themed premises that break away from classic offerings and are directed at a very specific public. The menu is varied. Sit down and take note.

## **Traceable foods**

Transparency in labelling and knowing exactly what the food we buy is composed of, is not a new idea, but now the consumer also wants to know in detail where it comes from and how it is produced. Twenty-nine per cent of all new food launches already use the origin to add prestige to their product, especially if it is locally pro-

duced. Local products are fashionable, and if it isn't local, then it must have other values such as sustainability or ethical production.

## 'Trashcooking'

We live in a world with limited natural resources and sustainability means reducing food waste. The skins of fruits and vegetables are also food, and in the US, supermarkets are already stocking products such as pickled watermelon rinds or pestos made with the stems of herbs. The good thing about these ideas is that they can also be adopted at home.

# **Vegetarian diet**

The growing percentage of consumers who have a diet almost exclusively of plant products, are forcing catering establishments to modify their menus, including options to satisfy these clients. The data shows that soon, vegetables will represent 80 per cent of the gastronomic offering.

# Vegetable protein

The aspiration to have a healthier diet which at the same time is more respectful to the environment leads to new foods such as 'meat' made from vegetable proteins. Pulses, grains and nuts already feature in the ingredients of burgers, sausages and cutlets, improving the flavour and texture.



## **Vegan desserts**

Irresistible to many, desserts have also seen changes to consumer habits. Vegan sweets, made without animal products, are the latest innovation and use vegetable milks, substituting coconut oil for butter and flax seed for eggs.

# 'Healthy' drinks

The big beverage manufacturers are reducing the sugar content in their products notably, far exceeding the conventional 'light', 'diet' or 'zero' labels. The increase will be in production of water-based, fruity, sparkling drinks.

# **Emotional benefits**

Just a few years ago we were looking for energy drinks and products that helped us

to get through a tough day. Now the aim is to maintain balance and emotional peace, benefits that are promoted by products such as chewing-gum with plant extracts, vitamin shakes or drinks made with tea and other natural ingredients that promise to reduce stress and anxiety.

## **Powdered superfoods**


Superfoods are back in powdered form and can be incorporated easily into smoothies, soups, biscuits and nutritional bars. Matcha tea, maca root, cocoa, spirulina, kale and collagen come in the form of powders with the aim of becoming part of our everyday diet. From now on, incorporating extra vitamins and minerals to meals is going to be a much easier task.

## **Fouth meal**

No, we're not talking about brunch but a healthy snack that we can consume just before or after daily exercise, snatching a moment of peace in a frenetic lifestyle.

## **Floral flavours**

Flowers have made their mark on haute cuisine as decorative elements in recent years, but aromatic flowers such as rose, jasmine and lavender have been used since ancient times to add aroma and flavour. In 2018, the rose, lavender and hibiscus flower


#### Not just sushi and ramen

eaving a Malaga restaurant the other day, the owner bade me farewell with the words, "Don't forget to write something nice on TripAdvisor." Apparently the going rate for a fake review on the world's most influential online restaurant reviewer is around 12 euros. Oobah Butler, after years of making a living in this way, decided to conduct an experiment to resolve the matter once and for all. He set up a nonexistent restaurant that would climb up the TripAdvisor rankings using invented reports and appraisals. The Shed, Dulwich opened in his Dulwich semi; it had a mobile



phone number, a website and a dinner-by-appointment-only policy. Shortly after the 'inauguration' in 2016 its ranking was 18,149, unsurprising considering there were no reviews posted, but in weeks it rose to 1,456 thanks to stunning feedback orchestrated by Butler from friends and contacts. Nine weeks later it got to 156th place, and the snowball effect was such that in one week there were 116 attempts to make bookings via the website and the phone's answering service, plus numerous requests for employment and contacts by hopeful suppliers. All were ignored. One day its TripAdvisor listing had 18,000 views and it had still not served a single meal to anyone. In November 2017, six months after 'opening', The Shed achieved top

placing. TripAdvisor phoned with congratulations. TripAdvisor would later comment that its anti-fraud system is designed to avoid fictitious postings of existing restaurants, rather than those of inexistent ones. Work that one out if you can. However the case is well-documented and although only accessible in archived rather than current form, http://archive.is/coW0I shows TripAdvisor's page when The Shed was at the 263 spot (out of a possible 18,188 at the time). Eventually THE SHED did begin to serve meals, mainly based on tarted-up fast food, but still the enthusiastic reviews kept coming in.

## AROUND MALAGA

## The natural beauty of the Serranía de Ronda

#### **JAVIER ALMELLONES**

The Guadiaro, like other important rivers, has for many vears served as a natural boundary between territories. This is exactly what happens in its journey down through the valley that bears its name, from Benaoián to Cortes de la Frontera, which marks the border between the Serrania de Ronda and the province of Cadiz.

The valley alternates between open areas with verdant forests and impressive mountain ranges which tower over the valley, from which visitors can see the Cañón de las Buitreras, a canyon which has been designated an Andalusian Natural Monument.

This varied landscape serves to create a collection of towns with a common heritage, including Cortes de la Frontera, Jimera de Líbar, Montejaque and Benaoján.

That said, there are other towns in the area surrounding Ronda which also offer a harmony between nature and historical legacy. Arriate is a town with unique traditions, situated a stone's throw from Ronda.

It's also easy to visit Montecorto, gateway to the Sierra de Grazalema national park, which has recently been added to the list of municipalities in the the province of Malaga.

Prehistory. This village in the Guadiaro valley boasts a grand history centred around its two caves, La Pileta and El Gato. The first is known as the 'Altamira of Andalucía', because of its cave paintings, while the other, which once served as a shelter for the first settlers of the area, has now been declared an Andalusian Natural Monument. This tranquil mountain village is also known for the quality of its cold meats.

Benaoján

What to see: The El Gato and La Pileta caves and the Nacimiento de Benaoján spring.



#### Montejaque


Refuge. Known by the Arabs as Monte-Xaquez ('sacred mountain'), this town is set on one of the slopes of the Juan Diego mountain range and is connected to the settlement known as the Llanos de Líbar by a wellmaintained path. Near the mountain is the El Hundidero cave. The most picturesque part of the town is certainly the old town, which hosts both the Iglesia de Santiago El Mayor and the town's Speleology

What to see: The Hundidero caves, the Llanos de Líbar and the church of Santiago



#### Jimera de Líbar

Riverbank. Although much of the town is built on a hillside, there is also a pleasant neighbourhood that grew up to serve the railway running alongside the Guadiaro river. The Jimera station is well connected to that of Benaoján with a walking route, part of the Gran Senda of Malaga. In the town, as well as its historical buildings, visitors can see the church of Rosario, while in Estación vou can find the shrine of the la Virgen de la Salud. What to see: The Iglesia del Rosario, the shrine of the Virgen de la Salud and the Guadiaro river.



#### Cortes de la Frontera


Nature. This municipality, the only one in the Malaga section of the Alcornocales nature park, surprises a lot of visitors with its rich architectural heritage. In the centre, you can see buildings of interest, such as the town hall, with its neoclassical style, the Nuestra Señora del Rosario church and the chapel of Valdenebros. It is also worth seeing the bullring, though built much later (in the 19th century). In the centre there is also a visitor centre for the nature park. **What to see:** Town hall. Casa de Piedra, the Alcornocales nature park and Las Buitreras canyon.



#### **Arriate**

**Tradition.** Set in the valley of the Guadalcobacín river, tributary of the Guadiaro, and surrounded by the boundary for Ronda, this town is one of the gateways to the Serranía. The surrounding countryside is full of pleasant surprises, such as the Arroyo de la Ventilla brook. As well as the many wineries in and around the town. Arriate is made more attractive by its many unique traditions, such as its Holv Week celebrations.


What to see: The Arrovo de la Ventilla, the church of San Juan de Letrán and the La Estacá viewpoint.




#### **Montecorto**

## TWO DAYS IN VALLE DE LOS PEDROCHES

Car + walking

**Journey time:** Three hours from Malaga to Villanueva de Córdoba. Events: four hours. Cultural visits and routes: six hours.

ocated in the north of Cordoba province, the district of the Valle de los Pedroches has preserved the tradition of slaughtering Iberian pigs through a number of fiestas and events which take place especially during the winter months.

Before the end of January, in one of the towns in this valley, the Cerdo Ibérico tapas route will take place. Specifically, it will be the bars and restaurants of Villanueva de Córdoba that host the event between the 26th and 28th of this month. More than twenty establishments will take part and showcase the versatility of the area's cuisine.

We will have to wait a further month for another gastronomic event in this town with a pork flavour; the Fiesta de la Matanza in which visitors can witness first hand an ancient tradition, with tastings included.

These and a number of other festivals in the Valle de los Pedroches show just how important Iberian pork is here. In fact, during practically any time of the year, a culinary route is scheduled across the establishments of the area.

In them, the food is typically wholesome with dishes such as

homemade 'flamenquines' (slices of jamón serrano wrapped in pieces of pork loin, coated with egg and bread-crumbs and then deep-fried), 'lechón ibérico frito' (fried suckling pig), pork cheeks in sauce, oven-baked ham or 'migas' (breadcrumbs) with bacon rashers. Of course, none of these dishes would be complete without the accompanying jamón, cold cuts or 'lomo de orza' (fresh loin, fried on a very slow heat in its own fat).

However, not all food found in the 17 towns in the valley is derived from its prized Iberian pork. The range of meats is very broad and includes beef, lamb and game meat such as venison and wild boar.

What's more, there is a plethora of other dishes, which in the past people turned to for sustenance, that have now become specialities such as 'cachorreñas' (a soup made from bread soaked in hot water, garlic, paprika, salt and vinegar), 'ajohuevo', rice with hare, 'sopa dorada' or 'la olla de Carnaval' (a selection of meats with chickpeas), among others.

Among the towns in the Valle de los Pedroches, are Cardeña, Conquista, Villanueva de Córdoba, Pedroche, Belálcazar, Pozoblanco and Hinojosa del Duque.

## Míchel out of ideas as Malaga's slide to Segunda continues

MALAGA. The new year has not brought a change of fortunes. Malaga were just as limp and lifeless as they were a little over a fortnight ago when Espanyol visited La Rosaleda on Monday night. The visitors, who until now hadn't won on the road, picked up their first win away from Catalonia, courtesy of Malaga old boy Sergi Darder. His first-half goal was enough to see off the Blue and Whites who dominated the subsequent possession albeit without ever looking likely to score.

Despite throwing on Borja Bastón, Javi Ontiveros and later Juanpi, only a weak header from En-Nesyri - with almost half an hour still on the clock - came remotely near to finding the equaliser.

With the club's unhalting slide towards Segunda, fans once more turned on Michel, calling for his dismissal, with owner Sheikh Abdullah Al-Thani, absent once again, also subjected to chants of "¡vete ya!".

Diego González was in tears at the full-time whistle while his teammates picked fights with the opposition players. Now rock bottom of the table, five points from safety, tensions are evidently running high after the brief optimism generated by the winter break quickly dissipated and the realisation has set in that, without drastic change, the club is in deep trouble.

## Blue and Whites move fast to bring in further reinforcements

Attackers Alberto Bueno and Riki Centurión are on the way in while exits for Paul Baysse and Jony have been agreed

MALAGA. Following the side's crippling 1-0 loss to Espanyol on Monday, Malaga have moved fast in the transfer market to reinforce in attacking areas. While it looked like it was going to be a month of frustration when Alberto Bueno's transfer was held up by owner Sheikh's Al-Thani's inaction, the forward was officially presented as a Malaga player on Tuesday and will soon be followed through the door by winger Riki Centurión.

Bueno joins until the end of the season on a loan deal from FC Porto after having his loan spell with La

Liga rivals Leganés cut short.

The deal had been in place since at least Friday and the player passed a medical and even trained with the first-team, all while awaiting Al-Thani's thumbs up.

The player, 30 in March, is Malaga's third winter signing, after Spanish defender Ignasi Miquel joined from Lugo and Argentinian defensive midfielder Manuel Iturra made his return to the club after a spell in Mexico.

A versatile player, Bueno is happy to play in most attacking positions, but excels as a second striker. He was an integral part of the U-19 national side that were European champions in 2006 and was joint-top goalscorer in the tournament with five goals.

Bueno represented Real Madrid, Valladolid and Rayo Vallecano before his move to Porto in 2015 but after only making four appearances, returned to Spain on loan with Granada and Leganés.

The forward is soon to be joined in

the squad by winger Riki Centurión who has agreed a loan deal until the end of the season to move from Italian side Genoa despite interest in taking him back to his native Argentina.

Despite being just 24, former São Paulo and Boca Juniors man Centurión arrives with a lot of baggage. A picture of him holding a shotgun emerged during investigations into a domestic violence complaint made against him by an ex-girlfriend in Argentina. Centurión also made headlines when nude photos of him went viral and which saw his club's ultras turn on him.

His signing is imminent, after the club made space in the squad by offloading defender Paul Baysse, for whom an offer of a little under a million euros from Girondins de Bordeaux was accepted, and winger Jony who has returned to Sporting Gijón on loan.

## The 150-million-euro question

**Many see Philippe** Coutinho as Andrés Iniesta's successor. but there's life in the old dog yet. So where does he fit in?

So it's all signed and sealed but the big questions is: "Would Philippe Coutinho make it into Barcelona's current best eleven?

An outrageous question when the Liga leaders have just broken the Spanish and indeed Premier League record to bring the Liverpool midfielder to Spain. He's clearly a star for the future, potentially world-class but isn't necessarily an automatic choice upon arrival.

A few so-called experts suggested that he's here to replace Andrés Iniesta, which is probably correct in the long-term but not the immediate. One of the foot-

ball intelligentsia claimed that Iniesta is no longer as influential. I suspect he doesn't watch every

Iniesta is still the orchestrator, the man who sets the rhythm and

fine tunes the younger players around him. Ernesto Valverde seems to have a pact that Iniesta will start virtually every game but won't finish them. A quick check suggests that the 77th minute is as long as the coach will push him. He's only been asked to play for 90 minutes once, against Malaga. So, Iniesta isn't budging and he

probably has Xavi's club appearance record in his sights.

The other easy target is Ivan Rakitić who is undervalued by so many, but not the manager. The Croatian has played more minutes than any other outfielder apart from Lionel Messi.

The test will be when Barcelona have to pick their very best side. For me there is one place up for grabs alongside Messi and Luis Suárez. When it came to the Clásico, the honour was given to Paulinho. Presently, it would be between the Brazilian and Ousmane Dembélé who is finally fit again.

Coutinho will have to recover from injury before he can stake a claim. It would make sense for the 150-million-euro signing to play the Liga matches and allow Iniesta, Rakitic and Paulinho a chance to rest and rotate with the emphasis on peaking in the Champions League (where Countinho is ineligible to play).

Examination weekend will be in May when Barcelona face Real Madrid again and Valverde will select his preferred eleven from his full squad. Until then, Coutinho will be learning the ropes.

#### The beast unleashed

The biggest challengers appear to be Atlético Madrid who finally unleashed Diego Costa back into the wilds of La Liga last week. He didn't disappoint.

## Hoping for a long-awaited medal

## Snowboarder Regino Hernández will be competing in his third Olympic Games in February





"These Games haven't taken me by surprise; we are prepared and, being realists, we know we are good enough to win a medal," he says

FUENGIROLA. It seems that not even coming second in the world championships, a decade competing with the international elite and three Winter Olympics by the age of 26 are enough for fans to stop Regino Hernández in the street and ask for a photo. Many people would love that to happen to them and would boast, but Regino doesn't care. He only likes to attract attention when he is on his snowboard.

This 'rider', who was born in Ceuta but has lived in Mijas Costa since he was one year old, has been selected to take part in the Winter Olympics in Pyongyang (South Korea) in February. This will make him one of the athletes from Malaga province who has participated the most in this major sporting event, behind only swimmer María Peláez (who has competed five times) and yachtsman Félix Gancedo (four). Regino is also the youngest man ever to achieve this historic triple record.

He remembers his first Olympic event as if it were yesterday (it was in Vancouver, in 2010). He was 17 years old and the youngest member of the Spanish team. "I didn't know what was happening. I made my debut in the World Cup the previous year, and all of a sudden I was going to the Olympics. I hadn't been fighting to get there," he recalls.

Now, nearly eight years later, he will be the second most senior (in terms of Games experience) member of the Spanish team in South Korea and is 11th in the world ranking.

It is a small team of just eight competitors, but they stand a good chance of winning a medal, especially Regino Hernández. "These Games haven't taken me by surprise. We are prepared and being realists, we know we are good enough to win a medal," he says.

Travelling with him will be his companions in the snowboard team, Laro Herrero and Lucas Eguíbar. A few days ago Regino shared first place with Eguíbar at the World Cup in Montafon (Austria), and they both shared the same trainer, Israel Planas.

"Israel died just after the World Championships. He had a stroke. He was only 41. He is one of the people I plan to dedicate my medal to," says Regino. Unfortunately, this was not the only loss he has suffered in a short time. The death of one of his childhood friends, Ángel Moreno, has changed his life.

"We became friends in Fuengirola when we were five years old... he died two years ago now, in the Sierra Nevada, snowboarding, and apart from my parents and my family circle, he was the person who gave me the most support," he says.

'Our parents were friends, we used to play handball together when we were little, we went to the same school... I was with him the day before, here in Fuengirola, and then he went to Granada. When it happened, they rang me to tell me they couldn't find him and we went there to see what was going on," he says.

The bad news was confirmed shortly after that phone call, and the details began to appear in the media. The body of his friend, who was 24 at the time, was found around seven hours after he accidentally ran off the piste.

"Nobody saw him, nobody realised what had happened, because he was the last one in the group and it wasn't until they reached the bottom that everyone started to wonder where he was," he says. It is something which will mark him forever, "I've changed my way of looking at life. Seeing the courage a family can have after losing a son, how they fight to carry on ... it makes you think 'Why should I worry about stupid things every day?' We get depressed over nothing, while far worse things are happening to other people."

#### A risky sport


Time passes for everyone and Regino has had to learn to overcome difficulties and move onward in a sport in which he knows that the slightest mistake could have serious consequences.

"I've broken my knee twice, both shoulders... this is a risky sport and it is all part of it. We know that we will be injured at some time," he says, with the calm which comes from experience. Now he has also injured his wrist, during a training session for the World Cup in Italy, although it has not stopped him competing and completing his busy schedule.

"We never stop. We're always travelling. We have just done trials in France, Austria and Italy, and this month we will be in Turkey and Russia, and then it is the Olympics in February," he explains. He has been competing with the international elite in this sport for the past ten years.

Ever since he stopped playing handball, which was his first passion, and experienced the snow when he was four years old, he decided that snowboarding was what he wanted to do. He has numerous stories to tell about how he has come this far, although it is still difficult to make a living from his sport.

"It's difficult. We are given grants, but those depend on results. Also, this year the grant depends exclusively on the Games. If you have a bad day, you can lose your grant. There is everything to play for," he explains. So there is no lack of motive for Regino Hernández to try to win an Olympic medal. He has been trying to do so for several long years, and has shed blood, sweat and tears. If he wins this time he knows he will not be alone. Two of his closest friends will be cheering him from above.

## Contemporary dance finds a home on the Costa

## The Wennare Company has taken up residence at the Felipe VI theatre in Estepona

**ESTEPONA.** Having a resident dance company is an honour associated with concert halls in major European capitals. However, Estepona can now be added to this prestigious list, as the Auditorio Felipe VI takes in the Wennare Dance Company as permanent residents.

The troop is currently made up of five experienced dancers from Spain, France and Georgia under the direction of choreographer and dancer Yuri Gudushauri, who has experience in both classical and contemporary dance.

Veronika Ulkina, director of the company, said that "it is difficult to manage a company without the use of your own space" and she thanked Estepona town hall for allowing them to use part of the theatre.

Ulkina considers Estepona, and the Costa del Sol, a great place to find spectators. "There is no language or cultural barriers in contemporary dance, it is pure expression and anyone can understand and enjoy it,' she explained.

The choreographer, who trained in the Bolshoi Ballet Academy in Moscow, never dreamed of starting a

dance company, mainly because of the space problem. "Now we have a theatre to use and a technical team to work with," he said.

Estrella Martín is one of the dancers in the Wennare Dance Company. She trained in New York and Japan The company is formed by five dancers from Spain, France and Georgia who will be taking their show on tour

and considers the Auditorio Felipe VI to be an ideal location for them, partly due to its big stage. "It's a privilege for us to be able to use this theatre because it is very difficult to find somewhere to carry out our entire work process, and not just put on one


show," she said.

As well as the creation and production of shows, having a home means that the company can also offer classes.

Over 60 students, aged between four and 17, make up the school. Gudushauri stressed that this is the only place where children can learn the 'Vaganova' technique of Russian ballet, which is not offered by any other academy or conservatory, but is used by international ballet dancers. The technique comprises of a series of movements derived from the teaching methods from the old Imperial Ballet School in Russia, which emphasises the lines formed with movement of the human body. Currently, the school offers three grants for children from Estepona.

The company made its debut with the successful performance of their first show 'EGO', which they will now be taking on a ten-date tour of Spain, rehearsing back in Estepona between shows. Then, from 1 May they will start preparing a new show.

The Felipe IV theatre, which seats 600, is also home to a variety of activities such as café-theatre, jazz and film cycles, monologue competitions, opera, book and record launches and exhibitions, as well as being home to a religious music band, a swing school and a musical theatre school.
