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

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

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# Minister reassures the Costa during Marbella visit in wake of spate of recent violent crimes

Juan Ignacio Zoido was visiting the town to announce the building of a new National Police station twice the size of the current one

**COSTA DEL SOL.** The minister of the Interior, Juan Ignacio Zoido, has reassured Costa residents that the recent spate of serious violent crimes are “just isolated incidents”. Speaking on a visit to Marbella to unveil plans for a new local headquarters for the National Police in the town, he called for people to stay calm and “not create a sense of panic”.

In the past three weeks a wave of violence has swept along the coast in six separate incidents, culminating in the latest, last Saturday, May 12, when a father was shot dead in broad daylight in San Pedro after the first communion service of his son.

The outbreak began on 30 April, with the discovery of the body of local man Francisco José López in his car in the Guadalhorce valley.

Then on 4 May, two Moroccan

men reported that they had been shot at in a bar in Fuengirola's marina and this was followed three days later by the grim discovery of a man's body dumped by the side of the A-7 near the Costa del Sol Hospital. His

wounded partner was found nearby flagging down traffic and claiming the couple had been kidnapped.

Further to this an eastern European man walked into a health centre in Fuengirola on 11 May with

gunshot wounds. After treatment he fled but was tracked down by the police shortly afterwards.

And finally, on the same day that the man in San Pedro was killed, a north African man was freed from

behind the La Cañada shopping centre in Marbella, where he had been tied up for 24 hours.

Investigators say that none of the crimes appear to be linked and are related to the settling of scores between criminal and drugs gangs.

**Gangs stealing others' drugs**

Malaga province, including the Costa del Sol, enjoyed a fall in overall crime in the first three months to the end of March this year: good news that is now threatened by May's violent outbreak. Experts say the sudden surge is due to gangs stealing each others' hauls. “Buying and bringing the drug has costs. If you steal it here it's all profit,” said an expert.

The Interior minister on his visit to Marbella said that he did not expect the tense situation between gangs and security forces in the Campo de Gibraltar and Algeciras areas, where the drugs are brought ashore from north Africa, to spread along the Costa del Sol and denied there was a security problem.

Marbella's new National Police station will be twice the size of the current one and will be built on council land near the bus station.

## “El Maradona” shot dead by San Pedro church minutes after attending child's first communion

**SAN PEDRO.** The peaceful and happy Saturday-morning routine in San Pedro was shattered last week, 12 May, with the brutal assassination of a man while he was just driving off in his car by the Virgen del Rocío parish church.

The 36-year-old, who died of his injuries, was with family members who had just attended the first communion service of his child when a man wearing a motorcycle helmet approached and shot him.

The victim was a well-known businessman nicknamed “El Ma-

radona” and sources said the death appeared to be part of a drug-related feud between rival criminal groups. In the last few months both the gym the man owned as well as a beach bar in Estepona that he part-owned had been subjected to alleged arson attacks.

# Tension rises after boy is killed in Algeciras by powerboat used in drug smuggling

The sense of insecurity in the Campo de Gibraltar area was heightened after nine Guardia Civil officers were attacked in a separate incident

**ALGECIRAS.** The feeling of insecurity felt by locals in the Campo de Gibraltar area because of the activities of gangs bringing smuggled drugs from north Africa increased this week after two separate incidents around Algeciras town.

On Monday a six-year-old boy who was out at sea fishing with his father near Getares beach died after the boat they were in was hit by a semi-rigid inflatable speedboat.

The two occupants of the faster boat were arrested and are reported to have a criminal record for drug-trafficking. Although the government stressed that there was no evidence that the speedboat was being used for that purpose on the day of the collision, it had been stopped by antidrug patrols in April when it was found laden with fuel

containers and officers believe it was supporting other smuggling boats. On that occasion officers had impounded it as the pilot wasn't carrying the correct paperwork and the owner had only recovered possession from police an hour before it was involved in this week's fatal incident. The government is currently trying to ban this type of fast boat from the area due to its use by drugs gangs.

Witnesses to the incident say the boats' occupants had got into an argument and the faster one had driven into the smaller one. While investigators said they were unclear exactly what had happened, they indicated that those in both boats had significant links to the area's illegal drugs trade and that there had been "previous arguments and scores to be settled".

## Attack on off-duty police

The death of the boy came just days after nine Guardia Civil officers were attacked with broken bottles and baseball bats, also in Algeciras. The officers were all off duty at the time and had gone out to eat in a restaurant last Saturday evening when "they came across around 40 people outside in the street waiting for them".

One of the officers shot three times into the air to break up the group and they made their way to the nearest medical centre to receive treatment for minor injuries.

By Wednesday, seven of the attackers had been detained; four of them have a police record for drug trafficking, sources said. The families of those arrested have claimed it was the officers' fault for starting the fight as

they "had left the restaurant drunk".

In reaction to these latest incidents, the Interior minister, Juan Ignacio Zoido has said there will be no let up in the fight against drug trafficking in the Campo de Gibraltar area, where the self-confidence of the gangs has increased recently. On Tuesday 400 kilos of cocaine was seized inside a single shipment at Algeciras port.

## Wanted British man with 75 false identities held by National Police in Marbella

**MALAGA.** A British man wanted by UK police and subject to a European arrest warrant was held in Marbella on 8 May, police have said. The suspect is considered an expert in attacks on armoured delivery vans and is believed to have been using 75 different fake identities.

The man was arrested in Marbella after the vehicle he was travelling in was stopped by police and the officers were unable to verify the authenticity of the identity documents that he handed over to them.

## Attempted bribery

He is wanted in the UK in connection with robberies and illegal acquisition of firearms and explosives. During questioning by police after his arrest he is said to have offered 500 euros to officers in return for them setting him free. Police have therefore additionally charged him with not just handing over a fake identity document but also with attempting to bribe them.

# Robert De Niro: "I wouldn't feed Donald Trump in any restaurant of mine"

The actor and director has just opened a luxury hotel and restaurant in Marbella with chef Nobu and producer Meir Teper

**MARBELLA.** He loves coming to Spain. That was the first thing he made clear to the press after arriving in Marbella from London. He has been visiting the Costa del Sol for years, but now Robert De Niro has become a local businessman, opening a hotel and restaurant on the Golden Mile with Japanese chef Nobu Matsuhisa and Hollywood producer Meir Teper.

He said he loves fine cuisine, too. He has experience in the business and also made it clear he wouldn't tolerate the US president in any of his restaurants. Asked by a journalist, "What would you serve President Trump in your restaurant?" he responded, "I don't care what Donald Trump likes. If he walked into any of my restau-

rants, I'd get up and leave," to applause from many of those present.

It was Nobu's fame and people's admiration of his cooking, that made De Niro decide go into business with him, first in restaurants and then with Nobu Hotels. However, he made his

debut in the field of gastronomy 30 years ago, with the Tribeca Grill restaurant in New York.

"About ten or fifteen years ago we were in the Hard Rock Café in San Diego and I thought: why am I doing this? And so we opened our own line

of restaurants and I started working with Trevor [Horwell] and Nobu. And we have continued to grow ever since," he explained. He describes Nobu as a magnificent chef. "I love his food and that is also something I took into account," he added.

At his side, Nobuyuki Matsuhisa thanked him for the compliment and paid his own to another master of cuisine in Marbella, Dani García, praising the way he uses local produce. "It is important to have good products to make the best dishes and to offer the best service. That quality is what I have found in Marbella," he said.

## Sake ceremony

In accordance with the Nobu tradition, the owners of the brand took part in the sake ceremony with which they inaugurate all their establishments. There were Japanese lanterns, taiko drums and, of course, the traditional Japanese drink. A barrel had been filled with special sake and Nobu, De Niro and Teper, wooden mallets in hand, complied with the ritual and broke the lid. That marked the start of the opening party, with a toast to good luck.

The ritual seems to have paid off so far, because the brand continues to grow. Meir Teper announced that the hotel chain, which already has a presence in Ibiza and London, will be opening a hotel in Barcelona next year, and intends to set up in Madrid and expand into Portugal in the future. "We are more than good friends; we are almost a family, and together we are very strong," said Teper.

The Nobu family is certainly growing in the town, where the Nobu Hotel Marbella, in the Puente Romano complex, opened its doors at Easter as a luxury establishment for adults. It has 49 rooms and suites and there are plans to increase these to 81 by mid-2019.

## Beach-cleaning equipment doubled ahead of high season

"Never in history have we been able to have beach cleaning machines on all 2.7 kilometres of coastline," added Muñoz.

In total 90 staff will be responsible for the cleanliness of Marbella's beaches this summer.

Its construction, however, will require the alteration of the town plan and this will be discussed at the next council meeting.

# Marbella asks government to put an end to dangerous A-7 crossings

The town hall is awaiting permission from the Public Works ministry to add new pedestrian crossings in El Trapiche

**MARBELLA.** Marbella town hall has submitted a request to the Public Works ministry (Fomento) in a bid to put an end to the dangerous conditions pedestrians in the northern part of the town encounter, crossing the A-7 to get from El Trapiche to the area close to the bus station.

The lack of crossings and the expansion of the area to include the bus station, the Mario Vargas Llosa primary school and a soon-to-be-reopened hotel, has seen an increasing number of people risking their lives on a daily basis as they attempt to cross the A-7 slip roads.

However, the creation of new, clearly signposted crossings requires

the permission of Fomento which owns the public highways. The slip roads currently fall under Fomento's jurisdiction, though Marbella town hall contests that they are urban roads and should therefore fall un-

der its control.

There are currently four points where people regularly cross, but none of them have sufficient pavement width and only one has any markings on the road.

# Regional minister urges patience over Costa del Sol Hospital works

**MARBELLA.** Legal proceedings have begun in an attempt to give "fresh impetus" to the Costa del Sol Hospital expansion project, according to the regional minister responsible for Health, Marina Álvarez.

Álvarez, speaking at an event during which the hospital was presented the award for the best hospital in Spain in 2017, said that she hoped the judicial process would strip 'Concesionaria Costa del Sol SA' of the contract after the project was aban-

doned in 2010 following the refusal of permission for the construction of the car park.

However, Álvarez also warned that the project would remain at a standstill until the judicial process had been completed.

The works, which had an initial budget of 48.5 million euros, stopped approximately at the halfway point.

It is estimated that to complete the project, a further 18 to 24 months of works are necessary.

# Five arrests made over property racket worth over 500,000 euros

More than a hundred people were tricked into paying deposits for properties of between 5,000 and 10,000 euros

**MARBELLA.** The National Police have arrested five people, four men and one woman, in Marbella in connection with defrauding more than 500,000 euros through the creation of false real estate promotions posted online. The number of victims is estimated to be in excess of a hundred.

Those detained are accused of posting advertisements for off-

plan properties at highly attractive prices in locations such as Alhaurín el Grande, Mijas, Punta Umbria (Huelva), Alcalá de Guadaíra (Seville) and Madrid.

The investigation first started after a number of complaints were made by people who had made deposits of between 5,000 and 10,000 euros to the false company then all contact with the supposed agents was lost.

Those accused allegedly contacted the real sellers of the off-plan properties under the guise of being interested buyers. They did this to ascertain all of the pertinent details which they then passed on to interested buyers, having gained their trust in the process.

# Calls grow for Junta to rectify "below standard" new footbridge over the A-397 in San Pedro

**MARBELLA.** The new pedestrian footbridge over the A-397 in San Pedro that was opened without much fanfare on 4 May is already attracting criticism.

Deputy mayor for San Pedro, Rafael Piña (OSP) has visited the site and is calling for the Junta

de Andalucía regional government to rectify the "below standard" footbridge which he says poses an obvious risk to its users.

Piña points to several holes in the ground, the use of different types of concrete, handrails held on with just "little bits of wood".

The OSP has also pointed out that the company responsible for the construction of the bridge left behind rubble and other mess.

"We hope that the PSOE running the Junta does its job and comes to carry out an inspection here and order the necessary repairs to give us the footbridge the people deserve," read the OSP statement.

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# Seeking compensation for mis-sold SIPP's or QROPS



Compensation is potentially available for investors.

British expats who have lost all or some of their retirement capital after being mis-sold pension schemes are potentially able to claim for compensation.

Many British expats in Spain transferred their pensions to Self Invested Personal Pensions (SIPP's) and Qualified Recognised Overseas Pensions (QROPS). For many, however, the consequences have been disastrous and have resulted in a complete loss of retirement capital and income. Others have been more fortunate and only lost some of their capital and income.

A new venture in Spain, Expat Investment Claims, has partnered with Legal Force, a UK regulated claims management specialist, to assist expats make claims for compensation for their losses.

In a test case on 19 January, the Financial Services Compensation Scheme said it would compensate investors who joined schemes set up by certain providers.

"This opened the floodgates for expats to claim," said Peter Butler, regional director of Expat Investment Claims.

"The scale of the losses is not the issue. The fact is that a large percentage of British expats were mis-sold SIPP's and QROPS," he

added. "Compensation is potentially available for these individuals."

What happened? Clients were encouraged to transfer their existing pension arrangements into SIPP's and QROPS on the promise of greater returns and more control over their pension funds. In many cases, the clients did not have investment experience, the advice was not regulated, the advice was unsuitable, the fees were not disclosed and the risks were not explained.

Pensions in the UK are highly regulated investment products and only qualified professionals are given permission by the Financial Conduct Authority to advise on them. Most advisers in Spain did not have the correct qualifications or permissions and should not have been advising expat clients.

"More generally, if any poor advice concerning SIPP's and QROPS left you worse off, you may be able to make a complaint and receive compensation," said Butler.

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# Call for a new local hospital divides neighbouring mayors

Mijas council wants to cofinance an improved facility in Las Lagunas but Fuengirola says that is the Junta de Andalucía's job and accuses Mijas of slow progress

**MIJAS/FUENGIROLA.** The relationship between the mayor of Mijas, Juan Carlos Maldonado, and the mayor of Fuengirola, Ana Mula, is not going through its best period. Despite the geographic closeness of the two municipalities, especially where the Mijas area of Las Lagunas merges into Fuengirola without most people realising it, the different political opinions of the two council chiefs are causing friction.

At the heart of the current dispute is the proposal by Mijas, run by a Ciudadanos and PSOE coalition, to jointly pay for the construction of a badly needed local hospital in Las Lagunas to replace the health centre there. The new, larger facility would directly serve Mijas as well as Fuengirola immediately next door. The mayor has even set aside 4 million euros in this year's budget towards it.

However Fuengirola, run by the PP, has blasted Mijas, saying it is the Junta de Andalucía regional government that should pay for health care facilities, not the two councils. Mijas's proposal would see the councils fund the construction to speed it up and the Junta take over the running, just as is being done in Estepona.

Mayor of Fuengirola, Ana Mula

argues that the proposed plot of land hasn't even been handed over to the Junta yet and accused Mijas's Maldonado of procrastinating on other promises to cooperate with Fuengirola. However for the first time this week she hinted that Fuengirola council may be willing to put up some money once the land title was sorted out.

# Province's 'gestores', who help smooth paperwork, launch English website

**MALAGA.** The official association for Malaga of the advisors who help sort out bureaucratic affairs and paperwork worries for their clients, such as tax declarations, residency or driving papers, has launched a new website with information in

English to help foreign residents. The association of 'gestores administrativos' (Colegio de Gestores Administrativos) has prepared the information because it says "it wants to become even closer to the foreign population in Malaga and its province".

On the new site, which is at [www.tramitesmalaga.com/en](http://www.tramitesmalaga.com/en) international residents are able to read up on everything about the procedures they need to go through when first arriving on the Costa.

The association says that the website will be updated regularly and will contain the latest news from

the Spanish authorities that could be interesting to foreigners, both from the EU and outside the European Union. All of the topics published are chosen by 'gestores', qualified professionals that can help. The website also has a list of 'gestores' who are members and allows a user to ask a question to get a personal answer.

A 'gestor administrativo' is a certified professional graduated in Law, Economics, Business or Political Science that has also passed an exam organised by the ministry of Finance or who has an MA in Administrative Management.

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# San Isidro takes Estepona back in time to its farming roots

The local people took to the streets this week to pay tribute to the town's patron saint

**ESTEPONA.** From eight o'clock in the morning on Tuesday, Estepona was temporarily transformed from an urban town into an old-fashioned agricultural community. You could say it was yet another of San Isidro Labrador's miracles.

Early-rising residents brought fruit and vegetables to the parish church of San José as an offering to San Isidro. The Isidro brotherhood later gave the food donations to Cáritas, a catholic charity.

Local farmers donated more than 250 kilogrammes of lemons, which were handed out by the Reinas and Damas (queens and ladies-in-waiting) as they paraded through the streets visiting the special altars set up for the occasion. The most prominent of these was on Calle Casares.

Farming tools, freshly grown produce, flowers, and hay bales disguised the roads and pavements.

The parade was headed by 22 floats, which competed to win the 100-euro prize for best decoration. Various prizes were awarded through

out the day.

As the event drew on, the festivities gave way to the religious side of the celebration. The scent of incense announced the approach of the image of San Isidro, which was carried slowly on a cart pulled by two oxen, stopping every 50 metres to receive gifts from the townsfolk.

María Jose López, the head of the Isidro brotherhood, declared the event a "success" and said it had allowed older citizens to recall the Estepona of their youth.

Plans are already being drawn up for next year's festival, which is likely to become even bigger this year's.

### San Luis gourmet market will open at the end of June

:: C. M. After being pushed back twice, the official opening of the first gastro-market in Estepona is now earmarked for the end of June.

The initial budget was set at 600,000 euros but has since soared to 1.6 million.

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# New beach bar on Malapesquera beach attracts complaints

**BENALMÁDENA.** The police have received several complaints about the construction of a beach bar-restaurant on Malapesquera beach, beside Puerto Marina, because palm trees which formed part of the green zone between the sea-front and the sand have been trimmed, and the building works have been continuing until late in the evening.

Sources at the town hall say the project has been granted all the necessary permits and that the late-night works were an exception, caused by a problem with one of

the lorries.

This has always been a controversial project, because the council believes there is no need for another 'chiringuito' in the area, but the decision was made by the

previous legislature and could not be changed. The new bar-restaurant will be 150 square metres in size, with a further 30 square metres for toilets which the public will be able to use.

# Racecourse company goes into liquidation

**MIJAS.** The company which manages the Costa del Sol racecourse, Recursos Turísticos de Mijas, has filed for bankruptcy. This has come as no surprise to Mijas council, as it had been on the cards for several months.

The decision puts an end to the joint venture company which was formed between the town hall (93%) and Unicaja (7%),

which the local authority says should have been wound up in 2014, during the mandate of former mayor Ángel Nozal.

The company has numerous debts, including one of nearly four million euros to Mijas town hall in unpaid rent. After years of difficulties, the council says the premises "can now be put to good use for a project which all the people of Mijas can enjoy".

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# Translators to be provided for participatory budget meetings

**MIJAS.** The first open meeting took place in La Cala de Mijas on Tuesday to keep local residents informed about progress on the participatory budgets which are to be introduced in the municipality for the first time next year.

At the meeting, which was held at the local branch of the town hall, it was announced that, given the high foreign population of the area, council staff would be present to act as translators for those who need them.

Tamara Vera, the councillor for Public Participation, and the councillor for Foreigners, Roy Pérez, say it is essential that foreigners, who represent more than 42 per cent of the registered population in Mijas, are able to have a say without suffering difficulties in communication.



# WORKS BEGIN ON FOOTBRIDGE

After being closed for several weeks for safety reasons, the footbridge over the A-7 between Mijas and Fuengirola is now undergoing urgent repair works. The bridge is close to the Hotel Beatriz Palace, close to the entrance to Fuengirola on one side, and the BP petrol station on the other. As the municipalities adjoin at this point, the southern end of the footbridge is on land in Mijas, and the northern side is in Fuengirola.

# Over 1,400 signatures on railway station petition

**BENALMÁDENA.** The Spanish government let it be known last December that it has no immediate plans to build a railway station at Nueva Torrequebrada, despite an announcement by the Ministry of Public Works in March 2015 that it intended to do so.

Local residents say the station, on the suburban line between Malaga and Fuengirola, is badly needed because the nearest one is so far away, and the area is expanding rapidly. A campaign group has now been set up by people living in the area, and it is collecting signatures on a petition to put pressure on the government to change its mind. So far, over 1,400 people have signed.

More than 4,000 people live in Nueva Torrequebrada, mainly young families, pensioners and foreign residents. The nearest station is over six kilometres away,

in Arroyo de la Miel, and although it can be reached by road, it can be a complicated and time-consuming journey.

The council agrees that there is a clear need for a station in Nueva Torrequebrada and believes it would bring positive results such as a reduction in traffic in the area and improved access to the beaches, and would generate more business.

The mayor, Víctor Navas, says the local authority is prepared to use part of its surplus to finance the works. Officially, the council is not able to build the station itself because it does not have the legal powers to do so, so permission is needed from the government in order to go ahead.

This would not be the first time the council had used its own funds for a project which is the responsibility of another authority. In the past it has also built a school on behalf of the Junta de Andalucía.

# The first jábegas from Malaga are about to be seen in Venice

Two clubs from El Palo and Pedregalejo are taking part in the prestigious 'Vogalonga', a 30-kilometre route through the city

**MALAGA.** The traditional 'jábegas' of Malaga will be seen on the waters of Venice for the first time on Sunday, taking part in the famous 'Vogalonga' a 30-kilometre exhibition route from St Mark's Square to the island of Burano.

Two clubs from El Palo and Pedregalejo are delighted to have the chance to participate in one of the most prestigious regattas in the world this year. "This is something that everybody who rows dreams of going to once in their life. I believe it is the biggest gathering of non-powered boats in the world," says Felipe Romero, who will be on board 'Carmen y Gloria', the jábega which belongs to the El Palo club.

The members of both clubs will be wearing traditional Malaga fishermen's outfits: white shirt, waistcoat, red cummerbund, trousers which come between the knee and the ankle, and sandals.

The club members will be taking two jábegas and a smaller 'chalana' to the event. They have eight hours to complete the route, and believe they will need most of that time. They will have to navigate through the narrow canals of the city, where sometimes there is only room for one boat at a time, and will then cross the lagoon and row round the islands of Murano and Burano.

"This began as a protest against boats which caused waves, so it is a longstanding tradition, just like ours," says teacher Paco Pareja, who will be taking part.

None of the 'jábegeros' are athletes, but they do train all year round and are confident they are up to the challenge. "It's going to be spectacular. We can't wait to get there," says Paco.

## "When I saw the photo, I got goosebumps; I knew they had found my uncle"

**MALAGA.** Lourdes rang her mother, just after forwarding her a photo. "Pick up your mobile, sit down and look at the picture I've just sent you on Whatsapp," she said. María Josefa, who will be 60 in September, did so and then asked: "Who is it? It must be someone in my family". When she heard her daughter's response, she realised why Lourdes had told her to sit down. "It's your brother, Mum. He's called Ted," she said. Then came a barrage of questions, which María Josefa had been asking in her mind all her life. "What's he like? Where is he? And how did you find him," she demanded to know.

"As soon as I saw his photo, I got goosebumps. I knew I had found my uncle. He is alive, and he's well. This is a dream come true," says Lourdes, who lives in Benalmádena.

Ted is 55, lives in Oklahoma, has three children and a grandson. He is believed to have been a stolen baby. "We grew up hearing that my grandmother had had another son, and that he had been adopted by an American soldier and his wife. Nobody knows who the father was. But my grandmother couldn't read or write. She couldn't even sign her name. We believe the baby was taken from her," says Lourdes. Her grandmother was living in Madrid at the time and she gave birth in a hospital run by nuns, because she was a single mother. Sadly, she died five years ago, never knowing what happened to her son.

It was Ted who found his family, after contacting Enrique Vila, the president of SOS Niños Robados. They had a starting point because his adoptive father had kept his birth certificate and the surnames, which are uncommon, were the same as Pepa's. Enrique contacted Lourdes via Facebook, and sent her a photo of Ted. She says the family resemblance is uncanny. Enrique put them in touch and now they are hoping to meet before long. "I hope it will be soon," she says, "but it doesn't matter. We have found my uncle, after all this time."

**LONDON.** The city of Malaga has taken its slogan “the ideal place to live, work and invest” to London this week in a bid to attract more international businesses to the area.

Malaga and Barcelona were the only Spanish cities with stands at Going Global, a fair aimed mainly at British firms thinking of expanding overseas or setting up offices in other European countries.

The event, held this year at the ExCeL centre, has gained importance since the UK’s vote to leave

the EU and for the last two years the city has been launching initiatives to court British firms wanting to keep one foot in the union.

The two-day event included talks, round tables, public exhibitions and masterclasses delivered by experts in international investment.

At the helm of the Malaga delegation was deputy mayor and city council member for the departments of Tourism & City Promotion and of Productive Economy, María del Mar Martín Rojo, who was accompanied by the council’s experts in promotion and international economic development, Marc Sanderson and Isabel Pascual.

Helping them spread the word of the advantages of Malaga and Andalucía as a business location was SUR in English, with a special 16-page supplement that was dis-

tributed at the event in ExCeL as well as in the main hotels in the City.

The information supported the council’s main arguments to convince investors that Malaga is more than just a holiday destination, among them the Andalusian Technology Park, the University, the incentives and support offered by the local and regional authorities and the high frequency of connections by air with cities all over the UK.

### Marijuana found hidden in lorry of lettuces

### Council seeks 90k fine for illegal quarrying

TORRES.** The town hall in Alhaurín de la Torre has asked the Junta de Andalucía to issue a maximum fine of 90,000 euros for those who have been carrying out illegally quarrying at the Pinos de Alhaurín quarry, where taking stone is banned since 2015. It says the same people were fined eight years ago so the fine amount needs to be large.

### Archidona to get large solar power park

**ARCHIDONA**

:: **F. TORRES.** A new solar panel park is to be opened on the outskirts of the town of Archidona, in inland Malaga province. The contract has been awarded to Marbella-based firm Anasol, a renewable-energy specialist.

The park will have 28,000 photovoltaic modules which will be installed in an environmentally friendly way, whereby the top

soil and vegetation on the ground is undisturbed by concrete intrusions.

The five hectare site in the northern part of the municipality will be surrounded by a two-metre-high fence and the electricity created by the cells will be fed into the national grid.

Archidona council says that two companies bid for the project and that currently the council is advertising the project as it is at public consultation phase. The Junta de Andalucía is responsible for authorising it.


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# Fuengirola's visiting shark was "harmless" says marine expert

Swimmers warned of the presence of a three-metre-long shark on Torreblanca beach on Sunday

**MALAGA.** A sighting of a three-metre-long blue shark caused alarm on the beaches of Fuengirola on Sunday, forcing a four-hour ban on swimming. It's reason enough to jump out of the water with fright, and perhaps related to the number of times that you've watched 'Jaws'.

Several bathers warned of the presence of a shark only several metres from the shore in Torreblanca at around 12.15pm. Following the spread of several different videos on social media, the Guardia Civil sent out a patrol to find the shark and return it to deeper waters, but were unsuccessful in their search.

The red flag was raised until around 5pm, when it was downgraded to yellow.

Malaga's marine rescue service, Aula del Mar, said that the presence of blue sharks is not uncommon on the Malaga coastline. Juan Jesús Martín, biologist and director of the

centre, explained that this species is the only type of shark that ventures into shallow waters, either pursuing prey or out of mere curiosity. "It's not common, but it can happen," he said.

Martín clarified that the blue shark is one of more than twenty species that live in the Alboran Sea, and although it will sometimes swim in areas with bathers, there

has never been a documented encounter between the two. "These animals have a very bad press, partly due to films, but in the Alboran sea there has never been a blue shark attack, and worldwide it's still a rare phenomenon," he said. He also pointed out that sharks often approach during winter, but mostly go unnoticed.

### Archaeological park to be restored

:: **E. CABEZAS.** The Mediterranean archaeological park, situated next to the Cantal and La Victoria caves in Rincón de la Victoria, is set to have restoration work carried out, according to the town's mayor, Francisco Salado.

The archaeological site, which first opened to the public fifteen

years ago, has suffered considerable damage in recent years, including to prehistoric paintings at the entrance to one of the caves on the site, allegedly caused by squatters.

Work will include restoring the paintings in the La Victoria cave, some of which belong to the Neolithic period, as well as cleaning the area and tidying up the gardens in which much of the vegetation reflects typical plants that would have existed during prehistoric times.

### International presence at Art and School Biennial

## Landmark 'Plusvalía' tax ruling could pave the way for further claims

A court has ordered Vélez-Málaga town hall to pay back almost 5,000 euros of increased land-value tax despite it being unclear if the vendor made a loss or not

**VÉLEZ-MÁLAGA.** A court in Malaga has ruled that Vélez-Málaga town hall must pay back 4,844 euros in Plusvalía (increased land-value tax) to a resident who sold a house in the Chilches area in March 2016.

The man originally bought the house in August 2005 and at the time of selling it the town hall gave the property a value of 59,805 euros, for which the seller was ordered to pay the aforementioned plusvalía tax.

Until last year anyone selling a property in Spain was required by national law to pay the tax, regardless of whether they had made a

profit or loss on the sale as it is calculated on theoretical increased land value and not actual market prices. However, a ruling by Spain's Con-

stitutional Court in 2017 deemed it unfair that vendors who had not made a profit on the sale of their property had to pay the tax.

In this landmark case, the first of its kind in Malaga province, the court did not look into whether the vendor had indeed made a loss or profit, suggesting that it no longer matters whether a profit is made or not. Although the vendor's lawyer, Francisco Galán Palmero, said that "the deeds proved that there had been losses".

Similar rulings have already been given in Madrid, Catalonia, the Canary Islands and Navarra, but this is among the first in Malaga. The judge said after the ruling that her decision would pave the way for further claims against other town halls in the province.

The Plusvalía is a national tax applied at a local level by town halls. Since it was called into question by the Constitutional Court there have been further calls to reform it or even scrap it altogether. It currently only applies to urban land and not rural land and to the value of the land, not the construction itself.

### Trip to Rome and getting in touch with old friends form Lux Mundi anniversary plans

# Historian finds documents that confirm there was a concentration camp in Torremolinos

It was built by Francoists in 1938 as a form of repression against thousands who were abused and forced to work

Since the return to democracy it has never been officially recognised, but in Torremolinos there was a concentration camp between 1938 and 1939. It was built at the site currently occupied by the Aqualand waterpark.

Thousands of prisoners passed through that inhumane prison, living in the open air and kept inside by a metal fence. Although investigation carried out several years ago brought this information to light, the lack of evidence has meant that knowledge of one of the darkest parts of Malaga's history has not been made public.

Until now, local historian Carlos Blanco has found official documents that show the existence of the facility; these include a quartermaster's report, an administrative journal and an invoice. A budget from the Ministry of National Defence reveals that the Seville Treasury covered the expenses of this terrible service, with a daily cost of 1.65 pesetas per prisoner.

The documentation discovered by Blanco leaves no room for euphemisms despite years of attempts by the council to play down the facility. Former mayor Pedro Fernández Mon-

tes (PP) denied that there had ever been a concentration camp in Torremolinos - "only a detention centre, which is not the same" - and called the claim "cliché" during a council meeting in 2015.

Documents from the time describe the confinement centre as a "concentration camp designed for prisoners of war". It even had its own stamp. On 30 March 1939 a document signed by the captain of the camp confirmed that the facility had a population of 1,924 inmates, although the total number of people detained in Torremolinos during the final months of the civil war and the beginning of the dictatorship is unknown.

Another document details the costs associated with running the prison; the warden validated the invoices, which were reviewed by the chief accountant, the auditor and a tax office representative. For example, 6,349 pesetas were sent from Seville to pay for the concentration camp to be run on 30 and 31 March 1939.

There are still a lot of unanswered questions, however. We don't know how long the camp remained there for or what happened to the prisoners although it is known that one of the cemetery walls was used for executions by firing squad.

While the majority of the inmates in this type of Franco camp were Republicans, there were also foreigners, Gypsies, political dissidents, homosexuals and other citizens. They were all used for labour. Some research indicates that part of Malaga Airport could have been built by prisoners.

The inmates slept in the open air and had no medical services.

Research by Javier Rodríguez, a lecturer at the Universidad Autónoma in Barcelona, revealed that in April 1939 there were 4,494 people registered at the Torremolinos concentration camp, and more than 13,000 in this and other camps in the province of Malaga.

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## Nationwide campaign launched for British expats to maintain right to vote in Spain after Brexit

Brexpaters in Spain initiated the campaign because it believes the right to vote in local elections in Spain has not been properly considered

**MALAGA.** British expatriates living in Spain are becoming increasingly concerned about whether they will be able to participate in the municipal elections in Spain in May 2019 – a date which falls within the transition phase of the UK's exit from the European Union.

Despite the fact that the UK government has promised to restore voting rights for long-time expat residents in Europe, this will probably not happen until 2024. Worse still, those expat residents who have represented their communities on Spanish local councils may well find themselves prohibited from standing after the UK's departure in March 2019.

Brexpaters in Spain, the platform set up to defend the rights of British citizens in Spain, is commencing a nationwide campaign to raise awareness of these issues, working

with mayors and local councils, and the local, national and international press. The campaign, which has the backing of the Spanish political party, Ciudadanos, will also petition MPs in the UK.

"There is a problem on the horizon that, until very recently, has been ignored, forgotten or just overlooked. It is also an issue that some expats living here permanently do not understand, or maybe even care about, but it is vital to our continued lifestyle in Spain and our integration into the Spanish life," Anne Hernández, President of Brexpaters in Spain, explained.

The president believes that the right to vote in Spain has not been properly considered, claiming that Spain and the UK will need to sign a bilateral agreement that will enable expats to vote in the local elections. She also stressed that the situation must be identified and solved before the end of this year.

"We are aware of the limited time we have left to find a solution, given that the local elections are just one year away. At present, expats cannot vote in the UK if they have been out of the country for more than 15 years. We cannot vote in the EU elections and now, no vote in the mu-

nicipal elections here in Spain," Anne said.

"We will be completely disenfranchised. It begs the question as to quite what we British residents in the EU stand for, even though we proudly retain and defend our British passports," the president continued.

The campaign runs until 2pm on Sunday 22 July.



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# Catalonia has a new president - separatist Quim Torra avoids swearing allegiance to King

The latest candidate, who is loyal to Carles Puigdemont, was voted in by regional MPs on Monday and sworn in to power on Thursday

**BARCELONA.** After so many months waiting, it was all over within a few days. Following winning an investiture vote by MPs on Monday, by Thursday lunchtime this week Quim Torra was being sworn in as head of the Catalan regional government in Barcelona.

MPs from secessionist parties, who together hold a slim majority in the regional parliament, had been on a countdown to choosing a new head of government or facing fresh elections that none of them wanted.

After it had proved impossible to appoint any proposed candidate since last December's regional elections, due to legal action against them, it was left to the Speaker, Roger Torrent, to hurriedly propose Torra last week. The key to Torra being voted in was the opinion of left-wing separatists CUP, who have criticised his perceived right-wing ideology. In the end, in the second

vote they decided to abstain and Torra squeezed in by just one vote.

Quim Torra is loyal to Carles Puigdemont, the former president who is wanted in Spain for rebellion and who is now unable to leave Germany while courts there decide whether to extradite him on embezzlement charges. They have already refused to hand Puigdemont back to Spain

on the rebellion charge.

The new president is now expected to style himself as a parallel regional head, giving an unofficial but high-profile role in decisions to Puigdemont in Berlin.

At the scaled-down swearing in ceremony on Thursday, virtually no media were invited and constitutional political parties criticised

the failure of the new Catalan leader to swear allegiance to the constitution and King Felipe VI. The Spanish flag was also nowhere to be seen.

Now there is an official regional president, the suspension of some of Catalonia's devolved powers by Madrid, under the so-called Article 155, is expected to be lifted. How-

Belgium says 'no' to extraditing other rebel Catalan politicians due to 'technical error'

The legal situation of the various former Catalan politicians in self-imposed exile in Europe was back in the spotlight this week. Courts in Scotland, Belgium and Germany are still deciding whether to extradite some separatist leaders to Spain on a variety of charges including rebellion and embezzlement.

In Belgium, where three were waiting to see what judges there will decide, a court said on Wednesday that it did not agree to extradite them for rebellion as, due to an "omission", there was no evidence supplied to them by Spain of an active detention order in Spain itself. The Spanish Supreme Court was quick to contact courts in Europe to clarify the situation and accuse Belgium of a "lack of cooperation".

ever the PP, PSOE and Ciudadanos parties have said they will move quickly to support a suspension of those powers again if Torra starts to follow a separatist policy agenda.

Some self-rule for Catalonia was put on hold last October after the regional parliament voted on an illegal declaration of independence and was then dissolved by Madrid.

# Uproar in Tenerife over UK tabloids' false Mount Teide eruption claims

Hoteliers' association hits out, saying it is tired of the fake news every year just as the tourist season is starting and it wants politicians to do more

**TENERIFE.** The British tabloid press is in hot water this week with the tourist industry in Tenerife for alleging that its famous Mount Teide is about to erupt. Britons make up a big part of the annual visitor numbers and people fear that it will have a negative effect on their business at the start of the summer season.

The Sunday Express website headline earlier this month read, "Tenerife volcano alert: Shock as 270 earthquakes hit Brit holiday favourite Canary Islands" and The Sun has been among other contributors fuelling the story with a "Volcano fear hits Tenerife" headline.

Jorge Marichal, head of the hoteliers' association that includes Tenerife pleaded with local politicians to do more to stop the unsubstantiated reports. "We're tired of how, at the start of every season, they come up with a story like this that doesn't just sow seeds of doubt

among the British that are thinking about visiting the island, but also among the people of the Canary Islands themselves," he said.

"They know full well that they are publishing something fake, which makes us think that there are definite interests behind it all."

The regional minister for tourism in the Canaries, Alberto

Bernabé, was more measured. "It's perfectly natural to imagine some sort of judeo-masonic conspiracy led by competitor markets. But we think it's down to something much simpler: they know [in the UK] that any Canaries' news is of interest and they have no problem manipulating the truth if it helps them sell more," he explained.

## Left-wing Podemos leader under fire for his 540k home

**MADRID.** Pablo Iglesias, the high-profile national politician who is leader of the Podemos party that grew out of an anti-capitalist street movement, was under fire on social media and in the press this week for acquiring a luxury 540,000-euro home.

The purchase, made with his partner and fellow Podemos politician, Irene Montero, has come as a surprise to many, including those within his own party, due to Iglesias's outspoken criticism of the supposedly comfortable life of MPs.

Back in 2012, Iglesias commented on the decision of a min-

ister to spend a similar amount on a home by Tweeting: "Would you entrust the country's economic policy to someone who spent 600,000 euros on a luxury penthouse?"

The new home of the radical Podemos couple is in the hills behind Madrid and is on a 2,000-metre plot, including swimming pool and guest house. Iglesias has justified the decision saying he has earned the money and it is for living in and not speculating on. The couple are expecting twins and face a 1,600-euro-a-month joint mortgage.

Iglesias currently lives in a 60-metre-square flat.

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# The submerged economy

**Over one million people in Spain work without a contract and pay no tax or Social Security. This type of fraud means that 250 billion euros a year escapes the taxman. "If I declared it, I wouldn't have enough to live on," is just one of the reasons given**

Spain is starting to recover after a decade of economic asphyxiation. The recovery can be seen from official statistics, but is not so noticeable in the street. The labour market continues to expel many people and ill-treat others with insecure jobs and low wages. With an unemployment rate of around 16 per cent, twice the European average, how are long-term unemployed people who do not receive benefits, or those with contracts for very few hours a day, surviving? Part of the answer lies with the so-called "submerged" or "black" economy.

Manuel (not his real name), is an accountant. He is currently very busy, doing seven mini-jobs. In January, at the age of 52, he registered as self-employed, taking advantage of a special rate of 50 euros a month for Social Security contributions, but he doesn't declare all his income for tax. "If I did, it wouldn't be worth me working so hard," he says. He does the accounts for five companies. "I bill three of them properly. The fourth one pays me without an invoice, and the fifth one is half and

half," he explains.

He also works as a salesman for a law firm, earning 50 per cent commission for every client he brings in with toxic bank products, and with a construction company, for which he is paid three per cent for every new project. Hacienda, the tax authority, doesn't see a single euro of this money.

Manuel earns twice as much as the 1,000 euros a month the authorities think he receives. "I'm not paying as much Social Security as I should, but I'm not that worried about my retirement. I know when it happens I'll manage somehow," he says. He is paid cash in hand and takes measures to ensure that there is no sign of the irregularity on either side.

More than a million people in Spain work in the "black economy". Manuel has been one of them for eight years, since the construction company for which he was head of administration went into liquidation and closed down. He doesn't hide the fact that he was earning and claiming unemployment benefit at the same time for a while, although it is a very serious offence which could have left him with no benefits whatsoever. But this isn't all.

During the ten years he worked for the construction firm, at the height of the property boom and with 90 workers under him, there were also irregularities. "The pay slips only

showed the amount we were supposed to earn, according to the employment terms and conditions. Expenses and overtime were paid in cash separately, in an envelope," he says. "If a company declares everything its employees earn, it can forget about being competitive, and that isn't just in the construction industry; everyone does it."

Undeclared earnings is just one part of the submerged economy, which the European Commission defines as any remunerated activity "which, being legal in nature, is not declared to the public authorities and remains outside their control and taxation".

### Social Security fraud

When a company doesn't register its workers with Social Security, or does so but fails to pay the right amount, it is committing fraud. This is not only illegal, but encourages unfair competition, means the staff will not receive as much retirement pension as they should, and, above all, affects the income of the State.

"The submerged economy in this country represents 24.6 per cent of GDP, and means that 250 billion euros escape fiscal and employment controls. According to our estimations, the money the State is not receiving in tax and Social Security contributions is between 60 billion

ing 80.9 per cent went undiscovered in a year that was historic in terms of the fight against tax fraud," says Mollinedo.

Examples of the social permissiveness which exists in Spain about tax fraud are to be found every day. For example, when self-employed workers go to someone's house to do a job and ask "Do you want an invoice, or not?" It also occurs on the internet, where you only have to type "work in the black" into a search engine to find dozens of advertisements from people offering to do so in different trades and for different reasons.

**No documents**

Some, like Luis, have had no alternative. He came to Spain four months ago from Venezuela. He has applied for political asylum, but for the moment he is not here legally. "I have no residence documents and I have to work without a contract, but what I have found so far is abusive: they were paying me between 15 and 20 euros a day in the construction industry, working from seven in the morning till ten at night. I'm not in a situation to apply for anything, and I don't want to be a burden for Spain, but these conditions are unacceptable," he says.

Ángel's case is very different. The crisis put an end to the family business in which he had worked for 15 years as a printer. He did temporary jobs for a while, but then they were hard to find or they paid very badly. He offered to work "in the black" and now, aged 45, he takes home everything he earns as a forklift truck driver for a company in Murcia.

"They pay me 13 euros an hour and I'm doing five hours a day until August. It's not ideal, because I'm worried I'm not contributing towards my pension, but there is no alternative. I have a mortgage to pay and a family to feed. They have to be my priority," he says.

However, employing someone without registering them with Social Security can result in major problems for a business owner. "They should think twice," says Javier Martín-Gavero, a specialist in Labour Law at the Gómez-Villares & Atencia legal firm.

It is normally considered a serious offence, and can result in a fine of between 3,000 and 10,000 euros, but it can be considered very serious if the person who is working without a contract is also claiming unemployment benefit. In that case, the fine can be between 10,000 and 187,000 euros. The worker could also be obliged to pay back the benefits he or she has received while working.

In this situation, if the company decides to dismiss the worker, they can claim compensation and cause trouble for the business even though they were employed illegally.

"Sometimes, companies decide it is just a question of costs and it's worth the risk of being found out, but the problem is that they all think 'it can't happen to me' and that's a mistake," says Javier Martín-Gavero.

**RELEGATED TO THIRD**



Over the last few months, the popularity of the Spanish government has been steadily declining, but the most recent test of voters' intentions puts it in third place for the first time. According to a survey conducted by Metroscopia for El País, centrist newcomer Ciudadanos would win if a general election were held today, with 29.1% of the vote. Leftist alliance Unidos Podemos would come second with 19.8% and the ruling Conservative Popular Party (PP) third with 19.5%.

Prime minister Mariano Rajoy fares even worse, with 86% of Spaniards saying he should go. The message is clear: the PP can no longer rely on its much-vaunted economic credentials to maintain voters' support.

Ever since it took office in 2011, the PP has presented itself as the only party fit to preside over the Spanish economy. On paper, it appears entitled to make that claim: Spain's GDP has been expanding at one of the fastest rates in the eurozone for the last three years, and unemployment is down to 17%, from a peak of 26% in 2013. Indeed, the Conservatives' pledge to reduce the jobless rate has been their other election-winning mantra: half a million new jobs a year, says Rajoy, is the amount required to return the Spanish workforce to health.

Most of the new employment contracts are temporary or part-time, though, and have done nothing to strengthen a perilously insecure labour market. Also remember that the Spanish

economy was unaffected when Spain went without a government for ten months in 2016. Actually, its expansion continued apace. These two facts alone provide sufficient motive to doubt the PP's economic competence; but there's another reason why the Conservatives have slumped to third place in the opinion polls.

The PP's responses to Spaniards' concerns appear utterly unconvincing. In February, there were protests all over Spain when the government announced a 2018 pension raise that wouldn't even match inflation. Rajoy only pledged to increase the proposed hike of 0.25% to secure parliamentary support for this year's budget (which still hasn't been passed). And when more than five million Spanish women participated in the country's first female strike at the beginning of March, all Rajoy could do was mumble that gender pay inequality was no longer at the bottom of the PP's priority list. Do you believe him?

This is not even to mention the Conservatives' nonexistent line on corruption. The circumstances surrounding the recent resignation of Cristina Cifuentes, former head of the PP in Madrid, revealed a laughable inconsistency: lying and cheating are tolerable (other PP members have lied about their qualifications without consequence) but shoplifting is a sackable offence. Unless the PP suddenly takes a zero-tolerance stance on corruption and starts heeding the concerns of the electorate, it stands no chance of winning the 2020 general election.

Sometimes I have to carry a mobile phone, which fact gnaws at my very soul like the devil with a rusty saw. Things are getting



**MALAGA.** In the Plaza de la Marina, five women on stilts pay tribute to those who fought to be them-

selves. Almost at the same time, in the Episcopal Palace, a pregnant woman wearing a suit calls for the end of the patriarchy. Meanwhile, a hundred female eyes watch over Calle Larios from above. Women were the driving force behind many of the events that took place as part of the Noche en Blanco, a night of culture in the city of Malaga last Saturday. They were accompanied by an uninvited guest, the wind, which meant that many events had to be moved to alternative venues.

Up to 10,000 guides detailing the official programme were given out within the first half an hour of the event starting. Tourists, local people and bachelor parties, as usual, mingled in the streets of the historic centre. "We've come with three busloads from Algarrobo," said Amparo Melgare as she waited to get into the Carmen Thyssen museum, free of charge like all of the cultural attractions last Saturday.

This year's Noche en Blanco, an expression which means staying

awake all night, provided plenty of reasons for doing just that, but this year's fun was also accompanied by more serious messages.

Calls were made for equality, recognition of the role of women in the arts and tributes to the 'Muses and Women Creators' (the theme of this year's edition) in history. "To make women more visible and the protagonists of cultural events is very good," said 23-year-old Cristina González.

The company Maduixa opened the performances in the Plaza de la

Marina with an award-winning show, Mulier. Five dancers gave a lesson in strength, coordination and balance on stilts, pushing their bodies to the limit.

Next it was Emma Luna's turn to surprise the crowds in the Plaza de la Marina as her aerial acrobatics won rounds of applause.

Perhaps the show that had the greatest impact was that of Ernesto Artillo in the Palacio Episcopal. The same venue that earlier that week had vetoed two works of an exhibition (one of which was an explicit nude), was now filled with men and women posed on pedestals as living mannequins, wearing costumes on which the artist has painted breasts and genitals. There were younger and older models, of different races and even an eight-month pregnant woman. The show and its background music was described as "powerful, unusual and different" by a Romanian tourist couple in the city.

"It's shocking, but positive. I put myself in their shoes, what will they think of us looking at them? It's the first time I've seen something like that," said Reme Ruiz of the display.

At the end of the room, a clitoris made of flowers was on display; proof, according to sources from the Episcopal, that in the diocese there is no censorship.

**Female revolution**

With this piece Artillo takes one of the emblems of patriarchy and transforms it into a symbol of the feminine revolution. The costumes will be auctioned this Friday, 18 May, at catawiki.com to raise funds for women's associations. Ernesto Artillo had also left his mark on Calle Larios, where his photos of the eyes of women looked down over the crowds in the main street.

Next to the façade of the Pompidou, students from the School of Architecture built The Lady of Steel, a 40-metre-long pavilion to represent the duality of women: the strength and robustness of the scaffolding and the fragility and sensitivity of the tulle fabrics.

The event as a whole was a great success both for advancing gender issues and increasing tourist interest in Malaga. As well as the street entertainment, the free admission to the main museums was a major attraction. In the first two hours 800 people had visited the Carmen Thyssen museum, 1,500 had walked around the Malaga Museum and a further 1,300 had been in the Pompidou.

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
# Novelising the social issues of expats

A new book focuses on the frustrations of five foreign residents in Fuengirola

**FUENGIROLA.** “When you try to escape from your problems, they are the first things you pack,” claims a new book by British author, Gus Duffy.

The Estepona-based writer has just released his first novel, *A Little Bit of the Moon*, a book set in Fuengirola that focuses on the social issues of a group of five expats from very different backgrounds.

Gus, who came to live in Spain in 2014, set the book in Fuengirola because it was where he first set up home on the coast.

Born in Harrow, NW London, in 1982, Gus came to Spain with his wife (a former teacher) in search of a stress-free life, having tired of trying to make ends meet in London.

They both quickly adapted to the quality of life they could afford on the coast, but Gus, like so many before him, struggled with the language and found it difficult integrating into

Spanish society.

“I wasn’t very good at languages at school and I haven’t grasped the language here, even though I know that I should have, but I will persevere and try to become more integrated,” the 36-year-old writer says with conviction.

His association with the expat so-

ciety in Fuengirola fuelled his drive to write the novel, as the characters are loosely based on some of the people he had met. However, the story is inspired by the songs of British Ska band, *Missing Andy*. The title of the novel is a line from one of the group’s hits. The band’s songs focus on working class issues, like domestic vio-

lence, an issue that plays a large part in the novel. Gus, who is a big fan of the band, felt compelled to write about the normal everyday issues of expat life on the coast, rather than the falsified stereotypical image.

The author is keen to point out that something like domestic abuse happens to all sorts of people, “not just the typecast victims we see on television”.

The book is set around the fictitious Gloria’s Bar and focuses on the frustrations of five different people who must learn from their past mistakes to confront their futures.

“The characters are based on the diverse groups of people that one finds in Spain. At home we tend to mix with people in our own circle, but here, as expats, we mix with people that we would probably not have mixed with before,” Gus says.

This is his first published work. He originally tried his hand at play writ-

ing and even though he had his work considered by the Finborough Theatre in London, a career as a playwright did not materialise.

“I hit that point in my life where I had been doing a job to just to pay the rent and survive, and I wanted to make a change. When I was small I loved to write stories, which was the only thing I was confident with, and so I started writing scripts. After I had been knocked back a couple of times, I decided to try my hand at writing a novel, which my wife thought was a good idea,” Gus explains.

Gus’s wife used her teaching skills to edit and proofread the book and although she was critical, she encouraged her husband because she believed he had unveiled the true identity of the foreign community on the coast.

“Being an expat is more than moving abroad, it is like an identity. No two expats are alike and the only thing they do have in common is the fact that they are expats,” he says.”

He feels that the expat residents of the Costa del Sol have never been truly depicted in a novel and he believes that his new book tackles subjects that are not normally explored.

“I might have got a little close to the truth for some expats, but it is something I feel strongly about. We all think that people who suffer from domestic abuse are a particular type of person, but this affects people from all walks of life, even the ones we least expect,” Gus concludes.

I have been living apart from my husband since some months ago, although we are still married. We do not have any children, and I would like to get married again to my new partner. As I am not separated yet, could I marry again as soon as I start the separation actions, or would I have to wait until having a judgment?

Applying for separation is not enough to marry again. Moreover, having a judgment would not be sufficient either, as in order to marry again it is necessary to have a divorce judgment. It is necessary to know the specific circumstances of the case in order to determine the possibilities of trying to apply for divorce as quickly as possible (such as applying directly for divorce instead of for separation).

I have decided to buy a property in Spain. After visiting several different properties, I have settled on buying a country house. The owner has told me that for tax reasons, he does not want to declare the real price of the sale and has established, as an obligatory requirement, to state a price below the real value on the title deed. Should I be wary of this stance?

In principle, it seems that the reason for this is simply to avoid paying all the tax. This would obviously constitute fraud, although depending on the circumstances and the amount that would not be declared, the tax administration might not be aware of it. In any case, if you are very interested in the property, you can always settle the tax according to the tax value of the property, and not the sale price. Actually, the tax regulation establishes that when settling the tax, it must be done according to the higher value, no matter if it is the price appearing in the deed or the tax value. If in this case, the tax value is higher than the sale price, you must calculate the tax according to this value. Nevertheless, when buying a property in Spain, and especially if it is in the countryside, it is highly advisable to hire the services of a lawyer to make sure that everything is done correctly, in order to avoid any kind of problems.

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# Still no win for Spain, but UK survives stage invasion

## Israel's Netta Barzilai eventually came out on top after a tumultuous Eurovision 2018

"They never rank highly, but they're always happy", said one Italian commentator of the eager Spaniards who queued under the blazing heat in Lisbon's Praça do Comércio on Saturday ahead of the Eurovision Song Contest final.

As it was held relatively close to home, the Spanish turnout at this year's event was particularly high, with over 400 fans arriving to watch the show in the Portuguese capital.

It had been 49 years since Spain won the European singing competition in 1969 with Salomé's 'Vivo Cantando'. This year's hopefuls did not manage to buck the trend. Couple Amaia and Alfred, from Pamplona and Barcelona, respectively, couldn't convert their chemistry into votes, coming 23rd with their rendition of Tu Canción (Your Song).

Israel's Netta Barzilai was crowned winner this year for her

song 'Toy', an anti-bullying anthem. Speaking to the press, the singer explained that her song was about "empowerment" and was "for those who have to fight to be themselves".

The UK entry, sung by SuRie, also caused a "storm". The singer was interrupted mid-way through

by a stage invader, who snatched her microphone and shouted about "Nazis of the UK media", before he was promptly removed by security guards. This temporarily left 29-year-old SuRie with no other option than to clap along to the music.

TV presenter, Graham Norton,

commentator on the UK coverage, was quick to praise the singer for her professional handling of the situation; the Brit quickly recovered, completing her song to rapturous applause and refusing the chance to perform again. This wasn't enough to pull in the votes however, as the UK finished just

behind Spain in 24th place.

The Israeli win was its fourth victory in the history of the competition and the first since 1998. Netta was presented the coveted crystal microphone by last year's winner, Salvador Sobral, who had previously criticised her song, calling it "horrible".

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# Finding enjoyable ways to make a living

**A trial year in Spain has led to the decision to stay here and the work portfolio is growing**

**R**eaders may be familiar with Ian Rutter's voice from his Life Stories programme on Talk Radio Europe. Classical music fans may also have heard him presenting his show on The Wireless Radio; an internet-based radio station.

Ian, 55, and his partner Andrew, live in the Lecrín Valley in Granada province and since they moved there in 2016 they have been extremely busy.

It's hard to know where to start with what Ian does. Andrew quite rightly describes him as an "entrepreneur" and that is probably the best way to sum him up. Ian himself will say he's a "Jack of all trades" and admits that he likes to "dabble" in as many things that interest him as possible.

Ian was born in Germany and as a child lived in Cyprus, England, and Northern Ireland as his father was a pilot in the RAF. He went to university in London, where he studied Architecture and later on spent time in Kent, although he says that he has "an affinity with Suffolk" and loves East Anglia as that's where his parents eventually settled.

Interestingly, Ian never really followed architecture as a career, although he has used his creative talents to other ends over the years. He admits that he really wanted to be an actor but that his father would never have supported such a career choice.

"Acting had to be funded privately and my dad wouldn't have paid for me," he explains, adding

opened a shop, and then went into the travel business. He went on to obtain a web design certificate and spent 10 years as a director of two digital marketing companies. Ian later moved back to London where he was able to put his business expertise to use in the charity sector, working first for Age UK and then for LGBT charity, Stonewall.

It was with Age UK that Ian got

his first radio gig. The charity had just launched a radio station and he was invited to present a classical music programme on a voluntary basis. This led to his programme on The Wireless Radio, 'Classical on The Wireless' and he has had the opportunity to interview some leading names in classical music, including Andrea Bocelli.

He approached TRE soon after

moving to Spain and was offered the Life Stories programme after submitting a pilot interview with his friend and neighbour in the Lecrín Valley, the artist, Roberta Gordon-Smith.

Ian says of the radio programme that it's given him "a fast track to a network of people here" and taken him to parts of Andalucía he "would never otherwise have seen", which has helped him and Andrew to settle here. He also says he's "fascinated" by the stories behind people's decisions to move to this part of Spain and has met some "incredibly interesting people".

Ian and Andrew were already familiar with southern Spain through Ian's work in the travel sector. He would visit Andalucía regularly, renting villas, but confesses that he had "never had any desire to live here". However, he discovered the space and beauty of inland Spain and tentatively suggested the idea of moving here for a year to Andrew "to see if we would like it", he explains, adding, "Fortunately Andrew said yes." He says he waited for someone to tell them "not to be ridiculous" but says that nobody did and within two weeks of moving here the couple knew they wouldn't be going back to the UK.

Another feather to Ian's bow is the TEFL qualification he did before coming to Spain, so that he could teach English as a foreign language, which he now does, part time in a private language school in Granada. He has also done a number of voice-overs for companies in Spain as well as for a Unesco project.


Both Ian and Andrew are artistic and are using their time in Spain to get back to doing what they love, after the frenetic lifestyle of London. ## “There’s still a bit of that working lad from Liverpool in me”

### Ringo Starr Musician

The Beatles drummer will be performing in Spain this summer along with his All-Starr Band with tracks from his own repertoire and those of his guests

When he came up with the idea of starting a group, the first All-Starr Band, with some friends, the legendary drummer with The Beatles was already a household name in the pop world, although his personal life had taken a downturn. Ringo Starr had just come out of a clinic, where he had gone to treat his alcoholism, and his wife, actress Barbara Bach, had done the same. He felt he needed to get back on stage and go on tour again to complete his recovery, and that is exactly what he did on 23 July 1989 in Dallas.

It was a gathering of historic names, like Joe Walsh of The Eagles, Nils Lofgren and Clarence Clemons of the E Street Band, Dr John, Billy Preston and Rick Dando of The Band, plus guest artists such as his son Zak Starkey, who is also a drummer, and Bruce Springsteen. The musician from a working-class family from Liverpool completely recovered his

vitality and also delighted fans with the setup, performing hits he had composed or sung with The Beatles, including Yellow Submarine. The other group members also chose songs from their repertoires.

With this same formula, and about to celebrate his 78th birthday, Ringo will be coming to Spain (26 June in Barcelona, 28 in Madrid, 29 in La Coruña and 1 July in Bilbao), but with other musicians because over time some have left the group and others have joined. In the concert they will also be performing numbers from Starr’s most recent disc Give More Love.

“I started the All-Stars after going through a bad time, with a very simple method. I opened my diary and started ringing friends to see if they wanted to join me and play. Dr John said yes, Clarence said yes...” says the pop legend in a phone conversation recently from his home in Los Angeles.

Nowadays he feels “blessed, happy”. He begins and ends his conversations with the words “peace and love”. He usually wears a necklace with the hippie symbol - “you’ll also see it at the concert” - and feels part of “the spirit of those years”. In 1968 The Beatles published the White Album, which he considers

### The four seconds of She Loves You

He joined The Beatles in 1962, at the start of his career, to replace Pete Best. He immediately became one of the most popular members of the group, especially in the USA, for his sense of humour and friendliness. For years his contribution to the band was underestimated. Now, however, the critics have high

praise for his role. The drum entry to She Loves You, the song that started Beatlemania, was completely marked by his forceful four seconds of drumming. Ringo hates drum solos. He says the sound of the drums should be the driving force of a song, providing the adrenaline rush, and that makes it very demanding to compose. For him, the idea of drumming isn’t to play something pretty.

one of the band’s landmarks. A year earlier they had recorded Yellow Submarine and a year afterwards came Sgt Pepper. It was the group’s most charismatic period, and the most creative. However, Ringo Starr believes that his true identity lies in another place and another time.

#### The cap and the hat

“OK, it’s true that a lot of things happened in those years, but my real movement, the one that marked me, was in the factories in Liverpool, in the 1950s. There’s still a bit of that working lad, who used to play music in the evenings, in me.”

Richard Starkey, Ringo’s real name, started working in 1955, when he was 15, on the British railways. They fired him because he didn’t want to wear a cap, and put a hat on instead. But that wasn’t his only experience of work and until the early 1960s, when he decided to dedicate himself to music, he was employed by a Liverpool equipment manufacturer. Today he has a fortune of approximately 200 million euros and has sold his mansion in England, although he still has a house in London, in Chelsea.


Industrial cities like Liverpool and Manchester have played an important role in pop music. How does the world’s most famous drummer explain that? “That was when there was music news for the first time, and we were doing everything they were doing in London. It was the same in Manchester and Birmingham. But I think there is a deeper reason, and that is ‘skiffle’, a very basic rock which we liked a lot and which you can play with a drum, in my case, and three guitar chords. That was all we needed, and that is what set us on the path.”

He started with a friend from the factory, in 1957. He played with different groups and in 1962 joined The Beatles, replacing Pete Best, who had failed to convince the other band members or their manager, Brian Epstein. As John Lennon has said, at that time Starr was one of the best-known musicians in Liverpool.

This will be the second time he has played in Spain. The first was in 1965. “Yes, in Madrid and somewhere else, I think it was Barcelona,” he says. That was during the Franco dictatorship, and it was a huge event. Some of the fans waiting to greet them at Barajas airport fainted, and there was all the excitement of Beatlemania.

“I remember it was important for you, but you have to understand: it was just two more concerts. The tours were long and it was our job to play. That’s all. We got off the plane, did the concert and then it was on to the next one,” he says.

Sixty years after playing on stage for the first time, he is still on the road. He doesn’t mind leaving the Californian sunshine and travelling in planes, buses and cars. “I suppose the sun in Spain is the same as in California, isn’t it? I’m a musician, someone who tries to entertain people. That’s what I do and I still enjoy it. I’m just grateful that I dedicated myself to music. When the evening of a concert arrives, I feel really good. I’m with the other musicians and it’s great. I love the public, and the public loves me. Peace and love, brother.”

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## Warm welcome for barefoot runner

Julia Chi Taylor arrived in Almuñécar after crossing Spain to raise funds for Cudeca

**TORRE DEL MAR.** British athlete, Julia Chi Taylor has achieved her goal. She arrived in Almuñécar last Saturday, on her 59th birthday, after running 1,000 kilometres barefoot across Spain.

Julia started her epic journey in the town of Suances in Cantabria on 23 March and ran down through the centre of the country.

"I think I more or less followed the route that planes take when they fly to England," she says. She was running to raise money for Cudeca and for the Friends of Sussex Hospices charity in England.

The runner was joined by friends and well-wishers in Almuñécar, who had organised a birthday party, complete with banner and cake, for her arrival. Julia says that the idea to run barefoot across Spain "just formed" and "that was it"; she knew she had to do it. She explains that for her running barefoot is just as natural as "walking to the shop to get the newspaper in the mornings".

### Wet weather

Julia was joined by other runners who had heard about her journey along the way and says that she was rarely

alone. Over the 43 days that she was running she averaged 25 kilometres per day and had a rest day every five.

"The rest was mainly for my feet which took quite a pounding," she explains.

Julia laughs as she points out that she managed to choose "probably the wettest weather Spain has ever had", referring to the unusually high rain-

fall that the whole country experienced during March and April. She says that running barefoot in the rain is harder than running when it is dry and the weather conditions, which included snow in some parts of Spain, made the challenge "much more difficult" than she had anticipated.

Julia is a marathon runner and her first international race was in Man-

resa, Spain, in 1979 when she was 19. She went on to represent the UK in races and marathons until 1993, winning the 1985 Dublin City Marathon and obtaining her best time at the 1986 London Marathon with 2 hours 36 minutes and 31 seconds when she finished in seventh position, which in turn got her selected for the Commonwealth Games.

Julia was born in West Africa to "colonialist parents" and moved back to England when she was four. She explains that she has loved Spain ever since she came for that first race in 1979, so much so that she now spends more time here than in the UK as she is learning Spanish. "I want to speak Spanish as fluently as I do English," she admits.

Julia divides her time in Spain between the villages of the Alpujarra and coastal Almuñécar in Granada province. "I am really drawn to Almuñécar," says the runner.

### Running and Zen

Cancer hospice charity Cudeca is close to Julia's heart as she lost her own mother to the disease 42 years ago. "When my mother died I was just 16 years old and she was the most important person in my life," she says, adding, "My mother understood my passion for running."

After losing her mother Julia sought refuge in the world of running and Zen philosophy; rigorous self-control, meditation and insight into Buddhism, particularly for the benefit of others. And this is something that she has used throughout her life. She explains that for her running is always a journey. She says that she will be spending some time now in the Granada Alpujarra for a well-earned rest but she will be keeping her mind active by continuing with Spanish classes while she is there.


# The ultimate blueprint for empire building is published

Throughout the 400 years of Spanish presence in the Americas and the Philippines, interactions between settlers and natives threw up complications that Castilian law was not equipped to deal with. As a result, a new legal solution needed to be found.

Through the 'Leyes de Indias' (the Laws of the Indies), a series of decrees issued by the Spanish crown, an attempt to regulate social, political and economic life across the empire was made.

The Laws of Burgos (1512) and the New Laws (1542) established norms for the early colonies, including forbidding the maltreatment of the indigenous people and endorsing their conversion to Catholicism. The system of 'encomiendas' was also created, where the native people were grouped together to work

under a colonial head of the estate for a salary.

However, a series of abuses and a problem with levels of compli-

ance led to the so-called Valladolid debate which took place during 1550 and 1551. This was the first moral discussion over the rights and treatment of a colonised people ever to take place in Europe. A number of views about the way natives should be integrated into colonial life, their conversion to Christianity and their rights and obligations were shared by some of the great theologians of the time including Bartolomé de Las Casas, the most persistent defender of the Indians during the early years of the Spanish conquest.

The ideas that Las Casas presented during the great debate influenced the development of the Laws of the Indies and the rights of Indian peoples over the next 300 years.

French historian, Jean Dumont, described the Valladolid debate as a major turning point in world his-

tory, "the dawn of human rights". Ultimately, however, abuses continued, even after indigenous people were placed officially under the protection of the Crown.

Further laws were passed in 1573. These were considered the first wide-ranging guidelines towards design and development of communities and included 148 ordinances to aid colonists in locating, building, and populating settlements.

Heavily influenced by Vitruvius' Ten Books of Architecture and the theories of Leon Battista Alberti's, they codified the city planning process and established a blueprint which would taken around the world.

It was decided, for example, that towns should be built in an elevated position, around a central Plaza Mayor (main square), from which twelve straight streets are built in a rectilinear grid. The style of buildings, the ordinance said, should be "all of one type for the sake of the beauty of the town".

However, due to the vast quantity of laws which had been passed over more than a hundred years of colonisation, in on 18 May 1680 under Charles II, the 'Recopilación de las Leyes' (Compilation of the Laws) was published.

This became considered the classic collection of the laws and was a major milestone in colonial history.

While on the one hand it was criticised for depriving indigenous people a responsible role in government, its inconsistencies, excessive attention to ceremonial matters and virtually unenforceable commercial regulations, it was nonetheless the most comprehensive law code ever instituted for a colonial empire and established progressive and humane principles, even if they were ignored.

## Phygelius x. rectus

**An upright perennial shrub with fuchsia-like blooms that will keep flowering right through the summer until autumn**

Also called Cape Fuchsia or Cape figwort, *Phygelius x. rectus* is a hardy perennial shrub native to South Africa. It forms an upright mound of bright green foliage 60 cm to one metre tall by about 1.20

metres wide and once established, is drought hardy for short periods. The fuchsia-like flowers form in showy panicles from mid-summer through to mid or end of the

autumn and are in shades of salmon-red through to orange, with a yellow throat. There is also a creamy yellow version called *P. x. rectus* 'Moonraker'.

*Phygelius* is a member of the Scrophulariaceae family related to snapdragons and fox-gloves. It needs an organically rich, well-drained soil and will increase in size but sending up suckers. It can be invasive if growing in ideal conditions but it is easy to remove the suckers which will provide new plants if potted up. It

can also be propagated from soft wood cuttings in the spring. Besides making a good border plant it can also be grown in a container which will prevent it from spreading.

After a couple of years, the base of the Cape Fuchsia may become quite woody so it is a good idea to cut it back hard every spring. Although not frost tolerant, it should survive in cooler, inland areas if given a thick layer of mulch in the autumn.

Dead-heading will promote new blooms which attract bees and butterflies. According to English botanist and botanical illustrator W. J. Hooker, the genus name could possibly come from the Greek word 'phyge' meaning 'flight or avoidance'. He wrote in 1855 that this was because "it has so long escaped the research of botanists".

## GARDENING HINTS

## What does it all mean?

Remembering and pronouncing binominal plant names are hard enough (unless you know some Latin or even Greek), but did you ever wonder what the 'x' in the middle of some botanical names stood for? It's simply to indicate that the plant is a hybrid of two species within a genus, although it doesn't tell you who the parents are. An example is the plant in the article, *Phygelius x. rectus*. In this case it is a cross between *P. aequalis* and *P. capensis*. To make it a bit more complicated, there may be 'cv.' followed by another name in commas; an example of this is *Rhododendron cv. 'Sayling'*. The 'cv.' stands for 'cultivar' and identifies a plant

that does not occur naturally and has been purposely bred to produce certain characteristics. This gives some fabulous variations to an already extensive range of plants within each genus but keep in mind that hybrids and cultivars are unlikely to produce offspring that is true to the parent from seed. Often the seed will revert to one of the parents or be infertile. And then there's 'var.' Var. stands for variety, and unlike cv., refers to a plant that has evolved naturally, such as *Kalmia latifolia var. occidentalis*. Saving seed from varieties, as long as they haven't been cross pollinated, should come true to the parent plant.

# Local permaculture project goes to school

Students at Sotogrande International School embarked on a project designed to teach them about environment care for the future

**MALAGA.** Having been inspired by well known environmentalists such as Drew Dillinger, Sotogrande students recently visited the Danyadara farm to learn about the permaculture project. Permaculture aims to mimic natural ecosystems to produce food while regenerating, as opposed to degenerating, the natural world.

Jacob Evans, head of the farm, and his colleague Jon Valdivia are not your stereotypical farmers. At 27 years old Jacob has already travelled extensively in Spain and Latin America, developing a phenomenal knowledge of permaculture techniques and practices.

Jacob and Jon explained permaculture's core principles to a group of 60 students against a soundtrack of hip hop beats and high definition videos.

Throwing old jeans to the worms

in compost baths, enjoying outdoor showers (the water from which feeds vegetable plots) and growing an edible food forest are just some of the ways in which Jacob and Jon explained that food can be produced using 'closed loop systems' whereby waste is reduced. The Danyadara project is demonstrating that desertification in Andalucia can be reversed using such techniques and provide plentiful and delicious food, increasing biodiversity and allowing children to have a lot of fun in the process.

Inspired by this talk, students set to work in beginning to design the school's own permaculture project. Working in mixed groups, they began to choose the ingredients that they hoped to include in their school-grown, end-of-term lunches.

The school also brought scientists over to test pH values and nutrient levels in order to monitor the impact of permaculture techniques on the fertility of the school's soil. Technology and construction enthusiasts began designing outdoor showers (to include shower heads produced using 3D printers and recycled plastic bottles) and a collection of plastic bottles is under way in order to construct a recycled plastic greenhouse.

Miss Stone, who helped organise the event, said: "The children absolutely loved the opportunity to show off their talents and perform to an audience. ## A WHITER SHADE OF WINE



**A**nyone fortunate enough to have been in Malaga on Monday would have had the opportunity to taste more than a hundred white wines from the region of north-west Spain known as Rías Baixas. And although it has been 30 years since it changed its official title from Albariño, there are still faithful fans that continue to use the previous name. It is allegedly commercial suicide to vary a brand name, but this Galician region of lakes and fjords had no choice when Brussels mandated that grape nomenclature could no longer be used to describe wine-growing areas.

Through a mixture of good luck and good judgement the winemakers of this beautiful Spanish region have not only survived but also increased their sales all over the world. Not for the cheap and cheerful brigade, these wines have a quality and a class that can be favourably compared with those from the Rhine, with which region they share latitude and weather, giving credence to the legend that the vines were originally brought from Germany by the monks of Cluny.

The Albariño grape is allegedly rot-proof, but it is better to keep it off the ground, so vines are hoisted up on pergolas supported by stone posts. All very

labour-intensive making for costs that cannot compete with southern rivals. Added to which the grapes are among the most expensive variety used, and as well as Albariño there are three other types employed. In common with Portuguese *vinhos verdes*, made just across the border, there is nothing better to accompany shellfish of any type. On the Costa there are a few excellent Galician restaurants that serve a *mariscada*, a selection of seafood containing everything from soft-shelled crab to razor fish and always shipped from Galicia – not for the faint-hearted either financially or gastronomically. A little-known fact about these Albariños is that they do not have to be drunk young. Indeed a 4 or 5 year old wine is often more enjoyable than a younger one.'

### WINE OF THE WEEK

#### Martín Códax Albariño

This bodega (founded in 1986) is the region's largest co-operative, and it keeps tabs on its members around the year. There is a wide range of Galician wines of different varieties, but its Rías Baixas Albariño is a classic and widely available in stores and restaurants along the Coast. Around 9 euros.



# A winery launches the first sparkling wine in Malaga made by the Champenoise method

Antonio Muñoz Cabrera-Dimobe has developed a 'brut nature' that is aged for thirty months in the bottle and made with 100% muscatel grapes

**MOCLINEJO.** Malaga has been producing sparkling wines since 2013, a product that is greatly appreciated by Costa consumers. The first to dare to make this type of wine in the province was Bodega Jorge Ordóñez, which today has two bubbly varieties, Botani Espumoso (sweet muscatel) and Botani Muscat (dry muscatel). Bodegas Quitapenas has four varieties, (sweet and dry Florestel and Tachín semi-dry and Feria). Tierras de Molina produces three, (Apiane dry, rosé and muscatel) and Casa de Guardia has a brut and a semi-dry with D.O. Cava, made in Requena, not in Malaga.

Another winery that has its own sparkling wine is Victoria Ordóñez, Las Olas del Melillero rosé, made with Pedro Ximénez, Petit Verdot, Syrah and Tempranillo varieties of grapes, all grown in the Parque Natural Montes de Málaga.

Tartratos will soon be added to this list of sparkling wines, a brut nature aged for 30 months in the bottle in the style of the French

Champagnes but made in Malaga.

This new sparkling wine is made from 100 percent Muscatel grapes, harvested in 2015 and before they were quite ripe. After spending several months in a stainless steel tank, the resulting liquid was bottled in the 'traditional method', also called 'methode champenoise', which is carried out to make the sparkling wines of the Champagne region (France). This method consists of provoking a second ferment-

tation of the wine in the bottle. After ageing for 30 months, Tartratos is ready for sale. Dimobe wants to present and launch its new product before the summer. In total, he has produced 4,000 bottles.

According to Juan Muñoz, almatier of the Moclinejo winery, "the look of the label is still being finalised and the wine has turned out great, hence there is a hurry to put it on sale".



# A 'king' of fishes in the heart of Malaga

Gastronomy and culture at the 2nd Jornadas del Atún Rojo organised by El Pimpi and La Sole

Until 20 May, El Pimpi and El Sole in Malaga are offering a variety of dishes prepared with fresh tuna besides their usual menu

**MALAGA.** It is possible that at some time in the past, an enormous bluefin tuna (*Thunnus thynnus*), caught in the Mediterranean, was carried through the narrow streets of a Muslim Malaga to a market as the flesh of this fish has always been prized in the Mediterranean. The tuna fishing industry was a source of work for many along the coast during the annual migrations of the fish in spring and at the end of the summer.

Few traces of the ancient fishing industry remain on the Malaga coast but the historical connection is still in existence as hundreds of amazed tourists and a number of journalists discovered recently. At approximately 1pm on 10 May, a bluefin tuna weighing almost 350 kilos was gutted and filleted on the terrace of the El Pimpi bar in Calle Alcazabilla, Malaga.

This 'ronqueo' as it is called in Spanish, was the inaugural event for the 2nd Jornadas del Atún El Pimpi y La Sole which, with the collaboration of the Román y Martos company and brewery Cerveza Victoria, will offer various events until Sunday 20 May.

A special menu was prepared by El Pimpi's chef Andrés Romero and La Sole's chef, Juanjo Perles for a dinner at the Cerveza Victoria brewery yesterday and various experts helped to give the guests a complete history of tuna fishing and gastronomy of the region.

The supplier of the tuna was the Román y Martos company, the only

business in the province that has its own boat for bluefin tuna fishing and the means to prepare the fish properly. Lorenzo Monio, responsible for marketing the company's bluefin tuna explained, "we take care of every part of the process, from stunning the tuna at the moment of capture to avoid suffering, having cushioned the deck of the

boats so it does not get bruised, to staff trained in techniques for the rapid exsanguination and the Japanese ikejime method that is used to immediately annul nervous reflexes and guarantee that the meat is of the best quality."

An experienced team of ronqueadores deals with the filleting. Ronqueadores that last Thursday took no

more than 15 minutes to divide up the giant fish.

Until Sunday, besides the usual menu, El Pimpi and El Sole will be offering a wide variety of tuna dishes inspired by the orient such as Japanese tuna tataki and chirasi tartare with tuna, ginger and spring onion as well as tuna prepared in more traditional ways.

# The long spicy history of the tomato

## The Spaniards brought the strange new fruit from the New World to Europe

The Aztecs introduced the conquistadores to many new foods such as maize, chocolate, turkey, peppers, vanilla, pineapple and the tomato

**MÁLAGA.** The season for the mainstay of the Mediterranean diet, the tomato, is nearly here and it's hard to believe that just 500 years ago it was unknown.

Dishes that we consider as Spanish, such as gazpacho or pisto, did not have tomatoes or peppers back then. There were no tomato salads or cod in tomato sauce either, and the Italians did not even have the faintest idea that their gastronomy would become world famous thanks to the pasta with tomato. The tomato, or *Solanum lycopersicum*, would not be discovered by the European palate until the year 1519, during the conquest of Mexico in the unknown territories of the New World.

Among the many foods that the Spaniards got to know thanks to the Aztecs (maize, chocolate, turkey, pepper, vanilla, pineapple, avocado...) one stood out. The natives used it to temper the chili in sauces and stews, the *tomátl*. Originally from the Andean coast, it had been domesticated in Mesoamerica for five thousand years, giving rise to different varieties that were identified with different prefixes on the root *tomatl* (fat fruit):

*xaltomatl*, *izhoatomatl*, *miltomatl*, *xitomatl* in the Náhuatl language. Of these, the most appreciated were the *miltomatl* or *tomatillo verde* and the red *xitomatl* (navel tomato), which was sweeter and fleshier. Both types were used by the Aztecs to reduce the hotness of the chili in tamales, moles and sauces.

With so many different *tomátl*s the Spaniards became confused and ended up calling all of them 'pomate' or 'tomato', a word that Sahagún used for the first time in the mid-sixteenth century to describe the juicy fruits that could be green, yellow or red.

Francisco Hernández de Toledo, a physician and botanist from Toledo who directed the first scientific exploration of the New World between 1571 and 1577, also wrote of having tasted the tomato. In his book 'Recurum medicarum Novae Hispaniae Thesaurus', a posthumous work partially published in 1648, he indicated that tomatoes crushed with chili made a very good sauce (*intinctus gratissimus*), which enhanced the taste of almost all other dishes and aroused the appetite.

It is believed that the tomato moved from Tenochtitlan to Spain

very quickly, although more as a botanical curiosity than anything else. The yellow variety was taken to Italy, which is why naturalist Pietro Andrea Mattioli baptised tomatoes in 1544 as 'pomi d'oro' or *pomodoro*. He was the first to officially confirm tomato consumption in the Old World, indicating that the common people ate it fried in oil, with salt and pepper.

For a long time the tomato was a food for humble people due to the fear it caused in enlightened society. Why? The reason was that it was related to other *Solanaceae*

plants such as belladonna, datura and mandrake, which were toxic and suspected of being used for magic, making poisons and as an aphrodisiac. As had happened with the tomato's distant cousin the potato, the tomato was seen by some as a potentially dangerous food and was therefore avoided as a regular ingredient at grand tables.

In spite of the doubts that people had, the tomato quickly acclimatised to Spanish soil and in 1592 it was already cultivated in the Casa de Campo in Madrid. We know this thanks to Felipe II's botanist, Gregorio de los Ríos, who in his "Agriculture of Gardens" (1592) advised planting "pomates" in March and April as "they say they are good for salsa".

The Spaniards at first used the tomato in the same way it was used in the New World. Little by little, thanks to the fact that the poorest people made good guinea pigs, it was found that tomatoes were safe to eat. New sweeter varieties also emerged, so the image of that foreign ingredient began to change and become accepted in the diet of the privileged classes.

In 1639 there is talk of the slight indisposition of Queen Isabella of France, wife of Philip IV, due to a possible over eating of tomatoes and throughout the seventeenth century it appears as a common ingredient in salads and other dishes in the poems of Quevedo and Sor Manuela de San Felix.

However it was an Italian who is credited as the author of the first recipe using tomatoes. Antoni Latini (1642-1696) chef to the governor of Naples Esteban Carrillo y Salcedo, included various recipes with tomatoes in his book 'Lo Salco Alla Moderna'. But with due credit to Spain, every single dish in it that uses tomatoes has the suffix 'alla Spagnola'.



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# Localised fat

Asturias, Galicia and Andalucía have the highest number of overweight people in Spain. The fault does not lie in cuisine or climate, but with income and education standards

The most famous dishes in Asturias are 'cachopo' (fried veal fillets with ham and cheese) and 'fabes', a bean stew with plenty of rich trimmings, made to bolster you during the harsh winter months. In Andalucía, the local cuisine is gazpacho and fried fish, light meals that are perfect for keeping cool under the hot sun.

However, both of these communities find themselves among the top end of the rankings for obesity in Spain. Asturias is in first place,

home to 25.7% of the country's population of obese adults; while Andalucía is third, (just behind Galicia) with 24.4%. This epidemic comes hand in hand with serious health problems, such as diabetes, strokes and cancer, as well as enormous economic costs to health services and employers.

According to data, the root cause is not related to geography or climate, rather a combination of factors centred around income and standards of education. "Eating badly is cheaper," declares dietary nutritionist Aitor Sánchez.

The source of this data is the Study of Nutrition for the Population of Spain (ENPE), which studied a sample of almost 4,000 people, aged between 25 and 64, from all over the country. In addition to questioning them about their food and exercise habits, the researchers, coordinated by professor Carmen Pérez Rodrigo of the University of the Basque Country, registered the height and weight of all participants to determine their Body Mass Index (BMI), which is calculated by dividing weight (in kilograms) by height (in metres) and squaring the result. A number higher

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than 25 indicates that the subject is overweight and higher than 30 means they are obese. The researchers also measured abdominal obesity – the most dangerous form – which is found in men with a waistline of in excess of 102 centimetres and in women with one over 88. The results are alarming, especially among men, and they worsen with age.

Following closely behind the three regions with highest obesity levels are Murcia (23.9%), Madrid (23.8%), Aragón (23.7%), Castilla-La Mancha (23.6%), Castilla-León (22.1%), Navarra (20.9%) and the Canaries (20.1%), though in previous studies this final percentage has been higher.

However, even the regions with lower rates of obesity – Balearic Islands (10.5%), Catalonia (15.5%), Basque Country (16.8%), Cantabria (17.6%), La Rioja (17.9%), Extremadura (19%) and Valencia (19.8%) – are not exempt from the problem. Aside from the Balearic Islands (with 42.7%), at least half of citizens in each of these communities are overweight, ranging from 50.7% in the Basque Country to 66.8% in Asturias.

The study is consistent with others that have come before it – like the European Health Survey in Spain of 2014 – and shows similar regional patterns. Pérez Rodrigo, president of the Spanish Society for Community Nutrition, admits that

**Not long ago, an abundance of meat was a sign of opulence. You just need to look at the canons of the art world; the glorification of fat women with cellulite in the paintings of Rubens is a far cry from the dangerously thin models seen on catwalks today.**

**Nowadays, obesity – the second largest cause of preventable death on the planet – is increasingly linked to poverty.**

**The number of overweight people (1.9 billion) is more than double that of those malnourished (800 million). In developing countries they live side by side: individuals who are emaciated through lack of nutrients and people that stuff themselves with fast food.**

**It is not rare for someone to suffer ailments associated with over-eating – diabetes, stress, apnea or artery problems – alongside malnutrition.**

**Sudden dietary changes caused by the consumption of high-fat, high-sugar foods, have brought about a health-related disaster in Pacific Islands like Tonga, Samoa, Nauru, Palau and the Cook Islands, where one in two residents are obese.**

they lack concrete data, but stresses that there is a relation between low standards of education and low income and excessive bodyweight.


The most prosperous autonomous communities are also those that suffer least from the obesity epidemic. With the exception of Madrid and Aragón, the regions with an above-average GDP – the Basque Country, Navarra, Catalonia, La Rioja and the Balearic Islands – are the ‘thinnest’.

Aitor Sánchez, blogger and author of ‘Mi dieta cojea’, (My diet is bad), rejects the idea that a

healthy diet is costly, but does admit that that foodstuffs with a lower nutritional quality like sweets, baked goods and ultra-processed products, are both low in price and taste good. They contain more sugar, more salt, more fat and more flavourings, are convenient, as often need little preparation, and they last longer than fresh products. For these reasons, their production is in high demand. “Twelve croissants at the supermarket cost the same as one avocado,” Sanchez explains.

Pérez Rodrigo points out that,

though its too soon to make any conclusions, it has been noticed that within the population groups where the common diet is that of the Mediterranean – more fruits, vegetables and olive oil and less red, processed meat and sweets – there are fewer recorded overweight people. “It’s not the post-war era Mediterranean diet,” he explains, because lifestyles have changed and cars and sedentary work environments have reduced the energy we expend during the day. “In the Basque Country at the start of the 20th century, a person would

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➤ consume a kilogramme of bread every day. Today we only eat about 70 or 80 grammes.”

Standards of education are also a determinant in what we choose to eat. According to the aforementioned European survey, rates of obesity in people with a basic level of education are double that of those who go to university (22.76% and 9.62%, respectively). This trend is even more prominent among the elderly and among women, where rates are tripled.

Dietary nutritionist Juan Revenga, author of 'Adelgázame, miéntame' (Make me thinner, lie to me), believes that consumers receive biased and contradictory information about food, which makes it difficult to make sensible decisions. For example, the same food companies that sell high-calorie and dangerous products, like fizzy drinks, sweets, cold meats

### Measuring body fat

The Spanish Society for the Study of Obesity seeks financial help for a study surrounding excess weight, which will include the measuring of body fat using bioimpedance techniques. Its vice president, Diego Bellido, explains that BMI - which only takes weight and height into account - is not a viable tool to indicate whether someone is

overweight. People with a high percentage of muscle mass, such as body builders, may have the same BMI as someone who is obese.

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# Singing for a new smile

**A gala at the Edgar Neville Auditorium will raise funds for Míriam Gómez, a young woman with Down's syndrome who needs costly dental work**

**MALAGA.** Music fans in Malaga will have the chance to see popular performers Mariló Ruiz, Mayte Adrián, Carmen Rivas, José Ortiz, Conchi Matas, José María Uría and Lidia Prada at a benefit gala tomorrow, 19 May, at the provincial government's Edgar Neville auditorium. The aim is to raise enough funds to give a new smile to Míriam Gómez, a 34-year-old woman with Down's syndrome.

Míriam has to undergo expensive dental work due to a serious mouth infection. Her mother, Inmaculada Gómez, is moving heaven and earth in search of a solution for her daughter. "The doctors have told us that this type of infection (severe periodontal disease) is more common in people

that have Down's syndrome. The public health service has given us a solution which will do more harm than good. They suggest pulling out the teeth gradually, which would take more than a year to complete. Meanwhile, Míriam would continue to lose bone mass in her mouth. She is barely able to eat as it is and what she does eat must not require chewing, something that is worsening the kidney failure from which she already suffers," Gómez explains.

A private clinic in Malaga is offering another solution, but it is incredibly costly, even after a considerable price reduction. "The clinic will use Míriam's case as part of their training programme, which means that other dentists will be able to observe Míriam's operation. This

will take the price from 32,000 to 16,632 euros. We have raised 2,700 ourselves from family members, but due to our situation [Míriam's mother is retired due to a disability], this is all we can afford," says Inmaculada, who has started a social media campaign to drum up funding support from her fellow citizens "even if it's just one euro."

Inmaculada is also the Malaga president for Síndrome Contenta,

an organisation which advocates for the increased social inclusion of those who have Down's syndrome.

She asks that the gala is publicised so that the clinic is able to "begin urgent treatment", for which they now need 6,800 euros.



**TORREMOLINOS.** Torremolinos will be hosting the biggest gay party of the year. Under the slogan of '50 Años Siendo Visibles' (50 years of being visible) the festival will begin on 26 May and continue until 3 June.

Organised by Torremolinos town hall and several local LGBT associations, the event will serve to highlight the rights of coexistence, diversity, visibility and equality of the LGBT collective. The nine-day festival will present a series of live music concerts, comedy drag shows,

films, beach and pool parties, competitions, workshops and colourful street parades.

The event attracted more than 40,000 people last year, so this edition has been extended by five days, making it one of the biggest gay events in Spain. The fun starts on Saturday 26 May at midday, with a volleyball championship on the Bajondillo

beach, followed by an inaugural party at 10pm in the Sala Centuryon in Torremolinos.

Several educational and cultural activities will take place in the streets of the town centre until Wednesday, when the town hall will raise the rainbow flag at the town hall building at 1pm. This will mark the official start of the daytime party in Plaza La Nogalera. Here locals and visitors will enjoy an array of activities, including the Proud Pet Competition, performances of the local LGBT chorus and shows by outrageous drag queens like Satin, Kelly and Darkyta.

The main concerts of the festival will be held in Plaza La Nogalera on Friday 1 and Saturday 2 June at 9pm. The lineup includes some of Spain's top artists, such as 90s pop sensation, Azúcar Moreno, and Eurovision winner Massiel.

The highlight of the event is the Gay Pride Parade, which takes place at 8pm on Saturday 2 June. This colourful event has the ambiance of carnival because of the ostentatious outfits of the participants, who wind their way from the town hall to the Plaza La Nogalera.

The final act of the festival is the massive beach party in Bajondillo, which starts at 4pm and continues until the early hours on Sunday 3 June.

## Sting, Jamiroquai and Pet Shop Boys sign up for Starlite

Spanish artists Luis Miguel and Pablo López will be performing alongside big international superstars at this year's Starlite Festival

**MARBELLA.** At one time there were doubts about whether the Marbella music festival would take place this year. However, the organisation has been name-dropping its 2018 lineup on an almost weekly basis. The list is characterised by its size (with 33 more DJ sets) and by the noticeable number of Latino artists among the list of main acts. Still, big international names like Sting, Jamiro-

quai, Charles Aznavour and Pet Shop Boys come together with the Spanish offering to form a lineup that caters for everyone.

Although deciding on a headline act proved difficult, Luis Miguel, one of the most famous names in Latin music, will open the festival on Wednesday 11 July. The Mexican artist has sold more than 100 million albums worldwide, he has a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame and he's won six Grammys

and four Latin Grammys. Among the Latin stars performing at the festival will be Maná (25 July); Luis Fonsi (26 July); Romeo Santos (31 July) and Juanes (10 August).

English-speaking artists will also arrive in force on the costa during July and August. Heading up the list is Sting (19 July), who returns to the Costa del Sol after playing at Fuengirola's Mare Nostrum Festival in 2017. Composer, performer, actor and activist, Sting has 16

Grammy awards and a Golden Globe.

Jamiroquai (22 July) is another of the groups that will delight audiences in the Nagüeles Quarry. Formed in 1992 by Jay Kay, the pioneers of 'future funk' have revolutionised the world of sound, establishing themselves as one of the most successful groups on the planet.

With more than 50 million albums sold, four Grammy awards, four Billboard awards and one Emmy, Steven Tyler of Aerosmith will also take to the stage on 2 August. To add, James Blunt will perform on 3 August and crowds can expect to hear his world-famous single, 'You're Beautiful'.

### Spain is top in sales

If the festival has learnt anything since it started, it's that it does not necessarily need international artists in order to achieve commercial success. In fact, the Spanish performers are those that have sold the most tickets.

So far, the only sold-out date is that of the Fuengirola-born Pablo López (4 August). The artist is returning home after his Santa Libertad tour to sing songs from his latest album, 'Camino, fuego y libertad' ('Road, fire and freedom'). "In this recording I go through everything," he says. "My life, my story, even my home". López describes song writing as "a journey through emotions".

Another local artist, Pablo Alborán, will play his third concert in the province since the year began. Tickets for his performance can be found on the Starlite web page, but few remain. The artist returns to the stage with his fourth studio album 'Prometo' ('I promise'). Alborán is one of Spain's most prominent artists, at just 28 years old he's





In the closing stages the tempo of the match tapered off and Malaga's control became less absolute. Contreras instructed his side to play more defensively in order to see out the game, and SPA seemed to have lost any kind of conviction to win the match.

The final whistle was celebrated as if Malaga had been promoted. The future looks bright; if Malaga keep playing this well they will achieve promotion and usher in a bright new era for women's football.

**MÁLAGA.** Malaga are closing in on a return to the Primera División. This is not so much shown by their results and their points haul (six out of six) but also their superiority in front of both teams they have faced so far in the promotion play-offs.

During Sunday's tie, they were far superior to SPA of Alicante, a testament to the methods of their trainer Antonio Contreras. Malaga's promotion could be confirmed as early as Sunday 27 May if they win

in Arguineguín (Gran Canaria). For this to happen, Fermarguín would have to defeat or draw with SPA (while Malaga have a week off next weekend).

Unlike in their first play-off match, Malaga overwhelmed their rivals from the first whistle. Free

from the nerves that gripped the team in the first stage of this decisive phase of the season, the Blue and Whites came to overwhelm, to intimidate, and succeeded with a winning strategy based on pressure and determination.

Adriana had two excellent chances

early on. In the first, she had an excellent opportunity to score but inexplicably missed the target, and afterwards Paula, who spotted the space, sent an excellent ball into the box, but the captain's rushed shot sailed over the goal.

The first half was a more unpredictable affair than the match played in Cártama a week before. Malaga took the initiative and dominated possession, but SPA proved that they were also capable of posing a threat.

Marina Martí was perhaps the best player for the side from Alicante; she came very close to assisting after made a measured pass to Claudia, who could only find the post from only a few yards out. Pepa failed to capitalise on the rebound.

## Asserting dominance

That was in the 18th minute, and although neither side had fully settled into the match, SPA would not get any another clear goalscoring opportunity.

Malaga continued to put pressure on their opponents, with runs from Shiv and energy of Meri causing problems.

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# Husillos quits as Al-Thani decides to restructure the club once more

The Malaga club owner has decided that Juan Ramón Muñoz is the man he wants to oversee all sporting operations

**MALAGA.** As Malaga's rivals are preparing for life in Segunda next year, the Costa del Sol club is in complete turmoil. A replacement for head coach José González, whose contract expires after Saturday's clash against Getafe, is yet to be found and the man who was charged with this appointment has now reportedly quit.

Though not officially announced, sporting director Mario Husillos has resigned from his post after club owner Sheikh Abdullah Al-Thani publicly closed the door on the appointment of former Granada, Levante and Elche boss Lucas Alcaraz, tweeting: "With my respect to Mr Lucas Alcaraz It's not our options I wish to him very successfully with another team [sic]."

This public undermining of Husillos' authority was the final straw. When negotiating his return to the club with the sheikh's sons Nasser and Nayef in late 2017, Husillos demanded that there be no interference on the sporting side of operations and that any of the

sheikh's opinions be kept private. This had been the case until last Friday when the sheikh's tweet broke that dynamic.

Husillos let it be known immediately that he would be leaving the club, informing club lawyer Joaquín Jofre (who is effectively the only person involved in running the club outside of the Al-Thani family) that he would continue working until the termination of his contract was confirmed but that he would not be taking any decisions and would not be "making the team". This means that any negotiations that he had been carrying out are now at risk of collapsing and the club could find itself paralysed until Husillos' departure is sealed.

## The sheikh's new plan

It is understood that Sheikh Al-Thani will not seek to replace Husillos and will instead revert to the formula which he tried to implement upon arriving at the club.

His first managerial appointment after buying Malaga was that of Jesualdo Ferreira. The Portuguese, who had very little knowledge of Spanish football, was appointed as a general manager and was tasked with coaching the squad, as well as overseeing player recruitment.

# Further woe inflicted on Malaga with drubbing at the hands of Espanyol

The Costa side found themselves three goals down after a nightmare opening half an hour

of space down the right, his measured cross found Sergio García who showed much greater desire than



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
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However, after a disastrous five-month spell and some peculiar signings, Ferreira was replaced by Manuel Pellegrini as head coach and Antonio Fernández as sporting director.

This time round, though, Al-Thani is convinced that the system will work and his preferred candidate for the role is former coach Juan Ramón Muñiz.

The sheikh has studied Muñiz's role in earning promotion for Malaga in the 2007-08 season - a season during which he carried out the role outlined.

The coach, however, has already twice refused the Malaga job in the last two months (he was also Husillos' first choice) having been unconvinced by the sporting project and the sheikh's interference in daily operations. However, the sheikh is confident that if offered the chance to oversee the entire sporting project, Muñiz would find the Malaga job, one close to his heart, hard to refuse.

Negotiations on this front, though, can't begin until Husillos' future is resolved. Having seen his working conditions compromised, and therefore the terms of his contract broken, the sporting director is holding out for a pay-off.

## Protest planned ahead of Getafe clash tomorrow

**"Malaga supporters want answers," the statement reads. "We want to know who is responsible and get explanations from them. We want to know the plan in place to return Malaga to Primera and for Al-Thani either to put someone who understands football in control of the club or for him to sell up."**

**"Malaga CF belongs to the people of the city so we are calling on everyone to take part, from politicians and business owners, to the university and the press."**

Roberto Rosales to prod home his side's second.

It was three less than four minutes later when Sergio García easily outmuscled Luis Hernández on the edge of the box before threading the ball through to Baptista whose shot across Prieto found the bottom corner.

López may be called up again on Saturday in the final game of the season against Getafe after both Rosales and Ignasi Miquel were ruled out after both picking up their fifth bookings of the season.

# A bastion of stability

**Once a club where the manager very rarely outlasted the president's cigar... now look at Atlético!**

Longest serving manager, purpose-built stadium, crazed fans and a loyal squad of players, Atlético Madrid must now be regarded as the model for all football clubs to follow.

Diego Simeone has delivered his sixth major title in seven seasons and there isn't a club in Europe that has greater harmony between players, supporters and the manager. How things have changed!

There are those along the Costa who will shudder at the mention of Jesús Gil, once the politically incorrect mayor of Marbella who doubled up as the commander of La Liga's craziest club.

In the town hall he installed a bust of Franco's head; at the Calderón stadium he was frequently calling for the head of his coaches. It's hard to calculate but I make it 36 changes of manager in his sixteen years at the club. He closed the academy and in doing so handed one of the country's greatest ever players, Raúl, to his arch rivals! We could never have predicted the day when Atleti would be the organisation everyone eyed with envy.

At their lowest point they dipped into the second division. This led to a teenager named Fernando Torres getting his opportunity. 'El Niño' was established as captain before his twentieth birthday and he's the favourite player of supporters stretching over two decades.

Amazingly Torres had never won a trophy in the red and white stripes

until this season. The set, which includes a World Cup winner's medal, alongside European Champion with club (Chelsea) and country, was completed with the Europa Cup medal on Wednesday night.

Now he can head off to the sunset, possibly a Chinese or American sunset, with his career completed. He summed it up recently: "When I made my debut with Atlético I had achieved what I wanted to. All the rest was a gift."

When he started his career Atlético was a madhouse; he leaves it behind as a prototype institution. The fact that Simeone threw him on shows that the manager does have sentiment. The fact it was in the 90th minute and the game was well won shows that it was calculated.

Torres isn't the only player departing, though. Antoine Griezmann is expected to head to Barcelona. He kept his word to stay an extra season after the club were handicapped by a transfer ban last summer. I'm

sure he'll excel but don't rule out a return to Atlético before his career curtains; Torres returned and Diego Costa always had the club in his DNA.

You'd think that by losing two players of such high calibre, Atlético would suffer; but that is the secret of Simeone - it is a constant rebuild.

The foundation is the best goalkeeper in Spain, Jan Oblak, and one of the best defenders in the world, Diego Godín, backed up by a constant flow of talent. There is never a transition at Atlético, the team is continually getting refreshed.

On the Europa League winning team photo are Thomas Partey, Saúl Ñíguez, Lucas Hernández, José Giménez and Ángel Correa - all are under the age of twenty-five.

The preparation has been done already. This goes back to my opening line, nobody at Atlético Madrid can be accused of sitting back and smoking a big fat cigar of satisfaction anymore.

## Ben Barek Advising consultant for Malaga Football Club

The former Malaga player and coach relives his life in football and gives his take on the club's current predicament


**MALAGA.** Like a child with new shoes, Abdallah ben Barek (Rabat, 1937) proudly displays a new Malaga insignia on the lapel of his blazer. In a chat with SUR after a huge tribute in his honour at La Rosaleda, Barek reflects upon the most important years of his life and analyses the current state of Malaga football club.

**-You grew up in the Royal Palace in Rabat. What memories do you have of your childhood?**

-So many. My father was a royal driver and when I was born they asked that he name me Abdallah, who was the youngest son of King Mohamed V. A lamb was sacrificed at the baptism and we were given money for the party. At three years old I entered the palace and I stayed there until I was 10. I was almost like a toy for the King. Every other weekend I was allowed leave to be with my family. The palace was a bit like a town; it had everything. I would play there, bouncing my ball off the walls. My family were humble and at age 10, I left with them.

**-Was it difficult to be a Moroccan footballer in Europe during the 1950s?**

-What I will say is that 1956 was the year of Moroccan independence from France and Spain, who had protectorates like Tangier and Tetouan with football teams in La Liga. But after the change, these teams were incorporated into the Moroccan league. It so happened that I played for Stade Marocain in Tetouan in a cup game. We won, I scored the second goal and people from Ceuta wanted to sign me up after the game. They showed me around there but I didn't like it much. My dream was to become a professional so I could buy a house for my family. In the following game, we played in a derby

against Fath Union Sport (FUS), who had signed Larbi ben Barek, the best Moroccan football player of all time, and Chicha from Tetouan. We won at home. When I went to greet Larbi, he introduced me to some directors from Granada, who were in Segunda at the time. They had come to see me. For political reasons, my father didn't want me to go, but I asked Larbi to convince my parents. It was

a huge event to have him visit our home.

**-So you were allowed to go?**

-Yes, my father accepted, but by then it was Sunday and they wanted me in Spain on Monday. I didn't have a passport and I was barely 18 years old, but the managers spoke with the airport police in Granada and I flew directly from Tetouan. On Thursday I played a friendly match

with Recreativo Granada, who were trained by Carmona Ros. They thought that I was the son of Larbi and they encouraged me. I scored one goal in the first half and after that I didn't touch the ball again. In the second half, I scored another goal. Afterwards, the president of the football club invited me to a dinner to negotiate my contract. We came to an agreement of 60,000 pesetas plus

3,000 per month. During the first season we were promoted and in the second we stayed up.

**-And then you came to Malaga...**

-Yes, because teams were only allowed two foreign players and one had to be from South America. Granada needed a goalkeeper, because Candi had retired, and signed Carlos Gomes, from the Portuguese national team. In Malaga Julio Parres, who had businesses in Morocco, was interested in me, but we could not reach an agreement. Murcia offered me 100,000 pesetas, but they already had signed another Moroccan with a three-year contract. This reignited Malaga's interest. We were in Segunda and Américo joined the same week I did and we were soon promoted to the first division.

**-What did you think of Malaga? You've now spent six decades here.**

-Malaga wasn't like it is now. Tourism in Torremolinos was just starting to blossom and I was taken in by the Aragonese family who lived on Calle Granados. I became more and more enchanted by the city and the atmosphere here.

you to the tribute ceremony. He is very grateful to you...

-Yes. This was because, during the 1980s, King Hassan II wanted to promote Moroccan football and set up the 'One Thousand Footballers' project. They hired me as the trainer-director, to find young, unknown footballers who showed potential. Naybet was among those discovered. To see the players progress from a young age was amazing. Naybet was a right winger, but during knockout rounds of the youth African Cup of Nations (held in Egypt) a centre-back got injured so I put him there. After that, WAC (now Wydad) of Casablanca kept him in that position. From then he played for the national team, went on to France and eventually to Deportivo de la Coruña.

-During this era, Morocco became

the first African team to get out of the group stage in the 1986 World Cup, in Mexico. Now they return to another World Cup in Russia. Is the team better or worse than it was then?

-Comparisons are always tedious. During that time we had Ezaki (formerly of Mallorca) in goal; Boudribaia, a marvellous midfielder, or Timoumi, another player that was about to come to Malaga before he was taken to Murcia by Kubala. [Kubala] said he didn't know where to put him... "When he is kicked, he gets up and apologises to the one who kicked him"... he would say. He was a good man. I believe that the team in '86 was of a better quality, but the current manager (Hervé Renard) is doing a great job. They were undefeated in the qualifiers.

-You were also close to playing in

the 1962 World Cup in Chile. Morocco lost to Spain in the play-offs.

-Yes. They were better. It was a great opportunity, but they had an excellent team, with Di Stéfano, Puskas, Gento, Del Sol, Santamaría, Zoco... We lost 0-1 in Casablanca and the result was influenced by the fact that our best player, Akesbi, from RAC, could not play that match because at that time clubs were able to stop players from going away with their country. In Chamartín they were 3-0 up, but we scored two goals. I got the second, a left-footed shot but I had a leg injury. I didn't say anything to Morocco or to Malaga so I could still claim my wage. And that was at a time when injured players weren't substituted...

-You are, as you have said, in two minds. You have confidence in the Sheikh, but you know that fans are

unhappy with the management of the club.

-I understand the fans. The team has been relegated and they're allowed to be angry, but I know these fans. I know that they'll still be with the team next season. It might be that there is even more support than when the team was in La Liga. I always say that when you fall, you get back up and do better next time. They will overcome this. What has happened has happened and now's the time to unite.

-But should the way the club is managed change?

-I don't know. People have their own ways of thinking and if they have confidence then they can get things done. The Sheikh wants Malaga to be among the best in Spain. I think that this can be achieved. Now we have to help him too, but he needs

to understand the mentality of Malaga.

-What do you think of the evolution of En-Nesyri?

-Before, clubs brought in players for their individual qualities. Now the collective is more important. En-Nesyri is a young kid who dominated at the Mohamed VI Academy in Rabat. He came to the youth team with three others, who followed him, but returned for different reasons. Now Hicham and Abqar are there too. En-Nesyri needs to learn how to use strength and speed tactically and not just run for every ball that comes his way.

-What strategy is the team going to take now they're in Segunda?

-They need to be a team that is a mix of La Liga and Segunda. They need to be aggressive. It won't all be pretty, it should be practical.

The Costa side finished just a point adrift of eventual Segunda B IV winners Cartagena

**MARBELLA.** Marbella brought the curtain down on the most successful season in their history with a 1-0 win in front of their own fans on Sunday. The Costa outfit saw off Villanovense, but the win was not

enough to usurp Cartagena at the top at the top of the table who grabbed the point they needed against Écija.

Celta B, the first obstacle to promotion

The first stop on the road to promotion for Marbella will be in Vigo, it was announced on Monday. The Costa del Sol team will take on Celta B in the first play-off game on Sunday at the Barreiro stadium which has a capacity of just 2,500.

Celta B, the reserve team of the La Liga side, finished fourth in group I with 63 points having lost only two games at home all season.

This is the first time that Marbella will in a playoff for promotion to Segunda since 2009 when the side managed by the late José Luis Montes lost 2-1 on aggregate to Lorca.

Estévez's side took its toll on Villanovense's Barrio who received his second yellow for a mistimed challenge on Rioja. With more than half an hour still on the clock, it became only a matter of time until the hosts took the lead.

This, though, didn't come and Marbella had to console themselves with a second-place finish and must now focus on the lottery of the play-offs for promotion to Segunda.

## Belgian investment firm threatens to walk over owner Grinberg's lack of cooperation

**MARBELLA.** Belgian investment group LDV Sports Management, which recently announced that it had reached an agreement to purchase 97 per cent of the shares in Marbella FC, is now threatening

to turn its back on the deal with club owner Alexander Grinberg who they say is "failing to fulfill the commitments [which were] agreed upon".

In a press release sent out by LDV, the company blames the Rus-

sian businessman for refusing to sign off on the deal with a notary.

"On 13 March a declaration of intentions was signed. Exactly a month later, on 13 April, a private agreement between Grinberg and LDV was signed. Even though Grin-

berg refused to take part in a joint press announcement, LDV immediately deposited 150,000 euros and made a transfer of 75,000 euros in good faith. However, as of now, Grinberg is yet to sign off on the deal," read the statement released on Monday.

It also said that Grinberg had, throughout the process, "been putting his interests ahead of those of the club" and was "mostly worried about staying president of the club, even though he wouldn't own it".

## Tracy Topping Darts player

British expat Tracy Topping recently triumphed in the Spanish National Darts Championships and she now has her eyes set on a world title

**MALAGA.** Darts is one of the oldest established English pub games and it is one sport that the British can lawfully claim to be the masters of. One person who endorses this claim is British expat, Tracy Topping, who recently triumphed in the woman's singles section of the Spanish National Darts Championships. Tracy fought her way through eight rounds before reaching the finals, which were held in Gandia, Valencia, at the end of April. She triumphed over a player who had been tipped to win the competition, and now she is preparing to take part in the World Masters championships in the UK later this year.

Born in Melton Mowbray in Leicestershire, Tracy started playing darts at the age of ten, practising on a dart board her father, also a keen player, had installed in the garage. She began playing in the local darts league as a teenager but progressed to become a county player, representing England on several occasions.

### Eric Bristow

It was during this period that Tracy got chance to partner her hero, Eric Bristow, who she got to know well on the circuit during the golden era of darts. She paired up with the five-time world champion, nicknamed The Crafty Cockney, on several occasions, but never actually

played against him in a competition.

She also played with 'Goldfinger', Maureen Flowers, Britain's top female player during the 80s and former girlfriend of Bristow.

"Eric looked after us when we were young hopefuls; he was a real gentleman. He was a brilliant player and a really nice guy. His death last month was a great loss to the game," Tracy explains to SUR in English.

Previously residing in Cyprus, Tracy came to Spain in 2001 to be with her husband. He was in the merchant navy and based in Malaga, and Tracy quickly fell in love with

the Costa del Sol. However, at this time, conventional darts was not a popular game in Spain and so Tracy did not get much opportunity to play. In fact, she had only picked up her darts again just 18 months before she won the championship in April, having not played seriously for almost 20 years.

### Personal tragedy

It was a personal tragedy that instigated Tracy's return to the oche. In 2016, Tracy's life was shattered when her husband died and in order to try and divert some of her grief, she was persuaded to take up darts once again.

"Playing darts again helped me overcome a little of my grief, because I needed an escape. I had cared for my husband for three years, so it was a way of getting myself out of the house," Tracy says sadly, as she recalls the period.

Tracy began playing in the friendly league in Fuengirola and here she was spotted by two players from the Malaga league. They were so impressed with her skill; they asked her to consider playing for The Beer Garden, this year's silver cup winners. It the oldest British pub team in the Malaga league, which is affiliated with Spanish National League.

Tracy, who uses a set of 32 gram tungsten darts, took up their offer, although she still plays in the Fuengirola league as well. She was soon persuaded to enter the Ladies Singles Spanish National Championships and she was one of only two British contestants in the competition. Even though she had the support of her teammates, some of whom were also competing, Tracy was not confident she could win the competition, seeing as she had been away

from the game for so many years. "There were about 900 people there and I was nervous because I hadn't played at this level for many years. The standard of darts was much higher than I expected. There

are some very good Spanish players even though it hasn't been a national game for that long," she says.

### The World Masters

Tracy first entered the World Masters Championships at the age of 17 and now she is set to return once again. Winning the Spanish national competition automatically qualified Tracy to enter the World Masters Finals, organised by the British Darts Organisation (BDO), in Hull in October.

She currently plays in three different darts leagues on the coast, which means she is now back in full training and has her eyes firmly set on a victory at BDO finals, but the only thing she is lacking is sponsorship.

"I want to do well and I'll do my best, but there's a long way to go yet. Before I do anything else, I need to find a sponsor, so I can continue to play and prepare myself for Masters Tournament," the shy darts champion concludes.

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# Liverpool stars soak up the sun ahead of showcase final

Jürgen Klopp's side have chosen the Marbella Football Centre to train ahead of the Champions League final against Real Madrid on 26 May

**MALAGA.** With less than two weeks to go until the biggest game of the season, the Liverpool squad arrived in Marbella on Wednesday, hoping to recharge their batteries after completing a gruelling domestic campaign and begin preparations for the Champions League final against Real Madrid in Kiev on 26 May.

cial interest in Premier League Golden Boot winner, Egyptian forward Mohamed Salah, who stopped to sign autographs.

This may be as close as fans will get, though, as the Liverpool squad gets down to work in their initial preparations for the big final.

The Marbella Football Center, in San Pedro Alcántara, is a favourite of head coach Jürgen Klopp. He brought his Liverpool squad there on a warm-weather training camp in February and has also previously brought Borussia Dortmund during his spell there.

The complex has been chosen again this time as it can offer "complete isolation" - a request filed by club officials ahead of arrival.

Though plans are officially being kept under wraps, it is understood that the travelling group, comprising more than

sixty people, will work at the Marbella Football Center installations until Saturday evening before a return to Merseyside.

The plan is to work away from the distraction of fans and journalists and to that end, the training sessions will be held behind closed doors and the timetables are being closely guarded and only revealed to the players themselves on the day.

The squad is staying at the La Quinta hotel and is being ferried to the Marbella Football Center by bus to keep distractions to a minimum. Despite this level of secrecy, though, the player have already been spotted cycling around Marbella, albeit with a sizeable escort.

The clash in Kiev will be the five-time winner's eighth appearance in a European Cup final. They earned their spot there after winning their group (comprising Sevilla, Spartak Moscow and Maribor), then victories in the knockout stage against Porto (5-0 on aggregate), Manchester City (5-1) and Roma (7-6).

Real Madrid will be the strong favourites on 26 May, but Salah and co, after their break in the sunshine, will be fully rested and raring to go.
