MPs move to choose new PM in vote of no confidence

PSOE's Pedro Sánchez could take over if PP's Mariano Rajoy doesn't resign first

Mariano Rajoy was on the brink of becoming the first leader of the Spanish government to be ousted in a no-confidence vote this week.

This Friday (1 June) MPs were due to decide whether to replace the conservative Partido Popular leader with the PSOE Socialist party's Pedro Sánchez.

Sánchez had put himself forward as candidate to be prime minister



in a debate in parliament called by his party after last week's damning verdict on the PP in the Gürtel corruption case.

At first the motion seemed unlikely to succeed, but during Thursday's debate support increased and only Rajoy resigning before the vote seemed likely to stop the Socialist leader winning. **P20**

Bancosol, 20 years fighting home-grown hunger

A real crisis

Bancosol is celebrating two decades and still supports 48,370 people who need its help - at the height of the financial crisis this figure reached 58,000- but with a lot less budget than before because of a reduction in the grant from money collected through people's tax returns.

The change in the way the grant is calculated, when responsibility for its allocation moved from central to regional government, has led to a fall in income from this source, from 850,000 euros annually to 175,000, 80 per cent less. This has forced Bancosol to cut back on training programmes and the size of its workforce in order to carry on. Those in charge have already raised the alarm: they only have enough funds to carry on until September and they are asking for help from the Costa del Sol community.

Despite everything, they are still operating like a well-oiled machine. It's a far cry from when Bancosol started in the passageways of Mercamálaga. Nowadays, from the warehouse unit they built in 2002 and

The volunteers have been reorganising the produce stored to be

given out to people in need across Malaga province and the Costa del Sol. They've had to clear out one of the two warehouses they use, ready to take delivery of 75 tonnes of food sent by the EU's Fund for European Aid to the Most Deprived (FEAD).

This is one of the two public aid programmes that Bancosol works with, the other being the Andalusian FAGA fund. The rest of the food it receives comes via donations from: Mercamálaga, the city's wholesale food market; from farmers and food manufacturers; and public cam-

paigns such as the Gran Recogida (great collection) or Operación Kilo that are organised throughout the year. The next one takes place today and tomorrow.

Because of financial difficulties at Bancosol, this year they haven't been able to use the extra two units that they normally lease to store the FEAD produce, making do with their normal base. "We're going to have food piled up in the aisles until we can start giving it out, but it is what it is, we'll manage," says Joaquín Jiménez, president of Bancosol since January. Jiménez, retired after a career in the banking sector, has got the hard task of sorting out the finances at the charity, which is going through one of the

Operación Kilo returns this week

Bancosol, with the sponsorship of Fundación Unicaja, will be running another Operación Kilo on Friday and Saturday this week (1 and 2 June). Shoppers at 102 supermarkets in the province belonging to the Mercadona, Maskom and Eroski chains will be met by up to 1,200 volunteers and asked to donate food weighing one kilo from their shopping basket to the food bank. Organisers hope to collect 200,000 kilos of food in this campaign.

extended in 2009 to cover more than 1,000 square metres, just over 6,000 tonnes of food is handled each year.

In the loading bay, vans from some NGOs are waiting their turn to pick up fresh produce such as tomatoes, oranges or peppers, which is excess stock from the wholesale market nearby. These charities are responsible for collecting it from Bancosol and distributing it to families in need across Malaga province. Many families have children and need help to get a hot meal.

Fighting waste

Bancosol doesn't just get food to those most in need. Its other activity is the constant fight against food waste. "A third of food produce is thrown away; we can't allow this to

happen when people are going hungry. Our work seeks to bring together these realities," explains Jiménez. And of course there's the environmental impact of all that waste too. "It's the amount of pesticides, fertilizers and water for food that in the end just goes to waste," he adds. To help address this, the charity carries out school visits to educate children on making the best use of foodstuffs. "They are the best people to spread this message to the rest of the family," he says.

Apart from making people aware of waste, Bancosol had until now two other activities, although these have been reduced with the budget cut. Firstly there is food processing. For several years, the charity has been collecting excess farm produce to turn it into processed foods, such as fried items, milk powder or soup, a total of 772 tonnes. This year this programme has had to be cancelled.

The other project that Bancosol has committed to is work training. Although this year a smaller team is working on it, its hotel and office cleaner courses are still being run. Since this scheme was set up in 2015, 321 people have been helped into work, 146 in 2017 alone.

Bancosol's managers and volunteers make it clear that there is still a need for the charity. Despite the generally improved economy, there is a large group of families with few means and facing continued hardship. "We're fighting to find new members and involve larger Malaga companies in order to carry on," explains Jiménez.

Costa charities' teamwork gets the food to those in need

Some 200 NGOs work with Bancosol and distribute food directly to local people in a coordinated way

MALAGA. In total, 200 NGOs form part of Bancosol's network that gets the food out to those most in need. It's an operation that grew out of the financial crisis when an increase in the number of people needing aid forced the charities to work together to improve the distribution of the aid.

The Bancosol president, Joaquín Jiménez, explains that since then his organisation asks the partner NGOs to prove the genuine need of the people being helped with a social worker's report and there is a centralised register to avoid people benefiting more than once.

La Gran Recogida (the great collection), held annually since 2012, was another turning point in collaboration. This charity initiative brought together different NGOs

under one umbrella, using their own volunteers to collect in supermarkets.

"We all feel part of Bancosol; we voluntary organisations owe them a lot," says Olga Santiago, from the Spanish cancer association (AECC), which has a programme in place to give food to 80 families affected by the disease. "You can see that people

have serious problems when users come in who have just had a chemo or radiotherapy session and, despite being in a bad way physically, queue up in our centre every week to collect their food bag," she adds.

Eva Pascual of charity Inpavi adds, "95 per cent of the food we give out to our 500 families comes from the food bank."

Two gangs behind more than 40 home burglaries are held

MALAGA. In the last few weeks, officers from the National Police and the Guardia Civil have delivered another blow to organised crime on the Costa. According to the Ministry of the Interior, investigators have identified the members of two gangs that were behind more than 42 home burglaries and subsequently disbanded them both, with the arrest of nine people.

The first of the organisations specialised in nighttime burglaries, often while homeowners were asleep. Police arrested three members of the group, all of Albanian origin, after they returned home following three burglaries in Marbella. They are cur-

rently awaiting trial in Benalmádena and are thought to be the perpetrators of 26 burglaries in Malaga and Marbella. In addition to stolen items, officers have seized 5,300 euros in cash and three firearms.

The second organisation carried out their burglaries during the working day, whilst residents were away from home. The six Spanish citizens that have been detained in Malaga are thought to have committed 39 crimes in Malaga and Cordoba, 15 of which were burglaries.

The investigation began after the Guardia Civil in Nerja identified a vehicle carrying solar-powered batteries and tools that had been reported stolen.

School football trainer awaits trial for grooming of children

:: J. C. / Á. F. / A. G. A football trainer from the Malaga FC training school has been arrested by the National Police after being accused of grooming teenagers. He allegedly contacted them through social media to encourage them to send intimate images of themselves.

Malaga FC has not officially spoken about the arrest, but sources close to the club said that management is involved helping police.

The accused appeared in court on Monday and the judge ruled that he be kept in prison whilst he awaits trial, with no chance of bail.

The investigations, which remain open, began after a number of adolescents came forward to say that they were being blackmailed by social media users who told victims that they possessed certain images of them and were threatening to make the images public if the teens did not agree to send intimate photos of themselves.

This is not the first case of this kind in Malaga. Football trainer J. C. C. F. (arrested in 2016) is currently in prison, convicted of the sexual abuse of minors. In February of this year, another football trainer was sentenced to nine years in prison for the abuse of minors.

the Cabopino beach in the Marbella district of Las Chapas which looks similar to those used for drug trafficking. It was discovered on Monday morning, and although no cargo was found, the main hypothesis is that it was used to carry hashish.

Woman accused of offering fake gigolo jobs

:: J. C. / Á. F. A woman is on trial at Malaga's criminal court for scamming men with the false offer of gigolo work, by making them pay a sign-up fee to access a nonexistent work pool. It is thought that the woman has tricked 310 since 2011 and defrauded them out of more than 124,000 euros, though so far only three men have made official accusations. The prosecutor wants a sentence of two and a half years.

Youths held over fight with bouncers

:: J. C. / D. S. Four young men from Malaga have been arrested after a fight in Mojácar (Almería) last Saturday night resulted in three stabbings. The men, who were on a stag party, were kicked out of Mandala Beach and proceeded to brawl with three bouncers, each of whom sustained serious stab wounds and was taken to hospital. The four fled the scene but have since been arrested.

Local explorer to swim between the 5 continents

MALAGA

:: **F. GUTIÉRREZ.** A young Malaga explorer has been giving details of his latest expedition which will involve swimming the straits between the world's five continents. Nacho Dean, who is already the first Spaniard to travel round the world on foot, plans to start his next adven-

ture on 8 June with a swim across the Strait of Gibraltar to Africa. This will be followed by crossings of the Bosphorus, the Gulf of Aqaba, the Bering Sea and Bismarck Sea. The aim of the mission is to raise awareness of the perilous state of the world's oceans.

In 2016 Dean completed his walking challenge after three years, 31 countries and 33,000 kilometres. Currently he is training three hours a day in a pool and in open water and hopes to finish his swims in October.

Council admits below par Plaza de la Merced work

200 Mijas estates await council-services news

GELIBTER.** The more than 200 unadopted housing developments in Mijas, which currently don't receive many council services, will soon find out under what conditions the town hall will be prepared to take over upkeep of their streets and offer full services. Sources said that the council has now completed going through the audits on the state of each development.

Malaga gets tough on unregistered private-home holiday lets in the city

All parties support the moves which will involve setting up a working group with local residents and increasing inspections

MALAGA. The council in Malaga city has voted to bring in a series of measures to get tough on owners who rent out homes to tourists without official permission. Just as in many other Spanish cities, locals in the historic centre of Malaga have been complaining that the huge rise in the number of properties being let this way is intruding on their day-to-day lives and pushing up their rents.

In the package of measures, which was approved by all political parties on the council, councillors promised to work with neighbours and community leaders to report any home being privately let that isn't registered on the regional government's official self-catering accommodation list.

A city hall study has recently shown that Airbnb, the well-known online private home-letting service, had double the amount of properties listed than the number recorded on the Junta de Andalucía's official register. It said that some 2,500 are actually recorded but a search of Malaga city on Airbnb revealed 4,782. When the data is looked at by the

number of beds available, the survey suggests that of the 20,128 on Airbnb, some 7,000 are illegally listed.

The study itself recommended that councillors take tougher measures, although regional legislation doesn't currently allow the council to ban or severely restrict this type of property, as has been done in Palma de Mallorca.

Councillors voted for more resources to deal with the problem, including increasing the number

of inspections. A working group will be set up between the different political groups on the council, representatives of the Junta de Andalucía regional government and residents in the areas with the highest concentration of rental properties in order to monitor the situation.

The head of one neighbourhood association representing the historic city centre, Alejandro Villén Leal, highlighted that residents have no comeback when they call Local Police with complaints about tourists' behaviour in their blocks of residential flats, as officers can only act if the owners of the flats are present, whereas in a hotel "when they throw a party in the rooms, they throw them out on the street".

Hotel and restaurant strike draws closer as unions and bosses fail to agree

The dispute centres on working condition changes that hoteliers are requesting, and stoppages could take place in July, August and September

MALAGA. Trade unions representing workers in the hotel and restaurant sector on the Costa del Sol will consider summer strike action if bosses do not agree to their demands by next Tuesday.

Negotiators for some 85,000 employees in the hospitality sector in Malaga province have been trying to reach a new collective agreement with employers since the existing one expired last December. However at meetings this week no agreement was reached and if next week's meeting cannot resolve the dispute, stoppages will take place in July, August and September, unions say.

The dispute centres on hotel staff in particular. Unions want an increase in salaries of around 4 per cent, however Aehcos, the association of Costa del Sol hoteliers, wants any increase linked to an improvement in absenteeism as well as more flexibility from staff over when they have their days off.

Last week workers in the hospitality sector staged a four-part march along the Costa del Sol.

One union boss, Lola Vallalba,

said that the employers' position showed "a total lack of respect" and the regional minister for Tourism at the Junta de Andalucía has called on them to be "generous" in sharing the increased profits with workers who "had acted responsibly during the financial crisis". "I don't think a strike would do anyone any good and nobody wants it," he added.

Further protests are planned outside Malaga's conference centre for today (Friday) where a national hoteliers' conference is taking place in the presence of the king.

The president of Aehcos, Luis Callejón, explained why his group's negotiating position had toughened on Wednesday this week. After being "unfairly" accused of getting up from the table last Monday, he said, "he was withdrawing everything that he had personally brought to the table to move negotiations forward".

This step backwards included, for example, withdrawing employers' support for outsourced maintenance workers to be included in the collective agreement or for assistants to be automatically promoted after three years.

"I've never seen such a difficult agreement," said Lola Vallalba.

Meanwhile representatives of bar and restaurant workers, where there is more agreement, have asked hoteliers and the unions to "act responsibly" to avoid a strike.

Deal that lets council staff work less than they should is overturned

Workers only need do 35 hours a week instead of the legal 37.5 and some get 30 days annual leave, 8 more than the norm

TORREMOLINOS. The internal audit department at Torremolinos town hall has told its bosses that an agreement made in 2016, which allows council workers to turn up to their job for fewer hours than they are meant to, is illegal.

The agreement was signed

when the PSOE party took over as a way to smooth over the relationship with the council workforce during the transition to a new administration.

The law says that the working week for municipal staff is 37 and a half hours, although up to now staff put in 35 hours because of the agreement. Some workers manage to work 300 hours a year fewer than the law states, as the council is paying the missing hours as overtime, especially to the town-hall-controlled Local Police.

In terms of annual leave, the law says 22 days a year but in Tor-

remolinos council staff got over 30 days a year, as days in lieu were given for working over holiday periods.

Now the council says it will abandon the agreement, which was approved without being voted on by the full council, and sit down with workers and unions to draft a new set of conditions. Overturning the deal means the council will save money on reduced overtime hours.

Torremolinos council has frequently been criticised for the supposedly vague way it employees and manages its 700 staff.

Torremolinos awards contract for next stage of town-centre pedestrianisation plan

TORREMOLINOS. Last week Torremolinos council announced that it has awarded the contract for the second phase of its flagship project to landscape and pedestrianise the resort's central Plaza Costa del Sol

and part of Avenida Palma de Mallorca. The company Sorigué will carry out the work as part of a three-million-euro deal that is expected to be finished by December.

The area was closed to traffic in 2015 and, now the initial drainage and utility alignment work has been finished and further funds have been found, work on the landscaping can begin. The overall project covers an area of 10,000 square metres and has been designed by local architect Salvador Peralta Moreno. Other streets in central Torremolinos will also see improvements for pedestrians.

Council sails on with plans to charge boat trip operators a fee

BENALMÁDENA. Despite the objections of the 17 operators currently running boat excursions from Puerto Marina, Benalmádena council says it will press on with its plan to charge a licence fee. At the moment operators pay nothing but officials want every company to pay a levy of at least 50 cents per passenger under new rules.

The council owns the Puerto Marina port and leisure complex and says that current operators have been operating "on the edge of the law" for more than a decade. Under the plans, the 17 spaces for boat trip operators will be kept but all of them will be put out to public

tender rather than choosing "companies at random", as the council says has been done up to now.

The current operators say that jobs are at risk at the start of the peak tourist season and that many of them have bought boats that they are still paying back the loans on. In reply, Benalmádena council says that all of them are free to compete as part of the new tender process and that they were warned "two years ago" what was going to happen.

The operators want a fee of 14 cents instead, as is paid in Málaga's port, although in that case the port also takes a percentage of the company turnover.

Association reports that stray cats are being poisoned in Estepona

ESTEPONA. The Estepona-based association Gatos y Amigos has reported that stray cats are being poisoned in different parts of the town. One of the locations is El Ángel beach, next to a shopping centre, where the president of the association, Laura Montes, suspects that paint stripper and industrial adhesives were used. This caused hair loss and seizures in a cat that was found covered in a yellow sticky substance.

“We will never understand what drives someone to wish this suffering on an innocent creature,” said Montes, “There’s no humanity in this type of crime.”

The association has also detected that some of the strays in the Río La Cala area have been found with noose traps around their necks. Montes explained that they were able to remove the noose in some cases but in others the cats died.

The association has pointed out that animal cruelty is a criminal offence and encouraged members of the public to report cases to the Guardia Civil environmental unit, Seprona. Reports can be made anonymously, said the association.

Marbella council approves convent refurbishment

According to the mayor, the investment of 1.8 million euros will stimulate a cultural revival across the old town

MARBELLA. Marbella council has approved a project to restore and refurbish the cloisters and chapel of the old Trinidad convent. The mayor, Ángeles Muñoz, has highlighted that this project, which will receive an investment of 1.8 million euros, is part of “a wider

cultural revival in the old town”, including the Museo del Grabado (print museum) and the Hospital Real de la Misericordia.

The convent is in the centre of the old town, on the corner of Calles Salinas and Viento, next to the Hospital Bazán, now the print museum. The plan for the building is to create a reception area, lift, an exhibition and a multi-use space, as well as stairs and lobbies. Upstairs there will be another exhibition area.

As parts of the building are different heights, there is a need to connect the two different parts.

1,000 bottles of liquid will dilute dogs' urine

:: N. CASTRO. Marbella town hall has introduced a new system to dilute dog urine on local streets. It is recommended that dog owners pour a mixture of water and white vinegar directly onto their pets' urine. The street cleansing department will distribute 1,000 bottles of the solution, which will help to prevent stains and smells. Failure to comply could result in a fine.

Blow to illegal street sellers in Marbella after police campaign leads to 17 arrests

Local Police have confiscated 4,900 fake articles and shut down a sellers' distribution point

MARBELLA. The first phase of the police campaign against the illegal street selling of falsified items in the municipality of Marbella has culminated in 17 arrests. The intervention, which began in May, has also led to authorities closing down five associated market stalls and an establishment that served as a storage and distribution point for fake branded items.

Officers confiscated 1,400 articles from those selling on foot and an additional 677 articles from markets stalls in Puerto Banús and Marbella.

At the storage and distribution point, a further 2,769 items were found. The municipal police department has also closed off another, smaller establishment that is suspected as having the same purpose.

Prison sentence and ban on public office for former Axarquía mayor

José Antonio Gutiérrez, who resigned in 2014, pleaded guilty to charges of misappropriation of public funds during his time in office in Sedella

MÁLAGA. A court in Malaga has sentenced the former mayor of an Axarquía village, José Antonio Gutiérrez (41), to nine months in prison for misappropriation of public money. Gutiérrez, who ran Sedella and pleaded guilty to the charges against him during his court appearance earlier this week, has also been banned from holding a position in public office for five years.

The former politician was mayor of Sedella from 2011 until March 2014, when he resigned over the scandal. He had taken over from his predecessor, Francisco Gálvez, who had held office for two decades, in a pact between the Izquierda Unida and socialist PSOE political parties.

Gutiérrez, along with his brother, bought computer and sports equip-

ment for the town hall with grants from Malaga's provincial government, the Diputación. However, the brothers produced invoices with values higher than the actual cost of the items bought, claiming that computers purchased cost 937.50 euros when the real value of each item was between 553 and 580 euros.

The two men also submitted false

invoices for the installation of the computers as well as the sports equipment.

The court also heard that the materials bought did not comply with the purpose of the grants awarded by the provincial government.

The brothers are said to have pocketed in the region of 10,000 euros which has been paid back since Gutiérrez's resignation in 2014.

Councillors urge town hall to help local hedgehogs and chameleons

VÉLEZ-MÁLAGA. Opposition councillors at Vélez-Málaga town hall are urging the ruling tripartite administration to get a plan off the ground to protect chameleons and common hedgehogs in the town and the villages that belong to it.

Councillors for the Izquierda Unida party, Miguel Ángel Sánchez and Alicia Pérez, want to get the initiative, which has already been agreed by the council, but not yet

enforced, going as soon as possible.

"It is probably too late to run campaigns in schools this academic year but we urge the local government to follow the example of other places and put up signs on the roads and to produce a campaign through the various methods of communication which the town hall has at its disposal," explained Sánchez.

A residents' group in the village of Triana, which belongs to Vélez-

Málaga, ran a campaign last summer, via their website, Triana Corazón de la Axarquía (Triana, heart of the Axarquía) and the councillors have asked the town hall to send out a similar message between the months of July and September, which is when the animals are most active and at risk of being run over.

Chameleons and common hedgehogs are both protected species and the former are native to the Axarquía, where a number of studies have been carried out on them. However, populations of both species suffer the same risk of being run over in the summer months not only in the east of Malaga area, but across the whole of Andalucía.

Trawler fishermen to go on strike over changes

MÁLAGA

:: **A. P.** Trawler boats in Malaga province will be grounded on 15 June as the fishing industry in Andalucía and Valencia will be striking against cuts and changes to the conditions of bottom fishing which have been

proposed by the European Commission's agriculture and fisheries directorate general. The patron of the fishing association in Caleta de Vélez, María del Carmen Navas Guerrero, said on Tuesday that the local industry is worried as the changes could mean that trawler fishing, which fishes pink and white prawns, hake and red mullet, would no longer be affordable.

Works ongoing to improve water supply

VÉLEZ-MÁLAGA

:: **E. C.** Malaga's provincial government, the Diputación, is currently carrying out a 150,000-euro project to improve the water supply in the villages of Arenas, Sayalonga and Canillas de Albaida in the Axarquía. The condition of the existing pipes regularly leads to leaks and problems with the supply of drinking water in the villages. Representatives from the Diputación visited the site on Tuesday.

Mountaineer rescued from La Maroma

VÉLEZ-MÁLAGA

:: **E. P.** A 42-year-old mountaineer, who had gone missing from his group, was rescued from the Axarquía's La Maroma mountain on Monday morning after the group alerted emergency services at around 8.40pm on Sunday. Once located, the man, who had disappeared and fallen, was taken by helicopter to the traumatology hospital in Granada where he was treated for concussion.

Nerja likely to charge residents to marry

NERJA

:: **E. C.** Nerja town hall has published the draft version of a new by-law on its website which will require residents who have been on the town hall census (Padrón) for more than four years to pay up to 150 euros for a civil wedding. Currently only couples who have been

on the Padrón for less than that time have to pay the tax.

Mayor, Rosa Arrabal, said that her administration had "inherited" the situation from the previous administration, which made it illegal in the town to discriminate between residents and nonresidents. The draft document is on the website for suggestions as to how to "improve" the situation so that only a "symbolic fee" would have to be paid rather than the full 150 euros.

I subscribe to a telephone service which makes calling abroad cheaper. I contracted the service by phone, and now I want to cancel it because I can call using my Wifi, and have no need of the special service. However, each time I call they say that I have to call a different number, or that they have already dealt with my request

when it is not true... Last time, they asked me for the contract, but as I hired the service by phone, I do not have it. Is the company obliged to provide one if I ask for it?

Yes, they are. You can ask them to send the contract in writing with the clauses, and it must include the requirements to cancel the service and the means to do it. In normal conditions, the request to cancel the service sent by fax is enough.

REF. G. N. I.

I own equal shares with my brother of an apartment in Spain which we inherited from our father. We have always had a good and close relationship and have come to the property on a number of occasions to spend our holidays with our families. However, the company where I work is shortly transferring me to an

office in Australia, and for this reason I will not be coming to Spain to use the apartment anymore. I have suggested that we sell the property or let him buy my share, but he point blankly refuses, as he says that it is his family's holiday home, but on the other hand, he does not have the money to buy my share. Can I do something to unblock this situation?

If it is impossible to reach an agreement between the parties, either because they do not agree about the sale price, or because one of the parties refuses to sell or to buy the other party's share, there exists the possibility of going to court. In these cases, with the help of the judge, and taking into account that an apartment cannot be physically split, the judge can insist that the asset is sold at public auction, and the amount obtained will be divided up between the parties according to each one's share.

Mayor of Torremolinos offers support at Brexpat's meeting

José Ortiz claimed he clearly understood the problems that might be faced by British expatriates when the UK finally leaves the EU

TORREMOLINOS. The mayor of Torremolinos showed his support for the local British community during a meeting hosted by Brexpat's in Spain last week in Torremolinos. The talk focused on the effect the forthcoming Brexit could have on British residents in Spain and covered subjects like dual nationality, driver's licences, pensions and the campaign to raise awareness of residents' rights to vote in Spain. The event, chaired by the president of Brexpat's in Spain, Anne Hernández, was attended by British consul for Andalucía and the Ca-

nary Islands, Charmaine Arbouin, and several lawyers and financial specialists. The Mayor of Torremolinos spoke of his respect for the local British expats, saying that they are "extremely important for Torremolinos, and also for Spain". He highlighted the long-standing historic link enjoyed by Spain and the UK, claiming that he was "quite certain" that a bilateral agreement between the two countries could soon be agreed. The mayor, who had recently met with British ambassador, Simon Manley, said, "I clearly understand the problems that might be ahead for expats when the UK finally leaves the EU." He also expressed the town hall's desire to acknowledge the concerns and worries of local British expats in Torremolinos, promising to organise a special platform where information will be available.

"I hope all these problems will be ironed out so the British residents in Spain can continue living as they have been for so many years. We have almost 2,000 British residents registered on the padrón and there was a 20 per cent increase in British tourism in Torremolinos last year: we obviously hope that the effects of Brexit will not have an impact on that," the mayor said. Charmaine Arbouin added, "Although we still do not have all the answers, most of your worries will be overcome if you are a legal resident. Those who are not registered should do so now and not leave it to the last minute, because there is already a waiting list of up to one month." She went on to say: "My general message is quite simple. Make sure that you are registered on the padrón and that you hold a resident's card, and you will be able to live and work in Spain exactly as you do now."

In the end that wasn't confirmed, but they offered us the chance to film *Terminator*, which they decided to do in Spain and Hungary instead of Mexico," says Welter about this latest in the saga, which sees the return of the original filmmaker, James Cameron, to produce the film, starring Arnold Schwarzenegger and Linda Hamilton.

Filming is due to begin this month, but Peter says the locations are a professional secret and he isn't prepared to reveal them. He wouldn't even confirm or deny rumours that the filming will take place in Almería, Murcia and Salamanca (the reservoir of Aldeadávila de la Ribera).

What he did say is that this production with the legendary Schwarzenegger could have been even more important if Spanish law was as competitive as that of other European countries.

"The initial plan was to film en-

tirely in Spain with over 100 million euros of investment, but the problem is that due to the tax system in this country it isn't worth any company spending more than 15 million," he explains. "The tax break for the major studios is 20 per cent of expenditure, but there is a maximum of three million. It means that foreign companies obtain no tax benefit at all if they invest more than 15 million, so the studios look for locations in other countries which don't impose that limit, such as Hungary which, unlike Spain, also has large studios for interior shooting. The lack of sets is also a weak point for Spain."

Restricting investment

"We possibly have the biggest variety of climates, architecture and different natural spaces in the whole of Europe. What is the sense in limiting investment by major foreign productions? Why, if they could spend 50 or 100 million euros, do we prefer them to only spend 15 million?" says Peter. Because of that regulation, he says, Spain can only attract part of the filming for major films and series, instead of the complete productions.

He gives a good example. In the last two years the seven best-known Spanish companies who work on international productions have gen-

erated an investment of 167 million euros, eight million of which went directly to Social Security. This figure could have multiplied if the maximum tax deduction for a superproduction had not been limited.

Peter believes the limit should be raised from the current three million to 20 million euros. "We won't see that happen this year, though," he says, "because it hasn't been included in the latest national budget."

With regard to Terminator, the investment in the latest film about the legendary and expeditious robot T-800 will exceed the limit of 15 million euros for tax benefits, so Fresco Film deserves due recognition for having brought to Malaga a market which would normally have chosen Madrid or Barcelona.

Peter Welter has also brought the complete filming of Sony's Snatch series to the Costa del Sol: the second season was filmed in different locations in Malaga province between January and May.

This production enabled him to work "from home" for several months, which is quite unusual in his work. In fact, he is already packing his cases to start the pre-production of the Cameron and Schwarzenegger film in different locations in Spain. Although, just like Terminator, Welter gives a smile and says: "I'll be back".

The series by Sony, starring Rupert Grint, has just ended four months filming on the Costa del Sol and will be screened in September

MALAGA. The mafia is leaving the Costa del Sol. That may sound like a news item, but it actually refers to the actors in Snatch, with Rupert Grint (Harry Potter's friend in the film series) in the lead, after four months touring the province from top to bottom filming the second season.

The last episode of the story of British gangsters who settle in Malaga to continue their shady tricks was filmed last week. Luckily, the only thing they have taken away is a variety of locations which promise to look attractive on screen. In exchange, they have left behind an investment of 12 million euros, believed to be the highest amount for a foreign production of this type in the province.

This is a striking figure, although not the highest seen by the executive producer of the Malaga company Fresco Film, Peter Welter, who was responsible for this American

title being filmed on the Costa del Sol: at first, the plan was to use locations on the coast of Catalonia as the setting for the series.

"What is relevant is that this was one of the first American series to be filmed with an exclusively Spanish technical team, and in this case most of them were from Malaga," says Peter, who has shown that the province not only has excellent locations for films, "but also a team of professionals who are easily capable of handling these interna-

tional productions".

When Snatch is screened, it will be an excellent way of promoting the area for tourism. "It shows off our coastline which means we are selling the Costa del Sol at the same time," says Peter. He hopes this series will be well received by American audiences; it is due to start in September via Crackle, Sony's film and series platform. "We made a fantastic team and those in charge are so pleased that they may return to film a third season, if this one is as successful as the first," he says.

Support from councils

Town halls also provided support for the filming of Snatch: one of the main locations was a beach bar in Torre del Mar (Vélez Malaga) and other scenes were shot in Malaga's port and city hall. Peter Welter also praises the "unconditional support" received from Rincón de la Victoria and Mijas, but says the biggest problems they encountered were in Nerja. "They offered to collaborate, but when it came to filming they put obstacles in our way, which surprised me because they know the impact a series like this could have," says Peter. As thanks for his work, all the Snatch actors signed a poster, which he has proudly hung on his wall.

Rajoy's government on the line as Socialists lead an MPs' vote of no confidence

Following last week's Gürtel case corruption sentence, Pedro Sánchez seized his chance to oust the PM and, with PNV support secured, only Rajoy's resignation would stop the move succeeding

MADRID. Spain was on the verge of a change of government this week if a no-confidence vote among MPs planned for today (Friday, 1 June) succeeded as expected in toppling the ruling Partido Popular party (PP) and Prime Minister Mariano Rajoy.

The resignation of Mariano Rajoy before the vote was the only option remaining to stop PSOE Socialist party leader Pedro Sánchez becoming prime minister. Up to the last minute Rajoy was refusing to resign despite pleas from Ciudadanos leader Albert Rivera to go before the vote succeeded.

The 'express' no-confidence debate had been called by the PSOE in response to last week's judgments against the PP and several former top members in the mas-

sive Gürtel corruption trial. Those found guilty were sentenced to a total of 351 in prison, the PP was found guilty of operating fraudulent party funding and the PM himself was criticised as an unreliable witness.

With the public mood decidedly fed up with the relentless news of political corruption across Spain, the PSOE's Sánchez seized his

chance to force out the minority conservative government by offering himself as a candidate to be PM instead in an MPs' vote.

While it wasn't immediately clear if he would get enough votes to succeed at the start of the debate on the no-confidence motion on Thursday, it became clear that smaller parties were rallying to the call and the PP became increasingly

nervous. Rajoy accused Sánchez, who isn't a sitting MP at the moment, of opportunism, "because he would never win any public election".

Support for PSOE grows

In his address to MPs, Sánchez promised to maintain the recently agreed national budget for 2018 in order to maximise his cross-party support.

His PSOE party with 84 MPs was automatically supported by left-wing Podemos and allies (on 67 seats) as well as the Catalan republicans (9 seats). Other minority parties came round as the debate progressed to say they would vote in favour of the motion and usher in Sánchez as new PM. This brought the anti-Rajoy coalition to just short of a 176 absolute majority to succeed, depending on the decision of the PNV Basque nationalist party.

Basque nationalists decide

The PNV held off announcing their decision on which way to vote until Thursday afternoon. On one hand the conservative-leaning PNV, satisfied with funding concessions for the Basque Country in the national budget, was keen to keep the status quo. On the other hand, its leaders knew a rejection of the motion would push more of its supporters towards the more radical Basque separatist parties.

In the end it decided to back the motion, with Rajoy seemingly heading for defeat and the country a new prime minister on Friday unless he stepped down in the meantime in order to prevent the vote being carried out.

New Catalan president breaks deadlock with untainted new ministers and full regional autonomy will return

BARCELONA. The new president of the Catalan government, Quim Torra, gave in to pressure from Madrid this week by agreeing to choose four new names for regional ministries that he had previously offered to politicians either in jail or self-imposed exile. When the earlier four nominations were made, central government refused to ratify the appointments or lift the suspension of some of Catalonia's devolved powers. Despite initially saying he would take Madrid to court, Torra changed plans and agreed to

appoint a regional cabinet untainted by pro-independence legal action. This paves the way for all of Catalonia's devolved powers to be restored at last.

The decision comes against the backdrop of the planned no-confidence vote against the national government in Madrid, a motion that Catalan separatist MPs have supported in the belief that there may be a softer policy on Catalonia from any new incoming prime minister.

Torra was expected to travel soon to Berlin to meet self-exiled former president Carles Puigdemont

Relief as Podemos party members say 'OK' to leaders' new home in online vote

MADRID. There was relief for the two top leaders of left-wing Podemos this week after members voted online that they could keep their jobs. Pablo Iglesias and Irene Montero, a couple, had faced criticism for buying a 600,000-euro luxury home. Deciding to end the matter decisively, they had risked their careers by asking members' opinion. In the end, 68 per cent approved, with a record turnout.

Plans to remember 50th anniversary of border closure

An exhibition will be held on the Rock to mark the anniversary, and the mayor of La Línea has suggested that a joint event should take place

GIBRALTAR. Next year marks the 50th anniversary of the closure of the land frontier between Spain and Gibraltar on 8 June 1969, the culmination of a series of events by the Franco regime which was designed, but failed, to bring Gibraltar to its knees.

The border remained closed for 13 years, and was reopened as Spain prepared to join the EEC; pedestrians were allowed to cross in December 1982, and it opened fully on 5 February 1985. Many local people still remember the tears of joy as families who had not seen each other for so many years were finally reunited.

The Gibraltar government has decided that it would be fitting to mark the occasion with a series of events, possibly including a joint activity with La Línea council.

Although the final programme has yet to be decided, it has been

announced that an exhibition will be held in Gibraltar to mark the event and a booklet will be produced for distribution to schoolchildren. “It is important that the younger generation is fully aware of their history and of the sacrifices made by their forefathers,” said a press release issued by the government this week.

During the recent official visit by chief minister Fabian Picardo to La Línea de la Concepción, the Spanish town the other side of the border, the mayor of La Línea, Juan Franco, proposed that a joint event should be held, possibly a seminar looking at the impact of the closure on either side of the border, or a reception, but nothing has yet been agreed.

Costa town halls on hold for new rules on charging 'plusvalía' tax

Benalmádena council has been ordered to pay back a Swiss national 121,801 euros of the added land-value tax after it calculated incorrectly

MALAGA. Town halls across the Costa del Sol and Malaga province are in limbo over 'plusvalía', the land-value tax they charge to property sellers, while they wait for a change in law to clarify how this tax can be levied in the future.

The uncertainty comes after last year's ruling by the Constitutional Court that town halls had been illegally charging the tax where real property prices had actually gone down and after a subsequent increase in court sentences against councils.

In the latest case to go against a Costa town hall, Benalmádena council has been ordered to pay back 121,801 euros to a Swiss national who was forced to overpay when they sold their property in the Torrequeda area in 2014.

The 'plusvalía' tax is levied directly by town halls on the supposed increase in value of land a property is built on since it last changed hands, and not on the sales value of the property itself. The levy has been at the centre of controversy as the legal formula used has often

incorrectly overestimated a land value increase even if the owner is losing money on the sale of the property itself.

In the case of the decision against Benalmádena, which came after an appeal led by lawyers Maldonado González, the court said that the council had failed to check whether the value had really gone up and had relied on standard calculation methods that have now been ruled unconstitutional. It says that the home-seller's attempts to show with market studies why the tax was disproportionate had been ignored.

The body responsible for collecting municipal taxes on behalf of 79 of the 103 town halls in Malaga prov-

ince says it currently has 6,000 requests for refunds from homeowners, developers and banks for money supposedly overpaid in the last four years combined with new property sales where councils have not charged the tax while the new rules are clarified. It says the total tax income on hold is 22 million euros.

Town halls are asking the government to urgently reform the 'plusvalía' tax and compensate them for the revenue they will be losing. They have proposed that either the charge be incorporated directly into income tax, taking it out of their hands, or a new charging scale linked to real property values. The new law is expected to come in the summer.

Owners of Malaga kids clothing retailer buy 3% of Unicaja Banco

MALAGA. The wealthy Malaga family that created and owns the Mayoral children's clothing company has acquired a 3.039% stake in Unicaja Banco, another locally based firm.

The market value of the shares acquired by the entrepreneurial Domínguez de Gor family, the head of which is listed by Forbes as the richest person in Andalucía, is over 75 million euros.

The investment places the family as third largest shareholder in the financial group. Besides the Unicaja foundation that still holds 49.6% of the stock, the next largest holding is with Fidelity funds, with 3.7%.

By buying a stake in Unicaja, which is Spain's seventh-largest financial group, the Domínguez de Gor family has taken the latest step in the diversification of its investment away from its Mayoral operation.

The company has already increased its stake in the Adolfo Domínguez clothing brand from 5.45% to 8.54% and is the fourth largest shareholder. In February the family also acquired a 10.5% share of mobile phone operator MásMóvil.

In 2017 Mayoral's turnover was 365 million euros.

Mariano Rajoy might have finally secured approval for Spain's 2018 budget, but his troubles are far from over. The day after the spending plan went through - having finally won the votes of the Basque Nationalist Party (PNV) - several Popular Party (PP) politicians were sent to prison in the Gürtel case, which involved allegations of a massive cash-for-contracts scheme within the party; indeed, the PP as a whole has been ordered to pay back €245,000.

Predictably, PSOE leader Pedro Sánchez - back in full crusading mode - has called for a no-confidence vote in the Spanish prime minister, which is happening today. Prior to the vote, sources indicated that Sánchez may garner enough support to take over as prime minister of Spain, thus burdening the country with a leader and a government that it didn't ask for. Hopefully, it won't come to that.

It's always laughable (as well as infuriating) when the traditional Spanish left preaches political morality to the PP, thus giving the impression that it's a stranger to corruption itself. This is only one reason why Sánchez shouldn't take up the role of prime minister: his party, as every Spaniard knows, is just as tarred by corruption as its opposite number.

The so-called ERE case is just one of the serious, ongoing investigations that affects the PSOE, in which over 200 people have already been formally accused. It implicates the Socialist

government of Andalucía in the misuse of around €150 million of public funds. Cash earmarked for employees' pensions or redundancy packages was allegedly channelled into PSOE members' pockets and used to pay for women, cocaine and a chauffeur (who eventually ratted them all out). To repeat, this is just one of the many cases in which the PSOE are charged or suspected of corruption on a large scale.

This is not to say that Rajoy should stay. The Gürtel case - in which the PP leader testified as a witness last year, and of which he says he had no knowledge - has ruined his credibility. And the PP's claim to be the only fit stewards of the country's steadily-improving economy is suspect, to say the least: its minority status in congress makes even the passing of a budget a fraught, drawn-out affair. But the embattled prime minister was right to remind the PSOE in parliament on Thursday that "there is corruption everywhere, as you well know".

At the time of writing, rumours indicate that Rajoy may resign if he suspects the Socialists will win the PNV's votes. This would prompt a snap election which would likely render the formation of a coalition government necessary - an imperfect outcome, for sure, but one vastly preferable to the PSOE gaining power. The only difference between the Socialists and the PP is the colour of banner they march under.

Build it and they will come?

I very much enjoyed the piece in the paper last week about the growth of the Malaga construction industry, although I would also like to express my concern about its implications.

In recent years Spain's housing bubble burst, which was a

huge issue for the national economy. There has also been an over-reliance on the tourism sector in the local area, which many new structures are springing up to accommodate. A diversified economy would weather the next storm much better.

Long life

The scientist Ginés Morata, who brought his theories to a lecture in Malaga last week, believes that we could live to be 600 or 700 years old. In other words, science and technology are developing at such speed that we are constantly having to re-think our definition of the word "impossible".

It's not that long since electricity was considered magic and that flying around the world was superhuman. Now it's difficult to keep up with the barrage of new tricks that the flourishing partnership of internet and smartphones can perform for us today; some advances are life-changing for the better, and others just drag us away from real life.

So if over the last few decades we

have been constantly achieving what was previously considered impossible, then there's no reason to doubt our scientist's words. We will, within just a few more decades, be able to slow down the ageing process significantly; but every sentence highlighting progress was followed

by a caveat - if we want to; if our politicians accept it.

Politicians. Imagine if we all did have a life span of 600; how long would a term of office be? How many years could a mayor or a president be in power for? Hundreds of years? That would make the cur-

rent mayor of Malaga, who'll be standing for election again next year at the age of 76, just at the start of his career.

And what about Spain's prime minister Mariano Rajoy, who's already overstayed his welcome, and faces a no-confidence motion as the name of his party becomes less and less separable from words like corruption and lies? He might be around for hundreds of years to come! And the old party cronies who have just been handed long prison sentences could bounce back after decades behind bars. Longer life spans would certainly not be a good idea for any political party that is in need of young blood and a fresh new image.

The dream of the human race is to achieve immortality, said Ginés

Morata. Well Connor MacLeod didn't seem to enjoy being immortal very much, and Dorian Gray's desire for eternal youth led to nothing but tragedy.

Scientific research is essential and governments should be investing more funds in it - but let's hope that for the time being they focus on projects to improve the quality of the life we have rather than just extending it.

The magic that falls into the hands of scientists in the next few years must be used to find cures for illnesses that take people from us long before their time.

But perhaps someone could save a bit of energy to invent a formula that turns people's faces green every time they tell a lie. That might cut a few political lives short.

"There wasn't anywhere like Torremolinos"

She modelled for Elio Berhanyer and helped bring the Beatles to Spain. Now, two husbands, three daughters and lots of adventures later, Shelagh Tennant is a retiree in Fuengirola

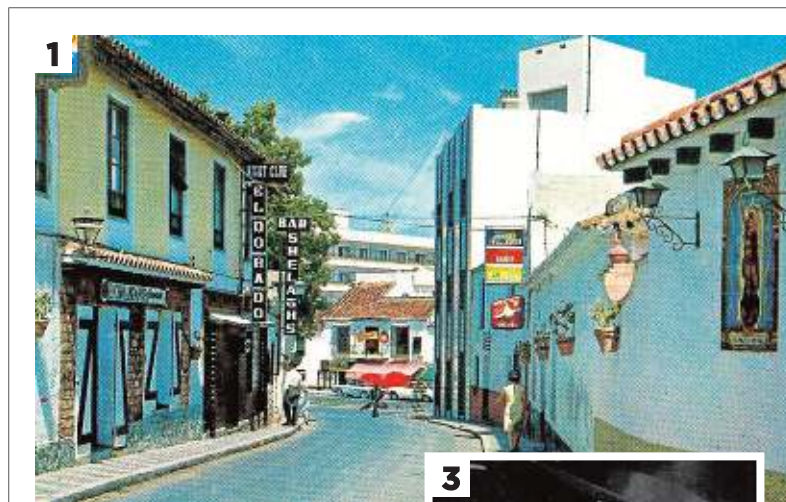

TORREMOLINOS. Few people know that the first English pub in Torremolinos opened "by chance". Shelagh Tennant, a British citizen who arrived in Spain at the age of ten with her family, invested two million pesetas in an establishment that started out as a pizzeria. Business never prospered. "It was a disaster," she says.

The excitement of the early sixties managed to survive amid the oppressive Franco years. One night, "after I had been arguing with the owner of El Dorado", the club next-door, Shelagh began serving drinks. She put on records that she had brought from England, which had never been released in Spain. It took about half an hour for a queue to form outside the establishment, then known as Shelagh's Bar, on Calle María Barrabino. "We sold rum and cokes for 25 pesetas and played songs by The Beatles, The Kinks and all the new music from London and Gibraltar," recalls Shelagh.

Torremolinos, a liberal oasis that survived on the margins of the dictatorship, was flourishing. "It was a marvellous place, nowhere will ever be the same. It didn't matter who you were. There were artists, hippies, writers, singers, hustlers, English people who didn't do anything. There was nowhere like it," Shelagh recalls.

When she realised that her bar could work, she hired waiters and

negotiated with suppliers. "I didn't plan it, everything was very spontaneous. We made a lot of money, but I've always been hopeless and I didn't keep any of it. I had ten waiters who danced while serving, dressed in silk. We made music with teaspoons and bottles. Everyone wanted to be there."

Shelagh's Bar competed with El Dorado, "but we had better music." During the short time it was open, Shelagh's became known as one of the trendiest bars in Torremolinos, reaching the same heights as Pedro's Bar, El Mañana and El Remo. Only The Galloping Major, which opened two years before Shelagh's pub, still remains.

However, the story of this particular woman is not limited to the restaurant business. The daughter of a wealthy family, Shelagh began working as a model aged 17, thanks

to Elio Berhanyer, whom she met through Jaime de Mora y Aragón. He immediately saw that she had potential. "Elio was the first fashion designer to pay models in Spain fairly."

Rebellious youth

Shelagh was a mischievous child and moved through various boarding schools after being repeatedly expelled for disobedience and bad behaviour. Her adolescence followed a similar pattern: she once spent three days locked in a police cell. "Then they took me to Carabanchel jail." Why? "The excuse was that I had been working in Spain without papers, but in reality it was because I had started going out with a man whose very influential family did not approve of our relationship."

After leaving prison, she mar-

ried David Tennant, an English aristocrat who was the son of the Baron Glenconner and three times Shelagh's age. They moved to Mijas. "We lived in El Palomar, but when I opened Shelagh's Bar I bought myself a house in Torremolinos called La Paloma. Everyone joked, asking me why the 'paloma' [dove] was never in El Palomar [dovecote]."

Her Torremolinos bar venture didn't last long, barely a couple of years. This was sufficient, however, for a BBC report about the establishment and an article in Modern Man magazine, which mixed erotic content with travel recommendations.

"Coca-Cola gave us an award for selling more soft drinks than any other establishment on the Costa del Sol, including the Hotel Pez Espada," she explains. Tired of all her responsibilities, Shelagh decided

to sell the bar and travel around Italy. The poet and lawyer Rafael Pérez-Estrada helped her with the sale of the bar. It ended up in the hands of another woman, Tina, who opened it as Tina's Bar. This establishment still remains today, despite various changes of ownership.

A friendship between Shelagh and Brian Epstein, famed manager of the Beatles, marked the second phase of the ex-model's professional life. "We loved each other very much. When the Beatles came to Madrid, I was in charge of the translations and the paperwork, since the tour promoter, Fernando Bermúdez, couldn't speak English," she recounts. At that point the band were in a fragile state: "John Lennon wanted to break it up, he felt that he bore all the pressure alone. Brian felt he was no longer on the same wavelength as Paul McCart-

ney, who was very conceited; or Ringo, who couldn't see what was going on; but he was totally in love with John."

Lennon was already familiar with Spain. Years before, he had travelled to Torremolinos with Epstein.

"We used to sit in a cafe in Torremolinos looking at all the boys and I'd say, 'Do you like that one, do you like this one?' I was rather enjoying it, thinking like a writer all the time: 'I am experiencing this,'" the Imagine songwriter once said of his trip.

Shelagh confesses that, over time, Epstein's focuses were changing. "There was a point where he just wanted to go to bed with [bullfighter] El Cordobés. He was crazy about that man." She also remembers how Epstein felt like he had become unable to control the group.

"Sometimes he would call me in tears at three or four in the morning, saying that he was going to kill himself. And in the end he did." She speaks in reference to Brian Epstein's fatal barbiturate overdose, which is officially considered to be an accident.

After her adventure with the Beatles in Madrid, Shelagh flirted with music promotion, although fickleness has always been a part of her professional career. "I have never needed money, although sometimes I've had lots and sometimes very little, but it has never interested or excited me."

Now, aged 75, with two marriages and three daughters under her belt, Shelagh lives in Fuengirola, where she leads a peaceful life. "The most important thing is never to quit. I was recently ready to do so, because I had a pinched nerve that caused me a lot of pain. All the doctor could do was write about it on the computer. However, the next day I got up and thought that there's always a reason to keep going."

Torremolinos Chic, a website run by José Luis Cabrera and Lutz Petry, which for the last decade has recovered images, postcards and anecdotes from the 'golden years' of the coastal town, will pay tribute to Shelagh, "one of the most fascinating people of that era" in the Galloping Major pub this evening, 1 June.

She says that she will receive her recognition with graciousness and charm: "I've got to make myself look pretty; my grandchildren are coming."

Shelagh's mother was a socialite who married an heir to a barony

TORREMOLINOS. Shelagh Tennant's mother, Marion Wrottesley, described as a 'raucously effervescent and flighty figure' was also something of a celebrity in Torremolinos.

She married the heir of a barony and hobnobbed with everyone from The Rolling Stones to Somerset Maugham and the Kray Twins.

Married seven times, one of her great loves was Alec Waugh, who immortalised her in his most celebrated novel, *Fuel for the Flame*. He also gave her a Cisitalia sports car, which is now in the Metropolitan Museum in New York.

During the 1950s, Marion inherited 30,000 pounds and she moved to a 13-bedroom mansion in Mallorca with her children, Mark and Shelagh.

A while later, she surfaced among the bullfighting sector of Torremolinos, where she received the nickname Pinkie, on account of the colour of her hair. She returned penniless to London during the swinging sixties and spent the remainder of her life living in bedsits in Kensington and Earls Court. She died in 2006.

When informed that she would meet all her old cronies in heaven, she reportedly replied, "I think I'm going to do a little wandering first."

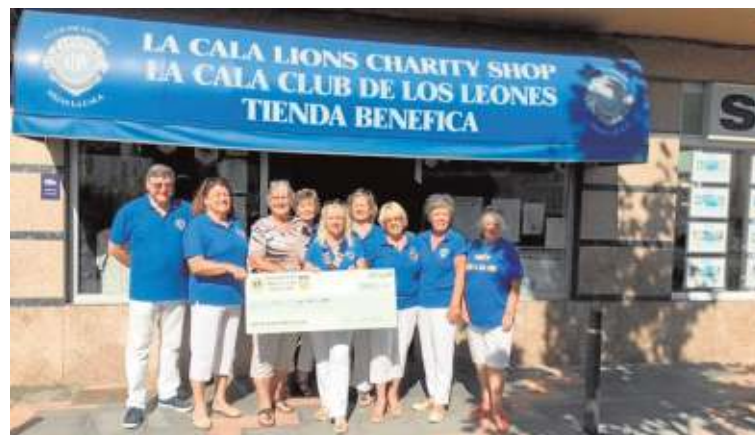
RBL Quiz trophy stays in Coín

A graveyard with a curious history

A new English language tour of the cemetery in Benalmádena will focus on the tombs of the famous residents

BENALMÁDENA. Some people may not relish the thought of spending their leisure time in a cemetery, especially when they are enjoying their holidays, but Leslie Thompson, a local undertaker, believes he can change this.

Leslie, who works for the Francisco Camero funeral directors in Benalmádena, has decided to offer guided tours around the International Cemetery in Benalmádena. His aim is to educate culturally minded locals and tourists in the history of the cemetery, while highlighting some of its most distinguished residents.

Opened in January 1969, the secluded necropolis is situated above the town's old bullring and has panoramic views of the surrounding mountains and the coastline.

The cemetery has no religious restrictions, and so Muslims, Catholics, Jews and atheists are buried alongside each other.

"This is an international cemetery, so anyone can be buried here. Although there are a few Muslim graves in the main part of the cemetery, there is also a separate Muslim burial ground," Leslie tells SUR in English.

Many of the first burials were of the bones of people who had previously been laid to rest in the old cemetery in Arroyo de la Miel. Some

were also transferred from the former graveyard of the Santo Domingo de Guzmán church in Benalmádena Pueblo.

"Burials are no longer authorised in the old cemetery in Arroyo de la Miel. The area is being cleared for development, so all of the bones will eventually be reburied here," Leslie says.

For his tours, which will be conducted in English, Leslie will concentrate on some of the more famous people who are interred in the graveyard, and these include a diverse collection of national and international celebrities.

One of the most impressive tombs is that of Argentine singer and actress, Imperio Argentina, who died in 2003. Imperio's career

spanned more than 50 years and she became one of Spain's most admired stars, although she was often criticised for her apparent allegiance to the fascist regime.

Ivor Emmanuel, a Welsh singer and actor probably best remembered for his role as Private Owen in the 1964 movie, Zulu, was laid to rest in the cemetery in 2007.

Others are Slavko Vorkapich, a prominent figure of modern cine-

matography in America during the early and mid-20th century; and Paul Lukas, a Hungarian-born actor honoured with a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame.

Although his ashes are not in the cemetery, celebrated Cuban jazz pianist and band leader, Bebo Valdes, was cremated here in 2013.

There is also a rumour that one of the actors from 1939 movie, Gone with the Wind, is interred here, but

Leslie says he has yet to confirm this.

Among the more curious stories hidden in the cemetery are those of the tomb of Jaromir Hanush, an international scientist known as one of the 'fathers of the atomic bomb', and Martha Chippendale, the wife of John Douglas Williams. Williams was the chauffeur of the car that was carrying President John F. Kennedy on the day he was assassinated in Dallas in 1963. However, why his wife is buried here is another mystery that Leslie intends to uncover.

"A lot of British and American celebrities came to Benalmádena to escape the pressures of their trades, but I have yet to find out why Martha Chippendale is here," Leslie says, looking mystified.

He came up with the idea of the guided tours several years ago, but the project never really got off the ground. However, after careful planning and plenty of research, he is now ready to offer the first tour, which will take place at 11am on Saturday 16 June.

The one-hour tour, which is free, will begin with a brief talk concerning the history of the cemetery, followed by a guided tour of the gardens and tombs. Visitors will also enjoy light refreshments and the chance to ask questions.

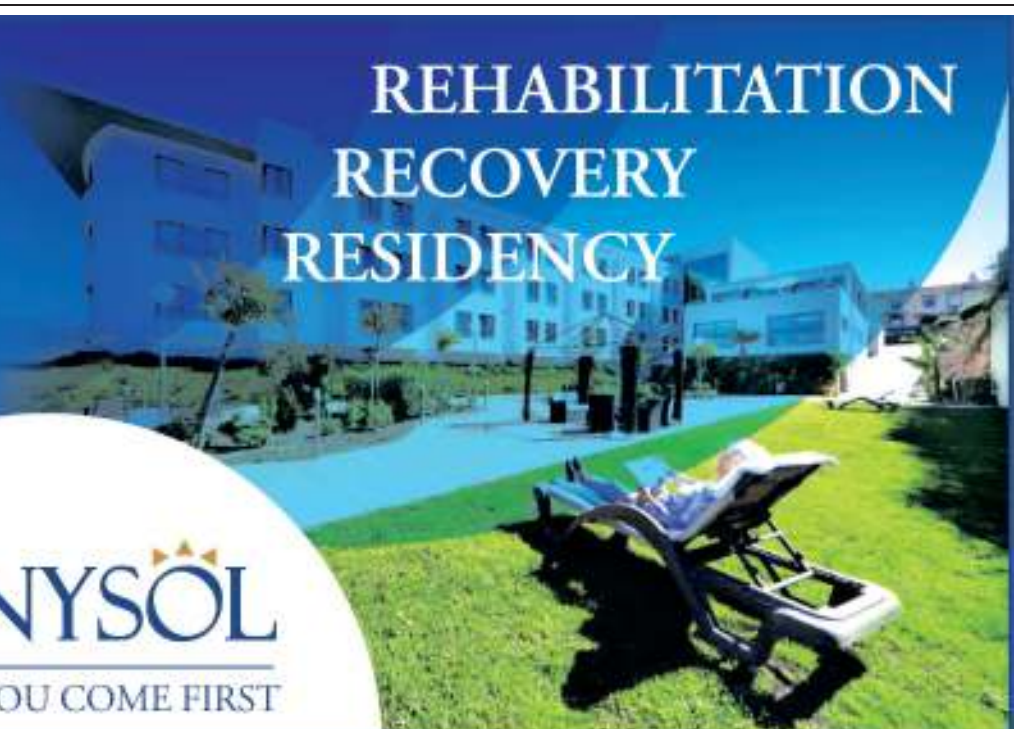

Picasso receives Warhol at home

The Picasso Museum in Malaga is showing a retrospective about the father of pop art, with nearly 400 works from his 30-year career

MALAGA. In the 1950s, a young man from an industrial town who had started to make a fortune as an illustrator in the Big Apple, wrote to the director of the New York Museum of Modern Art (MoMA), Alfred Barr,

offering one of his works to the institution. The all-powerful Barr was diplomatic in his refusal, but: "If you visit the MoMA today you will see more people taking photos in front of the Campbell's soup tin than Las

señoritas de Avignon", said José Lebrero, artistic director of the Picasso Museum in Malaga (MPM), this week, describing not only Andy Warhol's ascent to fame but also the fact that he is only 20th century artist to be almost as popular as Picasso.

Both artists are now together at the MPM, which is the last stop on a tour by the retrospective about the father of pop art after previously being shown in Barcelona and Madrid.

'Warhol. El arte mecánico' contains nearly 400 impressive works, and is expected to be a great success, especially as it will be on the Costa del Sol in peak tourist season. Around 485,000 people went to see it in the

two previous cities.

The exhibition includes not only Warhol's most famous works, but also some of his experimental projects and his early creations, such as illustrations for different magazines and four-minute films which were like moving portraits (or not) of different personalities.

On loan from 45 collections

This is such an important exhibition that 45 organisations and private collectors have loaned works for it, including the MoMA, Metropolitan Museum of Modern Art, the Centre Pompidou in Paris, the Tate in London and the Museo Reina Sofia in Madrid. Most of the album and book covers have been loaned by Canadian collector Paul Marechal.

The works were created throughout Warhol's 30 year-career, from his beginnings in the publishing industry to his fame on the New York cultural and social scene, including his portraits of Marilyn Monroe, Elizabeth Taylor, and Jackie Kennedy, his Brillo pad boxes, the 'Silver Clouds' made with material used by NASA and much more. The exhibition continues until 16 September.

The exhibition includes the most experimental works by the famous American artist

QUEEN'S

Chinese houses

This Californian wild flower looks stunning sown in a border or grown on its own as a container plant

Collinsia heterophylla is a native Californian wild flower that grows in partial shade under oaks and other trees at the edge of woods. It is a member of the Schropulariaceae family (figworts) that includes fox-

gloves and antirrhinums.

Common names include innocence, blue-eyed Marys and Chinese houses, the latter because the flowers form in tight whorls of de-

creasing diameter which give the plant the appearance of a pagoda. The overall height of this plant is usually around 40cm, depending on the soil. They prefer a rich loam but will grow in most soils.

The flowers are similar to those of the antirrhinum (snapdragon) and have a lilac or white upper lip and a rose, purple or violet lower lip. They attract lots of bees and butterflies.

The leaves of Chinese houses are bright green and lance-shaped and the whole plant is covered with a velvety fuzz like the skin of a peach.

Unfortunately it is not drought or frost resistant and needs regular watering during dry spells. It is best treated as an annual and will seed itself around the garden. Alternatively the seed can be collected and sown in early spring. It doesn't need to be covered with soil; just sprinkle on the surface and press down lightly.

The genus name Collinsia is in honour of Philadelphia botanist and Quaker, Zaccheus Collins (1764-1831). The specific epithet 'heterophylla' refers to the fact that the same plant has two types of leaves, some with smooth edges and others finely serrated. An added attraction is that the leaves turn a rich crimson at the end of the reproductive cycle.

Flowering usually finishes in early autumn but regular dead-heading, before the fruit sets, will prolong flowering.

GARDENING HINTS

The garden accessory

The perfect garden is never complete without a few 'accessories'. These include pieces of sculpture, fountains, mirrors and the most popular of all, a sundial. They were once the only form of accurate time keeping and go back to ancient Egypt and Greece. The Romans always incorporated them into their gardens and they became a garden fixture right up until the mid 1800s when mechanical clocks became more accurate (up until then they had to be continually reset using a sundial). Although sundials continued to be used as a garden ornament,

they surged back into popularity just before the First World War and many long-forgotten dials were resurrected and new ones created. Sundials do make a wonderful focal point in a garden but if you want to tell the time accurately then remember that they are place-specific; buying a sundial that was manufactured in another country is likely to mean that the angle of the gnomon (the needle) is wrong for where you live. You may have to tilt the dial slightly to make up the difference in latitude which, incidentally, here in southern Spain is roughly 37°.

1 JUNE 1778

Families from Malaga embark on a journey to colonise Louisiana

The roots of New Iberia, the American town twinned with Alhaurín de la Torre and Fuengirola, lie in Malaga. In 1762, the Treaty of Fontainebleau transferred the rule of the North American state of Louisiana to the Spanish Empire. This was kept secret, however, during the negotiations for the 1763 Treaty of Paris, which awarded a lot of North American land to Great Britain. At that time, the state was populated by mostly French, British and Native American people. In an effort to assert its dominance over the vast land, the Spanish Empire planned to colonise Louisiana with its own people. It sought volunteers

from the province of Malaga, promising poor families their own plots of land, farm tools and money for growing crops. On 1 June 1778 a group of 16 Spanish families set sail to America aboard the ship San José, led by governor Bernardo de Gálvez from Macharaviaya. The majority of the colonists were from Malaga, with many hailing from the Axarquía and Alhaurín de la Torre. At this time, New Orleans (not Baton Rouge) was the state capital and their desired destination. After a gruelling four months at sea, stops in Puerto Rico and Cuba and the deaths of many of the travellers, the colonists eventually arrived at the port of New Orleans on 11 November.

between the Spaniards and the French-descended Acadians who resided at the new site. More 'Malagueños' arrived from New Orleans, though many were in a state of poor health. Evidence suggests the town lacked a doctor. In August 1779, Spain became involved in the US War of Independence and Nueva Iberia's military men left the town to fight, led by Bouligny, who by then had been appointed leader of colonisation. Bouligny was replaced and, under a new intendant, those left behind through the winter suffered meagre harvests and hostile conditions. The population of Spaniards

began to wane and it is thought that by 1793 only six of the original families remained. In 1800, Napoleon regained the land for France. Soon after, in 1803, the state was sold to the USA in a transaction known as the Louisiana Purchase. Nueva Iberia became New Iberia. Though the colonisation of Louisiana was by no means benign, today the town acknowledges its past with an annual Spanish-themed festival where residents enjoy flamenco, tapas and paella.

A glimpse into the world of artists

The popular Open Studios event in the village of Gaucín continues this weekend

MALAGA. Anyone who likes art should take note that the second part of the annual Open Studios event is taking place in the pretty village of Gaucín, in the Serranía de Ronda, this weekend. It is well worth a visit.

One of the joys of this event is that it has something to interest everybody. If, like me, you are someone who “knows nothing about art but knows what they like”, it is a fascinating voyage of discovery, into painting, sculpture, textiles, ceramics, photographs and jewellery. For those who are already knowledgeable, it is intriguing to see new works and how the artists evolve.

It is equally as interesting for other professionals: an artist friend who accompanied me last weekend immediately got stuck into very enjoyable discussions with the creators about the materials they used, and their techniques.

The Open Studios concept is a novel way for everybody to enjoy art: touring the artists’ studios, seeing them at work, chatting to them and having the opportunity to buy or commission unique works from local creators, which

makes them even more special.

There are 18 studios this year, and they are clearly indicated. There are also maps showing the layout of Gaucín and the location of the studios, most of which are in the village centre.

Some of the studios are in the artists’ own homes, so this event also gives a fascinating glimpse inside traditional village houses, and in other cases the artists rent the studios as places to work and ex-

hibit their creations.

Possibly the most surprising and effective studio this year is number 8, in Calle Convento, which is being used by painter and sculptor Jim Rattenbury: the unusually shaped space is beneath a swimming pool and it has proven an atmospheric setting for his varied works.

Unfortunately, space precludes a description of all the studios here but the participating artists this year, in the order the studios are numbered, are Rosie Venables, Silvia Franco, Chris Klees, Sarah Webb, Sian Feber, Gerrit Oppeland-Hampel, Vivienne Whiffen, Jim Rattenbury, Nozomi Hatano, Michael Roschlau, Lesley Riddihough, Jennifer Waterhouse, Paddy Robinson, Emma Cornish, Sebastian Fisher, J. Sánchez Zabaleta, Ana Pellón, Juan Antonio Sangil, Javier Machimbarrena, Stephanie Thompson and Anna McGrane.

The Open Studios event can be visited today (1 June), tomorrow and Sunday, from 11am to 7pm. There is a great deal to see, but Gaucín really lends itself to an event of this type, with plenty of places for refreshments or a meal, and stunning views over the countryside to enjoy in-between the studio visits. This makes a really good day out; if you miss it this weekend, make a note in the diary for next year. It goes from strength to strength.

BREXIT – MOVING TO SPAIN NOW: THE POSITIVE APPROACH

There have been a lot of harbingers of doom about Brexit and British citizens buying property and moving to Spain. However, on re-reading the Joint Report of the UK Government and the European commission of 8th December 2017 it is clear that for those thinking of buying or renting property and living in Spain before Brexit, some of the most important rights have been secured.

“This agreement guarantees that your rights as residents in the EU will be protected in the Withdrawal Agreement, so you can have certainty that you will be able to receive healthcare rights, pension and other benefits provisions as you do today. You can also benefit from existing rules for past and future social security contributions. Furthermore, we have agreed that close family members will be able to join you in the Member State where you live, after the UK has left.”

This includes partners, Civil partners, grandparents and others.

It may well prove to be a mistake to take the wait-and-see approach if you are considering moving to live permanently in Spain, or indeed to set up a business or become an employee. For the retired, the major concern has been reciprocal rights on healthcare, so again it would be better to make your move prior to the final stages of Brexit.

Crazy about mental health

Thousands of people with mental disorders “came out of the closet” for the first time in Spain to celebrate Mad Pride Day. “We just want our space and not to be looked at like oddballs,” they say

Nobody could have guessed that an informal conversation in a Telegram group at the end of the year would sow the seed for Mad Pride Day or Día del Orgullo Loco in Spain. But “why not?” asked some of the friends who had created the forum to share their experiences in associations for people with mental disorders.

Soon family members, activists,

and mutual support groups joined in and within a few weeks they had a logo, informative letters for other groups to encourage them to take part in the day and a common slogan: ‘Pride Cures’.

“We wanted to reappropriate a word [loco] which is often used in a derogatory way, to give it a new sense, away from negative connotations,” said sources at the organisation. Now 20 May 2018 will remain in the minds of about 20 organisations and thousands of people who, affected by a mental illness, decided to “come out of the closet” on that day and face a society “which marginalises and isolates us”.

“We are not proud of our suffer-

ing, but we are proud of how we are. We just want our space and not to be looked at like oddballs,” said Rodolfo García, president of the En Primera Persona association and organiser of the Mad Pride action in Andalucía.

However, coming out of a closet which is as discriminatory, closed and asphyxiating as homosexuality was in its day, has not been easy. “There is a risk involved, which is that people will label us and reject us, but we have to face that so things will be easier for those who come afterwards. Somebody always has to take the first step and show that we do matter. It remains to be seen whether or not they accept us as we are, with our differences,” ex-

plained García.

At present, eight out of every ten people with mental health problems in Spain are unemployed. “Having a proper, motivating job is beneficial for anybody, but for those with mental health problems it is also essential for their recovery and independence,” said Ana Lancho, president of the Madrid association La Barandilla.

For 20 years she has run the Lajman day hospital, a psycho-re-

habilitation centre, and two years ago she started a project using radio as a therapeutic tool for people who have difficulties in developing a social life; this has repercussions on their quality of life and self-esteem. They often feel cornered, pointed at and undervalued, and that isolates them and closes them into their own world, which they find it hard to leave.

That was the case with Paqui, who

was diagnosed with paranoid schizophrenia and depression 25 years ago. Today she collaborates with the radio station started by La Barandilla association and she only has words of gratitude for them.

"The relationship with my parents wasn't good, but they realised that something wasn't right when I told them I was having religious visions," she says. That is when Paqui's uphill struggle began: when she

found out she had schizophrenia she gave up singing in a choir, cut off all contact with her friends, telling them that as far as they were concerned she was dead, spent hours sleeping at home because of her treatment and began to feel rejected by people, especially when they crossed the road to avoid her because they feared a violent reaction.

"Sometimes, the way you are treated causes more damage than the

illness itself," said Ana Lancho. Today, at 51, Paqui is a woman who is contagiously cheerful at the other end of the phone and she is thinking of joining a new choir.

With the celebration of Mad Pride Day, with its demonstrations, workshops and declarations read out in the main cities, Spain joined a movement that started in Canada in 1993. In that year, a group of people affected by mental disorders went out

into the streets to denounce the prejudices and discrimination they suffered from other people, who didn't want to coexist with them in the Parkdale district of Toronto.

Their message struck a chord in other countries, including the USA, South Africa, Ghana, Australia, Brazil, UK, France, Italy, Belgium and Germany.

Asturias was a pioneer in Spain in celebrating Mad Pride Day in 2010, although that year they called it El Escandalazo, alluding to the evaluation by the World Health Organisation (WHO) of the mental health services in that region, "but whose recommendations were not adopted", said Tomás Corominas, a member of the Hierbabuena mental health association.

In his opinion, it was difficult for Mad Pride Day to take off in Spain because traditionally "families and professionals have stopped us participating and being represented". "Many of those affected stigmatise themselves. Sometimes, we do ourselves no favours by having a confused image of all this," said Corominas.

The organisers of this movement are seeking to change society's perception of people who suffer from mental disorders.

"They are stigmatised by ignorance, media cowardice and film

scripts. People often think that they are violent but they're quite the opposite, they are victims of society," said Nel González, president of the Spanish Mental Health Confederation.

However this organisation, which represents more than 300 associations and 47,000 members all over the country, disassociated itself from Mad Pride Day because it considered it too controversial.

"Not everyone is proud of their illness and that obliged us to take an eclectic position," said González in justification.

But beyond the social stigma of those affected by a mental disorder, of whom there are more than a million in Spain (half of them serious cases), this group is claiming the right for them to make decisions about their own treatments and to be respected.

"We cannot tolerate being tied to beds in hospitals, nor being admitted against our will, nor being filled with drugs to tranquilise us; it is time for psycho-social treatment to become an alternative to drugs, because we're not just a symptom and a diagnosis. That's the only way society will learn to know us and accept us," said Rodolfo García.

The Spanish Mental Health Confederation has also recently

➤ contacted the office of the UN's High Commissioner for Human Rights to denounce the breaching of human rights in the psychiatry sector.

"At medical centres they are still applying protocols which need to be abolished, such as forced immobilisation (being locked into rooms), blackmail and chemical containment (abuse of medication). It is not acceptable that, if they have a crisis, the patient has to leave their home in handcuffs to be taken to hospital; it is traumatic and a very injurious practice for the patient," said Nel González.

Closure of asylums

The Health Law of 1986 resulted in the definitive closure of the so-called 'manicomios', or asylums. Men and women who until then had been held in inhumane conditions were considered citizens with the right to receive suitable treatment, as if they were suffering from any other type of illness.

"Closing those prisons was a liberation and it gave rise to a later movement to respond to the needs of thousands of sick people who were able to coexist in society," explained González.

It was in a mental health association in Zaragoza that José Manuel Dolader sought answers to a tragic event which marked his family forever. Now, 12 years after his nephew killed his grandmother (José Manuel's mother) after a psychotic episode, they are still unable to talk about the matter.

"Even though he had been diagnosed with schizophrenia my sister refused to see the problem and consented to my nephew not taking medication. That is all that could explain what he did, because he loved his grandmother," said Dolader.

That family tragedy led him to becoming personally involved with this social reality and collaborate with the Tú Decides and La Barandilla associations, which he now runs. He believes these patients should service their sentence (his nephew spent five years in jail) "but that they should be given special consideration, because my nephew didn't know what he was doing".

Scientific advances in the field of psychiatry have been very important, especially in the "decade of the brain", said Julio Bobes, president of the Spanish Psychiatry Society. "The investment in research

between 1990 and 2000 led to major advances in personalised psychiatry, with the discovery of genetic data associated with serious mental conditions and the possibility of making predictions and knowing when medication would be most effective through genetic

markers," he explained.

Nevertheless, a major concern for specialists in this field nowadays is the increase in drug consumption, especially psycho-stimulants like amphetamines, cocaine and cannabis.

"The problem we have is that pa-

tients with serious disorders (schizophrenia, bipolar disorder and degenerative conditions) who take drugs make their illness worse," said Bobes.

This psychiatrist also warns of the danger of young people consuming these substances, because it precipitates the appearance of serious mental illness (which has its origin in a genetic alteration), and the prognoses for the illnesses are worsened by contact with drugs.

The World Health Organisation forecasts that one in every four people will suffer from mental illness during their life. At present in Spain, more than nine per cent of the population already lives with one, and depression is the most common.

In recent years psychiatrists have seen an increase in consultations for problems associated with everyday life, such as anxiety, stress, depression, adaptive tensions, or setbacks in their working or family life.

"Now, half of a psychiatrist's working day is spent seeing patients with depression, although most are slight or moderate cases," said Bobes. However, he gave the following warning: "Depression will be the most incapacitating mental disorder in the next decade, given the prevalence of patients at present."

Human rights

Associations representing people affected by mental disorders continue to denounce healthcare practices that "do not respect human rights". They reject methods such as tying a patient to the bed, excessive sedation, blackmail or isolation.

The Health Law was the start of the psychiatric reform in Spain and the end of mental asylums. Men and women who had been locked up in inhumane conditions started to live in society and their illness was treated like any other. "It was a great liberation," said the Spanish Mental Health Confederation.

Switzerland has five times more (50.1 for every 100,000), and France and Germany more than double (22.7 and 22.3, respectively). Experts warn of an increase in cases of anxiety and depression and say that drug use is bringing forward the age at which illnesses such as schizophrenia first appear (from 24 years of age to 19, on average).

of people affected by a mental disorder in Spain are unemployed. This is the highest rate compared with unemployment among people affected by other illnesses and disabilities. Social support groups say that having a job is essential for people to become self-sufficient and recover the self-esteem lost following their diagnosis.

"People could live for as long as 600 or 700 years"

In a recent lecture in Malaga, the scientist and winner of a Príncipe de Asturias Award, Ginés Morata, declared that the process of ageing could be halted

MALAGA. Could immortality be possible one day? This was the burning question at a talk given in Malaga last Friday by Ginés Morata, member of the Spanish scientific research council (CSIC) and winner of the prestigious Prince of Asturias award in 2007.

"In the future people could live for 600 or 700 years," Ginés Morata told SUR during a press conference prior to his master class on the subject of genomic medicine, organised by the Malaga medical school and EADE, a private study centre in the city.

If the limits of human life currently oscillate between 110 and 120 years, with both biological and genetic advances, in the future this could reach 600 or 700 years. However, this is dependent on society wanting it and politicians accept-

ing it. "To begin with, we've got to manage to slow down the ageing process considerably, so that, even if they aren't young forever, humans can remain younger for a long period of time," explained the scientist.

"This will be possible one day, if people think it will be of any use to them. If it can be done with flies, worms and other species, why not with man, considering the number of genes we share with other animals? Another thing is whether or not people will want this."

When asked when this might be possible, he replied: "Potentially, I believe it'll be possible within the next 50 to 100 years." The top scientist made it clear that society will have to say whether it is open to these changes or not. "Nobody wants to die. Why should it be impossible for a person to live for 600 years. I personally want to live for

much longer," he revealed.

With regards to immortality, he emphasises that from a scientific point of view and from what is already known about human and animal biology, life may well reach new limits. "I'm not saying that immortality is impossible, although it isn't at this moment. The dream of the human race is to achieve immortality," the scientist added.

"It's been done on worms"

Morata referenced molecular genetics investigations that have already extended the lives of many living beings. He also mentioned that science has managed to multiply the lifespan of a worm by six times the original, through manipulating the genes related to ageing. Therefore he asks, "if we carry out the same process on human beings, why shouldn't we come to live to 600 or 700 years?"

In addition to those achievements already mentioned, Ginés Morata has received further prizes throughout his career. Born in 1945 in Rioja (Almeria), he has recently been named Foreign Associate at the National Academy of Scientists in the United States.

A LOST OPPORTUNITY



Almost anyone you speak to about the recent royal wedding will agree that the British have a gift for organising such events. Never mind that they invented this sort of ritual in the 18th century and injected a level of ceremonial and ritualistic procedure as a way of invoking a patriotic verve to what would otherwise have been rather dull and routine affairs. The wedding of Prince Harry and Meghan Markle followed the usual pattern, giving a gloss and flair to what is becoming the obligatory democratisation of European monarchies.

The wedding breakfast menu is now a matter of record. Scottish langoustines, lamb from the Windsor royal estate and pork from Sandringham. And to toast the happy couple? A British sparkler, surely? Well, actually no. The old favourite of the royal household and By Appointment choice, Pol Roger Champagne. Hackles have been raised among British wine growers, and quite rightly so. What better opportunity could there have been to show the guests that internationally recognised brands such as Camel Valley, Chapel Down, Nyetimber, Harrow & Hope and Gusborne are as good as any country can produce, and indeed have scored more highly than French bubbly in blind tastings? For the official visit of Spain's king and queen in

2017, the wines choice was an English fizz, Camel Valley, a white Burgundy and a Ribera del Duero. No-one's feathers ruffled there. The organisation of many official banquets is contracted out to independent catering companies, which also have a say in what is served. So the knee-jerk reaction was to order Pol Roger with no questions asked, rather along the lines of no-one got fired for ordering IBM, as they used to say at the onset of the computer revolution in the USA.

Can you imagine any other European country turning its back on its own wines at such an important event? Rather like President Macron serving Italian wines at an official banquet, or Angela Merkel hosting a dinner at which Spanish wines were served?

The restaurants of the prestigious La Cónsula catering school in Malaga and La Fonda in Benalmádena have reopened to the public

MALAGA. After nearly three years closed to the public, there was impatience for La Cónsula to reopen its restaurant. Miguel Delgado and Mari Carmen García were among those affected by the closure of the catering school in Churriana, near Malaga; they had planned to celebrate their wedding on December 4, 2015 and had booked the whole premises for the event. Just a week before the wedding they were notified that it would be impossible to hold the event there because the teachers were on strike, protesting because they had not been paid for months. However Miguel and Mari Carmen held no grudge; as soon as they saw in the press that La Cónsula was reopening, they made reservations. "We are in love with La Cónsula," Miguel acknowledged. His was the second table to be occupied on the day the restaurant opened for the

public. Before them were Héléne Arnoux and Michelle Bolliriviere, two French friends who have lived in Alhaurin de la Torre for 15 years and who used to have lunch together once a month in this restaurant. "We were sad to hear about the situation, we saw the news about the problems and we could not believe that this could happen to a restaurant of this category," commented Héléne.

More than forty people went to La Cónsula on the reopening and tried the tasting menu which consisted of octopus carpaccio with seasoned spider crab and pine nut vinaigrette; baked hake with white asparagus sauce and Iberian pork shoulder marinated with fines herbes. The wines were a white Rueda Verdejo and a red Ribera del Duero Tempranillo. The dessert, a lemon mouse with basil, was paired with a muscatel wine from Malaga and Pedro Ximénez.

La Fonda

In La Fonda, a few kilometres away in Benalmádena Pueblo, the same thing was happening. Here they served Andalusian gazpacho with olive oil ice cream and lime foam, turbot supreme over sweet tomato with saffron and Iberian grilled

pork steak with wrinkled potatoes and coriander. The dessert was profiteroles with three chocolate sauce.

After the meal, both students and teachers were satisfied that everything went according to plan

and they received numerous compliments from the diners.

In both schools, the menu, which changes every week, costs 20 euros, and does not have VAT. They quickly get booked up, with reservations

coming in by email or by phone.

Isabel García, one of the teachers, says she answers many calls and has to tell the callers that there is no availability. "In October we will be reopening," she says.

The first to sit in the reserved area were friends from Malaga and Madrid, also regulars of La Cónsula. "We live in Madrid, but we often come to Torremolinos. And whenever we return we ask about La Cónsula," said Julio Merino, accompanied by his wife, Mariví Echevarría. "We used to come frequently, and we have very good memories," they said. The other couple, Manuel Fernández and Carmen

González, invited the American musician Martha High, singer for the great James Brown for three decades, to join them for lunch so that she could get to know the La Cónsula restaurant and the area loved by Hemmingway.

Hard work

The nerves were evident in the kitchen. Miguel Núñez and his students prepared the starter, a dish that was offered on previous menus and that had always received a good review, the octopus carpaccio.

"They have worked hard, preparing menus daily; now it's different,

with the added pressure of customers," he acknowledged. New orders were announced over the loudspeaker, and Laida Lara and her colleagues from Group B were preparing to give the last touches to the hake with the teacher, Alejandro Zamora placing the foam around the fillet while Laida garnished the dish.

It is precisely this dish that Hélené and Michelle liked the most and they were the first to finish.

"It was all very good, very well presented and the sauce was spectacular! We will definitely be coming back," promised Hélené.

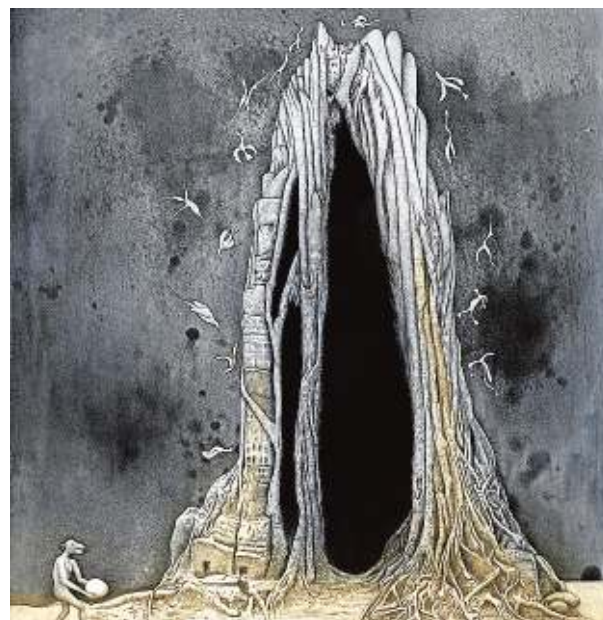

Art inspired by María Zambrano

The Centre of Hispanic-Moroccan Studies has a new collection to celebrate the legacy of the local philosopher

MÁLAGA. "I'm interested in the poetic reason of María Zambrano, to understand the world through serene meditative thought. I've tried to include that in my work, to depict the emotions that we try to resist." Aixa Portero says each word measuredly as if trying to phrase

her sentences perfectly. She is distrustful of haste, yet she inhabits the same daily vortex that so many of us do nowadays. The result of that creativity takes a delicate and deep form. A winged book called Niké. Or her six paintings on Japanese paper. Or her nest of feathers and twigs which she says demonstrates the link between human beings and nature.

Ultimately, her goal is to recreate the thought processes of philosopher María Zambrano through art. That was the impetus behind her collection that was unveiled last week in the Centre of Hispanic-Moroccan Studies in Málaga. Six

artists were chosen by the curator, María Bueno, to display works based around Zambrano's most famous work, 'Algunos Lugares de la Pintura'.

"María Zambrano is an author who is known internationally, especially in Latin America, since she stayed there during her exile; however in Málaga one can learn a lot about her life and her works," said María Bueno, creator of the exhibition which can be visited in the centre of the Plaza de Teatro until 15 June.

The artists' works are very different, despite all being inspired by Zambrano. "All establish a link

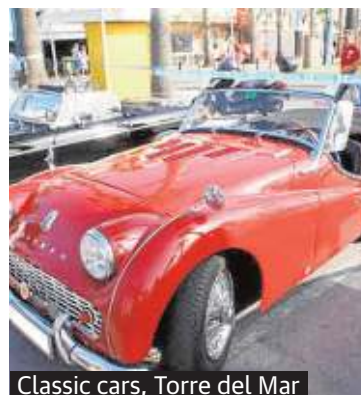

Moors and Christians prepare for friendly battle in Mojácar

TWO DAYS IN MOJÁCAR

Car + visit on foot

Journey: 3 hours and 30 minutes from Malaga. **Festival:** Moros y Cristianos, 4 hours. **Monuments and museums:** 5 hours.

Mojácar's Al-Andalus history is at the heart of one of its most exciting traditions, the Festival of Moors and Christians, which takes place between Friday 8 and Sunday 10 June.

The theatrical event is mimicked in various other municipalities of the Spanish Mediterranean area, including in other towns in Almeria province. It revolves around the historical conflicts between Arabs and Castilian troops over land ownership.

In the case of Mojácar, the

performances relate to one historical event that occurred in 1488, when the town mayor, Alabez, refused to surrender unconditionally to the envoy of the Catholic monarchs, Captain Garcilaso de la Vega.

One of the unique features of the live reenactments in Mojácar is that there are no winners or losers. Unlike many other festivals of this kind, this story concludes with negotiations and a peaceful surrender.

Mojácar's Festival of Moors and Christians is one of the most important events of the year, as much in the town as in the surrounding district. The many local people who dress up in period costume, fill the town with colour.

The weekend kicks off on Friday evening (8 June), when the Moorish King hands over the key to Christian King as the troops gather. From there, marching men from both sides of the conflict parade with horses and take part in mediaeval tournaments.

Over the three days, the small tourist town is transformed into a true-to-life Arab souk, not just because of the reenactments, but also due to the wealth of activities in the programme, as well as a farmers' market in the old town (between Plaza Nueva and Calle Glorieta).

The event, which is celebrated every year at the end of spring, gives the town an unmistakable taste of summer. In fact, for the townspeople, it represents the start of the new season, given the high temperatures and the thousands of Spanish and foreign tourists.

MALAGA. Malaga CF have won a place in Spain's top flight in women's football, La Liga Iberdrola. On Sunday all they needed was a draw against Femarguín in Gran Canaria to secure promotion, but they won their play-off match thanks to a goal from María Ruiz in the 72nd minute.

The team played consistently well all season, finishing top of their group as a whole to earn a place in the play-offs. Their promotion follows a very poor season for the men's team, who came last in La Liga and have been relegated to the second division. The women's team secured promotion in Arguineguín, the same town where the men's team won promotion to La Liga ten years ago, at the end of the 2007/8 season.

Now that the celebrations have reached their end, it is time to face the reality that what lies ahead in La Liga will not be an easy ride. There were only three or four teams that

against Femarguín. María Ruiz's goal, a spectacular chip from the edge of the box.

Following their victory, the players arrived at Malaga airport at 1am on Monday morning where around a hundred friends, relatives and fans were waiting for them.

Atletico Malagueño's brilliant season earns side promotion

MALAGA It was third time lucky for Malaga's reserve team, Atlético Malagueño, when they finally managed to achieve promotion into Segunda B after spending 11 years in Tercera.

The 1-1 score away against Yeclano on Sunday was all they needed. After their previous match against Yeclano concluded in a draw (0-0), Malagueño's objective was clear: a draw or a win would immediately secure promotion.

The Costa side has had bad luck in the play-offs in past seasons, but an excellent set of players has helped Atlético Malagueño climb the ranks this year. Jaime Moreno and Jack Harper played strongly on Sunday, and the return of defender Fernando Deco balanced the team well, both in defence and offence.

Key to the match was Ignacio Abeledo. After an attempt from Yeclano was deflected, the ball was passed to the Malaga striker, who sent it into the back of the net with

a rabona kick to set the score at 0-1. However, Iker Torre equalised for the home side with an unstoppable free kick before half time.

Both goals were scored in the first 45 minutes, making for an exciting first half, although the second half became something of a stalemate, despite the away side dominating possession and posing genuine threats to the Yeclano goal.

The resulting tie means that the Malagueños can now leave the Tercera division behind.

Unease among club staff as academy boss resigns

Despite the success of the women's and reserve teams the unease continues at Malaga CF as staff and players wait for club chairman Sheikh Al-Thani to make a decision about the new head coach. When the club's attempts to take on Juan Ramón Muñoz fell through (after negotiating terms the sheikh pulled out), several more names were put on the table. One of them is local man Esteban Vigo, although Cadiz coach Alvaro Cer-

vera has also been named as a potential option.

Meanwhile the staff at the club are aware that no decisions can be made without word from the sheikh, who has either not opted for a coach or is biding his time.

On Thursday the director of the Malaga CF youth academy, former first team coach Antonio Tapia, announced his resignation. The reason he gave was that he wanted to go back to coaching, although the uncertainty created by the imminent departure of sports director Mario Armando Husillos, is key to his decision to stand down.

Zidane has resigned, but don't underestimate what he achieved

Watch the tributes flow in for Zinedine Zidane... now!

As the cameras were whirring, the spotlights illuminating the squabbles of the players and the president, he just sat back as an exhausted figure who had claimed immortality by winning his third Champions League title in a row for Real Madrid.

Not that he's received the credit due to a leader who makes an often dysfunctional club perfectly functional. He's like the Hollywood director who has won Golden Globes amid bickering superstars and a cheque-writing executive producer who also wants his share of the world's adulation.

Take the weekend; before the elite European cup had been lifted

Cristiano Ronaldo was ensuring that HE was going to be claiming the headlines by hinting that his Real Madrid days may be done. Then it was Bale's turn!

That was on the shop floor; up in the presidential suite Florentino Pérez was fighting back by claiming he'd now won as many European Cups as his superstar player.

How does the song go? "Clowns to the left of me, jokers to the right, stuck in the middle..."

Amid the bickering, Zidane must be smiling to himself as he's managed to diplomatically keep the enormous egos in check all around him. He was like a ringmaster, keeping the dangerous animals apart until show time.

If Real had lost against Liverpool

he may have been sacked; as they won he departed on his own terms.

The only headline he claimed was in the build-up to the game when he modestly admitted that he isn't a tactical genius: the polar opposite of what it says in the "Managers Survival Guide" - give yourself a nickname, claim to reinvent the game, celebrate goals by sliding on your knees down the touchline.

Don't be fooled by the unpretentious exterior; far more of Real Madrid's success was down to him than any other individual.

Tactically he got it spot-on. He chose to keep Gareth Bale on the bench. It's true that the Welshman changed the game when he came on but for the first twenty minutes when the predicted Liverpool blitz

needed quelling, Zidane required all hands to the pump. He could only carry one player, and that man is Ronaldo.

He unleashed Bale at just the right time and - boom! - it worked explosively.

When you rely on TV cameras to

be your eyes you don't always get the full appreciation. Inside the Kiev stadium it was the first time I'd been able to study the Frenchman's mannerisms. He never moved from the coaching zone and was constantly reminding his players of their roles, a little like an Under 8s' coach on a school pitch.

Now the race is run. He's exhausted and surprised everyone by calling an impromptu press conference to announce his departure. In two and half seasons he'd won every major possible for a club manager. On average it was a trophy every 98 days.

He achieved this without signing a Galáctico. Zidane WAS the Galáctico manager Florentino Pérez always desired. In many ways he is more irreplaceable than Ronaldo or Bale.

Please do not underestimate what Zidane has achieved. They nickname the Bernabéu "The White House" and you know what happens if they allow an egocentric to run a place like that.

Thousands welcome Real Madrid home after Champions win

The Spanish team beat Liverpool to become winners of the Champions League for the third time running last Saturday

MALAGA. Rapturous crowds flooded the streets of Spain's capital city on Sunday to welcome home Real Madrid after a 3-1 win against Liverpool the previous day.

The team were crowned victors of the Champions League for the third successive year, after a thrilling final in Kiev, which saw two

goals from Gareth Bale and one from Karim Benzema. This is the team's 13th Champions League win overall.

The side flew into the Spanish capital on Sunday, led by captain Sergio Ramos, who was first off the plane carrying the trophy. The players climbed aboard a white open-topped bus, adorned with the message "Campeones", and toured the streets of Madrid, flanked by thousands of fans. Club president Florentino Pérez summarised the mood: "We are living in the age of glory."

The street celebrations culminated in Madrid's Cibeles square, before the players continued the party in a full Santiago Bernabéu

stadium. In his speech, Ramos gleefully spoke of how the team defied their critics to win for a 13th time:

"They said it wasn't possible."

Meanwhile in the UK, the Liverpool team's arrival was a different

entire scene, as the dejected players disembarked the plane with their heads hung low.

A coach with an Olympic pedigree

The hockey team from Nuestra Señora de la Candelaria in Benagalbón has just made history by reaching the Spanish Championship

BENAGALBÓN. Mari Carmen Barea (Malaga, 1966) is one of the athletes from Malaga who has received the highest number of awards in history. She and Theresa Zabell are the only 'Malagueñas' who can say that they have won an Olympic gold medal. Against all predictions, Mari Carmen's field hockey team beat much more powerful rivals and pulled off a historic victory which even the male team has never been able to emulate.

Nearly 25 years later Mari Carmen, who lives in Benagalbón, started to introduce this sport at the Nuestra Señora de la Candelaria school, which her two daughters attended. While this sport in Andalucía has barely 400 women and 600 men players, the hockey school created by the Olympic medallist now has over 50 young members, of whom nearly 90 per cent are girls.

"I stopped playing professionally after having my children, but after a few years I really missed hockey and wanted to carry on being associated with it in some way," she explains. She also thought this would give her daughters the chance to play the sport, which is still quite uncommon in Malaga province.

With the gold medal as her best introduction and the support of the Malaga 91 Hockey Club, Mari Carmen Barea started recruiting members and was surprised that 35 children signed up.

"You have to bear in mind that the fathers and mothers of my daughters' friends didn't even know what hockey was," she says. "But the support from the school was very important, because they always believed in the project, and they still

do, because although a lot of the players have gone up to secondary school now, they still let us use their facilities for training," she says.

"The fact that my daughters can enjoy this experience reminds me of how I started at the Domingo Lozano school," says Mari Carmen.

"I know that nearly 600 players have come from there since, but the pleasure of playing hockey with my friends was the same as my daughters are enjoying at the moment."

The first major tournament

In addition to competing in the Olympics (Barcelona, Atlanta and Sydney), several world championships and European cups, and

being Spanish team captain, Mari Carmen Barea now has another feather in her cap. The girls' team from Nuestra Señora de la Candelaria, in which her daughter Irene is one of the outstanding players, was chosen to compete in the Spanish Championship.

Only the 12 best teams in Spain can take part, and to do so they have had to win several regional competitions and sectors all over the country.

"The reason they competed for the first time was to try to do well in the Andalusian championship, but in the end we won it and carried on winning through all the stages, which meant we were one of the 12 chosen for the Spanish Championship in Castellón," says the proud coach.

No recognition from Malaga council

Anyone who knows Mari Carmen Barea is aware that she doesn't like to boast about her achievements, but neither has there been any official recognition from her home city. As well as the gold medal at Barcelona 92, she has played in 230 international matches with the Spanish team, and holds the women's record of the Spanish Hockey Federation. She has competed in three Olympics, three world championships, five European cups, numerous international and national tournaments and has twice been champion of Spain. She has received several medals and awards, but never from Malaga council. She wasn't even included in the list of award-winning local athletes which has been installed on the Paseo del Deporte, beside the Ciudad de Malaga stadium. Maybe now is the time that this gold medallist who is doing so much for her sport to be given the recognition she deserves from the city in which she was born and loves.

Although the team came tenth in the championship, Mari Carmen says it doesn't matter.

"We competed very well; our team had seven players, whereas others, like the Barcelona Junior and Athletic de Tarrasa, have dozens every year. And what is more, we beat the Club de Campo de Madrid, which is a real institution," she explains.

Although the team could always do with more assistance, she says the trips the girls have made so far would never have been possible without the collaboration of Rincón de la Victoria council and Unica, the organisation which back in the 1990s sponsored Caja Ronda, Mari Carmen's first professional team.

Following the success so far, her objectives from now on are clear: to compete in the Spanish championship again next year, and carry on working to make this hockey school a benchmark in Andalucía.

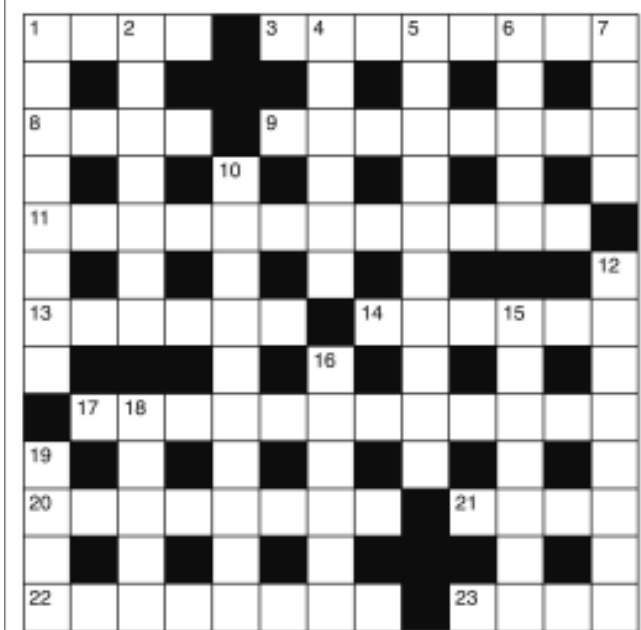

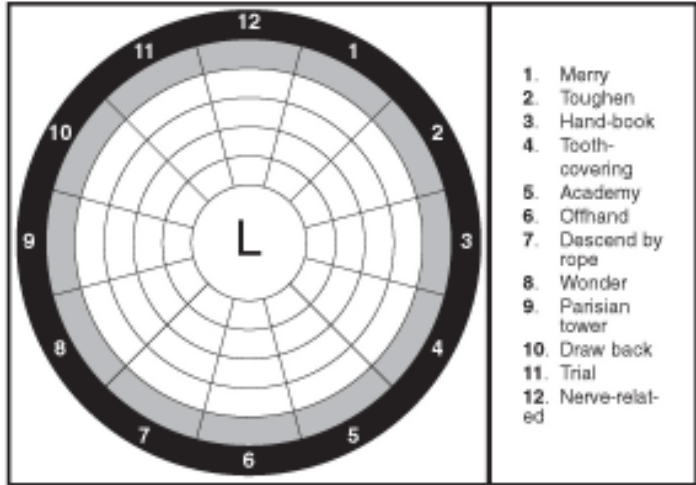

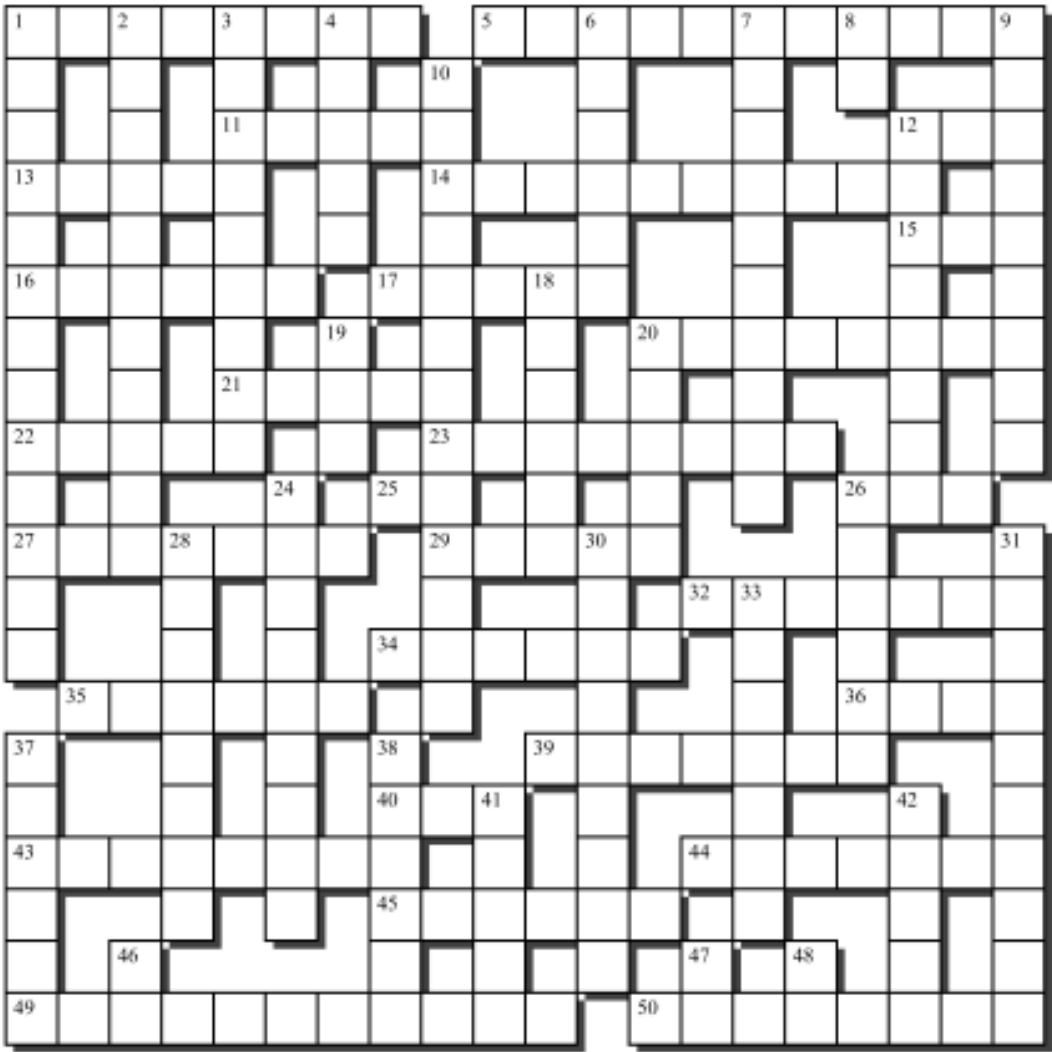
