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

Marbella cracks down on bad behaviour

A campaign aims
to preserve the
town's reputation
as a quality resort

Marbella council has joined forces
with the local hoteliers' and busi-
ness associations as well as the Local
Police force to launch a campaign
aimed at ridding the town of the un-

in bars, shops and hotels to advise

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Torremolinos and Benalmádena to link La Leala and El Pinillo by a bridge

The two mayors have signed an agreement for the project, which is estimated to cost about 1.3 million euros

There will be a new connection between Benalmádena and Torremolinos before too long. The mayors of the two municipalities signed an agreement at a press conference earlier this week to build a bridge which will link the adjoining areas of La Leala Norte and El Pinillo, which are on the boundary between the two and separated by the Saltillo stream.

This announcement marked the start of a project in which the first step will be to draw up the technical report which establishes the works to be carried out, the cost and the time it will take to connect the northern part of the two municipalities.

The mayors said they had made the decision to build the bridge in response to the fact that people in La Leala and El Pinillo have been

calling for a connection of this type for a very long time.

"There have been numerous requests over the years; it is something which is needed and people have been waiting for it for a long time. When we were in opposition I personally knocked on doors and listened to what people had to say about this," said José Ortiz, the mayor of Torremolinos. He also explained that in 2015, when he became mayor, one of the first visits he made was to that area, and so did Victor Navas.

"We had both included this in our electoral campaigns and finally the bridge between Torremolinos and Benalmádena will now become reality. It will benefit more than 2,000 local people," said Ortiz.

"The time when Torremolinos was isolated and separate from eve-

rywhere else has changed now. That ended three years ago. Our priority is what is good for the residents of our municipalities," he continued. "We are working with the administrations to get the best for our towns, and that is why we are building this bridge across a gap which is barely 20 metres wide, to make life better for the people of Torremolinos and Benalmádena".

The mayor of Benalmádena, Víc-

tor Navas, described the agreement as a historic day for the two municipalities. "We are going to provide a solution to something which has been a problem for several decades. This bridge will link the two municipalities at a point in La Leala which has been cut off until now. This was a commitment which José Ortiz and I both made during our election campaigns," he said.

Navas also warned that the bridge would not be built immediately. "The project is only just beginning now after a complicated process, because we are two different councils and we have had to coordinate the work in order to get this far".

"Now, we have to draw up the plans, and then look for financing, so it could take time," he said. He also revealed that the two town halls have already carried out studies which indicate that the project is likely to cost around 1.3 million euros.

Both Ortiz and Navas pointed out that the bridge will make it easier for pedestrians to walk between a commercial area (La Leala) and a residential one (El Pinillo). It will be safe for pedestrians and will also give people from El Pinillo fast access to the motorway. It will also help to reduce traffic on the other connecting roads, where there are often delays, and will "develop synergies" between the two municipalities. This will be positive for them both, and will boost their local economies, both mayors said.

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Marbella starts a campaign to prevent anti-social behaviour during the summer tourist season

The town hall, police, businesses and hotels are taking part in the initiative, to stop people behaving in a way which damages Marbella's reputation for quality

MARBELLA. Marbella welcomes tourists but this summer, as well as inviting them to enjoy its variety of leisure facilities, it is also giving them a clear message: there are certain rules which must be respected.

These include not being partly or fully undressed in the street, consuming drugs or alcohol or making excessive noise in a public place.

The town hall, Local Police, local businesses, the Tourism Centre and AEHCOS hotel association have created an awareness campaign which will be activated this summer to tell visitors that "we are not trying to create difficulties or contravene anyone's freedom, but we want to maintain the reputation for quality for which we have been known worldwide for a long time," said councillor José Eduardo Díaz.

The council has been working for

several months on new coexistence regulations, which have now been put on public display.

The campaign focuses on eight types of behaviour which are prohibited, and which could result in a fine of between 300 and 3,000 euros for those who fail to comply. Using segways and other electric vehicles in unauthorised areas; graffiti; urinating or defecating in public; making excessive noise; being partly or fully undressed in public; drinking alcohol or consuming drugs in public; and vandalism.

These are all detailed in the posters that have been put up around the town and the more than 80,000 leaflets which will be distributed throughout the municipality this summer. Local businesses and hotels are also raising awareness through CIT Marbella and AEHCOS, who will give the leaflets to their clients.

The tourism sector

Farkh, says he is pleased that the authorities have listened to what the hotel sector has been saying for some time, about the need to stop certain behaviour among visitors to the town. "For us it is important not only to raise awareness but also

80,000 leaflets will be given out in shops, bars and hotels, showing the types of behaviour that are being banned

to have a preventive campaign. We don't want a witch-hunt or to fine people, but we need to stop the attitudes that are damaging the image of Marbella," he said.

The president of CIT Marbella, Juan José González, agrees. "Our town needs to maintain its reputation for quality, excellence and luxury. We can't allow anti-social behaviour," he said.

The head of the Local Police, Javier Martín, said the campaign is starting now because it is the peak tourist season, but it will continue all year. He said extra police patrols are also being carried out on the seafronts of Marbella, San Pedro Alcántara and in Puerto Banús "to make sure that people comply with the regulations and that their behaviour is not a nuisance to other people".

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National Police bring down boiler-room operation running out of Marbella

MARBELLA. A boiler-room operation which had scammed approximately 1.2 million euros from more than 40 investors across Spain from its Marbella base has been dismantled.

Six people (two Spanish, three Israeli and two Iranian) have been arrested as a result of a National Police operation which started after an investor in Marbella reported a fraud to the police in June. The individual, having seen shares rapidly declining in value on an app the company told him to install, tried to recover his money to no avail.

According to the investigations, those arrested were involved in approaching clients, through two companies set up in Marbella, and persuading them to invest in their financial services which, they say, would yield massive returns.

However, they did so, according to a police statement, without the required licences to offer this type of services (as confirmed by the National Securities Market Commission) and the sole intention to defraud.

Arrival of a further 237 migrants stretches resources once more

MALAGA. After a frantic day out at sea during which 237 migrants were rescued from around a dozen boats, the various organisations tasked with processing migrants were stretched to the limit once again on Monday as calls increased for a permanent centre in the Costa del Sol capital.

After receiving first aid in the port, the 183 men were transferred to the Tiro de Pichón sports centre, as was the case two weeks ago, while the women and children remained in the care of the Cruz Roja.

The organisation's provincial head, Samuel Linares, said that a permanent base was necessary: "Just two weeks ago we put all these beds away and now we have to bring them all out again. It's a lot of work and we could better organise ourselves with a permanent base."

Spokesman for Málaga Acoge, José Luis Rodríguez, echoed the sentiment, saying: "A sports centre full of camp beds is not an adequate space for these people. They have to set up welcome centres that can give them some dignity."

AVE train delayed after stag party is ejected over disturbances

:: **R. SOTORRÍO.** National Police officers were called to Cordoba station last Friday to eject a stag party, travelling from Madrid to Malaga on the AVE high-speed train, after

disturbing other passengers. After the train manager was unable to calm the men down, the police were informed as numerous passengers, some from three carriages away, complained about the noise.

The train was held up in Cordoba for 30 minutes, arriving in Malaga 20 minutes late, obliging RENFE to issue a 50 per cent refund to customers.

'Accident-prone' woman held over 22k fraud

:: **SUR.** A 46-year-old Spanish woman has been arrested after a joint police investigation linked her to nine incidents of insurance fraud. Between 2011 and 2018, the woman was hit by a car on nine occasions and after being treated for injuries in hospital, filed an insurance claim. In total, she is believed to have received more than 22,000 euros.

Eight years for jihadi tracked to Estepona

MADRID

:: **AGENCIES.** Danish national Ahmed Samsam, who was arrested in Estepona in June last year, has been sentenced to eight years in prison for his links to Islamic State in Syria, as well as attempting to get hold of weapons while in Spain, where he also used social media to maintain a network in which he preached hatred and exchanged information.

Man stopped at airport after taking children without permission

:: **A.F. / J. C.** A man was arrested at Malaga Airport as he tried to take his children, aged six and nine, on a flight to Belfast (Northern Ireland) without the permission of

the mother.

The children's father was stopped after the mother reported him to the Guardia Civil in Mijas, saying that he had turned up at her place of work and snatched the children. In the process, he had also breached a restraining order, she said.

Fearful that he would flee the country, the police tracked him down to the airport.

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Speedboat crashes into a full beach in Manilva attempting to avoid police capture

MALAGA. Bathers on a beach in Manilva on Monday received an unexpected visitor as a police chase through the water resulted in a speedboat, pursued by a helicopter, crashing onto the shore and its driver escaping on foot across the sand.

It appears that the driver was taken by surprise in the Strait of Gibraltar as he was heading to a drug-smuggling boat to deliver fuel ahead of its receipt of the contraband.

The presence of the two boats was detected midway through the afternoon by the radars of SIVE, a branch of the Guardia Civil concerned with border control and drug trafficking, which mobilised its sea

and air patrols having suspected it was a trafficking operation.

The police helicopter, which was on call on the Strait and manned by officers from Seville, immediately descended on the area. According to sources, the semi-rigid boat, with powerful engines with which smuggling boats are typically equipped, fled towards Morocco while the other headed towards the Spanish coast.

At this point, a chase ensued which ended at Sabinillas beach which was filled with bathers.

The scene was recorded by dozens of people of their mobile phones. "Look! Look at the helicopter!" could be heard in the background of one clip, followed by "should we go?" as the boat approached the shore.

With the helicopter still in hot pursuit, the driver of the boat didn't stop until he hit the shore at high speed. From there, he continued to flee across the sand on foot, encouraged by the ironic cheers of: "Run! Run!"

The helicopter pilot then tried to keep sights on the man, while communicating his location by radio to officers on the ground. However, before it got that far, an off-duty officer enjoying a day at the beach with his family ran after him

and detained him.

According to the same sources, the arrested man was resident in La Línea de la Concepción. In the boat which he abandoned on the shore, there were around twenty tanks of fuel.

Ryanair strikes to go ahead after unsuccessful mediation talks

DUBLIN. Strikes set to affect Ryanair passengers across four countries look set to go ahead after the airline rejected the demands of cabin crew during mediation talks on Tuesday.

The cabin crew, represented in Spain by the USO and Sitcpla unions, are calling for the airline to apply the conditions established in the labour laws in the countries in which the employees are based - Spain, Portugal, Italy and Belgium - rather than the Irish legislation.

According to Europa Press, negotiators were pessimistic even

ahead of the meeting, but have not ruled out further negotiation right up until Saturday, the deadline for officially presenting warning of a strike which is set to affect Italy on 25 July and Spain, Portugal and Belgium on 25 and 26 July.

Irish pilots' strike

This is not the only industrial action planned by Ryanair staff. On Thursday, some 94 pilots based in Ireland went on strike, seeing 30 flights between Ireland and the UK cancelled and scores of others disrupted.

The Irish pilots' concerns relate

to pay and working conditions including promotions and annual leave.

With regard to cancellations or delays, Ryanair are obliged by law to inform passengers of any disruption to their travels, offer alternative travel arrangements or give a full refund.

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Mijas and Cártama, the places in Malaga which will grow most in the next 20 years

MALAGA. The Malaga province of 20 years' time will be different to the one we know today, demographically speaking. It will have a higher population - unlike other provinces in Andalucía - and its inhabitants will be distributed differently, in terms of age - nearly 30 per cent will be over 65, twice as many as now - and by place of residence. The population will be more concentrated on the western coast and in the Guadalhorce valley, while more rural areas - specifically Antequera and the Serranía de Ronda - will have lost around ten per cent of their inhabitants by 2040.

This information about population comes from a report called 'Proyección de la Población de Andalucía. Provincias y Ámbitos Subregionales 2016-2040', which was published recently by the Institute of Statistics and Cartography of Andalucía (IECA).

According to this study, the municipalities in Malaga with more than 10,000 inhabitants at present which will grow the most in the next 20 years are Mijas, which will grow by nearly 22 per cent; Cártama, with an increase of 21.2 per cent; and Manilva, by 20.6 per cent. On the other hand, those which will suffer the greatest loss of population will be Antequera, which will lose ten per cent of its inhabitants; Ronda, with a drop of 8.1 per cent; and Nerja, whose population will fall by six per cent.

Malaga city will see a discreet increase in percentual terms (about three per cent), but it will be the Andalusian city which will gain the most inhabitants in absolute terms (nearly 17,000). Its percentual growth, however, will be beaten by Almería, with 4.8 per cent. All the other provincial capitals in the region are going to lose population in the next 20 years. This decrease will contrast with the increase in their respective metropolitan areas.

"The resident population in the capital cities of Andalucía will fall by 62,000 people overall, and in contrast the other regional municipalities will gain 144,000 inhabitants", says the IECA report. It means that places close to Malaga city which act as dormitory towns, such as Cártama, Rincón de la Victoria and the two Al-

hauríns are among those in the province which will grow most.

The authors of the report do not have a crystal ball, but they do have numerous demographic indicators and mathematical models which enable them to project current trends into the future. Joaquín Planelles works for IECA's Demographic and Social Statistics Service and is responsible for drawing up the population projections.

"There are two methodologies: the extrapolation models, which are based on the evolution of the population, and the components model, which is the one we use. We don't extrapolate the population; we make a hypothesis about how the birth rate, mortality, life expectancy and mobility of the population are going to behave, based upon how each of these components have evolved in the past. Starting from the population figures and then applying mathematical models which incorporate those components, we come to the projected population," he explains.

Using this method, the municipalities which the report says are going to gain most population are those with a higher birth rate, less ageing population and more immigration, internal and external. However, Planelles says the projection models expect the differences between places to become less acute as time passes.

"For each territory, we look at how it differs from the average of each indicator: for example, the average number of children per woman. But we calculate that for 2040, this differential from the average will have reduced by half, partly because of the effect of policies which aim to reduce the differences between territories," he explains

Coast and metropolitan areas

Enrique Navarro, professor of Regional Geographical Analysis at Malaga University, explains that two major trends will guide the relationship between the population and the territory: coastalisation and the movement of people out of cities and to their areas of influence.

"Coastalisation isn't just a phenomenon which affects Malaga or Spain, it is worldwide. The coast used to be seen as a dangerous and unproductive place, but now people prefer to live near the sea. Here the trend is especially intensive because the principal engine of the economy, tourism, is focused on the coast," he says. Over the next 20 years, the Costa del Sol is expected to gain an additional 55,000 inhabitants, an increase of 10.2 per cent.

There will also be an increase in the metropolitan areas, as mentioned above. "Malaga city isn't growing, or is growing only by a very small percentage. On the contrary, its area of expansion is. That used to be Rincón de la Victoria and Torremolinos but now includes places which are further away but have good connec-

tions: Alhaurín de la Torre, Alhaurín el Grande and Cártama. They are places where housing and taxes are lower," says Enrique Navarro. It is also worth noting that the population of the Guadalhorce valley is expected to grow by nearly ten per cent in the next 20 years.

The IECA has also calculated the ageing population by province, area

and municipalities. In the case of Malaga province, the town with a population of over 10,000 which will have the highest proportion of retired inhabitants will be Nerja, with a third of the residents over the age of 65. It is followed by Fuengirola, Ronda and Torremolinos, also above average.

The ranking does not include the

small villages, which are precisely those most affected by this trend and also by depopulation.

In contrast, the municipality with the highest proportion of young people in 2040 will be Cártama, where 32 per cent of residents will be under the age of 30. Rincón de la Victoria and Alhaurín de la Torre will also be above average in this respect.

Residents say they are fed up with motorhomes parked on the seafront

Caravans and motorhomes stay months or years in Carvajal in the same spot they claim, and councillors are now being asked to change bylaws

FUENGIROLA. Residents in the seafront district of Carvajal, in Fuengirola, have had enough of the motorhomes and mobile caravans “camped out” on their paseo marítimo. They are calling for the local authorities to do more about the supposed problem, claiming that some have been parked up there for months, when the official limit is 48 hours.

The president of the Carvajal residents’ association, Eladia Pabón has said that, apart from breaking the law, the long-term parking causes harm in other ways. “They empty

out waste water onto the paseo. There’s one motorhome that’s been in the same place for two years, so it can’t empty its toilet tanks anywhere else,” she explained adding, “I’ve managed to count up to 11 motorhomes on the stretch between the Fuengirola Playa apartments and the Los Marinos chiringuito.”

They take up parking places, in that particular example for two years, but there are others here for one or two months, as long as their holidays last. And most of them have Spanish number plates.”

Besides the parking problem, Pabón explains that users come out onto the pavement “to sit down as if it were a campsite”. “The strangest thing of all is that the Local Police don’t enforce the bylaws, and I understand that they don’t warn [the occupants] about the illegality.”

Despite these concerns, which are shared by many local business owners, Eladia Pabón is not against

the caravans or motorhomes, if they are in the right place. “In Fuengirola we’ve got an excellent campsite as well as areas marked off for motorhomes to park in the feria ground. But parking up on the street, especially on holiday, cooking, washing, spending a while sitting on the pavement as if it was a terrace...”

The Ciudadanos party will propose changes to bylaws in the next Fuengirola council meeting to include a clear statement that the maximum amount of time allowed for parking is 24 hours, (and not 48 hours as now), except for locally registered vehicles or those parked in specially designated areas.

More funding for repair works called for to stop Marbella’s ruined castle falling down

The local council has just completed a blueprint for the restoration and conservation of the site and has sent it to the regional government

MARBELLA. The council in Marbella has recently completed a restoration and conservation plan for the ruins of Marbella’s Moorish castle, which is a key visitor attraction in the resort’s old town.

The report by architect Pedro Gurriarán, a specialist in Islamic buildings, aims to find a solution to restoring the walled complex which, it is said, is in danger of falling down in some parts.

The council-funded report has been sent to the regional government’s ministry for Culture, as the first stage in getting Junta de Andalucía permission to carry out the


restoration and protective work as planned in September 2019.

In parallel, the council’s department for Culture is looking for 500,000 euros funding to pay for the work and has asked for a national government subsidy

Serious structural problems

The council says that pieces of stone and mortar are frequently falling off and that water gets into the walls. Some of the damage is in very advanced, they say.

Three criteria will be used to decide on the work needed, once funds are found and permission is given; work will respect the original construction techniques; non-historical items, like planting tubs, will be removed; and parts where nobody knows how they once looked won’t be restored. Since 2007 there has been an overall management plan for the site but now, says the council, more work is urgently needed.

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Axarquía water bills to go up as of this week

The controversial move to increase prices in five towns has led to a split in local government coalition and residents angry at "official mismanagement"

TORRE DEL MAR. Water bills have gone up this week in five towns across the Axarquía. Vélez-Málaga, Rincón de la Victoria, Algarrobo, Torrox and Benamocarra are the places affected by a decision to increase prices, which was made by the Mancomunidad de Municipios de la Costa del Sol Oriental - Axarquía; the shared public services body for the town halls in the area.

The agreement was passed by two of the political parties; PSOE and Izquierda Unida that make up the Mancomunidad, with a further two; the Partido Popular (PP) and Ciuda-

danos opposing the move and with one abstention from Vélez-Málaga's deputy mayor, Marcelino Mendez-Trelles. The difference in opinion over the matter has also led to a split between parties in the organisation and angry outbursts from locals at its meetings.

The hike in prices has come about as Axaragua, the public water treatment company run by the Mancomunidad, has built up a 10 million euro debt, due to money from the water company being used to pay its own running costs as well as official salaries. The public body now has to raise 600,000 euros per year to clear its debts. Mayor of Torrox, Óscar Medina (PP), said that his party had always tried to avoid "passing the responsibility of bad management onto residents." According to the president of the Mancomunidad, Gregorio Campos (PSOE), the rise will "be felt by 85 per cent of locals but by only an average of three cents per month."

TORROX. A new dog beach in Torrox Costa officially opened last Saturday, with around 200 canines and their owners making use of the facility on the same day. The area covers a 300-metre stretch of beach near the mouth of the River Torrox and is the seventh beach of its kind

along the Costa del Sol. Mayor of Torrox, Óscar Medina, said that it had come about "following requests from residents and tourists." As with similar beaches in the province, dogs must be controlled at all times and potentially dangerous dogs and those weighing more than 20 kilos must wear a muzzle.

Town Hall increases free parking spaces

The spaces may be used for a maximum of two hours using a cardboard disc which can be bought for one euro from the town hall and other locations. 

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Local Police capture snake found in baby's pushchair at family's home

Malaga city resident Juan José was shocked to find the 1.2-metre-long reptile after hearing a noise

MALAGA. Local police successfully captured a dangerous 1.20-metre-long snake that had slithered into a Malaga family's home and coiled itself inside a baby's pushchair last week.

Juan José Ruiz discovered the creature after hearing noises and seeing movements in the garden of his house when he returned from work. Realising the snake had slipped inside his home, he alerted the Local Police who sent a patrol minutes later.

Describing the moment he opened the front door of his property, José said: "It moved very quickly. It didn't occur to me what it was until I saw it slide onto the floor and into the house."

At first, the police team were unable to spot the creature, but then saw it had moved underneath a small pillow inside the pushchair.

During the operation the snake tried to attack on numerous occasions, even attempting to bite the protective gloves worn by one of the officers. To seize the animal, the police used a clamp designed to cause it no harm.

Before the capture, the buggy - used for the couple's two young twins - was taken outside. Doors and win-

dows were immediately shut to avoid the reptile entering the property again while Juan José's wife and the couple's three young children remained inside the residence. "I told her to close the living room door and I did the same for the kitchen," Juan José detailed.

Some days before the episode, an area of shrubland near the house had been cleared, which is where Juan José and his family believe the snake came from. "Surely it came from there, and ended up giving us a good scare," he remarked.

The ordeal has affected how José and his family go about their daily lives from now on. Juan José said: "Now my wife and my mother check the pushchair every day when they are going to use it."

Once the snake was caught it was taken to the local animal care centre, to begin the process of reintroducing it back into its natural habitat.

José's scare, which took place in a residential area on the east side of the city, is not the only snake-related incident to have occurred recently locally. Days later, police found a two-metre-long snake trapped in a net covering a tree that had been put in place to prevent birds from eating its fruit.

The mystery of record lottery winners' identities

Two Costa lottery sales offices sold separate record-breaking 28-million-euro-prize tickets last week but nobody knows who won

MALAGA / MARBELLA. Come out, come out, wherever you are. The two winners of a record national lottery draw in Malaga province have yet to come forward to say who they are, leading to fevered speculation in two parts of the Costa del Sol.

On Thursday 5 July two tickets sold at local official state lottery ticket kiosks came up trumps in the draw for the flagship 'La Primitiva' competition, which is drawn every Thursday and Saturday.

Each of the local winning tickets was worth a huge 28 million euros. They were sold at the San Judas Tadeo lottery kiosk in a residential

area of Malaga city near Carlos Haya hospital and in the Marbella lottery office of Pepi Suárez, just outside the resort's old town.

Lottery sources said that the

amount won in a 'La Primitiva' was a record for one province, as it was highly unusual for two high payout single tickets to be sold in the same area. More money has been handed

out before in the province but in smaller 'décimo' fractional tickets.

But the winners in both Malaga and Marbella are being quite shy about their success, with nobody

coming forward so far. Pepi Suárez only took over her ticket concession seven months ago. "Up to now the biggest prize was 2,500 euros," she said.

Coín main street reopens to vehicles amid controversy

Calle Feria has a new look and is now one-way only, causing concern from some business owners

FERNANDO TORRES. After months of rebuilding and resurfacing, Calle La Feria, one of Coín's main streets, is now open to vehicles again. The town's mayor, Fernando Fernández, was present to cut the ribbon last

week, allowing the first cars to pass through.

The new look Calle Feria is now only one way however, which has drawn criticism from local shop and business owners who fear that less people will use it now than before. They had been campaigning for it to stay as a two-way street with clearly defined pavements. Now pavements and roadway merge into one, with priority being given to pedestrians.

However, José Antonio Pérez

López, president of the local association of young entrepreneurs, said that he thought the move would prove positive, adding that there is a "lot of excitement" as it will improve parking accessibility in the surrounding area, as well as public signage.

The town's mayor said that the street was now "passable, accessible, more attractive and without any architectural boundaries."

The work on the street was budgeted at 444,700 euros.

New trees for children's play areas in Cártama to provide shade from harsh UV rays

TONY BRYANT. Cártama town hall has begun an initiative to add extra shaded zones to the town's leisure areas following comments that they were too exposed to direct sun.

Organised by the local council's department of Environment, the project involves planting trees in the children's playgrounds in order to provide protection from dangerous UV rays.

The first stage of the project to be carried out involved the planting of 13 mulberry trees - favoured for their quick growth - in Parque Los Naranjos in the Estación de Cártama area of the municipality.

Councillor for Environment, Jairo Delgado, said, "We aim to plant trees in all of the parks in the municipality and these will provide extra shade during the hot summer months."

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The government approves a new phase on the Algeciras-Bobadilla railway

MALAGA. Spain's new socialist government is continuing to make progress with the Algeciras-Bobadilla railway project which it inherited from its predecessor, the Partido Popular. Earlier this week in Cadiz the new Minister of Public Works, José Luis Ábalos, announced that the contract for the first phase of the Almoraima-San Pablo stretch of line is to be put to tender in the near future. The works will cost nearly 15.4 million euros and will take approximately 12 months to complete, he said.

This part of the project will replace the line and the infrastructure over 26.7 kilometres, between points 129.4 and 156.1. The sidings in the stations will also be renewed, apart from Jimena de la Frontera, which will be included in phase 2.

The bridges will also be surveyed to ensure that they are high enough to allow electrification to be carried out in the future. During this first phase the drainage system will also be renewed, as will the signals and communications to guarantee continuity of the service while the works are under way.

This part of the project does not include the electrification, as that will be done separately. The works are being financed by the European Regional Development Fund (Feder 2014-2020) for sustainable transport. The minister, who visited Algeciras on Wednesday, pointed out that the start of this phase is the result of the new government's decision not to stop any projects which had already been scheduled, and to advance them.

The president of the Business Confederation of Cadiz (CEC), Javier Sán-

chez Rojas, welcomed the announcement, saying it was "an important step" in the overall modernisation of the connection with the two railway corridors of the Trans-European Network, the Mediterranean and the Central.

However, he also warned that the objective set by the EU for its completion, 2020, "is very close and a great deal of additional effort needs to be made to comply with deadlines which businesses in Cadiz province do not want to be missed".

Sánchez Rojas recalled that businesses in the Campo de Gibraltar area had already called for action back in April with the 'Quiero corredor' cam-

paign, demanding an infrastructure which will enable them to compete under equal conditions with the rest of Europe.

The project so far

This is one step further in the project to renew the stretch of line between Algeciras and Bobadilla, but there is still much more to be done. The phase which has been delayed longest and is most controversial is the one between Antequera and Ronda. The previous Ministry of Public Works team ruled out the high-speed stretch of line which had been proposed by previous socialist governments. Although there has been no new information

about this stretch, it looks as if it will be the same as the rest: the single track which exists at present will be renewed and a third one which can be used by trains with international and conventional gauges will be added. They will then be electrified. All this has been in the environmental impact phase since the end of 2010, which has meant that no works could be carried out.

Finally, unless something unexpected happens, the contract put to tender for the stretch between Bobadilla and Ronda (69 kilometres) will only be for designing the electrification and signalling, which will take eight months. The plans to improve the platform are still being drawn up.

This is very different from the situation in 2011 and 2012, when the idea was to build a high-speed AVE line between the two towns, with a double UIC-gauge track running the 64.4 kilometres between Antequera's Santa Ana station and La Indiana on the outskirts of Ronda, where a new station was due to be built. That project had a budget of 711.47 million euros. The parliamentary Public Works committee recently agreed that the government should be urged to resume the works in this area, as they are vital to improve the communications with Ronda.

With regard to what has been done so far, the only phase to have been completed is Ronda-Cortes de la Frontera-San Pablo (carried out between 2009 and 2011). The contract for the 26-kilometre stretch between San Pablo and Almoraima will be put to tender shortly.

Last June the railway administration company ADIF authorised the works between Almoraima and Algeciras to be continued, after agreeing that the two contracts for this 20-kilometre stretch could be modified. This includes the San Roque cargo logistics area, which should be completed this year.

In October last year the contract was awarded for the sidings at Castellar de la Frontera station, so that it can cope with cargo trains up to 750 metres long. The new CTC traffic control system is also being installed at present, and will soon be operational over 106 kilometres.

Giant Las Vegas-style complex hunts for home in south of Spain but Costa is unlikely

MALAGA. A Canadian group looking to build an entertainment complex the size of 1,300 football pitches was rumoured to be eyeing up a site on the Costa del Sol around Manilva or the hinterland of Gibraltar this week.

The project, worth an estimated 3.4 billion euros, has been looking for a home for a while ever since Madrid said it couldn't be built there. But the interest in the Costa del Sol appears to be a red herring to encourage the acceptance of the project by the regional government in Extremadura, which the company wants. There land is cheaper than the Costa and more readily available, and sources say that mentioning the Costa may be a negotiating tactic by the developers.

70 per cent year-on-year surge in approval of plans for new-build Costa homes

MALAGA. A report by Malaga province's association of professional architects, (Colegio de Arquitectos), has confirmed that there is now a sustained recovery in the Costa property market.

According to their data, released on Wednesday, architectural plans for 4,154 new-build apartments or houses have been given their legal seal of approval in the first six months of this year, an increase of 70 per cent on the same period last year. Most of those new approvals have come in the last three months, with plans for over 1,000 getting the OK in June alone.

However only a small amount of social housing is being approved. In the second quarter of this year, plans for just 291 accessible homes got approval, almost all of which will be in Malaga city.

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The number of self-employed workers in Malaga exceeds 117,000 for the first time

Most of the 'autónomos' in the province work in retail, hotels, restaurants and construction. The sector says they would benefit from tax reductions

MALAGA. The number of self-employed people in Malaga continues to grow. The economic recovery, combined with the latest labour and legal reforms which affect these workers, has resulted in more people registering as self-employed under what is known as the special regime for autonomous workers (RETA). The latest figures from the ATA national federation in Spain, issued on 30 June, showed that 3,273,558 people are registered as self-employed in the country, of whom 529,311 are in Andalucía; 117,281 are in Malaga province.

These are high figures for Spain, Andalucía and Malaga. In fact, they are higher than in 2007, before the economic crisis. The social security payments which the self-employed have to pay every month are also high. Unlike employed workers, whose monthly income is always similar, the amount of money they can make can vary widely from one month to the next, but they still have to pay the same amount of Social Security each month. This week, the new minister for Work, Migration and Social Security, Magdalena Valerio, suggested that changes may be made to adjust these payments to the amount of money actually

earned.

Three out of every four self-employed do earn more than they have to pay out, but Valerio is considering changing the Social Security payments to quarterly, because the amount earned each month can vary so much, or adjustments to the amount paid could be made at different times during the year. However, not everyone is convinced that this is the answer.

The president of the self-employed workers of Andalucía association (ATA-Andalucía), Rafael Amor, for example, says some peo-

ple pay their social security in different ways, according to the arrangements they have with those for whom they provide services.

"We are prepared to discuss more reforms; in fact there is a parliamentary sub-committee which is looking at advancing the reform of the RETA, but I would ask the politicians for more specific information in their proposals," says Amor, who believes "there are other more important necessities" which would help the sector, such as tax reductions.

"Many town halls are charging

too much in IBI tax, with figures from before the crisis, income tax hasn't changed for years and nor has IVA (VAT). It would be much better to reduce those, especially for sectors such as hairdressers and veterinary clinics," he says.

He also points out that a law containing urgent measures to encourage self-employment, which came into force in 1 January this year, "has covered many things we have been demanding for years". These include being able to temporarily de-register as self-employed when there is no work available.

The fake self-employed, under scrutiny from the authorities

MALAGA. Phenomena such as the collaborative economy, which includes multinationals in the transport sector such as Uber and Cabify, or logistics, like Deliveroo and Glovo, are coming under scrutiny from tax inspectors because they often hide a number of irregularities, such as people being forced to register as self-employed when they depend economically on a single provider, who also dictates their working hours.

The minister for Work, Migration and Social Security, Magdalena Valerio, says the "abuse" of self-employed workers which is being carried out by some companies is absolutely intolerable. They are taking on workers with whom "there is a real employer/employee relationship", but insisting that they register as self-employed. Valerio says a plan against labour exploitation needs to be drawn up, as prime minister Pedro Sánchez has already said, and more inspections need to be carried out.

The president of ATA-Andalucía, Rafael Amor, says the number of false registrations as self-employed in Spain did not grow with the crisis, but the sectors have changed. "This is no longer just happening in transport or logistics; it is also occurring in the public administrations and the media," he says. "There are ways of reporting it to the authorities".

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Top level diplomacy saves little puppy Mauri from a worse fate

A Malaga woman working briefly in Mauritania was helped by the country's president when she rescued a puppy which was "going to be eaten"

MALAGA. The driver of the bus which transported them from place to place appeared one day with a young mongrel puppy, just a few weeks old. Patricia Chica, a 36-year-old from Malaga, was working temporarily in Nouakchott, the capital of Mauritania, as a waitress with the Dani Garcia group: the chef's company was doing the catering for the African Union summit which took place recently. Patricia is an animal lover and rescues strays in her spare time, as well as fostering newly-born abandoned puppies in her home at Torre del Mar.

"I saw our driver at the hotel with the puppy and when I asked him about it he said a friend had given it to him. Then he pointed to a pan on the ground and made gestures to show that he was going to eat it," she says. Her reac-

tion was instinctive: without thinking of the possible consequences she grabbed the puppy out of his hands and ran off, to hide in the kitchen of the conference hall, while the man stared after her in astonishment. When they heard what had happened, her colleagues came to her defence and refused outright to return the puppy to him.

That was the start of the story. "I didn't expect to end up in that

situation, but I couldn't bear the thought of a puppy ending up on somebody's plate as part of the menu. I know they'll eat others, but there was no way I was going to let them eat this one," she said, speaking to us while she was still in Africa.

State involvement

The situation soon turned into a matter of State in this African country. Patricia explained what

had happened to the person responsible for protocol in the Mauritanian government; she took charge of the dog and assigned a staff member to look after it while Patricia was working at the summit. In fact, she did even more than that. She got the president of Mauritania, Mohamed Uld Abdelaziz, personally involved.

Patricia says he gave orders for the puppy's health certificate to be processed in record time by an

official vet and for it to be given its first vaccines, and he paid the costs for this to be done. As a result Mauri, which is the name Patricia gave the puppy, would be able to leave the country for its new home in Malaga.

We spoke to Patricia as she and most of the Dani Garcia team, about 50 people, were about to start their journey home. Despite having the official documents for the puppy, she was still worried about what might happen because the journey involved crossing borders between Mauritania, Morocco and Spain.

A symbol

"It breaks my heart to think that in some countries they still eat puppies, but I am so impressed and delighted at the bravery and generosity of these young people who become involved in saving this one," says Carmen Manzano, president of the Sociedad Protectora de Málaga. The association advised Patricia about the documents and veterinary checks the puppy would need in Mauritania. Carmen sees this case as a 'symbol' in the fight for animal rights.

Finally, Patricia was able to bring us up to date and report that the journey home had been uneventful. She carried Mauri in her arms as they crossed the borders, and hid him in a rucksack on the flights. Now, she is looking after him temporarily until her colleague Juan Luis, who has offered to adopt him, arrives. "They're all fighting over him still, though," she laughs.

"In Malaga we have many animals for adoption, but none of them has had an adventure like this one," she says. She hopes her experience may serve to inspire others who decide to give a future to an animal that really needs one.

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

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Catalan president meets Pedro Sánchez in Madrid to "prepare dialogue"

A German court has agreed to extradite Carles Puigdemont, ex-Catalan leader for embezzlement and not for rebellion

MADRID. The first formal meeting between the Prime Minister, Pedro Sánchez, and the pro-independence president of the Catalan regional government, Quim Torra, took place in Madrid on Monday.

Held at the new PM's official residence, La Moncloa, the talks were an attempt to "normalise" the situation after the events of last autumn led to an illegal declaration of independence by the Catalan regional parliament. Both men have recently taken up their posts, providing an opportunity to improve relations again, political commentators said.

Madrid and Barcelona said that

the meeting had gone well. Quim Torra said it was "the start of dialogue" to what he claimed needs a political solution. Sánchez told Torra that the right to self-determination would never be on the table.

On Thursday, a German regional court confirmed that ex-Catalan president, Carles Puigdemont, would be extradited to Spain on embezzlement, but not for rebellion as a Spanish judge had requested.

ALL SMILES BETWEEN PP CANDIDATES

Last week's primaries to lead the conservative PP party saw two of the six candidates make it to the next round. Delegates at a party conference on 20-21 July will choose between María Soraya Sáenz de Santamaría, seen as close to the politics of former leader, Mariano Rajoy, and Pablo Casado, closer to the right wing of the party. Despite differences, both were in good spirits at a dinner on Tuesday.

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Standard and Poor's, the leading US research analysis and index provider, has published the SPIVA study comparing the performance of actively managed and passive index funds. A stock market index fund reflects a weighted average of several securities and is intended to represent the stock market and track changes over time.

The results of the study showed that, over a 10 and 15-year period, the majority of active fund managers failed to equal the index that they were benchmarked against.

A few active managers, nevertheless, do consistently beat the index. Several academic papers refer to these successful managers as having 'high active share', meaning that their selection of securities will diverge as much as 100% from those held by the benchmark index. Where the index is diversified the successful active manager, believing that he knows better

than the market, will be less diversified, more concentrated and therefore take more risk. Successful active managers, like hedge fund management, have 'skin in the game' - they stand to make it personally big and lose big if they make wrong bets against the market. In fact, the hedge fund industry has been decimated during the last decade.

Most fund managers are employees of a management company and are judged by their investors and their employer on performance relative to the benchmark index chosen. This is often a poor match, as management companies try to show their funds in the best light possible.

An active manager will actively try and beat a given index by selecting stocks or bonds on a different basis than the index. In order to realise a profit the manager will buy, sell and then purchase again. The index, however, hardly moves as it is a passive construction re-

flecting the overall market. In order to avoid reputational and market risk by taking bets against a given index, a manager may choose to hug the index. In this case, the manager's portfolio will mirror that of the securities in the index. Why is this a problem for investors?

An index fund may have an annual management fee of 0.05%, as does the Vanguard S&P 500 Index Fund, giving the investor an exposure to the top 500 companies in the US. However, the active manager who is a 'closet indexer' may charge an annual management fee of as much as 1% for the same portfolio. He may claim active trading and thus will also need to buy and sell more, in an effort to produce a performance greater than the index - but this will incur further costs, and no better profits.

It is time, therefore, that the industry 'outed' closet index managers. Until they do, sensible investors should ensure that they are not paying for what they don't get. Most long term investors would be well advised to use low-cost index funds for the core, if not for all, of their portfolios.

San Miguel pumps 3.9m euros more into its Malaga brewery

MALAGA. The Mahou San Miguel brewing group has said that it invested 3.9 million euros more in 2017 at its Malaga production facility, next to the airport. Some 30 different improvements were made to bring the total investment made in the brewing facility in the last decade to 28.6 million euros.

Plant director, José Manuel Huesa, has said that the main investments last year included the replacement of two pasturisers, (on the cans and litre-bottle production lines), and the merging of two laboratories into one.

The majority of the improvements made are to help the company meet its objectives of reduc-

ing water and energy usage. While the amount of beer brewed at the plant has increased 24.2% since 2002, the unit consumption of water has fallen by 17.1% and energy by 25.5%. The firm also says its carbon dioxide emissions have gone down over 50% in the same period.

Malaga has the second largest production capacity of Mahou San Miguel's seven breweries. Currently 170 million of litres is produced a year by the airport but there is room to go up to 250 million.

The site opened over 50 years ago and employs 150 people, and the company has been keen to stress its commitment to the local area and economy.

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Government welcomes references to Gibraltar in the UK's White Paper

The 98-page document refers to ensuring the Brexit deal works for Gibraltar, border arrangements and meeting the needs of the wider UK family

GIBRALTAR. The British government issued its White Paper on the future relationship between the UK and the EU on Thursday, and while there was uproar in the House of Commons during the speech by new Brexit minister Dominic Raab because MPs were furious not to have been provided with copies, the Gibraltar government, which did receive the White Paper, was able to respond with more decorum, welcoming the fact that the 98-page document contains several references to Gibraltar.

These include, on page 7: "... ensuring the deal delivers for the Crown Dependencies, Gibraltar and the other Overseas Territories, noting there will be no change in their long-standing relationships with the UK." Page 15 states: "The UK will be seeking specific arrangements for the Crown Dependencies, Gibraltar and the other

Overseas Territories. These should take account of the significant and mutually beneficial economic ties between these economies and EU Member States, including their overseas countries and territories." Page 34 deals with the border: "Streamlined arrangements are particularly important at the Gibraltar-Spain border, which is crossed every day by

thousands of people from other Member States". And finally, in the 'Conclusion and next steps' section: "...meeting the needs of the wider UK family, including the Crown Dependencies and the Overseas Territories." The Gibraltar government said it will be working in close partnership with the UK as "we prepare to leave the European Union".



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It was a Sunday evening in June, just as spring was trying its hardest to turn into summer. The unusually cool weather matched the unusual climate in the country as a whole, then still in shock after the sudden change in government.

open at that time, on a Sunday. And their conversation was in a language that could be recognised as Chinese.

The older girl in the group was the teacher - it was their version of that ancient and universal childhood occupation of "playing

schools" - and she was doing her best to teach the others, apparently her siblings, a 'hanzi' character used in traditional Chinese writing. For lack of a blackboard, she was drawing the complex imaginary lines with her finger on the glass in the door.

A lesson in Chinese

Suddenly, an argument started: the second oldest child, a boy, didn't agree with the "teacher" and told her that her symbol wasn't right.

What was most surprising, though, was that, while up to that point the lesson had taken place entirely in Mandarin, Cantonese, Wu, Min or Jin (I'm afraid my ear is not tuned in to differentiating the dialects), now the younger boy was speaking directly in impeccable Spanish. He had jumped from one language to another, crossing thousands of kilometres of cultural, linguistic and physical distance, in tenths of a second, less than it takes any of us to think of our next sentence, without changing language.

It's interesting that when it comes to arguing and negotiating they turn to Castilian Spanish,

which is a language that lends itself to rows. Euskera has barely any insults, and, when the Basques want to swear at each other they also resort to Castilian, which is so rich in expletives.

And so the Chinese lesson goes on, sometimes in one language, sometimes in another, as if it were all one tongue.

I left them with their children's linguistic deliberations and, as I went on my way, I started thinking about this new generation of Spaniards with Asian features, who, when they leave school, will have no problem doing business and establishing cultural links between the two countries. And they will still have time to go to the bar and argue about Real Madrid or Barça in the language that best lends itself to the occasion.

Friday 13th produces utter fear and dread for some superstitious people

MALAGA. Today is Friday 13th, a day that is considered unlucky for those of a superstitious nature, for it is believed to be a bad omen and bring misfortune.

Some people, especially in US and UK, will avoid normal daily activities, like driving their car or flying, for fear of some ill-fated conclusion. Others avoid anything that might cause them concern, even though these things pose no threat throughout the rest of the year.

According to the Stress Management Centre and Phobia Institute in North Carolina, an estimated 20 million people in the USA are affected by a phobia of this day, making it the most feared day of the year.

For a month to have a Friday 13th, it must begin on a Sunday. It happens at least once a year in the Gregorian calendar, but can occur up to three times. There have only been two this year and there will be

two every year until 2020.

One study by the British Medical Journal concluded that the risk of hospital admission as a result of a transport accident may be increased by as much as 52 per cent on a Friday 13th; subsequent studies however have disproved any correlation between Friday 13th and the rate of accidents.

The fear of the number 13 has a

name: triskaidekaphobia; while the scientific term for the fear of Friday 13th is paraskevidekatriaphobia.

Origins

There are, of course, those who believe Friday 13th is just another day-date combination - while dismissing it as superstitious poppycock - but where did it originate and why is it considered such a fateful day?

Spanish superstition warns not to marry on Tuesday 13th

In Spain, as in other Spanish-speaking countries, Tuesday 13th is considered a day of bad luck and misfortune. Although many Spanish children are familiar with Friday 13th, which is largely due to Hollywood and American influences, traditionally, the Spanish regard Tuesday with far greater wariness.

There is even a timeworn saying that warns - 'Don't marry, go on a journey, or leave your house on Tuesday' (en martes ni te cases, ni te embarques, ni de tu casa te apartes).

The scientific term for the fear of Friday 13th is paraskevidekatriaphobia

Theorists have suggested it was the day on which Eve bit the apple from the Tree of Knowledge, and that it was also the day that the Great Flood began. Others claim that the superstition surrounding the day may have arisen from the last supper and the crucifixion, as there were 13 people present at the supper and Christ was crucified on a Friday, although it became known as Good Friday.

Another suggested origin of the superstition relates to 1307, when, on Friday 13 October, hundreds of Knights Templar met their fate, although this may not have been formulated until the 19th century.

However, there is no evidence to support any of these theories, and the origins of the curse of Friday the 13th will remain as curious as the legend itself.

Hollywood

Like most legends and superstitious beliefs, Hollywood has been responsible for fuelling an ongoing interest in this date.

The blockbuster movie franchise, Friday the 13th, comprises twelve slasher films, a television show, several novels, comic books and video games that focus on the fictional mass murderer, Jason Voorhees.

Several of the films were released on Friday 13th and the series became one of the most successful horror movie franchises of the twentieth century, grossing over 460 million dollars at box offices around the world.

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The Pompidou opens up to Jean Dubuffet

The Malaga branch of the Paris contemporary art centre offers a new exhibition focusing on the founder of Art Brut

MÁLAGA. The new temporary exhibition at the Centre Pompidou Málaga is one of the “pop-up” museum’s best yet. More than 80 pieces from the centre’s Paris parent’s collections take visitors on a journey through the career of a crucial player in the evolution of art in the last half century.

Jean Dubuffet (1901-1985) is written down in art history books as the founder of the Art Brut movement and the fascinating complexity of his work is visible from the start of the exhibition, which opens with *Traveller without a Compass* (1952), a painting that gives the whole exhibition its name.

In the middle of the last century the Art Brut movement sought a kind of ‘year zero’ of creation, a tendency stripped of tradition, outside the debate between figurative art and abstraction, to open a new childlike and reactionary path, rude in appearance but with a sentimental background, whose echo has resounded for decades and whose most notable cultivators in Spain were Antoni Tàpies and Equipo Crónica, as the president of the Centre Pompidou Paris, Serge Lasvignes, pointed out in Málaga on Wednesday.

“What strikes me about Dubuffet is his crazy, utopian desire to create art rejecting all prior cultural heritage. Starting from zero, wanting to work like a child, like a mad man or a prehistoric man. This exhibition shows this desire well,” said Lasvignes, of the show that remains in Málaga until 14 October.

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

Fruit and veg: better off naked

From the first time that someone dislodged a fallen tree trunk to allow a river to flow, to the latest advances in genetic engineering and disease prevention, history is filled with amazing examples of how human intelligence can collaborate with nature for the better. On some occasions, however, man changes the natural course of things and ends up doing more harm than good.

According to the Spanish *Desnuda la Fruta* campaign (literally, Undress the Fruit), one text book case of this human folly is the use of redundant plastic packaging: the practice of smothering fruit and vegetables (many of which - onions, bananas, oranges, aubergines - are already protected within their own natural packaging) in polystyrene and plastic film to display them on the shelves of shops.

The campaign has shared messages on social media requesting that supermarkets and consumers reduce their use of superfluous, expensive and environment-polluting plastics.

"The 'packaging' designed by nature is biodegradable, is best for preserving food and it's called peel," says *Ambiente Europeo*, one of the associations involved.

Sometimes, it's best to leave the job to evolution. Peel is 100% organic and can protect its contents against heat, cold, dirt and damp.

Patricia Reina and Fernando Gómez, a couple from Madrid who have reduced their use of disposable plastics to the absolute minimum (they can fit two years' worth of waste into just two lunch boxes - have spent a long time trying to alert the food industry about this unnecessary waste. This effort was without success until they came across Isabel Vicente, author of *La Hipótesis Gaia*, a blog about environmental issues.

The writer, who is from Salamanca is an agricultural engineer and an Environmental Sciences graduate, who had also noted the "nonsensical" wrapping up of fresh products in supermarkets.

The most "weird and outrageous" example she found was a single onion wrapped in a much-too-large plastic container. This became the main image of the #DesnudaLaFruta campaign, which encourages conscious consumers to photograph fruit and vegetables that are wrapped in plastic in a way that is "abusive and unnecessary" and spread them on Facebook, Instagram and Twitter alongside the above hashtag.

British campaigners offer a realistic alternative to single-use plastic

Ecopassion, an environmental initiative and online shop, advises local residents on how they can reduce their everyday use of plastic

MALAGA. While Spain's #DesnudaLaFruta campaign has taken off on a global scale, two British residents on the Costa del Sol have been working to help locals find practical ways to reduce their use of plastic. Neighbours Sarah and Steph from Casares Costa were walking their dogs together discussing environmental issues when they had their "light bulb" moment and decided to start Ecopassion, an online shop and waste-reduction campaign that was officially launched in March of this year, aided by the women's background in marketing.

Already, their mission has gained traction. In April, they visited the local water board (Acosol) and in May the recycling plant for Costa del Sol West (Urbaser) in order to fact-find, and say they were met with very a very positive response.

"We really wanted to dispel the myth that all rubbish is put into one bin and landfilled," Sarah told SUR in English.

As a result of their campaigning efforts, Ecopassion has managed to get five local bars to switch from plastic straws - the disposal of which is seriously threatening to marine life - to paper ones.

TIPS

Reduce your plastic intake:

Drink tap water and stop buying bottled: If you really don't like the taste (some areas are better than others) then get a water filter.

Use reusable bags for fruit and veg: If you take your own bags with you then you reduce the need for unwanted plastic.

Avoid food packaging: 90% of household waste here is plastic and even when trying to reduce your plastic waste in other ways, food packaging can still be a culprit. Try to shop in places with a deli counter where you can take your own containers for meat/cheese etc. or use places that wrap in waxed paper instead of plastic.

Switch from liquid clothes detergent to powder: Fabric softener is reported to be bad for you, so that's one bottle you can cut out. If you switch to powder detergent you will be using a recyclable card box.

Try using solid shampoo: Bars last longer than a bottle. Also try ditching shower gel and hand soap for soap bars.

As well as offering helpful advice through social media, Ecopassion sells a wide selection of recyclable, reusable or biodegradable alternatives to everyday household items,

for example drinking straws, cleaning materials, shopping bags, toothbrushes and shampoo bars wrapped in paper, and, for the current Plastic Free July campaign, the shop is offering a variety of discounts.

The team, headed by Sarah and Steph, also organise events: their first beach clean takes place this month on the western Costa del Sol area up to the border of Cadiz province.

Sarah admits that, among her new plastic-free lifestyle habits, some have been easier to implement than others: "I can't remember the last time I bought a plastic water bottle or used a plastic bag, and all my family now happily use a bamboo toothbrush, but it took a while to adjust to the shampoos, so we tried a few different ones before settling on the ones we use now."

One of the Ecopassion founders' biggest challenges was making the extra effort to shop in different places according to which products have the least plastic. Sarah recommends making a fridge chart to speed up the process.

With more and more people getting involved, the business is going from strength to strength. "We haven't met with very much resistance at all," said Sarah.

"What is really inspiring," she added, "is meeting people and hearing what lengths they have gone to to live a more environmentally friendly lifestyle. Sometimes the people you would least expect to make changes have done so."

The response has been overwhelming and has broken down many barriers. Although the onion remains at the top of the ranking of ridiculous packaging, users have shared images of oranges that had been peeled and repackaged, sprigs of herbs inside boxes that weigh more than they do and ecological courgettes wrapped in non-ecological containers.

"Over-wrapping has become so normal that we've got to the point that it does not surprise anyone, but there are many people who think it's crazy," explain Patricia and Fernando, who recount their experiences in a blog: Vivir Sin Plásticos (Living Without Plastic).

From their point of view, pro-plastic arguments made by certain companies on the basis of hygiene or conservation do not hold up. "Don't oranges, kiwis and bananas have sufficient protection with

their own skin? Aren't you going to peel them before you eat them?" they ask.

"I suppose that the packaging is meant to speed up the shopping process, because the client doesn't have to weigh the fruit, but this does not justify all the waste," declares Vicente.

Of the three famous 'Rs' in sustainability - reduce, reuse, recycle - people normally just resort to the last. They put their products in a recycling bin and clear their conscience, but the truth is that half of those plastic remains could end up on landfill sites, or, worse, polluting oceans and beaches.

Reusable bags

The promoters of the vegetable 'striptease' put more emphasis on another R; rejecting the over-packaged food products and realising that the alternative is just as simple: buying loose fruit and veg. In many cases, the consumer can weigh their products and stick the price directly onto the article, or pack their fruit and vegetables in their own reusable bags made of recyclable plastic, fabric or mesh, all of which can be bought very cheaply online. Almost all businesses accept this without question.

However the activists admit that the ball is in the hands of the distribution sector. Although plastic-free supermarkets already exist elsewhere - the latest, called Ekoplaza, has just opened in Amsterdam -, Spain is dragging its feet, say the environmentalists.

"The main objective of the campaign is that this plastic packaging disappears, but, up to now, no companies have agreed to it. Some have said that they will take our suggestions into account, but as of yet no action has been taken."

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Record crowds at fifth Weekend Beach

TORRE DEL MAR. The fifth Weekend Beach festival closed in the early hours of Sunday morning reporting record ticket sales with 140,000 people attending over the four days and 38,000 attendees on average per day.

The fifth anniversary got under way in the middle of last week as thousands of ‘Weekers’ started to descend on Torre del Mar and pitched their tents on the campsite behind the main festival ground. 

GARDENING

Lupinus albus

White lupin is an attractive plant, content to grow in hot climates and with an edible seed popular here in Spain

The lupin genus as a whole does not fare well in hot climates but one species, *Lupinus albus*, has been grown in the Mediterranean region for over 2,000 years. Commonly called the Egyptian or field lupin

(altramuz blanco or chocho in Spanish), it is not only grown for its attractive foliage and spikes of white flowers but also for its crop of edible seeds which here in Spain are cooked and served

in brine as a snack.

Archaeological excavations have unearthed traces of this plant in Greece, Italy, Egypt and Cyprus, dating back to nearly 4,000 years ago. The seed is high in protein and low in starch and gluten and is a source of folate (B9), magnesium, phosphorous and iron. Like all lupin species, the raw seed is bitter and toxic, containing poisonous alkaloids, and needs to be soaked before cooking, in the same way that pulses are treated.

It is grown commercially in various countries, particularly Australia which produces 80 per cent of the world's crop.

However useful it may be as a food, *Lupinus albus* is also an attractive bushy plant with dark-green, pubescent leaves and tall spikes of white pea-like flowers which attract bees and butterflies. As a member of the Fabaceae family, it can be used as a green manure as it fixes nitrogen in the soil. It grows to about 1.2 metres tall and although drought resistant (it has a very long taproot) it will flower and seed more vigorously with regular watering. *Lupinus albus* prefers an acid soil which must be free-draining to prevent the roots rotting and can be grown in full sun or partial shade.

In temperate regions it is sown at the end of the summer and grown during the winter months, taking 11 months to mature. People with peanut allergies may find they are also allergic to *Lupinus*.

A study shows that Antequera's lovers' rock contained the very first shrine in Andalucía

Scientists have discovered that the wall paintings in the Matababras cave date back to 3,900 years BC, before the Menga dolmen was built

MALAGA. The wall paintings in the Matababras cave, inside the Peña de los Enamorados (lovers' rock) in Antequera, date back to 3,900 years before Christ. The date has been scientifically certified and means that this neolithic enclave was the first ever shrine in Andalucía; it existed before the dolmens were built nearby, according to Leonardo García Sanjuán, a professor of Prehistory at Seville university.

He is the coordinator of a study which has produced a much more specific, and earlier, date for the origins of the archaeological complex which is now a World Heritage Site.

"This shrine was already in use before the Menga dolmen was built,

which is how we can date it," said García Sanjuán. He believes the cave paintings were done before the end of the neolithic period, and the study has opened the way for others to be carried out in the future to establish a more exact date for the megalithic monuments.

"We already knew about this small cave, but no in-depth study had been done into it," he says, stressing the importance of the multidisciplinary research which has revealed further details about the site.

The result is important because of the link it shows between these cave paintings and the dolmens: the shrine in the mountain (which looks like the profile of a sleeping giant) is what made the settlers on the Antequera plain build the Menga dolmen facing the Peña, instead of towards the sun or the stars, like other dolmens.

"We already knew that people once lived in El Toro cave at El Torcal in Antequera, which is where we have the oldest neolithic settlement in Malaga and one of the oldest in southern Spain," said García Sanjuán.

Now it appears that when they

moved down to the plain, they decided to worship the rock, so they built the Menga dolmen to face the shrine there and the megalithic tomb, Viera, towards the sun, as in the rest of Europe and north Africa, according to Bartolomé Ruiz, director of the archaeological site.

"One of the objectives of this work was, for the first time, to try to put a date to these paintings, which is difficult. We used a method which is called uranium thorium dating on the symbols which have been preserved at the foot of the Peña, by activating neutrons and X-ray diffraction and carrying out a full style analysis," explained García Sanjuán.

High resolution

Once this scientific study had been published, it showed that this cave painting was done in the 39th century BC. "That date is very compatible with the hypothesis that the Menga dolmen faced this mountain because there had been a sanctuary there before," he said, "as was also indicated in the study which was carried out for the application

to be designated as a World Heritage Site."

As part of the study, "a photogrammetric restitution was carried out, which is very important at a conservation level, because for the first time we can say that we have a complete three-dimensional map of what this cave is like, with all its features," said García Sanjuán.

The high-resolution research was carried out by the Prehistory and Archaeology Department at Seville university, and financed by the Ministry of the Economy and Competition's National R+D Plan. The team included specialists from the Senior Board of Scientific Research (CSIC) and the universities of Alcalá de Henares, Southampton, Lisbon and Seville.

The first 3-D map has also been produced of the small Matababras cave and its features

This new scientific contribution will have to be continued with further studies, because up until now there was only an estimated date for the dolmens: Menga was believed to have been built 4,000 years before Christ, but that has now had to be revised to at least 3,900.

This was all during the late Neolithic period, which was between 10,000 and 3,000 years before our time, and there is believed to have been a 1,000-year difference between the creation of the dolmens of Menga, Viera and El Romeral.

The classification as a Unesco World Heritage Site has attracted more visitors and made it possible to complete the museum project; it also means that more in-depth studies can be carried out into the Dolmens of Antequera site, to find out about who built them. Also, as Michael Hoskin (the scientist who carried out the comparative study which showed that Menga was the only one to be built facing an object other than the sun) says: what if there are more dolmens lying beneath the ground in the area?

TORREMOLINOS. Torremolinos is getting ready for the second biggest LGBT festival of the summer season, the Wonder Gay Festival, a week of themed parties and musical events that will take place at different venues in the town centre and on the beaches of El Bajondillo.

Following the success of Torremolinos Pride last month - which was attended by more than 40,000 people - the Wonder Beach Festival will take place from Monday 23 until Sunday 29 July.

The festival presents a series of activities like pool and beach parties with top DJs, comedy drag shows, concerts and leisure activities. The event, which is aimed mainly at gay men, is expected to attract people from all over Andalucía.

Parties are held in the most popular gay-friendly bars, including Eden, where many of the daytime parties will take place on the bar's private beach area.



Voria Harras' collection, which features toys and miniatures from the medieval era up to now, is available to visit five years on from the closure of her museum

MALAGA. Voria Harras didn't keep her own doll house, she gave it away to another little girl when she was just a child. However, this did not stop her becoming the collector she is now; the proud owner of the doll house that the children of the Andalusian aristocracy used to play with and a replica of the mansion on Paseo de Sancha.

For nearly fifty years, Harras has cared for and restored doll houses that date all the way back to the 14th century. Five years ago, her museum on Calle Álamos, in the centre of Malaga was closed, and since then the tiny art-deco lamps have sat in

darkness and the minuscule curtains have remained closed. Until now. The dolls return to a new home in a different location: The Exhibition Centre in Benalmádena.

For six months, until 14 December, the cultural centre will be host to Voria Harras' extensive collection. Displayed across three floors is everything from miniature houses and 19th-century toys to authentic medieval show furniture.

Centuries ago, catalogues of furniture didn't exist and the only way that a carpenter or a builder could show their work to a client was to construct scaled-down pieces which he then gave away. This is the origin of doll houses and the purpose of the Buganvilla doll house, a building that still stands in Monte de Sancha.

"They weren't for children to play with. Architects used them as models and afterwards they were put on display in the hall or the living room

of the house," explains Harras. People would decorate the house with furniture that the carpenter had made and lay the table with miniature cutlery from the goldsmith. Little by little, the model became an exact replica of the real house, in miniature. The collector says that this was a way for well-off families to "show their house to visitors without actually showing it".

Visitors to the exhibition can explore a replica of the Palacio de los Carranza in Cádiz (with a miniature porcelain Limoje dinnerware set), a stately home typical of the Malaga province complete with balconies, wallpaper and a sun room on the first floor for sewing, playing and painting. Or look around the tiny Cordoba palace, Villa Dolores, which has an arbour on the terrace.

Harras' vision as a whole combines various interests, from architecture to fashion and customs of the 19th century. None of these houses have water in the bathroom, some don't even have baths (each bedroom has a chamber pot and a washbowl), while others house more servants than residents. Some even have a chapel. Anything that you might find in a home has been put

in one of these doll houses, there is even a tiny radio in one of the sitting rooms.


With the passing of time and changes in lifestyles, the replicas began to seem old fashioned and the little rooms became places for the children to play with. By the start of the 20th century, the Lenci dolls - one hundred years old by then - would get mixed in with push chairs, stuffed animals, toy kitchens and train sets. A spectacular Tudor doll

house (found on the second floor of the exhibition) was used around this time, a typical English replica with not a detail missed.

The art deco style in the doll houses began to evolve alongside what was popular at the time. Telephones appeared and running water was accessible inside the home. Garages were built outside and people started to use washing machines. Each house tells the story of a home owner, as is the case of the Cortinas sisters, who burnt their doll house to keep warm during the war, but kept everything that was inside; or that of Carmen Marcos, who received her doll house as a gift from the King. It features a replica of her grandparents' living room alongside designs inspired by the Bauhaus school.

As the decades went on, many doll houses began to leave their original homes, thrown away or replaced by a plastic model. Voria Harras' collection invites onlookers to travel back to the time where these pieces would catch the eye of the little ones, but had a more important function for adults. "It's a mistake to think that these were just for children," adds Harras. Whoever visits this exhibition will know that she is right.

A taste of the sea

TWO DAYS IN GARRUCHA

Car + festivals

Journey time: 3 hours from Malaga.

In the Cabo de Gata, the beautiful beaches and impressive cliffs aren't the only thing that residents have to be proud of. There are also some charming fishing villages, like Garrucha, which is situated on the coast of the Campo de Vera, between Mojácar and Palomares.

In fact, as well as tourism, fishing is one of the main activities in this Almería town, which houses less than nine thousand residents. A close link to the sea and its products means that Garrucha boasts its own cuisine, a red prawn that takes its name

from the town and is much-loved by gourmet enthusiasts.

In addition to this crustacean, a veritable feast of seafood, fish and molluscs, such as John Dory, snapper, mackerel and monkfish arrive at the fish markets of Garrucha every day. Some of these fish serve as ingredients for a simple seafood stew, made with wine, almonds, garlic and fried bread.

A good way to see everything that arrives at the fishing port is to go, by appointment, to the fishing market, where a traditional auction takes place every afternoon. Here, the visitor can verify the quality and the freshness of the delicious Mediterranean fish for themselves.

The port, which is joined to the marina, is just one of the delightful features of the traditional town of Garrucha. From the sea front, visitors have access to the pier, a hundred-year-old walkway upon which one can breathe in the sea air.

In the town of Garrucha lies a monument to the fishermen and a museum dedicated to fishing and the marine environment. Known as Nautarum, it is situated in the old Castillo de Jesús Nazareno, within the Las Escobetas area.

This lovely fishing village, lined with beaches, cultural spaces and historical monuments, is ideal for summertime visits. Some of the more prominent testaments to the town's heritage are an old 19th century chimney - a relic of the mining industry -, a majestic town hall as well as some traditional religious buildings, like the San Joaquín church or the Virgen del Carmen chapel.

Pickling in vinegar, an ancient technique for preserving foods

Vegetables, fruit, spices and oils can be added to enrich the vinegar marinade and help soften the meat

MÁLAGA. Pickled foods have been with us for centuries. They have one prime ingredient: vinegar, which chemically is acetic acid produced by exposing wine to the air.

The first known vinegar in the Mediterranean area dates from 4,000 BC. The Babylonians made it from beer or wine and used it together with herbs and spices to prepare meat and fish. Vinegar is a potent antibacterial agent. In ancient times it was used as a water purifier and food preservative.

In 'De re coquinaria', one of the few remaining testimonies of ancient Roman cuisine, Apicius spoke of a "way to conserve fried fish" which consisting of covering it with vinegar. But Apicio's recipe is not in

the strict sense a pickle. As indicated by the anonymous 13th-century Andalusian cookbook, 'Hispano-Maghrebi cuisine during the Almo-had period', "when you add vinegar to the pickle, it reinforces the acidity to a great degree, and it is regulated when it is combined with sweet elements and a lot of fat."

Hence, the gourmet Pepe Iglesias, in his article "Escabeches en la historia" (www.encyclopediade-gastronomia.es) states that originally, escabeche (the pickle) was "a stew", "a dressing made of vinegar and spices which cooked indistinctly the meat or the fish". This method of pickling had the advantage of preserving the food for long periods and has been commonly used in Spain since medieval times to preserve surplus fish and meat, especially small game, where the addition of vinegar and spices helped to disguise odours and flavours that were excessively strong.

Nowadays tastes have changed and the sourness of vinegar is not so popular although it is still used

to soften and add nuances and aromas. Plus, we no longer rely on vinegar quite so much as a preservative.


There are many different types of vinegars and some people consider it a waste to use high quality vinegars for marinades. However in a country which is renowned for its wines, there are lots of excellent vinegars to choose from and many are protected by their own D. O. (Dominación de Origen).

A good way of using these aromatic vinegars is to combine them with a wine from the same area in a ratio of two parts vinegar, one part wine and one part stock or water.

The vinegars and spices used should be adapted to the flavour profiles of the meat or fish. Lighter vinegar mixtures with orange peel, sweet wine, honey, and perhaps sweet red peppers, provide balance and smoothness. Remember to take care with the colour of the vinegar you choose as dark vinegars and wines can make the finished dish look unattractive.

The price war for sardines on skewers hots up in the beach bars of El Palo

Many businesses on the east side of Malaga city sell the sardine 'espetos' at two euros compared with up to ten euros in some restaurants in Marbella

MALAGA. It is the most popular food of the summer in the 'chiringuitos' (beach bars), and yet the most criticised pricewise. The 'espeto' (sardine skewer) is at the centre of a war waging on the east side of Malaga. A dish that on average will cost five or six euros has been reduced to just two euros in many businesses in the district of El Palo.

The further you travel to the east of the city, the cheaper espetos are, while in Marbella and Estepona one can pay ten or eleven euros in even the most traditional bars.

Price wars

This price battle is its fiercest on the sand, especially on the beach of El Dedo. There, businesses such as Sherif Playa and Antonio promote their low prices on huge blackboards to attract the attention of the residents and tourists.

Paquito Medina, from the Antonio restaurant, explains that hav-

ing them at that price hardly generates any profit but it does help to keep the tables occupied. "All our customers want espetos, so it's a good promotion," he said.

Iván Márquez, of Sherif Playa, thinks the same and explains that

this war in reverse began a couple of years ago when a business started offering them at one euro and the rest followed suit.

"They have risen somewhat, but have remained very low compared to the rest of the coast," he said.

He is also aware of the draw of low prices because more than 90% of the tables order espetos. "We're surprised if someone doesn't ask for one," he added.

The ability to lower prices to the maximum is a problem for the rest

of the business owners in the area. Many of them buy the sardines when they are cheapest and freeze them, and can also buy them from Italy and even Croatia. "It's a product that varies a lot in the market, so if you only want to work with fresh, good quality sardines you cannot compete," they say.

Supply problems

As the coasts off Malaga cannot supply all the demand, many boxes of sardines come from Castellón and the Levante coast, "where the fish is very similar in quality".

The Malaga fishermen assure that working with this type of fish is complicated because you never

know what price it will be since it varies depending on the boats that leave port and the time of year.

When key days arrive like the Night of San Juan or the Malaga Fair, "they take advantage and raise the price of a box of sardines".

Wholesalers sell the six-kilo 'corchos' for between 12 and 25 euros plus VAT, so that a kilo of sardines can cost up to about five euros in Mercamálaga, the wholesale market.

"To that we have to add the cost of our staff's wages, water, electricity ... it really does not pay to sell them at only two euros," they said.

The president of the Association of Fish Wholesalers of Mercamálaga,

Luis Miguel Roldán, explains that currently there is a very high demand but little quantity of product, so the price is high.

Although he does not know how to explain the shortage of sardines, he considers that it is mainly due to the fishing grounds and explains that the few that are entering now come from the Spanish Levante. "It has nothing to do with jellyfish or anything like that," he explained.

Fluctuating prices

Currently sardines are sold at about three euros per kilo plus VAT but the price fluctuates a lot and rises towards the weekend, since that is when there is greater demand from

the beach bars. "It is clear that the sardine is most in demand in the summer and the most are sold then."

Although they don't run out of supplies completely, this shortage of sardines is also reflected in the municipal markets.

During the past week just a couple of stalls at Malaga's Mercado Central have had a continuous supply of sardines and have been selling them at over five euros a kilo.

A fishmonger at La Merced market, Salvador Gallardo, explained that the problem is that now there are no sardines from the Costa del Sot, as fishermen are having to move to waters off Almeria for fear of the jellyfish. But he added: "The sardines are now at their very best."

SURGE PRICING



You don't have to be a brain surgeon to understand that a hotel room's value at 6pm is greater than that for the same room at midnight. When there is a tube or bus strike it is normal for Uber's rates to increase, sometimes by as much as 400%, and street vendors invariably charge higher prices for their umbrellas when it is raining.

Is this opportunism or price manipulation? Until 1861, when a grocer in Philadelphia decided to label all the items in his shop with prices, the usual way of buying anything was by personal negotiation. No-one paid the same and no item cost the same.

It appears those times are coming back. The price you will pay for many goods and services will be dictated by who you are, where you live, what you have bought in the past, the prices you paid, and frequency of purchase. Buying airline tickers online is more sophisticated than other marketplaces, and typically a fare can be updated as much as 90,000 times in a day. It used to be amusing to ask the person in the next seat how much they had paid, but now it seems there is no identifiable rhyme or reason to justify tariffs.

Our consumer profile calls the tune. Allegedly users of Apple products pay an average of 30% more for online purchases, on the

assumption they have greater acquisitive power. Everything is 'negotiable', from cinema tickets to medical treatment, so what about restaurants? Is it reasonable to charge a diner the same rate on a Monday night as on a Saturday? Admittedly the restaurant's costs are the same on both occasions, but is the experience the same? On Monday the dining room may be half empty and the head chef taking a night off. The value-for-money element is very different, which is why the currently accepted price variation formula involves a discount of 25-30% Monday through Thursday. Slowly but surely surge pricing in restaurants is making headway in US and European countries, although Spain is not so far one of them.

Good business

They save millions of lives while at the same time boosting the bank accounts of the major pharmaceutical companies. They are vaccines, welcomed by many, but reviled by others

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For Pilar García-Corbeira, the figures have always added up: preventing six million deaths a year, saving the loss of 400,000 years of life and avoiding 700,000 cases of severe disability are more than enough reasons for her to answer, when anyone asks her how important vaccines are, "We are talking about a collective weapon".

For this microbiologist, the medical director of the vaccinations department of the all-powerful GlaxoSmithKline (GSK) in Spain, the debate about whether

or not this is huge business for the pharmaceutical companies or whether the latest major discovery by her company, the vaccine against meningitis B, is proving a goldmine for the British giant, is not the question.

"I find it hard to understand why some people reduce this to a business matter. Vaccinations are the best and most effective tool for health since water was made suitable for drinking. It may sound as if I am biased, but it is the truth. Every doctor dreams of being able to eradicate an illness," she says.

García-Corbeira was speaking during a break in one of the interminable days which are necessary in this profession, to which she has dedicated the last 22 years of her life. The interview took place while she was working on the creation of a new vaccine against syncytial respiratory virus, an infec-

tion which affects the tiny airways of young children and fills hospital wards every winter. Last year they began tests with two-year-olds, and if all continues as at present, in five or six years they may be ready to revolutionise vaccination calendars all around the world.

Before this, she collaborated with the team which created the vaccine for herpes zoster, the same virus which causes chickenpox, and prior to that she was working on a vaccine for cervical cancer. That is why she becomes irritated when someone says that there is only generalised vaccination because of the greed of the pharmaceutical industry.

"They forget that not all cases are commercial, they are not just sold to make a profit. The pharmaceutical companies invest in science, clinical testing, research... but surely everyone can understand that in order to be able to keep on researching they have to have some sort of return. Of course a pharmaceutical company is a business and therefore needs profits to survive, but I can't think of many better reasons to work than to try to prevent illness and improve people's lives," she says.

An average investment of 400 million euros, working teams which can include 100 experts all over the world and, with luck, no more than six years before a new product is available, seems enough commitment for one company, even if the vaccines have opened the door to a multimillion euro business which periodically makes the major pharmaceutical companies the focus of attention.

The companies are accused of greed and opacity by some nongovernmental organisations, and questioned by the anti-vaccine groups who wield a battery of scientific evidence and supposed cases to support their rebellion. Some even claim that the companies are so powerful that they even have managed to get different health services to work for their own interests.

One of the best-known critics is Xavier Uriarte, president of the League for Freedom from Vaccination. He is tireless in saying publicly that most vaccines do no good, and are also the cause of numerous problems. He is the author of 'Los peligros de las vacunas' (The dangers of vaccinations), a type of bible for those who support this theory, and his followers believe that mass prophylactic vaccination, in other words artificially infecting the population, carries notable risks and they attribute the policy of vaccinating all citizens of healthy countries to "the inert bureaucracy of vaccination programmes and the pressure which important economic sectors put on the administration to benefit their own interests".

Amós García Rojas, epidemiologist and president of the Spanish

Vaccinology Association, disagrees. "It isn't even true that vaccines are big business for the pharmaceutical companies, when they are between 1.5 and two per cent of the total of all pharmaceutical expenditure in a country like Spain. It has been shown that the vaccines produce nowhere near the level of business of other drugs for this industry," he says, adding that if anyone wants to know how important vaccines are, they only have to close their eyes and think about what people were dying of 60 years ago.

"The vaccine has been the only tool capable of wiping smallpox off the face of the earth and almost eradicating polio, an illness which 60 years ago was filling warehouses with steel lungs which were needed to try to help the patients breathe, and that in 1988, not so long ago, was still paralysing nearly 1,000 children a day around the world. Not to mention the more than 20 million people who have been saved from dying from measles between 2000 and 2015 alone," he insists.

A worthwhile investment

A large part of the medical community is making efforts to stress the value of these medicines which

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deaths and 700,000 cases of severe disability are prevented every year thanks to vaccines. Nowadays, 116 million children are given basic vaccines every year but another 19.4 million still have no access to them.

are able to save us, in some cases, from certain death, and some are doing their sums to try to dispel any doubt. A few months ago, a study carried out by the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg school of public health concluded that every dollar invested in vaccines resulted in a saving of 44.

Having decided to talk about the financial aspect, the researchers examined the economic impact of a vaccination programme against ten illnesses in 94 countries with low and medium income between 2011 and 2020. The conclusion? The 34 billion dollars necessary to carry out the initiative will result in a long-term saving of 586 bi-

llion in health expenditure.

Profitable ideas

Something which nobody has any doubt about is that, although vaccines are not the principal source of income for pharmaceutical com-

panies, they do contribute considerably to filling the already enormous wallet of the companies which produce them. An example? GSK, which just over a year ago hit the headlines with its vaccine for meningitis B, a treatment which

costs 106 euros per dose and which, despite the price, resulted in such a demand that for a time pharmacies over half of Spain ran out of stock, has turned its discovery into a good business.

This drug, which became an in-

stant best-seller, earned 634 million euros in 2017, thanks just to Bexsero, the name with which it has been placed on the market. In addition, there were the 446 million in 2016 and 131 million euros in 2015, the year in

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➤ which its sale was approved. So far 22 million doses have been sold, which gives an idea of the amount of money GSK has earned through it.

How much does it cost to come up with a formula which we will be able to tackle an illness? It is calculated that this same company invested between 130 and 400 million euros in R+D to produce its vaccine against the rotavirus and later, between 2010 and 2013, that vaccine would produce an income of 2.5 billion euros. Rotavirus, the main cause of serious diarrhoea in babies and young children, kills around half a million under-fives every year despite being a preventable illness. Preventing a death, says the company, has no price.

That idea is not shared by groups such as Médicos Sin Fronteras, who not only believe that it does have a price but also that the prices are very high. The organisation, which has produced an extensive report on vaccination, says that vaccinating a child in a poor country is 68 times more expensive now than it was in 2001.

"A complete vaccination programme in 2001 protected against six illnesses and cost 57 cents. Now it protects against 12 and costs 39.25 euros. The multiplication in prices is due to the greed of the big pharmaceutical companies," says Miriam Alía Prieto, who heads MSF España's department of vaccination and response to epidemics. She believes one of the problems is the opacity of the market.

"The pharmaceutical industry deliberately hides the prices for which it sells the vaccines to each country and most of them, having signed a confidentiality agreement, don't reveal the information either. The companies do that to make sure governments and donating organisations don't find out, and that way they get more money

Médicos Sin Fronteras believes that the prices of vaccines in poor countries are very high

from the negotiations. This leads to irrational situations such as that Morocco and Tunisia pay more than France for Pfizer's vaccine against pneumococcus: 55 and 58.5 euros respectively, compared with 50," she says.

Médicos sin Fronteras, which has added its voice to those calling on the United Nations for more transparency, admits that although it is not a perfect solution, alliances such as GAVI - which brings together governments, vaccine manufacturers, NGOs and the Gates Foundation (Melinda and Bill Gates) to promote vaccination all over the world - have brought down the prices of vaccines in the poorest countries; and that the Panamerican Health Organisation, which protects a large part of Latin America and the Caribbean, took a giant step 20 years ago by deciding to buy vaccines as a block via a rotating fund. However, says the association, the figures still don't add up.

"The fact is that the pharmaceutical companies have placed business profitability above everything else, which means that something like the hepatitis C vaccine which costs one euro to produce is being sold for 1,000," it insists.

This way of looking at things in no way resembles that of Pilar García-Corbeira. "To advance in this it is necessary to work on creating alliances, international research groups with the ability to develop an idea. A major structure is also needed to reach the end of the road. And we're doing it. Who would ever have thought that one day I would be able to protect my daughters from cancer of the cervix?" she says.

HOW THE VACCINE FOR CERVICAL CANCER WAS CREATED

SET TO WORK



Once the cause was identified, the work continued in different laboratories and research centres around the world. But who made the discovery? Starting with tests on hares, and contrary to dominant theories in the 1970s, Harald zur Hausen, a German researcher who won the Nobel Prize for Medicine for his work, successfully isolated two CEPAS of the human

papiloma virus involved in 70 per cent of cervical tumours.

From then on, researchers, virologists, doctors and biologists all over the world set themselves the challenge, and a difficult one at that, to work on creating a vaccine. Some years later the work of an American researcher, Dr Schiller, provided the basis for the vaccine against HPV.

MICE



Just as in the case of flu, ferrets were the 'guinea pigs' used to develop the vaccine; for human papiloma, mice were used for testing. It was through experiments on these animals that the researchers discovered that the virus has to fix itself to the basal membrane of the neck of the uterus, one layer below the epithelial cells, to start the in-

fection. The work with the mice also showed the mechanism through which the HPV infects the epithelial cells of the neck of the uterus and gave the researchers an idea of the cellular response which could be expected in humans. This enabled them to move on to the next stage of the research, and find a safe way to apply the vaccine.

30,000 WOMEN



The steps taken to reach this phase were no guarantee that the vaccine would work. It still had to be tested on humans and the protocol is to do that bit by bit. Volunteers have to be found and side effects have to be gradually ruled out, the amount of proteins the vaccine should have has to be evaluated and studies into what the experts call the range of doses have to be carried out.

research worked with dozens of hospitals around the world. Gynaecologists suggested the idea of participating to their patients. Those who decided to do so made the decision freely and received no money for it. 20,000 women aged between 15 and 25 took part in the effectiveness studies for the vaccine against human papiloma virus, and 30,000 aged between 10 and 72 took part in the safety studies. They were monitored for seven years in total, and could opt out at any time if they so wished.

Who and how

Having reached this point, the laboratories which carried out the



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objective was to find out as much about it as possible and, given that there can be many types, to decide which was to blame and how to combat it. After months of work they concluded that the best course of action would be to tackle the one which was causing 70 per cent of these cancer cases.

New actors

Dr Schiller's experiments showed that the vaccine was effective in animals. That gave the pharmaceutical companies the evidence they needed to invest in their own vaccines, designed to protect against numerous types of HPV.

Under control

Tests on animals are always, and including this occasion, carried out in accordance with strict guidelines laid down by the regulatory authorities and only take place when there is no other way of finding an answer to the questions.

SAFETY



When the researchers had confirmed that the vaccine was effective and safe, the time came to register the research with the health authorities and apply for it to be approved; this is essential before any vaccine can be provided or administered.

In Spain

Before being put on the market, the vaccine against HPV had to be given the go-ahead from the Spanish and European Medications Agency, which supervises the regulation of vaccines put on sale in any EU country. The laboratories provided full information about the product, the data compiled during its development and the tests which were carried out. Then came the moment when it could be produced. That brought more challenges, including ensuring there was enough supply. It meant that large quantities of the vaccine would have to be produced. Hundreds of thousands of vaccines travelled all over the world.

THE END



The perseverance of the researchers paid off when in 2006 Gardasil, produced by the American pharmaceutical company Merck, became the first prophylactic vaccine against HPV to be authorised in the USA. Cervarix, made by British giant GSK, was approved in 2009. After a long road, they were finally on the market.

Control

Since the first group of women was vaccinated in Australia, the vaccination programmes have gradually increased over the years and now it is included in the recommended vaccination programme in 67 countries, either as organised or voluntary vaccines. At present around 115 million women a year are estimated to be given the vaccine. Meanwhile, the drug continues to be monitored. This guarantees that the experience obtained from its use can be analysed and evaluated in terms of safety and effectiveness. The process never really ends.

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A wireless defibrillator implant for a five-year-old boy with a heart tumour

The surgical team in Granada successfully carried out this pioneering operation on a patient who weighed less than 20 kilos

GRANADA. Cardiovascular surgeons at the Virgen de las Nieves University Hospital in Granada have implanted a wireless defibrillator in the chest of a five-year-old boy with a heart tumour. The little boy, who is recovering well at home now after being discharged on 8 June, has become the first case known in Spain and Europe in which this device has been used in such a young patient, and one who weighs less than 20 kilos.

Little Alejandro suffered a cardiac arrest on 25 April, when he was with his parents, who immediately took him to the health centre in Zújar, where they live. He was taken to the hospital in Baza to stabilise him and later transferred to the ICU at the Virgen de las Nieves in Granada. There, he was diagnosed with an uncommon tumour, five centi-

metres in size, in his heart.

José Manuel Garrido, the surgeon who led the operation, said the tumour, known as intraventricular fibroma, can lead to sudden death or cardiac arrhythmia. "We were very lucky that everything along the chain went very well; these days medicine in isolation is impossible. You need a team who treats the pa-

tient cross-sectionally from start to finish," he said.

He also said that due to the size of the tumour, the medical team debated over whether to operate or not. "We decided we would, using extracorporeal circulation, to remove as much as possible," he explained. They successfully removed 80 per cent of the tumour and recon-

structed the cardiac cavities. The remaining 20 per cent was left in order not to damage the anterior descending artery.

Dr Garrido also said that the tumour was caught at an early stage, which reduces the dangers. "The worst scenario would be that the tumour continues to grow slowly and reappears. We will be monitoring

Alejandro so we will be able to remove all or nearly all of the tumour in the future, because his arteries will be bigger by then and we can apply other techniques," he said.

Second challenge

The second challenge for the medical team was to implant the defibrillator. The Virgen de las Nieves hospital is a pioneer in electrostimulation in children and the doctors took the decision to implant an electrical cardioversion device "to protect the heart from outside". This was not a normal type of defibrillator: it has no cables, because otherwise it would produce thromboses and other problems because Alejandro's blood vessels are so small. Also, the need to replace cables would increase the risks.

"This device is a bit bigger than conventional ones, which is a problem in children, so we put it between the chest muscles, as near as possible to the area by the spinal column," said Dr Garrido.

This successful operation could open a new chapter in treatment, with other hospitals also using a device of this type in young patients with similar problems.

The wireless defibrillator is likely to work for about seven years. "We know we will have to change the generator in five, six, seven or eight years, but by then we will have overcome the major initial problem, which was that he was a small boy with a large tumour and he didn't weigh very much," said the surgeon.

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Ten reasons to think again about flip-flops

Experts warn of the dangers of continually wearing this type of sandal and only recommend flip-flops for the beach, swimming pool and public showers

MÁLAGA. Summer's here and our feet are noticing the difference as many of us now spend all day wearing flip-flops, which are only a minimal barrier between us and the hot ground. However, podiatrists say flip-flops have more disadvantages than benefits and they can cause problems in the short and medium term.

These are the ten reasons why prolonged use of flip-flops is not advisable:

1. They are not suitable for any type of walking, because they make us take short steps, drag our feet and more stress is placed on the ankle.
2. There is no support for the foot and this causes a lack of balance and increases the risk of falls and sprains.
3. They can cause injury between

the 1st and 2nd toe, because the strap can rub.

4. They cause the plantar fascia, the tissue on the bottom of the foot which connects the heel bone with the toes, to stretch, causing inflammation, pain and tiredness.

5. Because they are completely flat, they provide little support for the

sole of the foot. Laura Fernández, a podiatrist at the Vithas Xanit hospital, recommends soles which are one or two fingers thick and if they are higher in the heel, even better. 6. They can cause 'hammertoes' due to inadequate support. Laura explains that without us really realising it, our toes tend to bend in or-

der to get a better grip on the ground and better stability.

7. They change the way we walk, and that has biomechanical consequences especially, says Laura, for people who tend to turn their feet inwards or outwards, because wearing flip-flops makes that worse.

8. In certain people, for example

diabetics, who often suffer from inadequate circulation in their feet, any injury can lead to some serious complications.

9. The foot is unprotected. It is highly exposed to external agents: the sun, insect bites, grazing.

10. It should go without saying, but it is not advisable to do any type of sporting activity in flip-flops and drivers are banned from wearing them.

Of course, they do have some advantages:

1. They allow the feet to breathe.
2. They are easy to put on and take off.
3. They can be washed quickly.

There is no need to throw your flip-flops away after reading these recommendations, however. Experts say they are suitable for the beach, swimming pool and public showers because they prevent skin infections. Podiatrists just recommend that for everyday use they should be replaced with other types of sandal with a thicker sole and provide support for the ankle.

Laura Fernández says humans have lost the tradition of walking barefoot and we need something solid beneath our feet now, although she also points out that walking barefoot on the beach is very good for us.

The dream is over

Croatia fought back to overturn a one-goal deficit after Kieran Trippier's freekick gave the Lions the lead in the opening stages

MALAGA. It's not coming home after all. England's World Cup journey came to an end at the semifinal stage in Moscow on Wednesday night as Croatia overturned a one-goal deficit to win in extra time and progress to the final.

Kieran Trippier gifted England

the perfect start, placing his freekick into the top corner in the fifth minute but despite this, confidence didn't flow and a meek strike from Harry Kane in the 30th minute, one-on-one with the goalkeeper, was to be England's only other attempt on target all game.

Gareth Southgate's side, lacking the killer touch, remained in control of the tie, though, this is until Croatia unexpectedly grabbed an equaliser in the 68th minute when Ivan Perisic acrobatically converted Sime Vrsaljko's cross from the right.

This saw nerves starting to set in, perhaps for the first time in the tournament, with communication breaking down in the Lions' backline. Perisic almost made John Stones pay for leaving a looping high ball to unexpected goalkeeper Jordan Pickford when he rattled his shot off the post, with Pickford fortunate that the rebound from Ante

As full time approached, Croatia were much the superior team, with England relying on the pace of substitute Marcus Rashford to manufacture counterattacking opportunities.

Stalemate, however, ensured extra time and England had the first chance of the half - once again through a set piece - when Stones saw his header from the corner cleared off the line by Vrsaljko.

Pickford came to the rescue just before the break when he spread his body well to deny Mario Mandzukic the go-ahead goal as he waited to tap home Perisic's cross.

That same duo combined again as Croatia bagged what proved to be the winner in the 109th minute. Perisic nodded the ball into Mandzukic's path after a poor Kyle Walker clearance, before the Juventus striker nipped in ahead of a shell-

shocked Stones to hook the ball across Pickford into the far corner.

Unlike against Tunisia, a late fight-back never materialised as Croatia used their superior experience to see out the game.

"Remarkably proud"

"At the moment we all feel the pain of defeat," Southgate told reporters following the game. "I don't think realistically we expected to be here. But once you're here and played as well as we did, you want to take those opportunities in life."

The coach, who took the role permanently in November 2016, added: "I'm remarkably proud of the group of players - the reaction of the supporters compared to two years ago shows the country are proud of the way we played."

Prince William, who is also president of the English Football Association, tweeted: "You've had an in-

credible World Cup, made history, and gave us fans something to believe in. We know there is more to come from this England team."

The Costa reacts

England's journey to the semifinals - for the first time since Italia '90 - captured the imagination not only of a nation, but of thousands of football fans resident on the Costa del Sol.

Hundreds took to the bars in the usual Costa hotspots such as second line Puerto Banús, Duquesa port and Bonanza Square. However, Plaza de la Merced and surrounding streets in the city of Malaga were also teeming with supporters, either residents or enjoying their summer holidays, keen to soak up the atmosphere and revel in the greatest achievement of the national team in many of the younger supporters' lifetimes. "The boys did great," said Joseph

Philipson, who works as a translator. "It was a great ride seeing them come so far. The atmosphere in Malaga was amazing with so many turning out in their colours. Hopefully England can go home with a third-place medal."

Daniel Collins, a Science teacher in Benalmádena, added: "Even though we didn't win, it has been a great World Cup. They're a young side and went beyond all expectations to reach the semis. We even won a penalty shoot-out!"

It was not only the English backing the Three Lions. Guido Colantonio joined his English friends in backing the national side in the absence of his nation Italy at the tournament. He said: "It was nice to see England very competitive in the final stages of a major tournament after such a long time."

England face Belgium tomorrow, Saturday, in the third-place playoff match.

Luis Enrique to lead Spain into new era as Fernando Hierro steps aside

Hierro has cut all ties with the national team, turning down a return to the sporting director role he held prior to the World Cup

MALAGA. Luis Enrique has been appointed as Spain head coach, officially beginning the rebuilding process after a disappointing World Cup campaign. The 48-year-old signed an initial two-year contract on Monday to replace Fernando Hierro in the hotseat.

Local man Hierro, who was thrust into the managerial spotlight just two days before the World Cup began following the shock dismissal of Julen Lopetegui, led the team to the knockout stages where they were defeated by hosts Russia.

Despite the challenging circumstances, Hierro told the Spanish football federation (RFEF) that he would be searching for new "professional challenges" having accepted responsibility for Spain's failure and turning down the opportunity to continue with Spain as the federation's sporting director - his position before the World Cup.

"An indisputable leader"

Hierro's replacement in the dugout is Luis Enrique who won two consecutive La Liga titles during his time as manager of Barcelona and made 62 appearances for the na-

tional team as a player

Luis Rubiales, RFEF president, had said that they were looking for an "indisputable leader within the dressing room" and someone who "commanded a hundred per cent respect" - a profile the former Roma and Celta Vigo coach fits.

As he announced Enrique's appointment, Rubiales added: "We have two very intense and important years [ahead of us] and the new coach fits all of the requirements [we were looking for]."

"We didn't approach anyone else, we only spoke to Luis Enrique."

Luis Enrique was not the only appointment made on Monday. José Francisco Molina, formerly of Va-

lencia and Atlético Madrid, has filled the sporting director role, left vacant by Hierro.

He stressed that changing the style was not on the agenda, but "to make small changes". "Just because we haven't done so well in recent times, it doesn't mean we should go back to square one," he said.

The new duo must now revive the team's fortunes. Spain have not progressed to the quarter finals in the last three major tournaments, and are now without star midfielder Andrés Iniesta who has retired from international football.

Luis Enrique will be presented to the media next week, Rubiales confirmed.

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So long, Cristiano!

What will Real next move be? Hand over the mantle to Bale and Asensio, or go out and buy another 'galáctico'?

The key for any great performer is to forget the encore and depart leaving the crowd wanting more. Cristiano Ronaldo bid 'adiós' to Real Madrid after nine incredible seasons at just the right time; everyone is a winner.

Juventus have acquired a world-class talent, Real have pocketed a fair fee and the player can see out his days with a lucrative wage without having to learn Chinese or play alongside American players who'd be in awe of him.

The timing was perfect. Ronaldo dug deep to lead Real Madrid to a record third successive Champions League title. His brilliance in the European competition was largely the reason they succeeded. However his slow start to last season was the reason the club lagged well behind Barcelona in the Spanish Championship.

He leaves a legacy of fifteen major team trophies plus the four Balon D'Ors he won personally. He topped forty goals for each of his last eight seasons. The man was phenomenal and probably still will be in the slightly more considered pace of Serie A. The fee, 100 million euros, is the fifth most expensive transfer of all time and his contract takes him to the age of 37.

It's outrageous to think that a player of his age can move for that amount of money but he breaks every rule. Andrés Iniesta and Wayne Rooney are a similar age and are seeing out their autumn years by taking their talent to emerging markets. Don't be surprised if Ronaldo does that in 2022 and still commands a 50-million-

So what does this mean for Real Madrid? How do they replace their greatest player of all time?

The easy answer is to invest in the next 'galáctico'. Neymar has been making eyes at Florentino Pérez for quite a while now but will he fall for it?

The Brazilian is a marquee name, he will sell shirts but I don't think he'll weigh in with the forty plus goals per season that Ronaldo contributed.

The dream signing would be Kylian Mbappé. He does look to be the next big thing as he's lit up the World Cup. I would imagine that Paris St Germain will resist any approaches as it has taken them a year to finalise the 166-million-euro deal to keep him in France.

This is good news for Gareth Bale. He bid Cristiano a sporting farewell on social media but deep down he must be delighted that the centre of the stage will finally be his. If Ronaldo hadn't departed

then I'm sure that the Bernabéu wouldn't be big enough for the two of them and the Welshman would have been heading back to the Premier League.

Bale is possibly the biggest winner in the whole saga. After a nightmare year with injuries he was beginning to regain his powers at the season's finale, culminating with his match-winning performance in the Champions League final. He was of course left waiting in the wings but with Ronaldo's parting he should be the focus of attention again.

The other player to benefit should be Asensio. He's undoubtedly one of the most outstanding young talents in world football but his appearances were restricted because of the abundance of creative types.

I imagine that Bale and Asensio led the three cheers when Cristiano was saying goodbye, but they'll end abruptly if, or should I say when, Neymar prances through the door.

Malaga get back down to business

First summer signing Badr Boulahroud joined his new teammates as training began on Monday

Youssef En-Nesyri, Michael Santos and Cenk Gönen were the only absentees as the players started double sessions

MALAGA. Having completed medical examinations and physical tests on Friday and Saturday, Malaga's players officially started pre-season preparations on Monday, with new coach Juan Ramón Muñiz there to oversee proceedings at the current training base next to La Rosaleda stadium.

A total of 25 players participated on the first day, including newcomer Badr Boulahroud, a Moroccan midfielder who completed a move from Rabat side FUS Rabat on Friday.

Players took it in turns to take to the field, with sessions including some light running, reflex exercises and some work with the ball, as they readied themselves for some grueling tests ahead of the new season.

The squad present was light in attack with strikers Youssef En-Nesyri and Michael Santos yet to return. En-Nesyri featured at the World Cup for Morocco, while Santos' loan spell at Sporting Gijón was extended to 10 June after the Asturian side reached the La Liga play-offs.

Goalkeeper Cenk Gönen was another absentee. The Turkey international has returned to his home country for a scan to check on his recovery from a shoulder injury suffered midway through last season.

His place was filled this week by youngster Álvaro Fernández.

Double sessions

Following his first meeting with the players, coach Muñiz is certainly putting his new players to the test with 12 sessions in the first week alone. From Monday through until this Sunday, the players have double sessions scheduled every day (at 9am and 7pm) except on Wednesday and Saturday.

Twenty-five players in total were present on the opening day of training: goalkeepers Andrés Prieto, Álvaro Fernández, Kellyan; defenders Roberto Rosales, Cifu, Miguel Torres, Ignasi Miquel, Bakary Koné, Diego González, Luis Hernández, Luis Muñoz, Mikel, Federico Ricca,

Juankar; and midfielders Keko, Álex Mula, Javi Ontiveros, Mehdi Lacen, José Recio, Adrián, Badr Boulahroud, Manuel Iturra, Esteban Rolón, Juanpi and Adnane Tighadouini.

However, it is highly unlikely that these 25 players will be anywhere close to the group that will start the season.

Transfer activity

While there has been progress on the footballing front, talks are still ongoing on several fronts over comings and goings.

Boulahroud's arrival is the only so far but a number of departures, which would free up further space in the squad, are understood to be close to completion.

Defender Bakary Koné, who was on loan at French side Strasbourg last season, has been approached by Turkish side Trabzonspor. The club's president publicly announced his interest in the central defender and negotiations were at an advanced stage until a number of other clubs also expressed an interest.

The aforementioned Gönen is also expected to be out the door shortly with conversations ongoing with a number of interested parties. A positive outcome in his medical tests could be the green light for a move.

Enquiries have also come in for Javi Ontiveros, Youssef En-Nesyri, Michael Santos, Ignasi Miquel and Roberto Rosales, but these have been rejected and moves now seem unlikely

- at this moment in time.

An offer from abroad came in for Ontiveros, but the player himself showed no interest so talks went no further. The same occurred with Michael Santos, who rejected the chance to join Danish side FC Copenhagen.

Leganés' approaches for En-Nesyri and Rosales were rejected outright as Malaga demonstrated a resolve not to 'give away' players on the cheap, especially after En-Nesyri's World Cup cameo added to his value.

One deal which could still be revived, though, is Getafe's bid for Ignasi Miquel. Though an offer was rejected because it didn't reflect the club's valuation, Malaga's interest in Jorge Molina and Dani Pacheco could still mean that a deal is reached.

Badr Boulahroud: "I don't think it will take me long to settle in"

MALAGA. It's taken a while, but Malaga have finally come alive in the transfer market, completing the signing of Moroccan central midfielder Badr Boulahroud on a three-year contract.

Boulahroud signed from Moroccan first division side FUS Rabat on Friday last week, joining his new teammates for the start of the club's pre-season prepara-

tions on Monday.

He was officially unveiled on Tuesday and he took the opportunity to thank the club for the opportunity: "Malaga is a big club with a lot of fans and I want to return the confidence [placed in me]."

The 25-year-old, who has made one appearance for his country's national team, is comfortable in possession and operates primarily

as a holding player, but is versatile. "I can play in any position the coach needs me to," he said, adding: "I don't think it will take a lot of time for me to adapt because

Ruzafa, world champion again

The triathlete was the clear winner in the ITU World Championship

RINCÓN DE LA VICTORIA. He's done it. After finishing second last year in Canada, Rubén Ruzafa, a triathlete from Rincón de la Victoria, has been crowned ITU World Champion for the fourth time.

Ruzafa ran out the clear winner in the competition held on the Danish island of Fionia on Tuesday, seeing off the challenge of New Zealander Sam Osborne, finishing some two minutes ahead. In third place came Frenchman Brice Daubord.

The Spaniard managed to open up the gap in the mountainbiking section, his speciality, before maintaining his rhythm in the third part, recording a time of two hours, six minutes and four seconds. Osborne finished a minute and 47 seconds later, while Daubord finished two minutes and 35 seconds after Ruzafa.

The competition took place on the island of Fionia, the second largest in Denmark, and consisted of a one-kilometre swim from a port, a very demanding 27-kilometre mountain climb by bike divided into two laps, followed by a 10-kilometre run.

Frenchman Maxim Chane was the first out of the water, 30 seconds ahead of Daubord and Osborne and

a minute ahead of a group in which Ruzafa was part.

In the mountainbiking section, however, Ruzafa took the lead before the seventh kilometre and at the crossover to the running section, he had a 1.5-minute lead over Osborne and reigning XTerra champion Bradley Weiss.

With a time of 36.50, victory was assured. After crossing the line, Ruzafa was "very satisfied" with the result, having finished just ten seconds behind the winner last time out.

Joint best in history

With this latest title, the Rincón

triathlete, 33, has become the first professional sportsman to win four ITU world crowns (having also won in 2014, 2015 and 2016).

In addition to his three XTerra world titles (2008, 2013 and 2014), Ruzafa has drawn level with South African Conrad Stolz with four XTerra crowns (2001, 2002, 2007 and 2010) and three ITU wins (2011, 2012 and 2013).

"Conrad retired in 2014 at 41 so I believe there's a lot more time left for me," said Ruzafa.

There's to be no rest, however, as Ruzafa returns to action on Sunday to take part in the XTerra in

the Czech Republic. After that, though, he will take a month-long break before the second half of the season gets under way with the XTerra in Germany on 18 August, which is also the European championship.

After this, Ruzafa expects to compete in the Subaru Triatlón Cross de Calella in Barcelona on 1 September, before the XTerra in Madrid on the 16th.

From then on, the triathlete's attentions will be focused exclusively on the XTerra World Championship to be held in Maui on 28 October.

Nadal to face Djokovic in the Wimbledon semi-finals after seeing off Del Potro

LONDON. Novak Djokovic is the man who stands between Rafael Nadal and a place in the Wimbledon final after two-time champion Nadal won 7-5 6-7 (7-9) 4-6 6-4 6-4 against Juan Martín del Potro on Centre Court on Wednesday.

The Spaniard, who has reached the semis for the first time since 2011, takes on Djokovic later today, Friday, for a place in the final where either Kevin Anderson, who surprisingly overcame Roger Federer in the quarterfinals, or John Isner await.

Spanish hopes rest firmly on Nadal's shoulders after world number three Garbiñe Muguruza unexpectedly crashed out in the round of 64 to Belgian Alison Van Uytvanck last Thursday.



A guitar virtuoso at the age of 11

Blanca Samper, from Marbella, is the youngest person ever to pass the top exam set by Trinity College of London

The music student, who played songs by Iron Maiden and Guns N' Roses in the exam, is a member of the rock band Devils in the Sky, with others aged 9 to 15

MÁLAGA. Beethoven played in concerts when he was seven years old. At that age, Blanca Samper was still spending her time outside school practising rhythmic gymnastics, until summer arrived and her mother heard that a "very good" teacher was offering private guitar lessons. She asked Blanca whether she would be interested, and still laughs today when she remembers her response: "Mummy, why on earth are you

asking me that? It's what I have wanted to do ever since I was little!" That wasn't exactly a long time, but for Blanca it must have seemed like an eternity.

She found no problem swapping her leotard for rock tee-shirts, and the rhythm of her body for that of her guitar. A few days ago the teacher at Trinity College London who came to Marbella to examine students, couldn't hide his surprise when Blanca sat down in front of him with her instrument, aged only 11.

She said she was "very nervous". However, she didn't do badly; in fact, she was excellent. She passed Grade 8 and has become the youngest pupil to reach the highest level at this international school.

"When they told me, I couldn't believe it," she says, although she admits that she finds it easy once

she starts playing. She passed the exam by playing songs for virtuosos of this instrument, like Iron Maiden's 'The Trooper' and especially one which she played with tremendous skill and whose title could be a metaphor for Blanca Samper herself: 'Sweet Child O' Mine', by Guns N' Roses.

The young musician, who studies at the Rock Factory Academy in San Pedro Alcántara, didn't just leave the examiner from Trinity open-mouthed with her guitar skills: she also passed Grade 6 in bass and Grade 3 in drums. This is partly thanks to her private tutor, Rafa Reyes, who after that first summer advised her parents to let her continue with music because she was "a machine". It seems he wasn't wrong.

Future dreams

Reyes is also the creator of Rock Factory, where Blanca continues to train and has met other children with whom she set up a band called Devils in the Sky, all aged between nine and 15. They dream of a future as music professionals, so much so that after making their debut last year and recording their first songs of their own, they will be returning to the stage to perform in concert as part of the Ojeando Festival which takes place in Ojén this weekend.

Blanca will be playing the guitar, alongside vocalists Sara and María, bass player Lluvia, Julia on the keyboards and drummer Sergio. "I love the guitar, but I like to try everything," says this youngster who loves rock music and wants to learn to play the keyboard next.

The family's living room has resembled a rehearsal studio for some time now.

"I'm wondering where we'll put a piano," admits her mother.

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
