Tourism authorities prepare to win back British visitors in London

While a drop in tourist figures this year concerns the industry, an increase in winter flights to Malaga raises optimism

The winter season at Malaga airport began this week with news that the number of flights scheduled between now and March has increased this year by 15%, bringing a possible total of more than seven million people to the region. This, along with reports that fewer hotels are closing for the low season, comes as brighter news as the tourism industry heads

to the World Travel Market in London next week. The main concern for Costa representatives at the three-day international travel fair will be to recover British tourist figures which fell this year after several record-breaking seasons. The Junta de Andalucía has announced a change in strategy while the Costa del Sol has its own exhibition space at the show for the first time. **P2&3**

Malaga airport looks forward to a busy winter with more flights and new destinations

MALAGA. The airport which serves the Costa del Sol is expecting to be extra busy this winter, because from now until the end of March the airlines are offering a total of 7.1 million seats to fly here. This is 15 per cent more than the same period last year, and there will also be 13.7 per cent more flights, with more than 43,000 planes landing and taking off in Malaga during this time.

Malaga airport is the fifth in Spain in terms of plane seats over the winter, according to the Aena airports authority, after Madrid-Barajas, which is offering more than 29.5 million, Barcelona-El Prat with over 23.1 million, Gran Canaria with 7.9 million and Palma de Mallorca with 7.3 million.

A total of 43 airlines are offering direct flights between Malaga and destinations around the world between November and March, and 16 of the 186 routes are new.

These include the Vueling flights connecting Malaga with Algiers and Marseilles, and others which were announced this week by Norwegian, which is the fourth biggest airline in terms of passenger traffic in Malaga.

This company, which will base six of its planes in Malaga this win-

ter, is the one that has most increased the number of flights. It is now offering 45.5 per cent more seats on flights to Malaga, totaling more than 926,000.

Norwegian will be flying to 16

destinations altogether, including its latest addition, Dusseldorf.

Ryanair, which is the leading airline at Malaga airport in terms of volume of passengers, is also expanding its connections from the

Costa del Sol this winter.

The low-cost Irish airline recently announced that it will be flying from Malaga to Luton six times a week, and it has introduced a connection to Oslo and another

Fewer hotels in Malaga are planning to close for the winter

Positive tourism figures in the winter months in recent years have led some hotel owners to take the decision to stay open during the low season instead of closing as normal. This is seen as a clear step forward in the attempt to attract year-round tourism to the region.

The president of the Hotel Owners Association of the Costa del Sol (AEHCOS), Luis Callejón Suñé, announced this week that 46 hotels in the province will be closed from November, five of them to carry out modernisation works which in total will cost 27.1 million euros.

Statistics from the Costa del Sol Tourist Board show that last November 8.4 per cent more people stayed in hotels in Malaga province than during

the same month in 2016, and there were 3.5 per cent more overnight stays. Average income per available room increased by seven per cent. The figures for January were close, but slightly lower.

Last winter 63 hotels in the province closed during the winter months, meaning that 25,500 beds were no longer available. This year it looks as if 22,000 beds will be taken off the market, principally between November and February.

Sources at Aena say the two major markets for Malaga airport are performing strongly at present: Europe, with 152 routes, and elsewhere in Spain, with 29.

However, there will also be more flights to more distant destinations, such as the USA with 41.1 per cent more seats and 37.9 per cent more operations, and Africa, where the airlines have placed 30.4 per cent more seats on sale and programmed 17.2 per cent more operations so far.

Year-around attraction

These important increases are in contrast to the scheduling for last summer, when the airlines increased their connections with Malaga by four per cent. It is a clear indication that the companies can

Tourism authorities head to London armed with strategies to win back British visitors

see the attractions of the destination at other times of year, and not just in the peak season.

The sector is also confident about the future of tourism within Spain, and has increased flights for the domestic market by 10.6 per cent to more than 10,400.

The number of seats on offer for flights within the country has now risen to 1.3 million, which is 10.8 per cent more than last winter.

However, most of the airlines have been focusing their attention on destinations elsewhere in Europe, with 16 per cent more seats and 14.7 per cent more flights.

There are 39.4 per cent more seats available to Sweden, 24.7 per cent more to Germany, 9.8 per cent more to Ireland and eight per cent more to Italy.

The UK continues to be the principal market, however, with a total of 44 routes to British cities, reinforcing its position as the country with the most connections and with 14.6 per cent more capacity.

This will no doubt compensate for the 5.5 per cent reduction which was registered in the numbers of travellers to Malaga from Britain between January and August this year.

The regional Tourism minister said this week that the industry needed to adapt to the changing visitor trends

MALAGA. The regional minister for Tourism, Francisco Javier Fernández, said at a SUR event on Monday that action must be taken to deal with the recent evidence of a fall in British tourist figures in Andalucía.

This year's decrease in holiday-makers visiting the region from the UK, as well as Germany, among other countries, has caused the tourism authorities to adopt a last-minute change in strategy for next week's World Travel Market in London.

At the three-day travel fair, Andalucía and the Costa del Sol will come up against rival destinations around the world in their fight to attract British holidaymakers and convince tour operators to continue sending tourists to southern Spain.

Fernández said that this year's campaign would not just focus on London but would also reach out to places such as Manchester and Birmingham, where the collapse

of Monarch caused a drop in tourists heading for Spain.

The Costa del Sol tourist board, meanwhile, promises a bigger and better presence at the fair this year, having its own exhibition area of around 200 square metres - for the first time.

Its aim, said president Elías Bendodo this week, is to recover the 5.5% fall in British visitors recorded

in the first nine months of this year at Malaga Airport. Bendodo explained that around a hundred business owners will be in London next week under the umbrella of Turismo Costa del Sol with more than 300 professional meetings already set up on the stand.



Man killed in Torremolinos shooting linked to unexploded bomb in Marbella

A 33-year-old man was killed after a masked gunman opened fire in a restaurant in Playamar on Saturday night

MALAGA. A man who was gunned down while having dinner in a restaurant in Torremolinos last Saturday night has been identified.

The victim, who later died after emergency surgery in Carlos Haya hospital, was known to police, having been arrested a month ago in connection with an unexploded bomb found in a litter bin in the Alto de los Monteros area of Marbella. However, just a couple of weeks later, he was out of prison having paid his bail.

The 33-year-old Dutch national of north African descent, was shot at around 9pm on Saturday by an individual who burst into Tiki, a restaurant on the seafront at Playamar, with his face covered and opened fire, letting off seven shots without saying a word.

It was still quite early for a Saturday night and the only customers were the victim and his female companion who were dining at a table, and another foreign couple at the bar.

The waitress was about to serve the couple one of the dishes they had ordered when the incident occurred.

"I hadn't seen the man who fired the shots come in. When I heard the first shot I thought it was a balloon bursting. I didn't think it could be a gunshot, even though it was inside, but when I saw they were gunshots I dropped the plate I was carrying and ran to hide upstairs where we have a storeroom," said the witness.

She added that nearly all of the

employees did the same, while another colleague locked herself in the toilets. "I hid in the storeroom out of survival instinct," she said.

"His face was covered and he pointed [the gun] at everyone in the restaurant. He fired seven shots, but I was so nervous that I

didn't see what he was shooting at," continued the waitress.

Another of the employees who was in the kitchen said he went out with the intention of following the attacker but when he saw how serious the incident was he also hid."

Quick response

The emergency services received numerous calls informing of the shooting and police were quickly deployed to try to intercept the suspects.

After the shooting, the gunman left the restaurant and escaped in a white van parked nearby where an accomplice was waiting. The van, which apparently had its back window missing, left in the direction of the motorway.

Sources close to the case said that police chased the gunman's van but lost sight of it on the motorway.

The emergency services rushed the victim to hospital with gunshot wounds to the head and upper body.

The government says that policing on the Costa del Sol is "sufficient" at present

MALAGA. Despite the surge in violent crime on the Costa del Sol in recent months, the government has no intention of putting a special plan in place, said María Gámez, the central government representative in Malaga.

Just 36 hours after the shooting in Playamar, Gámez insisted that "the resources we have in

place are proportional to the problems we have in the province". She added that the police response to the recent spate of violent crime had been "efficient and forceful" and insisted that, for the moment, no special measures were being considered.

Gámez said that while these recent crimes were "attention-grabbing", overall crime had fallen by

four per cent in the province thanks to the work of the police in bringing down drug trafficking gangs.

Not everyone agrees with the delegate's assessment, however. Provincial head of police union UFP, Susana Corrales, said that police numbers needed to be bolstered: "We are seeing that forces across the province have officer shortages of between 13 and 20 per cent. Obviously, being fully staffed will result in more efficient policing."

Similarly, Guardia Civil union AUGC's Andalucía representative, Javier Torrellas, believes that "a special plan, like the one in place in the Campo de Gibraltar, would give more power to the law enforcement forces in their investigations".

Eighty-two arrested as part of insurance fraud car accident scam

MALAGA. An investigation has led to the arrest of 82 people, a dozen of them minors, accused of being part of a wide-reaching scam to gain money from insurance companies.

National Police investigated 21 suspicious vehicle collisions between 2015 and 2018, many of which involved buses and taxis in Malaga city.

The idea, according to the investigation, was for the scammers to provoke a crash involving as many people as possible, in order to claim compensation.

SUR sources believe that the fraud raised at least 260,000 euros.

Rare Chucky doll, valued at 1,000 euros, returned after theft

MALAGA. A collectable doll, one of only 100 made to coincide with the launch of the Chucky film in 1989, was stolen from a computer repair shop in Malaga last Friday.

However, thanks to CCTV images which caught a man grabbing the doll and giving it to a woman who put it in her bag, as well as a campaign launched by SUR, the doll, valued at 1,000 euros, has been returned.

Its owner, César Gil, explained that the doll was dropped off at a roast chicken shop nextdoor, probably as a result of the CCTV images being shared. "In any case, I'm pleased it's back as it is a collectable and this incident has probably seen it increase in value".





Phone mast to be removed after 18 years of protests and cancer fears

Orange España has repeatedly refused to remove the antenna which neighbours believe has caused cancer-related deaths

TORROX. Residents of the Generación del 27 neighbourhood, situated between El Morche and Torrox Costa, celebrated the news that a telephone mast, which they say has caused "high numbers" of cancer-related deaths, is to be taken down in early November.

Mayor of Torrox, Óscar Medina, announced last week that town hall operatives would be dismantling the mast between 5 and 19 November.

The move follows 18 years of protests by people living in the area, who claim that radiation from the mast has caused the deaths. Neighbourhood spokesperson, David Ruiz, said that residents believe the number is "high" given that only 300 people live in the vicinity of the mast. He added that studies "have never been carried out regarding the level of radiation coming from the aerial and the high mortality rate in the area."

In May 2014 Torrox town hall requested that telephone company, Orange España, remove the mast, which Orange refused to do. The matter went to court and eventually in December 2017 a court in Malaga rejected a last-minute attempt by Orange España to keep the aerial where it is.

Refusal to remove mast

Since then Torrox town hall has been trying to get the company to remove the mast, a move which Orange has refused to act upon. The council has

also asked Orange to identify a new site for the mast as there are concerns that customers will have signal problems along the coast.

As the town hall has been unsuccessful in its attempts to get the company to take down the structure, Medina signed an order for the town hall to dismantle it last week.

The mayor told SUR last week that after 18 years of fighting, "We are going to remove that aerial." David Ruiz said that he was "satisfied" they are finally going to remove it.

Unicaja to pay for work to 16th century convent

The bank, which currently holds the deeds to the building, has applied to the town hall for a licence requesting permission to modernise the 16th century convent so that it complies with health and safety laws to open it to the public. The move comes after campaigning by a citizens' group which is concerned about the future of the convent.

Beach bars east of Marbella under threat of closure as council appeals ruling from Madrid

Coastal protection laws means the land the dozen 'chiringuitos' are on is classified as public and the government won't let their licences be renewed

MARBELLA. A dozen beach bars, or chiringuitos, on the edge of the sand in Marbella are facing an uncertain future after a central government order that their licences cannot be renewed.

The chiringuitos affected are all along the beaches in the eastern part of the municipality, including Alicata, Costabella, Real de Zaragoza, el C, La Víbora, El Realejo and Río Verde.

The government says that the beach bars and restaurants are on public coastal land and so cannot stay there long-term, and blames Marbella town hall for the problem.

Now Marbella council has said it will launch an official complaint to Madrid and try and get the resolution overturned, while the opposition has complained that the ruling PP party on the council has been slow to react, since it found out about the order in August.

Marbella town hall blamed

Two months ago, it was announced that the twelve chiringuitos were now on public land according to protection rules within the 1998 coastal law (Ley de Costas) that the government has been gradually enforcing since 2002. The resolution says that, as Marbella town hall had not registered or claimed ownership of the land the bars are on prior to the law being implemented, then


it has no rights to renew the operating licences for the bar.

At a meeting of the full council last week, the councillor for Beaches, Manuel Cardena, promised to make an official appeal.

The opposition PSOE party criticised the councillor for taking two months to do anything knowing that the popular beach landmarks were now officially under threat.

In reply Cardena said, "We are in this situation as you [PSOE] did nothing, referring to when the PSOE was in power in Marbella up to 14 months ago."

Spokesperson for Izquierda Unida, Manuel Díaz, complained that these are "established" businesses adding that "this subject is being dealt with in the council meeting now when it was urgent in August".

Locals say they are fed up with work on busy street

Improvements to Estepona's Avenida de Andalucía started in May and delays mean the council is now aiming for a Christmas end date.

ESTEPONA. Delays in the resurfacing and landscaping improvement on Estepona's Avenida Andalucía, a key local thoroughfare, are causing misery for locals and forcing shops to close and others to lose money, locals say.

The plan for the avenue that acts as an inner ring road around the old town was divided into two phases. The project started in May with the

first part expected to have been finished in three months and the second part in six months.

However, almost five months on, there is still no sign of the works being close to finished, a problem that was compounded recently with the heavy rains and floods in the town.

Two franchised shops have closed and the Los Arcos bar has stopped trading as well, as the owner didn't want to renew the lease.

Pilar González is a partner in the Fusion hairdressers and is worried that, after investing her savings a year ago in the business, she is going to have to close. She admits that the business is kept going by its regular clients, "but in the summer we were hoping to make a comeback but it all went wrong because

the work should have been finished on 20 August and it's still just the same now". She added that the owner of the shop unit had reduced her rent.

Bar owners estimate a fall in sales of between 50 and 75 per cent and

complain that they see few people working on the site and that the contractor needs more supervision.

The council says that both phases are being carried out simultaneously now and all should be ready "by Christmas".

Estepona's IBI tax down for seventh year

ESTEPONA

:: **C.M.** Residents in Estepona should be benefiting from lower municipal IBI taxes in 2019. It is the seventh year in a row that this local tax for town hall services has been lowered and during this time the average bill has fallen 20 per cent.

This year's reduction is around 3 per cent for the total of 51, 253 properties that get the annual bills. Locals will also continue to benefit from a 3 per cent discount for paying by direct debit.

The council has also said that five million euros will be spent on subsidies for certain groups, for example pensioners and the unemployed will not pay rubbish collection charges. Local courses and activity programmes will also see costs lowered.

Man held over thefts from 17 cars in one night

:: **C.M.** A 31-year-old man of Spanish nationality was held on Tuesday by National Police officers in Estepona in connection with break-ins in 17 different cars on one night.

The thefts all took place on a single night in the car park of a residential community at the junction of Calle Carmen Laforet and Calle Letonia, near Avenida del Mar in Estepona, to the east of the centre of the town.

The alleged thief, who is believed to have spent the whole night on the roof of the same building, broke the windows on the cars to get inside and removed valuable items.

He is also being linked to another theft from inside a car in Calle Faro on 4 October.

App success for rubbish hit squads in Marbella


MARBELLA

:: **M.P.** In its first month of operation, the mobile app 'Marbella Limpia' (Clean Marbella), has received well over 1,000 alerts from local residents who have used this new communication tool to let the town hall know when parts of the resort need cleaning.

The aim is to alert street cleaners immediately to problems. So far an average of 45 messages a day are being received. The number of downloads of the app to date is over 550.

The service runs from 8am to 10pm but the app can be accessed 24 hours. The rapid response team has five vehicles and 20 dedicated staff and users can follow progress in real time.

The council is hoping for 2,000 downloads by the end of the year.

Mijas defends its donkey taxis and says conditions have improved

Animal rights campaigners are calling for an end to the service; the donkey drivers say they are tired of attacks on social media

MIJAS. Mijas town hall's announcement of new regulations to control the conditions of the animals providing Mijas Pueblo's traditional Burro-Taxi service has, far from being praised, revived calls from animal rights activists for an end to the tourist rides.

Manuel and Salvador have been driving the Burro-Taxis in Mijas all their lives, having inherited the job from their parents. When asked about this new controversy they explained how they are tired of the attacks on social media.

"They post photos of obese people on donkeys which weren't even taken in Mijas. The strange thing is we've only ever received one or two complaints to our faces," said the pair. It's clear from social media that the donkey taxis cause indignation among animal rights campaigners, although many of the photos posted are taken in Greece. A few hours

watching the Mijas donkeys reveals that more than 90 per cent of the riders are small children; adults ride in the donkey-pulled carriages.

According to Manuel and Salvador, the donkeys only give three or four rides each a day and the route does not involve steep slopes, although they do walk to and from their stables to the village centre.

The local council, which studied the new regulations with the president of the Malaga law society and

the Refugio del Burrito shelter, has defended the service, which dates back to the early days of tourism in the 1960s.

"We like having this as our symbol and that's why we are taking care of it," said local councillor Nuria Rodríguez. She said that the donkeys' conditions had improved in recent years and that the aim of the new regulations was simply to put on paper what is already being done in practice.

Mayors lead flood aid protests as authorities announce help

Initial central government estimates are that 128 million euros will be needed as it prepares to declare an "emergency zone"

MÁLAGA. Local mayors from inland Malaga province have been leading sit-ins and road blockages this week in protest at what they say is the slow and inadequate response by authorities with aid for the heavy flood damage in the area.

The municipalities of Teba, Campillos and Ardales were especially affected by the record-breaking rainfall last month, with many homes damaged and a lot of infrastructure swept away.

There was widespread disappointment last Friday that the national government, by coincidence holding a cabinet meeting away from Madrid in nearby Seville, did not declare an official emergency zone to release faster funds.

However on Tuesday the Junta de Andalucía regional government

announced emergency funding worth 37 million euros would be available from its funds for districts affected across parts of Malaga, Seville and Cordoba provinces. The regional president, Susana Díaz, also said that she expected the national government to announce an emergency zone this Friday, 2 November.

Despite the announcement by the Junta, the mayors said they would continue protesting. Mayors of Teba and Campillos, Cristóbal Corral and Paco Guerrero, both of the Izquierda Unida party, said it was "insufficient" and that they would continue protesting, including a rally in Madrid on Friday.

"We haven't been through a flood," said the mayor of Campillos, "We've been through a tragedy."

"Political motives"

Susana Díaz urged the mayors this week to stop "pouring oil on the fire" and the national government representative in Andalucía, Alfonso Rodríguez Gómez de Celisro, stressed that help for private individuals affected had been available

since the first day and criticised the mayors for "taking advantage of the catastrophe" to gain votes.

Meanwhile on Wednesday, the national government's representative for Malaga province, María Gámez, said she had received requests for 128 million euros in aid.

Damaged infrastructure

Of the 37.7 million euros aid announced by the regional government for 86 Andalusian municipalities for rain damage, 40 are in Malaga province. The majority will be spent on repairs to infrastructure, including roads, water courses, schools and health centres, while around ten per cent will go to town halls. Funds will come from a mixture of extra, authorised spending plus disaster contingency funds.

Meanwhile discussions have begun for four kilometres of unfinished AVE high-speed rail line to be brought into service as a quick way to replace the damaged normal gauge Seville-Malaga line, which along with other non-high-speed lines in the north of the province, has been out of action since the floods.

Woman dies near Vélez trying to cross a swollen river after Tuesday's rain

An investigation is under way as to why the victim and her husband were crossing on foot after dark in the rural area

VÉLEZ-MÁLAGA. A 50-year-old woman was killed on Tuesday evening in the Vélez-Málaga municipality when she was swept away while trying to cross a swollen stream with her husband.

The tragedy happened at 8.30pm in a rural area towards the village of Arenas known as Haci-

enda Macarena. Her husband called emergency services as soon as the accident but it was too late to save her.

The woman's body was found later the same evening some two kilometres further downstream.

At the time that the woman was swept away, it had stopped raining in the area but the amount of water in the stream was significantly more than usual as almost 72mm of rain had fallen in Vélez-Málaga during the day.

A police investigation is under way as to why the couple were crossing the water on foot after dark. The autopsy confirmed cause of death was drowning

Rain on Wednesday forces cancellation of Halloween events and more water-logged streets

Temperatures are expected to improve to a more seasonal norm across the Costa del Sol and inland over the weekend.

The porpoise has not deserted the Costa del Sol, recent figures reveal

The common porpoise had barely been seen since 2002, but several sightings were recorded recently off Torrequebrada

BENALMÁDENA. The common porpoise, a species that experts believed had disappeared from this part of the Mediterranean, has made a comeback with seven sightings recorded in a recent report.

Scientists at OceanSea, in collaboration with Costasol Cruceros, have reported a total of 651 sightings of cetaceans between November 2015 and September 2018 in the Alboran Sea. These were mainly bottlenose dolphins (542 sightings), common dolphins (79), fin-back whales (12), turtles (7) and striped dolphins (4).

However it was the seven sightings of the porpoise off the coast of Torrequebrada, Benalmádena, that excited experts the most.

The species had barely been seen in the Mediterranean since 2002. "We're talking about a species that has almost disappeared from the

Mediterranean," explained the OceanSea researcher Samantha Blakeman, who revealed the recent figures at the Congress of the Spanish Society of Marine Mammals, held in Bilbao.

For the coordinator of the campaign, Juan Manuel Salazar, the sightings are important for the area, especially as the Alboran Sea is an area of conservation.

Aula del Mar releases recovered sea turtle

A sea turtle, measuring 48 centimetres and weighing seven kilos, was released on Monday after being cared for by Aula del Mar marine animal centre in Malaga. The animal had been found distressed, but without serious injury. After spending a few days in a small observation tank under the watchful eye of marine experts, it was concluded that bits of plastic that the turtle had ingested were causing digestive and buoyancy issues, explained the Aula del Mar.

Town hall hosts meeting to combat gender abuse

An effective network of support for abused women in Benalmádena was promised

BENALMÁDENA. The Mayor of Benalmádena, Víctor Navas, hosted a meeting with representatives of the Democratic Women's Movement (MDM) in Benalmádena last week. The MDM works to raise awareness on issues such as gender-based violence and the group aired various concerns about the growing number of female victims of gender abuse. "We will analyse the measures taken by the different institutions to combat this problem," promised the mayor.

One of the commitments of the meeting was to enhance collaboration between MDM and the municipal Centro de la Mujer in order

to offer an effective network of support to abused women.

The meeting also supported a motion to name some of the town's streets after illustrious women; the first will be Josefina Samper, a historical figure of political activism who died earlier this year.

In a separate initiative, the town hall announced plans for a new grant for projects that promote equality between women and men. The grants are aimed at charity associations and non-profit organisations based in Benalmádena. The town hall is offering up to 20,000 euros for projects that promote equality in education; the prevention and intervention of gender-based violence; and the promotion of women's participation in social, political, economic and sports life.

Proposals for grants must be submitted to the town hall by Thursday 15 November.

Local council pledges to eliminate single-use plastics

BENALMÁDENA. Benalmádena town hall has supported a motion that will reduce and eventually omit the use of harmful petroleum-based plastics. The motion was proposed by members of Podemos and was supported by all parties during last month's plenary meeting.

In order to help combat damage to the environment and marine animals, the town hall has agreed to reduce the use of single-use plastic bottles and packaging in public buildings and at sporting and cultural events. It has also promised to raise consumers' awareness of the negative impact of petroleum-based plastics.

With the initiative, Benalmádena town hall takes on a commitment that adheres to the European Parliament's new proposals for a total ban on single-use plastics.

With the amount of harmful plastic litter in oceans and seas growing ever greater, the European Commission proposed new EU-wide rules to target the ten single-use plastic products most often found on Europe's beaches.

Britons living on the Costa del Sol "will not be affected by Brexit at all"

Spain's foreign minister, Josep Borrell, sent out a calming message while speaking at a conference on energy, security and environmental matters in Malaga last week

MALAGA. With the UK's exit from the European Union fast approaching, Spain's Minister for Foreign Affairs, Josep Borrell, had a message of reassurance for British people resident in Spain, especially on the Costa del Sol, on his visit to Malaga last Friday.

Borrell, speaking at a conference for the Organization for Security and Co-operation in Europe (OSCE) at the Hotel Miramar, insisted that the Brexit process "will not affect [British residents in Spain] at all" and he called for calm.

"We have promised not to allow people to be used as hostages in the negotiations. Spain has made that very clear," he said.

The minister also stressed that this was an issue that worked both ways. "The rights of citizens, whether those Britons who live in Spain or Spaniards who live there,

are a fundamental part of the Brexit negotiations," he said.

He added that those worried by Brexit could "rest assured" that the rights of the "hundreds of thousands of British people in Spain and the tens of thousands of Spaniards in the UK" would be the highest priority.

The meeting in Malaga focussed on discussing a common European policy on energy, security and the environment.

It brought together 170 specialist delegates and 15 ministers and deputy ministers from different European countries.

New law to safeguard UK citizens' health post Brexit

MALAGA. The UK Department of Health and Social Care has published details of the Healthcare (International Arrangements) Bill which the department says on its website, has "been introduced to give the government legal powers to fund and implement healthcare deals after Brexit."

The announcement claims that the Bill "seeks to safeguard healthcare for 190,000 expats and 50 million people who travel abroad every year, through agreements with the EU or member states."

It goes on to explain that the proposed law will establish a legal basis to fund and implement reciprocal healthcare schemes and share necessary data after the UK leaves the EU.

The announcement seeks to reassure British people living in the EU 27 by stating, "For the 190,000 expat state pensioners who have chosen to live in the EU and those intending to retire to the EU, it will

help by safeguarding reciprocal healthcare if there is no EU deal."

Parliamentary Under Secretary of State at the Department of Health, Lord James O'Shaughnessy, said, "This Bill will allow us to implement new healthcare arrangements with other countries - in the EU and elsewhere - so that UK citizens can travel with confidence."

MISPLACED OPTIMISM



Spain's "glass-half-full" economy minister Nadia Calviño is convinced that her government's new budget will be passed, despite it needing support from hostile quarters in congress. Speaking to CNBC this week, Calviño breezily declared, "I don't think it's impossible to find agreement with these political parties." Among these potential allies, though, are Catalan separatist parties - and their backing for the Socialists' 2019 spending plan is unlikely to be forthcoming.

At the end of last week, Spain's Supreme Court finished investigating the cases of eighteen pro-independence Catalan politicians involved in organising last October's illegal referendum. Of these eighteen, nine have been held in custody since the vote and are to be tried on charges of rebellion, for which the maximum prison sentence is thirty years. Other, less serious, charges faced by these men

and women are misuse of public funds and disobedience. The Supreme Court has confirmed that all these politicians will be going on trial, probably early 2019.

The Court's ruling also proves that pro-independence Catalan president Quim Torra's ultimatums to the government have been ignored. For the past couple of months, Torra has been threatening to withhold parliamentary support for Pedro Sánchez's administration - specifically for its proposed 2019 budget - unless it allows Catalan separatists to proceed with secession plans and releases the imprisoned politicians.

One of the separatists behind bars is Oriol Junqueras, former Catalan vice president and president of the pro-independence Republican Left of Catalonia (ERC). A couple of weeks ago, Junqueras received a visit from Podemos leader Pablo Iglesias, whose party has made a budgetary pact with Sánchez's Socialists.

Iglesias was told by Junqueras that the ERC will only start cooperating with the government on fiscal issues if Sánchez takes "categorical" action on behalf of imprisoned separatists.

The PSOE leader, though, has repeatedly made it clear that he will not interfere in judicial proceedings against Catalan secessionists. Accordingly, the only "categorical" action that's been taken since the Iglesias-Junqueras meeting has been the Supreme Court's decision to put eighteen prominent independents on trial. One wonders, then, why Calviño is so sure that her government's budget will pass the parliamentary vote this month, in part buoyed up by support from Catalan separatists. Misplaced optimism, surely?

Yet there was another reminder this week that, macroeconomically speaking, Spain is indifferent to the Catalonia problem. During the third quarter of this year - which spanned the first three months of Sánchez's hamstrung minority administration - the country's GDP expanded by 0.6%, three times more than the eurozone average. Spain's overall expansion for this year is predicted to be 2.6% - down from the last three years but still a healthy growth. As Sánchez tries to secure Catalan parties' approval for his 2019 budget, Spain's GDP appears to be more than capable of taking care of itself.

Locally based Unicaja Bank makes 142 million in first nine months of 2018

first nine months of last year.

The drivers behind the rise, according to the company, were an increase in interest income - 4.6 per cent (20 million euros); a drop in operating expenditure of 2.5%; and a reduction in the need to make special provisions.

The Malaga-based group also highlighted other achievements in its announcement: an improvement in solvency levels; reduction in non-productive assets; an increase in new loan business; and, above all, an increase in customer deposits.

HEIR TO THRONE'S DEBUT SPEECH AT EVENT FOR CONSTITUTION

The Princess of Asturias, heir to the Spanish throne, spoke in public at an official event for the first time on Wednesday. Princess Leonor, eldest daughter of Felipe VI, was celebrating her thirteenth birthday and the king and queen have been slowly increasing her public profile in recent months. The princess's birthday coincided with the fortieth anniversary of parliamentary ratification, ahead of a referendum, of Spain's post-Franco constitution and she read a part of it out loud during the commemorative event.



Confusion after minister's Vatican meeting over moving Franco's body

A papal press statement has hurriedly had to clarify that no agreement has been reached with Madrid about the dictator's remains

MADRID. The deputy prime minister's meeting with the Pope's second in command turned into an embarrassing diplomatic faux pas for Madrid this week after the Vatican was forced to issue a press statement correcting what the minister said had been discussed.

Carmen Calvo was at the Vatican on Monday to talk about several issues, including taxation of Church property in Spain. But near the top of the list was a discussion on where the Church stood on the planned exhumation of the remains of dictator General Franco from his ceremonial resting place at the Valley of the Fallen Civil War monument.

If the removal goes ahead, Franco's grandchildren have said they want a burial in the public crypt of Madrid's Almudena Cathedral,

where there is a family tomb.

Faced with the likelihood that this could turn Franco's grave into even more of a tourist attraction and place of right-wing pilgrimage than now, the government has been searching for a way out of granting the Franco family what is apparently their legal right.

After the Vatican meeting with Pietro Parolin, Carmen Calvo said

that they had jointly agreed a way out that wouldn't involve the cathedral crypt.

But a rare rebuke from the Vatican in a statement said that the pair had only discussed that the government's engagement with the Franco family was a sound approach.

The Catholic Church in Spain has previously also expressed its wish to keep out of the controversy.

Puigdemont launches Republican Council

BARCELONA

:: C. REINO. The self-exiled former separatist leader of Catalonia has set up a "Republican Council" based in Brussels. The new body, which is more symbolic than real, is not part of the Catalan regional gov-

ernment but has its support, and is not funded with public money.

The council will be led from Belgium by Carles Puigdemont, who headed the Catalan government before fleeing to avoid arrest on Spain's charges of rebellion, and it will initially be charged with furthering the cause of the Catalan independence movement internationally.

Let's see who can explain to the Constitutional Court that once the first months of a baby's life have passed, when a mother has recovered from the birth, both parents can look after their child equally well.

And that not giving them equal leave is discrimination.

Malaga magistrate María Luisa Balaguer, who voted against the recent ruling that maternity and paternity could not be equal, had tried to get her colleagues to undersand this, but apparently without much success.

Balaguer says that the TC's decision ignores the evolution of society and perpetuates the discrimination against women in the workplace, as with leave of different lengths they are still less attractive

to employers. Some traditions are still very powerful.

I'm a big fan of the expression "working dad" and I've never un-

derstood why these concepts are never mixed in our everyday language, while it's normal to say "working mum". The latter sums

up in just two words that being a parent and having a job is only a problem for women. They can work outside the home, but looking after the family is still their department.

It's true that it would be reasonable for the government to take the decision to make maternity and paternity leave periods equal. In just a few years we have come a long way, from just three days for new dads to the present five weeks. However the Constitutional Court has let pass a golden opportunity to encourage the government to get a move on. The discrimination is not just because women interrupt their professional careers to be mothers for longer than the birth, but because sharing the bringing-up of a child is a duty and a right of

all parents. Of course when a company has to choose between a man and a woman, of new parent age, they will employ the man.

Dads should have a longer paternity leave to strengthen their links with the child, to be able to enjoy fatherhood and, as a friend once told me, to be left "holding the baby" as that's the only way to learn.

And on top of all this the court made its ruling allegedly to protect the health of the mothers. Well don't worry. Recovering from a normal birth does not require years off work. And as children don't come with an instruction book, the best way of learning how to be a parent is to practise.

This comes as a blow to anyone hoping to seek real equality between men and women.

Spain still speaks 'Spanglish'

The level of English in this country is still mediocre and in a recent test it scored lower marks than last year

Some experts believe the problem lies in the education system, because teachers are not properly trained

It's a classic. The years pass, trends pass, governments pass, trainers of Real Madrid pass, and Spain never manages to shake off the reputation it has had since time immemorial of a country whose inhabitants have a medium-low proficiency in English.

This has been highlighted by the EF EPI report 2018, which has just been published: it gives the results of the EF Education First test, which evaluates the level of English among adults and classifies non-English-speaking countries in accordance with the results obtained in the test.

The result this year is that Spain has passed, but only just. In fact, the study has shown that not only has Spain not improved its knowledge of English, it has gone backwards; and in two aspects, as well.

In the first instance, on a scale of 0 to 100, it obtained an average mark of 55.85, slightly lower than a year ago (56.06) and even worse than in 2016 (56.66) and 2015 (56.8).

It has also dropped down the international ranking based on the same index. In terms of knowledge of English, Spain occupies 23rd place out of 32 European countries, ahead of only Italy, France, Belarus, Russia, Ukraine, Georgia, Albania, Turkey and Azerbaijan. Globally, Spain is 32nd out of 88 nations, having dropped four places compared with last year and nine compared with 2015.

It seems unlikely that there are fewer inhabitants with a knowledge of English than a few years ago, so the data suggests that the number of people who took part in the study in this country is probably lower. In fact, the report says that worldwide, for the first time, more people aged be-

tween 26 and 30 speak English than those between 21 and 25.

It is also the case that this year's test, carried out to internationally approved standards among 1.3 million individuals worldwide, included 30 per cent more participants compared with last year and 13 new countries have been evaluated, explained EF Education First, the international language teaching company which carried out the study.

"They can't speak it"

The results have "unfortunately" come as no surprise to Ana María Fraile, director of the English Language Department at Salamanca University.

"In our experience, when first year students who want to specialise in this subject come here they are supposed to have a certain level of English and a certain knowledge, but they tell us that at school the classes were very rarely taught in English and they hardly ever spoke it. They just did written exercises, which were very repetitive, to learn the grammar. They

points were awarded to Sweden, which tops the worldwide list of English proficiency among non-English-speaking countries with a 'very high' level. come here and they can't speak the language. In fact, their written level is pretty poor as well," she says.

Ana María says it seems that "the system and the teaching methodology is failing", even in schools which in theory provide bilingual tuition.

"There seems to be a similar situation with bilingual schools. Either we have devalued the meaning of the word 'bilingual' or there are hardly any schools which merit that description. Bilingual means you are equally at home in your native language and another one," she says.

She believes the root of the problem lies in the education system in Spain. "We don't have enough fully trained teaching staff, so they are not teaching English properly. Some of the teachers can't even express themselves well in the language," she says.

Around 650 students a year study for a degree at Salamanca University, with moderate success. "Quite a few have to repeat the course, unfortunately," explains

Ana María. "They have to leave here with a C1 level, which shows a flexible, effective and spontaneous use of the language, and they don't all reach that level".

Everything she says is cause for thought. "In a situation where speaking English is key to being competitive, our average score, which is the worst in three years, shows a real loss of opportunities for the Spanish population," says Xavier Martí, the director of EF Education First in Spain.

"Although the level in Spain is above the world average, which is 53.34, for a European country it is very low and the results show that the level of English has dropped in the past few years," he says.

On this occasion his company evaluated more than 76,000 Spanish people through an online reading and oral comprehension test. The report, which is "used as a reference document by most governments in the world", does not analyse how many people among the whole of the Spanish population have some knowledge of English.

Navarra, top of the class

To improve the scores in forthcoming tests, Ana María Fraile says it is essential that the teaching methods used from infant school upwards need to be reconsidered, and teachers should be properly trained. She also believes the ability of teachers in bilingual schools should be carefully monitored. She applauds the efforts of some universities for introducing courses which are also available in the English language, "not only for our own students but also to attract others from abroad".

However, not every area of Spain just scrapes through. Four regions passed with better marks and reached the "high aptitude" level in English proficiency this year.

Navarra topped the list with 58.17 points, followed by Madrid (57.94), the Basque Country (57.88) and Asturias (57.75). La Rioja (51.87) and Extremadura (51.29 puntos) came bottom of the list.

In terms of cities, Barcelona and Madrid scored higher than any others, with more than 58 puntos. Bilbao, in second place last year, has now dropped to fourth.

Custody without bail for Catalan independence MPs

Carles Puigdemont fled to Brussels with five other supporters and fresh elections were called

On Thursday 2 November 2017, prosecutors in Madrid called for former senior members of the Catalan regional government to be denied bail and held in jail following the attempted declaration of independence on 27 October when MPs voted to create a "Catalan republic as an independent and sovereign state".

Judge Carmen Lamela agreed, saying that there was a high risk of another crime being committed and evidence destroyed while investigations continue into their role

in the unilateral declaration of independence vote (UDI) in the Catalan parliament and the events leading up to it.

Of the regional leaders who were called to appear in Madrid's central Audiencia Nacional court on Thursday, only nine made the journey to the capital.

Eight of the attendees, including ex-vice president, Oriol Junqueras, were refused bail and faced possible charges of sedition, rebellion and misuse of public funds.

Only one who attended the court session, the former Business minister Santi Vila, was allowed free if he deposited 50,000 euros in bail. Vila had re-

signed his post in the Catalan regional government in protest at the planned UDI just ahead of the vote.

All the regional ministers, known as 'consellers', and former president Carles Puigdemont, were removed from their posts on 28 October, the day after the declaration, with the application of Article 155 of the Spanish constitution that imposed elements of direct rule from Madrid. Five of the former top regional government team were absent from the court session on 2 November having fled to Belgium, including Puigdemont himself.

At the time they claimed they had gone to the Belgian capital to seek legal advice and try to have their court appearance handled by video link, a move which the court refused.

Prosecutors also asked the judge to sign an international warrant for their arrest, which was issued.

Meanwhile, in Madrid, the Supreme Court heard from lawyers of the rebel speaker of the Catalan parliament, Carme Forcadell, and five regional MPs who at the time controlled the parliamentary agenda. They were summoned on suspicion of the same offences as the leaders.

Having dismissed the rebel Catalanian MPs, the then president of Spain, Mariano Rajoy, announced that there would be regional elec-

tions on 21 December.

In the event, while no party gained an absolute majority, between them the independence parties gained enough seats to govern, showing that there were still strong pro-independence feelings in the autonomous region.

Carles Puigdemont remains in Belgium where last Saturday, 27 October, he announced that he has launched a new party, Crida Nacional (National Call).

When I had my first child, I decided to breastfeed him, and when he was weaned, my breasts were flaccid and empty. I did not like how they looked, and as I'm still young, I decided to undergo a breast augmentation surgery, in order to fill them out, and make them firmer. However, the result of

the surgery was not as expected, and now one of the breasts has "dimples". In the clinic I have been told that they can repeat the surgery within a few months to try to fix it, but I do not trust this doctor any more. Could I ask for compensation instead of a new surgery? This way, I could go to a different clinic that offers a sufficient guarantee. Is that possible?

In order to answer your question, it is necessary to know if the cause of the "dimples" has been due to malpractice or not, in order to report the issue at the criminal courts if that had been the case. Likewise, and even if the surgery had been done correctly, it would be advisable to know if you were conveniently informed about the risks you took when undergoing the surgery. If you were not informed that the result of the surgery might not be as expected, this

argument could be used in a possible negotiation with the clinic, or if you need to go to court.

My car has had a breakdown, and when going to the repair shop to ask for an estimate, I was told that I have to pay for an estimate, in case I don't decide to get the repair done there. Is it legal that they charge if they have not carried out any works?

According to the law, it would indeed be legal that they charge for the estimate. You have to take into account that the repair shop does actually do work, even if it is not a repair, as in most cases the mechanic has to invest time to dismantle the car in order to find out the cause of the breakdown. This amount will not be charged (or will be discounted) if you finally decided to have the repair done there.

GARDENING

American wintergreen

Pretty white or pink bell-shaped flowers in summer and scarlet berries and purplish foliage in winter

The genus Gaultheria is a member of the Ericaceae (heather) family and has pendulous, white or pink bell-shaped flowers and aromatic, glossy green leaves. In the autumn, large red, pink or white (depending on species) fruits form. Common names include eastern teaberry, creeping wintergreen, boxberry, American wintergreen, chick-

enberry and mountain tea among many others.

It is native to America, from Newfoundland to Manitoba and south to Georgia, where it is found growing in woodland clearings or in the shade of mountain laurels and rhododendrons. Gaultheria pro-

cumbens is a low growing species often used for ground cover. Its branches spread out around the plant just a few centimetres off the ground. The upright stems bear clusters of small oval, glossy leaves which are a paler tone underneath. The dainty nodding flowers appear from early summer and are followed by striking red berries which may stay on the plant the entire year making it possible for a display of berries and flowers at the same time. The leaves of this species have the added advantage of turning purple and red in the autumn.

Although Wintergreen will grow slowly and remain fairly compact, it will benefit from being cut back into the old wood every second year to rejuvenate growth.

Some members of the heather family will grow in open, exposed areas but Gaultheria prefers a shady, sheltered spot with no direct sunlight. The soil needs to be fairly acidic and although it will grow in neutral soils it dislikes lime. It is not drought tolerant and needs to be irrigated regularly in summer and occasionally in dry winters.

Wintergreen was once used as a minty flavouring for toothpastes and chewing gum. The leaves contain methyl salicylate, a compound with similar properties to aspirin (acetylsalicylic acid). Traditionally a tea was made from the leaves to help ease headaches or fevers but it can be dangerous for children, the elderly, pregnant women or anyone allergic to aspirin. The berries are also edible and can be cooked in cakes or used to make ice-cream or wine.

GARDENING HINTS FOR NOVEMBER

Pamper houseplants

Winter is suddenly here and houseplants could do with a little pampering to help them stay healthy and rest, ready for a vigorous new start in spring.

With daylight hours reduced, growth slows down and therefore plants need less watering; some plants can be left until the soil has dried out completely before remoistening.

Houseplants need to be moved into a spot with as much daylight as possible but away from draughts and radiators.

Keep the leaves clean as a buildup of dust will restrict the amount of light getting through to the surface and remove any dead or dying leaves as soon as they appear to prevent diseases developing.

Family Law and cross-border relationships

The number of "international" families is increasing each year. Whether it is because one of the parents is working abroad, separated or divorced from the other parent or for educational and social reasons it has become common to have an international family who require an international agreement for custody, visits and maintenance for families.

Fortunately in this area a number of legislative improvements have been brought in over recent years specifically to deal with these situations. Apart from a number of Conventions and Treaties at international level within the European Union there are extensive regulations that apply across member states. There are some other countries that also have bilateral agreements on family cases.

For families and couples who do not live in the same country, and in some cases do not share a nationality or applicable law at the time of a family breakdown, there are structures in place to deal with the new situation. In divorce proceedings it is

important to know which Courts are competent to hear the case. Where there are children involved it is also important to know which court should deal with issues such as maintenance. Establishing which court is competent to hear the matter means that the couple can be guided on what rules and laws will govern the financial split and the liquidation of the matrimonial regime. There is a difference between the procedural rules governing which court is competent to hear the case and the law that will be applied in court. For example an English couple with a number of different assets and properties might be able to divorce before the Spanish court but the financial split between them might be governed by English law. Most countries within Europe will apply their own national law to matters related to children.

It is very important that this is considered before taking any steps to go to court as some things, such as pension rights, might be much more difficult to deal with in one jurisdiction than another. Whilst you cannot



undertake "forum shopping" choosing the country that you think would be most advantageous, do take advice, particularly where an order to share a pension might be available in some countries but almost impossible to obtain in others. Surprisingly enough we have dealt with cases where each of the divorcing couple has gone to a different court, one in England and one in Spain. At the moment within Europe it is quite simply a case of first come first served.

A court who sees evidence that a previous claim has been made in another European country should immediately cease its proceedings. This rush to court may well come to an end Post-Brexit if no agreement is reached. The courts would then have to decide which country is the most appropriate to deal with the case.

With parent and child relationships a key factor in coming to agreement is that you must not take a child out of the country of habitual residence without the consent of the other parent. The country of habitual residence of a child is the place where they have established their home, educational and social life. For very young children this is acquired quite quickly after birth. The overriding legislation is the Hague Convention of 25.10.1980 dealing with Child Abduction. The procedure is an accelerated one and each country has a Central authority appointed.

While this legislation will protect the child and return the child to the country of habitual residence it is clearly in

the best interests of the child to come to an agreement beforehand rather than dealing with the courts with the attendant stress.

If the parents cannot agree a Judge may have to decide if a parent can leave with a judicial order from the court. This can be obtained if it is clearly in the best interests of the child. However, as soon as a move is considered it is best to discuss amicably and well in advance offering effective visits and communications.

Finally one thing that is often forgotten is that an order granted in say Britain or Holland, but dealing with assets such as property in Spain, needs to be properly drafted to allow it to be effectively enforced. At the risk of repeating ourselves yet again obtain the advice should be sought before the order is drafted to ensure you can divide, transfer or receive assets in Spain without paying unnecessary taxes and costs.

Duck bao

'Bao' is literally to 'enfold' and bao bread is Asian in origin. It is steamed with Peking style laquered duck, spring onions, pickled gherkins, hoisin sauce and aromatic herbs. For four people.

Peking style duck INGREDIENTS

- 1 Peking style duck.
- 1 litre hoisin sauce.
- 600g molasses

METHOD

Preheat the oven to 180°. Remove the internal organs from the duck; using a blow torch, pass the flame over the body to burn off any remaining feathers. In a bowl mix together the hoisin sauce and the molasses. Place the duck in a heat proof, shallow dish and baste generously with the hoisin / molasses mix. Roast in the hot oven for 20 minutes and then remove and baste again. Do this three more times after which the skin should be crispy. Remove from the oven and leave to cool. Chop the flesh very finely.



INGREDIENTS TO FINISH

- 4 bao bread rolls.
- 400g chopped duck.
- 80g hoisin sauce.
- 30g spring onions.
- 30g pickled gherkins.
- 10g fresh mint.
- 10g fresh coriander.

Steam the bao rolls for approximately two to three minutes in a steam oven or alternatively cook them in a microwave for 30-50 seconds.

PLATING UP

Cut the steamed bao rolls open and fill with finely chopped duck, spring onion and pickled gherkin cut into julienne strips. Moisten with a little hoisin sauce and sprinkle with the aromatic herbs.

OUR LOCAL WINE REGION



We on the Coast are very lucky to have Ronda as our nearest wine-growing area. The phylloxera bug wiped out the Malaga vineyards in 1878, and it was not until the arrival of outsiders like Alfonso von Hohenlohe and Frederic Schatz 30 years ago that vineyards started to flourish again in the Sierra.

Hohenlohe's bodega still exists but is unrecognisable, as is the wine it makes. Schatz's organic varieties are widely acclaimed. Currently there are many bodegas in the Ronda area making excellent varieties, officially classified as the Serrania de Ronda within the all-embracing official title of DO Sierras de Málaga.

Brought up, as most of us are, on Rioja and Ribera del Duero styles, we often erroneously compare Ronda, and indeed other areas' wines, with these Spanish references.

The problem for the wineries

has been to get Andalusian bars and restaurants to acknowledge their existence. The standard response, when asking your favourite local restaurant why there were no Ronda varieties featured on their list, was a standard "They are too expensive".

This may have been vaguely associated with reality ten or 15 years ago, but an effective price freeze over a decade has brought them into line with any other region's levels.

Of the better Ronda wines – and really it is hard to find a bad one – Chinchilla's two impressive reds from the Doña Felisa bodega are among the best. Chloe Chardonnay, the first white wine to be made in the area, is surprisingly good at around ten euros. The five reds range from eight euros for the most acceptable Encaste 2017, and 13 euros for the excellent Seis + Seis 2013 (see Wine of the Week below).

WINE OF THE WEEK

Chinchilla Doble Doce 2013

From the above-mentioned Doña Felisa bodega in Ronda, this blend of Merlot and Cabernet Sauvignon has 15 months barrelage in French oak. It won a gold medal in Paris recently as the best Cabernet Sauvignon in the World. Around 19 euros.

Easy puddings in a glass

Easy to prepare, versatile and delicious. Nearly all favourite cake recipes can be adapted to this format

Working with just three basic elements -bases, custards and toppings- the only limit is the imagination

MÁLAGA. Imagine you have just organised a get-together for friends at your home, or have offered to prepare your famous tiramisu for a party with 50 guests. In situations like these, puddings in a glass

are ideal. Easy to assemble, store and serve, there are endless combinations and you can even provide a dessert buffet by using different ingredients. So, let's look at some ideas for delicious puds in a glass.

There are basically three elements: base, cream or custard, and topping. Contrast is also important. The more you play with colours which will be seen through the glass, the more attractive your desserts will be, and the combination of creamy, juicy and crunchy

textures will make them more interesting to eat. But let's do this a step at a time:

1. The bases

The base goes in the bottom of the glass, and it needs to be something that will enhance the flavour of the cream or custard and harmonise with its texture.

If, for example, you want to offer a version of a classic strawberry and cream sponge cake, instead of making the cake you can buy sponge fingers and pour a light syrup over them. For the syrup you need 100ml of water and 100g of white sugar.

Put them in a pan and heat them until the sugar has dissolved. You can add lemon juice or a few drops of your favourite liqueur etc, to add to the taste, if you like.

Then put the sponge fingers into the glass, level them off and add the syrup with a basting spoon.

Then, for your strawberry cake, add whipped cream and sliced fresh strawberries. You can use more than one layer if you like, but it must always look attractive from the outside.

Other options can also be used for bases, for example digestive biscuits for cheesecakes or lemon pie in a glass.

For this, you'll need 80g of butter, 10 digestive biscuits and a pinch of salt. Crush the biscuits into quite large crumbs, add the melted butter and salt and use your fingertips to ensure that the butter mixes

properly with the biscuit crumbs. This will help to keep them crisp once the cream has been added.

'Tortas de aceite', almond cake or even pastry can also be used as a base for these puddings, but if you want them to stay crisp it is best to add them at the end in the form of a topping instead.

2. Creams and custards

This is where imagination and time come into it.

If you're short of time you can improvise and make some very good fillings with bought custard, for example. Like this 'Baileys tart' glass:

For six people, use sponge fingers for the base, and pour neat Baileys over them. For the filling, use 300g of bought custard, 200g of caramel and one sachet of instant coffee diluted in 20ml of whisky.

In a bowl, stir the custard ingredients until they're well mixed, and then use a piping bag to place the filling on the bases.

Finally, put whipped cream on the top and sprinkle chocolate-covered coffee grains over as a topping.

If you want to make a chocolate cake in a glass, you can use butter-free chocolate mousse as the fill-

ing: melt 150g of dark chocolate, and when it has cooled to room temperature mix in four beaten egg yolks. Separately, whisk the four egg whites until very stiff, and then fold them into the chocolate mixture, using a spatula and

gentle upward movements.

To assemble the dessert, put chocolate sponge soaked in a few drops of Cointreau in the bottom of the glass, then spread a spoonful of apricot jam on top.

Add the semi-bitter mousse, and

finally whipped cream topped with a hot chocolate sauce.

The sauce is made by heating 20cl of single cream with 10cl of milk, and melting 150g of dark chocolate chips in it.

Stir until well mixed, and keep until needed. You can add a sprinkling of toasted almonds on top of the sauce, if required.

White chocolate yoghurt is also a very versatile custard for desserts in a glass. For this, you need 200g of whipping cream, 125ml of Greek yoghurt, 200g of white chocolate and two spoons of icing sugar.

Whip the cream. Melt the chocolate in a bain marie, and mix it with the Greek yoghurt. Next, stir the two creams together.

If you want a filling with a thicker, more cheese-like texture, you can

mix 200g of whipped cream, 150g of sugar and 200g of cream cheese.

Both of these fillings combine very well with fruits and any type of jam.

3. Toppings

Look for crispy items, anything from pieces of chocolate or nuts to more unusual and entertaining elements like popping candy.

Myths and truths about flu and the common cold

Colds and flu can be prevented by taking certain precautionary measures, but there is a great deal of 'fake news' about avoiding and treating them which is unsupported by scientific evidence and can cause far more harm than good

Autumn arrives, and then comes the cold weather. It is a time of year when colds and flu are unwelcome but regular visitors. There are a great many myths about how to avoid them: contrary to common belief, keeping well wrapped-up and never going barefoot at home will be no use at all unless we take other, really effective, measures. In fact, catching a virus has nothing whatsoever to do with what we wear or whether we are outside in bad weather.

So if colds and flu are unrelated to the weather, why do so many people suffer from them at this time of year?

Well, there is a correlation, but

not the one that many people think. Yes, it is a fact that most colds occur in the autumn and winter; that is due to a combination of factors, such as people spending more time together at home and in enclosed spaces such as offices and schools, and that increases the risk of exposure to viruses. In some climates the combination of cold weather and low humidity means nasal passages dry up, and that makes them more susceptible to cold viruses.

The question to which everyone wants an answer is, how can we prevent colds and flu? Experts recommend washing our hands carefully and regularly, not rub-

bing our eyes, covering our mouths with our forearm when we cough, using disposable handkerchiefs and not sharing food, glasses or cutlery. It sounds simple, but it is effective. Weighing ourselves down with heavy coats, scarves, hats and gloves, on the other hand, isn't.

Something else to bear in mind is that a cold is not the same as flu. They are two different illnesses even though they have similar symptoms. It is important to know how to tell the difference, because in certain people flu complications can be fatal, such as the elderly and patients with pulmonary and cardiac problems.

A high temperature, cough, muscular pain and headaches are usually associated with flu (and are rare with a cold), while sneezing, nasal secretion and sore throats are signs of a cold and do not, or very rarely, occur with flu. They are two completely different viruses.

It is essential to take note of that, because a whole network of urban myths has developed about the 'world' of colds and flu, even

though they bear little or no relationship to the findings of scientific studies.

A classic example of a myth is the one about vitamin C, which for decades has been said to have properties which improve the immune system and help its defence against colds and flu.

Despite this or any other supposed anti-viral properties, no scientific tests have ever supported the theory. There is therefore no

need for us to stuff ourselves with vitamin C if we come into contact with a virus, and if we don't wash our hands properly we will end up transferring it to our eyes anyway.

We will also catch the virus if we don't keep at a cautious distance from someone who already has it, because it is mainly transmitted through the air.

In fact, not even a strong immune system is a guarantee: a healthy adult can easily suffer from two to four colds a year, and children can have twice as many.

The case of the common cold is similar: it can be the result of over 200 different viruses which cause inflammation of the membranes which cover the nose and throat. Among all these, the principal ones are the rhinovirus, adenovirus and coronavirus. Our bodies are incapable of developing all the defences they would need to battle them all.

As well as the recommendations above for preventing flu, there is scientific evidence that the flu vaccine is a preventive measure which has proven its effectiveness in groups with the risk of greater complications. GPs will already have recommended a flu jab to patients who belong to one of the risk groups. The campaign has already begun in Andalucía and patients only have to go to their

health centre to be given the vaccine. Remember that nowadays it is not only suitable for pregnant women, but is also recommended for them because they are part of a risk group and it is totally safe in this sub-group. It is also one of the safest vaccines, with the lowest side effects, and can never cause flu because it contains unactivated virus.

Children, elderly people and others in a risk group should have the flu jab every year. The risk groups include people over 65, those who live in residential or nursing homes, pregnant women and individuals with chronic medical problems.

Looking at another aspect of flu

or the common cold, what should we do if we catch them? Let's start with what we shouldn't do. There are many 'alternative' remedies, including medicinal plants and other treatments, which are used to alleviate the symptoms. People believe that ginger and propolis can help them to feel better because of their analgesic properties, although there is no scientific evidence for this, and it is probable that any improvement which occurs in these people is the natural evolution of the illness.

Garlic and onion have also been used as remedies for flu processes, to prevent them as well as relieving their symptoms; some see them as two 'powerful

➤ antidotes' which are capable of battling different respiratory afflictions. However, once again, no clinical tests have supported these beliefs. Putting a raw onion in a room so you don't get flu is just one more myth. All it does is 'perfume' the room with the rather unpleasant odour of the vegetable.

If you don't want to catch flu, it is important to avoid contact with people who have it, and wash your hands regularly and thoroughly.

With regard to echinacea, some studies indicate that it may slightly relieve the symptoms of the common cold in adults, but has no proven effects on prevention or improving the body's defences.

It also interferes with other treatments which affect the liver: paracetamol, cortisone, immune suppressants, anti-tumoral drugs...

For that reason, these 'remedies' can even be harmful. Not only do they not cure the flu or cold, but could be contraindicated if someone suffers from another chronic health problem.

Treating flus and cold with antibiotics is also a big mistake. Flu is an illness which is frequently uncomplicated and self-limiting and its treatment is purely associated with symptom relief: staying hydrated, relative rest and the use

of thermal analgesics like paracetamol or non-steroid anti-inflammatories should be sufficient.

Because flu is caused by a virus, antibiotics are no use because they only work against bacterial infec-

tions. Doctors will only prescribe anti-viral drugs for patients at risk.

Abusing antibiotics doesn't help people to get better faster, as many believe, and it can have an adverse effect. The indiscriminate use of

antibiotics makes the bacteria more resistant to them (which means that if that person needs them in the future they won't work).

Because of all this, as always, it is preferable to be aware of such types of 'fake news', and stick to treatments which are supported by clinical tests.

If the high temperature persists and antipyretics have no effect, it is important to consult your GP to see whether you need a different treatment.

The OCU consumers association warns of another false belief about treatment of colds and flu: "We think we have to make sure we drink enough liquids, but the traditional advice of 'drink lots of liquid' when you have a cold or flu isn't proven scientifically. People should also bear in mind that the water our body needs doesn't only come from the liquids we drink but also the foods we eat," says the organisation, adding, "It is true that the sweating associated with a high temperature (a common symptom of flu) can contribute to dehydration to a certain degree, but that makes us feel thirsty, the best and most unmistakable sign that our body needs us to drink water. It is sensible to be very careful with children and elderly people in this respect, however, be-

cause they don't always show the signs so clearly".

Stop smoking

Smoking is one of the worst lifestyle habits as far as health is concerned. As well as being the cause of serious illnesses such as different types of cancer and cardiovascular problems, it is also an enemy when combating less important illnesses like flu and colds, and not just because it produces a change in the immune system.

Studies show that smokers, especially the most inveterate ones, have a higher risk of getting flu or catching a cold, and their symptoms are more intense once they have done so. Breathing in environments contaminated by tobacco smoke damages the mucus of the respiratory passages, encouraging the adhesion and penetration of viruses and bacteria.

To sum up, the best thing is to take basic hygiene measures as a precaution in order to avoid catching or giving colds and flu to other people. The flu vaccine is a form of prevention and, although it doesn't guarantee 100 per cent immunity, it significantly reduces the risk of catching the illness at this time of year.

Finally, ignoring advice which is not supported by medical evidence will save you time and also money.

Spanish doctor reconstructs face of man attacked by a hyena

Famed surgeon Pedro Cavadas carried out the operation at the Hospital de Manises in Valencia

VALENCIA. "I heard a woman screaming, I got closer and saw that she was being devoured by a hyena. I tried to defend her but it attacked me too and tore off my face and my fingers. I survived because I fell into a spot where it couldn't reach me." This is the tragedy that Lonunuko suffered six years ago, but thanks to Dr Pedro Cavadas, he now has a second chance.

The renowned Valencia surgeon has reconstructed his face and one of his hands which means the Kenyan can now eat and help to look after his seven children.

The pair spoke on Tuesday at the conference hall of the Hospital de Manises in Valencia. Lonunuko couldn't find the words to thank the surgeon who has restored his basic functions.

Following the incident in 2012, Lonunuko was transferred to a hospital in Samburu in northern Kenya where they found that his palate, his upper jaw bone and a third of his

face had been ripped off. He couldn't swallow nor speak and he had severe injuries to his hand. With limited resources "they did what they could", said Cavadas.

The surgeon said that while there were still "a few aesthetic touches" to be added, Lonunuko could return

to Kenya in a week and will be able to live "a normal life" now that he "can eat whatever he wants and be understood when he speaks".

The recovery period, compared to being attacked by a hyena at least, "should be a walk in the park for him", joked the surgeon.

Expert warns of rise in sexually-transmitted infections among teenagers

MÁLAGA. The non-use of condoms is leading to an alarming increase in sexually transmitted diseases among teenagers in Spain, an expert has warned.

María Jesús Alonso, who spoke last week at the 32nd congress of the Sociedad Española de Pediatría Extrahospitalaria y Atención

Primaria (the Spanish society for outpatient paediatrics and primary healthcare), said that cases of herpes, gonorrhoea and chlamydia had increased steeply among teens in the last five years.

Alonso attributes this rise to a lack of education, with many pairs using condoms on the first sexual encounter, but not on subsequent ones. Reasons for this include the belief that they "ruin the mood".

The expert also pointed towards an overreliance on the morning-after pill and a misunderstanding of its function.

In Spain there are almost 10,000 pregnancies among girls under 19 every year, 80 per cent of which are unwanted.

Spanish police to de-stress with the help of yoga

Members of the National Police force who experience psychological trauma will be given training in meditation and yoga to combat stress

Ever since it was announced last week that the National Police would be receiving classes in meditation to help them to deal with the stress of the job, little else has been spoken about during station coffee breaks.

But as many officers joked around and started doing the lotus position in the corridors, a majority, in fact, have expressed their interest in signing up for the classes.

This is the first time that yoga classes have been offered to the Spanish police. Not only is the course free, but officers will also have all their expenses paid.

The course is called 'Regulation of stress through yoga' and is aimed principally at officers further down

the chain of command who, according to the Ministry of the Interior, suffer the highest stress levels. Only deputy inspectors and those fighting crime directly on the streets, which is to say the majority of the workforce, can sign up.

The first classes will take place at the headquarters for police training in Madrid between 11 and 13 December.

There is only limited availability for this pioneering course set up by the police

Although the course has been designed for all police officers, initially its organisers will give preference to those with job profiles considered the most stressful, more specifically, members of "units exposed to traumatic psychological experiences".

As a result, judicial police will be prioritised, especially those in the family and women's units (UFAM). Forensics officers and those tasked to deal with violent crime will also top the list. These agents are the ones who, in their day-to-day work, face very difficult situations, inves-

tigating cases involving the dead and wounded, family violence and paedophiles.

Perhaps it is not a surprise that the ministry expects a positive response to this initiative. With the prospect of hundreds of registrants, which would exceed the capacity

the course has to offer, they have decided to do a "pre-selection", giving priority to those already mentioned.

The course is especially attractive as officers based outside Madrid will not have to pay for their accommodation, food or travel expenses.

Malaga travel to Pamplona on Saturday to take on mid-table Osasuna (kick-off 6pm). The Reds' form at El Sadar is what has kept them afloat this season, picking up three wins and two draws from their home games while their away form has suffered (two points from six games).

The club was founded in 1920 and took its name from a Basque word meaning 'health'. Their stadium holds 18,500 spectators and, in fact, is smaller than the city's bullring which is the third largest in the world.

Clearly content with his side's lead, Malaga's Muñiz responded in kind, bolstering numbers in his midfield with the introduction of Javi Ontiveros and Mehdi Lacen.

Adiós Lopetegui

There was little sympathy as the coach left Real Madrid after the Clásico humiliation

In the end it was a quickie divorce of an arranged marriage that lasted just 139 doomed days.

Julen Lopetegui departed heartbroken, feeling unloved but reportedly 15 million euros richer after his painful parting from Real Madrid.

It was a tawdry affair. He'd courted secretly and was outed in the summer as news of his liaisons with Florentino Perez, the Real Madrid President, became public knowledge.

He turned his back on his first love, managing the Spanish national team. If there was an app to fix up these sorts of associations then it would have aligned the logarithms and worked out that the calm, cool headed coach was perfect for the job. With Spain he didn't lose a single game and they headed to the World Cup as one of the most fancied teams.

History now tells us that his head was turned by a more attrac-

tive offer. He'd have to sever his present relationship but the proposition was more head-turning. Luckily he signed a detailed prenuptial before plunging in.

He left without any sympathy.

None from the Real Madrid supporters who were humiliated by the Clásico defeat.

None from the rest of Spain who felt betrayed in the summer. Even the club statement offered a parting shot that he'd failed with eight Ballon d'Or

contenders. The most important one of course was missing: Cristiano Ronaldo, who was allowed to leave in the summer without a Galáctico replacement.

The situation isn't dissimilar to the one inherited by Zinedine Zidane when he picked up the bits and pieces after the reign of Rafa Benítez. Maybe now people will recognise that Zidane is as great a manager as he was a player.

I stress manager because it is

management of individuals and not drills that leads to the success of a club like Real Madrid. A manager needs to massage some egos and often bruise a few as well. Nobody, not even Cristiano Ronaldo, could question the credentials of Zidane when he offered a stern lecture.

So who succeeds Lopetegui? Antonio Conte is enjoying a stress-free existence and has given the job a swerve. Roberto Martínez has apparently expressed an interest but his background is similar to that of Lopetegui and, as a friend, I don't want him subjected to the toxic atmosphere at the club.

Mauricio Pochettino has all of the credentials and has stated recently that he feels he can't raise expectations at Tottenham beyond a top four finish, given the limited finances derived from the uncertainty of the stadium move.

The Argentinian wouldn't take the job without assurances that he can dictate the football policy himself rather than work as a coach of the collection of players the president picks. He would want a welcome bursary to inject some life and competition into the changing room.

I suspect the door will remain ajar as youth coach Santi Solari

keeps the seat warm.

What the club could do with is someone like Ernesto Valverde who is not credited for the excellent job he is doing at Barcelona. The Clásico proved that well-considered planning and willingness to make alterations during the game can pay off. They hammered Real with Lionel Messi watching from the side lines. The new players have been assimilated. Arthur Melo, Clement Lenglet and

Philippe Coutinho are all settled.

His initial selection was strong and when change was required he was decisive. He brought on Nelson Semedo and moved Sergi Roberto into a position that won the game.

Valverde is firmly established and his relationship is firmly established.

Over at the Bernabéu it is once again 'Situation Vacant' and there are not too many takers.

A 47-year-old British woman has achieved one of her horse riding dreams after being selected to represent Andalucía in endurance riding

ESTEPONA. At 47 years of age, Caroline Grahm will be one of the oldest competitors on the course when she takes part in Raid Interautonomías - a 60-kilometre endurance horse race - this Saturday.

However, in this case, with age does not come experience. This is the first time that Caroline will represent Andalucía in these inter-regional games for a sport traditionally dominated by teenagers and young people because of their weight.

Caroline, who has lived in Estepona for 20 years and runs Ranch Sista Los Rubios riding stables which

looks after in excess of 25 horses, only started competing in the sport four years ago when she was introduced to it by friend and fellow competitor Tracy Lewis from Manilva.

A young person's sport

"I have ridden since I was four years old but had never heard of endurance racing. It wasn't big in Lancashire!" says Caroline. "It's a sport that's predominantly for younger people and not that many women compete but I thought I'd give it a go for fun and started in a 40-kilometre race. I worked up to 80-kilometre distances, won the Andalucía league title for best horse and then became addicted."

The single mum of four will compete in the 60-kilometre race on Saturday 3 November on her nine-year-old Anglo-Arab horse, Bambina RC. They will be going up against regional teams from the whole of Spain and two of her children will be on hand

as supporting "crew" to help at the breaks, water stops and vet checks.

"I bought Bambina in Seville last year after seeing her online. She had never done an endurance race before but there was just something about her I liked," Caroline explains. "People have nicknamed her the Champagne War Horse because she is totally fearless."

Endurance riding started officially as a sport in the USA in 1955. This equestrian discipline, dominated by the Arab horse which for centuries has been bred for both speed and stamina over any terrain, has been rapidly growing in popularity across Europe in recent years.

Aside from the mental fitness and stamina required of both horse and rider over a five-and-a-half-hour race, Caroline attributes a lot of their success to where they live: "We have hundreds of kilometres of steep mountain trails on our doorstep in the Sierra Bermeja natural park behind Estepona. It's beautiful, challenging and superb fitness training for us both."

Travel costs

However, like in any amateur sport, endurance riding success does come at a cost. While a number of other riders have sponsors, Caroline does it on her own and pays all of her own travel costs.

Saturday's race is in Badajoz, almost 500 kilometres away, and in order to help out with transport costs for Bambina, friends have set up a Go Fund Me page for anyone who wants to contribute towards this fledgling partnership's maiden run in the colours of Andalucía: "She gives to so many people every day and works so hard for everyone. This is the thing that's just hers and she's fabulous at it. Let's help make that journey easier for her."

The deal was announced on Monday by tournament director, Luis Torres, and Marbella councillors Manuel Osorio and Javier Mérida.


Liuzhou Challenger quarters for Davidovich





Donald Gray, the essence of traditional architecture

Marbella pays tribute to one of the designers of La Virginia, which is celebrating its 50th anniversary

The Australian, who won the Rafael Manzano Prize in 2015 and has lived in La Alpujarra for years, is a staunch defender of the Andalusian style of building

MARBELLA. "This is the Casa de la Cascada (the Kauffman residence), the work of American architect Frank Lloyd Wright. He did it in the year I was born, 1935, and it is an example of modern architecture. If you took the house away, you'd see a beautiful waterfall, but he built an enormous block of reinforced concrete there. Why on earth was he ever famous?"

At the age of 83, Donald Gray is still highly critical of the contemporary and avant-garde architecture with which he has never agreed. On the contrary, he has spent his whole life defending a style which he fell in love with the first time he set foot in Spain, the traditional architecture of Andalucía. He has used it more than most in residential developments which are still inhabited today and which, especially in the case of La Virginia, in Marbella, retain their essence and authenticity even after 50 years. La Virginia shares the double merit of being one of the loveliest and yet least well-known in the municipality.

This Australian architect has just been back to La Virginia, to attend a tribute from the community of

the development, the mayor and councillors, as part of its 50th anniversary celebrations. The event was also attended friends and people who know, admire and are fond of him. "Today is a great day for Marbella and for Andalucía," said another master in his own field, Rafael de la Fuente, afterwards.

As its designer, Donald Gray was delighted to return to La Virginia for

this important anniversary. The idea for the project came from developers Juan Manuel Figueras and Freddy Wildman at the end of the 1960s, and Jurgen Vig Muller, María Luisa Larrañaga and Rafael Neville (all friends) were also involved.

At the tribute there were speeches and a screening of a video filmed three years ago, when he was awarded the Rafael Manzano Prize for New Traditional Architecture. The documentary explained that "space and light" is the essence of the buildings upon which Gray worked between the 1960s and 1990s. These include Las Lomas de Marbella Club, Pueblo López in Fuengirola, Nuevo Pueblo Miras, the town hall in La Tana, in Pitres, and La Tartana hotel in La Heradura (Granada).

There was also a screening of a se-

ries of photographs provided by the architect, who was born in Australia and has lived in La Alpujarra for years. It was a showcase of examples of modern and avant-garde architecture, and the outrageous mass construction during the years of the property boom. For Donald Gray, these are examples of dehumanised buildings.

On-site training

His particular commitment to recovering and defending traditional Andalusian architecture began when he arrived in Spain in 1959. He realised that it was something that was never taught at university, and decided to learn directly from master builders. He worked alongside them, designing and building his first houses. In 1961 he went to live in Torremolinos, and after that to La Alpujarra.

"Today is an important day for the town because we are paying tribute to a person who, with his enormous talent and sensitivity, has contributed to enriching the artistic heritage of Marbella with one of the loveliest residential developments on the Costa del Sol and a magnificent example of the best traditional Andalusian architecture," said the mayor, Ángeles Muñoz, at the tribute.

In the heart of the Golden Mile, La Virginia is a small community of about 68 houses set in secluded cobbled streets, which still seems far away from the bustle of the busy town. It remains today the calm refuge which its creators planned half a century ago.
