A lasting legacy for Marbella's elderly

Day centres in the town are being modernised after an Austrian lady left a million euros specifically for the care of old people in her will

MARBELLA. Few people will remember her (she used to go to the Encarna Cantero centre, but that was years ago), but many are now grateful to her for a gesture which has provided no less than one mil-

lion euros to modernise and equip the new Active Participation Centres in Marbella.

This is the money that the council obtained from the sale of a house in the prestigious Los Monteros area, which had belonged to Margit Selzer, an Austrian lady who was born in 1929 in Reichenberg and lived for several years in Marbella. She left the property to the local council in her will. She wanted the money raised from its sale to be spent on improving the day centres for the elderly.

In recent weeks the users of these centres have been watching the arrival of deliveries of all types of domestic appliances, sound systems, air conditioning units, deep fryers and a long list of other equipment, and minor works being carried out on soundproofing and modernising kitchens.

"We are delighted. We never thought anything like this would happen. We're getting everything now," says a longstanding user, Encarna Cantero, after whom one of the centres has been named.

"We're very happy about all this. It has changed everything. We even have more light now. One of our companions here says people can see all our wrinkles now that there is more light," jokes María Romero, of the Plaza de Toros centre. "This woman has done something wonderful for elderly people in Marbella, and we should all be grateful to her."

At the Santa Marta centre, very little remains to be done now. "Everything is different. It really needed this, and we are over the moon," says Ana Naranjo.

Before drawing up the list of what was needed, a team from the

council arranged meetings with users of each centre to learn what their priorities were, and then organised an equal allocation of funds.

The lists were sent to Andrew González, the executor of Margit Selzer's estate, who approved the council's plans and has been keeping a close eye on everything. He agreed that a reputable company such as El Corte Inglés would be ideal for providing what was wanted.

Now that the works are about to come to an end, the centres are visibly improved. They all have defibrillators, wall clocks, comfortable and practical new furniture, audiovisual and sound equipment with the facility for screenings, air conditioning, new kitchens, professional cooking equipment and LED lighting.

In addition to the general equipment, each centre has requested its own improvements, which range from a billiards table to static bicycles and treadmills, and IT facilities including computers.

Courses

The council will provide the staff to teach the courses once all the equipment has been installed. Sinks, tables, chairs, curtains, bookshelves, freezers, fridges, ceiling fans, armchairs, coat stands, sewing machines, parquet flooring, mirrors... the list is very long for the nine Active Participation Centres for Elderly People in Marbella (Encarna Cantero, Las Chapas, Los

Paisajes, Miraflores, Nueva Andalucía, Plaza de Toros, San Pedro Alcántara I and II, and Santa Marta). Altogether it has cost about one million euros.

"The idea was, as she stated in her will, that everything had to be spent on improving the centres for the elderly. We provided the executor with the list of needs. Once everything is done and he has seen the accounts, he will know whether there is anything left to spend or not. If there is, we will buy more items for the centres," says the councillor for Social Rights, Isabel Cintado.

She is also very grateful to Margit. "She has enabled us to carry out major improvements at all the centres for the elderly, with a sum of money which would have been very difficult for the council to have obtained otherwise, all at once and immediately," she says. "What is important is that we comply with this lady's wishes, and she wanted a major improvement of the facilities. It was wonderful news for us when we returned to government in 2017. That's when we discovered that the file about this inheritance had been kept in a drawer since 2015," she says.

Malaga city bus careers out of control into parked cars as driver suffers heart attack

The driver was revived by emergency services and is in a serious but stable condition. No one else was injured

MALAGA. An out-of-control city bus crashed into several parked cars early on Friday morning when the driver suffered a heart attack at the wheel. The accident, in which “miraculously” - according to onlookers - no one else was injured, occurred at 8.15am on Calle Héroe de Sostoa in Malaga.

Out of control, the bus left its lane and ploughed into twelve parked cars, pulling up trees and scattering refuse containers as it went.

When the emergency services arrived on the scene the only person who needed treatment was the 49-year-old driver, who responded to resuscitation attempts and was rushed to hospital in a serious but stable condition. He had recently passed a company medical checkup.

The 13 passengers on the bus at the time were all able to leave the vehicle unhurt, according to the city's bus company, EMT.

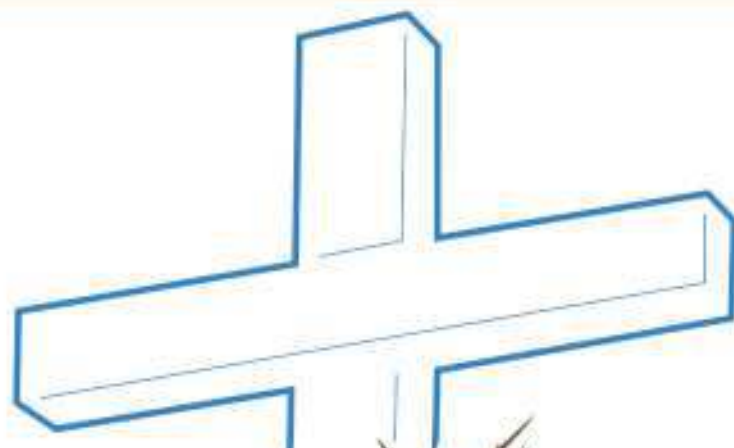

The new 'heroes of Sostoa'

MALAGA. Calle Héroe de Sostoa is one of the main arteries into the city from the western side and has provoked a lot of debate among locals over the years: who is the 'hero of Sostoa'? Was there just one or several? From which battle was it?

The truth is there was one, called Tomás, and he was known for his bravery in the face of Napoleonic troops. However now, we must add four more: Antonio, Francisco, Clara and an anonymous passenger on the number 1 bus which crashed into 12 vehicles, mostly cars, after the driver suffered a heart attack.

These heroes, not known to one another, came together like a well-drilled rescue team, removing the driver's foot from the pedal, calling on the radio to find out how to switch off the engine, opening the doors to evacuate the passengers, and performing lifesaving cardiopulmonary resuscitation manoeuvres to bring him back to life.

At the Carlos Haya hospital, where he is recovering from heart failure, the driver was told that his passengers had saved his life.

Fate

Antonio Guzmán shouldn't have been on that bus, "although now I'm glad I was there, because I was able to help," he says. He normally took the earlier one but on Friday he just missed it.

Just like Tomás de Sostoa, who was

born in Uruguay, Antonio is also from the other side of the pond. This 39-year-old from the Dominican Republic, said: "After the first impact I saw that the driver was convulsing and then the cars started piling up. The screams of the people and the panic will stay with me forever."

Francisco Luis Guzmán always goes to work by car but he had a dinner with friends and didn't want to drive. "My wife offered to take me but I told her I didn't mind taking the bus." Francisco, from Malaga, was sat in the seat closest to the driver doing a sudoku on his phone when he heard "a loud crash". After finding a way, with the help of another man, to get him out of his seat, he made it known he was a doctor. As did Clara. The pair of them carried out cardiopulmonary resuscitation manoeuvres and his pulse returned. However, it went once more at which point the emergency services took over. "I was very dejected because he had suffered a massive heart attack," said the paediatrician.

While this was all going on, Antonio was looking out for the safety of the passengers on board, on the radio trying to work out how to shut down the engine and open the doors.

With everyone finally off the bus, attention turned back to the driver. The anxious wait continued until from the ambulance came a thumbs up. "That made us all smile," he said.

50,000 euros in compensation granted to family whose baby was dropped during birth

MALAGA. "I heard the bang. Since then, I haven't been able to sleep for six years." These are the words of Ana García whose daughter fell to the floor during childbirth at the Hospital Clínico in Malaga in January 2013. Now, after six years, the Andalusian Health Service (SAS) has acknowledged the damage suffered by the minor as a result.

The Patients Ombudsman has announced that the SAS has agreed to pay compensation of 46,942 euros to the parents of the minor after it was acknowledged that the fall was the cause of the girl's slow development. Future neurological damage also cannot be ruled out.

The ombudsman says that, "while the midwife was exerting pressure on the tummy, the gynaecologist deemed the use of forceps to be necessary. While she was taking out the girl, specifically when she had taken out half of the body, the gynaecologist turned, ignoring the situation, so the newborn fell to the ground from a great height with great force".

For its part, the SAS say that the fall was unfortunate. A report states that "the withdrawal of the forceps coincided with a contraction that caused the unexpected expulsion of the foetus".

But the battle isn't over yet. The lawyer for the Patient Ombudsman, Francisco Damián Vázquez, has said that the legal battle is not over as the compensation does not

satisfactorily cover the extra care that she requires.

Her mother Ana says, "She's improved a lot but she's the worst in her class and she suffers terrible vertigo when she's in a car or a bus."

She added: "She's suffered so much. Every time she sees a white coat she starts to tremble. I lost my job because I have to take her to so many appointments."

Girl, 2, dies after falling in swimming pool

:: J. C. / F. T. A 22-month-old girl died on Monday at the Hospital Materno in Malaga, where she had been admitted on Sunday after falling into a swimming pool in a family home in Alhaurín el Grande.

The events took place around 5.50pm. According to 112 sources, the parents of the minor, who live in Cortijo Alto area of Malaga, had gone to spend the day at the grandparents' home, just on the border with neighboring Coin. It seems that they lost sight of her for a few moments and, when they began to look for her, found her inside the swimming pool, apparently in cardiac arrest.

Man with amputated penis is identified

:: Á. F. / J. C. The mystery over the man found disorientated and wondering the streets of Torremuelle in Benalmádena with a head wound and a partially-amputated penis continues.

After being unable to identify him since his admission to the Hospital Clínico in Malaga on Saturday (the man referred to himself as Sergio, Rafael and Naomi), SUR sources have confirmed that a positive identification was made on Tuesday and that he is a 32-year-old Spanish national.

The origin of his injuries, however, still remain unknown but investigations point towards a mental disorder and that he inflicted the injuries on himself, though other hypotheses have not been ruled out.

Third arrest made over torture and kidnapping

MARBELLA

:: C. MÁRQUEZ. The investigation into the alleged kidnapping and torture of a man who turned up at Marbella police station last week has yielded another arrest.

The man, who still had bits of tape stuck to his face and hands, was able to provide information, including the number plate of the car that they transported him in, and this led to the immediate arrest of two men.

This week, however, a third man was also arrested, but the victim alleges that there were seven involved in total.

The three arrested, 27, 34 and 41 and of French or Belgian nationality, have been charged with false imprisonment, causing injury, drug trafficking and belonging to a criminal organisation.

Town halls are 65 million euros better off thanks to undeclared changes to properties

The tax authority has finished its inspections and discovered 89,000 properties whose owners will have to pay an extra 150 euros on their IBI bill on average, and a further 600 euros for arrears

MÁLAGA. Town halls have found themselves with considerable extra income from IBI property tax thanks to the inspections under way in the province since 2014.

The authorities have been searching for cases of new construction, extensions, renovation work or change of use of buildings that had gone under the IBI radar. This is mainly because neither the owners nor the relevant town hall had added the work to the official Catastro property records, whether or not they had a building licence or certificate of habitability.

After four years of work on this "regularisation plan", the authorities have now finished checking the 1.8 million buildings in Malaga province, and found irregularities in

88,919 of them (about five per cent of the total). Among the list of undeclared works are brand new construction projects, extensions and swimming pools which, although they may have had a works licence, had not been declared at the town hall's Catastro office where the cadastral values should have been updated; their owners, therefore, had not been charged the extra IBI tax they should have been paying.

Now things are changing, and after paying the Catastro a fee of 60 euros to correct their records, people will find that their IBI bills have also been updated accordingly. Not everyone will be affected equally, because the amount varies according to the type of construction and the square metres which have been added, but the average increase is 150 euros and the town halls are demanding a further 600 euros for late payments for the past four tax years, which is the longest period the authorities can claim for.

Altogether, this regularisation plan will enable the 103 municipalities in the province to collect over 65 million euros. This is around ten per cent of the total collected every year through the IBI tax, which is the main, but not the only, contribution to be affected by the updating of cadastral values.

The figures held by the Catastro are also applied to decide the amount payable of another municipal tax, 'plusvalía', which has

to be paid when a property is sold, inherited or gifted, and also in some regional taxes, and state ones such as wealth and income tax.

Many of the undeclared changes detected concerned brand new construction work, such as a new house or storage facility. These amounted to 34.2 per cent of the detected fraud.

However, there were also numerous house extensions and rebuilding work in of buildings that were already registered. These represented 38.4 per cent of the infractions. Another 21.5 per cent were renovation work and changes of use (such as enclosing terraces with windows, or restoring an old house). The remaining 5.9 per cent of properties had swimming pools that did not figure on the authorities' database.

Place to place

By municipality, Malaga city stands out with 13,050 properties being regularised, of which half were extensions or rehabilitation. Nevertheless, in relative terms, it is striking that the inspectors detected irregularities in one in every ten buildings in Álora (2,144 out of a total of 19,241), with an almost equal amount of new constructions and extensions.

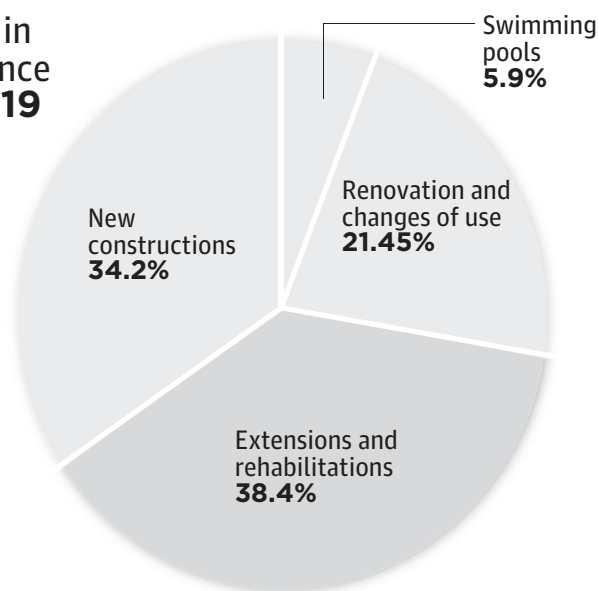
In the list of municipalities, it can also be seen that three of every four infractions in Vélez were for new buildings, most of them on rustic land between the numerous hamlets in its vast terrain. In Benalmádena and Cártama new swimming pools predominated, accounting for one in every four infractions detected.

Although this is officially tax fraud, no fines are being imposed. Hacienda says the 60 euros it charges are to cover the cost of the inspection services, which included personal visits, orthophotos and drones. The Cadastral Law obliges people to declare fully and correctly any new constructions or modifications carried out to existing ones, whether they are economic, physical or a change to ownership, or be fined between 60 and 6,000 euros.

Despite this type of amnesty by the tax authority, the town halls are still able to issue fines for illegal works, and in this case they can include those which have been carried out in the past six years.

THE CADASTRAL REGULARISATION PLAN

► **What is it?** It is an initiative from the Ministry of Finance and Taxation to detect fiscal fraud. The aim is to ensure that all new constructions or alterations to existing buildings are notified to the Catastro, whether or not they had a works licence or habitability cer-

tificate. The registered description must be completely accurate.

► **How is it done?** The Catastro compares the orthophotos already in its possession with aerial photos taken recently to spot any alternations. It costs 60 euros to regularise a property, to

cover the inspection costs.

► **The effects.** The increase in the cadastral value of a property affects local, regional and State taxes which are set in accordance with this variable. Councils can demand back payments for the past four years.

QROPS: The pros and cons of transferring your UK pension

One of the many pension options available to British expatriates today is transferring to a Qualifying Recognised Overseas Pension Scheme (QROPS).

QROPS are foreign pension schemes recognised by HM Revenue & Customs to receive tax-free transfers from UK-registered pension funds. They were introduced in 2006 to help Britons who permanently move abroad simplify their affairs by taking their pension savings with them.

Despite being widely seen as the answer for expatriate retirees, QROPS are by no means a one-size-fits-all solution. Here we explore some of their advantages and disadvantages.

Tax efficiency

Currently, Spain residents can transfer UK pensions into an EU/EEA-based QROPS without taxation, while transfers outside the bloc attract the UK 'overseas transfer charge' of 25%. There are expectations the UK could extend this within the EU/EEA after Brexit, so time may be limited for tax-free transfers.

Once in a QROPS, funds are sheltered from future UK taxes on

income and gains. They no longer count towards your lifetime pension allowance (LTA), so can grow unlimited without attracting 25% or 55% LTA penalties when accessing your money.

QROPS funds only become taxable once you start taking benefits in your country of residence.

When accessing QROPS or taking UK pension lump sums and income, the general Spanish income tax rates apply for residents. These vary regionally but range from 9.5% to 48%.

Depending on your situation, it may be more beneficial to reinvest UK pension funds into an alternative tax-efficient structure that is compliant in Spain, so explore your options.

Flexible access

Many QROPS allow you to take as much cash or income as you like, however and whenever you want. You could, for example, draw a higher income in early retirement and reduce it in later years, or take a lump sum and preserve the rest.

However, with this freedom comes more potential to exhaust your funds

— unlike a UK annuity or 'final salary' pension which provide a guaranteed income for life.

Diversification and investment choice

QROPS usually offer more options than UK pensions for how your money is invested, and are not as over-exposed to UK assets. You can choose a flexible investment plan across a wide range of funds to suit your circumstances, objectives and risk appetite.

As the value of any investment can go down as well as up, this introduces an element of risk to your retirement funds that is absent from a guaranteed annuity. However, an active, well-diversified investment approach can manage and minimise risk.

Estate planning flexibility

While most UK pensions are only payable to your spouse on death, QROPS offers the option to include other heirs.

QROPS may also offer some protection from UK inheritance tax when passing pension assets to non-UK resident heirs, although they may be subject to local succession taxes.

Multi-currency options

While UK pensions only pay out in sterling, some QROPS allow you to invest funds and make withdrawals in more than one currency. This is a major advantage for British expatriates in Spain as it reduces dependence on pound/euro exchange rates and removes currency conversion costs.

Freedom from UK rules... to a point

Funds in a QROPS are no longer governed by UK pension legislation, so are protected from future changes to UK rules. However, you could still be subject to UK legislation — and taxation — if you transfer funds again to an unapproved scheme within five tax years (for funds transferred from March 2017) or you permanently return to the UK within ten years.

Note also that the goalposts for QROPS are likely to shift in the future. Since their inception HMRC has made numerous revisions to the rules and delisted thousands of QROPS from various jurisdictions. There is far more complexity in the QROPS market than people realise.

For example, currently there are no Spanish schemes on the HMRC list

of approved QROPS. Expatriates resident in Spain therefore need to take care to choose an eligible scheme in another EU/EEA country — such as Malta — to avoid transfer penalties.

Where HMRC deems that its rules have been broken, it can charge a 55% tax penalty on the transfer amount.

Regulated, tailored advice is crucial

Refuse collection strike threat for next month in Fuengirola

Workers for the council's service operator, Urbaser, believe the company has still not kept a collective-bargaining promise

FUENGIROLA. The industrial unrest affecting refuse collection workers in Fuengirola that has been ongoing for two years is set to escalate once again in the coming weeks.

Employees at the refuse collection operator, Urbaser, that holds a contract from the council, have said they will start direct action again after, what they claim is, the refusal of the company to improve their working conditions as promised when Urbaser took over the contract.

According to sources, the work-

place committee have put forward a series of actions that includes a strike in May, which will be the third since summer last year.

The committee say they feel they

have been tricked by the company that claims it cannot improve financial conditions while the current contract terms are in force. Urbaser has also said that improvements to

non-financial terms need to be cleared by the town hall as well.

The dispute goes back to summer 2017 after Urbaser had taken over the contract for all street refuse collection and part of the street sweeping in the municipality in 2016.

The company stopped a new employment deal for workers in 2017 promising that it would be brought in in 2018. When this didn't happen, workers went on strike for 10 days last summer when only minimum legal refuse-collection cover was given.

The granting of the contract to Urbaser has been mired in controversy. The former licence holder, FCC, launched legal action claiming it had made a better offer than Urbaser that was ignored, and a court upheld the FCC complaint although the council then appealed.

Meanwhile, Urbaser asked to break the contract with the town hall, claiming the council wasn't meeting its side of the deal in terms of support and resources, but the town hall refused to cancel it.

The council also owes Urbaser several million euros in a dispute involving interest payouts on an old 2012 contract held prior to FCC.

British candidate in mayor's reelection bid

MARBELLA

:: N. CASTRO. The mayor of Marbella has included a British man on her party's list of candidates in the forthcoming municipal election. Ángeles Muñoz of the conservative Partido Popular is bidding to be reelected and announced her potential team last weekend. Darren Sands is currently president of the El Rosario residents community. In the 2015 election, the PP won 13 councilors, taken from the first 13 names on the voting list. Muñoz will hope to increase that amount.

San Pedro party asks for more autonomy

MARBELLA

:: M. PÉREZ. The OSP San Pedro party, who are the PP's coalition partners on Marbella council, have said that a precondition for a pact with any party after the May elections is for San Pedro to be given Entidad Local Autónoma (ELA) status, a form of semi-independence from Marbella town hall. OSP have recently been kingmakers on the council, helping the PP to power two years ago by withdrawing support for the PSOE.

Dean Tyler to stand for CM after leaving IU

MANILVA

:: C. MÁRQUEZ. Dean Tyler, current Foreign Residents councillor in Manilva, is to stand with the current mayor's Compromiso Manilva (CM) party in the elections on 26 May. Tyler was with the IU, CM's coalition partner, but he left after a recent falling out. Mayor of Manilva, Mario Jiménez, said that Tyler was well known and respected by the foreign population, which makes up 43 per cent of local residents.

SUR TALK CONTRIBUTES TO MARBELLA 'PADRÓN' DRIVE

Marbella council continues its campaign to boost its municipal population census, the Padrón. In a talk on Thursday, held in collaboration with SUR in English, tax practitioner Pedro Fernández of Garrigues law firm explained how the municipal register was separate from any other residency paperwork obligations for tax purposes. The offending drain covers have since been removed and replaced.

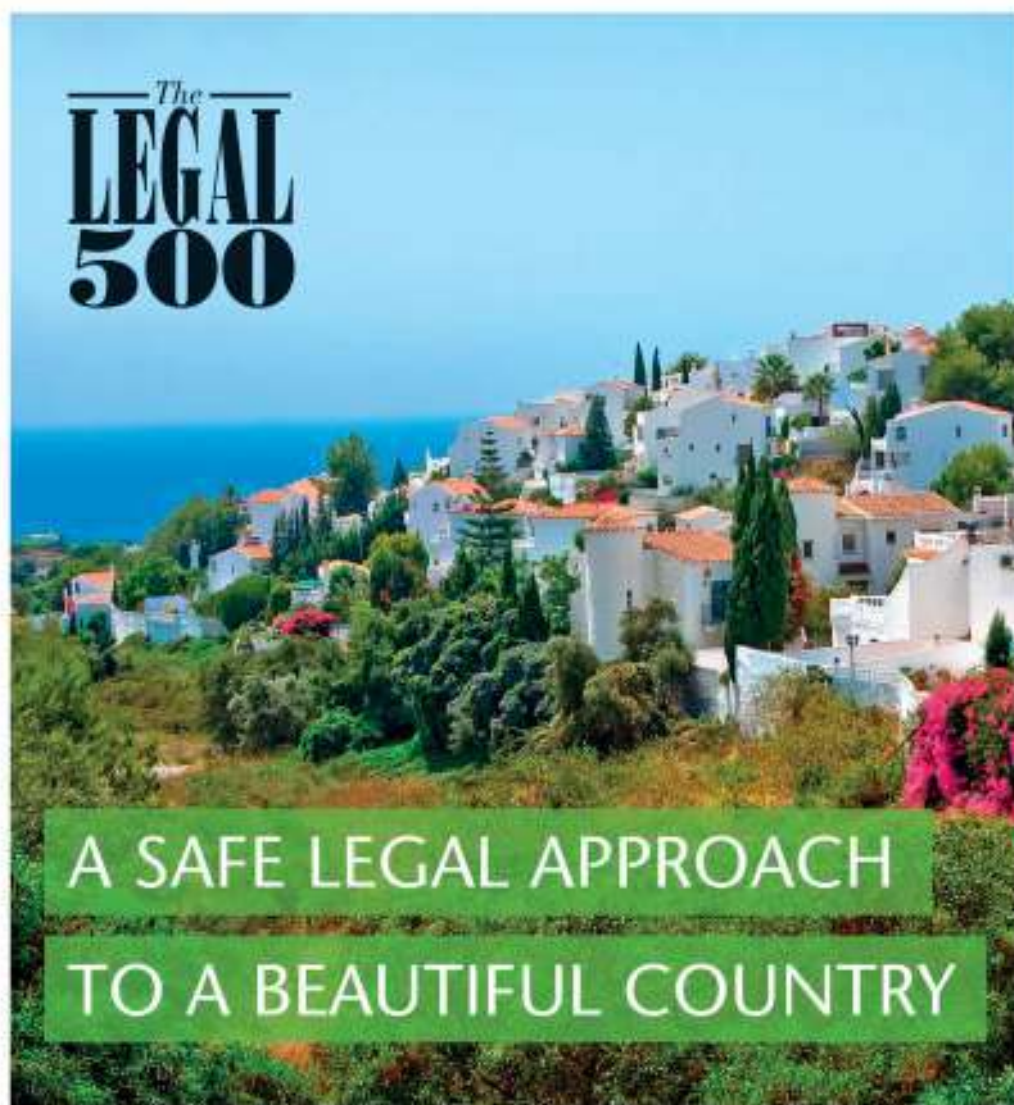

Study into relocation of Alhaurín de la Torre power lines to take place before summer

Residents have been calling for the pylons to be moved away from residential areas for years

ALHAURÍN DE LA TORRE. Residents in the Pinos de Alhaurín area of Alhaurín de la Torre have moved one step closer to getting their wish of having the area's high voltage

power lines moved away from their homes.

Their efforts over the years resulted in a study in 2018 which confirmed that the electric and electromagnetic field levels were above those recommended by the World Health Organization.

As a result, the town hall this week has committed to carrying out and funding fifty per cent of a study which will, before the summer, look into alternative locations for the lines.

**GARDEN BRIDGES CONTRACT AWARDED**

The contract for the project to install vertical gardens on overpasses in some of Marbella's busiest spots has been signed off. With a budget of 150,000 euros, the works to replace advertising hoardings with self-watering plants are expected to take six weeks to complete.

Costa del Sol hospital extension project to resume after Junta pays 12 million euros

The regional government has approved this payment which will rip up the contract with the current concession holder and resume the expansion which stopped in 2010

MARBELLA. Ministers at the Junta de Andalucía regional government this week approved the payment of 12 million euros that will allow the project to expand the Costa del Sol hospital in Marbella to resume. These funds will allow the Costa del Sol Health Agency to terminate the contract with the concession holder, giving free rein to the Andalusian government to resume the works.

This brings an end to a nine-year standstill, which began when the contractors, Concesionaria Costa del Sol SA, decided to halt works after a disagreement with Marbella town hall. This dispute was over the underground car park. The Junta had decided, as part of the financing of the project, to allow the company to take over its operation for a period of 40 years. Marbella town hall, however, disagreed with charging users to park every time they came to the hospital and denied permissions to install barriers.

From that moment on, the works were halted and the matter became held up in the courts. In August 2014 an agreement was announced obliging the three parties (the health agency, Marbella town hall and the concession holder) to withdraw the lawsuits filed in court, but no agreement could be reached between the Junta and the concession holder on the amount it should receive for profits lost from the car park.

In November last year, with the

PSOE still running the Junta, it was announced that the concession could be annulled with the payment of 12 million euros, a figure set by the mercantile court in Malaga. However, it wasn't until after the election that this was approved.

The works, which have been at a standstill since 2010, began two years previously with a budget of 48.5 million euros. But due to the time that has elapsed, a new project, which will add a total of 88,000 square metres, will need to be drawn up.

The new managing director of the Costa del Sol Health Agency, Luisa Lorenzo, acknowledged last week in an interview granted to SUR that the hospital is at the limit of its capacity and that it is a priority to resume the expansion.

Marbella updates entire bus fleet and introduces new routes

MARBELLA. The Pablo Ráez boulevard in Marbella was the setting on Tuesday for the launch of the town's new and improved bus service.

Avanza-Portillo, who won the contract, has overseen the complete renewal of the town's fleet of buses. The 19 new vehicles, all Mercedes, were put into operation throughout the day on Wednesday. They are fully adapted for passengers with mobility issues. They are also equipped with GPS technology so passengers can see their exact location on the 68 screens installed at bus stops, as well as Wi-

Fi and USB charging points and CCTV cameras.

The number of the buses in operation remains the same, but a number of improvements have been implemented to step up the service. These include the creation of new routes, alterations to existing ones and the possibility of calling upon "reserve" vehicles at times of high demand.

One new route will now see Cabopino served by buses for the first time, while there are new routes between La Cañada and El Ángel and Puerto Banús-San Pedro-El Salto. There is also a new circular route in

San Pedro and two nighttime routes (La Cañada-San Pedro and Cabopino-Marbella) will operate with the option for solo female passengers to alight where you like.

Free travel for residents

Some 1,200 people collected their passes, valid from 1 May, on the first day, with a total of around 31,000 expected to follow before the end of the month.

Residents take Vélez council to court over infrastructure shortfalls

Around 30 homes near Lagos and Mezquitilla can only be accessed by dirt tracks

VÉLEZ-MÁLAGA. Residents in the Cerro y Mar and Chorreras housing developments, which are situated between Lagos and Mezquitilla in the Axarquía, have gone back to court to seek a solution to an ongoing legal battle with Vélez-Málaga town hall over incomplete work to the roads and electricity supply to

their neighbourhood.

They claim that despite the approximately 30 houses appearing in the town's PGOU, the council has failed to carry out work it is obliged, under the general plan, to do.

"The houses feature in the plans and we pay IBI, but we don't get the services we're paying for," community president, Juan Ramón Ibargüengoitia, told SUR on Tuesday.

He said that the roads, most of which are still dirt tracks, suffer subsidence when it rains and that there is a lack of street lighting.

Electric scooters rounded up in Malaga as new regulations controlling their use come into force

As of Tuesday it is forbidden to park these vehicles in pedestrian areas, with fines of 200 euros being issued

MÁLAGA. The Local Police, in collaboration with the traffic enforcement authorities, removed 27 electric scooters belonging to four different companies from the streets of Malaga's historic centre on Wednesday morning. This came a day after a municipal edict from mayor Francisco de la Torre prohibited parking these vehicles in pedestrian areas, with fines of 200 euros being issued to those who fail to comply.

This came in response to a number of complaints filed by residents in the city, arguing that many of these scooters were being left on pavements, blocking entrances to buildings, crossings and making access difficult for those with limited mobility.

This new edict (as well as the provision of 29 official parking spaces

throughout the city centre, on the seafront and in areas of frequent use such as Teatinos and Huelin) has received the support of the companies renting out the scooters, though the speed with which it was pushed through took many by surprise.

Clara Vallvé, director of Bird in Spain, applauded Malaga's "innovative and progressive" attitude but called for better communication. "We are happy that Malaga has de-

cided to provide spaces but it has not given us a lot of time to adapt to the new rules," she said.

Gerard Sellarés, of Wind España, supports the initiative but admits that 29 spaces "falls short" of the demand, given that 2,000 scooters are rented out every day.

Niether company would confirm whether the fines would be passed on to the users who are now also limited to 10km/h on pavements.

Junta to cap GPs' daily appointments to give more time with patients

The regional minister for Health has said that primary care should be at the heart of the care system and promised more resources

CÓRDOBA. The Andalusian regional minister for Health, Jesús Aguirre, said on Thursday that the public health service will take steps to improve access to GP visits and primary healthcare with "a real reform" of service levels. The aim will be to limit how many patients a GP sees to 30 a day. The move comes in reply to doctors' and patients' groups who say that medics don't have enough time to see to patients.

Aguirre said that he was "completely in agreement with the industrial action" that doctors in health centres in Andalucía had announced for May as he himself wanted, "more time per appointment, getting to ten minutes [with each patient]", although he admitted that the new action plan is

only forecasting seven minutes.

The regional minister went on to say that the new plan meets many of healthcare staff's other demands and hoped it was enough to halt their planned action in May. He asked for more time for the new Junta de Andalucía government to take action.

The new primary-healthcare action plan, currently being presented to trade unions, will focus on three main areas; cutting red tape, improving diary management, and triage (categorising patients before they are seen).

Aguirre criticised central government for rushing the regions into preparing an action plan, but recognised that "it could serve as a starting point" for the "debate" about putting the primary care area of the health service at the centre of the operation.

As part of the diary measures, GP appointments will be limited to 30 a day, up to half the current amount. Primary care would also be given a higher share of total healthcare budgets and linked more closely to social services, so more people could be taken care of at home.

Semana Santa brotherhoods put finishing touches to their annual week of processions

Easter celebrations take on a grand scale from Palm Sunday and thousands will flock to town and village centres to witness this cultural and religious tradition

MALAGA. All eyes in the last few days have been on the weather forecast for next week ahead of Semana Santa celebrations. The most important period in Spain's cultural calendar starts this weekend with processions, run by the Confradías (or brotherhoods), on Palm Sunday (14 April).

In larger towns in Malaga province there are religious processions throughout much of next week, especially in Malaga city, Marbella and Vélez-Málaga on the Costa. More places join in as the week goes on and by next weekend, Easter itself, towns and villages will be taking part on Good Friday and Easter Sunday, with a rest day on Saturday.

With so much effort going into preparations for the tronos (ornate platforms carrying images of Jesus and Mary and often other figures from the story of the crucifixion of Christ), any rain would cause huge disappointment. Penitents' clothes have been spring-cleaned and band music polished as thousands get ready to take part. Each year more tourists flock to the ornate and moving spectacles.

Malaga city

The centrepiece of the Costa del Sol's Holy Week events is as usual Malaga city centre. From Palm Sunday through to Good Friday, over 50 different processions spread over six days will wind their way through the streets, staggered from mid-afternoon to the early hours of the next morning.

This Sunday the processions start a bit earlier at 10.15am with the Pollinica, a representation of Jesus entering Jerusalem on a donkey and a favourite of local children.

As usual, it is relatively easy for spectators to get a good view whatever town or village they are in as the processional routes cover relatively long routes. In Malaga the central stretch of the procession, around the Calle Larios area has been radically altered this year to make it longer and will now finish near the Cathedral. Brotherhoods have been rehearsing new routes to get to the centre and a special metal ramp has been built at the Cathedral for those 'tronos' small enough to fit through the

doors and to take into account the new route.

Outside Malaga city, Marbella's old town is venue to several processions throughout the week and it also has its own Pollinica this Sunday starting at 6pm.

In the Axarquía, Vélez-Málaga is known particularly for its 20 processions over the week. The Palm Sunday procession starts at 5pm.

Elsewhere in Malaga province Ronda and Antequera also have spectacular historic processions that attract many visitors.

Good weather is forecast for next few days as tourist industry gets ready

MALAGA. It wasn't just the thousands due to take part in the religious processions that have been watching the skies ahead of next week. Bosses in the tourism sector were hoping for a dry start to the peak season this year with high occupancies expected in hotels and apartments and busy restaurant terraces.

The association of Costa hoteliers, Aehcos, said this week that its members were expecting an average occupancy of 80 per cent in the coming week, with a peak next weekend.

The first detailed weather forecast for the Semana Santa week issued on Thursday by Aemet, the Spanish met office, brought good news, at least for the first half of next week.

From today (Friday 12th) to Palm Sunday (Sunday 14th), settled weather and rising temperatures were forecast, reaching 25 degrees on the coast with a light westerly wind.

From Monday to Wednesday of next week's Semana Santa, partly cloudy skies are expected with the possibility of a light shower in inland Malaga province but not on the Costa.

Temperatures should also rise inland on Maundy Thursday.

From Good Friday, a lot more instability is expected with a front crossing the country.

Election campaign kicks off with first party rallies and poll showing likely Socialist surge

The survey also suggests a big vote for far-right Vox and that 40 per cent of voters have still to make up their mind

MADRID. The campaign to win voters' support in the Spanish general election officially started at midnight last night and today, Friday 12th, is the first full day of campaigning.

Ahead are two weeks of wall-to-wall coverage of the campaign that will end on Friday 26 April. Saturday 27th is a day of reflection under Spanish electoral law, with no campaigning, and Sunday 28th is polling day.

A survey published this week by the government-run CIS polling agency was heavily commented on in the media. It showed the PSOE Socialist party as biggest party according to voting intention, estimated to win 123-138 seats in the 350-seat Congreso, the lower house, but short of the 176 majority needed. This would be significantly up on the seats won last time in 2016.

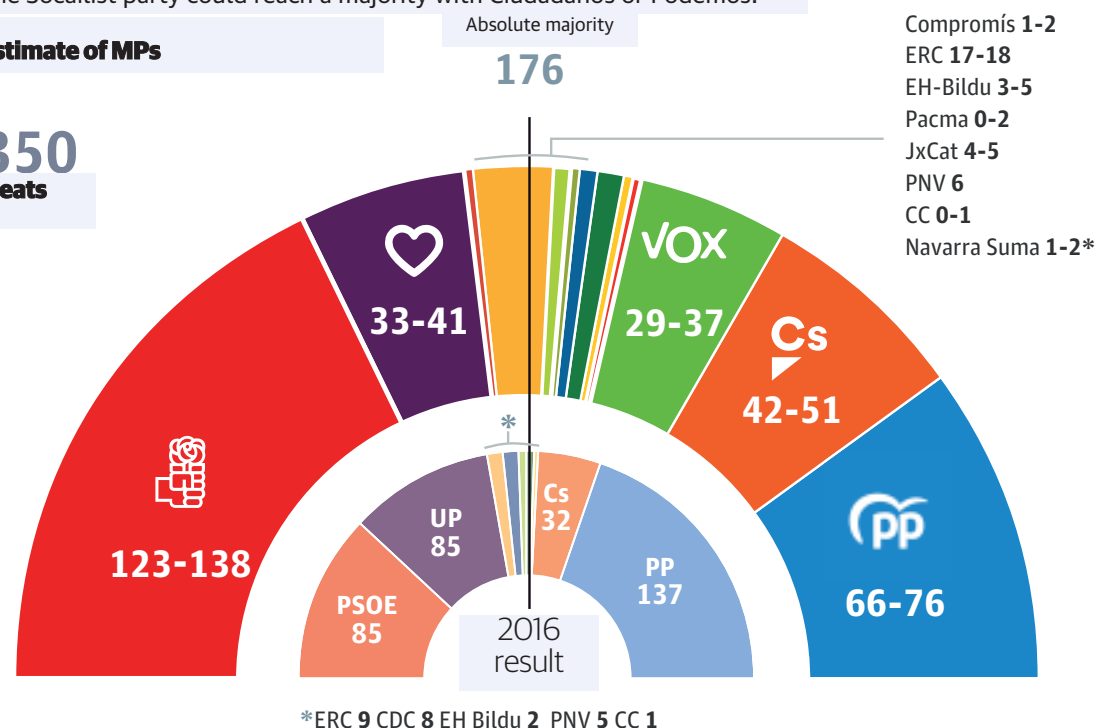
The other main headline from the CIS survey was that the three right-of-centre parties, Ciudadanos, Partido Popular (PP) and

Vox wouldn't have enough to form a majority. The PP, according to the CIS data, would see a significant fall in seats from 137 in 2016 to be-

tween 66-76 this year. The survey also showed that 40 per cent of voters were still to make up their minds.

For last night's launch meetings, all the main parties chose rallies in Madrid, except the PSOE that organised a meeting near Seville.

Government-funded opinion poll sparks controversy over "political bias"

MADRID. Parties on the right questioned the veracity of the CIS official-government opinion poll published this week. CIS (Centro de Investigaciones Sociológicas) is a research agency of the government and its director is appointed with the approval of the prime minister. Traditionally it monitors public opinion.

The current director, José Félix Tezanos, is a senior member of the ruling PSOE party and has faced criticism since the party came into power last summer over a change in methodology used in the poll, as rival parties have questioned his independence.

A senior PP politician said the CIS data was "an electoral obscenity" and had been used by the PSOE "on party lines", in reaction to the apparent collapse in the PP vote in the poll.

Even Tezanos, the poll's publisher, said he was surprised. "I don't think the PP will fall so much. And I have the impression that [hard-right] Vox could do better than the survey says," he commented.

Numbers of UK residents in Spain rose in 2018 despite Brexit

New national population data for 1 January this year shows Spain now has a total population of 47 million again, and almost 250,000 are British, a yearly increase of 2.5 per cent

MADRID. The population of Spain has reached 47 million again for the first time since 2013. According to the national statistics institute's advance figures for 1 January this year, Spain had 47,007,367 people. This represents a 0.6 per cent year-on-year growth and a third consecutive year of increases.

New immigration was the main reason, with 290,573 arrivals, while the number of Spanish na-

tionals dropped 6,186.

The British community increased 2.5 per cent in the twelve months to 1 January, helped by

more people registering for the first time ahead of Brexit this year. There are now officially 249,015 UK nationals "empadronados" at Spanish town halls, by January's data.

Of the total population in Spain, 10.7 per cent are foreign. There was a big rise in the Venezuelan population last year, some 44 per cent, because of the economic unrest there, increasing to 137,589.

The three biggest foreign national groups are, in order of size, Moroccans, Romanians and British. Ecuadorians, who were once the biggest group in Spain, have now fallen into eighth place.

By region, the most populated parts of the country are the same as at the start of 2018, with Andalusia home to the most, followed by Catalonia then the Madrid region. The autonomous regions with the smallest populations are La Rioja, Cantabria and Navarra.

A fifth of jobs in Malaga province are in the tourism sector

The number in work in this key part of the area's economy grew by six per cent last year but only 46% of workers have permanent contracts

MALAGA. A study released by a Costa del Sol planning body has reported that 20 per cent of jobs in Malaga province, including the Costa del Sol, are in tourism. The percentage is a long way above the national average of 13.7 per cent and the Andalusian regional average of 13.5 per cent.

The study by Turismo y Planificación Costa del Sol, part of the Diputación provincial authority, says that in 2018 there were 6.2 per cent more jobs in tourism than a year earlier.

Just over 70 per cent of people in the tourism sector work for companies and the rest are self-employed. Within the tourism sector, hotels, restaurants and bars employ 82,674 workers, according to social security registration data, and 11,680 are em-

ployed in leisure, cultural or sporting activities related to tourism.

Almost eight in ten workers in tourism have Spanish nationality. Just over 80 per cent of all workers in the sector are on full time contracts.

All the subsectors within tourism showed a strong trend towards job

creation last year, with the tour operators and car rental sector recording the highest growth, 10 per cent, and reaching 9,138 employees paying social security.

However, on the downside, only 46.6 per cent of workers in the whole tourist sector have permanent, stable contracts.

Junta: 618,000 taxpayers locally should see bills fall after reform

MALAGA. Almost 618,000 taxpayers in Malaga province, including the Costa del Sol, should see their taxes fall, the Junta de Andalucía has claimed after carrying out a reform to the part of income tax controlled by regional government.

The reduction in the income tax levied regionally on tax bills will be applied gradually up to 2023. From now on only incomes over 20,200

will have the Junta's own part applied, and the starting rate will fall from 10 to 9.5 per cent.

The move, said the head of the Junta's provincial delegation in Malaga, Patricia Navarro, is designed to make it more attractive for companies to relocate to Andalucía, as the taxes paid by companies on their employees' salaries will fall. Andalucía is now only behind Madrid and Castilla y León in terms of Spanish

regions with the lowest regional taxation.

Patricia Navarro also gave more details this week of the effects of the regional government's decision to virtually eliminate the need for direct family to pay tax on inheritance, which in Spain is levied on the beneficiary and not the dead person's estate. Inheritance tax on amounts up to one million euros will be reduced by 99 per cent.

Gifts between family members will also see the tax level brought down by the same amount. For example, a gift of 10,000 euros will now have just a 7.82-euro tax as opposed to 782 euros previously.

PUBLIC ENEMY NUMBER 1?



According to Popular Party (PP) leader Pablo Casado, Spain's prime minister Pedro Sánchez represents a "public danger" to his country. Ciudadanos' Albert Rivera is in agreement, saying this week that it has become a "national emergency" that Sánchez be removed from office. Ahead of what is going to be a general election of incredibly fine margins on April 28th, such hyperbole is to be expected. But Casado's and Rivera's rhetoric paints a misleading picture of a prime minister who has achieved a lot during his stint in the top job.

On the day that the UK's second attempt to leave the EU was supposed to succeed, it's apt to remember that Sánchez's government has worked hard to secure the rights of Britons in Spain and Spaniards in Britain after Brexit. Sánchez passed a royal decree early in March that enshrined in law his plans to preserve British expatriates' access to healthcare and voting rights in the case of a no-deal departure from the EU. Amid all the hysteria, Spain thus emerges as the most progressive country in Europe when it comes to preparing for a worst case scenario - namely, one in which the UK divorces Brussels without any kind of plan in place (although the latest extension granted by the EU, to October 31st, is designed to ensure that that doesn't happen).

When it comes to economics, the minority status of Sánchez's

administration has proved a real barrier to progress (the PSOE holds just 84 seats in the 350-seat congress). The government's inability to pass its proposed 2019 budget was, after all, the failure that triggered the upcoming election. Despite that, the Socialist leader managed to increase Spain's minimum wage by a substantial 22% as of January this year, from €736 to €900 - a raise that will make an enormous difference to many Spanish households.

The same could be said of a decree for which Sánchez secured the approval of a parliamentary panel two weeks ago, and which aims to protect tenants from mercurial and profit-hungry landlords. Such legislation goes a long way towards showing that, when the Socialist leader says that his priority is the lot of average Spaniards, it's not just political posturing (or not entirely, anyway).

What Casado and Rivera really have in mind when they brand Sánchez "Public Enemy Number 1", though, is Catalonia. Both the PP and Ciudadanos leaders are ramping up their criticism of his attempt to start a dialogue with the region's separatists, saying that it undermines Spanish unity; yet they seem to forget - or choose to ignore - that the PSOE leader is as fundamentally opposed to Catalan secession as they are. Far from being a "public danger" to his country, then, Sánchez will prove a hard act to follow if someone new moves into Moncloa after April 28th.

Ambitious garden city project planned inside Gibraltar's port

The 100,000-square-metre residential development, which will also have leisure and retail facilities, is to be called Victoria Keys

GIBRALTAR. Plans were announced this week for an ambitious new development within Gibraltar harbour, west of Coaling Island and in Port waters, which will be called Victoria Keys. The project will involve creating 60,000 square metres of new land, using material from the unsightly 'rubble mountain' on the East side of the Rock for the reclamation, and it will provide 100,000 square metres of residential buildings with leisure, community, commercial and retail use.

According to the plans, Victoria Keys will be mainly pedestrianised, with parking and traffic movements underground. There will be an extensive landscaped promenade, solely for pedestrians and cyclists, along the entire waterfront perimeter, and wide tree-lined avenues running east to west with views across the bay.

If this major project sounds expensive, well, yes it is. However the

Gibraltar government insists that it will cost taxpayers virtually nothing.

A press release from the government says the works will be carried out by Harbour Developments Limited, a consortium of locally-based developers. The reclamation costs will be financed by a Government owned company on a fully secured basis using funds raised from the £300 million institutional investment in Gibraltar.

Once the reclamation is complete,

the Government-owned company will be repaid, with interest, and will also receive a prime site (50% of the southernmost side of the reclaimed plot) with a guaranteed value of £25 million. The government will also receive a 20% share in the equity of the developer.

It will be a while before Victoria Keys becomes reality, however, as it has yet to go through all the town planning regulation and environmental impact procedures.

Thank you very much for your letter [by N. Barker] about Catalonia and Brexit published in the 5 April edition of SUR in English.

I found the letter to be very educational, as a result of your words of wisdom I've come to realise that despite having lived here for 37 years I know little about this country.

I didn't know that Catalonia is partly to blame for Brexit, and I doubt whether many Catalans know that either.

Another 'fact' that I didn't know is that the buoyant economy that Catalonia enjoys is all thanks to Franco, apparently because of investments made by the INI in his time. I think the least you could do is to inform the government of Catalonia of that 'fact'.

I have to admit that in my many visits to Catalonia I have never noticed that in the Catalan social structure "deep rooted and extremely painful damage has been done". No-one has ever mentioned it to me and I go out of my way to enter into conversation with the locals when I'm there.

Your mention of 'charnego' is interesting. Charnego in Spanish is a pejorative or descriptive term used primarily in the 1950s-70s in Catalonia (Spain) to refer to economic

migrants from other typically poorer regions of Spain such as Andalusia or Extremadura. Are you trying to tell us that in that context it is still in everyday use in Catalonia? I think not, I believe that it's only used by a handful of extremists.

My comment about companies having to relocate their registered offices is completely accurate. A total of 3,023 companies moved their registered offices out of Catalonia between October 2nd and December 13th 2017, according to the data gathered by the Spanish Association of Registrars.

The idea came from Rajoy and was designed to cut down the income of the Catalan government. It did not occur to him that damaging the Catalan economy was in reality damaging the economy of Spain. It is my belief that Catalonia was and is part of Spain but apparently Rajoy didn't know. Seemingly a year after the measure came into force it was reversed. Common sense prevailed.

Well, to end, I'd like to thank you once more for keeping me so well informed about Catalan affairs. Your information is invaluable.

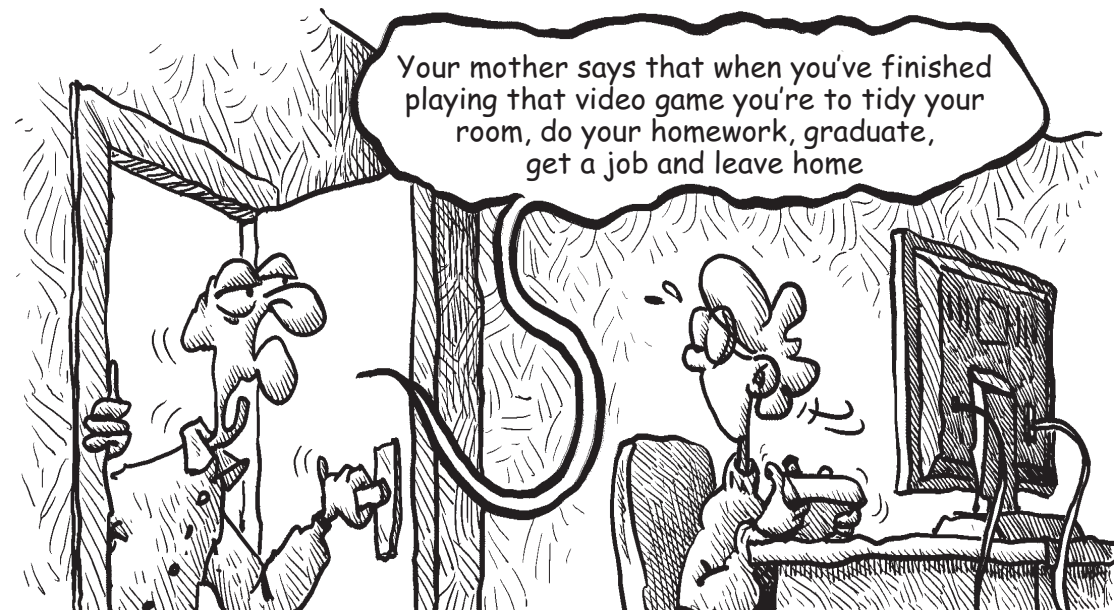

Faced with a new situation that could have consequences for the economy - from the crisis to Brexit, from election results to a board of directors at a bank - we, as journalists, often find we need to call up an economist twice. The first time is so they can predict what might happen; the second, so they can analyse what really has happened and explain what went wrong in their forecast.

Perhaps the cause of so many shots off target can be found among myths and beliefs that have settled down as unquestionable truths in economic science, which were born by chance out of logical reasoning but rarely go from theory to reality.

The fathers of economic science,

from Smith to present day, established their theories based on a scenario that only exists in theory, the perfect competition market. Economics, however is not mathematical but a social science, that is, where the human factor intervenes with all its complexities.

What's more, economic activity itself generates inequalities that alter the framework so that theory and practice follow paths

that sometimes never even meet.

The perfect market of free competition simply does not exist. It has never existed. Behaviour derived from considering that the scenario is real must be permanently checked with another tool resorted to by economists who are less affected by traditionalism, the empirical test.

Well, there is no empirical study that proves that reducing taxes for those who contribute most will activate the economy or have any beneficial effect apart from on the pockets of those directly concerned. The overflow theory, that maintains that when the cup of the most wealthy fills up that wealth starts to spread among the rest of the actors in society, has never managed

to work, apart from as an alibi.

Therefore it is certainly hard to explain why the Andalusian government has made the abolition of inheritance tax one of the highlights of its first months in charge, when the measure only benefits families in which each one of the children inherit a million euros or more. Unless this forms part of a campaign to put an end to the image of an Andalucía plagued by the problem of unemployment, low salaries and temporary contracts, to draw a new picture of a region in which the vast majority of its inhabitants were seriously concerned about the taxes they would have to pay when they inherited a fortune. And now, they are all breathing a sigh of relief.

Rudolf Schenker Guitarist, songwriter and founder member of the Scorpions

After 54 years on the road, the Scorpions founder and guitarist speaks to SUR ahead of the band's gig in Fuengirola in June

MALAGA. "It's all about timing," says Rudolf Schenker, "You have to wait for the magic moment." Before explaining how the Scorpions' story is all about doing the right thing at the right time, the 70-year-old founder of the band proves that he applies this theory to his daily agenda. How long is the interview going to be?" he asks when this newspaper calls him up at the allotted time, "Can you call back in 45 minutes? Then we'll have more time to talk."

Whatever the commitment that would have limited the original call, it was just as well we agreed to wait, because Rudolf Schenker likes to talk. His band, his music, his family, his career that already spans more than half a century, and above all the energy that holds them all together, spill out in a conversation with this German rock star who has found all the answers, and finds it frustrating that others fail to do the same.

The interview comes ahead of the Scorpions' trip to Fuengirola in June when they headline the Rock the Coast festival. Schenker, in his unmistakable German accent, explains that now, after 54 years on the road, the Scorpions only play what they consider to be "fun" gigs and festivals. It's not hard to see why the Costa event fits the criteria - Schenker's relationship with Spain goes back to when he was a child.

Memories of Spain

"My father was a big Spain fan, especially Malaga, and the streets of Granada and of course the Rock of Gibraltar," he explains. He remembers when his family first went to Barcelona when he was nine or ten and how "the next vacation was to Valencia, Tarragona, and then we ended up in Malaga".

As Schenker reminisces about Spain, it's easy to forget that at the other end of the telephone is the heavy metal hero who has toured the world several times over, made 18 studio albums and sold millions of records. Of course, he mentions touring in Spain and this country's "fantastic crowds" at their concerts, but it's clear that his family holiday

memories are those that count.

When he had his own family they also holidayed in Spain. Why? "In Germany half the people went to Italy and the other half to Spain," he explains, as if his was just an ordinary German family who came on holiday and found, as he says, "nice oranges and nice people".

His visits to the Costa continued, especially after his father retired to a motor home and lived for more than ten years on a campsite near Algeciras. "It's like coming home," he says.

Unlike his father though, Schenker has no plans to disappear in his own retirement caravan. When his age - he was 70 last August - is brought up in the conversation, he laughs out loud: "54 years playing rock music, it's amazing!" he exclaims.

When he realised interviewers had started asking more about the past than the future, he looked back and took stock. "I see what we've done - travelling around, bringing people together, having friends in China, Spain, Africa - it's unbelievable."

The weight of 50 years hit home when Schenker came across an old accounts book from 1965 that his mother kept to keep track of the money he'd borrowed from his father

- a loan, he hastens to add, that he paid back in full. This was probably about the time when people were telling him to "find a proper job", as they said the music wouldn't last.

Now he is a father and grandfather himself; "Of course they like the music," he says of his two teenage grandchildren, before proudly talking about his granddaughter's athletics and ice skating success. "They are a gift," he adds. And his life gained a new gift in 2015 when his girlfriend gave birth to their son, who, now nearly four, also finds his father's veteran rocker lifestyle fun.

So where does Rudolf Schenker get his energy from to keep going on stage? "From the audience, from the music," he says. "We get our energy from being on stage, seeing our fans smiling, full of emotion. If you give energy you always get energy back. We want to create a feeling, an atmosphere, where people become one."

As Schenker looks back at the 54-year history of his band it's clear what he means about things happening when the time was right.

In the heyday of heavy rock in the 1980s the Scorpions shared the limelight with bands like Def Leppard, Bon Jovi and Iron Maiden.

"We had parties like crazy; that was a fantastic time but you can't turn time back," says Schenker when asked whether he misses those years.

In the nineties the band's fame in Asia came as the ideal antidote to the damage grunge and alternative music were doing to heavy metal. "We were lucky. We could play in Asia and Russia so we didn't have to suffer," he explains.

It was a project with the Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra, says Schenker, that made them realise just how good their songs were. "We said, 'we have to go back to where we came from'. Then we did our next albums in 2004 and 2005. which were successful, because rock music was in again. It's all about timing," he repeats.

False alarm farewell

The Scorpions guitarist claims that announcing their farewell tour in 2010 was also done at "the right moment", despite them realising later that saying goodbye was the last thing they wanted to do.

The idea that this would be their last chance to see the band live brought old fans out of the woodwork. "It was an alarm clock moment," says Schenker, adding that

these old fans were joined in front of the stage by a new generation the band hadn't been fully aware of. "In 2010 we had over one million on Facebook," he says. Of them, "80 per cent were between 16 and 28 years old. Unbelievable."

So they didn't stop, and five years after announcing their departure they were on their 50th anniversary tour with a new recruit.

"We got Mikkey Dee [ex-Motörhead] in the band and we realised how much fun we still have, so this is why we changed our minds," says the guitarist. "The friendship is still there, the chemistry is right, we have everything we need to give the people the optimum."

Many of the classic songs the Scorpions produced over the years are the result of a different side to Rudolf Schenker that he admits does not fit much with the image of a heavy metal guitarist.

Songwriting

"Meditation helped me create great songs like Still Loving You, like Lady Starlight, like Rocking Like a Hurricane," he says, describing his daily routine back in the seventies as "meditate, compose, meditate, compose, meditate, compose, with lunch and dinner in between".

"If you do meditation you find yourself, and then you are what you are. Everybody is somebody special, but most people don't see it. Most people want to be somebody else," the guitarist explains with frustration in his voice.

Schenker explains that he has always been able to "find my way back home" when others lost their way during the party years of the 80s. "My guitar is black and white - yin and yang. I'm always the kind of guy that goes from one extreme to another," he says, "My good point is that I always find my way back to the centre."

Schenker's meditation is responsible for some of the ballads that, due to their popularity, perhaps eclipse the band's purer heavy metal tracks. The classic Still Loving You had its right moment to be recorded in 1983, seven years after Schenker wrote it, and became the most sold record ever in France, recalls the musician.

"I'm always asked why the ballads are so successful played by a rock band. I say that when a rocker shows his feelings, that feeling in music is stronger - that's the edge. It's like a rose with a thorn," continues Schenker. "The ballads are somehow very, very great, and also fearful."

Now the Scorpions have promised a new album and they'll be going into the studio this spring. No dates have been given though. "We don't want any pressure; we have to be inspired."

So are we likely to hear new songs at the Fuengirola concert? "Everything is possible," says Schenker. "Wait for the magic moment - that's the important point."

Tony Vino Stand-up comedian

The Malaga-born stand-up comedian, Tony Vino, will fulfil his dream when he performs on the Costa del Sol for the first time this weekend

FUENGIROLA. The Salon Varietés Theatre in Fuengirola is to host the third consecutive season of stand-up comedy nights this weekend. The two shows will take place on Friday (today) and Saturday and will again be compered by Dave Thompson, the madcap comedian who found fame as Tinky Winky in the BBC's Teletubbies children's series. Dave will be supported by Matthew Baylis (former story-liner on EastEnders) and Tony Vino, two British stand-ups popular on the UK comedy circuit.

Tony Vino was born in Malaga; his father is Spanish and his mother was born in Scotland, but since childhood, he has lived in the north of England. The former solicitor began working on the comedy circuit in 2005, performing across the UK and internationally. He has worked as a stand-up comedian and comper and is well known for the way he seamlessly mixes well thought-out observational humour with audience interaction.

His non-offensive style of humour mixes social and political issues, which has made him a favour-

ite choice for corporate functions and high profile events for charities like Oxfam, Christian Aid and TearFund. He has also worked with celebrity acts like Jimmy Cricket and Tim Vine, and was once commissioned to warm the audience for the BBC's Songs of Praise, an event he describes as a "low point in my career".

SUR in English caught up with the comedian prior to his arrival on the Costa and he explained how excited he is to be able to perform in Malaga for the first time; especially seeing as his father will be in the audience, along with several of his Scottish relatives.

Is Vino your birth name?

I've slightly shortened my real name for the stage. My full name is Anthony Triviño. Although my dad is from Malaga and lives most of the year there, I grew up in Preston. Even though I'm half Spanish, I sound as northern English as is possible and my ginger hair and freckly skin are due to my mother being from Glasgow.

How did you make a living before becoming a stand-up?

I gave up a lucrative career in law to do this. I studied law and then did a masters in something called Jurisprudence, which is legal philosophy. I worked for a few years and decided that life as a solicitor wasn't for me - much to the approval of my clients.

What made you decide to make a career out of comedy?

Back in 2005, a friend in Leeds started an amateur comedy night and asked me if I would MC it as I had done a lot of acting and liked making people laugh, most importantly; I said I would do it for free. The first night went amazingly

well. In fact, I met my wife that night. We clicked instantly and made each other laugh on and off stage. Fourteen years later we are still together, so who's laughing now?

What is the most bizarre place you have ever performed in?

I reckon it must be performing from the middle of a boxing ring. The organiser of the boxing competition thought it was a good idea to have a comedian on before the fights. It wasn't a good idea. Let's say that I lasted the full 12 rounds but the audience won on points.

Where do you get your ideas for material from?

Sometimes it is random and funny ideas crop up that I jot down as quickly as possible. Other times it is in conversations when people laugh and we've hit a golden seam of comedy that I then think I can work on. Mainly though, ideas

come from intentional thought. I have a discipline where I just write without worrying whether the ideas are funny or not.

How do you practise your new jokes?

Every time before going on (stage) I practise. I suppose it's like a musician playing an instrument - there is always a level of practice needed to stay sharp. I then sandwich new jokes into a performance to try things out.

Are you superstitious?

I wouldn't say I'm superstitious, but before going on stage I have various little rituals that I always need to do or I feel off centre.

Your act has been described as 'socially aware inoffensive fun': how would you describe your sense of humour?

A lot of my humour is derived from wordplay. I like to be silly, and simply for everyone to have fun. My

stage persona is affable and friendly (to mask my true self, which is full of anger and judgement).

How do you feel about performing in Malaga for the first time?

This is genuinely one of my dreams come true. It was on my bucket list. My dad lives in Malaga and for years now I always thought it would be ace if I could get to perform in Malaga and have chance to visit my father.

Will any Spanish relatives come to see you perform?

Apart from my dad, none of my Spanish relatives can speak English, so I don't think it would work for them. Ironically though, I have a load of Scottish relatives coming as they happen to be in Malaga this week.

What can the audience expect at the Salon Varietés in Fuengirola?

Expect the unexpected. There will be jokes, banter, audience interaction, stories, some poignant moments and a good sprinkle of fun.

Your friend Dave Thompson describes you as 'a sharp-witted comedian with a sublime sense of the ridiculous': how would you describe Dave?

A fine judge of comics. Seriously though, Dave is a seasoned veteran of the comedy scene. You know any night he is on that you are in safe hands. He is hilarious, likeable, surreal and quick.

Banderas: "I changed my life and am now doing what I really want to do"

MÁLAGA. Antonio Banderas takes a short break from the auditions, but he doesn't leave through the back door or look for a quiet corner in which to relax. He goes into the corridor where, nervous and concentrating hard, the next hopefuls are waiting to take their turn. He encourages them, wishes them luck, makes them laugh, just as if he were one of them. He always looks directly into the eyes of the person he is talking to. "Now I'm doing what I really want to do," he says firmly to me.

After more than two weeks of auditions in Malaga, Madrid and Barcelona, the final cast of *A Chorus Line* is being decided this week at ESAEM, the Senior School of Performing Arts in Malaga. About 500 applicants have come here to audition, of the nearly 2,000 who

originally applied to accompany Banderas in the inaugural musical at the 931-seat Caixabank Soho Theatre in October.

"I'm finding I have a fantastic problem. There is so much talent and it's going to be sad, because we're going to have to turn down some very good people and that is a painful thing to do," says Banderas.

In order to go ahead with this local project, he has already turned down two films this year, but he doesn't care. The heart attack he suffered a couple of years ago was a warning that made him decide to change his life.

"People live as if they are never going to die, but we all will. And I don't want to die asking myself

why I hadn't done something. When I saw death close up, I thought: I have to do something I really want to do. I started my career in theatre and got into cinema almost by accident, although it has brought me some very good things," he says.

The Malaga-born actor has made 112 films, spent 26 years in Holly-

wood and is now tired of living abroad. "I want to do things in my own city, live in my home and only leave when they need me for work somewhere else," he explains.

When he isn't filming, he'll be found backstage, on stage or teaching a masterclass because, he insists, Soho won't just be a theatre: it'll be a cultural and production centre.

"Our slogan is 'for Malaga from Malaga'. Local people will be the first to enjoy the shows we produce, but we will also have to take them to Barcelona, Madrid, New York, wherever. The idea is to have a stage arts production centre which gives value to the city," he says. "We want people to come, and find out what theatre is all about. Sometime in October we will be here, waiting for them, keen to perform for them on their doorstep, in Soho".

The cast iron plant

A favourite in Victorian times, the aspidistra is undergoing a 'facelift' with new varieties available

A familiar sight in towns and villages during showery weather is at least one pot of a large, leafy plant, stood outside the owner's front door getting a rinse in the rain. Once extremely popular in Victorian Britain, the Aspidistra has never really gone out of favour in Spain.

In Britain, it was about the only plant that would grow inside the dark, gloomy Victorian houses and the only plant that could survive the fumes from gas lighting, hence the common name 'cast iron plant'. However with the advent of electric lights, the Aspidistra fell out of fashion.

It remained a 'forgotten' plant until the 1980s when the genus Aspidistra started to be studied closely and the number of recognised species rose from 7 to 10 in the 70s, to nearly a hundred today.

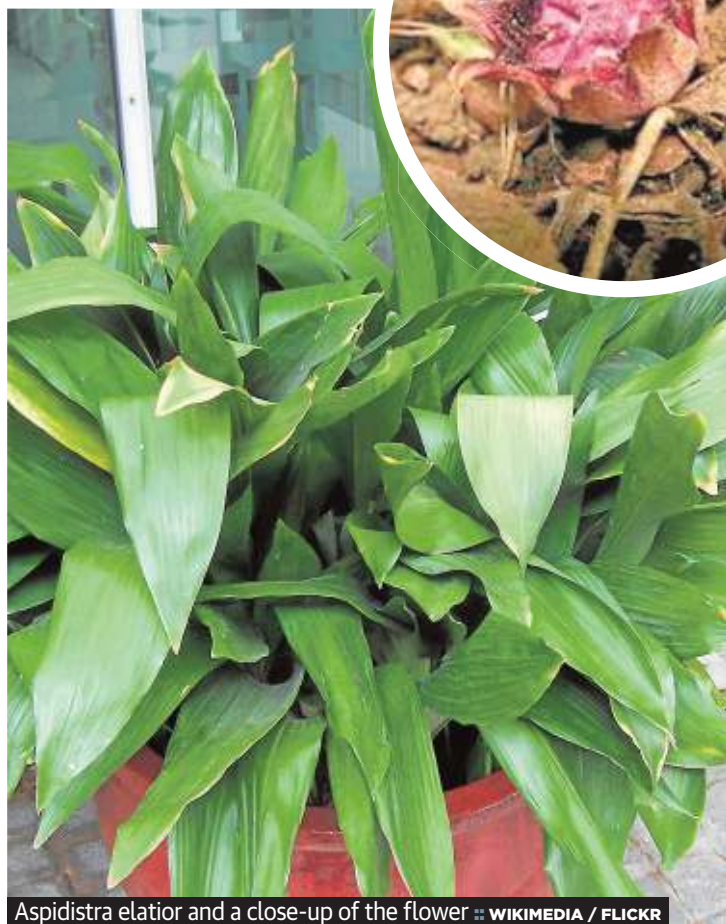
Native to China, Vietnam and Japan, the Aspidistra (named by John Ker in 1822 after the Greek 'aspidion' mean-

ing 'shield') grows in dry shade, under trees and shrubs. Although considered a house plant, it can withstand drought, draughts, below freezing temperatures and neglect. It needs minimum light and a free-draining soil; water logging will rot the rhizomous roots.

The paddle-shaped, dark-green, leathery leaves, 50-70cm long, form on short stems and grow very slowly. This is one of the reasons that Aspidistras are sometimes hard to find in garden centres; it grows so slowly that production is expensive, plus they are still not fully appreciated by many customers. However, nowadays there are lovely variegated species available, striped with creamy-white or butter-yellow or a spotted-leaved Aspidistra 'Milky Way' which is stunning although not quite as hardy as the original Victorian favourite.

Aspidistras will survive under a thick layer of dust for a very long time, some families passing them on from generation to generation. What they do not put up with is too much water or sunlight and root disturbance.

Aspidistras rarely flower, but sometimes a small violet-brown flower appears, resting on the soil although it is often hidden by leaves. It produces one berry which, if the flower has not been pollinated (this is done by slugs and snails in the wild) will be sterile. The only way to successfully propagate Aspidistra is by very carefully dividing it, avoiding any damage to the white stringy roots. This is best done when repotting which is only advisable once every three to four years.

Calliandra are popular plants for bonsai and are suitable for growing in containers. It is not drought resistant and performs best with regular watering.

GARDENING IN APRIL

Transplanting shrubs

Generally speaking, autumn is the best time to move established shrubs, but with this lovely spring rain the soil is soft and if you need to move any, now couldn't be a better time to do it. A plant that is already established is going to suffer some shock if you have to uproot it but to minimise this as much as possible, do it while the weather is cold and damp. Make sure you dig it out with as much

soil around the root ball as possible and avoid breakages, although some damage to the root system is inevitable. Make sure that the hole you have dug to put the shrub in is large enough for it to be at exactly the same level as it was before. Back fill carefully and firm the soil down well. Water in copiously and you may need to keep watering it at intervals, especially in hot dry weather.

WHAT HAPPENED TODAY?

12 APRIL 1931

Local elections led to the Second Republic

A landslide victory for republican and left-wing parties resulted in the king leaving the country and the Republic being declared two days later

On 12 April 1931 local elections were held in Spain for the first time in years, and the result - a landslide victory for republicans and left-wing parties - changed the course of history.

The number of seats on each council was determined by the number of inhabitants. Voting was compulsory, but only men were allowed to vote as suffrage for women had not yet been introduced.

The republicans won by a large margin in the regions of Asturias, Aragón and Catalonia, with a majority in most provincial capital cities. In Bar-

celona they won 75 per cent of the seats.

Out of a total of 80,472 possible seats on local councils, the republicans won 34,368, socialists 4,813, communists 67, and monarchists 19,035, with their best results being in the Balearic Islands and the regions of Andalusia and Extremadura.

Two days later the king, Alfonso XIII, who had come to power in 1902 and had become extremely unpopular, left the country, saying that he no longer had the support of the people. He had been advised that this would avoid violence breaking out.

After travelling to Austria, Switzerland, England and Egypt, he finally settled in Rome, but he only absented himself from Spain: he did not abdicate the throne. On the same day that he went into exile, 14 April, the Second Republic was proclaimed.

The politicians who took over the government of Spain on 14

April 1931 were from several small parties, and the prime minister of the new regime was Niceto Alcalá Zamora. However, he resigned in October after disagreeing with some of the articles in the new Constitution. He was also selected to be the President of the new Republic, a post he retained until the Civil War

began in 1936.

Under the new government, many things changed rapidly in Spain.

It introduced new rights such as freedom of speech, freedom of association and votes for women, legalised divorce and removed the special legal status of the nobility and the Church.

However, when civil war broke out in 1936, the history of the country once again took a very different turn and many of those innovations were reversed.

I have lived with my parents in Spain for many years, and taking advantage of the fact that two years ago I got a stable job, I began to think about buying my own home, so that I could become independent. I saved some money, and applied for a mortgage, but the bank requires me to provide a

guarantor. My parents' house is already paid for, and when I told them my father was reluctant because it is a risk, since they would lose the house if I do not manage to pay the mortgage. On the other hand, he wondered what would happen if he dies (the house is in his name), since he has always said that this house is what he will leave my brothers and me as inheritance. When the guarantor dies, is his obligation with respect to the mortgage cancelled?

No, unless the document that is signed expressly stipulates otherwise. In this case, moreover, if the heirs accept the inheritance, they will be responsible for the guarantee with their present assets and those they may have in the future. Therefore, it is a decision that should be taken very seriously, since, in the event of death, the rest of your siblings will be affected by this decision. In

any case, the most advisable solution in the event of your father's death is for the heirs to accept the inheritance for the benefit of the inventory, that is to say, they accept the inheritance, but have no personal responsibility for the debts that might exist when they receive it, since in any case the debts would be settled with the inherited property.

Last week a policeman fined me for checking my whatsapp messages while I was stopped at traffic lights. I was not driving at the time. Is that legal?

Traffic regulations state that the use of mobile devices or any other communication system is prohibited, unless you do not have to use your hands or head-phones. This also extends to when stopped at a traffic light or traffic signal, as momentary stop is part of the traffic and requires the driver's full attention.

Mijas town hall hosts Press Club journalism debate

A round table talk about investigative journalism, entitled "Is investigative journalism a dying dinosaur?" was the format for the April meeting of the Costa Press Club. At a time when anyone with a smartphone can instantly publish their version of "news" to the world, what is the future for professionals trained to sift information and contrast sources?

This was the topic discussed by local journalists Agustín Rivero, Malaga correspondent for El Confidencial; Damián Ruíz Fájula, freelance journalist (former correspondent for El Mundo); and Mats Björkman, chief editor of Sydkusten, in a discussion led by the Costa Press Club president, Jesper Sander Pedersen. The panellists agreed that professional investigative journalism

is essential and must be fostered, to avoid political censorship or the pressure of big businesses.

Mats Björkman spoke of the recent trend in Spain towards more independent media, funded by subscribers or systems like crowdfunding rather than advertising.

Dutch journalist Elsa Beckman also spoke from the floor about the danger of public opinion being polarised by uncontrasted opinions and "reports" on social media. The consensus was that there will always be a role for the professional media as an impartial watchdog, and to ensure the accountability of decision-makers.

The event, which was hosted by the Mijas Foreigners' Department in La Cala, was followed by dinner at the Restaurante El Torreón.

The campaign for hope in the fight against cancer

The Clínico hospital now has three bells which are rung by oncology patients to celebrate the end of their treatment

MÁLAGA. Miriam Segura Navarro used to dream of the oncology departments of hospitals having bells for patients to ring, to celebrate the end of their treatment. Miriam died in 2017, aged 32, from cervical cancer, and never saw her wish come true. But now, thanks to the provincial board of the Spanish Association against Cancer (AECC), in collaboration with the Clínico Universitario hospital, three 'bells of dreams' have been installed (in the medical oncology day unit, radiotherapy oncology and the phase one clinical testing department).

The Clínico is the second hospital in the province of Málaga to have these bells, following the example of the Costa del Sol hospital in Marbella, which incorporated them last December.

"Through this campaign, my daughter wanted patients to be able to share their joy when their treatment was completed or when

they received good news. The ringing of the bell signifies hope," said Miriam's mother, Concha Navarro. "That was her great dream. This

is for you, Miriam, forever," said Concha, her voice filled with emotion as she rang one of the bells at the official launch of the project.

Miriam Segura was an AECC volunteer and the face of 'La Niña de la Perla' which the association used on its poster for the II Andalusian Congress of Cancer Patients. She had the idea for the 'bells of dreams' in hospitals after seeing one in a hospital in Toronto, Canada, where she had part of her treatment.

The first of these bells, which was bronze and had once belonged to a ship, was installed in the MD Anderson centre in Houston, USA. It was donated by admiral Irve Le Moyne when the treatment for his cancer was completed.

At the launch there were performances by the Crescendo music group before and after the inauguration ceremony.

After Concha Navarro had rung the bell in memory of her daughter, the group went down to the radiotherapeutic oncology department where Virginia and Antonia, patients who had just finished their courses of treatment, rang the bell on their own and then with Miriam's mother, Concha. It was an emotional moment.

Beating the illness

José Antonio Medina said that for him, an oncologist by profession, this was a very special day. "Ob-

viously, I care very much about our patients so I am delighted that we have this bell in our hospital. The AECC deserves our gratitude for this initiative," he said.

Yolanda Lupiáñez pointed out that, once patients have finished their treatment, the bells are a sign of hope for the future.

Oncologist Begoña Jiménez paid tribute to Miriam Segura, saying that she had learned from Miriam that seemingly small details can lead to a better world. "She taught us that if we try hard enough, dreams can come true. Thank you, Miriam, for showing us that," she said.

Pedro González, of the AECC in Málaga, described these bells in the hospitals as transmitting an invisible strength to patients who are undergoing treatment, and said they symbolise the end of a difficult time when the patients are able to ring them.

While she was in Toronto, Miriam Segura wrote in her blog 'Psicococina de Ideas': "The ringing of the bell is very significant and symbolic. The first time I saw it I became very emotional and cried a lot, too. Next week it will be my turn to ring it, and I'll make sure it can be heard on all 23 floors of the hospital."

Madrid arrest reopens euthanasia debate

Ángel Hernández recorded how he helped his terminally ill wife die last week to relieve her suffering

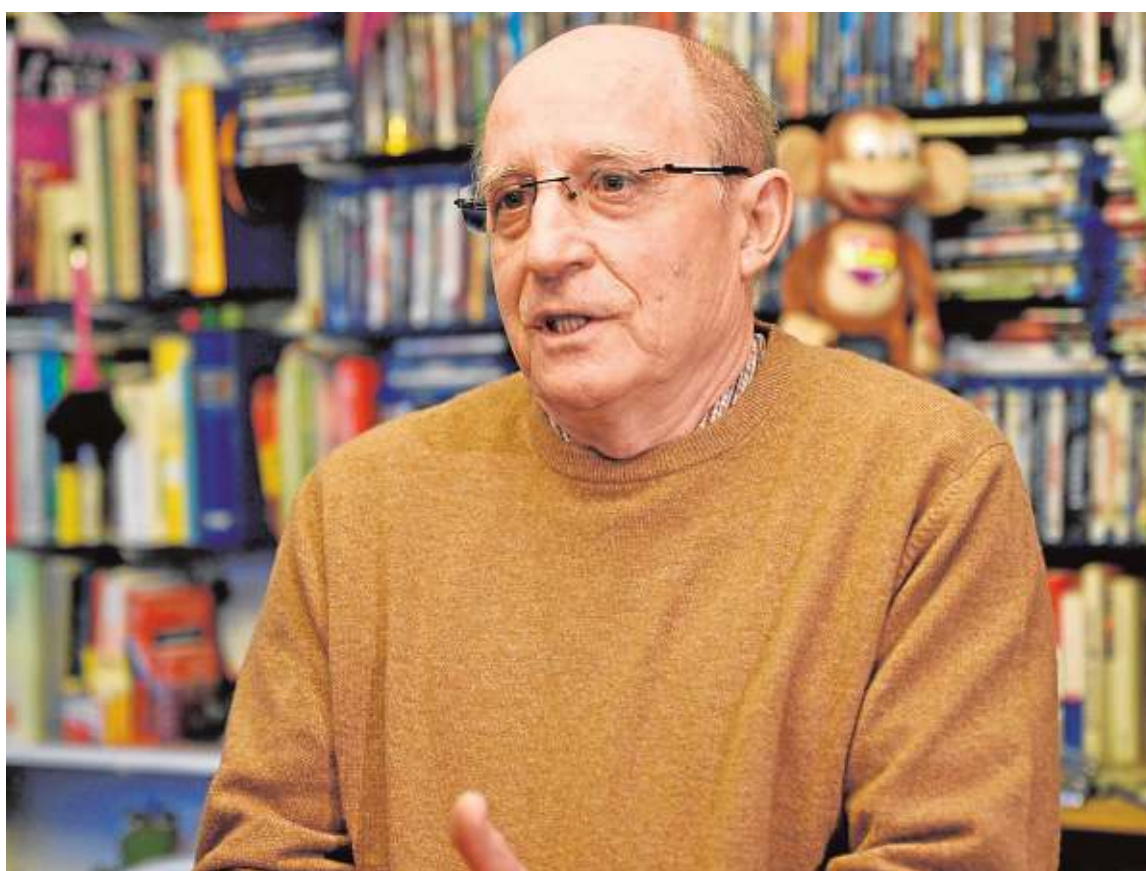
More than 80% of people in Spain approve of assisted suicide, while politicians and the Church adopt their positions with regard to death with dignity

MADRID. For the last three decades María José, 61, had suffered multiple sclerosis. She no longer had strength to move by herself and depended entirely on her husband, Ángel Hernández, 69, who retired eight years ago to care for her. They had decided that he would help her to die and that they would film their final moment together.

"My wife has needed a lot of care over the last years and it has been worse in recent months," said Hernández, who was arrested after María José's death for aiding suicide and later released on unconditional bail.

"[The last few months] have been terrible, she was very unsettled, she suffered a great deal. There was no way of helping and she was terrified of asking me to [help her die]. I said

that if she didn't ask me, I couldn't do it," he explained.

That day, however, the couple went ahead with their plan.

"Well, María José, the moment you've been wishing for has come," he says on the video and she nods. "I'm going to lend you my hands... only because you can't [do it]."

"We had to do it in a way that people could see it," said Hernández. "It had to be documented to show that people suffer, really suffer."

According to the results of a survey revealed at the end of last week by the CSIC (Spain's Council for Scientific Research), between 72 and 88 per cent of the population of Spain is in favour of active voluntary euthanasia and assisted suicide.

The day before the date chosen for María José's death they recorded another video in which she explicitly gives her consent.

The video continues: "First we're going to try with a little water." He offers her a cup with a drinking straw. "Because I don't know if you can swallow, you know? If we see that you can't we'll stop," we hear Ángel say.

"I seem calm, but inside I was like jelly," said Hernández in a TV inter-

view. "I knew that once she passed away, I would no longer feel her, see her, listen to her or talk to her, but for me her suffering was stronger than that."

She puts out her lips in search of the end of the straw, sucks up the liquid and swallows. Ángel picks up a similar cup and holds it for her. This time it contains pentobarbital, the drug used to help people to die in countries where euthanasia is legal.

"It was my wife who found out about it and prepared everything so that, if the time came, she could do it," said Hernández. "She got the medication on internet."

With the lethal formula in his hands the video shows Hernández say: "It's not much but it might not taste nice. Are you sure?"

"Yes," she replies in a soft voice.

No relief from medicine

"The medication did nothing for her," Hernández explained. "I used to give her drops of concentrated morphine, every two hours. I was scared of giving her an overdose, if you can believe it. I didn't want her to die from morphine, because doctors had prescribed it and I didn't want to involve them," he said.

After María José's death hit the headlines doctors released a statement defending their palliative care and political parties stuck to the same positions they adopted months ago, when a euthanasia law was debated with no consequence.

Pedro Sánchez (PSOE) has promised to "regulate" euthanasia if he is elected in the coming general election; Albert Rivera (Cs) and Pablo Iglesias (Podemos) have called for a

death with dignity law; Pablo Casado (PP) has kept out of it, not wanting the issue to creep into an election campaign.

No party spokesperson, however, called for a prison sentence for Hernández, who was arrested for manslaughter by aiding suicide when National Police officers turned up at the couple's apartment in the Moncloa-Aravaca district of Madrid on Wednesday last week.

On Thursday after he admitted the charges in front of a judge, he was released on unconditional bail.

"This has to serve to help the regularisation of euthanasia," said Hernández, aware that he has reopened a debate in which the Church is on the other side.

"Provoked death is never a solution to conflicts, not in the case of abortion or euthanasia or in any other situation," said the secretary general of the Spanish Episcopal Conference, Luis Argüello. "We must defend life, palliative care and oppose therapeutic harm."

The video shows how María José drinks the liquid; the astringent changes her face and she retches. The image skips to the point when her husband says: "Give me your hand, I want to feel the absence of your suffering," as he takes her right hand between his and holds it to his chest. "Don't worry, you'll soon fall asleep," he says, just before she dies.

Andalusian government announces improvements to palliative care

SEVILLE. The president of the Junta de Andalucía, Juanma Moreno (PP), said that euthanasia in cases of terminally ill patients signified a "failure" of the palliative care services offered by the public health service.

During this term of office, he said, his government plans to "expand

and strengthen" palliative care, making sure it is available in all corners of the Andalusian health service and to all ages.

"We're going to work seriously on this," he said, "There is room for significant improvement."

His words came in response to the debate sparked last week by the

case of Ángel Hernández, who was arrested for helping his terminally ill wife to die in Madrid.

In 2010 Andalucía became the first Spanish region to introduce a death with dignity law, which enables people to leave a "living will" to request not to be kept alive by artificial means in terminal cases.

Padel player wins a match point against diabetes

Álex Ruiz talks of his personal experience with the illness

He started the #Soydiabético hashtag on Twitter to encourage and inspire children who also suffer from the chronic illness

MÁLAGA. Álex Ruiz is 24 years old and for several seasons he has represented Málaga in the elite section of world padel. Like many of those who play racquet sports, Álex, from Alhaurín, started playing tennis before taking up this alternative sport. He is currently in 27th place in the World Padel Tour classification and has many active years ahead of him.

Now, however, he has taken a different step to talk about an aspect of his personal life of which most people are unaware, and he wants to use his position as an athlete to help other people. He has revealed that he is diabetic and has suffered from this chronic illness since he was ten years old. He has learned to control it, in order to be an elite athlete.

He has decided to talk about his experience with Type One diabetes for the first time to raise awareness

of the fact that it has not held him back in his career and to demonstrate to children with diabetes that they can lead a totally normal life and not be restricted in terms of sport, as long as they eat properly and keep the diabetes under control.

"The idea came from a friend of mine, Álvaro López, who helps me with social media. His partner's daughter is diabetic, and he suggested that it would be a good idea for me to tell my story," says Álex, speaking from Madrid where he is training for the World Padel Tour in Logroño.

"I have had diabetes since I was ten, so I have had it for most of my life and I wasn't sure how I could help. I have never talked about it before, but they said it would be a way of helping other people who are in the same situation," he explains.

Social media

Using the hashtag #Soydiabético, Álex (@11alexruiz) has started to post videos about his personal experience on Twitter. "There are families with diabetic children who have doubts about whether they should do sport or whether there is any risk of it affecting their sugar levels. My experience is that with good control and

behaving responsibly you can compete at top level with no problem.

"For me, diabetes has helped me to mature, to know my body better, and to know what my needs are at certain times when I'm competing or training," he says.

Álex, who plays for the Adidas Padel Team, admits that he is amazed by the response he has received since his videos were posted online.

"I never imagined they would be so well received, honestly. Reading some of the messages brought tears to my eyes, for example when parents have said my story will be such a help to their child. It makes me feel very emotional. I'm going to try to help the people who have written to me as much as I can," he says.

For the moment he is planning to post a series of videos with anecdotes and advice about how he manages his diabetes.

When asked whether his illness has never affected his performance, Álex is sincere. "I have to control myself much more than other colleagues. It's true that if my sugar level drops my performance is not the same, but that's something I have to live with. It isn't going to hold me back. It's just a case of dealing with it," he says.

“Radiotherapy helps cure 40% of patients with cancer”

Leading international company in cancer treatments GenesisCare has recently opened Andalusia's largest private oncology centre in Málaga. What is this new centre's vocation?

We're very ambitious with this project. As you mentioned, this private oncology centre belongs to international company GenesisCare, which is present in many Spanish provinces with a total of 21 centres spread across the country. In Málaga, however, where there was no previous presence, they have made an enormous effort to create a centre of excellence to provide oncological attention with a difference.

Why is the attention offered at the centre different?

We can say that the differentiating profile of this centre is based on three pillars. First of all, a model of attention that focuses on the patient's needs: accessibility, proximity, extensive timetables, etc. Moreover, it stands out for the multidisciplinary and complementary services, which are now believed to help obtain the best results in oncology. And finally, the third pillar of the centre is most definitely the professional team of renowned prestige. In fact, my mission is to attract the best professionals to collaborate with us and, from the multidisciplinary point of view I spoke of before, allow us

to provide the most beneficial oncology assistance for patients with cancer.

Which treatments does the centre offer?

We apply the latest treatments for each condition, always seeking the patient's well-being and comfort. To this respect it's worth mentioning that our priority is to provide the oncology patient with integral attention. This covers everything from the moment of diagnosis to treatment with the therapy that best suits their needs (radiotherapy, chemotherapy, brachytherapy or surgical interventions with professional collaborators) and, of course, the follow up and monitoring. We want to follow up in a way that makes the patient feel they have someone they can depend on, not only to discover the result of their treatment, but also

to ask about any doubts they may have after it ends.

How important is technology for GenesisCare?

I must start by underlining the fact that, when it comes to radiotherapy, the technology in Spain has in the past been a bit behind compared to other countries in the area. Yet we mustn't forget that the machines don't work by themselves. They need to be handled by professionals with the correct instructions, who know the technology they are employing. And for that, an experienced team is needed that can count on the col-

laboration of the rest of the nursing, technical and physician staff to manage and ensure what is prescribed is correct and brings the results we want. All, of course, with patient attention the priority as we said earlier.

What are the benefits of radiotherapy for oncology patients?

Although for a while radiotherapy had a bad reputation among patients, it is currently the most efficient treatment for this condition. The figures confirm this as 40% of patients with cancer overcome it with radiotherapy.

It's a very effective therapy when used correctly and for the conditions that require it. Thanks to radiotherapy we can treat very localised tumours in a single ses-

sion, especially those in the central nervous system, and with an efficiency rate similar to that of conventional surgery.

For other types such as prostate, breast, bladder or larynx tumours, among others, we can employ stereotactic body radiation therapy (SBRT) which is image-guided and concentrated in very few sessions. This makes it an alternative to surgery with the same guarantees, avoiding many of the usual after-effects. This allows us to have a much wider range of possibilities to guarantee the most suitable treatment for each patient. **Regarding the facilities, what makes this centre stand out?**

The centre is integral and focused on the oncology patient's well-be-

ing. This is apparent in the location itself, in an area that provides privacy and peace. The consultation rooms are very airy and have an area for meetings with patients and families to give often complex information in a friendly manner without a computer getting in the way.

MADRID. Extra virgin olive oils of incomparable quality, table olives marinated the way you only find in Malaga province, premium goat cheeses, exceptional wines, pure craft beers, flavourful sausages and meat products, spices, nuts, sub-tropical fruits, sweets made with local ingredients, preserves, liqueurs and gins, Moringa tree products, infusions with natural stevia, artisan breads and juices as typical of Malaga as sugar cane. This is just a sample of the wide range of products that the agri-food and beverage sectors of Malaga presented at the 23rd Feria Internacional de Alimentación y Bebidas de Calidad, Salón Gourmets which took place at the Madrid Ifema centre from 9 to 11 April.

Sixth year attending

The event was attended by 49 companies from Malaga, 36 of them under the umbrella of the provincial government's promotional brand, 'Sabor a Málaga', (taste of Malaga). This is the sixth consecutive year it has attended the fair with its own stand, aiming to give companies included under this seal of quality the opportunity to find a new niche in the market.

In an attempt to capture the attention of restaurateurs, companies

and distributors, many of the firms took the opportunity to present their latest innovations. Javier Mesa de la Torre, director of the family-run Ingenio de Nuestra Señora del Carmen, in Frigiliana, which has been manufacturing sugar cane molasses since 1728 with the same recipe, commented, "We only know how to make molasses, but that doesn't mean that we are stuck in the past. We have brought new products to the fair such as sweets made from cane molasses, and single-dose packaging, with which we expect to continue winning markets".

Another of the novelties presented on the first day of the Salón Gourmets was a gelatinous sweet

made from an infusion of orange blossom grown in the Guadalhorce valley (one of the largest citrus producing areas in Andalucía) by company Coin para Comerse, and which goes well with Malaga goat cheese as well as pate and toast.

Puente Nuevo, the Ronda brewery, were among the first to present their new lines at the show. "We are the only brewery that ferments our beers underwater, off the coast of Estepona," explained project leader Jenny Heredia. The beer is unique and is made on demand costing between three and six euros a bottle.

"We are hoping to make contact with distributors that specialise in high quality products," she added.

REALLY COOL



There are fewer more bucolic images than those of fisherman relaxing on a riverbank, enjoying the beers they had left in the water to cool earlier. However, unless it is a mountain stream flowing down from cooler altitudes, it is unlikely the temperature will be low enough for the discerning drinker. So what do we do when we want to drink the contents but the bottle needs cooling down before we open it? A crisp white wine or cava at room temperature is ghastly to taste.

The expert will get an ice bucket and half fill it with ice cubes, top up with water, and throw in a couple of handfuls of salt. Guaranteed to bring any liquid down to single centigrade figures in a very short time – providing we have all that equipment to hand – but remember to put the bottle in up to its neck or the first glasses will not be cold enough.

There are those who swear by wrapping the bottle in a damp cloth and putting it in the freezer, but unsurprisingly the cloth acts as insulation, so cooling actually takes longer. It is also worth bearing in mind that a bottle cooled in a horizontal position takes half the time of one that is standing up.

It is really much quicker to cool wine in the glass, so best to keep a tray of ice cubes made from white wine in the fridge, or frozen grapes. In emergency situations

we have to ignore aesthetics and just get the damned thing cold enough to drink. In-glass cooling is fast and practical but deprives the senses of the joy of seeing the liquid poured out. Nevertheless, a full glass put in a fridge will take minutes to cool, and if you use a plastic bag, faster still. Plastic is a better conductor than glass. If we have a competition the winner would be the wine transferred to a plastic bag and cooled in the freezer. But we aren't going to do that, are we? From personal experience the neatest and least complicated solution is to use those plastic gel-filled jackets that slide onto the bottle.

WINE OF THE WEEK

Encina Blanca de Alburquerque

Of all Spanish wine regions, the provinces of Extremadura must be the least attractive scenically. Dry and mostly flat, it is notable for its cold winters and steamy summers, and definitely not the source of great wines. Nevertheless this very unique white wine is unusual to the point of being unmissable, not least for using as many as nine local grape varieties. All of a new experience at around ten euros.

The long (and wobbly) story of gelatine

Moulds and multicoloured gelatine featured in various recipes from the 19th century

Gelatine was once the height of sophistication and demonstrated the status of the host through the food they served to guests

MÁLAGA. If I were to tell you that strawberry jelly was today's dessert, you probably wouldn't think that was interesting. However, if in an upmarket restaurant they suggested that you try the spherification of coulis of red fruit, or the spring dessert with a gel texture and aroma of trifle, that would be different. That is totally normal because although the main ingredient is the same and the three options all use a gelling agent to give them texture, these days the word gelatine sounds more off-putting than a small touch of 'guatiné', while 'agar-agar' or 'alginato' still give the idea of something innovative and therefore desirable.

Haute cuisine is increasingly finding new ways to jellify, thicken and coagulate, but the reputation

of the simple gelatine - the former queen of the dinner table - is heading downhill fast with no brakes, relegated to hospital food or an insubstantial dessert for children.

Ironically, the defenestration of poor gelatine is a consequence of its own overwhelming success. The obsession for textures between mucilaginous and plasticised was a gastronomic fashion at a certain time, but it was also the result of a desire which was largely cherished by any cook with pretensions, whether domestic or professional: the - final! - democratisation of gelatine. The food industry had managed to make one of the most difficult and expensive creations in the history of gastronomy available to all, and Spain went crazy for it, adored it, praised it, spent money on it and, in the end, fell out of love with it through overuse.

But you must understand, dear readers, that before all this occurred gelatine was not only the height of sophistication but also demonstrated the status of a host through the food they served. It was also the definitive proof of the skill of a chef, and one of the most arduous and costly



preparations possible in a medieval kitchen. Laboriously extracted from bones, tissues and other parts of animals, gelatine first needed enormous amounts of ingredients such as cows' feet, deer antlers and surgeon bladders.

Iced substance

Then came a lengthy and tedious process of cooking, clarifying, straining and filtering to achieve a transparent and miraculous liquid which set as it cooled, or 'froze' as they used to say centuries ago. In fact, the words freeze, jelly and gelatine have the same origins in Latin: 'gelatus', meaning cold. Long before the Royal Academy defined gelatine as an "iced substance and available in the form of jelly", used frequently by foreigners and introduced by them, it was already very well-known in the kingdoms of the Iberian peninsula. What happened is that they called it something else.

From 'gelea' to 'jieladina', but also gelata, jelabea, giladea and geladía, these are the names that appear in some ancient recipe books such as the 'Llibre de Sent Soví' (14th century), the 'Llibre del Coch' and 'Libro de guisados' by Ruperto de Nola (published in Catalan in 1520 and in Castilian in 1525) and the Vergel de Señores, which showed how to make all types of preserves (15th century).

Reading their instructions for making gelatine helps us to understand why it became an aristocratic technique, used in wealthy households with enough raw materials and staff to prepare it.

De Nola's 'giladea' was made with chickens, cow and sheep's feet, white wine, ginger, aniseed, cinnamon, pepper, nutmeg, mace flowers and saffron, and the gelatinous liquid was poured over the cooked meat and left to cool down

and set. Gelatine was also used as a preservative, as a thick isolating layer to lengthen the useful life of foods such as fresh fish or roasted meats.

Without a doubt the jewel of our gelatinous gastronomy used to be different, less practical and infinitely more lavish, the supreme demonstration of the shaky and wobbly culture that reigned before instant powders, agars and alginates came into existence.

In the Vergel de Señores book (kept in the National Library and still not completely transcribed) there is a recipe for 'gelea de manos de ternera y de carnero', a jelly made with cow and sheep's feet. It is a multicoloured fantasy of gelatine dyed in different tones which must have adorned many noble tables in the 15th century and was the predecessor to the rainbow-coloured moulds we make nowadays. And also the spherifications, it goes without saying.

Casa Natal hosts Iliad and Picasso works in exhibition

MALAGA. Picasso's birth house (Casa Natal de Picasso, Plaza de la Merced, 15) is now host to an exhibition in collaboration with the Pushkin Museum in Moscow. Until 23 June, the exhibition 'Iliad and Picasso' is open between 9.30am and 8pm, including in the holidays. The show explores works by Picasso

and Iliá Zdanévich (Iliad) and the friendship that formed between the two. Iliad was a French-Georgian writer and artist, who was an active participant in Russian Futurism and Dada. Entrance to the house and the temporary exhibition is four euros, and for either the house or the temporary exhibition only it is three euros.

The head of the Pushkin Museum discusses the two Picasso exhibitions that are in Malaga over the next few months and confirms future projects

MALAGA. Marina Loshak is the head of the Pushkin Museum, one of the most important art galleries in the world, with a collection that exceeds 700,000 works of art. In the next few months, the museum will participate in two simultaneous exhibitions in Malaga with Picasso at the forefront.

- **How many exhibitions around the world does the museum have at the moment?**

- I could not say the exact number, but we are in many countries at the moment. Currently, we have an exhibition in Mexico, we just returned from Taiwan, and we have also been to the National Museum of Tokyo... There have been lots of trips. Our works are always moving from one place to another.

- **What brought the museum to Malaga for these two exhibitions on Olga Khokhlova in the Picasso Museum and the project around Iliad and Picasso in the Casa Natal?**

- We know the two museums very well. We have a great friendship with Bernard Picasso and know the director of the museums (José Lebrero) very well. What's more, it was very important to us to make this exhibition in the Casa Natal, as for us it is something like a sacred place; where Picasso was born. Casa Natal preserves the aura of Picasso, so this project, as well as being informative, also gives a very personal glimpse into the friendship between Iliad (Iliá Zdanévich) and Picasso. It is well known that Picasso was not the most open or friendly person, that he could be selfish at times and that he was very picky when choosing the people around him. He was however a great friend to those he cared about, and this is shown in the exhibition. That's why we wanted to start this project in Malaga, and hope that other museums will host it in the future. For example, we hope that the Pompidou Centre in Paris will hold it at some point.

- **You mention the Pompidou,**

which wants to expand internationally through museums in cities such as Malaga. This isn't a strategy you have taken for the Pushkin museum. What do you think about this strategy that many international art institutions implement?

- It is a wonderful strategy and certainly does not only happen in Malaga. It has its merits, of course, because art and culture are what unite us. However, we will not open branches of the museum in any city outside of Russia. We use projects to take our pieces to where people will find them interesting, where they will be well received.

- **Do you think there are too many museums in Malaga?**

- I think Malaga is a unique place, without any doubt. When I visited the city a few months ago, I was very surprised by everything that has been achieved in such a short time. In Spain, there are wonderful, historical places, and Malaga is no different. I believe that the museums in Malaga are an example of the importance of culture for tourism and the economy of a city.

- **The claim that Malaga uses Picasso excessively as a promotional figure arises often. What do you think?**

- There is never too much Picasso. I guess it depends on how he is pre-

sented, but he is such a versatile artist, there are endless possibilities. In Paris, the Picasso Museum is my favourite. It is one of the most visited places in the city and it is a museum that solely focuses on Picasso. There are few painters in history who offer so many possibilities and who leave a work so open to interpretation as he does. That's why I think it is impossible to abuse Picasso, because there's never too much of him.

- **There are now two exhibitions in Malaga on Picasso. Do you have any new projects on the agenda for the city?**

- We are always working on many projects. We have plans for lots of cities that want to see our pieces and exhibitions, and Malaga is one of those places. People who visit the Pompidou Centre, the Russian museum, the Thyssen, the CAC, all in Malaga, are an audience that would be interested in our other projects. But it is important for people to remember that Spain is not only Madrid and Barcelona. Malaga shows that the culture in Spain is much more than just these two cities. It has become a unique place for culture, so for us it is a pleasure to be able to think about future projects, perhaps not related to Picasso, but related to Malaga.

Few areas of Andalucía immerse themselves so wholeheartedly in the traditions of Holy Week as the Subbética in Córdoba.

In this area, situated between the Guadalquivir river and the north of Malaga province, every one of the towns and villages organises some unique events over the ten days of Easter, and more than a dozen places in the Subbética area will be

competing to attract the attention of visitors who are hoping to see some truly emotional religious and popular traditions.

Villages such as Carcabuey, Almedinilla, Cabra, Lucena, Doña Mencía, Rute, Priego de Córdoba and Iznájar are among those in this area, which is partly protected by the Sierra Subbética natural park and surrounded by an immense sea of olive trees.

Any time of year is suit-

able for a trip to discover the Subbética Cordobesa, but at the moment, with relatively mild temperatures and countryside which is especially green after the winter rainfall, this area in the south of the province of Córdoba is looking at its best.

Spring is therefore an ideal time to enjoy the landscapes and, for those who are able to visit in Holy Week, traditions which date back hundreds of years.

One good example is Priego de Córdoba, which is situated in the Sierra Subbética natural park and rises like an iceberg from an ocean of olives. Together with Lucena and Cabra, its Holy Week is one of those on the Caminos de Pasión tourism route. The processions start on Palm Sunday, and the most popular is on Good Friday, which ends when the image of Christ 'the Nazarene' is carried up the Calvario hill.

Cabra can also boast that its Easter processions are among the best in the region, as it is home to 28 religious brotherhoods that still maintain many of the customs from the 15th century.

Easter week in Lucena is also famous for its historical traditions and processions. Every place has its own name for those who carry the heavy 'tronos', or floats, and here they are known as 'santeros'.

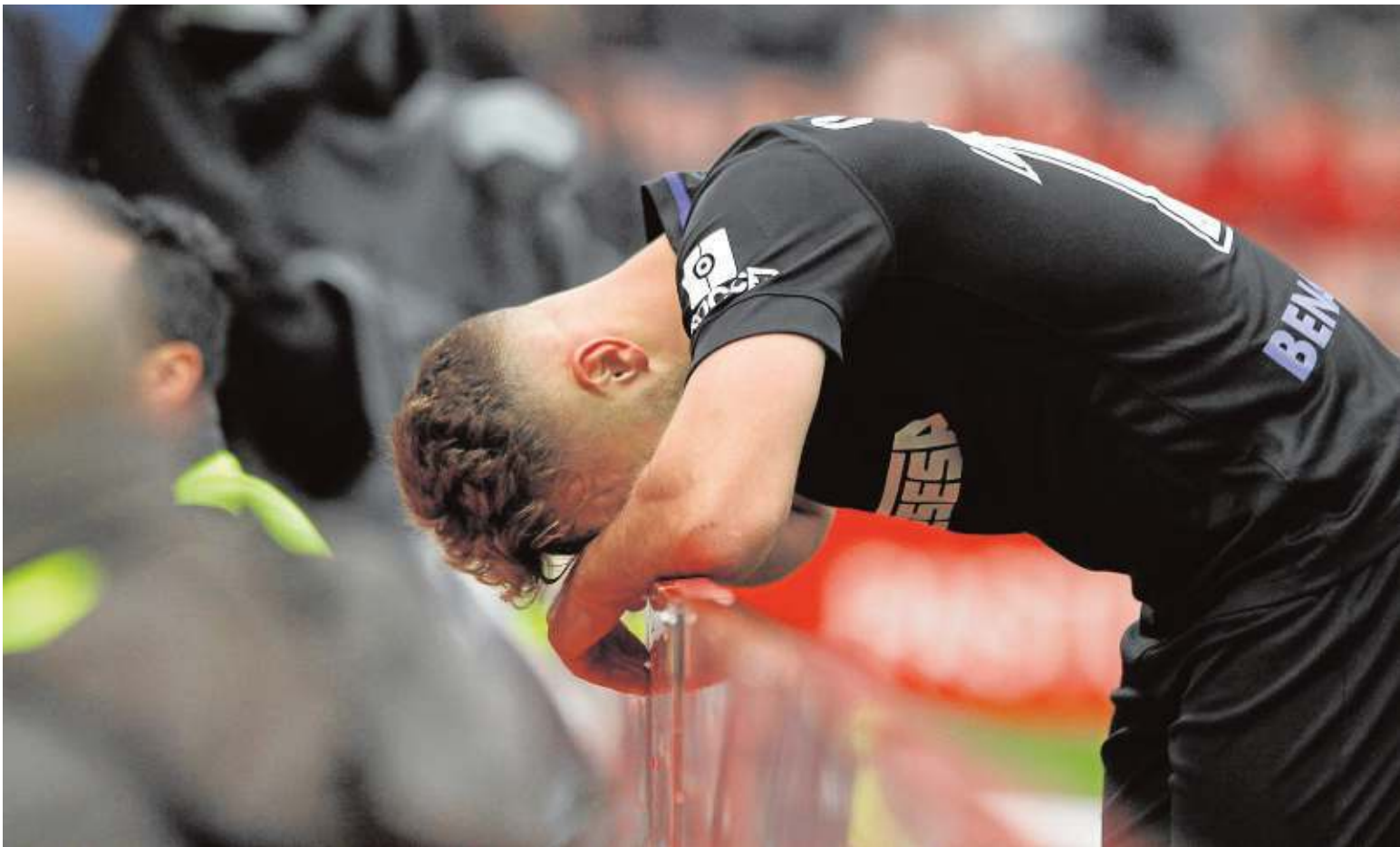

Derby defeat spells disaster for Malaga

Antonio Puertas gave Granada an early lead and the ten-man visitors were unable to recover

The Blue and Whites are now six points off the automatic promotion places with just nine games left to play

MALAGA. Malaga's hopes of returning to the big time via the automatic promotion spots received a major setback as Andalusian rivals Granada marched six points clear of their visitors after an incident-packed 1-0 victory at Los Cármenes on Saturday. It was a dismal day on and off the field for Malaga who failed to adjust to the wet conditions and seemed to be literally caught cold in the opening exchanges. The hosts were clearly in control from the outset and spurned two openings even before getting the go-

ahead goal as early as the fifth minute. Right-back Iván was too slow to get out to Fede Vico who had moved into space on the left flank and had time to size up a delicious cross to the back post where Antonio Puertas had both the speed and the power to beat Federico Ricca to the header and give his side the lead. The goal seemed to have a settling effect on both sides, with Granada contented with their lead and Malaga finally getting to grips with the occasion. As a result, much of the play

However, this new strategy was thrown up in the air just two minutes later when midfield anchorman Alfred N'Diaye received his second yellow card when his loose and high foot caught Fede on the thigh. Puertas thought he had taken ad-

vantage of his side's numerical superiority just moments later when a slide rule pass found him free on the left-hand side of the area to tuck past the exposed Munir. The linesman, however, came to Malaga's rescue and ruled the goal offside. Still chasing the game, Muñoz had few other options available than to move the recently-introduced Mula into an unfamiliar central role and to use his final change to bring in Cifu in a wing-back role to cover the entirety of the right flank. This left the visitors exposed and Fede Vico, left in acres of space, was able to line up a stinging long-range strike which Munir was only able to gather on the second attempt with Puertas following in on the rebound. In stark contrast to the first half, the game opened up completely. This suited Malaga who, playing a man

The Valverde Appreciation Society

The Barça coach has dealt with every issue he's faced with calmness and distinction, yet still doesn't get much recognition

The Ernesto Valverde Appreciation Society is an exclusive club, but membership should be growing rapidly.

The problem is that he looks more like a bank manager than a football manager; he's careful and considered rather than controversial and dramatic.

Actually, after my dealings with some of the charlatans who head up the banks here in Spain, forget the comparison to a bank manager; unlike them I'd trust Valverde with my last peseta.

He's what used to be called a "Mister" in Spanish football after gentlemen coaches were imported from England. The legen-

dary Fred Pentland used to sport a bowler hat. Maybe that's what the Barcelona manager needs to give him some individuality and recognition?

His achievements at the Camp

Nou are chronically unchronicled. Every single article you research on him mentions Pep Guardiola. Damn, even I've done it!

Many say that managing Bar-

celona is easy. They used to say that about Manchester United and Real Madrid and look at the mess they're in after appointing the wrong men in recent years.

Valverde took over at a time when Gerard Piqué was declaring that he felt the club was becoming inferior to Real Madrid. He lost one of the world's great talents in Neymar and had to handle the furore that surrounded the saga. He's overseen the end of the Andrés Iniesta era. He's controlled all of these issues with calmness and distinction.

In short, he has micro managed testing situations and emerged with great success. Last season they walked La Liga and claimed the Copa. This season the title is just about tied up, the club are in the cup final again and have one foot in the Champions League semi-final.

This week he became the first Barcelona manager to celebrate a victory at Old Trafford. Not one headline has been about Valverde. He remains in the background

unruffled, suit uncreased.

He's got Messi, say the detractors. This is true but Manchester United have Paul Pogba, Real have Gareth Bale and Paris Saint Germain have Neymar. None of those players have been bossed. Messi runs the show on the pitch, but Valverde runs the circus.

This week alone Barcelona have seen off their nearest rivals Atlético Madrid and dominated Manchester United. The English club didn't register a single shot on goal. That doesn't come down to Messi's magnificence, it comes down to organisation of outstanding players and their egos.

Remarkably some fans still criticise Valverde and the newspapers yearn someone who will give them more meat to chew on. For them, Valverde is too controlled and organised.

He's not the charming Johan Cruyff or the darling who departed to Munich and then Manchester (see I avoided mentioning him again). It could be that he needs to win the Champions League to receive true recognition.

He's sensible, measured, considered and his work pays dividends. If he ever leaves Barcelona, he can take over my sham-bolic local bank branch!

Jongeneel's Hawaiian challenge

The swimmer from Malaga plans to cross from the island of Oahu to Molokai to raise funds for water treatment equipment in schools in India

MALAGA. Christian Jongeneel, who was born in Rincón de La Victoria in 1974, refers to kilometres way out to sea as if he were going to take a walk through his local district. He is unique even in Spanish swimming, which has accustomed us to so many epic physical and sporting feats that they almost seem normal.

One day Christian crossed the Strait of Gibraltar and, as it didn't seem very far, he swam back again. He has also crossed the Channel from Britain to France, the Cook Strait (New Zealand), did the Al-Assad crossing of Syria, swam the shark-infested Santa Catalina Channel (California), the Gateway of India (Mumbai), gone twice round Manhattan Island in New York (93 kilometres) and even swum from Tenerife to Gran Canaria, 70 kilometres in 16 hours. Best of all, he has done all this for charity, swimming for the Brazadas Solidarias association to raise funds for the Vicente Ferrer Foundation, which is doing great work with the underprivileged in India.

He now wants to raise money to install water treatment equipment in schools in one of the poorest areas of the country, where the children have no drinking water. They contract all types of illness, and some die, as a result. To raise as much money as possible, he is going to do one of the most dangerous crossings so far. In September, he plans to swim between the Hawaiian islands of Oahu and Molokai, about 55 kilometres in one of the most unpredictable seas on the world because of its huge waves and marine fauna. It has a long tradition in Hawaii, but the participants normally row across and very rarely attempt to swim.

Jongeneel analyses this challenge with a cool head, which is

surprising after the challenges he has faced in recent years.

"You never know what your limits are. When I went to New York I had never swum 93 kilometres before and I didn't know whether I would be able to do it. You can't wonder about things, though. You just have to try. When I was about to swim twice around Manhattan Island, the contact I had there shook my hand and said 'See you tomorrow'. That's when it hit me that I was going to be in the water for a whole day. It's often better not to think about things, because if you do it puts you off".

The Hawaiian islands, halfway in the Pacific, are famous for having the biggest and most powerful waves in the world. They are a paradise for surfers and other aquatic sports, but not for swimming out in the open sea. This will be a

major handicap for the swimmer from Malaga, and so will be the wind, but the large population of tiger sharks and white sharks, the

"It's often better not to think about things, because if you do it puts you off," he says about his challenges

most dangerous in existence, could be the biggest problem.

Mentally, he sees these risks as relative. "I have been very lucky in the past not to come across masses of jellyfish, because if that happens you are forced to give up. Once the boat which was accompanying me lost sight of me during the night, and because of that we increased our security measures and in Hawaii I will carry a radio beacon in case I get lost," he says.

How to train?

Jongeneel has already begun to prepare physically for the forthcoming challenge, although he is doing it in his own way. At a time when most amateurs and professionals use advanced techniques and technology for training, his answer is surprisingly normal when asked how many kilometres he will be

swimming to train for September.

"My way of preparing is just to swim a lot and try to find as much time to do so. Until now I have been swimming in the pool, but now I'll start to swim in the sea in the mornings and evenings. Every two weeks I do a five-hour long session. I don't know how many kilometres I'll do. I know people use those watches that tell you everything but I'm very old-fashioned and I'm guided by the buildings along Rincón de la Victoria seafront, the Mercadona tower in Chilches and so on. I don't count the metres. I know sometimes people love to use training apps, and publicise their speed and distance, but I wear the cheapest watch you can buy from Decathlon...I've never been any good at that sort of thing. My way is undoubtedly not the best, but it suits me," he explains.

Last August Jorge Crivillés took 18 hours to complete this same challenge, also for charity, and he gave Jongeneel the idea. "He told me Hawaii was fantastic. The nature is almost virgin and the water is crystal clear. That also poses a risk, because the marine fauna is dangerous. There are a lot of sharks and they come close to swimmers," he says. To minimise the risks, he is thinking of wearing a wristband that repels sharks and equipping the support boat with a similar, more powerful system, although he hasn't decided yet because he fears it might have the opposite effect and attract them.

Jongeneel has already begun the campaign to raise funds for the water treatment plants that the Vicente Ferrer Foundation wants to install in schools in India. Businesses and institutions in Malaga have already shown an interest, but he is also hoping for small individual donations before and during his Oahu-Molokai attempt. "I'm so grateful that people I don't know take part in these projects, and now they can follow them in real time. When you're swimming and you are vomiting and dizzy, the fact that it is for charity makes sense of what you're doing, but so also do these people who collaborate with this campaign. We need lots of people to support challenges of this type."

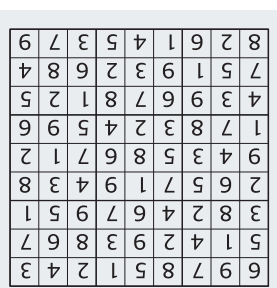

A passion for getting involved

RIOGORDO. Hundreds of local people and actors will be taking part in Riogordo's giant Passion play, El Paso, on Good Friday and Easter Saturday. The Easter story has been performed in the village in this way since 1951; in recent years however the cast has included a handful of foreign residents who are keen to get involved.

This year, the British-German Burke family, who moved to the village in January, have got parts as "woman, man and children of the village". Raaland, his wife Claudia and their two boys, aged nine and six, had "originally thought of be-

ing spectators this year". However, having spoken to long-term Riogordo resident, Leila Lawson, who is heavily involved in El Paso and other village activities, the whole family decided to get involved.

Raaland says that from day one it has been important for the fam-

ily to participate in village activities and they made sure they were at the recent olive oil tour and talk.

Leila herself always participates in El Paso and describes her role as "Woman of Jerusalem, third from the left".

Raaland and Claudia are taking

Spanish lessons and the boys attend the local primary school, although Raaland confesses that he doesn't think they're ready for speaking parts yet. This is probably a good thing, though, as the bigger parts are said to be highly coveted by Riogordo residents.

Other newcomers to the village are Heather Fish, 69, and Sammi Dennard, 44, who are both ballet teachers and originally from London. They have been in Riogordo since last November and, like the Burke family, are keen to embrace the events that take place throughout the year in what they have found to be a "friendly" village. Their role this year, however, will be to photograph the impressive event as they run their own film and photography company.

El Paso tells the story of the life and crucifixion of Jesus Christ in around 17 scenes and has been declared a festival of national tourist interest.

Tickets are 10 euros for adults and 7 euros for children and can be bought on the day outside the ground or in advance from: Rural-Andalus, Tienda Cofrade Nazareno, Cerería Zalo in Malaga. In Torre del Mar from the Pasatiempos bookshop or from Riogordo town hall.
