Local elections could mean all change on town councils

Residents across the country are called to the polls this Sunday as candidates bid for council seats

Less than a month after Spain's general election, the democratic process moves closer to home this Sunday for the municipal ballot. In the province of Malaga, voters in 103 municipalities, including foreign residents, will be electing their local councillors. The number of seats obtained will determine which party, or coalition, will be running the village, town or city for the next four years. Several areas of Spain are also holding regional elections this Sunday. **P2, 6&7**

Gibraltar and UK kick off voting in Euro election

The local and regional elections in Spain also coincide this week with the European parliamentary elections held across the EU. While at first residents in Gibraltar hadn't expected to be able to vote, the Brexit delay has forced the UK to take part.

Following the UK's tradition of holding elections on a Thursday, the people of Gibraltar have already voted, with a turnout reported to be slightly higher than usual. In Spain voting in the Euro and local elections will take place at the same time. **P21 & 22**

Spain goes to the polls again on a super Sunday of elections

ELECTIONS **26 MAY**

Voting will take place for all councillors, Euro MPs and some regional parliaments. Many international residents are entitled to take part in the vote for the town halls

MALAGA. Spain goes to the polls again on Sunday (26 May) for the second time in under a month. With the general election out of the way, this time it is a triple vote in some areas of the country for new councillors, new regional parliaments and Euro MPs.

Some 67,000 council seats in all 8,131 town halls are up for reelection and twelve autonomous regions will choose a new government. In Malaga province, including the Costa del Sol, voters will be choosing councillors in the 103 local municipalities plus their Euro MPs. There is no regional vote here as this was held in Andalucía last year.

Politicians have been campaigning hard ahead of the important votes and before the day of reflection tomorrow, Saturday, when campaigning is banned. April's general election yielded an increase in MPs for the PSOE and a split in the right-wing vote, with the conservative Partido Popular (PP) losing ground, and commentators are keen to see if the same pattern could be repeated this coming Sunday.

Monday was the last day for opinion polls to be published and a survey for GAD 3 showed that in the Euro vote, of the 54 seats across Spain, which is a single constituency; 19-20 would go to the PSOE, up from 14 in 2014; 11-12 to PP, down from 16 now; 8-9 to Ciudadanos; Uni-

das Podemos, 6-7; Vox 3-4.

Although only Spanish passport holders can vote in Spain in national and regional elections, many people of other nationalities living in the country can vote in the municipal elections, providing they were registered on the electoral roll. There are municipal voting rights agreements for all EU countries, as well as for Bolivia, Cape Verde, Chile, Colombia, Korea, Ecuador, Iceland, Trinidad and Tobago, Norway, New Zealand, Paraguay and Peru.

Foreign voters

Candidates to be mayor have been courting the vote of foreign residents as usual, especially in areas with a large proportion of expatriates. Official data shows that 40,000 foreign nationals on the Costa and in Malaga province have registered to vote on Sunday. International

candidates from the qualifying countries can also stand in the municipal election.

Among the larger local town halls where the foreign-resident vote is likely to be decisive in choosing who the mayor and councillors will be are Mijas, where 36 per cent of the local population is not Spanish and the current Ciudadanos mayor rules with a minority of councillors; Marbella, with 26 per cent international residents and a PP mayor ruling in coalition; and Nerja with 29 per cent international residents, where the PSOE leads a left-wing coalition. In addition there are many other towns and villages in Malaga province with significant number of international voters.

Man critically injured after prolonged attack by pack of stray dogs on industrial estate

MALAGA. A 30-year-old man was in a critical condition in a Malaga hospital this week after being attacked by a pack of dogs on wasteground on an industrial estate on the outskirts of the city.

The attack took place at about 2am on Sunday morning when police received reports of several dogs mauling a person. The attack was still going on by the time a patrol car arrived.

Officers found the man on the ground surrounded by five dogs that wouldn't let go of him. They tried sounding the horn of the vehicle to scare off the dogs but without success and one officer got out and fired shots into the air.

Although the dogs stopped biting, it took several more shots before they ran off into scrubland.

The victim, from Bulgaria, was virtually naked and had severe wounds all over his body.

A worker on the Santa Teresa estate has since come forward saying he was attacked the Friday before but had managed to get on to the side of a passing lorry to escape and was less seriously hurt. Others in the area say the pack are strays, but quite territorial, and frequently chase after passing vehicles and scavenge in bins.

Police have now managed to round up the dogs but none are believed to be dangerous breeds.

The first to be caught by lasso was a crossbred Malinois bitch, which at the time was believed to be the mother of the pack. Later the other four were found. Another with two large puppies was then identified as the oldest bitch. A male, a black dog and the most aggressive, was caught last using lassos and nets.



Brits found guilty of coercion, but not of kidnapping missing Latvian woman

The Malaga Provincial Court has sentenced Westley Capper to two years after it considered that Agnese Klavina got into his car under duress, while Craig Ian Porter gets six months as his accomplice

MALAGA. The two British men on trial in Malaga in March in connection with the disappearance of Latvian woman Agnese Klavina have been found guilty of coercion and not of kidnapping as the Prosecution Department had called for.

The court has sentenced Westley Capper, 41, to two years in prison for after considering it proven that Klavina got into his car under duress in the early hours of 6 September 2014 outside the Aqwa Mist nightclub in Marbella. Craig Ian Porter has been given a

six-month (minus one day) sentence for his role as Capper's accomplice.

The young Latvian woman has not been seen since, however the court did not find that the evidence, in the form of CCTV footage, proved that the British pair had kidnapped her.

The nightclub's doorman, who was also accused of participating

in Klavina's disappearance, has been acquitted.

The sentence also establishes a payment of 10,000 euros in damages for Klavina or her legitimate heirs.

Hit and run case

Capper and Porter were involved in another serious incident in Marbella 18 months after the disappearance of Agnese Klavina.

On 9 May 2016, a Bentley, driven by Capper with Porter in the passenger seat, ran over Fátima

Dorado, a 40-year-old Bolivian cook, on a pedestrian crossing in San Pedro. The victim died of her injuries in hospital.

The two men failed to stop at the scene and were later arrested in a commercial centre in Estepona.

In this case the Public Prosecution Department is calling for Capper to be given a two-and-a-half-year prison sentence, maintaining that he was driving under the influence of alcohol and cocaine at 75 km/h in a 40 km/h limit.

Big blow dealt to Strait of Gibraltar drug smuggling gangs in Guardia Civil raids

SEVILLE / MADRID. The Guardia Civil say they have dealt a severe blow to the illegal hashish distribution network in Andalucía. Twenty people were arrested in a coordinated operation this week and hundreds of thousands of euros in cash seized.

Sources close to the investigation said that 300 officers took part in 24 raids early on Wednesday morning in the provinces of Seville, Malaga, Granada, Huelva and Cadiz. In the Campo de Gibraltar area, eight property searches were carried out in Algeciras and Tarifa.

The focus of the operation was the logistics organisation supporting the smuggling of hashish across the Strait of Gibraltar. The Royal Gibraltar Police also helped with the investigation.

Among those held were experts in maintaining the speed boats used to move drugs from Morocco to the Spanish coast.

The Guardia Civil has warned that, because of police pressure on the Strait, gangs are now trying to land their shipments further along the coast.

Relief among Hospital Costa del Sol users as 'excessive' parking rates are scrapped

The underground car park is now in the hands of the Costa del Sol Health Agency after the dispute over its operation was resolved

MARBELLA. As of Monday, the underground car park at the Hospital Costa del Sol in Marbella has been property of the Costa del Sol Health Agency, bringing an end to parking fees considered by many habitual users of the hospital to be excessive.

The car park now belongs to this subsidiary of the Junta de Andalucía. Profits until now had been going to the concession holder for the long-delayed expansion works at the hospital, Concesionaria Costa del Sol SA. The handover took place this week following the Junta's payment of 12 million euros in April to tear up the contract, which had granted the concession holder control of the car park for

40 years.

Since Monday, and for the next two weeks, use of the car park will be completely free. However, it has been announced that once a new operation contract comes into force, users will have to pay one euro per 12 hours.

The car park had been the prin-

cipal cause of the hospital expansion ceasing. The contractors decided to halt works nine years ago after Marbella town hall refused to comply with the Junta's arrangement, turning down permission to install barriers and charge users to park every time they came to the hospital.

Marbella attracting the interest of Marriott for new high-end holiday rentals

MALAGA. The Marriott International group has its eyes on Marbella as a potential destination for its new venture into high-end holiday rental properties. The group's vice-president in Europe, Jenni Benzaquen, told the Efe news agency that "the company is actively searching for opportunities in Marbella and its surroundings, an area which, alongside Ibiza, is one where the group would like to develop its luxury brand in the future".

Benzaquen explained that younger people are now more interested in experiences than buying material objects, thus the brand's new project, Homes & Villas, which will offer 2,000 high-end residences

in more than 100 locations across the USA, Europe, the Caribbean and Latin America.

If Marbella is chosen as a destination, it won't be the only Mar-

riott project in the area. W Marbella, which was presented in Hong Kong last March, is expected to open on Real Zaragoza beach in 2021.

Starlite Festival given the green light with disputes over licensing now settled

MARBELLA. Marbella town hall has granted the necessary permits which will allow the annual Starlite Festival to go ahead.

The annual summer-long show will occupy the Los Nagüeles quarry site in the town for a total of 79 days this summer and organisers will have to pay 125,000 euros for the privilege. These will also be responsible for the construction of all facilities and their removal.

Most importantly, however, permission has been granted for the

space to be open for use until 5am - one of the key demands made by organisers.

This came after a number of clashes with the council in the summer of 2017 during which time there were disagreements over operating hours, leading to the Starlite promoters threatening to pull out of the resort altogether.

This year, the festival will run from 26 June until 12 September and has confirmed acts such as The Beach Boys, Kool & the Gang and Raphael.

Beaches to gain 50,000 cubic metres from La Bajadilla dredging

:: C. M. With high season fast approaching, Marbella town hall has decided to replenish the sand on

many of the resort's beaches.

Some 50,000 cubic metres, dredged up from the mouth of La Bajadilla port will be redistributed onto the beaches of El Faro, La Fontanilla, several in the town centre and El Cable.

The project is expected to take ten days to complete.

Equipment put out to tender for new hospital

:: C. M. A contract worth more than four million euros has been put out to tender to equip the new local hospital in Estepona. The contract covers diagnostic and screening equipment, surgical apparatus and clinical fixtures and fittings. Works on the new hospital finished in December but a concrete opening date has not yet been set. Mayor José María Urbano has said it should be open "by summer".

Caravans reported for blocking historic towers

MARBELLA

:: C. M. Historians and local residents have joined forces to officially complain to the Local Police about the presence of various vehicles, including caravans, blocking entrance to a historic tower. The Torre de Lances de las Cañas, declared an Asset of Cultural Interest (BIC), they say, is "completely blocked" and reflects "the state of the heritage of Marbella: unvalued and not cared for".

Succession tax in Andalucía today

If you live in Spain or have Spanish assets, it is likely that your heirs, or even yourself, will be affected by Spanish Succession and Gift Tax at some point. You need to understand how this tax will affect you and your family, and what steps you can take now to mitigate the impact.

And with recent reforms to the regional Andalusian Succession and Gift Tax rules, first in January 2018 and then in April 2019, you should review the latest rules and update your succession planning if necessary.

General Spanish Succession and Gift Tax rules

Unlike the UK, where tax is paid by the estate before an inheritance changes hands, in Spain it is payable by each person on the receiving end. Spanish Succession and Gift Tax (SSGT) is due if either the asset being inherited/gifted is located in Spain or if the recipient is resident in Spain.

For Spanish assets, tax is payable regardless of where the beneficiary is resident. So if you leave your Spanish property, bank accounts, etc. to children living anywhere in the world, they will pay SSGT on it. For inheritances or lifetime gifts received

by Spanish residents, SSGT applies no matter where the assets are located.

As a general rule, there is no blanket spouse-to-spouse exemption on inheritances or lifetime gifts in Spain. If you are resident here and give any assets to your spouse (who is also Spanish resident), they will pay tax on it.

The reductions under the state rules are just €15,957 for spouses, descendants and ascendants (with an additional reduction for children/grandchildren under 21). This does not include step-children, who usually only receive the same €7,993 reduction as siblings, nephews and nieces, etc. Other heirs – including unmarried partners – may receive no reduction at all.

The state SSGT rates currently range from 7.65% to 34%. With additional charges based on the relationship with the recipient and their pre-existing net worth, taxation can reach 82% in very extreme cases.

Andalusian tax rates and allowances – the latest rules

Each Spanish Autonomous Community has the right to amend

the state rules. Many of them do so in favour of the taxpayer, and *Andalucía* has just introduced more reforms to make the region a very tax-efficient place to live.

Unmarried couples registered as a *pareja de hecho* in *Andalucía* are also included with Group II beneficiaries.

In *Andalucía*, the personal reductions are the same as the state ones above, and tax rates range from 7.65% to 36.5%, with multipliers of between 1 and 2.4.

The main home reduction ranges between 95% and 100%, depending on the value of the property.

In January 2018, a variable reduction of up to €1,000,000 was introduced in the region for Group I and II beneficiaries (spouses, children, grandchildren, parents, etc.). This is for inheritances only (not gifts) and the amount includes the other reductions mentioned above, which need to be discounted from the €1m. Note this does not apply to beneficiaries whose pre-existing wealth is more than €1 million.

Now, from 11th April 2019, a new 99% tax relief has been introduced for Group I and II beneficiaries in

Andalucía. This is in addition to the personal reductions, main home reduction, etc. This effectively means that when your spouse or children inherit from you (or you inherit from your spouse or parent), only 1% of the SSGT bill needs to be paid.

This new 99% tax relief also covers lifetime gifts for close family members. Gifts must be recorded in a public deed by a Spanish notary, and for gifts consisting of cash, money from bank accounts, etc, you need to provide proof of source of the funds.

Cross-border inheritance tax planning

As UK inheritance tax liability is determined by domicile rather than residence – and domicile is an incredibly ‘sticky’ concept – it continues to affect many British expatriates. You could be liable for both UK inheritance and Spanish succession tax on your worldwide estate, although the tax paid in the UK may be deducted from the Spanish liability to avoid double taxation.

The latest Andalusian tax reforms are good news for everyone living in the region. Take advice to understand

how these rules apply to you and your family. The new reliefs only apply to spouses, descendants and ascendants, so if you have other heirs, talk to your adviser about making your estate planning more tax efficient, for all your heirs and to cover UK inheritance tax too.

Foreign residents who want to make a difference in their towns and villages

Last week SUR in English spoke to a number of foreign candidates in Sunday's local election. Here are a few more

"Our foreign residents have my number"

Katie Hallybone Deputy mayor and PSOE candidate, Macharaviaya

The PSOE has been in power in the small village of Macharaviaya for 16 years

MACHARAVIAYA. Katie Hallybone has been a councillor in the village of Macharaviaya for 12 years

and will be standing again, in what will be her fourth elections.

Katie, 36, came to Spain with her family when she was just 10 years old and has made a life for herself in the village. She has worked as a local tour guide and managed the Gálvez museum for over a decade and was approached by the mayor, Antonio Campos Garín, to stand as a councillor in

2007, which is when she won her first seat.

Katie says of her decision to align herself with the PSOE, "The village needed to carry on with the new

socialist party that had got in just four years before, after having in power the PP for the last 24 years."

Hallybone, a seasoned councillor and deputy mayor, says that this

year the PSOE party promises to get public transport to the village. She also says that the local primary school needs a canteen and they need to increase the number of days that a doctor comes to the village.

For the international community, a priority for the party is to continue with Spanish classes and as the only English-speaking councillor, Katie says that she is already the "link" for foreign residents, "all of whom have my phone number," she explains.

Approximately 10 per cent of Macharaviaya's 500 residents are foreign, of which the town hall says around half are actively involved in local politics and likely to vote on Sunday. On winning the elections, Hallybone says, "We are confident that we will be able to carry on working for Macharaviaya."

"Coín must regain its historical identity and value its scenic treasures"

Ralf Pirzl Ciudadanos candidate, Coín

The 50-year-old Austrian feels very much at home in the town

MALAGA. Ralf Pirzl, a Berlin-born telecommunications entrepreneur with Austrian parents, says he had never intended to go into politics. But when, under his presidency, the once heavily-indebted 'urbanisation' where he lives with his wife and daughter became one of the liveliest and most prosperous in the whole area, he was asked to use his leadership qualities for the benefit of his adopted town of Coín.

He agreed and was elected as councillor for the UPyD (Union, Progress and Democracy). Now, four

years later, following an agreement between his party and Ciudadanos, he is the leading candidate for the latter for the 26 May elections.

"Coín has lost its historical identity. In the old town, the jewel in its crown, much more could be done. The traffic is chaotic, it is difficult to navigate around the centre, we don't even have a foreigners' department and the tourist office is an absolute mess," he says.

Pirzl argues that the area's natural beauty spots should be much more accessible and valued "because they belong to everyone in Coín".

"I feel very much one of [the locals]," he adds, "and I've learned that they are much more open than four years ago. But would they choose a foreigner as their mayor?"

Despite his enthusiasm, he has his doubts. But he is ready to take on the challenge nonetheless.

Sandra explains that she is eager to get involved with any movement that is working towards a more sustainable future. "If every town hall got involved with the environment, all the little initiatives would add up to make a difference," she says.

She is standing for Impulsa Ciudad and supports the movement's educational policies, but is also passionate about getting foreigners involved. "In many ways, we don't integrate ourselves." **G. KENNY**

"To ensure the future of the planet, we have to act now"

Parisian Safia Aita has lived in Marbella for past three years, after working for 11 years as a consultant at KPMG. She now dedicates her time to teaching French and doing her best to help the environment.

be involved and be a link for foreign residents. For Rebecca it's the second time she's been on the party's list while this is Sarah's first time. "If we get an absolute majority I would get a seat," says Rebecca. Currently Frigiliana is governed by the opposition PSOE party but has PP councillors too.

Rebecca, 40, has lived in Frigiliana for 24 years and is a business owner. She's originally from Jersey and before moving to Spain permanently she used to visit her grandparents who lived in the village. She says her "ideas and beliefs are conservative".

Sarah, 56, is originally from Cambridgeshire and has been in Frigiliana for 21 years. Like Rebecca, she is also self-employed and says that while she wasn't actively involved in politics back home, she has "always had strong convictions and always voted".

Both Sarah and Rebecca think Frigiliana's PP leader, José Antonio González Conejero, who is an existing opposition councillor, is the "best prepared person for the role of mayor" and that he is clear about the need to get foreigners "more integrated".

This is the first time that Le Coadou has got involved in politics and is number five on the Vox list in Nerja. She says it's the party she "identifies most with" as it defends her "ideas and principles". The French resident decided to get involved in local politics because she

NERJA. Helmut Wiener, 56, an advertising copywriter from Dornbirn in Austria, was a leader of the youth movement of the late seventies and witnessed the birth of the Greens. When he and his family came to Nerja in 2008, he realised very quickly that something urgently needed to be done for the environment in the area. Therefore he joined the recently-founded Los Verdes (The Greens).

For Helmut, the wastewater treatment plant is the top priority for the town. "Until now, none of our mayors has really made this a priority. In addition, the project has suffered because there are different political parties ruling the town, region and country and they like to make life difficult for their political opponents. But thanks to our efforts in mobilising the community, we got the works to resume."



The commissioning of the sewage plant is the most important short-term goal of the election platform Adelante Nerja-Maró, which is made up of Greens, Podemos and IU.

Wiener is also very worried about illegal landfills, mass tourism and beaches.

2022 target set to end dumping of raw sewage in Guadalhorce

Four large pipes continue to pour effluent from towns and villages into the local river basin after years of EU complaints

MALAGA. The new regional government is doing its best to be seen to be moving faster than its PSOE predecessor on the issue of sewage being dumped into the Guadalhorce river.

The Junta de Andalucía is responsible for spending a water treatment levy added to utility bills on treatment plants, and so meeting EU guidelines. But some towns and villages don't have proper facilities.

At the moment, raw and barely-treated effluent pours into the Guadalhorce valley basin via four large pipes and around a dozen smaller ones. The failure to treat the water here is part of an ongoing police investigation into some officials in different local councils. The new head of the provincial office of the

regional environment ministry, Fernando Fernández, has said that the Junta is doing all it can to end the problem. Fernández was until recently mayor of Coín - one of the towns affected.

He explained that the new lower Guadalhorce wastewater plant is

now serving the towns of Álora and Pízarra and will treat Coín's effluent as well "within a few months".

A new Malaga North plant should be finished by 2022, the Junta claims, meaning that waste from Alhaurín el Grande and Cártama can then also be properly treated.

Police search for 83-year-old British man who disappeared last Sunday in Mijas

MALAGA. Police continue to search for an 83-year-old British resident of the Costa who disappeared last Sunday, 19 May, in Mijas Pueblo.

Glyn Jones, who has lived in Mijas for 15 years, was last seen around Plaza Virgen de la Peña,

near to the town hall, wearing a Barcelona football tracksuit, t-shirt and hat.

According to a notice from the QSDglobal Foundation that helps searches for missing persons, Jones has a height of 1.75 metres and weighs 75 kilos.

It is reported that Jones has dementia and can become confused. He is also described as having "a strong Welsh accent" and as being "very kind and funny".

According to information from emergency services, a police search began on Wednesday, led by the Guardia Civil in cooperation with Local Police and volunteer rescuers. The search is ongoing.

Caution on Costa over troubles at Thomas Cook



MALAGA. The hotel sector on the Costa del Sol has reacted this week with measured concern over the financial troubles of leading tour operator Thomas Cook.

Thomas Cook saw its six-month losses to March rise to 1.9 billion euros compared to 283 million euros a year earlier. The firm is currently trying to sell its airline business to help liquidity.

Unlike other areas of Spain, such as the Balearics or Canary Islands, not many hotels on the Costa del Sol rely on Thomas Cook for business, which means the local accommodation sector is not as worried as some.

President of the Costa hoteliers association, Luis Callejón Suñé, admitted that the industry is worried about what might happen but that companies locally were not overly concerned. Hotels working with Thomas Cook were all being paid on time, he said.

"Even so, all the problems of an operator like this affect us as they carry a lot of customers in Europe. However the younger generations already travel via other [booking] channels, so these big groups are being forced to speed up their transformation as tourism is changing in leaps and bounds," he explained.

Delta restarts its daily New York flights

Delta Air Lines restarts its summer flight programme to New York's JFK airport from Malaga today. A daily flight will operate to the Big Apple until September. The airline has been operating the seasonal route for 11 years in code share with KLM and Air France. This year it will use a Boeing 757-200 with 164 seats. It is the only direct flight from Andalucía to New York.

On top of the return of Delta, Qatar restarts services soon, with flights to Doha five times a week and a new Bahrain service is to be launched mid-June.

Jet2 to reach 1 m annual passengers at Malaga

Jet2 Airline will reach the one million annual passengers mark at Malaga Airport for the first time this year.

Last week the airline celebrated the fifth anniversary of its Belfast to Malaga route by offering passengers returning to Northern Ireland from the Costa del Sol a slice of cake at check-in.

The airline took the opportunity to say it will increase seats available by 11.3% this year. Last year, airport data shows Jet2 grew by 16.6% to almost 900,000 passengers. Its holiday arm works with 160 local hotels.

Junta promises funds for new Fuengirola-Mijas hospital

Plans are also to be drawn up for a new health centre for Los Pacos-Torreblanca next year

FUENGIROLA. Regional government spokesman Elías Bendodo last week met with Fuengirola mayor Ana Mula to discuss the future of the long-awaited Fuengirola-Mijas hospital, as well as that of the Los Pacos-Torreblanca health centre.

Bendodo recognised that the town hall had been submitting the same plans to the Junta for the last 40 years and they had been “falling on deaf ears”. However, that is to change, he says, promising to be an “ally” for the town.

For Bendodo the priority is the new Fuengirola-Mijas hospital and the Junta has already taken control of the project even though the town hall is yet to formalise the transfer of the land.

He also announced that the plans would the project would be drawn up in 2020 and that the project would be included in the regional budget for that year.

Next year will also see the project for the new health centre in Los Pacos-Torreblanca drawn up. Bendodo announced that work was under way to equip the health centre in Las Lagunas (in neighbouring Mijas but which will still serve Fuengirola) with an extra ambulance, above all to cope with the increased demand during the summer months.

Bus station

Further infrastructure works are also in the pipeline in the area and

the regional deputy minister for Public Works, Jaime Reynaud, visited the area on Monday to search for a location for the new bus station.

“We have been in opposition for a long time so now we must take the initiative and get things moving again,” said Bendodo, whose party, the conservative PP, took over the regional government in coalition with centre-right Ciudadanos early this year with the help of far right group Vox.

I have received a notification that my car is being repossessed. I stopped paying for a couple of months because I did not have the money, and in the last few months I have been paying as much as I could. Now there is only a small amount of money left over, but I have not been able

to pay the debt so far. Can I do anything to keep the car? I need it to work, and if I cannot work, I will not be able to pay the outstanding debt either.

If you have a lien on your car, the only way to cancel it is to pay the debt. You can try to negotiate with the creditor to have the lien suspended, but in this case where they have already repossessed, it is certainly complicated.

REF. S. N. I.

I am a British citizen, living and working in Spain for years, so I pay all my taxes here. My best friend lives in Romania, and last month she told me that her son, who is my godson, had a serious infection, and that he needed emergency surgery because his life was at risk. The problem was that she does not have public health in Romania, and therefore had to pay for the operation, which

cost about 30,000 euros. She had some savings, and I lent her the rest, about twenty thousand euros, which I transferred from my personal bank account. The child has already been operated and is better, but now I wonder if I can have any problem with the Treasury for having sent that money.

In principle, you should not have any problems with the Inland Revenue for having made a transfer. However, she may have trouble justifying that income, or you may have trouble justifying it when she returns the money. To avoid this type of problem, the best is to declare this amount as a loan between private individuals, which does not involve more costs than the notary to sign the deed. This loan between individuals does not involve interests and is also a good way to have the loan credited, in case in the future your friend did not return the money and you had to claim it.

Prehistoric axe unearthed during Bentomiz castle cleanup

ARENAS. Workers cleaning up the area around Bentomiz castle, near the village of Arenas, have unearthed what they believe to be an axe dating back to prehistoric times. "It is clearly a domestic item dating from the early Bronze Age," the town hall announced in a press release last Friday.

The cleanup project started at the beginning of May with a view to providing better visitor access and signposts to the sixth-century castle, which has been largely abandoned since the end of Spain's Islamic era. The town hall said that work is being undertaken under strict archaeological supervision.

Green light given to Axarquía Muscatel-grape visitor centre

:: E. C. The town hall in Vélez-Málaga gave the green light on Monday to a project to open an Axarquía Muscatel-grape visitor centre in the abandoned San Pitar historical complex in Valle Niza.

The organisation has set the wheels in motion to seek financing from Spain's agriculture and culture ministries as well as the Junta de Andalucía regional government and the Diputación provincial authority.

The aim is to restore the San Pitar area, which is made up of three important historical buildings, including an old quarry from where stone was taken to build Malaga's cathedral, dating from 1727, a church which dates from 1739 and a farm which dates from 1844. A town hall spokesperson said it was important to "maximise the potential of such an important native crop".

Contract awarded to improve pavement and access to El Cantal cliffs

New excavations have brought to light a luxurious, first-century building, highlighting the importance of this Iberian village in the Guadalteba valley

MALAGA. At the very start of their operation, the archaeologists had one idea in mind: they were going to find a Roman wall. This was the first time in 26 years that anyone had excavated on this site near Teba and their disappointment was great. However, the team were eventually able to breathe a sigh of

relief when they realised they had found an urban section of Los Castillejos, the first-century fortified settlement, or oppidum, of this Ibero-Roman site.

"This is not a little house," explained Pepe Berdugo, a member of the Association for the Defence of the Historical Heritage of Teba-Hins

Atiba, who pointed out some large ashlar (finely-cut stones) that gave an idea of the solid Roman construction that was built on the flattest part of the hill.

They have also found paintings, decorated ceramics, remains of fauna and even ivory trinkets.

Experts are more inclined to think

this was once a public building, perhaps either a temple or a centre of economic power in the village.

"What is clear is that we have found a great piece of first-century history," said Francisco Melero, director of the excavations which came to an end last week. It is more than a quarter of a century since initial excavations on the site uncovered the 1.2-kilometre Iberian wall that protects the hilltop settlement.

"Since 1993 we have not excavated anything here despite this being the most important oppidum from Iberian times in the province of Malaga," pointed out Bergudo, who together with the members of the Hins Atiba (Teba castle) association, pushed for these excavations. In the end they went ahead with a budget of 20,000 euros financed by Teba town hall.

The settlement of Los Castillejos is thought to have been most important in the fourth and fifth centuries BC. Its decline has been noted in the first century AD.

"We believed that the abandonment occurred in favour of the nearby Roman settlement of Cortijo del Tajo, but that is no longer so clear because this is a very important construction from that final period and it tells the story of great splendour until the very last moment," explained Francisco Melero, who points to some dark areas on the ground suggesting signs of fire and destruction.

"We still don't know whether the site was abandoned due to destruction or a ritual ceremony," said the archaeologist and director of the dig, who stressed that the abundance of terra sigillata ceramics (fine, red ancient Roman pottery) found, also indicates that this building was a luxurious and central space in the village.

The 50-square-metre space dug out by the archaeologists has revealed the portico of a building with large walls. A flour mill has also been located which would have been used once the area was uninhabited and used for farming.

Los Castillejos offers a journey back in time through this site, which is protected as an Asset of Cultural Interest (BIC). Now, more of its secrets, buried for more than twenty centuries, are being uncovered.







Mercadona, Carrefour, Día, Supersol and the Malaga company Maskom account for 67 per cent of the sales of fast-moving consumer goods in Malaga

MALAGA. In Malaga province there were 660 consumer goods stores (selling food, perfumes, drug store items) in 2018, managed by different operators or distribution chains, some of which work under several names. These stores cover a total area of 482,551 square metres. The sector, which is facing a major transformation due to the need to adapt to online shopping, is clearly led in Malaga province by Mercadona, Carrefour, Día, Supersol and Maskom, which account for 67 per cent of FMCG (Fast Moving Consumer Goods), according to a study carried out by the Retail Data consultancy.

Retail Data is a portal which generates commercial, sociodemographic and economic data for the retail sector, with information in real time. It is run by Raquel Segura, who points out that the retailer Maskom, in fifth place with 49 stores, accounts for nearly eight per cent of the existing sales of FMCG in Malaga province.

“This operator grew by about 8.5 per cent last year, thanks to the opening of two big supermarkets,” he says.

The leader of the supermarket sector in the province, as well as nationally, is Mercadona, owned by entrepreneur Juan Roig. It grew by 1.7 per cent in 2018 compared with the previous year, despite maintaining the same number of stores (88). This is because it has reformed and expanded some of its stores. In fact, its overall shopping space has gone from 117,586 square metres in 2017 to 119,617 last year, so it accounts for 24.79 per cent of the total supermarket shopping space in the province, placing it at the top of the Retail Data list. Mercadona, which has 4,970 employees in the province, ended 2018 at a national level with a six per cent increase in turnover to 24.3 billion and 1,636 stores.

Second place is held by Carrefour, with 41 stores in the province, three more than in 2017, and a shopping space of 58,454 square metres, which is 12.11 per cent of the total. In Malaga, the company Costasol Hipermercados, which is managed by Aurelio Martin, has been working with the French brand since 1997. The CEO of Carrefour España is Eric Uzan.

It is followed on the list by Día, which is currently undergoing a restructuring process. Its executive in Spain is Borja de la Cierva. It is owned by different shareholders, including LetterOne, whose VTO for the chain has been accepted by 57.41 per cent of the shares. Via this route, the company is controlled by Russian investor Mikhail Fridman, who now has 69.76 per cent of its capital. Día has 107 stores in Malaga province and a shopping space of 57,177 square metres. According to Retail Data, it ended 2017 with one store less, but still maintained a share of 11.85 per cent.

Fourth place is held by Supersol, owned by the Lithuanian Máxima –the CEO is Vyginas Sapokas. It has 59 stores in Malaga province and a shopping space of 49,837 square metres (10.33 per cent). As mentioned above Maskom, owned by Sergio Cuberos, is in fifth place.

Raquel Segura points out that the market in Malaga is highly fragmented, because some of the chains work under several different names.

Red faces at Alhambra as data of 4.5m visitors is "at risk of theft"

GRANADA. The Alhambra, Granada's famous palace that is one of the most-visited monuments in Spain, has taken urgent steps to increase data protection on its ticket sales website. The move comes after an online newspaper claimed it was full of security breaches.

El Confidencial said that the personal data of 4.5 million private individuals who have bought tickets in the last two years, plus data of 1,000 travel agents, was easily available to be downloaded using relatively unsophisticated computer hacking techniques. This data included names, phone numbers and emails, said the newspaper.

It also said that a fairly common type of firewall was not in place and that old data was not removed to another server when not required to avoid all information being potentially stolen at once.

The trustees that run the Alhambra, overseen by the Junta de Andalucía, have said that steps to increase the protection of the website have already been taken by the company contracted to run it. It says that "no personal data has been accessed", although it added that there may have been an attempted access between 18 and 22 February.

Gibraltar went to the polls on Thursday for the EU elections

Turnout appeared to be slightly higher than usual throughout the day after all political parties in Gibraltar urged people to use their vote

GIBRALTAR. Electing the members of the European Parliament is still quite a novel experience for voters in Gibraltar, because although the Rock joined the EU (EEC) with the UK in 1973, its people were not able to vote in EU elections until 2004, and then only after a legal battle.

It was after the European Parliament election of 1994 that a British resident of Gibraltar, Denise Matthews, lodged a complaint with the European Court of Human Rights, saying that as a UK citizen her right to vote had been violated. In 1999, in a landmark judgement, the ECHR de-

cidated that as Gibraltar is part of the EU and its people are affected by EU legislation, they should have a say in who introduces that legislation. It also ordered the British government to pay compensation to Ms Matthews for contravening her rights.

Spain tried to block Gibraltar's inclusion through a complaint to the European Court of Justice, but was unsuccessful.

As a result, rather than allow Gibraltar to be a constituency in its own right, claiming that it would be over-represented, the UK government decided to include it in the Southwest England constituency, and that has been the case ever since. Voters in this constituency elect six MEPs to represent their interests in Brussels.

Turnout for those first EU elections in Gibraltar was nearly 58 per cent, but has dropped since to levels similar to those in the UK, which are normally between 33 and 35 per cent.

However, this EU election, the

fourth in which Gibraltar has been able to vote, is different for many reasons, not least because it is taking place with Brexit in the background. Nobody knows whether the elected MEPs will be able to take their seats or whether the British parliament will approve the withdrawal agreement before they are able to do so.


In the UK, many people who do not normally vote in EU elections were expected to do so this time, either because they wanted to boost pro-Brexit parties or to try to reduce their influence in Brussels.

In Gibraltar, turnout was slightly higher than usual during much of the day, with 5,649 people having voted by 5pm. That was 23.9 per cent of the electorate, compared with 20 per cent at the same time in 2014. In the days beforehand, all political parties urged people to go out and use their right to vote which had been so hard to achieve, without suggesting which party to vote for.

The Gibraltar government's Ministry of Culture will be assisting him with funds towards the cost of transporting the artwork to the UK for the Royal Academy exhibition.

Open Day raises £1,500 for wildlife park project

Fears of job losses as bet365 chooses Malta

Being brave to help a loved-one

I have just read the story of Robert and his wife Charlee in this week's SUR in English (May 17th to 23rd 2019).

Words failed me because I was in tears. Poor man. My heart goes out to him and even though he will forever feel "did I do right or wrong?", I and thousands like me would hope we would be brave enough to help our loved-ones as he did.

Explain your situation

I work at a police station as a volunteer assisting people who need help, in particular with their paperwork.

Not infrequently people complain they have been given the wrong information. When investigated it becomes apparent that is often caused by people asking for one thing when they need something else. People often confuse Residencia with NIE and with EU Citizen Registration (green paper). They are not the same. For example: a NIE is just a fiscal ID number and nothing more. It can be issued to anyone from anywhere in the world if they have reason to need it. That includes opening a bank account, buying a holiday property, getting a contract for water, electricity etc. It confers no rights to being permitted to be

in Spain, either temporary or permanently.

Others ask for, say, a NIE or Residencia when, if EU nationals, they really need to register on the EU Citizens Register because they have moved to Spain. Non-EU nationals must obtain a Residencia if they want to live in Spain for over three months, and it is only non-EU nationals who can obtain that; in no circumstances is it an option for EU nationals.

When applying for EU Citizen Registration or Residencia, if one already has an NIE they will see that number on the certificate they receive. If they did not have an NIE, one will be allocated as part of the registration procedure.

To summarise: when you visit the police for paperwork (and this probably applies to other official offices), unless you know for certain what you need, it is much better to explain your situation and ask what you need. That way you will get the right information, saving your time and that of the police staff.

NB: An appointment for any of the three documents I have mentioned can now only be made online, not at a National Police station as hitherto. This is the web page but it is only in Spanish <https://sede.administracionespublicas.gob.es/icp-plus/>



The European Parliament (EP) elections are taking place between 23 and

Tempting, but not worth a jail sentence

26 May, depending on the country; the UK always votes on a Thursday while many other European countries favour Sunday. In Spain they're taking place on Sunday at the same time as the local elections.

Any EU citizen has the right to vote in EP elections, either in their

home country or country of residence. It would appear, however that while completely illegal, it is quite easy to vote in both countries even though countries are supposed to share voter information and take steps to prevent this from happening. It seems that there are varying levels of con-

control on voting activity across the EU and the perpetrator may not get caught. They would be committing electoral fraud though, which can carry a prison sentence under a 1976 EU Act on electoral procedures.

When my Spanish local election voting forms arrived in the post earlier this week (I will be away on Sunday, so not able to go to the local polling station), you can imagine my utter delight when the lists and corresponding envelope for the Euro elections were included along with the local election papers!

The choice of 32 different parties' lists to choose from was, quite frankly, startling. Like local and national elections in Spain, European elections use the Proportional Representation (PR) system and the voter is required

to select a list, pop it in the envelope provided and put it in the ballot box (or take it to the post office in my case).

Not only did I get to vote once, but here I was being given the opportunity to cast my vote twice, in two EU countries! Poetic justice, I thought. Until I looked into it and came across the aforementioned EU election fraud act. I decided not to risk a jail sentence for the sake of a vote and it's a timely reminder to any foreign residents who have already voted in EP elections in their home country, that even if presented with the opportunity when voting in the local elections here on Sunday, not to do so.

However, if you haven't voted at home then you are within your democratic right to do so in Spain.

Harling is heading to the Costa del Sol this week where she will perform as a vocal soloist with Collegium Musicum. The amateur choir and orchestra will present a production of Karl Jenkin's poem Stabat Mater, a 13th century hymn to Mary that portrays her suffering as the mother of Jesus during his crucifixion.

SUR in English caught up with the talented musician prior to her arrival in Malaga and she told of her delight at being able to perform live for the very first time with her sister (Alison Harling), a concertina player with Collegium Musicum. **Do you come from a musical background?**

Neither my parents or grandparents played music, but my big sister Alison is a musician.

You began playing the violin at the age of five: why did you choose the violin?

I would hear my sister practicing all the time and she would take me

with her sometimes to rehearsals and concerts, and I was soon hooked. **Did you think at this stage that you would make a career out of music?**

I think when you have the privilege of watching someone else you admire in your family applying themselves so passionately to something, it makes you think that anything is possible. I can't remember a time of not thinking I would somehow have a career in music.

Why did you change from classical to jazz?

After playing the violin classically up to my A Levels, I suddenly discovered Billie Holiday, Ella Fitzgerald, Frank Sinatra, Dinah Washington, Nat King Cole and Peggy Lee. I started singing along to these wonderful singers and then it occurred

to me; could I actually do this too? **What, exactly, is a jazz singer?** I think it is a singer who uses their voice like an instrument, improvising and interpreting music with a sense of freedom and expression

with a nod to the original composer. **You have your own four-piece band that uses an assortment of household equipment and kitchen utensils: can you tell us about this?**

I have always felt that music is everywhere if you listen hard enough. This was my attempt to take everyday objects and show how much fun can be had with them when you use them for musical purposes. Part of my show is to get the audience involved in playing some of these things and this allows people who may not play instruments to immediately be able to interact and feel a sense of joy through making music. I'm very happy to say that my audiences always leave those gigs smiling and it's largely due to the music they end up making themselves.

You have worked with numerous celebrated artists: is there any particular favourite?

I worked with Talvin Singh recently, which was such a great experience. He really knew how to bring the best out in my voice and violin and was also open to using the beautiful clinking of ships masts in the breeze on Brighton beach, a sound I've been wanting to incorporate

into a track for about 10 years. **You have a long association with dance music, and as a composer, you have written scores for television and film: is there any particular aspect of your career that you prefer?**

I think I enjoy music so much because my career has been so varied. Each new project brings with it new challenges that keep making me grow and change as an artist. One of my favourite things is to start with nothing and create something that didn't exist before, which writing/composing fulfils, but I can't imagine my life without performing, as I love the connection and interaction with other people.

In one sentence; can you explain what music means to you?

Music is everything and everywhere: it is our hearts beating, a bird singing, tinkling laughter or a child crying. It brings us all together and makes us feel a sense of belonging in the world.

Are you nervous before a performance?

Always. I have learned over the years to make my nerves my friends. When harnessed and put to good use they can help to propel your performances to new heights.

Are you superstitious, or are there certain things you do or don't do before a performance?

I am not superstitious, but I like to find a quiet space before performances where I can connect with myself and take a few deep breaths.

Have you performed in Spain before?

I once performed in an old medieval village in some mountains outside Barcelona. It was beautiful there and had a great sense of community. The people there were wonderful and made us feel very welcome.

What can the audience expect at next week's concerts?

They will see my sister and I performing together for the very first time. We may cry, or laugh, or both. We are very excited to be playing Stabat Mater, which mixes elements of classical and world music and includes a diverse collection of languages including Aramaic, Latin and English.

24 MAY 1956

Eurovision is born in Switzerland

Seven countries competed in the event's debut in Lugano, Switzerland, in 1956; Spain didn't take part in the annual festival until 1961

On 24 May 1956 seven countries got together to launch an event that would end up being an annual spectacle with an audience of millions.

The first Eurovision Song Contest, known then as the Eurovision Grand Prix, took place in Lugano, Switzerland, and had seven participants. The event was conceived at a meeting of the European Broadcasting Union in 1955 in Monaco. Members discussed the idea of organising a pan-European version of the popular San Remo Music Festi-

val in Italy.

The contest was broadcast as a radio show although there were television cameras in the theatre for the benefit of the few households that had television sets at the time.

The show was presented in Italian by Lohengrin Filipello. Seven countries performed two songs each in the Teatro Kursaal: Netherlands, Switzerland, Belgium, Germany, France, Luxembourg and Italy.

The winner was the song Refrain, performed for hosts Switzerland by Lys Assia.

The next year Austria, Denmark and the UK joined the competition, followed by Sweden in 1958, Monaco in 1959 and Norway in 1960.

Spain first took part in the contest in 1961, along with fellow newcomers Finland and Yugoslavia.

That first year Spain came ninth

with Estando Contigo sung by Conchita Bautista. The country has only won the competition twice: first in London in 1968 with La La La sung by Massiel; and again the following year when Salomé sang Vivo Cantando.

Spain came second on several occasions - 1971, 1973, 1979 and

1995 - and third in 1984.

At last Saturday's Eurovision Song Contest in Tel Aviv, Israel, Spain was represented by Miki Núñez, with the song La Venda. It wasn't expected to do tremendously well, but the final result, 22nd, was disappointing.

The first winner, Lys Assia, attempted unsuccessfully to represent Switzerland again at the age of 87, but was not selected. She died in March last year at the age of 92.

Dolichandra unguis-cati

The cat's claw creeper is a woody climber with glossy green leaves and bright yellow, scented flowers

A visit to the Jardín Botánico La Concepción in Malaga at any time of the year is always a pleasure and especially now with so many plants in flower. One particular specimen is in full bloom at the moment and will appear to be familiar to many although it is not that common. Dolichandra unguis-cati will look fa-

miliar because it is a member of the Bignoniaceae family and the flowers are characteristic of that group which includes Jacaranda.

Dolichandra unguis-cati is probably one of the most vigorous members of the family, especially in warm

climates with plenty of rainfall. In drier climates it is not quite so rampant and is easier to control. It is a semi-evergreen, woody climber which can reach up to 20 metres in height. The dark green leaves are pinnate and the flowers, which appear from spring and continue through the summer, are bright yellow and are sometimes in groups of two or three. They are lightly scented, especially at dusk.

After flowering, long slim 'bean' pods appear holding between 100 to 200 seeds. The pods turn a purplish-brown when ripe.

Common names include cat's claw creeper and funnel creeper, cat's claw because the vine uses hooked aerial roots with which to climb. It can be propagated by seed, cuttings or by digging up and dividing the tuberous roots. For hundreds of years, Dolichandra unguis-cati has been revered as a cure-all plant.

Despite being very toxic if used incorrectly, preparations made from the bark have been proven to have powerful anti-inflammatory and anti-viral properties. It is also believed to help fight cancer, gastritis, high blood pressure, ulcers, prostate problems, neuralgia, dermatitis, digestive ailments and gout, to mention just a few. A decoction is also used to treat dementia as it is believed to assist memory. In South America it is also used as a natural method of birth control.

The cat's claw creeper is native to Mexico, South America and the Caribbean. It is a prohibited plant in some parts of the US where it is classed as invasive. It is also prohibited in parts of Australia where it is regarded as a threat to natural riparian (riverside) and rainforest vegetation.



The CAC returns with 21st century pop art

The council-owned art centre has reopened with a powerful collective exhibition

MALAGA. Keiichi Tanaami will soon be celebrating his 83rd birthday, Hajime Sorayama is 72 and Harumi Yamaguchi is 78. Because of their age, they may be seen as 20th-century rather than 21st-century artists, until you stand in front of their works and experience their abundant vitality in the use of colour and the way they use subjects which combine tradition with the avant-garde, both oriental and western.

These three Asian artists are among those featured in a powerful exhibition which has just opened at the Contemporary Art Centre (CAC) in Malaga, which after two weeks of closure has 'revived' its cultural life with the collective display titled 'MSD_Make something different'.

It takes a look at 21st-century pop art and at the same time provides an extremely interesting bridge between oriental and western manifestations of culture. It does so with 69 works by 25 artists, including famous names in contemporary art such as Mark Ryden, KAWS, Erik Parker, Todd James and James Jarvis. Two of Malaga's best-known artists, Javier Calleja and Julio Anaya, have also created specific installations for this exhibition, which continues until 30 June.

The works are on loan from different private collections and have been brought to Malaga by gallery owner Shinji Nanzuka, curator of the exhibition, together with Alicia Gutiérrez, who at the opening expressed her gratitude to the private collectors for the free loan of

the works. She also thanked the artists for their commitment to an exhibition which seeks to "maintain the standard which this art centre deserves".

"The idea of this exhibition is to encourage a change of perspective about 21st century art," said Nanzuka.

The two local artists have definitely done that, with their works for this exhibition. Julio Anaya obtained Mark Ryden's permission to recreate one of his paintings on a wall, and has turned it into an enigmatic and interesting trompe l'oeil.

The 'Calleja Chapel'

Round the corner from this, Javier Calleja has a space of his own which could almost be called the 'Calleja Chapel': a corner of the main room where he has combined his large-scale creations with drawings, different canvases and works on paper with an installation which adjoins sculpture with the text on the wall. Without detracting from the other powerful works which surround it, this corner by Calleja on its own makes a visit worthwhile.

"I am really proud to be sharing an exhibition with a group of artists including those who are in my 'Top 5' favourites," said Calleja, before praising the work of the curators and the team from the council's Culture department who managed to set up the exhibition in record time. "They are a group of brave women who are able to keep this exhibition room open when it would have been much easier to have left it closed," he said.







Bajada Romana: 5 hours.

Visits to monuments and museums: 7 hours.



Located at the summit of what is today known as the Salto de la Mora, Ocuri was a city with maximum splendor in 2AD under Roman rule. This historical site, discovered in the 18th century, is a real source of pride for the citizens of Ubrique, which has been celebrating a themed party for a decade now.

Known as the Bajada Romana, the event will begin Saturday 1 June. On this day, early in the morning, numerous locals, dressed in typical clothes from that era, will descend on foot from the Ubrique bus station to the old Ocuri where a road from that time remains.

Once in the old Roman village, visitors can take part in different historical

activities, such as parades, dances, gladiator fights and the staging of slave auctions.

Although these are interesting for people of all ages, the youngest of those in attendance are able to attend a specially-organised workshop which will see them relive the Roman era.

In order to know more about its past, visitors can visit two themed spaces, that are housed in buildings of religious origin. The Historical Interpretation centre of Ubrique is found in the San Juan de Letrán chapel, while the permanent exhibition 'Manos y Magia en la Piel' is in an old convent.

This town, also famous for its artisanal production of leather, is a destination for those looking to switch off, surrounded by mountains and meadows.

Visitors should also bear in mind that the town is shared by two natural parks, Grazalema and Los Alcornocales. This makes it possible to enjoy several footpaths both in its municipal district and in other towns in the province of Cadiz.

If you are interested in religious buildings, there are two compulsory visits: the chapel of San Antonio, located in a unique enclave, and the Nuestra Señora de la O church, the main one in the town.

Eleven competitors took part, preselected by Media&Chef for the quality of their 'ensaladillas rusas', and fought it out in the final which was presided over by a large jury made up of professionals from the gastronomy sector.

It was a hard battle; the Russian salads from Restaurante del Candeado Golf, Matiz, Eboka, Yerbagüena, Jalar, QBO, Santiago, Lereo, La Cayetana and La Antxeta were all worthy of winning.

As in all the previous editions of the competition, the tasting and prize giving took place in the Gourmet Experience high-end food section in Malaga's El Corte Inglés, and the trophy was presented by Leonor García-Agua, the director of the Sabor a Málaga food brand.

IS WINE TOURISM WORTHWHILE?



One of the joys of travelling by car through France's wine country is stopping off at any of the wineries en route to buy a few bottles. These casual sales apparently mount up for winemakers, and now that Spain has gone overboard for 'enoturismo', it must make sense financially.

Taking as an example the well-known Protos winery in Ribera del Duero, last year it had 40,000 visitors at 11 euros per head. Add in what must be a substantial number of purchases from the bodega shop, and the income makes it worthwhile.

Outside the frenetic weeks of the grape harvest, it is easy to die of boredom in a bodega. There is little to do, and even the most reticent oenologist would prefer to spend hours chatting away to some inquisitive backpacker than spend his days mooching around a warehouse full of barrels.

There is no record of when bodegas opened their doors to visitors, but it was probably in Jerez de la Frontera around the 1950s. Although there was no wine tourism then, it was possible to visit several bodegas a week for a year without repetition (there were hundreds of bodegas then). All for free!

Although the average price in Spain is around ten euros, this is likely to increase soon with the building of show bodegas for the

express purpose of attracting visitors. One that has just commenced in Rioja is a multi-million euro investment where the actual making of wine is incidental. Hopefully it will be a long time before we get to the level of some Californian Napa Valley showplaces. At Castillo de Amarosa a visit costs 18,000 euros, but does include a barrel of wine for ageing plus 288 bottles of their best Cabernet Sauvignon, a leather-bound photo album and box of Monte Cristo cigars. Nearer home, the Duval-Leroy champagne house lets the visitors blend their own cuvee for the thousand bottles that will eventually be shipped to their home, for only 40,000 euros.

A life saver produced in Asturias

In the 1980s, the German pharmaceutical company Bayer decided to produce all the acetylsalicylic acid it sells in the world, 20 million aspirins a day, at its factory in Spain

It seems a bit strange that a factory would be called after one place when it is actually located in another, but that is the case in Asturias, where there is a long-running dispute over the Bayer plant. Its official name is Bayer La Felguera, but it is situated in Lada, not La Felguera. In reality, only a bridge over the Nalón river separates the two.

Both places are part of the municipality of Langreo, where the German pharmaceutical set up the business 77 years ago. In 2014 the firm decided it was going to use this plant to synthesise all the acetylsalicylic acid it uses to create its aspirins.

'Aspirin' is the brand name which is commonly used for all preparations made with this active ingredient, in the same way as people refer to 'Kleenex' for all tissues.

Aspirin is what Bayer makes, but there are numerous other companies all over the planet that prepare similar products using the same active ingredient.

Hundreds of lorries leave the fac-

tory at La Felguera - or rather, at Lada - carrying sacks of between 50 and 800 kilos of the powder needed to make 20 million tablets a day, which are sent all over the world. These tablets have also travelled to

the moon, as part of the first-aid kit on the Apollo XI.

This is the only place where they are

made. In the 1980s, the German firm Bayer divided its production between the factory in Asturias and another in Wuppertal, in Germany, where the company first began in 1863.

"The process was much more effective in our factory," says the manager of the Spanish plant, Jorge Álvarez, who has worked in different departments since 1996.

"The quality was the same, but the Germans could see that things were done more effectively here. They called it the 'Carlón process', after Julián Carlón, a former manager of the plant. They decided to close the German plant. It must be said that we are here today because of the people who worked here in the 1940s, 50s and 60s, during the dictatorship, when everything was more difficult.

There were 400 workers then. Today, we have 100 staff of our own and 50 subcontracted from outside companies.

Álvarez has an explanation as to why it is called La Felguera and not Lada, although it won't please everybody this side

of the bridge.

"When Bayer set up here in 1942, all the factories were in La Felguera. There was no room for such a high concentration, and even this area wasn't called Lada then. Although they had to move to the other side of the river, everything in the Bayer factory was in the name of La Felguera, and that's how it stayed," he says.

Things have changed a great deal over time. The German company went to Langreo because of the coal mines and the iron and steel industry, because the acetic anhydride and salicylic acid needed to create the active ingredient were produced from carbon. Now they are obtained from petroleum now.

"This area had economic potential; the industry was the most advanced in Spain, but little by little everything closed down and we and another factory were all that was left," he says.

One member of staff, 57-year-old Tomás González González, has spent all his life there, because he was born within the factory walls, in one of the homes provided for workers.

"Nowadays, things are different, but in those days it was normal for whole families to be employed: parents, children, brothers... my father started in 1949, when he was 19. I started at the same age,

and I've been working here for 38 years. You finished school and came to work here. My sister works here as well," he says.

He remembers the febrile activity when he was a child and used to go outside to play in the same place that his father earned his living.

"Imagine 400 people working here, how busy it was. In the 1960s there was a restructuring and a lot of jobs went, but we are still carrying on while all the other industry in this area is disappearing. I remember as a child that there was noise everywhere, from the mines and the steel factories. All that died, later on. People were unemployed, we were one of the worst-hit areas. All that's left is the coal thermal power plant, which is going to close, and us. And now, our 100 workers produce all the aspirins that are consumed on the planet. In comparison with a multinational we're tiny, but look at our worldwide reach," he says with a certain pride.

The golden age

From Langreo, the acetylsalicylic acid in powder form is taken to the eight centres that Bayer has around the world, in countries with the biggest market volume. At present the USA tops the list, followed by China, which is where they are compressed into pills and soluble, chewable and granulated versions. Later, they are distributed across the five continents.

In Spain, aspirin had a golden age; every first-aid box used to contain it, almost up to the end of the 20th

century. However, the start of the 21st brought with it other names which are now often used in self-medication, mainly ibuprofen and paracetamol, which are also cheaper.

Then came haemorrhages and stomach problems such as ulcers which can be caused by acetylsalicylic acid.

Children's aspirin stopped being prescribed to treat high temperature or pain in under-16s in 2003, because it was associated with an uncommon but serious condition known

as Reye's Syndrome, which sometimes occurs during flu or chickenpox and can even cause death.

With all this, aspirin consumption has been reducing in Spain, although at the factory in La Felguera, which is kept very busy meeting worldwide demand, they are not too worried about it.

As Jorge Álvarez explains, "Acetylsalicylic acid has two applications. On one hand there is its analgesic, antipyretic and anti-inflammatory effect, and on the other hand there's

the way it works in preventing cardiovascular illnesses.

"The second aspect has grown a great deal in this country and elsewhere, while the analgesics are still made but not to such an extent because of strong competition from paracetamol and ibuprofen. However, altogether, our production is still increasing."

Jesús Aguilar, the president of the General Council of Official Pharmaceutical Colleges of Spain, has this to say:

In China and USA there is a strong demand for aspirin, which still breaks records although it has to compete with other products now

“Aspirin is a medication which has been and still is often prescribed in Spain. I have to take it every day because I had a cardiac problem. However, as we have advanced, new molecules have emerged which have more or less the same effect in similar circumstances. Aspirin has beaten all records and continues to do so, as it has for the 120 years of its existence. As you can imagine, thorough studies have been carried out.”

However, he insists that every drug is designed for a specific situation and that is why there are pharmacists, “to explain when paracetamol, aspirin or ibuprofen is best to use, because it’s not just a case of someone having a headache but also other symptoms as well. And then they all have side effects. Aspirin can cause intestinal haemorrhages and stomach problems, but then so can ibuprofen. And ibuprofen and paracetamol can cause kidney or liver damage. Taking medication is important. People should always remember that these are drugs,” he says.

Returning to the factory, phenol

is needed to synthesise the active ingredient. This used to come from coal and now from petroleum, and acetic anhydride, from the same sources. Residues are generated by the processing of acetylsalicylic acid, or perhaps it would be better to say sub-products are generated, and that is the department in which Tomás González now works.

“I’m working on the distillation columns now; the production of aspirin generates residues which are reusable, like acetic acid, a type of vinegar which we don’t consume but sell to chemical companies to use in cleaning or curing leather,” he explains.

At home he rummaged around and found some old photos from where he grew up inside the factory walls. The interiors of the houses, from the time when there was a restaurant and bar for the workers; his mother sitting on the entrance steps;



his father, looking very elegant in his role as head of department; and one of Tomás himself, aged 30, with a beard.

“This factory has always been very important. I know some people in Lada are annoyed that it is

called La Falguera, but it’s only a matter of which side of the bridge you are on. You’re not really aware that there is any difference. It doesn’t matter” he says. He is, however, aware that many wouldn’t agree.

Spain is near the bottom of the European list of palliative care

It has dropped 20 places on the ranking in six years and 60 per cent of terminally ill patients die suffering because of the lack of resources

MADRID. The principal European countries have made major efforts in recent years to increase their palliative care services and specialist units to relieve pain and the emotional suffering of patients and their families at the final stage of their life. However Spain has not opened any new facilities in the past six years, and in some regions the resources have even been reduced.

As a result, the palliative care service provided by the Spanish health system is much lower than the European average, and since 2013 it has fallen 20 places on the ranking that measures the specialist services and units per 100,000 inhabitants, according to the Atlas of Palliative Care in Europe 2019. This is an internationally renowned study drawn up by the Atlantes Programme at the University of Navarra.

In 2013, Spain was the ninth European country in terms of palliative care services in relation to its population and, in fact, was among the best 25 per cent.

Now, it is 31st out of 49 with 0.6 specialist units for every 100,000 inhabitants - the European average is 0.8 - and is in the group of countries among the worst 50 and 75 per cent. The ratio of services is very similar to that of Romania, Georgia, Czech Republic and Latvia.

Same resources

The main reason, according to the coordinator of the Atlas, Carlos Centeno, is that Spain has the same 260 facilities as six years ago. This is increasingly distant from the two units for every 100,000 inhabitants which specialists consider necessary, and which in Europe is only fulfilled by the Austrian health service.

"While those around us have ad-

vanced, we have stood still," says Centeno, who attributes this to several reasons, but especially "a lack of political will", because the health authorities "do not prioritise" adequate attention to these patients nor the increase in resources.

There is no national law regarding palliative care - "so that has resulted in very different situations in different regions" - and the state strategy to improve this type of care is outdated. It was drawn up 11 years ago.

"Stretched to the limit"

This stagnation in developing palliative care in Spain has a dual effect. The number of specialist services is very low, even though demand never ceases to grow because of the ageing population and increase in deaths from non-transmittable illnesses, and the existing resources are "at their limit".

The lack of specialist units meant that 61 per cent of the 130,000 people in Spain who needed palliative care in 2017 because they were affected by pain and severe physical and psychological problems didn't receive it. About 80,000 patients died suffering with a poor quality of life in Spain because of a lack of professional assistance.

This lack of adequate attention and care at the end of adults' lives in Spain is clear, but is even worse when it comes to children and teenagers with fatal illnesses.

Ricardo Martino, coordinator of the Palliative Care Unit at the Niño Jesús hospital in Madrid, says that of the approximately 1,300 youngsters who die in Spain with a clear need for this specialist care, 85 per cent do not receive it.

At present there are ten pediatric

palliative care services, eight at home and two in hospitals, although Martino says, "There is a wave of young professionals putting pressure on politicians to create these units in different regions."

Carlos Centeno is calling for at least

three measures to try to improve Spain's palliative care situation.

Two of them involve training. The first is to create a medical speciality or sub-speciality for this type of care, because Spain is the only major European country not

to have one.

The second, that all Faculties of Medicine and Nursing Schools include palliative care as an obligatory part of the course, so GPs and hospital staff can at least be involved in the care of terminally ill patients whose needs are less severe.

The third demand is to multiply the scarce specialised services. Centeno wants every hospital to have at least one palliative care team (consisting of a doctor, nurse, psychologist and social worker) to attend to all patients and families who need them.

“Within two years stem cells will be used to help the heart recover from a heart attack”

About 300 experts in different specialities recently attended a conference in regenerative medicine and cellular therapy

MALAGA. The use of stem cells is opening a way to the treatment and cure of different illnesses, and this was discussed last weekend at a conference on regenerative medicine and cellular therapy in Fuengirola. The president of the Spanish Society of Regenerative Medicine and Cellular Therapy, Miguel Garber, says major advances have been made in the use of stem cells.

–**Why was Fuengirola chosen again for this conference, after it took place here last year?**

–The first conference was a success, with more than 184 professionals taking part, so we decided to come back to the same place. This time about 300 doctors participated.

–**In which areas are regenerative medicine and cellular therapy used most?**

–Regenerative medicine is multidisciplinary. At the conference we had cardiologists, cardiovascular surgeons, immunologists, orthopaedic specialists, cosmetic doctors and surgeons, etc.

–**What is the main function of regenerative medicine?**

–The objective is to be able to regenerate a patient's organs, so it is no longer necessary to carry out heart or kidney transplants, for example. We're nearly there, but not quite. In the meantime, what we have achieved

with regenerative medicine is treating damaged tissues so they recover.

–**Have there been important advances in curing illnesses with cellular therapy?**

–Yes, there have. In many parts of the world it is already used to cure illnesses. The pharmaceutical institutions are using the stem cell base to generate medication to treat, for example, colonic fistulas in patients with Crohn's disease. It is a development which has been achieved as a result of studies done in Spain.

–**What is still needed, and what do we need to focus on?**

–Although the treatments with stem cells have shown scientific evidence that they do cure illnesses, we need more cases to be analysed to be able to determine that this type of therapy definitely functions.

–**What illnesses could benefit most from regenerative medicine and cellular therapy?**

–Right now, the most important ones concern the joints. Illnesses like arthritis, osteoarthritis, etc. It works well in general on anything to do with joints, and closing up colonic fistulas. Before, it was very difficult to close them and now that has been achieved thanks to regenerative medicine. It is also applied to ulcers on the lower limbs (di-

betic foot) with very good results, and in diabetes. Right now it is being used in cardiology in an experimental manner to prevent cardiac insufficiency. It is also being used for illnesses such as Parkinson's. We still haven't found a way with Alzheimer's, but it is being studied. Another important advance has been with macular illness, and we believe that in future it will be a first-choice treatment.

–**Are there any legal problems in the use of this type of medicine?**

–There are no juridical problems. The legal aspects are the same as those of any profession. The use of stem cells is already regulated.

–**How are these types of therapies applied to cardiology?**

–We are seeing good progress, especially in the cardiology department at the Gregorio Marañón hospital in Madrid, where clinical tests are being carried out. We hope that in the near future we will be using stem cells in patients who have suffered a heart attack.

–**You say you're nearly there, but how much longer will it take?**

–I think it will be less than five years. We are on the final stretch, so I believe that within two years, or maybe less, we will have cellular therapies for heart patients of this type.

–**Is there sufficient research into cellular therapy in Spain?**

–As with everything, there are problems with research. However, there is quite a bit going on, although we need to do much more. The financing for research is always left until last. We're trying to convince the governments that they need to provide more money.

Unicaja women seal promotion to the second tier in dramatic fashion

MALAGA. The project may only be two years old, but Unicaja's women's team are making great strides. Sunday saw the side from Malaga earn promotion to the Liga Femenina 2, the national second tier, albeit after defeat in the most dramatic of circumstances.

Unbeaten until that moment, Unicaja faced Estepona at Los Guindos knowing that fine margins would decide their fate. Following Asisa Alhaurín de la Torre's relegation, the two sides faced off to see who would be Malaga province's only representative in the second division.

Having consolidated the project at youth development level and now achieved a place in the 'silver' division, the club is preparing to embark on an ambitious new project to ensure that they won't just be making up the numbers next year.

The Unicaja Foundation will continue to back the youth teams to ensure that the infrastructure is in place for young players to continue their progression into the first team, but funds will also be made available to bring in higher-calibre players, including an American or two, to increase the side's point-scoring potential.

The new Malaga head coach is imposing a fresh way of playing on the squad and it has resulted in eight goals in four games

MALAGA. Víctor Sánchez del Amo (Madrid, 1976) chose SUR for his first interview since replacing Juan Ramón Muñiz as Malaga head coach during Easter Week.

We spoke to him last week, following the finest showing of his reign so far (a 3-0 win over Real Oviedo) and during an 11-day break as the season approaches its climax.

The former Real Madrid and Deportivo player is undeniably at ease but also convincing in his discourse as he talks about football, but also about politics, sport, books, gastron-

omy and even education, in a three-quarter hour talk held in the Juan Cortés press room at La Rosaleda.

–How many hours do you sleep after a big game?

–The same as usual. I sleep well after games but I don't get much because of the adrenaline... The first thing I try to do is to calm myself down, regardless of the result. Normally we bring together all of the coaching staff, talk a little, relax, then go to bed. But before I do that, I need to watch the game, otherwise I can't sleep. Then I can go to training the next day with

a clear mind, knowing what we need to do to improve. A lot of things can escape your attention watching the game live.

–Have you been surprised by how quickly the players have adapted to this new way of playing?

–Not really. As a coach, when you're out of work it's your responsibility to follow the leagues you might eventually get involved with. That means we came here with a good knowledge of the team which means our hopes and expectations were very high. I believe we have the best squad in Segunda and I have witnessed this from day one. It's a great group, on both personal and professional levels.

–You were an assistant to Michel at various clubs as you started off in coaching. Given that he was here just a few months ago, did you speak to him before you arrived?

–No. At the end of the day, the information that you can get about a club can be biased. We analysed the team from a football point of view and that is the most interesting to us, with regards to our ideas and philosophy. Besides that, you can get information about the structure of the club, and so on, but that comes second.

–Michel told this paper that Javi Ontiveros, in his view, was a "raw talent" who could turn a game on its head. What do you think of him?

–He is a unique player who anyone who sees him play will fall in love with. He has tremendous balance and elegance. He does very difficult things with a football and that is what captures our attention. This potential, this talent... we have to harness it. This is something I love to do as a coach. The most important thing is for him to deliver consistently.

–Everyone says that if Ontiveros is

playing well, Malaga will go up. Is that how you see it?

–There are a lot of factors which can influence performances. We will never build our team around just one player. We love having individuals like Javi but we must look at the collective.

–In Cadiz (1-1, 6 May), the defenders passed the ball back to Munir on 64 occasions and Malaga had some issues getting going against Oviedo too.

–I realise that when people see you passing the ball around the back it starts to create nerves for those on the outside. However, we want to be brave in the way we play. Doing this allows us to attract the press of the opposition and open spaces up for us to create chances. We saw it in Alcorcón, when we played Mallorca and we'll continue seeing it. Opponents will realise this and sit deep and wait but it's all part of the tactical battle.

–This is why David Lombán has come into the team. He's good on the ball. But last Monday Luis Hernández played and put on a great defensive display. These are the sort of problems coaches like to have, aren't they?

–Of course. It's not a problem; it's the opposite. The level of the players has been exceptional. You can see the players who've been on the field but you can't see those who have been training. The level that we are seeing is a result of the competition between the players to make the squad every week. And we've not mentioned [youth player] Keidi [Bare] yet. He's done exceptionally well to adapt to the new role we've given him. Alfred [N'Diaye] can also play there and he is adapting well to our ideas, as well as the goalkeepers. We've been asking them to do things a bit differently from a positional and a distribution viewpoint and the response has been sensational.

–You've spoken about N'Diaye who against Oviedo probably gave his best performance of the season. But he could miss the play-offs if he is selected for the African Cup of Nations. How do you view the situation?

–They have to take into account how this affects professional teams who have made a considerable investment



in these players and who are being deprived of them at crucial moments. I know it's not easy to fit everything in but they have to keep us in mind. **-Does it worry you that you won't have had a game in 11 days when you play Zaragoza [on Friday]?**

-The idea is that we will train and focus on tactical training. Not playing will help us to avoid the risk of injury and suspension and help us to prepare in the best possible way for Zaragoza.

-Several people have started to think that if you're going to be without Munir for the play-offs - that you might consider giving his potential replacement a run-out...

-We are focused on winning every game and so we will choose whoever we think is the best for each game.

-Malaga have struggled to score goals this year. Do you think the contribution from midfield will be decisive?

-Any analysis that we do will always be relative. A lack of goals will always be a problem for a team looking to go up. That said, now we've scored eight goals in four games. The change in the way we play and in the creation of chances means that our players have many more options to score. What's more, at the other end the opposition are creating fewer and lower-quality chances.

-You've never contested a play-off, either as a player or a coach. Is that right?

-I've played and coached in many two-legged knock-out games in the Copa [del Rey] and in the Champions League... I don't see how this is any different.

-In this case it would come after 42 match days, with all of the players desperate to go on their holidays.

-We are ready for whatever comes our way. You can see that in the team.

-How are the seven players who are fasting for Ramadan coping?

-The players are very professional and this is nothing new for them. In the mornings there's no problem. They have two meals: one at night and one first thing in the morning. This means that they have energy for training then they go home to rest until night. It's more complicated on match days. Last Monday, Munir followed it strictly all day but keepers

-You've come to Malaga on your own, right?

-Yes, but my wife has just come to spend a few days here. They live in Madrid and they will stay there because my children's education [he has a 16-year-old son and a 12-year-old daughter] is the most important thing. As a coach, you have to be prepared for these scenarios.

-Had you been to Malaga a lot before?

-Only to play. Hotel, stadium, airport... Now I'm getting to know the city but I don't have a lot of time to get out and about. When I do, it's with Nacho [Oria, fitness coach] and we go cycling. Recently we went to the Sierra de Mijas and went up to the Fuente de la Reina and it was spectacular.

-Is your bike expensive?

-They are expensive but for me it's money well spent because it gives back so many physical, mental and social benefits.

-You're good at a lot of sports.

-I don't want to downplay my professional career but I'm very proud of what I achieved as an amateur. I was basketball champion at high school and the Getafe tennis champion at 'infantil' level. I still play a

lot of tennis now.

-Meat or fish?

-Fish. I've already enjoyed 'pescaito'. There's a great place next to the hotel [Tryp Guadalmar] where I've had 'espetos'.

-Did you vote in the general election? And will you in the council elections?

-Yes, of course, but I think there is a massive crisis of credibility among the leaders. I like to vote for projects, for people, but in Spain we tend to vote tribally.

-What did you study?

-I studied Economics but I wasn't able to finish and it's one regret I have. When I retire, I'd like to pick it up again.

-Twitter, Instagram or Facebook?

-For me social media is a good way to find interesting things, information, technical articles... I know it's all part of the image but we also have a professional responsibility. There's a lot of nonsense going on on social media.

-Films or series?

-I like films more but I have been caught up in series in the past. I loved House... but don't ask me about Game of Thrones.

-What type of books do you read?

-There was a time when I used to read historical novels but now I like to read things where I can learn something I can apply to my work. The most recent, and which we gave to the all the players was Luis Pasamontes' book 'El Liderazgo del Gregario'. I would recommend it to anyone.

use less energy. On the other hand, N'Diaye did eat. For us it's normal. We're in constant dialogue with the players to see how they're doing and to see what we can do to help.

-It must also have been great to see the team so compact and focused down to ten men against Oviedo. We're at a stage in the season where any slip can be punished, right?

-Exactly, that's why the small teams can sometimes beat the big and powerful ones. There are many things that can influence the final result which

is why overcoming adverse conditions is so important.

-Winning 3-0 must have come as a relief, especially from a psychological point of view, given the bad run of form at La Rosaleda.

-For us it's crucial that the team is brave. This is what we've asked the players from the start because we know that they are the best [in the division]. A squad with this potential has to be daring to perform at a high level. That wasn't just three points, it was an enormous injection of confidence.

-If promotion isn't achieved, we'll have to blame it on the failure of the squad and their work?

-I don't know how I would feel in that situation. It's not a thought I have ever let enter my mind.

Omission of Ontiveros and Pau Torres from under-21 squad gives boost to play-off hopes

MALAGA. Malaga's Pau Torres and Javi Ontiveros will be available to play in the play-offs, should Malaga get there, after the pair were left out of Luis de la Fuente's squad for the upcoming under-21 European Championships.

Delaying the tournament by a week because of Ramadan will allow both to play on the final day, but neither will be able to feature in the play-offs should Malaga get there.

Unremarkable to the end

A very strange and unspectacular La Liga season has come to an end but you can expect plenty of headline news over the summer

Gareth Bale ditching the lap of appreciation was symbolic; for not just him but many in a very strange and unspectacular season in La Liga.

It now seems that the circuit of the stadium at the final home game of the season is obligatory, even if it means waving to empty seats or quickening the step to get it over with. There are few clubs where there was reason for celebration and adulation.

Obviously, Barcelona deserve a salute for winning the league but there was still emptiness as nobody ran them close and they were scarred by the Champions League semi-final debacle.

The grandest celebration was at Espanyol who qualified for European football for the first time since reaching the UEFA Cup final twelve years ago. This will be tempered by the fact that the players must cut their summer short and be ready

for the qualifiers at the start of July.

Getafe, the club nobody used to love, earned nationwide admiration for almost making it to the Champions League. They sat in fourth spot until the final week of the season, and even for a few minutes on the last day of the season. Qualifying for the Europa League is probably better in the long term as it is a weight division they can compete in. In the Champions League they would have been battered and bruised by the heavy weights.

Valencia deserve distinction for reaching the Copa del Rey final, Europa League semis and clinching fourth spot. It's not so long ago this was a basket case of a club where Nuno, now proven to be a quality manager, was replaced by a TV pundit from the UK with little knowledge of the nuances of Spanish football.

Marcelino has 'managed' the season masterfully. At one point he was criticised for an overly cautious approach as he tried to balance domestic and European football. Come the final count he's achieved yet again, as he always does. Valencia have a deserved place in the Champions League mix and a chance of a first trophy in eleven years.

As always, the city of Seville is bemoaning a perceived lack of success. Both Real Betis and Sevilla are seeking new managers. Betis parted company with Quique Setién. There were artistic differences between the coach from the north of Spain and the fans from the south. At Sevilla, sixth wasn't regarded as good enough and Joaquin Caparrós stepped aside with his 38-year record as a coach still intact.

The best player is so obvious. It was a vintage season even by Lionel Messi's standards. Maybe we should

go all American and award an MVP? The most valuable player is probably Iago Aspas. His 20 goals in 27 games are the reason Celta Vigo remained ahead of the relegated pack and retain their top-flight status.

There's so much to dissect but the outright winner for the oddest signing of the season was Kevin Prince-Boateng at Barcelona. He arrived from the Serie A shadows of Sassuolo to the spotlight of the Camp Nou. It was hoped that he'd prove to be an experienced short-

term alternative, just like Paulinho previously. Alas he participated in just four games, failed to score and returns to Italy with a league winners medal and another leading club on his impressive CV.

The football may be over but the intrigue has only just begun with jobs to fill, an overhaul at Atlético, new blood at Barcelona, Galácticos to be acquired at Real Madrid as Gareth Bale works on his golf handicap.



Sculptor Stefan von Reiswitz dies, aged 87

The creator of the sculptures in the Parque del Oeste in Malaga, this German artist formed part of the 'Colectivo Palmo' which revitalised the city's cultural scene

MALAGA. At the age of 14 he sold his first painting, met José Ortega y Gasset and decided to learn Spanish in order to read his work in its original version.

Always mischievous and refined, his love for the Mediterranean and his nomadic soul led him from his native Germany to Malaga, where his work forms part of the city's landscape through his most popular creations: the sculptures of the Parque del Oeste, now orphaned by the death of Stefan von Reiswitz.

The sculptor, who lived in Malaga from the middle of the last century, has died of pneumonia at the age of 87.

"It was a relief to get here. I lived in Marbella and got fed up in 1954 or 55. I went to Torremolinos, which was a beautiful town. I got off the bus and there was a terrible wind, with a lot of dust in the air and I got back on the bus until I got to Malaga. There was a splendid sun and no wind here, so I decided to stay. There were coaches, a small port, a small bullring... I learned to drive in El Perchel... It was quite an experience...", the artist recalled with laughter during an interview with SUR on the occasion of his 80th birthday.

He would soon become involved in the cultural life of the city, first in the 'Grupo Picasso' and later in the 'Colectivo Palmo', the group formed by artists such as Enrique Brinkmann, Dámaso Ruano, Manuel Barbadillo and

Juan Béjar, among others, which was crucial in the transition towards modern art made in Malaga during the last third of the 20th century.

A painter before a sculptor, in the 1980s Stefan shifted from one discipline to another as he delved deeper into his unique iconography of fantastic animals related to surrealism, although the artist himself always mistrusted that label.

"I encountered all creatures in my childhood nightmares, when I spent all my formative years under the Nazis and those golden eagles that panicked me," the German artist recalled. After all, Stefan always understood artistic creation as a matter of instinct rather than intellect, even though his residence on top of a hill in El Limonar was filled with art books.

The power of imagination

The Picasso Foundation, the now closed Sala Alameda of the Diputación and the Taller Gravura dedicated some of the most memorable exhibitions in Malaga to an artist who is part of the collection of the Museo del Patrimonio Municipal, but not of the Museum of Malaga.

He always gave the impression of thinking of something else, of a world of his own that we are invited to enter through his sculptures. He himself summed it up in an accurate wish: "Imagination has few places to fly and I hope that the Parque del Oeste will serve that purpose". And of course it does.
