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# Fifty per cent of foreign investment in Andalucía comes to the Costa area, report says

A survey of companies based in Malaga province with foreign capital reveals an optimistic attitude: about 60 per cent expect their investment to increase this year

**MALAGA.** The Costa del Sol is not only the favourite destination for tourists who come to Andalucía, but for entrepreneurs and investors as well. The province of Malaga received 51 per cent of foreign investment into the region in 2017, which was 0.84 per cent of the total in Spain. This is according to the second annual report on the business climate in Malaga province, drawn up by the Ciedes Foundation and Malaga city council's inward investment office.


Malaga and the Costa's slice of the Andalusian foreign-investment cake grew considerably compared with the previous year (31 per cent). Gross foreign investment increased by 38 per cent compared with 2016, to 205 million euros, while in Andalucía as a whole it reduced slightly.

Analysis of investment value held in the province, (rather than what comes in and out over time), shows that Malaga was the province in the region with the highest growth between 2013 and 2016, at more than 64.7 per cent, compared with 34.1 per cent for Andalucía.


This and other data is included in the report, which the mayor of Malaga, Francisco de la Torre, said is the only one of its type carried out by a Spanish city. It studies different statistical sources as well as the results of a survey which was sent to 150 local-based companies with foreign capital and 50 entities and individuals who work with this type of company.


## HOW FOREIGN COMPANY'S TURNOVER EVOLVED (%)

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of the report is the companies' expectations regarding turnover, investment and job creation. M<sup>a</sup> Carmen García Peña, the head of Ciedes, says this is generally positive, especially among the larger companies with foreign capital. About 60 per cent of those with over 500 employees expect to take on more workers this year, while 20 per cent think levels will stay the same and 20 per cent expect to reduce them.

The perspectives for turnover and investment are also good. Just over 60 per cent of the companies expect their volume of business to increase this year, and that is more than last year. With regard to investment, 57 per cent believe it will increase. The major companies are the most optimistic, as 80 per cent expect to see an increase this year.

#### Evaluation

Foreign companies gave Malaga province a score of 2.94 (out of five) in overall terms, which was slightly lower than the previous 3.14, but García Peña explains that this is due more to a change in the questions asked in the survey (there were more aspects to score) than a worsening opinion of the city. The factors most highly valued by the companies when deciding on Malaga and the Costa were infrastructure, quality of life, innovation and human resources. The downsides were costs, the regulatory environment and tax.

The investing companies were clear that the area's strengths lie in the airport and high-speed train service, followed by the port, leisure facilities and culture. The weaknesses are seen as energy costs, slowness of commercial courts and subsidy availability.

When asked how Malaga could improve, the majority said the lack of language skills is a handicap for a province which has been making a living from tourism for over 50 years. Next came electricity costs, availability of international schools, quality of business colleges, acceptance of responsibilities and objectives by workers and other energy costs.

## Mercedes is latest luxury car brand to arrange global launch in Marbella

Improvements to the Palacio de Congresos are being hailed as a reason for attracting the November event, which comes after Audi visited earlier this year

**MARBELLA.** Mercedes-Benz has chosen Marbella for the global launch of its latest car model. The German luxury-car giant will unveil its new creation to important customers and motor-trade media at the town's congress centre in November.

The numbers speak for themselves about the importance of this motor event for Marbella that will be held over 20 days, from 5 to 25 November. According to Mercedes, the show will generate 2,800 over-

night stays in three to five star hotels, attract invited guests from 24 countries and bring together 400 journalists, bloggers, influencers.

As well as the extra business in low season for hoteliers, the activity generated for other sectors of the tourism industry will be significant. The Marbella Palacio de Congresos convention centre will earn 60,000 euros for hiring out its space.

The Mayor of Marbella, Ángeles Muñoz, this week highlighted the behind-the-scenes work that went

into securing the Mercedes deal and beating the competition. She explained that the worldwide image of Marbella as a luxury destination and recent renovations costing 400,000 euros at the congress centre had helped to win the contract.

By the time the event is held in November, an expanded parking area on land next door will be open and the centre will have one of the largest murals in the world on the outside, by artist Curro Leyton.

Muñoz said, "All this work helps turn Marbella into a sought-after destination for congress tourism."

The Mercedes event comes after the international launch of an Audi model earlier this year that saw 3,200 guests from 120 countries. The council estimates that Audi brought in an extra 7.5 million euros to Marbella.

Like Audi, the Mercedes event isn't expected to be open to the public.

## New boss of Malaga Airport shows confidence in future routes and investment

**MALAGA.** Speaking at the busiest time of year for plane activity, the new director of Malaga Airport has been explaining more about his plans.

At a working breakfast with journalists last week, just a month into the job, Pedro Bendala announced that the forecasted investment budget for next year at the airport will be 38 million euros, with the focus on making the terminals more environmentally friendly. "Aena [the airport operator] has made the promise of becoming carbon neutral, so we have to reduce our emissions and those of the 300 companies working at the airport."

Speaking about the airport's future growth, he said that "the sky is the limit" and that a master plan is needed "to activate investment when the need arises".

Bendala also commented on the increase in longer-distance routes operating this summer season. "Every day a year-round flight between Malaga and New York gets closer," he said, adding that the growth in connectivity to the Middle East was also important.

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## Serbian holds knife to flatmate's throat on balcony in Manilva

The victim was dressed in underwear, his eyes were blindfolded and his chest was stained with blood

**MANILVA.** A Serbian man shocked residents and tourists in La Duquesa in Manilva on Wednesday 31 July when he was witnessed threatening a bleeding and semi-naked man with a knife on a balcony. The rapid intervention of the local police ensured his arrest before any further harm could be done.

The incident occurred when people walking along the port spotted the man holding another prisoner on a balcony, while he threatened him with a large knife. The victim was dressed in underwear, his eyes were blindfolded and his chest was stained with blood.

Local officers arrived quickly at the scene and attempted to calm down the aggressor from below, while he continued to threaten the victim and brandish the weapon. Tourists and residents watched from the street, astonished.

The aggressor shared the flat with his wife and the victim. His wife, realising the danger of the

situation, fled the scene in fear that she too would be harmed.

While local police officers conversed with the aggressor from the street, another two officers asked for cooperation from his wife, who was able to enter the flat again through a window and open the door. Officers could then enter the flat and apprehend the aggressor, who did not resist arrest.

The victim, also of Serbian origin, had suffered a significant cut

on the head, which had produced the blood stains down his body and needed at least 11 stitches.

An investigation into the incident is under way, although everything currently points towards jealousy as the motive, since the three were sharing the flat.

The Mayor of Manilva, Mario Jiménez, has since praised the officers involved for their "professionalism and bravery" and for avoiding further harm.

## Private-hire driver arrested for 'inventing' kidnap tale after spending earnings on sex

Police believe the private-hire vehicle driver spent a total of 1,800 euros during the 15 hours at the brothel

**MALAGA.** A private-hire vehicle driver has been arrested and charged with filing a false report of a kidnapping, reportedly concocted to hide the truth behind a night of drugs and orgies.

The driver had reported the supposed kidnapping at Fuengirola police station, accusing a client of robbing him of his company's earnings at knife-point, before taking him to a local brothel, where he had been held against his will and forced to take drugs.

The alarming details did not stop there; the driver reported that once all of the money had been spent on prostitutes, the client forced him to travel by taxi to a friend's house where he was to sell a motorbike. The money earned was then spent on further revelry at the brothel. The driver accused the client of then keeping him hostage in a storage room for several hours when the night came to an end.

Despite originally believing the driver's tale and arresting the accused, police became suspicious when interviews with workers at the club and the taxi driver, who had driven the two companions to sell the motorbike, offered a very different version of the story. Witnesses said that the driver had not been forced to act against his will at any point during the night.

The driver has since been arrested over fabricating the crime. Investigators believe that, having taken the company earnings himself and having spent them at the brothel with his companion, who he was already acquainted with before the event, the driver reported his companion and invented the tale in an attempt to explain the missing money and his absence that day.

Police estimate that a total of 1,800 euros was spent by the driver on sex and drugs during the 15 hours at the brothel. According to the testimony of the taxi driver who drove the two companions to the house where they sold the motorbike, the sale amounted to 1,050 euros. The reveller also allegedly took another 600 euros he had in his pocket, and spent a further 100 euros on the night, taken from tips earned in his vehicle.

## Woman on trial for causing death of chihuahua in Malaga

**MALAGA.** A woman, charged with causing the death of a chihuahua, will appear in court on 28 October. The public prosecutor's office is calling for a 12-month prison sentence for the accused.

The alleged crime took place over the Christmas of 2015, when the

woman left the chihuahua and another mixed-breed dog in her locked house in Alhaurín el Grande, "without food, water, ventilation or even sunlight".

It was the woman's neighbour who alerted officers in January 2016, after hearing constant barking and smelling an unpleasant odour com-

ing from the house.

Upon entering the residence, officers discovered the chihuahua dead on the sofa, and the other dog to be "in a terrible state", surrounded by filth. The probable cause of death was "the malnutrition and dehydration caused by the accused, who, knowing that the animals were in the house, left them in those conditions".

In addition to the possible 12-month prison sentence, the prosecutor is calling for a three-year ban on the woman working with or owning animals.

## Smokers' club closed down and manager arrested, suspected of drug dealing

**FUENGIROLA.** National and Local Police have closed down a smokers' club in the Fuengirola area, which had allegedly been facilitat-

ing the dealing of marijuana and hash. A 19-year-old Irish-born man, who had been in charge of the premises, has been arrested.

Police who searched the club seized 885 grams of hashish, 701 grams of marijuana, various tools used for the sale and consumption of drugs, and around 550 euros in cash.

The premises had in fact been shut down before and the club had been registered as a non-profit association. Judicial proceedings are now under way.

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# Triple A avoids having to close animal shelter after an influx of new members, donations and materials

The Amigos de los Animales Abandonados association hopes the collaboration will continue to guarantee its survival in the long term

**MARBELLA.** Triple A will not have to close down after all. The animal rescue association has seen an influx of new members, donations and necessary materials after the call for help published in the SUR newspapers a couple of weeks ago, warning that it would not be able to continue unless it could raise the 50,000 euros it needed to continue providing this important service in Marbella.

The association, whose full name is Amigos de los Animales Abandonados, says it has received sanitary materials, food, cleaning products, around 70 new members, sponsors, donations and innumerable messages of support and interest in the situation from individuals, companies and other associations, both Spanish and foreign. Triple A's secretary Jan Weima said this week that they even received a donation of 15 euros from Tokyo.

"We are completely overwhelmed by the response; it has been incredible. We can't thank everyone enough. Luckily, we have been saved. This has enabled us to balance our accounts, because after 29 years working in this area, we don't want to be seen as an association that doesn't pay," he said.

This wave of support has been like a blast of oxygen which will allow them to pay their bills and carry on, but the management board at Triple A also pointed out that their monthly costs amount to 35,000 euros, 40 per cent of which is for wages. This is why they want the level of collaboration to continue, to ensure that the association can survive and provide a shelter for abandoned animals in the area. The Triple A shelter is on the Carretera de Ojén.

The association has also set its sights on a new line of collaboration with Marbella council, which it hopes will come into being in the next few months. If it does, it will be able to update the facilities at the shelter, with the priority being improved plumbing and infrastructure.

The board has already held a long meeting at the shelter with the mayor of Marbella, Ángeles Muñoz, and the councillor for Works, Diego López, after sending out their calls for help.

#### Urgent works are needed

Triple A and Marbella council have both confirmed that the meeting laid down the groundwork for a programme to improve the facilities and make them more practical.

"The association will draw up a

plan of what it needs and in September we will meet again to study its viability and work out a project," said Lisandro Vieytes, who is an advisor on sanitation and was also at the meeting.

"We are confident that the council will work hard to help us to create a shelter which is suitable for the

town of Marbella," said Jan Weima.

The Triple A premises are more than 70 years old and need urgent work, including plumbing and drainage. Marbella council already contributes 60,000 euros a year, which the association wants it to increase. In fact, ever since Jesús Gil gave them use of the old slaughterhou-

se for their first shelter, all the subsequent councils have collaborated in different ways.

In the last term of office the tripartite government surfaced the road leading to the shelter and the present council has provided use of adjoining land, which is used to walk the dogs.

## MARBELLA 12KM TRAFFIC CHAOS AS LORRY SHEDS LOAD ON ROAD

The trailer of a lorry overturned on the A-7 motorway around Marbella on Thursday morning, causing major headaches for motorists with up to 12 kilometres of tailbacks. 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# Home of corrupt ex-planning boss sold by court with him still living inside

Juan Antonio Roca has complained that he doesn't want to be the only one involved in the Marbella scandals to be stripped of his multi-million-euro assets

**MARBELLA.** A luxury apartment, one of the homes of Marbella's jailed former town-planning boss has finally been sold by the court.

The 535-square-metre single-floor property is between Avenida Ricardo Soriano and the Paseo Marítimo. It was one of the many high-value assets frozen as now-released Juan Antonio Roca was sent to jail in the infamous corruption scandals that rocked the resort over ten years ago.

The eight-bedroom property was put on sale on a court-supervised website for 2.6 million euros but in the end has gone for 1.8 million. However the sale comes with a possible catch as, despite having been found guilty, sent to jail, and still owing tens of millions in defrauded money to Marbella town hall, Juan Antonio Roca and his family are still living inside the luxury property.

Previous interested buyers have

been made aware that they could not take immediate possession because of the high-profile occupant, and would have to have signed a rental contract with the Rocas while he lived there. It's not known what the conditions of the final sale are.

### Not the only one

In other developments in the aftermath of the sentences of Roca and the many officials, politicians and business people who embezzled

funds from the town hall, it has emerged that Roca has complained to a court in Madrid. His lawyers told the court that heard the 'Saqueo II' part of the trials that it is not fair that he is being targeted for his assets (in this case alone he was ordered to pay back 37 million euros).

He told the court that it would do well to investigate more thoroughly assets of others culprits such as former mayor Julián Muñoz, as well as the heirs of former mayor, Jesús Gil.

# Major new pool for Marbella for use for competitive events

**MARBELLA.** Sports clubs and swimming competitors in Marbella look set to get what they most need at last: a place for high-level training and pool competitions within the municipality.

When the plan for the facility is carried out, almost 1,000 sportsmen and women can stop using crowded public pools where they are only allocated limited hours to train.

Marbella town hall has started a tender process to draw up and supervise plans for a swimming pool facility in the Polideportivo Guadaiza, on the San Pedro side

of Nueva Andalucía, that will also be used for national level competition.

The cost is estimated at eight million euros and the pool will need to be 24 metres long and 34 metres wide, with a moving partition to divide the space so different activities can use the pool at the same time. The floor of the pool will be marked out for water-polo competitions.

As an example of the current difficulties faced by sports teams, Club Waterpolo Marbella, that plays in national competitions, has to use a pool in Fuengirola instead for its home games and training.



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## EARTH MATTERS

Replasur uses a thousand tonnes of material provided by industrial laundrettes and packaging companies for its products every year

**MALAGA.** Plastic, above all when used for shopping bags, has lately become the environment's public enemy number one. Ecologists and governments alike have turned their focus to the control of plastic distribution, with negative consequences for marine life at the forefront of their minds. However, companies that make the most of the positive side to this supposedly damned product also exist. This is the case for Malaga-based Replasur, a company founded almost 40 years ago, dedicated to using recycled plastic for the production of kilometres of piping for countryside irrigation. The Replasur plant on the Santa Teresa industrial estate stamps out the circulation of a thousand tonnes of this material every year.

"Everybody is against the plastic bag, but we cannot deny that it is an economic and technologically important product, which creates jobs and is not to blame for the way in which we mistreat it and throw it to the sea. It is us who use it badly." José Luis Delgado, owner of Replasur, defends the raw material, following a life dedicated to reuse within the plastic industry, having been in charge of various factories for almost half a century.

According to Delgado, the business has its origins in a time of plastic shortage. One of his first businesses was a packaging factory, back in Franco's era. "Supplies of the raw material were running low, so I started this company to gather resources." For decades Delgado produced bottles and containers for oil companies and bleach factories, opening plants in Granada and Seville, both sold years ago. In the end, there were two businesses: one dedicated to recycling and the other to the production of piping for irrigation.

In order to work, the company mainly uses plastic bags, film and packaging from factories. The easiest thing would be to obtain these from town rubbish tips, which of course have the largest deposits. However, the veteran business

owner criticises how these facilities are controlled by the company Ecoembes, which has monopolised the industry. "Plastic has a value, and the economy comes before the environment," says Delgado.

As a result, Replasur has created its own network for obtaining the raw material and the company has agreements with industrial laundrettes, which use thousands of large plastic bags for clothes from hotels across the provincial capital and Costa del Sol. The company also receives regular contributions from packaging businesses, committed to the collection and sale of these materials.

### Recycled polythene

The number of people working at the plant fluctuates between ten and fifteen people, depending on the workload, and runs 24 hours a day. The process starts with the classification and cleaning of the huge bundles of plastic, made up of shopping bags, bags for clothes, sacks and all kinds of packaging. Interestingly, packaging such as bottles is never used.

The plastic is classified in order to remove parts which are not useful, before it is ground, washed, centrifuged and dried. It later passes to

a machine which converts the raw material into little black pieces: recycled polythene.

These are then introduced to a chain of automatic production which moulds millions of kilometres of irrigation piping for the countryside, with different diameters and pressure capacities. In order to save water, the company has already incorporated a dropper with a flow of 2.5 litres per minute into one of its products. The company distributes all the necessary components for agricultural work, and even the necessary technology for long-distance management, with applications for programming and activating the irrigation system from a mobile. It also offers advice on farm production plans. Sales depend on the season and weather, and vary according to droughts or the abundance of water.

The company, the only one of its kind in Malaga, also has a third side to it: the production of caps for bottles. It currently distributes to the whole of Andalucía and Morocco. "Our work is of great social value because we clear a lot of plastic waste; look at how rubbish can be transformed," José Luis Delgado, concludes, suggesting a more positive way of looking at the notorious plastic bag.

# Bottle caps recycled for a good cause

The company buys and recycles plastic bottle caps gathered from skips and collection points and all funds go towards social causes

**MALAGA.** Most people have wondered whether the plastic bottle caps gathered at collection points in offices and schools do indeed have an economic value. The answer is yes.

In the Replasur office on the Santa Teresa industrial estate, there are photocopies of the identity documents of some 50 individuals. Almost all of these people are representatives of NGOs from the Malaga province, from

whom Replasur regularly purchases plastic caps gathered from collection points, rubbish bins and skips. Funds go towards social causes and families who struggle economically.

Owner of the company, José Luis Delgado, explains how this material, which has many special characteristics, is recycled and sold.

Once washed, ground and recycled, the raw material is sold to another manufacturer, and it is transformed into plastic boxes used for the bulk distribution and transport of fruit to markets.

"We do not profit from this, but we cover the expenses, and so help people who need it."

Because of this, the company only purchases caps from people or entities with an accredited social cause.





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# Julen's parents demand a jail sentence of three years and six months for landowner

The couple, who are bringing a private prosecution against the owner of the land where their son died, claim he has never apologised

**MALAGA.** Julen Roselló's parents have filed a written indictment as part of the private prosecution against David Serrano, the owner of the land in Totalán on which their two-year-old son died when he fell down a borehole in January. They are asking for the court to sentence him to three and a half years in jail for manslaughter through negligence.

This would be a longer sentence than that requested by the public prosecution, whose provisional conclusions about the case were that Serrano should be jailed for three years if found guilty. The written indictment by the parents agrees with all the prosecution's conclusions, and differs only in the sug-

gested length of sentence. The couple's lawyer, Antonia Barba, says that in cases of negligence there are no fixed sentences and the judges and courts can decide on these arbitrarily after considering the personal circumstances, the severity of the events and the results.

Julen's parents believe David Serrano was "extremely negligent" and claim he had contravened safety regulations when having the 70-metre borehole drilled on his land in search of water. They also say he had not obtained authorisation for the containing wall he was building on the site,

and had failed to put up warning signs about the presence of the hole that Julen fell down, prompting a massive rescue operation.

They have also criticised Serrano's behaviour following the accident, saying that not only has he never apologised to them but he has tried to blame them for not looking after their child properly. They were also angry when his lawyers produced a report claiming that Julen could have been killed not by the fall, but by a pick used during the 13-day attempts to rescue him.

## Revenge, says defence

David Serrano's lawyers, however, say they are very surprised by the parents' demand for a jail sentence of three years and six months. Antonio Flores, of Lawbird Legal Services, said this appears to be a wish for personal revenge, and points out that the parents themselves had previously described the death of their son as an accident.

The defence lawyers reject the parents' claim that David Serrano was responsible for covering the hole, saying that this was the responsibility of the building company that was carrying out the works, and that the parents had been "indisputably and repeatedly warned" about the presence of the hole by Serrano, the owner of the land. They also say Serrano has said "a thousand times" how sorry he is for what had happened, and that parents have a duty of "culpa in vigilando" (responsibility to look after their children).

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## Costa del Sol placed on amber warning as temperatures rise above 39 degrees

Temperatures today (Friday) could beat Malaga's August record of 44 degrees, documented in 1953

**MALAGA.** The Spanish weather agency Aemet has placed Malaga, the Costa del Sol and Valle del Guadalhorce areas on amber warning, as today's temperatures (Friday) look to rise above 39°C.

After thermometers hit more than 40 degrees on Wednesday, residents and visitors along the Costa del Sol enjoyed a little relief on Thursday, with its predicted highs of around 34 degrees. The heat is not due to be so kind today, however, and meteorologists are following the relentless hot weather with an eagle eye, as a new record in the capital could be set; Malaga's highest temperature recorded in the month of August was 44 degrees on 9 August, 1953.

Wednesday's sweltering temperatures were this summer's fiercest taste so far of the Terral, the warm wind that picks up heat as it travels overland. Temperatures of 40 degrees were recorded at both the airport and Aemet's headquarters, breaking this summer's previous record of 39.1 de-

grees on 15 July. The heat was less intense in the east of Malaga.

The high temperatures on Wednesday led Malaga town hall to partially activate the municipal emergency plan from 12 noon to 10pm.

The most serious incident caused by the heat was a forest fire which started in the area of Lomas de San Antón. Firefighters were able to bring the flames under control within a few hours.

## Social media brings Thor home to his family

**A much-loved labrador who was stolen was found within 48 hours thanks to a viral campaign on the internet**

The devastated owners suspected who had taken him but thought the dog had probably been sold immediately. Instead, there was a happy ending

**:: JUAN CANO / ÁLVARO FRÍAS MALAGA.** Rocío talks about Thor, an eight-year-old labrador, as if he were a child. "I had him first," she says. "I always say I have a human son and a canine one". So it is easy to understand how she felt on Saturday when, at 12.30pm, she received a call from her husband to tell her that the dog had been stolen.

Bruno had popped in to the pizze-

ria he runs in Playamar, Torremolinos, for a few minutes, and left the door open and Thor tied to a lamp-post. "When I came out, he had gone. I started searching for him, rang the family, and that's how it all began," he says.

Rocío was on duty with the emergency unit at the San Miguel medical centre when she received the call. "I was devastated. There was no way I could work. I had to look for Thor," she says.

Bruno had obtained a photo of the possible thieves from a security camera: a man in his twenties and a woman of about 40, walking away with Thor on a lead. Rocío, whose job often takes her to poor districts where there are squatters, thought she re-

cognised the man. She found him at home, but there was no sign of Thor. "He said he didn't know anything. I suspected they had sold him," she says.

Meanwhile, Bruno had posted photos on social media and asked for help, and the response was phenomenal. "It went viral," he says. "The police shared it, vets shared it, animal rescue societies, individuals, it was incredible." Then on the Sunday night, a woman rang and said she thought she had just seen Thor in Capuchinos. The police searched the area, and finally found the dog, in one of the squats. "No sign of the woman or the lad, but at least Thor was safe. It was less than 48 hours, but felt like weeks and weeks without him," says Rocío.

## Self-defence sessions help women overcome fear of vulnerable situations

The workshops are free and led by Concordia Márquez, an expert in martial arts who says strength comes from the mind, not the body

**ALHAURÍN EL GRANDE.** "It's fear, rather than a weapon, that normally kills somebody," says Concordia Márquez, who is an expert in martial arts. While recovering from a foot injury which means she can't do any heavy work at the CYD Santa María animal refuge in Alhaurín el Grande, of which she is the president, she has decided to use her skills to help other "sentient beings" - in this case women who are suffering or have suffered (or want to prevent) physical and sexual aggression.

Concordia is running a series of free workshops on personal defence at the Novagym in Alhaurín el Grande twice a week. She quotes Mahatma Gandhi to explain the philosophy behind these sessions. "Strength isn't a matter of physical ability, it comes from the mind," she says. The workshops are open to any woman who wants to overcome their fear and learn how to defend themselves, whether from body-to-body aggression or threats with firearms, knives, sticks or similar objects. "It breaks my heart when I see on the news the atrocities which are carried out on women in Spain, and also the pain of their families. If I can give my grain of sand to the cause, then I'm satisfied," she says.

The sessions are free, but those attending must pay the gym fee to be covered by the insurance.

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# Final preparations are in full swing for the start of Malaga's famous August fair next week

Rules for the huge 'feria', which begins in full on Thursday, include not going shirtless, and extra security measures have also been announced

**MALAGA.** The Mayor of Malaga, Francisco de la Torre, has announced a series of specific rules and regulations for the huge Malaga fair, which starts next week. The famous 'feria' begins on Wednesday night, 15 August, with fireworks and starts in full on Thursday at 12pm. The rules include wearing adequate clothing and restrictions on the use of electric scooters in the centre.

The clothing rule means fair-goers must cover their torsos throughout the centre during the busy fair period, with the mayor explaining it is for reasons of hygiene and out of respect for others. It is not the first time there has been opposition to this type of behaviour; in 2017 hotel owners started a campaign to promote the importance of dressing appropriately at the fair in the centre, with some even handing out t-shirts.

Also included in the regulations are electric scooters, which the mayor banned from being parked in the centre in April. There will also be restricted parking areas in the centre during the festivities with certain zones being out of use and

visitors are asked to use public transport. The regulations also govern the sale of alcohol to be consumed outdoors.

In addition, extra security has been announced, with the installation of ten fixed cameras covering the busiest areas at the afternoon and evening showground. Also, as last year, private hire cars through apps such as Uber and Cabify will not be able to access the showground.

## Biggest in the south


Malaga's fair, the biggest summer 'feria' in the south of Spain, runs until Saturday, 24 August, and will draw many thousands of locals and visitors. The events in the city centre will begin each day at 12pm and finish at 6pm, when bars will have to move indoors and outside music will have to be turned off. The large showground, on the outskirts of the city, will have 120 bars and restaurants, known as 'casetas', and fun-fair, and will open at 12pm each day with many staying open until 6am.

The fair kicks off on Malagueta beach on Wednesday with live performances and firework displays at around midnight. On Thursday morning there will be the traditional procession and floral offering to the image of the Virgen Victoria, patron saint of Malaga. Other events on Thursday include performances by Carlos Bravo and Comando Bandera in Plaza de la Constitución, Freeska Malaga Ensemble in Plaza de la

Merced, among others.

At 9.30pm at the showground, more than 2.5 million lightbulbs will be switched on, illuminating the festivities into the early hours.



# Town hall adopts new road safety initiative

the first white strip of pedestrian crossings to facilitate the awareness of road safety. The initiative will become operational on all pedestrian crossings situated outside schools in Torremolinos. The idea was developed by the University of Seville and TEA-VIAL, an association that seeks to improve the quality of life of people with ASD.

The road safety scheme was launched in Mairena del Aljarafe, Seville, earlier this year and has since been adopted in several towns in Andalucía.

Torremolinos town hall claimed the pictograms "will take a step in eliminating cognitive barriers" and also assist the elderly.

They add that it discourages longer-stay winter camping by retired couples from northern Europe and doesn't make sense as hotels don't have the same restrictions placed on them. In the first six months of this year, 83,000 people checked into regional campsites.

### Train station infrastructure works to cause traffic delays

tion of Benalmádena on the Avenida Palma de Mallorca, which has been reduced to one lane at the junction of Calle Danza Invisible and Avenida Joan Miró.

Restrictions have also been enforced on traffic approaching the junction from Avenida Joan Miró. The work is expected to last for two months and the town hall has advised drivers to use alternative routes during rush hour periods.

### Cigarette clean-up scheme on coastline

The campaign, titled 'Playas Sin

Colillas' (Beaches without cigarette butts), involves the distribution of 4,200 conical ashtrays, in which bathers can deposit their cigarette butts and other rubbish that mechanical beach sweepers can sometimes find difficult to filter out.

The ashtrays have been designed with a conical shape to make them easy to stick into the sand. A lid ensures that carrying the ashtrays is hygienic.

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# Council earmarks 1.5 million for road resurfacing in Torreblanca

The works have already begun and also include the upgrading of road markings, signposts and street furniture

**FUENGIROLA.** Following the opening of a new connecting road between the recently-constructed developments in northern Fuengirola and the coast a few weeks ago, Fuengirola town hall have this week announced a 1.5-million-euro project to improve road infrastructure around Torreblanca.

The works, which are already under way, include resurfacing around a dozen roads, updating road markings and signposts, installing new lighting and replacing old benches and other street furniture.

According to José Sánchez, councillor responsible for Works and

Town Planning, this 1.5-million-euro investment will see a “significant” improvement in the “quality of life of nearby residents”.

The works, being called out on Calles Vencejo, Lirio, Cordoniz, Pinzón, Faisán, Cigüeña, Brezos, Camachos, Zorzal, Luganoz and Pensamiento will not affect traf-

fic in the area.

Another improvement will come in the form of a new recreation area next to the Juan Playa chiriguito beach bar. The so-called Plaza de las Naciones will feature a water fountain and will pay tribute to the various nationalities of those living in Fuengirola.

# Infamous 38-metre urban slide in Estepona is taken away

It was the longest in Spain but it attracted controversy on its first day after users reported bumps and scrapes

**ESTEPONA.** The company responsible for the construction and installation of the longest urban slide in Spain has now completed its removal.

The 38-metre slide, which was installed in the Parque de los Niños

close to Estepona port, had to be closed a day after it opened after several images began to circulate on social media showing users who had suffered bumps and scrapes as a result.

The town hall on 11 May then ordered the company to carry out safety checks and the slide, which attracted attention across Europe, was kept closed during that time. Now that these checks have been concluded, the slide, which was at an angle of between 32 and 34 degrees, has been removed.

Estepona town hall released a statement stressing that neither the installation or removal of the slide came at a cost to the public coffers as it was an initiative on the part of developers charged with re-vamping that area of the town.

A council statement said that the slide had “discredited” the town.

# Malaga Metro works demolish majority of remains found in its path

**MALAGA.** Works to build the extension of the Malaga Metro to the city centre continued last week after the discovery of an 11th-century Moorish settlement in front of El Corte Inglés threatened to derail the project.

With the on-site preservation of the ruins deemed incompatible with the metro project, the decision was subsequently taken to preserve just the most representative parts of what has been identified as the Moorish district of Al-Tabbanin, just outside the old city walls.

Last Thursday, 1 August, the works resumed, demolishing the vast majority of the ruins, except the parts which will later be removed and preserved as part of an exhibition at the future train station.

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# "I have suffered racism"

**Luc André Diouf Socialist MP for Las Palmas**

**Spain's first MP of Senegalese origin, Diouf has slept on the streets and been insulted. "I'm not bitter about it," he says**

Luc André Diouf arrived in Las Palmas, Gran Canaria, in 1992 with a one-month tourist visa. He wanted to see his newborn daughter, whose mother, his Senegalese girlfriend, who was already living legally in Spain. Living together proved impossible, however, and Luc ended up sleeping on the beach for 45 nights. He only ate once a day, and developed pneumonia. He underwent surgery twice. He was on the point of being deported. His faith in God and knowledge of the Bible came from a priest at the hospital, who later helped him to obtain training. He became part of the CC OO trade union, and one day he received a phone call: "Hello, it's Pedro Sánchez here." He couldn't believe it. Now, Luc André Diouf is the PSOE party's executive secretary for refugee policy and a socialist MP for Las Palmas.

**- Can you remember what it was like, sleeping rough?**

- It was very hard. It was something I could never have imagined when I was in Senegal, but it made me strong and helped me deal with what happened to me in Spain. It taught me the value of having something to eat and made me grow per-

sonally and professionally.

**- What were you most scared of, hunger or the police?**

- The police, definitely, because if I had been arrested and deported it would have made me look very bad in my own country. It would have been considered a failure, something shameful. When someone emigrates, there are very high expectations on the African continent.

**- Have you felt the need to settle accounts with anyone now that your situation is so much better?**

- No, never. My father used to say that bitterness is not normal in healthy people. Quite the opposite: if I have offended someone I always apologise, like when I was involved in a legal problem over racist behaviour. Between 2000 and 2005 I was insulted daily, I was belittled, there was graffiti... I often heard people say things like "Filthy negro, it's a shame Franco's not here any more"! But I'm not bitter about it. What would I gain from that? Nothing.

**- But you were sentenced to 18 months for that incident...**

- That is the only 'but' that anyone can say about me in the 27 years I have been in Spain. It was Carnival, I was out shopping and somebody started shouting at me. He was one of a group of local racists. He started to accuse me, demanding to know why I wanted the local bar closed down. At a residents' meeting, I had said I was in favour of the bar owner being fined and that people should respect local regulations. He wanted to know who I thought I was to tell people in the Canaries what to do,

said it was their place not mine and if Franco were alive I would either be deported or dead. I didn't want to continue talking, but he carried on shouting insults at me and my partner, who was from Tenerife. But the final straw was when he yelled, "Me cago en tus muertos" [I shit on your dead relatives]. My father had died a month earlier and I wasn't able to go to his funeral because I had to work. I was really upset by what he said. He refused to apologise, grabbed my shirt and tried to headbutt me. I moved out of the way, but he tried again and I responded. He was badly hurt and reported me; I reported him as well,

for racism, and he was fined. I was sentenced to 18 months in prison, but because I didn't have a criminal record I didn't have to go to jail. In 2010 my criminal record was wiped clean. I suppose some people would use that incident against me, but that doesn't worry me.

**Frustrated basketball player**  
**- What measures would you put into effect so that immigration stopped being a problem?**

- Migration is a social reality, it has existed since the world began. In order to understand it, respect it and recognise the values and rights associated with it, all political leaders

need to reach consensus through a pact of State.

**- What would you say to Spanish people who believe the welfare system is at risk because it has to support so many immigrants?**

- That claim is a distortion of the truth. The authorities don't provide houses or assistance to illegal immigrants. They do get help from the NGOs but those funds, which are mainly from the EU, are for anybody with very few resources, whether they are Spanish or foreigners. Also, the migrant population is normally healthy, and they hardly ever have to consult a doctor. In Spain illegal immigrants aren't even four per cent of the population. You should ask the families who employ home help whether they think immigration is a good thing or not.

**- Looking back over the years, is there anything you regret?**

- Two things: not having become the professional basketball player I wanted to be, and not having finished my studies in Economics.

**- Would you sit at the same table with an MP from the Vox party?**

- If I have to debate with them I will do it, but I don't understand why someone who is supposed to fight for the interests of everybody would base their discourse on segregation. It is something very painful to have to put up with and I think it is completely wrong for somebody to receive a salary when they are working against the interests of those most in need.

**- Did you ever think you would be an MP one day?**

- Never, not in my wildest dreams.

**- How will your life change now? Better holidays?**

- No, quite the opposite! The job will be hard work because the immigrant population expects that of me. With regard to holidays, I will go back to Senegal as I always do to see my family and go out collecting oysters with my lifelong friends. In that sense, nothing has changed.



## Sánchez urged by all sides to try harder to gain MPs' support to be voted in as PM

**MADRID.** As politicians retreated to their families and their summer holidays this week, calls were continuing for acting Prime Minister, Pedro Sánchez, to find a way to win enough MPs' support to be sworn in as leader of a new government in September. If no agreement is reached, another general election looms in November.

King Felipe, speaking from Mallorca, urged all sides to do what they could to avoid the country going to the polls again.

Unidas Podemos, the left-wing party led by Pablo Iglesias, continues to want positions in a coalition government with Sánchez's larger PSOE party. But the PSOE is holding out for a simpler, support agreement only, with the hope of Sánchez being able to govern alone.

Earlier this week, the conservative Partido Popular appeared to open a door to it abstaining to allow the PSOE to govern alone if Sánchez stood aside, and it has not ruled out trying to form its own minority coalition with Ciudadanos.

#### Watch out for dud coins in your change, police say

**MADRID.** The Spanish central bank, Banco de España, has warned that rental prices in Spain are spiralling higher, with a 50% increase between the last quarter of 2013 and May this year, a period of five years and five months. This compares with a much lower rise in the average price of homes for sale of 6.8%.

A report puts the rental price rise down to "economic and demographic" factors and has criticised the lack of a standard index to measure rental price increases that strips out odd types of property that cloud the figures.

The central bank said that the percentage of rental properties of the total number of homes in Spain rose from 19.4 per cent in 2005 to 23.9% in 2018.

The main groups of residents who rent in Spain are foreigners and

young people.

In 2018, 59% of homes where the main householder was from another EU country were renting, and 77% from non-EU countries.

In terms of young people, the ratio of households renting where the main person was aged 30-44 years was 30 per cent of the total for that age, up from 19 per cent in 2018.

The Banco de España suggests that changes in tax breaks have stimulated the rental market, both in terms of properties being bought to rent and people preferring to rent.

The proportion of homes being rented in Spain (23.9%) is still lower than other countries, such as Germany, (48,6%), France, (35,6%) or the UK, (35%).

## Government claws back 15 billion in unpaid or fraudulent tax in 2018

**MADRID.** The central government's tax collection service, the Agencia Tributaria, has said that it managed to get hold of an extra 15.1 billion euros in 2018 in its efforts to prevent and to counter tax fraud.

This is up on 14.8 billion extra collected in 2017, but 500 million short of the expected figure. In most years

since 2008, the government has fallen short of its target to recover unpaid tax.

Since 2004, when current records began, it says it has got back 156.1 billion in unpaid taxes through its publicity campaigns and inspections.

Last year, a special unit was set up to investigate the tax payments of high-net-worth families, which

in 2018 alone led to 347 million being collected in 494 different cases opened, 44% more cases than the previous year for the whole group.

### Rental income

The tax office has highlighted the rise in warnings sent out to landlords in the last year. Because of increased sharing of information with platforms like Air BnB, 700,000 notices have been sent out in 2019, up from 258,000 a year ago. It says that in three years, 122,000 new taxpayers with rental properties have come forward to declare income.

## HAPPY HOLIDAYS



**G**iven how quiet everything's gone in Spain over the last week or so, you'd be forgiven for thinking that the country's political deadlock had been broken and a new administration installed. But nothing of the sort has happened. On Monday, acting prime minister Pedro Sánchez travelled to Mallorca for his weekly meeting with King Felipe VI, during which he briefed the monarch on the latest political developments. One imagines that that took all of five minutes, with Sánchez informing the King that there is STILL no new government, more than three months since the last general election. Nor will there be one anytime soon.

In the press conference after his meeting, Sánchez declared his intention to attempt to form a government right up until the third investiture vote, due to be held on September 23rd. "I haven't lost hope, I'm not throwing in the towel," he told the assembled journalists. It was fighting talk, demonstrating that Sánchez is determined to be proactive, even after his defeat in the first two investiture votes. It'd be good to see a little more proactiveness from the leaders of Spain's other political parties, who have apparently given up and headed to the beach for the rest of the summer.

As acting prime minister and leader of the Socialists, the party with the largest share of the public vote in Spain, it's Sánchez's responsibility to try and form the country's next govern-

ment. But that responsibility also falls to the heads of the other main groups. It is their collective duty to ensure that a worn-out electorate does not have to return to the polls for the fourth time in four years in November, which is what will happen if Sánchez loses the next investiture vote. So far, though, there has only been one real attempt at cross-party negotiation, between the Socialists and Unidas Podemos, and that was dominated by self-interest on both sides. Where is everybody else?

A coalition comprised of the Socialists and centrist Ciudadanos is the only combination that would have a parliamentary majority, which you'd think would be incentive enough to start negotiating. Yet since April 28th the latter party's leader, Albert Rivera, has failed to approach Sánchez, instead sticking to his line that the Socialist leader has been too lenient on Catalan separatists.

The conservative Popular Party has said that it's prepared to abstain on September 23rd, but only if another Socialist candidate is put forward for prime minister, which is not going to happen. Again, self-interest dominates and there's no sense of urgency, no sense that a fourth (and futile) election must be avoided. Nothing will happen for the rest of the month now, as everything - even government - shuts down in Spain during August. Just as well that there's nothing important to sort out.

## As Brexit looms, Gibraltar welcomes the idea of a Tangier trade office

The office would be run privately by the Gibraltar and Morocco Business Association and aim to develop further trade and commercial links

**GIBRALTAR.** The Gibraltar and Morocco Business Association (GMBA) is proposing to open a trade office in Tangier, and the idea has been welcomed by the government.

The office will be run privately by the GMBA and will aim to develop further trade and commercial links between Gibraltar and Morocco. This is in line with the association's objectives, which are to foster business, educational, tourism, sport and cultural links between the two places.

It is also in line with the Gibraltar government's policy of developing and exploring new markets, and although the plan is not directly related to Brexit, it is interesting in the context of Britain's proposed departure from the European Union.

However, the Gibraltar authorities are keen to stress that the Tangier trade office plan is not due to fears that the border will be closed after Brexit.

A press release issued by the government on Thursday recalls that in 1969, when Franco closed the border, Gibraltar depended on labour and the importation of goods from the Spanish side. The economy underwent a fundamental change at that time which changed the focus from imports and labour by land to imports and labour by sea, largely from Morocco across the Strait.

"The situation today is clearly different in that the border is not going to close," says the official statement, referring to Brexit. "The continuation of a fluid border for persons and goods is in the interests of both sides. Gibraltar imports some 1.5 billion euros a year in goods and materials from Spain. The latest figures show that 15,329 residents of Spain work in Gibraltar, and that 9,705 of these are Spanish nationals. There is clearly a commonality of interests between Gibraltar and Spain in identifying positive solutions post-Brexit. However, this does not conflict with developing and exploring new commercial markets in Morocco and elsewhere".

GMBA president Clive Reed is excited about the Tangier project and that the idea has been accepted in principle. "Now we have to discuss the detail," he said.

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**T**he Junta de Andalucía has said it's thinking about charging admission to its monuments. It does charge already, but only foreigners. 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# The Crown moves into Malaga office

The popular Netflix production about the British royal family will film part of its fourth season on the Costa

**MALAGA.** When Peter Morgan came up with the idea of creating a series telling the story of the reign of Elizabeth II and the British royal family, he knew it was an ambitious project. But then he did not know that The Crown would end up becoming the most expensive series in history - 130 million euros for its second season in 2017 - taking the title away from the last season of Game of Thrones.

We still don't know, however, what Netflix plans to spend on the fourth season of this hit series, part of which will be shot in Spain, and especially on the Costa del Sol. What we do know is that Malaga city has been selected as the location for the production's headquarters during

the filming in Spain.

The Crown now tops the increasingly prestigious list of international series that have chosen southern Spain as a filming location. This year Spanish productions such as Toy Boy, Malaka and Brigada Costa del Sol were all filmed in Malaga province, in addition to international titles Paradise and Warrior Nun.

The Balearic-based production

company Palma Pictures, which is managing The Crown's stay in Spain, told SUR that it has been preparing for filming in Malaga and other Andalusian locations for several months.

Filming in this area is scheduled to start after the summer, although the company has already moved into

its new office in the city.

This will be the second Netflix production to be filmed in the province, after it wound up its shooting of the first season of Warrior Nun, an adaptation of the comic book of the same name, in early July. The crew spent four months filming in Marbella, Rincón de la Victoria, Torre del Mar, Alhaurín de la Torre, Antequera, Ronda and Malaga, among other locations.

This is not the first time that the British-American series The Crown has been filmed in the province of Malaga. In September last year the production came to Torremolinos to convert the iconic congress centre into a 1960s version of Los Angeles Airport. These scenes form part of the third season, which is scheduled to premiere in the second half of this year and could coincide with the filming of the fourth instalment in Malaga.

That visit to the Costa del Sol - also organised by Palma Pictures, which is currently filming the series White Lines in Spain with Netflix - was fleeting, but the fourth season of this series produced by Left Bank Pictures and Sony Pictures Television will stay for much longer. SUR has confirmed that the action filmed here will be

set in different countries of the world and not only in Spain.

## Shooting attraction

The filming of The Crown has the support of Malaga Film Office and Polo Digital (a centre for the development of digital content and technology firms) where the production office for the series is currently being set up. Located alongside the Russian and automobile museums in the Tabacalera building (the former cigarette factory), the centre has been key to the city's ability to attract film production teams because its facilities are ideal to accommodate the equipment used for these big productions.

In the last year, Spanish TV company Antena 3 had its headquarters there for eight months for the shooting of the series Toy Boy. Their teams were joined later by others from the Spanish-Finnish co-production for television, Paradise, and the new Netflix production, Warrior Nun, which occupied two floors. The Celine Dion biopic, The Power of Love, also used the building last June to set up its shooting headquarters.

The Crown is Netflix's most expensive series in which it has taken cameras into 20th-century Britain and unravelled the lives of the British royal family. After ending the story of the second series in the 1960s, the third instalment, about to be released on Netflix, travels from 1964 to 1976, a time when Harold Wilson (played by Jason Watkins) was the prime minister of the country.

As the characters mature the cast has changed and the starring role of Queen Elizabeth II, previously played by Claire Foy, has moved to the latest Oscar-winner for The Favourite, Olivia Colman. Matt Smith, who started the series as the Duke of Edinburgh, has passed on the part to Tobias Menzies (Outlander), while the role of Princess Margaret has now been taken over by Helena Bonham Carter.

This season is expected to see the appearance of Camilla Parker Bowles, while the Princess of Wales will be the most eagerly awaited character of the fourth season to be filmed on the Costa del Sol.

## Murder Mystery and the Costa's good image

A few weeks ago, Costa del Sol tourist board expressed its "surprise" at the image of Malaga portrayed in the Netflix film Murder Mystery. It said that the movie offered a distorted portrayal of the province when the protagonists, Adam Sandler and Jennifer Aniston, are received at the airport by a bus from the 60s and a dancing gypsy. For this reason, they invited the producers of the film to visit

the coast and get to know the area properly.

In the opinion of Fresco Film producer Peter Welter Soler (Game of Thrones and Warrior Nun), the controversy is unjustified as the tourist board has given only a partial view of the film. In the following scenes, the couple get on a luxury yacht that offers an idyllic view of the coast of Malaga.

"I've just returned from Los Angeles, where the film has been a great success, and when I said I was from Malaga everyone told me about the film and how spectacular the coast was," says the producer.

Welter explains that the criticism of the gypsy scene and the bus comes from "not having understood the character of Sandler, who is stingy and therefore hires the cheapest tourist service, but then accepts the invitation for a luxury yacht vaca-

tion which shows that impressive image of Malaga". Murder Mystery got 31 million streams on Netflix in its first three days; the paradox is that neither the image of the airport nor those of the Costa del Sol were shot in the province, but in Italy.


Fonsi, the “hurricane of Latin rhythm” appeared for the third time at Starlite on Saturday and entertained his fans with some of his most popular hits.

# Thirty years of sound pet advice

It was the summer of 1989 that Peter Harrison wrote his first Pet Care column in SUR in English. Back then he and his wife Erny were running their kennels of the same name and were becoming increasingly aware of the need for information among owners about looking after their pets in southern Spain.

Both Peter and Erny, who later began penning her own columns on her speciality - cats, stress they are not vets and therefore cannot offer veterinary advice, but over the years their column in this newspaper has given pet owners information, based on their own knowledge, experience and common sense.

"The Pet Care column is about care, not cure," says Peter, 86, who was born in Devon, England.

The British-Dutch couple moved to Spain in 1988 to their fourth-floor apartment they had previously used for holidays in Marbella. "It was all right for holidays but not to live," says Erny. "We brought our dog with us; he was used to Dartmoor where he had his own hill."

Their move to find more space, therefore, was inevitable and they settled for a property in Alhaurin el Grande where they opened the Pet-care kennels.

The couple recall how it was SUR in English's then advertising manager, Eve Browne, who gave them the idea of writing a column. After a professional career almost entirely in television and publishing, Peter jumped at the chance. That way he and Erny could inform more owners about dangers such as Leishmaniasis and processionary caterpillars as well as offering general advice about caring for animals in warmer climates.

"We came to the conclusion that there was a lot of neglect in Spain, due to a lack of knowledge," he says.

The Pet Care column was later complemented with a section focusing on the wildlife of Andalucía.

Peter and Erny are well-known among the international community on the Costa del Sol and inland, and not just for their column and their love of animals. Both have been staunch supporters of hospice charity Cudeca, and Erny was involved in opening the shops in Coin and Álora, where she was manager until 2010. In 2016 Erny received special recognition for her service to the charity.

The couple's love of animals goes back as long as they can remember.

"We always had dogs at home," says Erny, who was born in Maastricht, the Netherlands, 81 years ago.

Before moving to Spain they had spent four years running their ten-room hotel after converting a derelict Georgian mansion on Dartmoor.

**Seeing the world**

They had previously been based in the UK but also travelled the world, thanks to Peter's job as international sales director for New York-based publishing firm McGraw-Hill. He went on to accept a lucrative six-month contract as a consultant to media mo-

gul Robert Maxwell, which helped fund the Dartmoor hotel project.

"Compared with a lot of people, we've seen a lot of the world," says Erny. In fact both Peter and Erny had enjoyed successful professional careers and travelled widely before they met in 1974.

Peter, who is also a qualified riding instructor, was born in Devon and went to school and university in Exeter. He served as an army officer during the Suez campaign in Egypt, where his respect for animals was heightened after his guard dog sensed a dangerous situation.

In 1957, Peter started working in commercial television, then still in its early days. He began by selling advertising and by the time he was 32 he was made Deputy Midlands Controller for Associated Television, based in Birmingham. There, he was responsible for many programmes, among them the soap opera Crossroads.

A series of events and chance meetings led Peter, who has a son, Neil (now 59), from Birmingham to London and from television to publishing. His job at McGraw-Hill took him around the world.

It was a business trip to the Neth-

erlands in 1974, however, that was to change his life. "If you want to meet someone, oversleep first," laughs Erny as she recalls the couple's failed first appointment when she was marketing director for a Dutch publishing company. The honest excuse passed on by her secretary - that she hadn't got up in time - intrigued Peter, who made sure to arrange a new meeting.

Erny's career prior to their meeting had seen her working around Europe. She had been an au pair in Paris when she was 18, and later worked in international schools in France, Germany and Belgium.

She was also a travel writer in Switzerland, Spain and Morocco and an account executive with a Dutch publisher and worked for Lancôme as a film editor.

"I was very lucky because Holland is very independent about women, and so I could get the jobs that women in those days probably in England couldn't get because of the gender difference," says Erny.

Peter and Erny saw each other whenever he was in Holland, visiting her in hospital for three months after she fractured her skull (ironically falling over her cats on the stairs). "And then he proposed marriage."

As Peter and Erny look back over their lives for this interview, their stories are all but dull.

Back in his television days, for business reasons Peter came up with the plan to film Crossroads for a period in Tunisia. The stories he found there inspired him to start writing a novel. A meeting with the daughter of a top Nazi in Spain gave him the information he needed to complete Legacy of Evil that was published in 1997.

Both Peter and Erny admit they have been very lucky in the way that opportunities have arisen for them in their lives, but perhaps it's a case of them both being able to make the most of what life has to offer.

Now they take life more easily, living with their cat and dog in the house, 30 minutes from Álora, they moved to when they sold their kennels 18 years ago. The couple's love of cruising is among the few things that drag them away from their home, where after 30 years they still write their Pet Care columns.

"People are looking after their animals so much better now than they were 30 years ago," says Peter, who hopes that their information has contributed to this progress.

I consider that, just as I would have had to pay the difference if I had paid less than the correct amount, now that I have overpaid, I should be entitled to get the reimbursement of the difference. Do I have the right to claim the money paid in excess? Of course you are entitled to receive the difference. There exists the possibility of asking for the correction of the mistake, even if it was you who made it. It is necessary to apply for it in writing and you have a term of five years. The tax administration will reimburse the amount paid in excess, plus the interests.

I have lived in a rented apartment for two years. At the beginning, the owner would ask me regularly about the condi-

tion of the property, if I felt at ease here, and I thought that this was simply good manners. However, my relation with him has gone downhill as he doesn't stop bothering me and watching me going in and out the apartment. He even came to see me once and tried to enter the property, but I almost had to slam the door in his face. Recently, there has been a problem with the kitchen pipes and he wants to take advantage of this to enter the property and check its condition. Can I refuse?

The owner of a rented property, unless he has an authorisation issued by the court by duly justified reasons, or the tenant's consent, is not entitled to enter the property. However, if there is serious damage or a repair necessary he can enter in order to check the damage and proceed to repair it. Obviously, he is entitled to verify the specific place where the damage is, not the whole apartment.

## Taking care of your cat in the summer

Although cats are very independent there are a few things you have to look after for them, especially in the heat of summer.

Cats take a very long time over their food. They will sniff at it first, then try a bit and when it is to their satisfaction it will eat. Even then it is unlikely that the food will be eaten in one go. Cats like to come back to their bowl throughout the day. In the summer fresh food will go bad very quickly so it is best to keep it in the fridge until needed again.

Whether the cat is long or short-haired makes no difference to its grooming. In all cases it has to be done regularly or the cat will get hairs in its stomach which can form hair balls.

Regular grooming will prevent this and will also help prevent ticks attaching themselves. If your cat has problems with hairballs you can add some extra roughage such as a wheat

cereal or olive oil to its food. Sardines in oil are considered a treat by most cats and will do the job of getting rid of hairballs equally well.

A weekly dose of products like Defer-Um, available from your vet, will prevent hairballs from forming. Most cats like its rabbit flavour and will lick it from your finger, or you could smear a little on its coat and next time it washes the cat will automatically ingest it.

Ants are a problem when food is left in the cat's bowl. To avoid this, place the bowl inside a bigger one with a wide rim and fill the outer bowl with water. The water forms a moat that the ants cannot bridge.

Another important precaution is to make sure that all your animals, dogs and cats alike have access to a shaded area outside and always keep a plentiful supply of fresh water within reach.

# ETA terrorists arrested over plot to kill king

**They had been watching the royal family from an apartment overlooking the harbour and the hit-man had the king in his sights on three occasions**

Every summer, the Spanish royal family spend a few weeks at their residence in Mallorca, the Marivent Palace. It has become a tradition over the years, and 1995 was no exception. That year, however, King Juan Carlos, Queen Sofia and their three children were enjoying a relaxing break with plenty of water sports and had no idea that somebody was planning to assassinate them.

That August, an armed unit of the Basque separatist terrorist group ETA was also in Mallorca, staying in an apartment overlooking the harbour in Porto Pi, where the royal yacht was berthed. Late at night on 9 August, the security forces swooped on the apartment

and arrested three men, who were later named as Juan José Rego Vidal, his son, Iñaki Rego, and Jorge García Sertucha. According to neighbours, several shots were fired during the raid.

The Spanish police had been tipped off by their French counterparts, who were monitoring Rego Vidal and alerted them when he left France by yacht the previous month, and they had been watching the suspects closely.

In a statement to the press the following day, the Secretary of State for the Interior, Margarita Robles, said the men had been arrested for allegedly plotting an attack on the royal family. Suspicions had been aroused by the location of the apart-

ment in which they were staying, the fact that they had weapons with them and documentation which suggested that they had been following the movements of the king and his family.

The Spanish authorities said later that Jorge García Sertucha, the

member of the gang who was supposed to carry out the shooting, had the king in the rifle's crosshairs three times in late July and early August of 1995 but had not pulled the trigger because he couldn't be sure he would be able to escape safely immediately afterwards.

Rego Vidal had already spent a year in jail for conspiring to kill King Juan Carlos and the then Prime Minister Adolfo Suárez in Ibiza in 1979, and had been suspected of being part of an ETA unit that tried to kill the king's father, Don Juan, in 1975.

After the arrests on 9 August, the king and his family continued their holiday with every semblance of normality. Years later, the dramatic incident was featured in a two-episode TV drama in Spain.

**A** mine may have been abandoned by its miners, but it is still of interest to people who like to search for small minerals, either for their own collections or to sell on specialist websites or at fairs and street markets.

One day in December 1999, several members of the Grupo Mineralogista of Madrid tried their luck at a mine in Almeria province which had been closed 30 years earlier. When they reached a gallery 60 metres below the ground they found a strange white wall, which gave way easily with a couple of blows from a hammer. When Efrén Cuesta, from Asturias, looked through the hole, he couldn't believe his eyes. He was used to holding small geodes, just a few centimetres in size, in his hands, but this time he was actually standing inside one: it was a room made of rock, about 11 square metres, whose walls were covered with gigantic and extremely beautiful crystals.

That shining extravagance of the earth turned out to be the second biggest geode in the world, and it has just become the first in a perfect state of conservation which has been put on public display.

"These are the most transparent selenite crystals I have ever seen. It is spectacular," said Juan Manuel García Ruiz, a research professor at the Laboratory of Crystallographic Studies at the CSIC in Granada.

The giant Pulpí geode, the biggest in Europe, is in the shape of an elongated rugby ball and measures eight metres long by 1.8 wide and 1.7 high. Its crystals, which resemble knives of ice up to two metres long, are so astonishingly clear that it is possible to read a book through some of them. In the whole world, only one larger than this has been documented, and that is in the Naica Crystals Cave in the Mexican state of Chihuahua.

A geode is the result of a rare combination of accidents and the meticulous work of nature, says García, who knows these underground treasures very well. For one to be formed, a rock cavity fills with hot water with dissolved minerals, which then slowly cools. They have different colours and features depending on the type of materials and the conditions in which they form.

In the case of Almeria, the rock is a hollow dolomite in which a fissure appeared, through which the liquid with calcium sulphate (gypsum) of volcanic origin entered,

flooding the cavity during tens or hundreds of thousands of years. It is hard to determine when it occurred, but Juan Manuel García calculates that it was between two million and 90,000 years ago. The oscillations of temperature in the Earth's crust during millennia in the Sierra de Aguilón meant that in the interior the smallest crystals dissolved and the biggest ones grew extremely slowly.

The experts don't know how many of these almost magical capsules exist in the Earth's crust but, given that they are found at a certain depth, it is normal for them to be discovered during excavations to extract minerals for commercial use.

The Pulpí geode is exceptional in that way, because it was never discovered before even though iron, lead and silver were extracted from the Mina Rica from the end of the 19th century till 1970. It was very lucky, because at that time there was not much sensitivity towards these geological miracles: the picks and explosives crashed through

everything. In fact, in the mine there are the remains of half a dozen other, smaller, geodes which were split by the excavation and revealed their interior treasure. The workers most certainly didn't think they were important and used to take 'diamonds' home as a pretty souvenir, without thinking about the fact that they were the result of millions of years of intimate contact between the stone and water.

#### A secret revealed

After the accidental discovery by a collector, a group of local researchers studied the find and notified the relevant authorities to try to guarantee the protection of an extremely fragile treasure. However much they tried to keep it a secret, though, rumours spread among mineralogists and they couldn't stop two crystals being stolen before the cavity was sealed and monitored to prevent the curious and looters entering. During these 20 years, the Junta de Andalucía has still not managed to complete the process of classifying the geode as a piece of geological or natural heritage.



Pulpí council has always wanted to include the remains of its mining past in the Pilar de Jaravía district, and especially the geode, on

its list of tourist attractions which currently focuses on its ten kilometres of beaches, golf and agrotourism. Since 2015, visitors at the San Juan de los Terreros castle on the coast, three kilometres from the access to the mine, have been able to take a type of tour by putting on 3-D virtual reality glasses.

Now the council has taken a step further and, with help from the Almeria provincial government, has invested half a million euros on preparing the site for tourism and making its hidden treasure the first geode open to visitors in the world. There are strict rules: visitors are not be able to go inside the geode, but can see its interior through a type of window, to guarantee their own safety as well as preserve this unique treasure.

"Gypsum is a very soft material, you can scratch it with your nails. Footsteps, damp and CO2 from people breathing can also damage the crystals," explained Francisco Fernández Amo, a geologist from the Tecminsa company which has carried out the project to turn the

## Underground tourism growing in popularity

Pulpí has joined the Association of Tourism Caves of Spain, which has 40 members in the form of municipalities with natural or artificial caves which are of interest to tourists. These include Nerja (Malaga), Karrantza (Vizcaya), Altamira (Cantabria), La Jayona (Badajoz) and Jalance (Valencia). "We want people to see the mine, its buildings and its environment, not just the geode," said Juan Bautista López, Pulpí's tourism councillor.

In Almeria province there are already some very attractive places for fans of geological tourism, such as the old Rodalquilar gold mines, the karst beauty spot of Sorbas, with hundreds of galleries full of stalactites and stalagmites, and the Cabo de Gata Geopark and its beautiful volcanic landscapes overlooking the Mediterranean.

site into a museum.

Those who already know the mine are convinced it is a remarkable tourist attraction. "The mine has a large variety of minerals and during the visit people will be able to see the insides of dozens of smaller split geodes, one of which is 3.5 metres," said the local councillor for Tourism, Juan Bautista López, prior to its opening to the public this week.

The visitors have to wear safety helmets and, accompanied by a guide, walk in small groups through the 330 metres of the main gallery. They then go down to the second level, where they can take selfies with a split geode and access the 40-metre-high excavation chambers.

"They are like underground cathedrals," said Fernández Amo. "The geode is unique in the world, but the geological and mining heritage is also fantastic. There are faults, folds and different geological structures."

Not long ago, he made a further discovery: some of the minerals that form the walls of the mine are fluorescent when ultraviolet light is shone on them. Calcite, strontium calcite, epsomite and aragonite glow in hues of red, green, violet and silver which add to the spectacle of the underground route.

#### How does a crystal form?

When the dissolution of a mineral cools very slowly, the atoms are placed in an ordered manner and form polyhedral structures. There are crystals everywhere, sometimes visible such as in salt, sugar or sand, and sometimes not, as in ice cream, coral, medications and electronic equipment.

#### What is a geode?

It is a hollow rock whose inside is covered with crystals, mostly quartz, calcite and gypsum. They form in different ways. In geodes like the ones in Pulpí and Naica, the water cools over thousands and thousands of years. Juan Manuel García, the geologist at the CSIC who took part in surveying the Mexican cave, said its crystals grew at the rate of "one human hair per century". That is, indeed, very slow.

metres is the distance travelled on a visit to Mina Rica, although the pit, which is also known as Quien Tal Pensara, is much bigger.

#### Now open

The mine, which is in the Pilar de Jaravía area of Pulpí, a few kilometres from the boundary between Almeria and Murcia, opened to visitors this week. Tickets cost between 10 and 22 euros and are currently available for dates between 23 September and 13 October. Visit [www.geodapulpi.es](http://www.geodapulpi.es)

Inside the mine you can still see the 'cages' used to descend to the depths, machinery, boxes of explosives and tools used by the miners in different periods, as well as packets of cigarettes and old beer bottles.

Finally, visitors are led down steps to the third level - which is at sea level - to access the platform from which the 'treasure cave', the interior of the huge diode, can be seen through a glass panel.

## 'Hot' crepe ginger

**Dramatic *Cheilocostus speciosus* has petals reminiscent of Marilyn Monroe's famous dress in 'Some Like It Hot'**

*Cheilocostus speciosus* (previously called *Costus speciosus*) is a distant cousin of true ginger. Unlike its relation it is not aromatic, although the rhizomous root has been used for centuries in Ayurvedic medi-

cine to treat a range of illnesses including fevers, bronchitis, intestinal worms, rashes and asthma.

It is mentioned in

the Kama Sutra as an important ingredient in cosmetics used on eyelashes to increase sexual attractiveness. In some countries it is believed to have magical powers and can drive evil spirits (illnesses) out of the body and in some countries the young shoots and buds are eaten as a vegetable.

Common names for *Cheilocostus speciosus* include crepe ginger, cane reed, Malay ginger, spiral flag and wild ginger. It is a member of the Costaceae family and is native to Malaysia, India, Bhutan, Nepal, South China, Taiwan, Indo China, New Guinea and parts of Australia

Its large, thick, glossy leaves up to 30cm long are arranged around the red tinged cane-like stems in a spiral. The delicate white crepe-like flowers open from attractive red cone-shaped bracts in the late summer or early autumn. After flowering has finished the red bracts remain and oval fruit capsules form with black seeds inside.

Crepe ginger can grow up to three metres tall in frost-free areas but is usually a lot smaller if grown in a container. Partial shade is preferable to a location in full sun and it will withstand some drought but is not cold hardy.

Propagation is by carefully removing and potting up the plantlets that form in the leaf axils just below the flower head. Crepe ginger will also grow from cuttings or by splitting the clump when it is dormant and replanting pieces of the rhizome with at least one 'eye'.

There is a variegated form of crepe ginger *C. Speciosus* 'Variegatus' which has cream and green leaves and is shorter than the non-variegated species.

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# Bullfighting season: the moral question

A book by Scottish writer A. L. Kennedy is among the best English-language preparations for a 'corrida'

**MALAGA.** The ten-day Malaga feria kicks off next week and will feature eight bullfights, running from 14 to 21 August. If you're curious about the spectacle and are thinking of seeing a "corrida de toros" (literally "running of bulls"; "bullfight" is a handy but misleading translation), it's worth preparing yourself, as best you can, for what you'll see in the ring. I'd highly recommend reading the Scottish writer A.L. Kennedy's book *On Bullfighting* (1999), arguably the best introduction to the world of the bulls available in English.

Kennedy's research was meticulous. She attended corridas in Madrid and Seville, studied DVDs and read taurine magazines and books recommended to her by an aficionado friend. In *On Bullfighting*, she explains what happens during each of the spectacle's carefully-choreographed "tercios" (or thirds) in flowing, detailed prose. She also explores the morality of the corrida, looking hard at the uncomfortable realities of what plays out on the sand. I contacted Kennedy over email, via her Oxford-based agent, and asked what advice she would give to someone thinking of going to a corrida for the first time.

"You have to be aware that at least one thing will die," she wrote in her reply, implicitly referring to the fact that matadors, too, are sometimes killed and frequently seriously injured (the last matador to die in the ring was 36-year-old Iván Fandiño, fatally gored during a bullfight in France in June 2017).

"It makes you complicit in some things you may not like. And unless

the matador is wonderful, it's not even going to approach an artistry that would begin to excuse a death. If you're up for it and okay with all that, you would really need to read up on it so that you understand what on earth is going on - and it's good to have a bit of Spanish so that you can chat with people watching and get that angle."

The moral question posed by the corrida is whether its art and beauty justify the punishment the bull suffers in the ring and, ultimately, its death. A second, equally challenging, question follows logically: if there is no art or beauty, is the corrida immoral? I have deployed what might be called the "aesthetic defence" many times in the past, but now I'm not so sure that it holds, because the last couple of corridas I attended were nowhere near good enough to justify an animal's death. Several of Spain's top matadors are scheduled to perform in this year's Malaga feria, but there is still no guarantee that they'll be able to produce anything elevating or beautiful.

Yet there is always the possibility that man and animal, working together, will create something unforgettable and when that happens the corrida can be intensely moving. Kennedy found that "the poise, the elegance, the weird gentleness of some matadors is remarkable... There can be a high degree of skill, whether you like the skill or not".

Her writing is also alive to the spectacle's symbolic aspects - those which hinge on our empathy for bull or man, or both. As she put it over email, "I think everyone understands what it's like to go out into the world and have it hurt you when you don't expect the blows and can't defend yourself - that whole scenario, the bull's journey,

is very evocative".

The subtext to *On Bullfighting* concerns the spectacle's wider context - namely, our treatment of animals, especially those that are killed for our entertainment, whether aesthetic or gastronomic.

"When I was researching I wasn't a vegetarian and it's hard to have a credible position on cruelty if you consider an average slaughterhouse, or factory/intensive farming," Kennedy told me. "I did, actually, try to visit a slaughterhouse for the book and that was even harder than getting into the world of the corrida. I never found anywhere that would admit me". The author is now a vegetarian, although her conversion was owed to "the ecological damage done by meat farming" rather than what she saw in the ring.

One wonders why abattoir doors were closed to Kennedy and

whether what happens behind them is more defensible than the corrida - the case often made by anti-bullfight carnivores (a problematic position to adopt, but a very common one). Just to imagine "a slaughterhouse with punching and kicking and fear and metal clamps and failed shots", to use Kennedy's uncompromising words, is enough to make you think hard about the morality of killing animals solely for human consumption. "It's probably as shitty as what happens in the ring," she says.

To really make up your mind about the corrida, you have to see one. But before you do, it's better if you acquaint yourself with the world of the bulls - with its "delicate and superstitious atmosphere" (as Kennedy puts it), its place in Spanish culture and the brutal intricacies of what happens on the sand. On Bullfighting is a great place to start.



## GASTRONOMIC LET-DOWNS



**A**n email from a friend on an extended visit to Florida (USA) includes a photo showing a modest pile of shopping, mainly fruit and vegetables. Most appear to be past their best, but even this apparently small selection, bought at a store the equivalent of which in Malaga would be Aldi or Lidl, cost the equivalent of 54 euros. Three times more than the estimated cost here. No wine was bought. Why? Simply because the value-for-money element is skewed, and in spite of Trump's allegation that US wines are unfairly treated by the EU's import tariffs, actually no-one wants them.

When did we last see a Californian or Oregon, or any other US wine for that matter, on a wine list here? I cannot remember ever seeing one, except in ridiculously expensive restaurants where the wine list comes in a bound volume as thick as a bible, and includes wines from every wine-producing country in the world.

Anyway, my friend, after taking into account the most negative aspects of the world's most powerful country (where 33,000 people die each year because they cannot afford adequate medical attention), concludes that this particular 'paradise' can only be considered as such if you belong to the 3% of the population that controls 97% of the nation's wealth.

Next stop for my friend is Quebec, on a search for the classical French cuisine that apparently still exists in this old French colony. But his bad luck persists. The city is a cultural and gastronomic oasis. In the so-called best restaurants the selection offered is very unexciting and prices are ridiculous, with mark-ups that can reach 400%. As to local produce, although the city is situated on an estuary, good fish is not easy to come by, and in spite of the surrounding lush and fertile countryside, apparently good meat is also in short supply. The only reasonable conclusion is that any traces of classic French cuisine that may remain in this once-colonial outpost are about as easy to find as traces of Spanish gastronomy in the once-Spanish Philippines, ergo zero.

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# AECC opens the first active centre for the fight against cancer in Marbella

It is the first centre of its type in Andalucía and is a place where patients and their families can feel comfortable and receive support and advice

**MARBELLA.** This week in Marbella, the Spanish cancer association, Asociación Española Contra el Cáncer (AECC), inaugurated its first "active space against cancer" in Andalucía. Marbella has now joined Madrid and Barcelona, the only two other cities to possess a centre of this type. The association has been helping in the fight against cancer in Spain for 66 years.

"It is in Marbella, for Marbella," said the local president of AECC, Maika Gómez, about the new facility. She expressed her gratitude for the support received from numerous entities that have helped the project come to fruition, including the provincial government, the Diputación, of Malaga.

"We have to put our shoulders to the wheel because our resources are limited, but if we can do something to help the fight against can-

cer then we have to do it," said Francisco Salado, president of the Diputación.

The objective of this new centre is to offer cancer patients and their families a place where they can feel comfortable, away from a hospital

atmosphere. "What we wanted to do was fill the space with activity, light and life," explained Alberto Arenaga, one of the architects of the project. "This new centre will make everything so much easier."

In the new premises the asso-

ciation will continue to provide the same free services as it has since it was founded, but "as well as offering support, it is a space where people can share their experiences and receive medical and psychological advice", explained

Isabel Cintado, the councillor for Social Rights.

In addition to the programmes that AECC has been providing in Marbella since the 1980s, it also has a palliative care service, anti-smoking unit, voice rehabilitation sessions, a healthy lifestyle campaign in schools and a volunteer service.

"We need more support from public and private entities, such as town halls, provincial governments and associations like the AECC, so we can join forces and fight cancer together," said the head of the Andalusian service, Miguel Moreno, who also took the opportunity to call for more specialists in some towns and cities in the region.

"There aren't enough doctors. Patients have to go from Malaga or Seville to the hospital in Algeciras because of the lack of oncologists, and we are talking about a population of more than 350,000," he said. He also attributed the problem to the fact that many doctors have moved to other countries to work, and said something needs to be done to get them to come back.

## Research

Moreno stressed the importance of research, which is fundamental in eradicating this illness. "We must not forget the talent of the researchers who introduce treatments and therapies which are proving more and more effective," he said. There are seven research foundations in Andalucía, one of which is in Malaga province.

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# Urinary incontinence, the silent condition that affects millions of people worldwide

**The problem affects the quality of life of those who suffer from it, restricting their autonomy and reducing their self-esteem as well as often causing urinary infections and ulcers**

**U**rinary incontinence is a condition that occurs when a person can't stop urine escaping from their urethra, the tube which transports it outside the body from the bladder. Age, surgery, weight increase, neurological disorders, pregnancy and the menopause are some of the most common causes of this condition.

According to the International Continence Society, more than 400 million people all over the world are affected by urinary incontinence, and approximately 6.6 million of them (about 15 per cent of the population) are in Spain. However, it is difficult to give exact figures because an estimated four million people hide

the fact because of the social stigma associated with it. It is also perceived as a health problem which is not particularly serious, or even as a normal consequence of ageing, despite the difficulties it places on the quality of life for those who suffer from it, making them less autonomous and affecting their self-esteem. It can often also cause urinary infections and ulcers.

With regard to age, although it is true that incontinence becomes more common as the years pass, it can occur at any time of life and is not always associated with getting older.

Equally, although it is more common in women and people often associate it with pregnancy and the menopause, it can actu-

ally affect both sexes at any stage of life.

In fact, experts estimate that one in every four men will suffer incontinence after the age of 40. Ageing, the size of the prostate, cancer and neurological disorders such as Parkinson's or Alzheimer's are some of the most common causes.

### Treatments

Depending on the type of incontinence, there are different lines of treatment and alternatives. What is important is that the diagnosis is correct in each case, so the patient receives the treatment which is most suitable for their condition.

Treatments range from medication to physiotherapy of the pelvic floor, different types of electrostimulation, the injection of botulinum toxin (botox) in the bladder, or surgery.

One of the most traditional and effective treatments is physiotherapy, which solves the problem in a high percentage of cases, but other very effective therapies include the application of suburethral mesh, which presents a low morbidity and suitable clinical security.

This surgical treatment is used for women who suffer incontinence when doing physical activity. It should be remembered that the synthetic meshes used for stress incontinence are different to those used in the case of prolapse of pelvic organs and therefore, when considering the risks, it is important to distinguish between the minor ones associated with the surgery using mesh for stress incontinence and those associated with surgery using mesh to treat a prolapse.

Another treatment which is be-

ing used for hyperactive bladder and urinary incontinence is botox, which is giving very good results.

This toxin is administered in small doses directly into the tissue of the bladder, producing a relaxation of the overactive muscles to increase capacity and stop involuntary contractions.

This reduces the frequency of urinating and episodes of urinary incontinence.

With regard to surgery for women, a recent study carried out by researchers at the Mayo Clinic in the USA has shown that retro-pubic suspension surgery is more effective than transobturator surgery for stress incontinence.

The report, based on the experience of 1800 patients, says the two most common types of operation are the retropubic sling, which consists of placing a mesh sling below the urethra and behind the pubic bone, and the transobturator sling, where the sling is placed at a less acute angle through the space.

With regard to recovery rates within eight years of surgery, experts found it was 11.2 per cent for patients in the transobturator group and 5.2 per cent in the retropubic group.

**MARBELLA.** Noemí Delgado is a 25-year-old teacher but is studying to join the National Police, and on 18 August she will be representing Malaga province at the Miss Mundo Spain competition in Melilla. She will also be raising awareness of the very rare 'butterfly skin disease'

(Epidermolysis Bullosa).

The beauty competition will determine who will represent Spain at Miss Universe, and all the candidates are asked to champion a charitable cause. Noemí, who is from Benahavis, has chosen the DEBRA butterfly skin association, which began in Marbella and is still based there.

"Few people know about butterfly skin disease and I really want to help those who suffer from it, by encouraging funding for research to improve their lives," she said. The painful disease, which is genetic, makes the skin and mucous membranes blister very easily.

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# Residents' lifesaving investment

Two hundred residential communities on the Costa del Sol are already 'cardio-protected' with defibrillators installed in communal areas

**MALAGA.** "Let's hope that we never have to use it, but, if the day arrives when we do, and it allows us to save a life, its installment is more than justified." These were the words of Andrés García, referring to the defibrillator recently installed in the entrance hall of his block, in the residential area of Cruz del Sur, Benalmádena.

"There are nearly 200 residents living here, many of them of an older age, and so we realised that it was a good idea to have a defibrillator because you never know what might happen," García said, reasoning the installment with convincing statistics. Sixty-five per cent of the almost 30,000 deaths caused by cardiac issues recorded in Spain happen in the home.

For several weeks now, this community of residents has been 'cardio-protected' by its semi-automatic external defibrillator, and this neighbourhood is not alone. More and more residential blocks are introducing this equipment to their properties, although there is still a long way to go.

According to statistics managed by the association of property administrators (Colegio de Administradores de Fincas de Málaga), 200 communities have become 'cardio-protected'

since the contract signed by Procardio Healthcare in 2017, designed to promote the installation of defibrillators in residential buildings. The majority of these protected communities are on the western side of the Costa del Sol.

Before a defibrillator can be installed, an obligatory course must be taken to learn how to use the equipment. In the case of Cruz del Sur, three community caretakers and five residents of different nationalities who tend to spend a considerable amount of time at home have received basic life support training, including cardiopulmonary resuscitation techniques and instructions on how to use the equipment.

"With eight people, we can rest assured that at least one will be able to get to the scene in the case of an emergency," said García.

This equipment comes with audio

instructions in various languages in order to facilitate easy use in an emergency situation. "It's crucial that, in the case of an emergency, residents know who to turn to, because every minute lost significantly increases the probability of death," explained José Manuel Alcalá, manager of Meduba, a company that specialises in the 'cardio-protection' of public and now private spaces, in response to the increasing demand from residential areas for defibrillators.

The Spanish Heart Foundation (Fundación Española del Corazón) emphasises the need to act quickly

in the incidence of a heart attack. Those at the scene should call 112, begin the process of resuscitation and call for somebody to fetch the nearest defibrillator, in order to deliver electric shocks to the person while waiting for the ambulance to arrive.

The cost? 1,000 euros upwards, although in this particular case, the community has paid 1,600 euros, with the money also covering the cost of a device which automatically advises the emergency services as soon as the defibrillator cabinet is opened. The cost of the training and posters distributed throughout the residential complex, indicating the location of the equipment and instructing residents on who to call, is also included. As for maintenance of the defibrillators, the advantage is that they check themselves. You only have to remember to change the batteries and electrodes every two to four years.

**Use of the free Salud Responde app has increased by over 50 per cent this year**

**MALAGA.** The free Salud Responde app is becoming increasingly popular with people in Malaga province who want to make or cancel an appointment with their GP, or request information. In the first six months of this year, the number of transactions carried out via this app went up by 50.4 per cent, says the director of Salud Responde, José María González.

Thirty-six per cent of the population of the province (587,762 people) now have this free application and it has become the most-used method of managing health centre appointments.

The app, which has been developed for Apple, Android and Windows Phone, can be downloaded from the website of the Andalusian Health Ministry or that of the Empresa Pública de Emergencias Sanitarias ([www.epes.es](http://www.epes.es)), which manages the Salud Responde service. Once the app has been downloaded, the user has to enter the number of their social security card, their date of birth and DNI or NIE. The system registers the complete profile on the app, so the user can access it easily and directly every time without having to enter that information again.

If required, users of this app can also receive, free of charge, reminders about appointments, notifications and information, as well as public health warnings and advice about matters such as a forthcoming heatwave, allergies or other campaigns, in text and video format or links to websites. During the first six months of this year, 103,125 SMS messages were sent to users of the app for these reasons.

**Phone calls**

In the first half of this year Salud Responde also attended to 729,219 phone calls from people wanting to make or cancel appointments or asking for information. Of these, 4,895 were through the telephone assistance system (also known as the 'red button'). On average it takes about 55 seconds for someone who rings the service to make, change or cancel an appointment.

The employees who answer the phone at Salud Responde have been specifically trained in communication techniques, managing emotions and how to handle complaints, and they receive continual training in order to improve the quality of the service.

Salud Responde can also change appointments with specialists, and users of this part of the service increased by 24.2 per cent in the first half of 2019 compared with the same period last year. Between January and June, it was used 95,748 times.



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## Jimera de Líbar, the most cardio-protected place in Spain

**MALAGA** With one defibrillator for every 92 inhabitants, the village of Jimera de Líbar, in the Serranía de Ronda, is now the most cardio-protected municipality in Spain, far above the national average of one defibrillator for every 2,000 inhabitants. There are now five of these machines for public use in Jimera, and many local residents have been trained in how to use them.

The mayor, Francisco Lobos, decided to install the defibrillators after discovering that equipment of this type had been installed in Calle Larios in Malaga. He started by acquiring one, with the support

of the provincial government, and recently added four more.

"Local people are delighted because they feel safer," he said, "But of course the equipment is also there for the thousands of visitors we receive every year."

Two of the defibrillators are in the busiest areas of Jimera, the Plaza Virgen de la Salud and Plaza de San Roque. They are the most advanced types on the market, providing 24-hour tele-assistance from a specialist in emergencies, calls to the 061 emergency service and GPS location of the defibrillator. They are also permanently monitored to ensure they are functioning correctly.

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# Sheikh Al-Thani: "Everything will be resolved soon"

**MALAGA.** Following a summer of perceived inactivity, Malaga CF club president Sheikh Abdullah Al-Thani went on a charm offensive this week amid growing discontent among the fanbase. At the time of going to print, with just eight days until the start of the season, Malaga have been the least active side in the transfer market, signing just one player, Shinji Okazaki on a free transfer from Leicester City.

However, much work is still to be done. Last week, La Liga announced in a statement to agents that Malaga were unable to register any new players having surpassed the league wage cap. This is still currently the case.

With this in mind, Al-Thani took

to Twitter on Wednesday to appeal to the fans directly (it began with the words "My message to everyone").

"I know it's [a] difficult moment but Everything we will solve it soon [sic]," he said, finishing his tweet with: "Please do not worry at all".

The sheikh also used Twitter, his most used means of communicating with fans, to say that defender Luis Hernández, currently missing through injury, was not for sale.

### Official statement

Al-Thani's comments were followed up on Thursday by an official club statement, echoing the sheikh's sentiments.

The sheikh, it said, "knows the

great history of this Club and, together with the rest of the management team, has been working hard to ensure Malaga CF is in the best possible position ahead of the start of the upcoming season".

It continued: "We ask for confidence in the presidency, the Board of Direc-

tors and the management team. We are convinced the team will achieve great accomplishments that will be shared by the city and the fans."

With the clock ticking, Al-Thani is keen to boost his standing among the fans who are

growing increasingly frustrated as the club goes through its most difficult period of the past decade.

Despite the unrest, however, a protest organised for last week against the "worrying paralysis around the club caused by Al-Thani" only gathered around 20 supporters in Plaza de la Constitución in the city centre.

## Ontiveros still in limbo with Villarreal move up in the air

## From insanity to tranquility

Unlikely as it may seem, the formerly chaotic Atlético Madrid are now showing the rest how it should be done

Who would have thought that the club once considered to be the craziest in the world is now the model of normality?

Jesús Gil, the president who courted controversy, cut a figure like one of the Sopranos and changed managers as often as his shirts will be turning in his grave.

As the Premier League went into a deadline-day frenzy and Real Madrid continue to operate in a state of turmoil and Barcelona still have many questions to be answered, Atlético have completed the main business, replenished the squad and are eagerly ready for the new season.

This is a club that sold Antoine Griezmann to Barça, Rodri to Manchester City and Lucas Hernández to Bayern Munich yet in my view are the best prepared for this La Liga campaign. That's some statement considering they've also bid adios to two of the mainstays of their success, Diego Godín and Juanfran.

Atleti have merely shed a skin and revealed a new layer. It looks good, very slick.

The money from Griezmann has been invested in João Félix. Few can truthfully claim to know a great deal about the teenager before the transfer made him the fourth costliest player in the world. The first impressions are very impressive; he's shone in the pre-season games so far and the signs are that he'll slip right in.

Who'll partner Félix from the

'Lost Boys' remains to be seen. Diego Costa looked his old self against Real Madrid until the old demons took control and he was dismissed. Álvaro Morata could be the latest player to rediscover himself under the management of Diego Simeone.

### A new defence

Kieran Trippier, meanwhile, hasn't needed to master the language as coach Mono Burgos has wrestled him around the training ground, handling the England international like a puppet on strings. Atleti's defence has been a fort for years, now they've rebuilt the fort with new bricks. Renan Lodi, is a 21-year-old Brazilian who should start left back with Mario Hermoso from Espanyol and Felipe of Porto arriving to fight for places.

The team is built on the foundations of some of the best young talent in Europe. Jan Oblak has few peers as a goalkeeper; it's difficult to believe that Saúl is still only 24; Koke will relish running the midfield as the senior partner; and France international Thomas Lemar should flourish in his second season.

It's all looking incredibly well balanced. The key has been keeping 'Cholo' Simeone and, more importantly, keeping him happy. They call it 'Cholismo'. It's a vibe, a belief, a system.

His detractors, and there aren't many, say he's too rigid with his system. His detractors have never managed a club once regarded as a basket-case to two Champions League Finals, won La Liga and split the Barcelona-Real Madrid domination of Spanish football.

Why should he differ from 4-4-2 just to suit the hipsters who attach themselves to football? He keeps it uncomplicated and it works wonderfully.

He wanted to afford himself one luxury and that was James Rodríguez but that plan was blown out of the water when they humiliated Real Madrid in the States. They couldn't be seen to be allowing their rivals to acquire a player that may make them even better!

Simeone is content at a club where insanity was once the daily state. All is tranquil at Atlético Madrid. Normality never needed to be restored.

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## Valle takes Pastrana's crown in first event at new Marbella Arena

The Costa Rican boxer, with the aim of taking the title that Pastrana was defending for the third time, exerted a good combination of blows and put her rival against the ropes on several occasions.

Far from falling into Valle's quick game, Pastrana put on an unaffected defence, putting enough distance between them to make

Valle miss some blows.

However, the Costa Rican came out victorious (finishing 96-94, 93-97, 93-97), claiming Pastrana's crown.

After the declaration of Valle as the winner, Pastrana congratulated her rival and told the media that she had sustained an injury in her hand in the first round, which made the rest of the fight difficult.

### Marbella Arena

The fight was the first event to take place at the new Marbella Arena, formerly the Puerto Banús bull ring, after months of works on a full refit.

The boxing championship launched a two-month schedule of events planned this summer, before the venue closes again for the second stage of renovations, with Diego El Cigala and Navajita Plateá performing the site's first concert last Tuesday.

Upcoming events this summer include: Los Secretos and La Unión, Pueblos Blancos Music Festival, Pablo Milanés and the Queen and U2 Tribute 'This is what we are living for'.

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# Twenty stitches for Luis Ángel Maté after fall in Tour de Pologne

The Marbella road racer's fall preceded the death of 22-year-old Belgian cyclist Bjorg Lambrecht, which followed a collision at another stage of the tour

**MALAGA.** Cyclist Luis Ángel Maté, from Marbella, is already back on the Costa del Sol where he is continuing his recovery from a serious fall last Saturday.

The fall happened during the first stage of the Tour de Pologne in Poland in which Maté made his first appearance following weeks of altitude training with his team, Cofidis.

Maté was involved in a collision with teammate Filippo Fortin and fell from his bike only 20 kilometres from the finish line in Krakow. The huge impact to Maté's head resulted in serious bleeding and the cyclist was rushed to hospital in Poland, where he spent Saturday and Sunday night.

Despite not suffering a single fracture and not losing consciousness at any stage during or after the fall, Maté required more than 20 stitches in his head. His team-

mate was not so lucky, however, and had to undergo an operation.

The fall happened only two days before the tragic death of young Belgian cyclist Bjorg Lambrecht, who crashed into a concrete drainage tube in a roadside ditch at another stage of the tour.

Maté described his fall on Satur-

day as the "ugliest" he has experienced in a race, and said: "The helmet saved my life." He also argued that "the Polish roads were not in suitable conditions" for racing.

The crash came at an unfortunate time for Maté, three weeks to the day before the start of the Vuelta a España in Torrevieja.

who had her hands and feet amputated after contracting sepsis.

Chris Grenfell (53) and Jansen Riley (55), along with several swimmers and cyclists, swam five kilometres along the Marbella coastline, before embarking on a 200-kilome-

tre bicycle ride to Granada. Chris and Jansen then attempted to run up Pico Veleta, the highest tarmac road in Europe. Unfortunately, Chris suffered exhaustion half way up the mountain and was forced to withdraw from the race, but Jansen went on to complete the triathlon in 23 hours and 13 minutes.

"I was absolutely devastated to have to pull out of the final 25 kilometres of the run. I was so close, yet so far, but at least we have raised a good sum for such a worthy cause," Chris told SUR in English.

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# The Hulland sisters take a leap

Lily and Jasmine are from Malaga and compete with Nerja Atletismo - but have British nationality

**MALAGA.** At home they speak English, but despite their names, Lily and Jasmine are from Malaga. "We were born here and have lived here all our lives, so we can say that we are from Malaga," says Lily, the oldest by 15 months.

Their story in Spain began when their parents, from Manchester and regular tourists on the Costa del Sol, decided to move to Marbella, where their two daughters were born. Years later, looking to move house, their mother and her two daughters moved to Ronda, where they currently live. While the head of the family travels everyday throughout the province with her own home interiors company, Lily and Jasmine study and train at the athletics track in Ronda.

Although they have occasional sibling arguments, they are joint at the hip and spend the majority of their time together. Lily is 17 years old (18 this September) and competes at under-20 level, while Jasmine, who is 16 years old (17 at the end of the year), is in the under-18 category.

Despite starting to run very early, their real talent was the jumps. "We began doing cross country and we tried the triple jump later. In my case, I had never done any other sports before because I am really bad at them," the older sister jokes. The younger one explained: "I'm the same, I got into athletics a little later, seeing that my sister really enjoyed it. I used to do swimming and rhythmic

gymnastics, but I opted for this."

## The right decision

This proved to be a good decision. The first time that Lily competed in the triple jump was only three years ago (in 2016) and Jasmine two years ago (in 2017). Today the former holds the under-18 and under-20 (as an under-18) record for Andalucía, she came 12th in the European under 18s (last year), she was runner-up in the GB under 20s, leads the under-20s rankings both in Britain and in Spain and her score (13.16 metres) is the sixth

best this year in Europe.

Her little sister is following in her footsteps, albeit with fewer competitions under her belt. Jasmine finished in the top ten in the Spain under-18 championships, with a distance of 12.18 metres, she was champion in the Andalusian indoor championships and came third in Spain's under-18s.

## International ambitions

These Malaga girls are already both competing with the Cueva de Nerja -UMA and as with all great athletes, they have their sights set in-

ternationally: either a World Championships or the Olympic Games.

However, when it comes to competing internationally, they represent Great Britain as both have British nationality. In the case of Lily, when she moves to the under-20s, she will no longer be able to compete in Andalusian or Spanish championships and will therefore have to do it in the UK. That's why while Jasmine was winning bronze at the Spanish U-18 championship, her older sister was winning U-20 gold 2,400 kilometres away.

"I have thought about applying for the Spanish nationality, but the procedures are very slow and I would lose the opportunity to compete at international level in that time. Having already competed with GB, we would have to wait two years to switch allegiances," explains Lily.

## Intensive studies

What's more, next academic year she will be starting of the best UK university according to The Times, Loughborough. There she will study Art and Design after getting 12.2 out of 14 in the Baccalaureate.

Meanwhile, Jasmine, who studies science and is a lover of astrophysics, will begin second year of her Baccalaureate next year, later seeking to study Physics at university.

However, despite their demanding studies and schedules, they both want to keep fighting to carve out a future for themselves in international athletics.

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




