Andalusian health service goes back to in-person appointments with the doctor

This region is the first in Spain to restore the service since the pandemic began

The Junta de Andalucía regional government announced this week it is bringing back the opportunity to see a doctor in person at its public health centres from 1 October.

Regional president, Juanma Moreno, said that Andalucía was the first region in Spain to reinstate the service. However, he added that the option to have a telephone consultation instead would remain, as some prefer it or are still worried about Covid-19 contagion.

Regional Health Service officials believe it makes sense for repeat prescriptions and results of tests to be dealt with over the phone in the future.

Unions have backed the move but urged that safety measures in health centres should stay in place. **P2**

More relaxed rules for Health Districts with under 50 Covid-19 cases per 100,000 come in today; the rest of Malaga province, still on Level 1, is not too far behind

MALAGA. With Covid-19 case rates locally continuing to fall, the Junta de Andalucía regional government announced this week a new Level 0 for when different Health Districts reach below an average of 50 cases per 100,000 in the previous 14 days. The Ronda area is the first part of the province to reach Level 0 from today (Friday, 1 October), when the new rules come into force.

Level 0, when reached, means the end of almost all restrictions on capacity and opening times in shops, bars and restaurants, although experts still have the final say on moving down a level and it is not automatic.

Of the five Health Districts into which Malaga province is divided, two slipped under a case rate of 50 this week. Malaga district (covering Malaga city and nearby Rincón de la Victoria, Almogía, Macharaviaya and Moclinejo) reached 49.4 on Thursday, the day local experts met to decide whether to apply the Level 0 rule. However, in the end it was decided to keep that Health District at Level 1 due to local hospital case numbers and some other measures still being higher.

It was better news for the Seranía de Ronda Health District, (the mountain area and villages

around Ronda), where the 34.5 average 14-day case rate put its residents into the new, more relaxed Level 0 from today.

The other three Health Districts of Malaga province were still above 50 this week, and with a little a way to go to get to Level 0. These are: La Vega, (the Antequera area) at 78.1; Costa del Sol, (which includes just the western Costa from Torremolinos to Manilva) at 66.5; Axarquía (including the eastern Costa) at 59; Guadalhorce at 61.4.

Under the new level rules (for when Health Districts get to a 50 case rate,) there are no more lim-

its on closing nightclubs or bars earlier because of Covid-19 nor those seated at tables or bars.

Indoor masks to stay

Areas still in Level One, which is most of Malaga province, maintain restrictions on numbers at tables in bars and restaurants and on closing times.

But Level One areas were given some good news this week, with the decision to allow full capacity again in theatres, museums, stadiums and concerts.

Despite the further easing in Health Districts that move to Level 0, the Junta has reminded the

public that the use of face masks indoors and in crowds will continue to be mandatory and basic pandemic sanitary measures will have to be respected, such as hand washing and social distancing between people.

The average 14-day case rate per 100,000 for all Andalucía on Thursday was at 50,1.

There has been no change in Covid-19 rules inside schools in Andalucía.

In person doctors' appointments in public health centres start again from today

MALAGA. The president of the Junta regional government, Juanma Moreno, announced this week that Andalucía will start allowing in-person appointments again in public health centres from today (Friday, 1 October). Some telephone consultations will continue however.

"Whoever wants to see their family doctor face to face can do so, and whoever wants a telephone call [instead] can do so," Moreno explained.

Health officials say phone calls could still be useful to get the results of tests or ask for repeat prescriptions, and so they will introduce the option of a phone call from now on.

"It is understandable that many people don't want to travel due to lack of transport, caution or fear of contagion, and we respect them," Moreno added, highlighting that Andalucía is the first region in the country to guarantee a face-to-face appointment again if required.

The Medical union in Malaga has indicated that it is in favour of going back to face-to-face appointments again.

"In fact, this didn't completely disappear during the pandemic. We demand that measures controlling access and separate 'Covid routes' [within health centres] are maintained, to guarantee safety for both patients and staff. For the same reason, we are in favour of keeping phone consultations (20% of activity), the union said.

About 18,000 people in Malaga province refuse outright to be Covid-19 vaccinated

MALAGA. Despite scientific evidence showing that vaccines work, some 18,000 people in Malaga province have categorically refused to have a Covid-19 vaccine so far, say officials. The number across Andalucía as a whole is 93,000.

In Malaga province (including the Costa del Sol) there were 1.25 million people with full vaccinations and 1.28m with at least one dose this week. But convincing those who do not want to be jabbed is difficult and health professionals are redoubling their efforts to try and achieve it.

People who are reluctant to be vaccinated are usually called by doctors and, mainly, nurses, who have solid arguments to try to persuade them.

They explain that the vaccine is safe and with minor side effects. In addition, they emphasise that, in most cases, patients admitted to hospitals with the virus were not vaccinated. They say that not only is a jab an 'individual protective shield' against SARS-CoV-2 but it also benefits society as a whole.

The responses given by the people who are anti-Covid vaccines and called by telephone (sometimes up to four or five

times) are varied. Some reply emphatically, but in a polite way, that they do not believe in the vaccine, that they do not want to be jabbed and ask that they are not called again, after they have refused several calls to try to get them to a vaccination point. Others, on the other hand, get angry, shout and demand that they do not want to receive any more calls.

There are also people who say that they are thinking about it, that they are still not sure. Other people, given the reasoning given by the healthcare professional who call them, agree to be vaccinated - but don't show up at the appointment, often saying that

something unexpected came up. "They have excuses, one after another," said the sources consulted.

Around 10 per cent of those

called by medical centres or health districts finally agree to be given the injection that protects them from the virus.

The World cruises back to Malaga

International tourism is gathering steam again and four ships sailed in this Thursday, the most since the pandemic started

MALAGA. The signs of international tourism getting up steam again on the Costa are growing, and not least in Malaga's port, where the quaysides have been bustling with thousands of overseas visitors again this week.

On Monday, the very exclusive - and aptly named - The World sailed into port and this was followed on Thursday with four ships simultaneously tied up at the cruise terminals.

The World was in port for three days as part of its cruise designed by the millionaire owners of the residences themselves and before continuing its journey to the Americas. The almost 200 select passengers will stay an average of three or four months on board.

The ship features 165 luxury residences. Passengers have to

be part of the community of owners - an apartment can cost between one and more than six million euros, excluding travel and maintenance costs - and there is a waiting list. It was last in port in 2015.

Easier rules for travelling from Spain to the UK start on 4 October

MALAGA. The British embassy reminded visitors and residents in Spain this week that the Covid-19 restrictions for travelling to the UK are changing from Monday 4 October at 4am.

Eligible fully vaccinated travellers will need to book, pay for and take a day two test and fill out a passenger locator form ahead of travel but no longer need to take a pre-departure test when travelling to England. Predeparture tests are also being scrapped in Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland. Full details are on the gov.uk website.

in the world. Launched in 2020, it can carry up to 5,200 passengers, although this capacity is currently restricted.

The vessel was in Malaga as part of a cruise starting in Southampton in the UK that is sailing around the Iberian Peninsula.

The DGT roads authority has unveiled new signage on roads which reminds motorcyclists of the number of accident victims in the last five years

MALAGA. Nine sections of the road network in Malaga province are included among the one hundred in the whole of Spain that are considered the most dangerous for motorcyclists, both due to the high accident rate recorded in the last five years and the number of bends on the route.

The General Directorate of Traffic (DGT) roads authority has identified the stretches and installed special surveillance systems on them, but now it is

also warning motorists with new signage which, in addition to warning of the measures, also shows the number of motorcyclists involved in serious accidents in the last five years.

One of them is on the MA-3119, the road that connects Moclinejo with Benagalbón.

The deputy delegate of central government in Malaga, Javier Salas, and the provincial head of the DGT, Aída Vilaret, travelled there on Wednesday (28 September) to publicise the initiative.

“We have nine high-risk sections of roads for motorcyclists in the province, a number that is only exceeded by Santa Cruz de Tenerife and Las Palmas de Gran Canaria. With this new signage we intend to raise the awareness about the danger of these roads,” said Salas.

Mountain roads

The sections selected by the DGT are mostly located on mountain roads, with the exception of the

one located between kilometre points 300.1 and 302.4 of the N-340 in Nerja, where there have been six victims in the last five years.

The stretch with the highest accident rate, with 15 motorcyclists involved in accidents, is

located in Igualeja between kilometre points 19.8 and 22.4 of the A-397, a road that is especially dangerous with another section listed as it passes through Benahavís (30.6- 32.6).

Human error

The list also includes two sections of the A-366 in the municipalities of Alozaina and Yunquera, as well as the A-405 as it passes through Gaucín, the MA-5105 in Frigiliana and the A-7045 in Antequera.

According to Vilaret, “human error is the main cause” of accidents, although not the only one.

Awareness and monitoring

“These sections have been selected taking into account criteria such as sinuosity, as well as the accident rate in recent years,” said the deputy delegate of the Government, who stressed that “when faced with a road safety problem, the first thing to do is to inform and raise awareness among users and then monitor and control compliance with the rules that affect them.”

So far this year there have been seven fatal accidents involving two-wheelers on Malaga province roads. During the first nine months of 2021 there have been 142 injury accidents on the provincial roads.

Work begins to transform plot into a cultural and social area

San Pedro, Marbella, has become the logistics centre for the Netflix blockbuster series *The Crown* this week.

The esplanade known as Cielo de San Pedro has seen the coming and going of 40 trucks, numerous vans, tents, tables, chairs and dozens of crew members.

Despite the numbers of people and amount of movement in the area, little is known about the production due to the non-disclosure agreements signed by crew.

The production had already chosen Malaga for filming, having used city centre sites to recreate the Australian city of Brisbane in the fourth season.

Now, with filming of season five under way, Puerto Banús and its surroundings became the French coast in which Lady Diana and Dodi Al-Fayed enjoyed their

last romantic summer before the fateful traffic accident in Paris that cost the couple their lives.

The San Pedro base camp was the epicentre of production, where the team included fifty drivers, sets, actors, extras and a medical team to perform daily antigen tests to guarantee the health of cast and crew.

The action began even earlier than half past five in the morning and vans and trucks started to parade towards the locations chosen for filming.

Tate Aráez the Malaga professional responsible for organising the exterior shots in Spain for the series, has been nominated twice for the Location Managers Guild International Awards (LMGI) - considered the Oscars of the profession.

In the exclusive marina they were reproducing the scenes where Diana of Wales enjoyed ro-

The actors involved include Elizabeth Debicki, who plays a mature Diana, and Khalid Abdalla as her partner, Dodi Fayed.

Actor Salim Daw is cast as the billionaire and former owner of Harrods, Mohamed Al-Fayed, Dodi's father.

Despite the large scale of the production, it barely disrupted the usual workings of the port where tourists and employees continued to go about their daily lives, apart from a few curious onlookers and some photojournalists trying to reproduce those legendary photographs of Prince Charles' ex-wife.

The first signs that filming was being carried out came in the form of members of the production crew, coming and going through the port, equipped with their credentials and walkie-talkies, and the signs that marked out the catering service for the workers. On Tuesday filming centred around scenes at sea.

Crews from the series could be seen in Jerez on Thursday, where they have set up an operations hub for filming in Andalucía. Preparations were being made around the city's Alcázar fortress ready for the next stage of filming.

From that summer, the iconic photographs in which the mother of Princes William and Henry appeared sitting on the edge of a yacht with a certain kind of melancholy, were produced.

To recreate that moment, the producer rented the yacht Titania, which is 73 metres long with capacity for twelve passengers in its seven cabins and 20 crew members.

A boat built in 2006, it is estimated that the cost of rent could have amounted to 600,000 euros.

HBO takes over the Guadalhorce Valley to shoot *His Dark Materials*

The international series has chosen rural areas in the region to film several scenes for its new season

The sound of clapperboards could be heard in the Guadalhorce Valley this week.

The municipality of Coín is one of the locations chosen by the production team of *His Dark Materials*, an international HBO series that is in the middle of

filming its new season.

Around 200 people are working on the set, including technicians and security personnel, as well as the entire production company Babiéka Films, who are in charge of filming.

The set locations are centred around beauty spots, such as Barranco Blanco and Llano de Matagallar, rural areas where filming has gone virtually unnoticed, although many locals saw the set being constructed.

His Dark Materials premiered in 2019 as a fantasy series based on Philip Pullman's award-winning trilogy of the same name,

which is considered a modern masterpiece of imaginative fiction and has sold more than 18 million copies worldwide.

So far, the series has had two successful seasons, and the shooting taking place in Malaga is for its third and final season, made up of eight episodes.

The season does not yet have a premiere date.

After passing through the Sierra de Grazalema and Ronda, the film crew moved on to Coín.

The next stop was due to be Ardales, where scenes from the series will also be shot, specifically in the El Chorro area, this

newspaper learned this week.

After hosting this international production, Coín is preparing to continue boosting its Ciudad de Cine facility with the arrival of new productions, such as the Canal Sur series *Unknown*, which plans to start be-

fore the end of 2021.

"We want to place our town on the map of the film industry," said the mayor of Coín, Francisco Santos, who visited the *His Dark Materials* team on the set to welcome them to the area.

Crime increased by 17.5% in Malaga in the first six months of this year

There were more robberies, offences against sexual freedom, criminal injuries and vehicle thefts between January and June

MALAGA. The crime rate in Malaga increased in the first half of 2021 compared with the same period in 2020, a year in which the figures were at a record low because of the pandemic and lockdown. The easing of restrictions has led to an increase of 17.5 per cent in crimes in the province.

According to statistics from the Ministry of the Interior, there were more crimes against sexual freedom, injuries, robberies, thefts and

vehicle thefts, while the numbers of sexual assaults and attempted murders decreased during those six months.

The biggest increase was in homicides and murders which were actually carried out, as these rose from three to eight between January and June this year (11.6 per cent more than in 2020). However, attempted murders dropped by 31.8 per cent from 22 to 15, and kidnappings also dropped from four to three.

There was quite a high increase in robberies, which went up from 6,248 to 7,390 (18 per cent more), while vehicle thefts rose by 32 per cent and drug trafficking by 18.8 per cent.

With regard to criminal injuries, these rose by 23.7 per cent, with a total of 376 offences compared

with the 304 that took place between January and June last year.

There was another significant increase, which was offences in contravention of sexual freedom, which went up by 32.5 per cent, from 203 to 269. Other offences such as indecency and crimes against liberty also went up by 40.2 per cent, from 174 to 244.

The numbers of sexual assaults decreased in Malaga in the first half of this year, with a total of 25 compared with the 29 in the same period of 2020. This is a reduction of 13.8 per cent.

Meanwhile, robberies with violence and intimidation increased by 14.5 per cent to 560, although robberies with the use of force dropped by five per cent in establishments and by six per cent in private homes.

The man who died in motorway toll booth smash was a Guardia Civil officer

ing Guardia Civil officer. He was travelling from Melilla, where he was born, to his base in Guadalajara – a journey he did regularly in his red Mercedes.

It happened at 5.15pm when the vehicle entered the toll payment area at kilometre 6 of the AP-46, heading towards Antequera, at a high speed. Despite the fact the toll booths are protected by large concrete blocks, an employee working inside one of them was injured.

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Malaga hospital opens an internal investigation into the death of a four-month-old girl

MALAGA. The Andalusian Government's delegate in Malaga, Patricia Navarro, has offered her condolences to the family of the four-and-a-half-month-old girl who died in the intensive care

unit at Malaga's Materno Infantil last week.

Before, finally, being admitted to the ICU, the child had been treated and discharged on several occasions from the Quirón-Salud Málaga and Materno Infantil hospitals.

"I want to do it as a government delegate but, above all, as a mother. I cannot imagine the pain of losing a four-month-old child," said Navarro.

The Andalusian Government's delegate said that the matter is being investigated and in the hands of the courts. "When an incident like this happens, the hospital opens an internal investigation that runs in parallel with the complaint filed by the family."

Court investigates death

The death of the baby is being investigated by a court in Malaga after the family filed a complaint which explains that the girl was taken several times, over a five-day period, to the emergency departments of the Quirónsalud Málaga and Materno Infantil hospitals where she was treated and discharged. Her paediatrician also saw her.

The girl had presented with a high fever, rash, respiratory infection and vomiting. She died overnight (September 23 to 24) in the Materno Infantil's intensive care unit where he had been admitted in the morning.

Intercepted 250 bottles of laughing gas

A woman dies and a man falls ill after taking drugs

girola. The young Finnish woman had only arrived on the Costa del Sol for a holiday a few days earlier, accompanied by her 24-year-old boyfriend.

The unconscious pair were found by the girl's mother, who owns a property in the Los Pacos area, which is where they were staying.

British students caught in post-Brexit visa lottery

SUR in English explores the trials and tribulations for UK youngsters trying to obtain the coveted passport sticker to study legally in Spain

MALAGA. The prospect of a year abroad is an exciting and necessary part of a university degree for many students.

However, this year for British students the complications triggered by Brexit have meant that what was previously a straightforward process to study in the EU has been tainted for the first time by the stress of attempting to secure a study visa.

With many having to delay or cancel their plans entirely due to bureaucratic delays, this process is proving to be both financially and emotionally taxing.

Katie Watson (not her real name) who is studying Spanish at a university in the south of England and wishes to remain anonymous, unsuccessfully explored multiple avenues in her attempt to obtain an internship visa to work in Spain.

Beginning the application process in April, she was one of the first students at her university to apply for the documentation.

Lack of information

She told SUR in English, "The information on the [Spanish] consulate website, particularly surrounding the requirements for a visa application, was significantly lacking," which was coupled with a distinct lack of support from her uni-

versity in the UK.

It was an expensive and lengthy process which Katie estimates cost her 500 pounds (about 580 euros).

One element was particularly troublesome to obtain: proof that she did not have a criminal record in the UK, a request unheard of pre-Brexit.

The document demanded a sworn translation and legalisation, which took weeks to come back.

Then began the obstacle of obtaining a 'resolución de autorización para prácticas', which the Spanish authorities stated was needed for work experience but didn't say what it was or where to get it, she said.

Eventually the application was submitted but was rejected due to "invalid" health insurance (though Katie maintains that it was perfectly valid).

Given 10 days to appeal, her updated documents were sent on the ninth day, however she received an email saying they were submitted too late.

She then asked to appeal that and was told that they would be looking at appeals from January next year.

Drained, and faced with the possibility of not being able to make it abroad at all, Katie was advised by the lawyer from her place of work to do an unpaid internship for less than 90 days, removing the necessity for an internship visa. She has since returned to the UK.

She said, "This has become the reality for British students who want to work in Spain." For those who wish to study, the process is marginally more straightforward, but just as time consuming.

A University of Glasgow student who is still in the UK waiting a study visa said, "My biggest issue is how long everything is taking to come back."

Expensive

Also wishing to remain anonymous for fear of affecting her application, she has so far spent 300 pounds attempting to acquire her study visa, facing significant delays.

The British legalisation office took a month to return her forms, which, to her dismay, just contained a simple stamp. She is now in limbo waiting for Spain to issue the visa.

SUR in English spoke to David Walkden, the Senior Exchange Coordinator at Plymouth University, who said that of their seven students trying to get to Spain, "One is a Spanish citizen so had no problem; two went on tourist visas hoping to convert whilst there; two

have deferred their mobilities; and two have reduced their mobility durations so that they could enter without visas. So a mixed bag and not at all satisfactory."

Mirroring the sentiments of the students SUR in English spoke to, he explained, "The Spanish embassy in the UK was not helpful... Universities UK tried their best to intervene and engender a sense of importance in getting the matter resolved but didn't appear to be taken seriously by either the UK or the Spanish government authorities."

Despite this, he believes that this is a consequence of Britain's own

actions: "The Spanish embassy was not prepared to revise its visa procedures to accommodate the increased visa demand from UK citizens. And why should it? It was the UK's decision to leave the EU after all and these are the additional burdens and consequences that occur as a result."

Sixty-eight students were due to come to Malaga University this term from the UK, and while the university recognised that some were experiencing delays with their visas, they echoed the advice from the Spanish authorities to obtain the appropriate paperwork and not travel as a tourist to study.

With their degrees in the hands of bureaucratic processes, it remains to be seen whether these students, who are eligible to receive the Erasmus grant for a final year before the transition to the replacement Turing Scheme, will be able to experience their 'years abroad'.

The popularity of Erasmus is back again post-pandemic

MALAGA. After months of confinement and remote classes, the Erasmus programme, which allows young people to carry out part of their studies in other European countries, is more popular now than ever before.

"We have recovered from the crisis caused by Covid, and we even surpassed the figures prior to the pandemic," said the vice-rector for Mobility and International Cooperation at Malaga University (UMA), Susana Cabrera.

She clarified that collaboration with British universities will continue until May 2023, so that students from Malaga who choose to study there will still receive the help provided by the Erasmus programme post-Brexit.

After that date, this agreement

with the European Union will be definitively closed.

"But the United Kingdom and the EU countries are interested in maintaining this type of collaboration," so that UMA students can carry out their studies at universities in the United Kingdom, said the vice-rector.

Regarding financing, Susana Cabrera assures that alternatives to aid from the EU are being sought, which may be through the Junta de Andalucía or UMA itself.

However, the interest of Malaga students in the UK has waned in recent years.

In the 2018/19 academic year, 197 went. In 19/20, 97 and this year, 66. The United Kingdom requires students to obtain a visa to stay in the country, which costs 348 pounds.

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Vélez-Málaga schools raise funds for volcano victims

VÉLEZ-MÁLAGA. A number of schools in the Vélez-Málaga area have started a fundraising campaign under the slogan 'Let's rise to it' to help communities on the island of La Palma affected by the volcano.

Presenting the initiative to aid those affected by the eruption on Wednesday were: deputy mayor for the Torre del Mar area, Jesús Atencia; the deputy director of María Zambrano secondary school in Torre del Mar, Antonio Garrido; the coordinator of Escuela Espacio de Paz (Nuestra Sra. De Los Remedios primary school) in Vélez, Mar Granado; the director of Joaquín Lobato secondary school, in Torre del Mar, Miguel Ángel Vida. Other schools in Almayate and Caleta de Vélez are also participating in the initiative.

The charity project focuses on raising funds for families whose homes and surroundings have been destroyed by the lava.

The schools themselves will act as collection points for donations.

In a statement, Atencia thanked the local educational community for "their enormous gesture in devising this campaign" and encouraged people to do their bit if possible.

"I would like to encourage all local residents to participate and help with whatever they can. I am convinced that we will demonstrate, once again, that Vélez-Málaga is a charitable municipality," he said.

Collection points

Garrido and Granados explained the details of the initiative saying that, "in each centre there will be a collection point so that students, their families, teachers and any residents who wish to do so can deposit their contribution."

After the 22 October deadline, the schools will send the funds raised to a "trusted organisations" on the La Palma "to help all these people".

If everyone contributes a little, we can achieve a significant sum," Garrido said, adding that any other educational centres in the area that want to take part in the fundraiser "will be welcome."

Residents take to the streets over 'terrible' state of children's play areas in Nerja

With banners with messages such as 'Nerja needs parks', 'We don't vote but we play' or 'If we don't have a park, where do we have fun?', around fifty residents, including parents and children, protested on Wednesday afternoon in Nerja against the "terrible state" of several of the town's playgrounds.

At the gates of the Verano Azul playground, which has been closed since last April due to the poor state of its equipment, parents asked councillors to repair the facilities once and for all "because it is not right for our children to have play in a place like this, abandoned and unsafe," said África Fernández, one of the mothers.

Parents Pilar Jiménez and Mari Angeles Sánchez said that there have been "several accidents" involving children in recent years. "It was closed after a girl got her leg caught on a piece of wood in April. They promised us that it would be fixed in September. The month is about to end and they have done nothing at all," complained Sánchez.

The councillor for Operational Services, Gema García, replied that at the end of April the town hall announced that all the children's playgrounds in the town would be repaired by a specialised company.

However, the council took the decision to close the Verano Azul playground for safety reasons because it was "so deteriorated". "We are working to go out to tender for a new playground, which will also have adapted games," García announced.

The mayor was not able to say when the work would be completed by.

Tourist train to offer free tours including admission to Cueva del Tesoro throughout October

SUR. Rincón de la Victoria is to introduce a new tourist road train which will operate throughout October.

The announcement was made on Tuesday by the mayor Francisco Salado. "It is a pilot experience that will help to break the seasonal nature of the town and its facilities. We believe it is a good way to boost the sector and provide opportunities at different times of the year," he said.

The aim of the initiative is to promote and position the Axar-

quía and enhance Rincón de la Victoria's culture and heritage.

Free of charge

Rincón's councillor for Tourism, Antonio José Martín, said, "It is an activity that the whole family can enjoy and which will be free of charge throughout October. Our aim is that it can last over time. We will assess whether or not it will be maintained."

The train will run from Tuesday to Friday from 6 October until Thursday 28.

It will depart from the Casa Fuerte de Bezmiliana at 11am and the route will take two hours, taking in the town centre, Cueva del Tesoro (Treasure Cave) and the El Cantal cliffs. The route also includes free entrance to the prehistoric cave.

Commotion in Torre del Mar as ox escapes from enclosure

E. C/ J. R. An ox that escaped from its enclosure near the entrance to Torre del Mar on Monday evening was safely and quickly rounded up by its owner.

A few minutes before 7pm, for reasons that are unknown and are being investigated, the animal managed to escape from the enclosure on the main road heading into the town, where it lives with two other oxen, and travelled some 300 metres through the town.

Photographs and videos of the incident soon flooded social media.

The animal's owner was on the scene in just three minutes, and safely captured the beast without reports of any personal injuries or damage.

Laura Delgado, an employee of a Mi Colchón mattress shop, which is opposite the land, explained to SUR that the ox passed by the shop door "very quickly".

Head of the Local Police in Vélez-Málaga, José Andrés Montoya, said that by the time officers arrived at the scene the owner had already taken charge of the ox. A statement was taken from the farmer.

The enclosure where the livestock is kept has a two-metre high perimeter fence, so it is being investigated if it escaped due to a human error or a hole in the fence.

The ox is of a breed that is still used in agricultural work and to pull floats in 'romerías' (pilgrimages).

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Torremolinos dedicates a park in honour of Finnish residents

Finns have been coming to the Costa del Sol as tourists for 70 years; now around 500 live in Torremolinos

TORREMOLINOS. The town hall of Torremolinos is planning to dedicate a park to the Finnish community, over sixty years after the first international chartered flight brought Finns to the Costa del Sol.

The mayor of Torremolinos, José Ortiz, and the councillor for Planning, Maribel Tocón, attended a meeting in Madrid with the Finnish ambassador to Spain, Sari Rautio, to strengthen the relationship that Torremolinos has historically maintained with this Nordic country.

The mayor announced that the town hall is working on dedicating a park in the town to the Finnish community. At present, the Finns make up around five hundred residents, a number that is increased by Finnish tourists every year.

Tourism from this country remains one of the most important markets in Torremolinos. Historically the town was one of the first holiday destinations for Finnish tourists seeking the sun and this year commemorates 70 years since the first Finnish visitors arrived at Malaga airport.

In 1951, the Finnish air company KarAir made its first international flight. It brought Finnish tourists to Stockholm airport, and from there they headed to Malaga with a Swedish airline company.

Eight years later, KarAir offered the first charter flight from Helsinki to Malaga, with stopovers in Gothenburg, Luxembourg and Barcelona which soon became known as 'the sunshine route'.

At first Torremolinos was just a holiday destination but the Finns gradually began to see it as a good place to enjoy their retirement and it became one of the first enclaves where the Finnish community settled. The first Finnish Association - Asociación Finlandesa Costa del Sol - was founded in 1977.

In Madrid, Mayor Ortiz said: "We are very happy to continue to strengthen ties with Finland and move forward together on exciting projects in Torremolinos." He explained that the town hoped to host events related to Finnish culture and will have a specialised library. "We want it to not only be the main meeting point for the Finnish community here, but also for others outside the town."

Policing with no borders in EU's officer swap scheme

Spain's National Police force welcomed an officer from the German State Police this summer as part of the Comisariías Europeas safe tourism project

His waistcoat bears the word 'Polizei'. His uniform is lighter blue in colour than the ones we normally see in Spain, almost sky blue, and his cap is white. Dennis Paffrath is an officer with the German State Police, but at the moment he has left his own country and is working on the Costa del Sol. He is one of over 30 officers from different European countries who have been deployed around Spain as part of a scheme called Comisariías Europeas 2021; this is a police cooperation plan which aims to enhance safe tourism and provide assistance to the public beyond the frontiers of individual European nations.

"Although the work is similar, I feel the Spanish police are a bit closer to the public than we are in Germany; we want to be

close, but I think they have achieved it better here," says Paffrath, in perfect Spanish.

He has two more weeks in Malaga city to go, and most of his work during that time will be with the Foreign Tourist Assistance Service (SATE), which is based in the Plaza de la Marina. However, he will also be taking part in static and mobile security operations at the port and the airport, mainly as part of the National Police's Prevention and Reaction Unit (UPR).

Paffrath is a State officer - in Germany there is a Federal Police force and a State police as well as municipal police forces. At home he normally works in the training section, but also participates in operations against drug trafficking and other types of investigations, both criminal and administra-

tive. His duties here on the Costa del Sol, however, have been very different.

International patrol

"Most of the time I'm at the SATE office, but I also go on patrol in the streets, on the seafront, and on Muelle Uno. We want people to be able to see the uniform, to read the word for 'police' in their own language, and not just Germans, actually, but people from other countries who speak German as well," he explains.

In his first two days in Malaga, he had to take part in two arrests for offences against public health and faking documents, but Paffrath says that is not his principal mission: "I can take action if necessary, (he says, instinctively pointing to his firearm and defence equipment), but that is not the intention; what we want

to do is to make people feel safer and to feel reassured when they see that the German police is here".

One of the National Police officers who runs SATE, Pablo Campos, says the presence of a German officer has been very useful when providing a service to tourists. This summer he has seen for himself how German visitors (and those from elsewhere who speak German) have reacted when they have seen a uniformed police officer here.

"They are always surprised and the impact is very positive.

People feel more supported and understood," he says.

At the SATE office, where Local Police officers also attend to the public, most of the tourists come to report thefts and the loss of documents, so they feel somewhat defenceless when they arrive.

"Seeing a police officer from their own country makes them feel that someone is going to understand them, because he knows their idiosyncrasies and culture and what they are like," says Campos.

For Paffrath, going on patrol on the Costa del Sol has been a real adventure and it is an experience that he would not hesitate to repeat, mainly because it has enabled him to know a different way of policing and a different society first hand. However, when asked what, in his opinion, is the most striking difference between wearing his police uniform in southern Spain and his native Germany, he instantly responds: "The heat!"

The Ministry of the Interior describes this Comisariías Europeas project as an initiative which is becoming more and more popular every year.

"These exchanges aim to prevent street crime by being in contact with the public in general and tourists of all nationalities in particular, and helping them by translating and providing assistance where needed," say sources there.

New countries

Comisariías Europeas was launched in 2008, in collaboration with France, and it was extended to include Portugal in 2012, Italy in 2014 and Germany last year. More police officers take part each year, because the scheme is working very well.

Spanish officers from the National Police force also go to other countries as part of this project. This year they have been assigned to Paris and elsewhere in France and Lisbon, Nazaré, Oporto and Villa Real de San Antonio in Portugal, among other places.

"They always wear their own uniforms when they are on patrol, because then they are easily recognisable by people from both countries," explain sources at the Ministry.

The Spanish Guardia Civil and Portugal's GNR also have separate cooperation agreements for the area around the border between the two countries and these are also focused on tourism, with the aim of assisting visitors there.

La Palma volcano continues with no sign of stopping

The volcano at Cumbre Vieja on La Palma was still endlessly spewing out lava this week. On Tuesday night the lava flow had reached the Atlantic Ocean, after several days of will-it-or-won't-it, covering more buildings, farms and banana plantations as it went.

Although fears of the gases from mixing with seawater affecting the local population had not so far materialised, its explosivity and cascades of ash had increased on Thursday, said scientists.

Dramatic images showed lava pouring over the cliffs into the water. By midday on Thursday, a delta of over 42 acres of lava had formed, adding to the size of the island.

'I was going to sell the boat, and now it has suddenly become our home'

Luis, 90, is living with his wife on a boat in La Palma after being evacuated because of the volcano. Jacqueline, on a yacht nearby, doesn't know if her home is still standing

MALAGA. Don Luis the Doctor - as he is known in Todoque on La Palma in the Canaries - is 90 years old and still dares to tackle 300-kilo tunas. He has an old six-

metre motorboat called Hamurabi; it has a cabin and a couple of bunks which Luis Rodríguez has hardly ever used, until now. In fact, he had been planning to sell her. "Not now, though. When we came here after the eruption, Luis said we should restore her instead," says his Dutch wife, Margarethe. The boat has now become their temporary home.

Luis was on the phone, speaking to a relative who lives in South America, when the Cumbre Vieja erupted. He rushed home, and he and Margarethe barely had time to pack their bags when the Guardia Civil came to evacuate them because their house was threatened by the lava. So far, it is still standing.

First they and their neighbours were taken to Los Llanos de Aridane football ground, and then told they were going to be put up in the old military barracks in Santa Cruz de La Palma. They have no children or other relatives on the island, unlike the other evacuees. "We didn't want to leave here, but we didn't have anywhere to go, either. There were some apartments available but they cost 100 euros a night. Who could afford that?" says Margarethe. That's when they decided to go to their boat.

On board, they sleep on two mattresses which are three fingers thick - "it's a bit cramped here" - and they have bought a small air-conditioning unit. They have a few basic supplies. They were only able to bring one of their three cats with them, but they know the other two

jokes. "I get up around six. When Luis gets up we go for breakfast in Tazacorte, and do a bit of shopping," she says. Fresh water has become a precious commodity because they use so much of it. For the rest of the day, they get by on sandwiches.

When they get back to the port, they freshen up as best they can. "That's the worst part of it," she confides. "My hair is full of sand and ash all day, it feels as if I have nits". What is it like to find yourself sleeping on an old boat, with your home threatened by lava, at this age?

"Well, you don't think about that. If you did, it would affect you psychologically and you would get depressed. You have to deal with things as they come, and cope as best you can," says Luis.

Three pontoons along, Jacqueline Rehm approaches, with a bag of shopping. She and her partner arrived on the island in 2019. They rented a house and spent part of their savings on furnishing it. With the rest, they bought the Stella Maris, a 7.6 metre sailing yacht which they repaired.

They also moved onto their boat because of the volcano, but on Tuesday night, when the lava reached the sea, the Guardia Civil evacuated the port. "Finally, we were allowed back onto the boat because we literally had nowhere else to go," says Jacqueline. "We don't know what has happened to our house, whether it is still standing or not. Thank goodness we have the boat, because on the Sunday morning, when the volcano exploded, we had been talking about selling her," she says.

She doesn't rule out going back to Germany, although moving to La Palma was always her dream. "We love it here as normally there is no stress, but we know that after the volcano, nothing is going to be the same," she says.

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Covid-19 claims one in three local Chinese-run firms

Restaurants, which have faced numerous coronavirus control restrictions, have been particularly badly hit

MALAGA. The coronavirus crisis has taken its toll on everyone. And the decrease in sales and the increase in costs, has also hit many of the Chinese-run businesses in Malaga province. Since the pandemic began it is estimated that about 30 per cent of them have been forced to lower their shutters.

The president of the Association of Chinese Entrepreneurs of Andalucía, Leticia Chen, revealed that the crisis has especially affected businesses located in Malaga city's neighbourhoods, since families in those parts have lost more spending power compared to the city centre itself or the richer residential areas to the east of the city.

Restaurant businesses, which have had to face numerous coronavirus restrictions, especially in terms of opening hours and capacity, have been especially hard hit. Chen acknowledges that they had a particularly bad time until the first quarter of this year, although in recent months the situation has begun to improve somewhat.

Good business nose

"The Chinese have a very good business nose and know how to find business opportunities, so many of the stores that have closed are reopening with another type of activity," she says.

Although there is no official data, some 7,000 Chinese families are estimated to live off businesses they own in the province.

About 260 wholesale stores are concentrated on the industrial estates alone. This group is also having a hard time due to the increase in the price of exports.

Leticia Chen explains that the

price of containers has skyrocketed and that now you have to pay \$9,000 for a 20-foot container that cost \$1,200 before the pandemic.

Shopping habits

"The problem is that all the containers are now in the destination countries because everyone has ordered products from China and now it is very difficult to find

one at the point of origin," she claims. The change in shopping habits has also been a hard blow for Chinese business people working in Malaga. The pandemic has seen a boom in the number of sales on the internet and, therefore, hit all traditional commerce.

Regarding the current situation that the Chinese community is experiencing, the busi-

nesswoman predicts that sales will recover gradually over the next few months. She expects that many businesses will not be in profits again until at least next summer, since costs – including electricity and taxes - have also increased a lot.

"The costs are very high and the margins very small, so many businesses have been forced to close," she acknowledges.

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Eastern Airways suspends its winter flights from Birmingham and Southampton

The decision was made for financial reasons after talks with the government and the airline plans to resume these routes from March 2022

GIBRALTAR. The airline Eastern Airways has announced that it will not be continuing its Gibraltar flights this winter after all, fol-

lowing discussions with the Gibraltar government. In a statement, the government said the talks were held at the airline's request and related to ensuring the long-term sustainability of their air services from Gibraltar.

Eastern Airways began running their flights between Gibraltar, Birmingham and Southampton this summer, and although the intention had been to continue them year-round, it was a difficult time to start the two new

routes given the ongoing impacts of travel, including the Covid pandemic in particular. Therefore, in line with many operators of services throughout Europe, the winter schedule has been suspended and the flights are scheduled to start again in March 2022 for the summer season.

The general manager of Eastern Airways, Roger Hage, said it had been a difficult decision to

take. "All airlines are adjusting their flying programs depending on the demand into winter. Covid restrictions have made this even more unpredictable. We also have to ensure the sustainability implications and act responsibly to ensure the routes to Gibraltar work long-term. Adopting a seasonal approach this year achieves this and ensures long-term considerations apply. We

will continue to work proactively with the Gibraltar Government on the summer schedule for 2022," he said.

Gibraltar's Tourism Minister, Vijay Daryanani, said "It is disappointing for us to have less routes for the winter season but we need to look at the wider picture. Eastern Airways want to come back next summer. They need to protect their finances like any other business and I back their judgement. Having said this, our capacity for the winter months is excellent as British Airways has agreed to increase flights. This means we actually have more seats to the UK even after this suspension. I will continue working with Eastern Airways and look forward to welcoming them back in the summer".

Friday 8 October is World Dyslexia Day and the Gibraltar Dyslexia Support Group hopes everyone will wear red to help raise awareness

GIBRALTAR. October 4th to 10th is Dyslexia Awareness Week, and Stuart Byrne, the chairperson of the Gibraltar Dyslexia Support Group, is very clear that more needs to be known about dyslexia in general, and more support and understanding given to dyslexic individuals, whether children or adults.

"It's very important to realise that dyslexia is not a disease," he says, "so it doesn't need a cure. The 'treatment' consists of knowing what the issue is, and how to deal with it."

"Once dyslexia has been diagnosed, it can be a huge weight off your shoulders. It's very help-

ful. You know that you can and will succeed, with the correct support".

The wrong perception

Many people have a very vague idea of what dyslexia is, and just associate it with difficulty in spelling. Stuart explains that everybody is unique, but dyslexic people are usually very intelligent and creative because their minds work in a different way and they process information differently.

"You might look at the way I do something and think it's strange, or weird," he says, "but your way of doing it makes no sense to me".

Dyslexia is sometimes described as a learning disability, but Stuart says it is a learning difference and that all teachers should receive specific training with regard to educating dyslexic children.

"I don't blame teachers; it's not their fault, they don't have

the tools," he explains. "But education can make or break a person's life."

"A teacher has children's lives in their hands. Dyslexic children often lose out because the system is disabling. Repetition doesn't necessarily work and, for example, it can be truly hu-

miliating for a dyslexic child to be made to read out loud in class."

"They normally love learning, but they need special techniques and I really hope more will be done so that schools can put the correct measures in place".

Late 19th century lime kiln now fully restored

It is the most recent of a number of kilns which existed in Gibraltar, dating back to the Moorish period.

Far from home



Former Catalan president Carles Puigdemont's arrest and prompt release in Sardinia last week highlights how anomalous Spain's handling of Catalan separatists has been, and the complications faced in securing his extradition. Italy now looks set to join Belgium and Germany as EU countries that see no reason to extradite the exiled politician to his home country - and every time their extradition requests are denied, Spanish prosecutors' case against Puigdemont is weakened.

There are two fundamental uncertainties in Puigdemont's situation. One is whether the latest European Arrest Warrant (EAW) against him, issued by Spain's Supreme Court in 2019 but cancelled by a Belgian judge in January 2020, is still valid. The other is whether he has legal immunity as an MEP, which he technically attained in Spain's European elections in May 2019, but lost as the result of an EU parlia-

ment vote in March this year. In upholding that revocation two months later, the European Court of Justice (ECJ) said that there was little risk of Puigdemont being detained within the EU - which would have been an odd qualification to make if it understood that there was an EAW in place.

March of this year was a crucial month for another reason, because it was also when Spain's Supreme Court, fed up with having its EAWs rejected by Germany and Belgium, requested clarification from the ECJ on how to issue them.

Pending the court's announcement, Puigdemont's defence insists that the latest EAW was therefore deactivated at the time of the politician's Sardinia arrest. It was also explicitly cancelled by a Belgian court in January 2020, which ruled that the former Catalan president has had legal immunity from the moment the results of the May 2019 European elections were announced.

In making its January 2020 ruling, the Belgian court referred to the ECJ's December 2019 decision, according to which Oriol Junqueras, former vice president of Catalonia under Puigdemont, has also had legal immunity from May 2019 (although Spanish authorities didn't release him from prison as a result). By extension, this ruling applied to Puigdemont, who was therefore able to formally assume his duties as an MEP.

Puigdemont, then, has every reason to be optimistic about Monday's extradition hearing, not only because of the precedents, but also because Spanish prosecutors are losing ground. As things stand, it looks extremely difficult for Spain's Supreme Court to argue that the former Catalan president doesn't have immunity, or that the EAW for him has been valid since October 2019; but even if it proved both, it would still be up to Italian courts to find Puigdemont guilty of the equivalent of sedition under domestic law, something which Belgium and Germany have refused to do within the framework of their respective criminal codes. The former figurehead of Catalonia's separatists, it seems, isn't coming home anytime soon.

Supermarket price survey highlights big differences nationally

Locally, Malaga city and Marbella were surveyed and have shown up as among the dearest places to fill up your trolley in Andalucía

MALAGA. Depending on which supermarket chain you choose for your weekly shop and the town you do it in in Spain, the difference could be up to 30%. The findings are according to the annual survey carried out by the OCU consumers' organisation. It checks 1,103 stores in 65 places as well as the internet. Malaga city and Marbella were the two places surveyed locally.

Nationally, the Alcampo hypermarket in Murcia is the cheapest. At the other end of the scale is the branch of upmarket Sánchez Romero, in the equally well-heeled La Moraleja area of Madrid. In Andalucía, a branch of Covirán in Seville is the dearest, followed by Su-

percor stores in Malaga city and Marbella.

Interestingly, Malaga city and Marbella are also the Andalusian places, after Seville, where it is possible to save the most on the average annual food shop, depending where you go to, (1,099 euros saving in Malaga and 1,130 in Marbella).

The report also highlights the Valencian Region, Murcia and Andalucía as among the cheapest regions, with Balearics, Canaries, Basque Country and Catalonia being the dearest. Jerez de la Frontera is the cheapest place in Andalucía and also all of Spain - of those surveyed.

In Marbella the cheapest place to shop that was surveyed was Al Campo.

The branch of upmarket Sánchez Romero in La Moraleja, Madrid is the dearest supermarket surveyed

Freedom of speech

On 20 September, I received congratulations from a colleague in Venezuela for... Freedom of Speech Day. Frankly, having followed some really unusual and elaborate holidays - from Rosé Wine Day to Day of Happiness - I suddenly realised that I was not aware of the existence of this day which ironically directly relates to my profession. In any case it is true that some Spanish-speaking countries celebrate the so-called Día (in some definitions even 'Internacional') de la Libertad de Expresión de Pensamiento (literally: 'International Day of Freedom of

Expression of Thought').

Freedom of speech is something that I used to associate with the Dutch philosopher Erasmus, the Swedish priest Anders Chydenius, and especially with Speakers' Corner in Hyde Park.

However, the South American Freedom of Speech Day commemorates the anniversary of the capture of Rome which took place on 20 September 1870 and evoked the removal of borders and the unification of Italy. Coincidentally, the word 'borders' in this context is still relevant 160 years later, because we apparently have come to remove all borders

in our communication.

Yes, thanks to the developing social media, nowadays anyone can easily reach the public tribune to be heard or read. It appears our freedom of expression is becoming more like a sum of sound bites and quotations involving several 'press'-components - with either a desire to impress or to oppress, and both disrespecting borders of tolerance and courtesy.

Does it mean that we have stopped exchanging opinions in a polite way? It looks as though if something bothers our self-esteem, or we disagree with a given statement, we are ready to bombard an opponent with insinuations and everything that is already far from the gist of the discussion.

Attacking has become the best form of defence, and this is not new. This is an old saying - the best defence (or rather a pre-emptive strike) is a good offence, or, another classic: "If you are not with us, you are against us."

Working for 20 years as a journalist, I have heard lots of unpleasant words directed to my address and have even been placed in pigeonholes just because I said what others didn't want to hear or by chance squashed somebody's ideals and doubted somebody's idols.

All this is not about my complaining, more so about my sorrow. I am sorry that the fear of causing offence prevents certain topics from being rationally discussed.

We apparently endure a freedom of speech where one is encouraged to limit his/her personal point of view because there will be someone who is not free from prejudices and stereotypes, or just who doesn't mind playing a victim.

As for those who are loud and brave in expressing their views: indeed they quite often don't express their own thoughts but just say a trendy idea in unison, or rather are product of manipulation - tactful and very courteous.

Exploring Spain through wine

After 20 years working in hospitality in the UK, **Linda Macintosh** now shares her love of Spanish wine in Malaga's English cemetery

When she first arrived in Malaga, Linda Mcintosh, 37, did not imagine that she would end up hosting wine tastings surrounded by headstones and tombs. However, she has taken the paradox of drinking Spanish wines in the English Cemetery and made it a marketing hook for her business, Winederlust, which she founded with her wife, Phoebe, after leaving the UK six months ago.

"We had always planned on coming to Spain," Linda told SUR in English. "Then Covid hit, and I ended up on furlough [...] It was kind of a stupid time to move country and the best."

Linda had spent the last 20 years working in hospitality, mostly in her hometown of Manchester. After moving into restaurant management, she worked at a few top-end restaurants with excellent wine lists, whetting her palate for oenology.

"Then I ended up working at a really nice Spanish restaurant in Manchester that had an amazing Spanish wine list, and that kind of tipped me over the edge with my interests."

Linda subsequently studied with the WSET (Wine & Spirit Education Trust), before becoming the general manager of a wine shop and bar. However,

Linda and Phoebe had always adored Spain, and it was the combination of Brexit and the pandemic that finally encouraged them to move abroad.

"My wife had lived in Barcelona before we met. Then throughout our relationship we had been travelling back and forth from Spain, falling in love with it even more and travelling round Spain and trying to decide where our favourite area was. And we kept coming back to Andalucía."

Linda says she felt immediately at home in Malaga. She soon joined a social group for expatriates, which is how she met Father Louis, the Anglican priest of St George's Church. He suggested she use the English Cemetery, where the church is located, as a venue for her wine tastings. For Linda, it was an unexpected but ideal solution.

Charity

"What I had always intended to do, as part of my business plan, was to donate a portion of ticket sales to charity. It was then a natural progression to say, 'Well, rather than me donating to charity, let me donate to your charity for letting me use the space.'" So now Linda donates two euros per ticket to church fundraising.

Echoing with the cathartic buzzing of cicadas and adorned

by amber evening light that spills between the trees, throwing dappled shadows over the tables, the English Cemetery is certainly a delightful location for wine tastings. Linda markets Winederlust as "wine for the people", underlining her ethos of inclusivity; one guest at the tasting likened it to "dinner with friends".

"I don't want people to be scared of wine tastings," Linda said. "I think sometimes they can be quite high brow and pretentious and I try to steer away from that as much as I can. I grew up in the world of wine, around men in suits [...] who would speak to me like I was stupid."

Three from Andalucía

Among the six wines for tasting were a natural white, which

was many people's favourite, a fruity rosé that had been voted the best rosé in Spain for the twelfth year running by Spanish journalists, and a Mencía from Castilla y León that Linda described as "everything you don't expect from a Spanish wine."

Three of the wines were from Andalucía, at the request of clients who had attended previous tastings. Linda had been expecting this, though limiting herself to Andalusian wines is not her intention.

"One of the things I love about Spanish wine is, from all the corners of Spain, you can get

everything you want that you could get anywhere else around the globe, because it has all these different microclimates, all these different styles of wine making, and you can get these really fresh, crisp Ruedas and you can get these really heavy Priorats and these toasty Riojas. You can get everything."

Arriving in Malaga without having hosted a tasting for almost two years due to the various lockdowns was initially "daunting", said Linda, but revising and sharing her knowledge on wine has helped her to settle into her new life.

She has various plans for Winederlust, which include running themed tastings and collaborating with other businesses, but her priority will always be her passion - travelling through Spain in search of the best grapes, getting to know the country, one wine at a time.

Collars and leads

A dog's collar should be worn at night and firmly fitted so that its owner can control it in the case of emergency



Some things do not get the attention they deserve yet they are of necessity.

Take dogs' collars and leads for example. They are of great importance yet owners rarely give them a second thought. I often hear of dogs running off and getting lost because they have slipped their collars. They should have been adjusted so that they are sufficiently tight around the neck, snugly fitted, that despite wriggling so the most determined dog cannot get free.

There exists a belief that dogs should not wear their collars at night because they are uncomfortable for the wearer or ruffle the fur. Whoever started this weird theory...?

The simple truth is that collars are essential in the event of an emergency and most emergencies occur during the hours of darkness when humans are sleeping and take time to react to fires. It is often the result of

people weeding during the day then lighting a bonfire, leaving the fire, believing it is extinguished. An evening breeze fans the smallest ember and a raging fire soon results and spreads perhaps in your direction.

Dogs sense the danger ahead. Their reaction is to get loose and run away. Not usually the best plan. The owner can take charge of the situation with fire extinguishers or summon the fire brigade. The owner takes over the evacuation of the dog, but a dog without a collar is impossible to control and finding a collar and fitting it to a panicking dog is a problem.

A dog's collar should be worn at night and be firmly fitted to deal with any emergency, not just fire.

On the subject of both collars and leads, owners should buy both of good quality from a vet or reputable pet shop. Do not buy those that are plastic nor simulated leather. Get strong

ones of real leather or webbing. The military use webbing equipment for troops because it is tough and hard wearing, attachments should be of metal and of buckle type not plastic clips which are easy to operate but easy to open up when they should not.

Every dog should have a name tag of metal with the owner's telephone number and his mobile. When the finder calls, the distraught owner may be away from the land line seeking the lost dog. Make sure the metal tag can be read at two metres, not every finder may want to get too close to the lost dog however friendly.

Check all this equipment regularly and ensure your telephone number is current; also that the mandatory microchip is up to date. Your vet will have the equipment to do any change required. Do not delay this action; your dog relies on you to check regularly.

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Community groups rally to raise funds for local environmentalist

Ann Jenkins set up Playa Patrol in La Herradura shortly after moving to the village and was diagnosed with breast cancer last year

LA HERRADURA. Just over a year ago, Ann Jenkins, whose name many people will recognise as the force behind Playa Patrol in La Herradura, was diagnosed with aggressive stage four metastatic breast cancer which has also spread to her lungs and sternum. Ann has already had a mastectomy and is undergoing chemotherapy.

However, the many friends and acquaintances that Ann and her husband Christopher, who are both Canadian, have made while living in La Herradura are determined to help her to raise funds for Dendritic Cell Therapy (DCT), which the couple believe could help to save Ann's life.

Dendritic cells can communicate with the body's T cells and help the immune system recognise and attack abnormal cells, such as cancer cells. Blood is taken from the patient to develop a bespoke DCT vaccine, which is then administered. The treatment is

It is being organised by Sonia Ingriselli, a fellow Canadian and Admin on the Canadians Living in Spain Facebook group. Sonia said, "Ann is part of the page and I know many businesses throughout Banus and Marbella. They quickly volunteered to help the cause."

On the same day, The Hideaway

bar in La Herradura is also hosting a Pink October charity night, again with an auction. Donations include a painting by local British artist Steffi Goddard and spa days, among other items.

As well as the foreign community, the president of the Parent Teacher Association at La Herradura's primary school has also told Ann that they are planning to hold a family fun day on 17 October, at El Chambao de Joaquín beach bar in La Herradura, with some of the proceeds going towards Ann's cause. During the lockdown the couple donated 10 old iPads they had brought from Canada to help children who did not have laptops at home. "We are so welcomed into our little village and feel very humbled," Ann said.

A GoFundMe page has also been set up and so far just over 27,000 euros have been raised.

Ann is keen to stress that the fundraiser isn't just about saving her own life, but about the treatment itself and how it could help future patients.

GARDENING

Scadoxus multiflorus

The blood lily, botanical name *Scadoxus multiflorus* (synonym *Haemanthus multiflorus*), is a member of the Amaryllidaceae family of which there are around 73 genera. The majority of the family are bulbous herbaceous plants but a few, including *Scadoxus*, develop rhizomes as well as bulbs.

Scadoxus multiflorus has three sub-species, one of which, *S. multiflorus katherinae* is native to the Mediterranean region. The other two are found in Sub-saharan Africa and in parts of Arabia, although all three can be found naturalised in other parts of the world such as India and Mexico.

The common name blood lily refers to the reddish-orange blooms which are produced in a globe-shaped umbel of up to two-hundred tiny flowers with long stamens.

The drumstick-shaped flower heads can be up to 25cm in diameter and are held on bare, purple spotted stems up to 1.2 metres tall. After flowering a berry forms that turns bright red as it ripens.

The lance-shaped leaves, which may appear at the same time as the flowers or separately, can reach around 45cm long and form on pseudo stems formed by sheathing leaf bases (like ginger, wheat and bananas for example).

A good location for this stunning perennial would be in a shady spot, preferably with filtered sunlight. It can be grown in a border or in a container; the latter making it easier to move into a sheltered corner or greenhouse during cold winters. Alternatively the bulb and rhizomes can be lifted and stored. In temperate climates a protective mulch should be enough to protect it during the winter.

Propagation can be carried out by sowing the seed (which may take four to five years to bloom) or removing the small bulblets that form around the main bulb. This can be done when repotting in the spring. When planting the bulbs, be careful not to bury them too deep and use a rich, free-draining potting medium.

All parts of the blood lily are toxic; the sap was traditionally used to tip poison darts.

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WHAT HAPPENED TODAY?

1 OCTOBER 1975

The first strike of the GRAPO terrorist organisation

The terrorist group took its name from the date when its members killed four police officers in Madrid in 1975

The First of October Anti-Fascist Resistance Group (GRAPO) is a terrorist organisation that had its origins in the Organisation of Marxist-Leninists of Spain (OMLE), a splinter group of the Communist Party of Spain (PCE). The OMLE was dissolved in 1975, which resulted in the inception of the PCE-r (Reconstituted) and what would constitute its armed wing, GRAPO.

The movement was named after the killing of four Spanish police officers in Madrid on

1 October 1975. The group took this date as a starting point as a terrorist organisation.

The terrorist group continued its armed activity, carrying out numerous violent attacks which had strong social repercussions. After the high-profile kidnapping of several wealthy politicians, as well as the murder of more police officers, GRAPO became established as an urban guerrilla group in a similar manner as the Revolutionary Antifascist Patriotic Front (FRAP) had been in Francoist Spain.

During the first few years of the transition, GRAPO committed further atrocities, including the assassination of the president of the Spanish Supreme Court, Miguel Cruz Cuenca, and the bombing of the Guardia Civil

headquarters in Madrid.

The most devastating attack attributed to the group was perpetrated in a cafe in Madrid in May 1979, when a powerful explosive device killed nine people and seriously injured another 69 customers. Although GRAPO never acknowledged responsibility for the attack (claiming it was the work of a far-right vigilante group), the group's leaders, José María Sánchez Casas and Alfonso Rodríguez García, were arrested

and sentenced to a total of 270 years in prison in 1981 for carrying out the attack.

The organisation proposed a cease fire in 1982, and after further negotiations the following year, many of its members laid down their arms.

In 1984, the Spanish authorities passed an anti-terrorist law, and following an intense campaign, practically all the members of the organisation who remained active were arrested, although a few militants con-

tinued to plant explosives and demand money from businessmen.

Since its inception in 1975 until its last-known activity in 2006, the group killed 84 people, including police, military personnel and judges.

Currently the group is inactive, but not formally self-dissolved.

Feeling more tired than usual? Maybe you no longer have the energy you used to have to carry out your daily routine? Did your libido disappear some time ago? Do you feel sad, without any apparent reason? The cause may be your testosterone.

The factors that can cause symptoms in men such as those described above are diverse, but the levels of this hormone are not always taken into account when looking for a reason for this general feeling of lethargy.

Despite the importance of testosterone for numerous biological processes, misconceptions surround it, and qualities which bear no relation to reality are often attributed to it. The drugs to increase the level of this hormone have become quite famous, but they have a dark side: if these (and some are as simple as a gel which is applied to the chest) are not

used under medical supervision, there can be some very unpleasant consequences.

Dr Ignacio Moncada, a specialist who is a member of the Spanish Andrology Society, and Carmen Pérez Blanco, a doctor of endocrinology and medical nutrition and the spokesperson for the Melio analysis platform, are here to help us gain greater understanding of the so-called potency hormone.

into account, supplementing it can be dangerous," says Carmen Pérez Blanco.

The most immediate side effects include sexual dysfunction (yes, it does seem paradoxical), diminished fertility, cardiovascular alterations, liver toxicity and major mood disorders, such as aggressive behaviour.

"This hormone also increases the volume of red blood cells, which makes the blood thicker, and that increases the risk of cardiovascular problems," warns Ignacio Moncada. Enlarged breasts and increased sleep apnea are also among the symptoms.

✗ It only matters to older men. It is true that testosterone drops with age, but unlike women, who inevitably suffer from a sudden, sharp drop in oestrogen with the menopause, the male hormone

recedes gradually and not in everyone at the same pace.

But the margin is wide: it is not until a man is 90 years old that he can be considered to have reached the point of no return in the production of this substance.

However, it begins to drop between the ages of 35 and 40 and it decreases by about one per cent a year on average. Optimum levels have been established for every age and this is diagnosed through analysis.

"A test of testosterone levels is not often requested, but it is the only way of knowing. Pharmacies sell self-testing kits nowadays and they may become more popular now that people are more used to kits for self-testing due to the pandemic," says Pérez Blanco.

It's not only age that reduces it. Age is indeed its main enemy, but not the only one. Stress and obesity also have an effect. These two factors, prevalent in both sexes, directly alter this hormone.

"An increase in abdominal fat causes numerous endocrinous alterations, including a reduction in testosterone and an increase in its conversion to oestrogens, as well as an alteration in other substances that produce a negative biofeedback, reducing the gonadotropins and the testosterone even more," says the endocrinologist. And as for stress...

"High levels of cortisol directly inhibit the secretion of testosterone," she explains. Relaxation exercises and diaphragmatic breathing, medication and yoga can help. In addition to these factors, it can be weakened by congenital abnormalities, testicular damage through trauma, radiotherapy and damage to the pituitary gland, the organ that signals the testicle to produce testosterone.

Once lost, it cannot be recovered. Men believe that the loss of this hormone is something they have to accept as part of their biology, but that is not completely true: it can be recovered. However, this should only be done under medical control. There is a testosterone replacement therapy (TRT), which is applied if a deficit is diagnosed. This can improve desire, sexual function and performance, bone mineral density, body composition, mass and muscular strength, and also type 2 diabetes. These therapies are usually recommended for men aged between 45 and 55. "Older men tend not to consult their doctor about this," says Dr Moncada.

A deficiency affects more than the genital-sexual area. "Most of the men who consult their doctor do so because they are worried about erectile dysfunction, difficulty in completing sexual relations, or a lack of desire, and it is true that a lack of testosterone may compromise these. But in most of the cases we see, that isn't the cause. It is due to somatic problems such as fatigue, personal conflict, stress and other psychological factors," says Dr Moncada. But the consequences go beyond the sexual sphere, albeit this is the aspect that causes most concern. The symptoms include a reduction of muscle mass and strength, memory and cognitive function, as well as increased fat, reduced sensitivity to insulin, altered tolerance to glucose, triglycerides and high cholesterol. A lack of testosterone is also associated with mood changes, anxiety, insomnia and depression. Other parts of the body can sound a warning about the problem.

The more the better for male fertility. Whether applied through TRT or

taken as a supplement without medical supervision, an excess of testosterone can have negative effects and cause infertility. It seems strange, if you bear in mind that optimum levels are involved in sexual vigour and desire, but not in sperm production. On the contrary, "an excess of testosterone through supplements can cause testicular atrophy," says Dr Pérez Blanco. It confuses the body, which responds by blocking the production of sperm.

Certain foods and vitamins help to increase it. It is difficult, if not impossible, to make a pathology disappear with food and supplements alone. The same thing happens with testosterone. Strength exercises do increase muscle mass and raise the levels naturally "but that is not going to cure a problem," warns Dr Pérez Blanco. "Some sources say that certain foods, vitamins or supplements can increase the levels, but most of these claims are incomplete or are not even backed up by scientific study," she says. It is known, however, that zinc and vitamin D are important for the synthesis of testosterone and a lack of these micronutrients can have a negative effect. In cases such as these, supplements will help.

It doesn't only affect men. This may be the most widespread belief and it is the one which least corresponds to reality. This hormone does have some implications for the metabolism of women, specifically the ovarian function, but also intellectual performance and libido. "There are studies which show that a supplement can help women in this sense," says Dr Moncada. However, it is not a recommended treatment because of the side effects. Dr Pérez Blanco points out that high levels of testosterone and other androgens in women cause hirsutism (excessive hair on the face, chest, buttocks, abdomen and back), alterations in menstruation, alopecia and, most commonly, polycystic ovary syndrome.

Self-medication, under the spotlight. Testosterone medication is only sold under medical prescription, but self-medication is the order of the day because it can be obtained through unregulated channels and because supplements are

sold for athletes without this substance appearing on the label.

Dr Pérez Blanco says a Spanish study has shown that 14 per cent of supplements have been adulterated, but the true figure could be as high as 50 per cent. On one hand it is sometimes used illegally in sports competitions (doping), but on the other it is also used by people who exercise for leisure.

The therapy carries a risk: a growth of prostate cancer. This is the subject that causes most controversy around the possibility of treating abnormally low testosterone levels with drugs. But there are nuances. It does not mean that increasing the level of the hormone increases the risk of developing cancer. "In fact, this cancer appears when the man suffers a drop in testosterone," explains Dr Moncada. "What is known is that if cancer occurs, it accelerates its development. This is why the therapy should only be carried out under strict, regular medical control".

MARBELLA. For several years now, restaurant owner Santiago Domínguez has been saying he is going to retire but the pull of the kitchen stove has been too strong for him to resist. Until last week that is, when he announced that he would close the iconic restaurant on Marbella's promenade and hang up his chef's toque on 30 September.

His plans for the future, "To spend two months tossing and turning in bed. Do what I have not been able to do my whole life, sleep as much as I wanted," he said. "First I'll have a rest and then I'll think about what I'm going to do," he added.

Originally from Burgos, he arrived in Marbella in 1957, when the town was awakening to the growing tourism, and opened a beach bar right in front of where

his restaurant is today. He acquired the restaurant in 1972 and started up soon after.

Hundreds of movie stars, literary figures, politicians and artists have dined at his tables as it became the epicentre of gastronomy in the town with a cuisine based on the products and traditions of classic French cuisine.

With such an illustrious past he finds it impossible to choose a moment that he can say was the best of his career, "there have been many great moments, like when Onassis and Jacqueline Kennedy came, or when Onassis with Maria Callas visited. Or, on other occasions when Sophia Loren, Gina Lollobrigida, Jean-Paul Belmondo or Anthony Queen... There have been many, I would say thousands and I have about 20,000 photographs."

There is one niggling thing, one person he has never been able to feed because he wasn't able, himself. "When I've eaten here I've never been able to eat in one sitting. I've eaten half a plate of something and have had to get up or I've gone in to cook" he

explains.

Eating at the Santiago restaurant is like eating at home. "For me, the most important thing is that the customer leaves happy," he admitted.

Although it closed yesterday, and Santiago did not want to go into details, he did say that some of the staff were interested in continuing with the restaurant. Real Madrid and Barcelona are accustomed to competing for titles... but not the title for the biggest laughing stock in European football.

Sports editors must be wrestling with what is the big-

gest story? One was a fairytale, the other a horror story.

The biggest sensation appeared to be the mighty Madrid losing to the previously anonymous champions of Moldova, but then Barcelona challenged their great rivals

for front page news with the humiliation by Benfica.

A club called Sheriff lends itself to headlines. The team from Tiraspol was only formed in 1997. By then Real Madrid had already been crowned champions of Europe six

times. Their last-minute goalscoring hero Sebastien Thill, a Luxembourg international, has covered both legs in tattoos depicting his dream of playing in the Champions League. I hope he has skin left to chronicle his story.

Remember Real Madrid hadn't played in front of fans at the Bernabéu for 580 days. This was supposed to be the glorious home coming.

It should have been the story of the season, yet it kept everyone's attention in Spain for just twenty-four hours.

Step aside Real Madrid, Barcelona needed to grab the limelight.

In fact, it was a dark night at the Stadium of Light.

Losing at Benfica isn't quite as big a story as losing at home to a team from Tiraspol, but it is accompanied by a huge side show.

The spotlight is burning so brightly on coach Ronald Koeman. Quite often they declare a crisis in Catalonia when it is merely a bad week at the office. This truly is serious. To say it is the lowest point in the

club's recent history is pretty accurate.

In normal times Koeman would be replaced. Alas, these times are far from normal, and the club can't afford to pay him off. It would cost around 6 million euros to wave goodbye and then find a willing replacement.

Given the financial restriction, they couldn't recruit a coach with the credibility to take on the role. It's reported that they could pay his replacement just a quarter of his salary.

To highlight the predicament at the Camp Nou we can use the 'Gerard Pique factor.' He was sent on for the final 15 minutes as an emergency striker to try to save the day against Granada. He was hauled off after 33 minutes against Benfica to save face.

Pique is clearly past his best and doesn't warrant a place in the team. Maybe to justify his wages they appoint him as player-coach?

Big decisions need to be taken at Football Club Barcelona. Koeman is due to watch the Atlético game from the stands as he serves a touchline ban. Does he deserve to patrol the touchline again?

It has been quite a week for the big two of Spanish football and makes a mockery of the proposed European Super League.

You can see why they don't want the likes of the pesky Portuguese or sharp shooting Sheriff in town.

Stadium capacity decision boosts Malaga season ticket campaign

The new measures mean 100 per cent of seats can be occupied at football matches and 80 per cent at basketball games from this Friday

MALAGA. The decision made on Wednesday this week by regional and central governments to allow a return to full capacity at football matches comes as good news to Malaga CF.

The club are in the middle of their season ticket sales campaign and needed full capacity at La Rosaleda to allow for the influx of new ticket holders while maintaining the seats of the 19,000 current ones.

By Tuesday this week, more than 8,000 fans had already fully purchased their seats for the rest

of the season, which comprises 18 home games. The price of the seats is lower, and these new ticket holders will benefit from other advantages.

The most expensive season ticket, apart from the VIP area, costs 679 euros in zone 1 of the Tribuna, while the cheapest ticket will be in the 'Stand de Animación' (109 euros in total). The child pass stays at 60 euros.

Additionally, the club will compensate for the six games lost in the previous season due to the suspension of the championship (to those who requested it at the time).

The Interterritorial Council of the National Health System (CISNS) almost unanimously gave the green light for the expansion of capacity at the meeting on Wednesday, given the improvement of the coronavirus situation throughout the country.

The Ministry of Health initially announced that CISNS obliged both the National Professional Football League and the League of the Basketball Club Association (ACB) to "always guarantee a minimum interpersonal distance of 1.5 metres".

This condition was impossible to meet with full capacity, so finally the department requested that spectators should only "respect non-pharmacological measures of protection against Covid", without specifying distances.

Season ticket holders

The Health Ministry announced that the attendees of the events "will preferably be season ticket holders, as well as local fans" and that training will ideally be carried out without spectators.

The CISNS approved maintaining other limitations such as the ban on eating and drink-

ing in the stands. Furthermore, only water can be sold and consumed.

In addition, the council prohibits smoking, and it will be mandatory to wear a mask at all times in sports venues, even if they are open and ventilated, and entrances and exits will continue to be controlled to avoid

crowds.

These measures will be implemented for the entire country from 1 October and in the last week of the month a new assessment of the situation will be carried out. Malaga's next home fixture will be this Sunday, 3 October, against Fuenlabrada at 4pm.

Sharn Gomes, playing for Portugal, is still the highest run-scorer of the tournament.

He racked up 349 runs during the Group B round-robin matches, with his best performance being an unbeaten 78. With a spectacular strike rate of 192.81, he struck 25 fours and sixes apiece.

Junaid Khan, Thomas Vine and Imran Khan, representing Portugal, have kept their positions as joint-highest wicket-takers.

The CAC introduces the ironic sculptures of Mark Whalen to the city

Malaga Contemporary Art Centre is showing the first individual exhibition in Spain by this Australian artist who now lives in Los Angeles, USA

MALAGA. The Contemporary Arts Centre is now hosting an exhibition called 'I am just here' by artist Mark Whalen, whose work is halfway between 'kitsch' and pop with hints of surrealism and in which his gaze is set on everyday life. "I want to create sculptures that provoke sensations and feelings," he said at the presentation of his first individual exhibition in Spain. It consists of 22 pieces created specifically for this show, which can be seen at the CAC until 28 November.

Unusually for the CAC, the normally white walls have been painted pale pink to set off Whalen's works, something which was the artist's choice. "The colour contrasts with the sensations that some of my works produce, and I find that exciting," he said.

The curator of the display, Patricia Bueno del Río, describes his works as reflecting an existential restlessness, especially in the expressions of pain on some of the faces created by the artist. "Whalen creates myths and opens the Pandora's box of the subconscious," she says.
